Telegraphic Tidings

Denver's Federal Building.
WASHINGTON, June 11.—Bids have been opened at the treasury department for iron work on the public building at Denver, Colo., the lowest being that of Wilson Bros. of Chicago, at \$11,500.

A Colorado Cloud.
NORT COLLINS, Colo., June 11.—A cloud burst in the foot hills above the city yesterday caused the Foudre to overflow its banks, damaging crops, drowning stock and destroying bridges to the extent of \$15,000. So far as known no lives were lost.

Alger for Blaine.
SEATTLE, Wash., June 11.—General Russell G. Alger, of Michigan, arrived here yesterday. In an interview he said: "If Mr. Blaine indicates to the Republican party that he will be a candidate for President I believe he will be nominated in a moment. I believe he will be the strongest man in the Republican party."

Bad Business.
DENVER, June 10.—Ex-Policeman James C. Jones, last evening met his wife walking with T. J. Strawn, on California street, and after quarreling with him a moment drew his revolver and shot Strawn dead. Jealousy was the cause although there seemed to be no grounds. The murderer was arrested but refuses to say a word about the affair.

Sam Small.
ST. LOUIS, June 11.—A special from Ogden, Utah, says: The committee appointed by the M. E. conference, which has just closed, to audit the accounts of Sam Small, in connection with the University, report that they find him in arrears over \$10,000. It was decided that an action should be taken in the coming winter's case, but that the latter be left with the Georgia conference for whatever Sam's brethren in the south deem best.

Resignation This Week.
ST. LOUIS, June 11.—Gen. John W. Noble will return to St. Louis from Hot Springs during the present week, and it is stated by his friends in this city that his resignation as secretary of the interior will be forwarded to the president at that time. It is further stated that Gen. Noble will at once resume the practice of law in St. Louis, returning gladly to the shades of private life, abandoned on two years ago for the honors of a cabinet portfolio.

Land Office Order.
WASHINGTON, June 11.—An important order was issued by Commissioner Carter yesterday. It is directed at local land officers throughout the country. They are instructed to accept no fees from applicants for the issues of patents above what the law allows, all of which is turned in the regular reports to the government. It seems that some land officials have been acting as attorneys in this respect and have pocketed fees thus collected from applicants. This has also been the case with many of their clerks in making out papers for applicants after or during office hours. Many complaints come to the department relative to this matter.

High Death Rate.
NEW ORLEANS, June 11.—For more than two months New Orleans has been oppressed by a drought altogether unprecedented in its history. The prevailing weather throughout Louisiana has been dry, and the crops have suffered severely in consequence, but during May the drought was generally broken, except in New Orleans. In seventy days there have been only small showers here, with a total rainfall of one inch. The result the city death rate has been doubled. The mortality has reached the high figure of 47.8 per 1,000, double the average for summer, and nearly up to the mortality caused by a gripe, and this death rate is clearly traceable to the drought and the consequent bad weather.

The English Scandal.
LONDON, June 11.—Sir William Gordon Cumming was married at 10 o'clock, yesterday, in the fashionable Holy Trinity church at Chelsea to Miss Florence Garner, daughter of the late Commodore Wm. Garner, of New York. Lord Thurlow gave the bride away. Major Vesey Dawson, of the Coldstream guards, was the best man. The Rev. Robert Eyton officiated. The marriage was practically a secret marriage. Only twelve people were present at the ceremonies at Holy Trinity. They left for the bridegroom's estate at Altyre, near Farres, in Scotland, where they will spend the honeymoon. When the verdict was pronounced against him in the bacaret case Sir William Gordon Cumming again offered to cancel his engagement to Miss Garner, but that lady, believing in his innocence, would not hear of such a thing and insisted that the marriage should take place. Echoes of the bacaret scandal still fill the air. The denunciation of the Prince of Wales by the newspaper press, especially, his denunciation by the Tory press, has caused a tremendous sensation throughout Great Britain, and it is freely asserted that the revelations made during the trial of the bacaret scandal suit have done more to imperil the monarchy than any event which has taken place for many years past in England.

CONDENSED NEWS.
Many people on St. Paul's Island, Ont., are dying from the gripe.
Chinch bugs are dying off in Kansas. Some lesser parasite must have got a cinch on them.
Over 600 employees of the Union mills near Pittsburgh, Pa., are on a strike, and 500 looms are idle.
Joshua Aikens, of Carbon, near Greensburg, has a 5-day-old pig which has eight legs, four ears and two tails.

