BRIEF WIRINGS.

A New Bishop.
ROME, Sept. 4.—It is learned upon eminent and unquestionable authority that at the next Consistory formal announcement will be made of the selection of Rev. Dr. Hortmann, of Philadelphia, as successor of the late Bishop Gilmore, of Cleveland.

Going to Help.
KANSAS CITY, Mo., Sept. 4.—The Republican of Kansas propose to do their share toward the success of the McKinley campaign in Ohio. This evening Governor Humphrey, W. H. McBride, State Insurance Commissioner, and ex-congressman Louis, will leave for Columbus en route for Massillon, where they will open their campaign in behalf of the "Little Napoleon."

Workmen Organize.
BALTIMORE, Md., Sept. 5.—A union of Catholic workmen on the lines of the recent encyclical of the pope has been established here. The organization is open to skilled and unskilled labor, and its aims are to oppose socialism, to wear members from socialist bodies, to maintain a good standard of wages, and to find employment for members. It is understood that similar unions are to be established in every city of the country.

The World's Fair.
LONDON, Sept. 4.—The United States commissioners to Europe for the Chicago exposition sailed yesterday from Southampton in the steamer Augusta Victoria, for New York. They were accompanied by Henry Wood and Mr. Dredge, who go to Chicago to arrange for the English exhibit. Everywhere in Europe, the commissioners say, they were given a flattering and enthusiastic reception. From the 15th of July, the date on which they landed at Southampton until their departure, they have been objects of unceasing solicitude and courteous attention from all that is best and most distinguished in the European world. Their visit had been an occasion of a continuous demonstration of good will toward them and the country which they represented. No day passed that they were not feted. Here they were entertained at a garden party at Hatfield house by Lord Salisbury while in Paris, Berlin, Vienna, they were received with the same distinguished consideration. The work of the commission in Europe has been well done especially in Germany notwithstanding the bitter complaints made in that country about the McKinley bill.

Cleveland in Massachusetts.
BOSTON, Sept. 15.—General Collins, it is reported has been reconciled to the Cleveland Campaign for the Democratic nomination. The rumor is not generally believed as Gen. Collins antipathy to Cleveland was irremediable. In the Cleveland-Blaire Campaign Collins stumped New York for Cleveland and he was credited by many with having stopped the Irish stampede to Blaine. As a reward of his service, it was surmised that he would be tendered the secretaryship of the Cleveland-Blaire Campaign. Collins felt his disappointment keenly. It is understood he was offered other prominent public offices but each one of them he rejected indignantly. His election as president of the National Democratic Convention in St. Louis was pre-arranged and Collins had him elected chairman for political effect. Collins however, took no active part in the campaign that followed some months ago he resigned the chairmanship of the state central committee, so that he might be free to oppose Cleveland's political appropriations. Collins has been conciliated, Cleveland has gained a powerful ally in Massachusetts.

The Railroads.

RAIN TESTS SUCCEEDED.

The Ohio Wizard Creates a Genuine Sensation in Wyoming.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Sept. 4.—Frank Melbourne, the rain doctor, has been successful in his first test here in rain producing. He has been hard at work since Saturday night in the loft of a small barn located on a plateau overlooking the city. All the apparatus he has had was carried into the barn in four small grip-sacks. A small hole in the roof has been his only communication with the outside world. This morning the signal officer reported that a storm which was approaching yesterday had been diverted to the north and that the indications here were for dry weather. The morning was clear and bright with no indications of rain. Commencing at noon clouds commenced forming along the horizon on all sides. Masses of them were seen approaching toward Melbourne's laboratory.

Business in the town almost ceased, and thousands were out watching the clouds. At 2:40 there was a heavy peal of thunder and vivid flashes of lightning and in a few moments the rain poured down in torrents. It continued 30 minutes and the sun came out clear and warm. Melbourne sent word from his den that in an hour it would rain again. At 4 o'clock the rain commenced to fall again and continued for an hour. Forty-eight hundredths of an inch of rain fell. The committee in charge are satisfied that Melbourne had earned his money. An effort will be made to secure Melbourne to make a series of experiments to which experts from the east will be invited. To-night the weather indications are for more rain.

