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## MINISTER IN ROLE OF AMATEUR DETECTIVE

CAUSES ARRESTS FOR  
SUNDAY LAW VIOLATIONS

Warrants Sworn Out Against  
Central Avenue Saloon Own-  
ers and Employees For Serv-  
ing Drinks on Sunday.

With a minister in the role of amateur detective, Albuquerque has a new and active campaign against saloons and saloonkeepers for alleged violation of the New Mexico Sunday law, which prohibits the doing of all necessary labor on the "rest day of the week," commonly called Sunday, which has been interpreted by the majority of New Mexico law officers as directed particularly against the sale of liquor on Sunday.

Rev. Louis J. Moran, pastor of the Methodist church, south, is the man who conducted the campaign which ended at a'clock last night, when he swore out warrants against owners and employees of several saloons on Central avenue, charging violation of the Sunday law. The warrants were placed in the hands of Chief Deputy Sheriff Fred H. Hoyt, who succeeded in serving two of three of them, those on whom service was effected being cited to appear in justice court this morning to answer to the charge. At other places visited by the officer the bars, which the preacher had alleged to have been open, were found dark and quiet and it is asserted by Mr. Moran and those who participated with him in the campaign, that the owners and employees of these latter places, recoiled against the in-tervened action and closed up in time to avoid the officer.

The Rev. Mr. Moran directed a considerable portion of the early part of the evening to conducting the investigation. He visited the St. Elmo bar, the Sturges bar and other places where the complaint alleged drinks were being served, and immediately sought the officers of the law with petitions for warrants. Having sworn out the instruments he accompanied the officers on the round of service. It is charged that the law, put in quite successfully here some months ago and retained in place effectively since that time, had been taken off by the saloon owners in order to accommodate numerous visitors in Albuquerque who tell a story for cooking and other beverages, and that the resultant alleged violation of the Sunday law was brought to the attention of the Rev. Mr. Moran and others, who immediately took steps to put a stop to the serving of drinks. The results of the action are awaited with considerable interest.

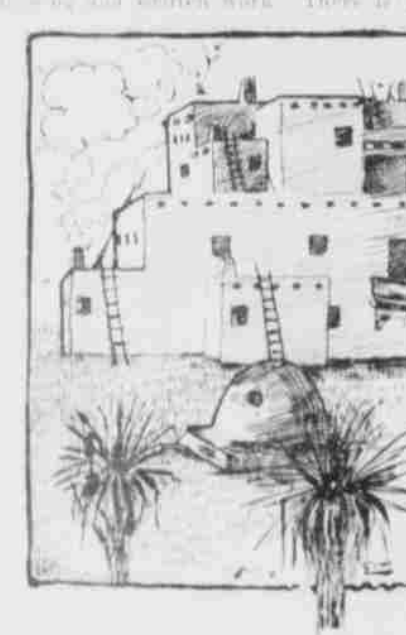

# ASSOCIATED PRESS NEWS FORECAST FOR THE WEEK

During a temporary lull in the political campaign, baseball will take the center of the thought for the coming week, while the country awaits for the decisive battle in the big league journal of the week.

The political campaign, however, will not be idle. Taft continues in the west, Brown at Lincoln, resting and waiting. He will leave his home Tuesday to speak in Iowa and then go to Chicago, where Brown and Taft are to be the guests of honor at the big electioneering campaign.

Mountain Senator Beveridge is busy in the northwestern states at Seattle, Portland, Tacoma, San Francisco and intermediate points. Hughes will be busy in South Dakota, Minnesota, Michigan and Missouri, losing the week at Chicago. Sherman will be busy in the northwestern states, then return to New York. Kern is staying through North and South Carolina and the Virginia. Hence, unless there should be an eruption at Lincoln or Washington, the week is likely to be peaceful politically.
