## SAD ACCIDENT AT SEWER REPORT TO LOCAL SANTA FE STATION

Three-Year-Old Son of Pass-  
enger Falls Beneath Switch  
Engine Losing Leg; Mother  
Also Hurt.

A very distressing accident occurred  
at the Santa Fe depot at 7:30 yester-  
day morning, when the three-year-old  
son of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Clark, pas-  
senger of train No. 1 from New York to  
Albuquerque, fell beneath a switch  
engine and his left leg so badly  
crushed that it was necessary to am-  
putate it at the knee. According to  
eye witnesses, Mrs. Clark had the lit-  
tle lad by the hand and started to  
cross one of the tracks, evidently un-  
aware that a switch engine was slowly  
backing up on the same track. The  
woman saw the engine as it was ap-  
proaching and attempted to raise the  
track barrier, but she was too late.  
She was knocked down, however, and  
for the long running board, would  
have been ground to pieces. As it was  
she was shoved off the track and onto  
the sidewalk. The boy was not so for-  
tunate. He managed to reach the  
sidewalk, but stumbled as he attempt-  
ed to step upon top of it and slipped  
back toward the track, his left leg be-  
ing almost completely severed by the  
wheel of the engine. The lad, together  
with his father and mother, were  
hastily placed in an ambulance and  
taken to St. Joseph's hospital, where  
the injured mother was ampu-  
tated by a surgeon. The engineer  
of the switch engine was sitting in  
the right side of the cab, and was  
very much startled by the accident.  
The switch engine was looking after the  
removal of a strike of work. The  
switch engine was rapidly moving  
when it reached the Hoken box and  
if it had been old enough to realize  
what was happening, he would have  
escaped injury entirely. The boy's  
parents were passengers on one of the  
delayed south-bound passenger trains  
and were supposed to be California. They  
are heart-breaking over the accident to  
their son. It is said the Hoken were  
moving to California for the benefit  
of the boy's health.