Oklahoma Products.
CHICAGO, Sept. 4.—Twenty gaudily decorated, carrying 25,000 bushels of wheat, not a mention a lot of watermelons, arrived here from Oklahoma yesterday. The consignment was sent here by the Guthrie board of trade as an advertisement. The wheat is of a very high grade.

Officials in Pursuit.
FORT GARLAND, Colo., Sept. 4.—C. M. Taylor and Frank Hyatt, deputy United States marshals, and J. A. Garcia, sheriff of Conejos county, arrived here at 10:45 o'clock last night on a special train sent out by C. Lydell, superintendent of the fourth division of the Denver & Rio Grande Railway, with a posse of about fourteen men and horses. They halted at Garland to unload the horses and prepare to start in several directions to assist in capturing the robbers.

COL. L. L. POLK.
President of the National Farmer's Alliance and Industrial Union.

Col. L. L. Polk, the president of the Farmer's Alliance, is a Southerner. He is the owner and editor of the Progressive Farmer of Raleigh, N. C., which place is also supposed to be his home. His duties, however, do not give him much opportunity to write for it, so constant and pressing are the demands upon his time. Col. Polk was born thirty-six years ago and since early manhood has been aggressive and progressive. How popular he is in his order may be seen from the fact that out of the vast numbers of the Farmer's Alliance he was chosen president. He now makes his headquarters at Washington, D. C., and the amount of business he disposes of in a short time is immense.

Col. Polk believes that the Farmer's Alliance movement will become an organized political party. His latest utterances



on the subject were in Richmond, Va., where he was attending a meeting of the State Alliance. He said that the National Alliance has over 3,000,000 members and is growing rapidly. It is strongest in the southern and northwestern states, and is increasing at a rapid rate in California, Oregon, Washington and other extreme western states. President Polk is a powerful speaker, and is a man who, by his direct manner, would attract attention

THE SHERIFF'S CASE.

During the last campaign the New Mexican published for several weeks a statement, taken from the sheriff's books, with as much care and as correctly as was possible, showing that then, during the month of October, 1890, Sheriff Frank Chavez, ex-officio collector, then a candidate for re-election on the Democratic ticket, was short a large amount of public funds collected for taxes. The New Mexican was assailed as publishing a falsehood and doing this for political effect and to defeat the sheriff and collector for re-election. All sorts of threats, etc., were made, but the New Mexican went on in the even tenor of its way and insisting that the charge was correct.

The New Mexican is informed that on the evening of September 3, 1891, upon an examination of the balance sheets of the sheriff's accounts, by the board of county commissioners, it was shown that the sum of \$33,265.43, according to the sheriff's own account, had been collected by him and had not been paid over to the county and territorial treasurers as the law required and that the sheriff was in default that amount.

The New Mexican's statement that the sheriff and collector was in default and short a large amount of public funds last October is therefore conclusively proven. The New Mexican's position advising the tax payers, property owners and honest citizens of this county to vote against the said sheriff's re-election and not to pay any taxes, while he was in office, is conclusively and beyond cavil proven.

The duty of the county commissioners in this matter is plain.

The people expect and hope that the law will take its course and that the county commissioners will do their duty.

There are two sides to every question; a right and wrong one; in Santa Fe county affairs let us have the right side, please; it is high time.

More honesty in county affairs is needed in most counties in New Mexico; taxes should be honestly collected and promptly paid over as the law requires and as common honesty demands.

There is plenty of money in the school funds of this city and the number of schools should be increased; two schools are not sufficient. Establish more schools Messrs. school directors.

The New York Sun, the strongest and ablest Democratic paper in the country, thinks well of Major McKinley and his policy of protection to Americans and American industries. In some respects it must be acknowledged the New York Sun is a great paper, and in the respects mentioned its head is very, very level.

