BRIEF WIRINGS:

Presidential Appointments.
WASHINGTON, Sept. 7.—Judge O. Hill, of Minnesota, has been appointed chief of the division of Indian affairs in the office of the secretary of the interior, vice M. E. Carpenter, resigned.
Webster Flannagan, of Texas, has been appointed collector of customs at El Paso, vice Clark, resigned.

Gresham Endorsed.
GALVESTON, Texas, Sept. 7.—At a meeting of the citizens of Galveston, Hon. W. Gresham of this city, was enthusiastically and unanimously endorsed for the appointment to the position made vacant by the death of W. L. Bragg of the inter-state commerce commission. During the meeting several telegrams were read from Colorado, Kansas and Iowa endorsing Mr. Gresham's candidacy.

Robbers in Close Quarters.
DENVER, Sept. 7.—Reports received by Denver & Rio Grande officials say that five mounted and heavily armed men entered Castillo canon Saturday night just before dusk, closely followed by a sheriff's posse. Word has been sent to the sheriff at Trinidad to guard the east entrance to the canon. If the five men prove to be train robbers their capture is almost sure.

Mr. Elkins a Probability.
NEW YORK, Sept. 7.—A special to the Press from Washington says: It is reported here on what is considered good authority that Secretary of War Proctor has sent his resignation to President Harrison, to take effect on September 30. The same authority says that Stephen B. Elkins, of New York and West Virginia, will assume the duties of the war department on October 1, by the appointment of the president.

Towers and Storms.
PARIS, Sept. 7.—In the recent storm and water spout terrible damage to market gardens and vineyards in the environs of the city was caused. Many acres of vines were destroyed. In Paris, many houses were invaded by hordes of rats, which had been driven out of the sewers by the floods. Scientists assert that the Eiffel tower caused electrical disturbances, and that the climate here has been worse since the tower was built.

The Union Pacific.
NEW YORK, Sept. 7.—The syndicate formed a few days ago for the relief of the Union Pacific has carried out the plan successfully, and all arrangements were completed at a meeting held in New York yesterday, at which all of the trustees and the creditors were assembled. The floating debt of the company, amounting to \$20,000,000, was all provided for. It is thought that the Vanderbilts have now gotten a foothold in the west and some radical changes will take place in another year in railways.

On a Tour of Inspection.
BOSTON, Sept. 7.—Secretary of War Proctor, who arrived at his summer home at Marble Head Neck, yesterday said he expected to leave New York next Wednesday for the west. The primary purpose of the visit is to inspect the posts of the department of Dakota which he was not able to visit on his former trip. "I desire especially to see and examine into the workings of the new Indian policy just organized. There are six organized and six additional under way. The experiment of making trained soldiers out of them is proving successful," said the secretary.

Chicago's House-Tower.
CHICAGO, Sept. 7.—Plans for the Old Fellows temple to be erected in this city, have been prepared. They provide for a building as high as the Washington monument. The entire ground space is built up to a height of fourteen stories. Above this the building extends six stories in the form of a square cross, the four spaces an angle of the main building being left vacant. Above this is a tower shaped structure fourteen stories high, making thirty-four stories altogether, with an aggregate height of 556 feet. The estimate cost is \$3,500,000. The ground space covered is to be 177 x 233 feet.

EX-PREST BALMACEIDA.

The Defeated Ruler of Chili Who is a Fugitive.

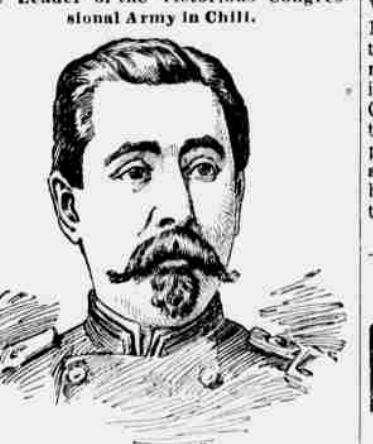


Jose Manuel Balmaceda was born in 1840. He is an educated man of resolute will, a fluent speaker and an experienced politician. After serving as deputy in five legislatures he became minister of the interior in 1872. He was one of the founders of the Reform Club in 1868, and in 1874 was an advocate of the separation of Church and State, and as prime minister, in 1884, he introduced civil marriage and other liberal laws. He was inaugurated president, September 18, 1886, for a term which expires September 18, 1891.

In the beginning of President Balmaceda's administration he fulfilled in a measure the liberal tenets of his early career. The public revenues were increased and the cause of popular education advanced. But soon his policy changed and he showed a disposition to go to unexampled lengths in centralizing the power of the Government, controlling legislation and manipulating the entire electoral system so as to dictate and control the presidential succession. The active opposition of the whole reform party of Chili was aroused and the result was civil war, which has been carried on with varying success of both parties, until the final defeat of Balmaceda's army by Col. Canto and the surrender of Santiago, the capital of Chili, to the congressional party.

The Leader of the Victorious Congressional Army in Chili.



