BRIEF WIRINGS:

Mexico and Reciprocity.
CITY OF MEXICO, Sept. 1.—President Diaz to-day appointed Joseph Ives Linan-tour minister plenipotentiary to arrange a commercial reciprocity treaty with the United States.

Money in Coal.
New York, Sept. 1.—In accordance with the resolution of the National Coal Exchange, the first shipment of the season was given consumers to-day by an advance of twenty-five cents per ton. A similar advance may be expected monthly for several months to come.

A Big Crowd of Cranks.
New York, Sept. 1.—A large party of gentlemen representing the American Sabbath Union and nearly every religious denomination left here last night in two special cars for Chicago, for the purpose of presenting the question of the closing of the World's fair on the Sabbath day to the National Commission. The delegation is headed by Col. Elliott F. Shepard, president of the American Sabbath Union.

The War is Over.
WASHINGTON, Sept. 1.—Official corroboration of Balmaceda's fall reached the state and naval departments yesterday. Acting Secretary Wharton received the following cablegram dated Valparaiso, August 30, 9 p. m.—Balmaceda has turned over the government to Baquedano and fled. Canto goes to Santiago to-night to assume control until the arrival of Junta from Iquique. Good order here. Signed, McCreery, consul.

Endorses Reagan.
DENVER, Sept. 1.—The committee appointed by the several commercial organizations to recommend a candidate for inter-state commissioner met yesterday and endorsed ex-Senator Reagan, of Texas. It is generally understood that Senator Reagan will accept the place if it is extended to him. Senator Reagan is so well known that there can be no doubt of his having the support of the entire south and west if he be placed as a candidate.

Pattison is Afraid of His Friends.
HARRISBURG, Pa., Sept. 1.—The Democratic state convention will be held here on Thursday, and the state committee is in session to-day for the purpose of forecasting the platform and arranging for a temporary organization of the body. Some ill-advised friends of Governor Pattison have recently suggested that the convention should endorse him as Pennsylvania's candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination, but the proposition is strongly opposed by the leaders of the party. One of these, Secretary of State Harity, says: "It is undoubtedly true that Governor Pattison is regarded by many leading men of the country, from without as well as within Pennsylvania, as in the front rank of those who are being carefully considered in connection with the presidential nomination, but that does not alter the opinion that a majority of the party believe that Grover Cleveland should be nominated. This belief is shared in, moreover, by Governor Pattison himself and many of his friends and supporters."

A Saloon Man's Congress.
New York, Sept. 1.—Four hundred accredited delegates filled the Lexington opera house to-day when the annual convention of the State Association of Retail Liquor Dealers was called to order. Up in the galleries and out in the lobbies were fully 1500 additional saloon-keepers, one-half of them being from the interior of the state. There promises to be some lively times during sessions of the convention, which will occupy three days. Saturday an address was issued to the trade denouncing Governor Hill and the Democratic party for failing to keep the bargain by which an excise bill satisfactory to the dealers was to have been introduced and passed at the last session of the legislature, and several of the delegates are cocked and primed with resolutions condemning the governor as well as denouncing Tammany Hall's administration of local politics and the attempt on

The rumors that the Vanderbilts are to take control of the property are received with serious consideration in Wall street, where J. Pierpont Morgan's close relations with the Vanderbilts are duly appreciated. That the Vanderbilts will henceforth control the road seems certain. Should this come to pass the St. Paul and Rock Island roads would come into very close and friendly relations with the great Vanderbilt system, which would then far surpass in extent any other railroad system of the earth.

MRS. MARY LEASE.

The Woman Orator Who Stirs the Souls of the Farmer's Alliance.

No speaker in the series of women's conventions held in Washington last spring left so marked an impression as Mrs. Mary E. Lease, of Kansas. She is a natural orator and genuine reformer. Her speeches abound with thrilling eloquence and rhetorical beauty as well as moral intensity. She is the Joan of Arc of the farmers and workingmen of Kansas. The Farmers' Alliance Senator League in equal terms with men, and it already includes half a million women in its membership.

