PRISON YAWNS FOR CURTIS AND MORSE

FINANCIERS CONVICTED OF DEFRAUDING BANK

Minimum Penalty of Five Years in Jail Provided for Offense; Application For Bail Is Denied.

(By Morning Journal Special Staffed Wire) New York, Nov. 5.—James W. Morse, until a year ago it dominated the world of finance, and Alfred H. Curtis, former president of the National Bank of North America, were found guilty today in the criminal branch of the federal court, on charges of misappropriation of funds and falsification of the books of the bank. There was also the additional charge of conspiracy against the prisoners, but the jury acquitted the men on this count.

Within five minutes of the time the jury had rendered its verdict, Judge Hough had refused to entertain a motion for bail and had committed the two bankers to the Tombs prison. The judge said that he would hear any motions the lawyers for the prisoners desire to make at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.

The federal statutes provide a minimum penalty of five years imprisonment for falsifying the books of a bank and a penalty of two years imprisonment for misappropriation of funds. No alternative but imprisonment is provided for conviction on the charge of falsifying the books of a bank. The maximum penalty on this charge is ten years imprisonment. The jury recommended a sentence of five years and a fine of \$100,000 for each of the defendants. The court room was crowded with a number of times and once when the jury returned to discuss the case. The judge, Mr. Hough, said that he would hear any motions the lawyers for the prisoners desire to make at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.

A large crowd had gathered in the court room to hear the verdict. Mr. Morse and Mr. Curtis had been in the court room for some time before the jury returned. Mr. Curtis was seated next to Mr. Morse. The judge, Mr. Hough, said that he would hear any motions the lawyers for the prisoners desire to make at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.

There was a momentary lull in the court room. This was broken by a burst of excited conversation and a few minutes later the lawyers for the defendants were making the customary motions for a new trial, for bail and for permission to take an appeal to the circuit court of appeals.

Judge Hough said that he would hear the motions tomorrow morning, when the prisoners and their lawyers would be present. He then dismissed the jury. Mr. Morse and Mr. Curtis were accompanied as far as the Tombs prison by their wives.

FINANCE AND COMMERCE

Wall Street.

New York, Nov. 5.—The stock market today gave plain signs of feeling the effect of the speculative panic which was set on for yesterday, and became unsettled and hesitating in the course of the day's business. The first thing that happened was a considerable rise in the large aggregate of 300 and the decrease eventually marked the satisfaction of the year's speculative demand induced by the election results. Stocks were held out to meet this demand from the market. All bids were filled promptly, according to the definition of brokers on the floor. Afterward there was a disposition to push the price of cotton. The impression that made of the market having arrived at a stage that discounts the favorable factors was emphasized by its action in response to the announcement of the plan for distributing \$112.25 extra profits on each share of old Northern Pacific stock, the new stock on which the final 12 1/2 per cent of subscription is payable in January, and showing the "coupon." Northern Pacific stock had sold as high as 150 1/2 after the opening but fell to 149 1/2 before the dividend announcement and did not rise to above 149 1/2 afterwards. The supposed intention to declare this dividend had been a influence in the stock market at intervals all through the present year and has been an offset to the desire to be liquidated, only to be proved lacking, that district of the truth of the rumors has grown up in the speculative element. This report was based on the report of an individual action given today. The constant rumors regarding the dividend have pointed to 10 per cent on the amount as a quotation for the existing stock and the certificates of the new stock were kept about that far apart.

The uncertainty on the subject has been ascertained by James J. Hill, discussing the reports of an intended extra dividend, which have the impression that its declaration was opposed by the most influential element in the control of the property. The opposition was based on the opinion that so large an extra dividend at this time would prove impolitic on the part of a company contesting for total reduction of rates of competition and seeking to secure higher rates for freight transportation. The company is at some pains to declare, in the official statement of the dividend disbursement, that "no part has been derived from the transportation business." The derivation of these profits, influence, is somewhat obscure. The Northern Pacific investment company, the stock of which is owned by the Northern Pacific, owns coal and timber lands in Montana and Washington. The \$2,775,000 stock in the Northern Pacific treasury is valued at \$2,775,000 in the annual report of the company. The amount to be withdrawn from the resources of this company to provide for the \$12 1/2 per cent dividend on \$112,000,000 of Northern Pacific stock is \$12,750,000, which amounts to 12 per cent of the stock of the company. The withdrawal of the stock after the new dividend known owed something to an apprehension of a sharpening of legislative pursuit of the company by this evidence of its liquid condition.

Chicago, Nov. 5.—Fresh news of a possible crop estimate in the wheat market today, but active trading was slow. The wheat market was steady. The wheat market opened at 1 1/2 to 1 1/4 at Liverpool and during the greater part of the day sentiment was bullish and a further decline of about 1/4 was recorded. In the final hour, however, the market rallied sharply and all of the loss was regained, closing prices being unchanged to 1/4 over with December at 24 1/2 and May at 24 1/2.

The corn market was weak all day and prices at the close were 1/4 to 1/2 below yesterday's final quotations. A decline of 1/4 to 1/2 in the price of cash corn was a bullish factor. Weather conditions were favorable for the crop and the prospect of the new crop and receipts are increasing.

Options were weak the entire day. The market closed with cash prices 1/4 to 1/2 lower, the December delivery having the greater loss.

Provisions were weak as a result of a weaker tone in the live hog market and because of the slump in corn. Late in the day a further recovery was seen, but by the close the market was about steady with prices a shade or 1/4 to 1/2 lower.

URGES WITHDRAWAL OF DESERT LAND

Commissioner Recommends Plan to Meet More Urgent Demands for Homes in the Years to Come.

(By Morning Journal Special Teamed Wire)
Washington, Nov. 5.—In his annual report for the last fiscal year, Commissioner Fred Bennett, of the general land office, recommends the withdrawal from entry of all public lands which may be irrigated, which are not now capable of being utilized for homes, at that point he says:

"The proper steps to take would be to withdraw the lands of the United States in order to certain what public lands which in their present condition are incapable of affording a home are susceptible of irrigation at a cost even much greater than that now contemplated by the reclamation service, and to withdraw these lands from entry awaiting the time when they can be made use of as home sites either under the United States government or under the Corps of Engineers. It will be only a comparatively few years before an irrigation project which will cost as much as \$200 an acre will be considered profitable and the market for the land justly such an expenditure."

"No one can be hurt by such a withdrawal, for desert land which cannot be reclaimed by the individual effort of a settler can never become a home until water is brought to it by the government, state or by the expenditure of vast sums by private enterprise."

Mr. Bennett says the land office has recommended that cuts be brought on either land which is being irrigated, or that the land be sold for 25 cents an acre. "There were several," he adds, "241 judgments for fraud, which resulted in sixty-three convictions and sixty acquittals, the remaining cases not yet having been tried."

"In the year 1907, of investigations there have been recovered from fraudulent entry during the fiscal year 1907-8, a total of 280,000 acres, exclusive of many relinquishments."

The total receipts for the year of the office were \$12,715,795, an increase over the previous year of \$1,167,521.

The total area of land originally entered during the year is 19,039,324 acres, a decrease of 1,037,299 acres, as compared with 1907. The total area upon which final proof was made is 8,068,044 acres.