Col. Canto is 40 years old. He commanded a battalion in the war with Peru and greatly distinguished himself. To his military tact, bravery and ability as a leader in that war he owed his promotion to the rank of Colonel. He is one of the most able officers of the army. He is short of stature and of swarthy complexion. When trouble was brewing between Balmaceda and his congress Col. Canto proposed a toast to the constitution and the three powers it established—the legislative, the executive and the judicial. Balmaceda ordered his arrest and Canto suffered several months' imprisonment and was finally sent to the north of Chili in exile. When the revolution broke out Canto escaped and immediately joined the congressional party and was put at

THE territorial fair at Albuquerque will be the very best that has ever occurred; and toward that very acceptable end the New Mexican has done very much indeed.

This great and grand climate of the capital city of New Mexico is coming to the front steadily; come to New Mexico and specially to Santa Fe, all ye health seekers and enjoy yourselves.

THE Republican party works for the interests of the people honestly; the Democratic party talks about the interests of the people and gobbles up all the public funds it can. There is the distinction and the difference.

The edition judiciously distributed, as we believe it will be, will do the territory a great deal of good and will show up the city of Albuquerque and the territorial fair in a very favorable light.

Our friends, the enemy, the White Cap-Democratic territorial committee, are busy raising funds for the support of the White Cap sheets, La Voz del Pueblo and El Defensor del Pueblo. It will take 2,500 good, old, silver pesos for such support. THE ACTION OF THE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS.

As already announced in these columns the resignation of Sheriff Frank Chavez as collector and sheriff was duly accepted by the board of county commissioners and Hon. C. M. Conklin was appointed to fill the vacancy. The new sheriff is too well known to the people of this county to need much said about him; the fact that he perfected a bond of \$100,000, a good and strong bond, in three hours on last Saturday afternoon is the most favorable comment that can be made; he has been sheriff and collector of this county for five years; he made an excellent record, settled his accounts to a cent and retired from office a poor, but honest,

man. The New Mexican predicts that he will make a careful, just, law-abiding and efficient sheriff and an honest, energetic and painstaking collector; that taxes will be collected promptly and without fear or favor and will be turned into the territorial and county treasuries once a month as the law and common honesty require and demand.

The people of this county are also to be congratulated upon the fact that during the past few months an honest board of county commissioners was in office, else the financial matters of the county would have gone from bad to worse, as is very apparent and known to everybody who knows anything, and acknowledged by all honest citizens. These three officials, namely Messrs. J. R. Mayo, C. M. Conklin and Juan Garcia, insisted upon an investigation of the financial affairs of this county; the investigation proved beyond cavil and beyond doubt that the administration of the county commissioners during the past two years and during the present year and until they, the present board came into office, had been dishonest, and that the sheriff was short in his accounts \$33,000.

The board acted firmly, but it must be admitted very moderately and mildly in accepting Sheriff Chavez's resignation. This we think was probably the very best course to assume for the present. The board intends standing by its record, and will, if at all possible, collect for the county the shortage now existing. It will also see that hereafter the law concerning collection and paying over of taxes is carried out in the letter as well as in the spirit.

The thanks of the good, honest and law-abiding citizens of Santa Fe county are the Messrs. Mayo, Conklin and Garcia for their honesty of purpose, fidelity and firmness in protecting the best interests of the taxpayers and of the people in this case.

Frost does his work well and it will be no fault of his if New Mexico does not swarm with prairie schooners all the way from the frozen north next year.—Hillsboro Advocate.

New Mexico Fruit.

The territory of New Mexico is attracting the attention of the viticulturists all over the country. The grapes grown in the Mesilla valley have demonstrated that the soil there is adapted to the raising of grapes of a flavor that is unsurpassed anywhere, and wherever they have been shown they at once attract the attention of all judges. Not only are the grapes grown of a superior quality, but the vines have uniformly been very prolific. The crop this year is magnificent and a considerable portion of it will be made into wine. The apple, pear, peach and plum crops are unprecedented in size and yield.—Denver Field and Farm.

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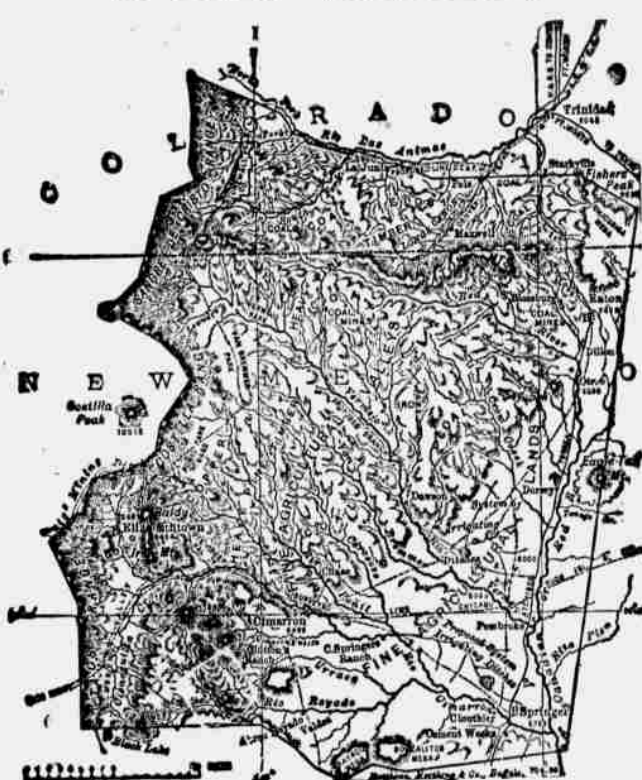