Whatever of economic heresy there may be in its platform, all Mrs. Lease's hearers are carried away with her eloquence. She has a way of saying the words of like spirit at her back. The Republican majority in Kansas was thought invincible, and yet the Farmers' Alliance last November elected five farmer congressmen out of seven, secured the state legislature and replaced the world-famous United States Senator Ingalls by the then almost unknown farmer, Mr. Peffer. There is no doubt that Mrs. Lease and the women of Kansas are in a large measure responsible for the success of the agitation. Mrs. Lease is a lawyer. She asserts that she soon discovered that the United States Senator Ingalls, the most thoroughly typical and representative element of American citizenship, are tired of old-time party politics. They want a new programme of social politics for the people. Mrs. Lease's confidence in the Farmers' Alliance as a piece of permanent machinery may be widely misplaced, but it is the spirit of awakening and of energetic action behind the organization that is significant. Mrs. Lease is certainly one of the most remarkable women.

At \$1.50 a Week.

An Associated Press correspondent who recently made a tour of German industrial centers says of the homes in Chemnitz:

"In each house one could see one or two looms. In one room I saw a man at his machine. He was making silk gloves of very fine workmanship. He told me he was making at present nine marks a week. I visited a number of other places. The men were all intelligent, self-respecting and industrious. Their earnings at present average from \$1.50 to \$2 a week. They live almost entirely on potatoes and rye bread. At the present high prices of food staples in Germany they get scarcely enough of that."

It is no wonder, in view of such wages and conditions, that the same correspondent says that some Germans claim that factories can not be established in the United States to compete with European prices, even under the McKinley law.—New York Press.

A Row on Col. Childers' White Cap Paper.

A fuss, bordering on a general fight, with blackened eyes and bloody noses, raged this morning in the sanctum of El Defensor del Pueblo, the White Cap paper, which, it is alleged, Col. 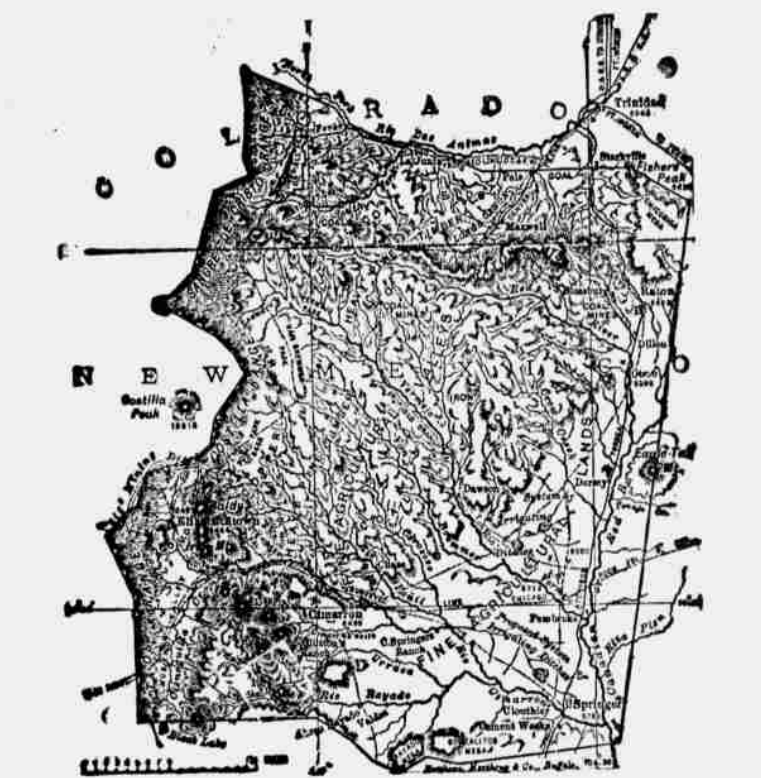