The court of claims at Washington has adjourned till October 24.
Bishop Knight, of the Episcopal diocese of Milwaukee died Tuesday.
Gen. John McNeal dropped dead from heart disease at St. Louis.
August Belmont & Co. have taken \$500,000 gold coin for shipment to Europe.
There are over 800 delegates present at the convention of the Epworth league at Cincinnati.
The sugar trust declared the semi-annual dividend of 3 1/2 per cent on preferred and 4 on common stock.
Sharpshooters from all over the United States, to the number of 2,000, opened their tournament at St. Louis.
The commissioner of pensions is making arrangements to further facilitate the issuing of pension certificates.
Labor men protest against the government employing Indian children at the Norfolk, (Neb.) beet-sugar station.
It is estimated that at least \$50,000,000 of the government's paper money supposed to be in circulation, has been lost or destroyed.
The depression in lake traffic has compelled the Chicago Ship Building company to shut down its yards at south Chicago.
The Union Pacific Coal company's mines at Evanston, Wyo., have shut down, and 300 men are thrown out of work.
Thousands of cattle are grazing illegally on the Cherokee strip, and the Indians are becoming alarmed at the state of affairs.
The St. Louis and San Francisco stockholders will issue 4 per cent bonds and call in the 6 and 7 per cent bonds at maturity.
A train on the Illinois Central dashed into a street car in Chicago, and although there were twenty people on the car, they all miraculously escaped unhurt.
Bernard Glandi was found guilty at New Orleans of jury bribery. He is the first of the six men indicted in connection with the Hennessey case.
E. D. Thayer, the aged president of the Brandon National bank, of Brandon, Vt., left a hand satchel containing \$40,000 in notes and mortgages in a dining car at Omaha, and it disappeared.
Judge Henry B. Saylor, of Huntington, Ind., has received official notice of his appointment as a member of the Pan-Republic congress committee.
W. E. Minchin, for some time bookkeeper at the American National bank of Nashville, Tenn., is discovered to be a defaulter to the extent of about \$18,000. Minchin and his wife have skipped.
United States grand jury began war against the smuggling of Chinese laborers into Washington. John Trumbull, of Port Townsend, Wash., was indicted for aiding Chinese to cross the Canadian line.
J. L. Campion, who for several years has been cashier of the Consolidated Bank Line company at Omaha, Neb., was arrested by Inspector Bowman, of the New York Fidelity Surety company. Campion's pecuniary excesses exceed \$50,000 cover a long period.
THE LAND COURT.
Something About the Justices Appointed by the President Yesterday.
Washington advises state that the president has appointed the following to constitute the new land court:
Joseph R. Reed, of Iowa, chief justice; associate justices, Wilbur F. Stone, of Colorado; Henry C. Scholtes, of Kansas; Thomas Fuller, of North Carolina; William M. Murray, of Tennessee.
The announcement of this last step in a matter fraught with so much importance to the people of New Mexico, creates great good feeling among the people generally. Judge Reed is a citizen of Council Bluffs, was for years a member of the Iowa supreme court and resigned that position to go to congress. Judge Wilbur F. Stone, of Colorado, is one of the best known jurists in the west. Judge Scholtes is from Wichita, Kas., and has been on the state district bench there for years. Of Judges Murray and Fuller but little can be ascertained at this writing.

WILL DO THE RIGHT THING.
The County Clerk's Friends Say He Will Ask to be Permitted to Do so Tomorrow Forenoon.
The newly appointed member of the county board, C. M. Conklin, proceeded to the court house this morning and demanded that the acting county clerk, Lucero, receive and file his bond. Lucero said personally he would be glad to do this, but would first like to confer with Pedro Delgado, the clerk, now in jail for contempt of court. During the forenoon all the necessary papers were prepared so that, in case of the acting clerk's refusal to accept and file this bond, application would at once have been made to the district court to have him committed for contempt.
A second call was to have been made at the clerk's office at 2 p. m., by Comrs. Conklin and Juan Garcia to ascertain finally what was going to be done about it, but shortly before that hour Comr. Conklin was hunted up by Sheriff Frank Chavez and the latter asked and urged that the matter remain in abeyance until tomorrow. The sheriff informed Mr. Conklin that County Clerk Delgado had made up his mind to comply with the order of the courts and recognize the lawfully elected county board, and that tomorrow forenoon this statement would be laid formally before the district court.