THEY ARE BEING CROWDED TO THE WALL.
The Philadelphia Record, a strong Democratic free trade paper, now charges Major McKinley with having robbed the treasury by causing sugar to be placed on the free list. Anything for a charge; upon the eve of defeat Richard wanted "a horse, a horse," and was willing to give a kingdom he didn't possess for any sort

of a horse; that's the position the Democratic free traders and campaign liars are placed in now; the tin plate lie, the increase in price of everything owing to the McKinley tariff bill cry, the treasury deficit howl, the destruction of our foreign trade falsehoods and similar canards being played out, the next thing is to charge McKinley and the Republicans generally with robbing the treasury by putting sugar on the free list; rich, rare and racy that; but was ever the time when the average Democratic paper cared for one lie more or less.

ENFORCE THE LAW AS TO THE SETTLEMENTS BY COLLECTORS.

To-morrow the New Mexican publishes the regular quarterly statements of the territorial auditor and treasurer; they will be found interesting and instructive reading; there is now the sum of about \$110,000 cash in the treasury to run the territory for the coming six months; the sum is not sufficient; the deficiency is brought about by two very apparent causes: The first is that there are several sheriffs and collectors who have failed to pay over taxes collected during the past two years. The other, that the White Cap Democratic house of the last assembly misstated and belied up the appropriation bills in such manner as to cause much uncertainty and doubt and as to make appropriations for which no tax levy was provided.

The reports also show conclusively the falsehood of the howl made concerning the amounts on deposit here in the Santa Fe banks. By the next quarter the territorial funds will have dwindled down much more and will be very small till the new taxes come in.

In the mean time it ought to be impressed upon the several boards of county commissioners that it is their sworn duty to compel sheriffs and collectors to make prompt settlement; let the law be enforced in the matter of paying over taxes to the proper officers.

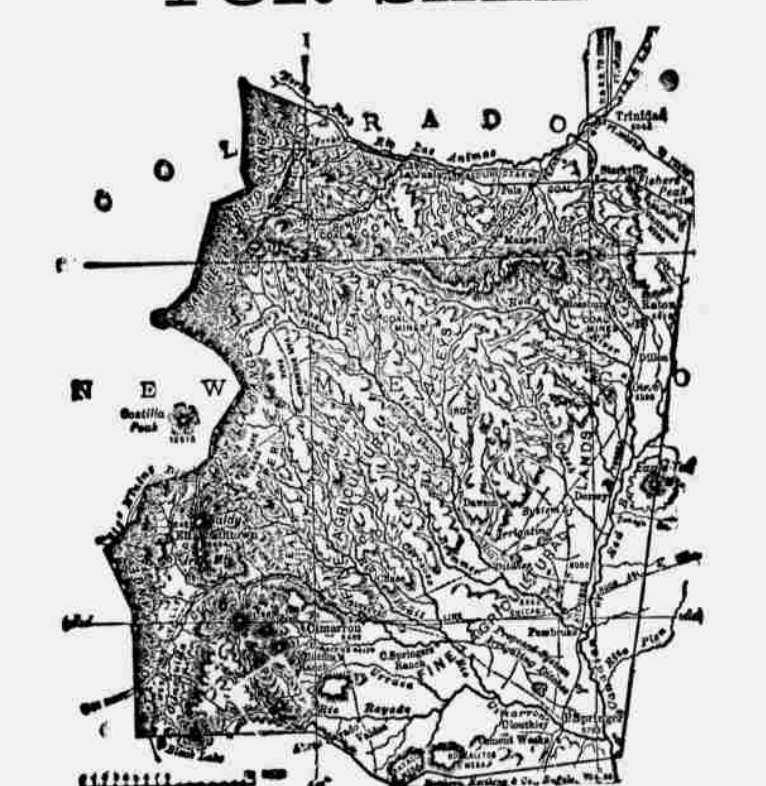
