FOES OF GRAFT AROUSSED BY ATTACK ON HENRY

Tragic Events of Past Week in San Francisco Rekindle Civic Pride and Give New Life in Reform Movement.

INJURED PROSECUTOR ON ROAD TO RECOVERY

Suicide of Would Be Murderer and His Desperate Deed Subject of Sermons in Bay City Churches.

(By Morning Journal Special Leased Wire) San Francisco, Nov. 15.—The condition of Francis J. Henry, is still most satisfactory and the attending surgeons report that he is making excellent progress and will be on the road to recovery. He passed a comfortable night, sleeping most of the time and feeling easily today.

Although the bullet has been located and removed from the wound, the surgeons have decided not to attempt it until Mr. Henry gains more strength as it has as yet given no cause of trouble.

The swelling in the throat is less than at any time since the patient was taken to the hospital and he is breathing normally.

Mr. Henry spent an hour today in the examining room of the hospital while the surgeons were removing grains of powder from his face and head. While this was going on the wounded man sat upon the table and made peculiar remarks.

When told of the mass meeting held last night at Dismal Hall he showed great interest and on being informed that his assailant had taken his own life at the court he said:

"It is too bad he did it before he gave his reason for shooting me."

Another X-ray photo of the assistant district attorney's head was taken today in order to get a different view from those taken yesterday.

The suicide of Morris Hays, who tried to assassinate the noted prosecutor, was the subject of many discussions today and the police authorities were engaged in trying to ascertain how Hays was able to have taken his life after he had been thoroughly searched two or three times. Two theories were advanced, one was that he had the pistol hidden in his shoe from the time he attempted to kill Mr. Henry and it was overlooked by the police.

The other theory, the one that the district attorney's office holds, is that the pistol was passed to Hays while he was confined with his wife and the police guard.

Although Hays was in the county jail he was in charge of the police department.

The clergy branch of the League of Justice held two mass meetings today, one at Calvary Presbyterian church, the other at Grace Methodist Episcopal church. The incidents of the past few days and the capture of the graft prosecution were discussed by a number of speakers, clerical and lay.

At the regular services of the churches in the city surrounding the tragic events of the week and their lessons were made in the sermons.

The attempt to kill Mr. Henry has had the effect of kindling civic pride and awakening public opinion and criticism of the prosecution of the bribery-graft cases and has evoked a determination to support the district attorney in the prosecution in a combination of all energies with disabuse the public service.

It is the intention to proceed to morrow with the interrupted trial of Abraham Rice, extra prosecutions laid being taken to prevent a recurrence of violence or disorder.

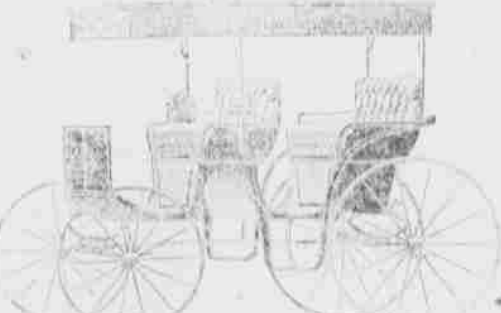

CARLSBAD PROJECT IS PROSPEROUS SAYS 'EARTH'

COUNTRY NEVER BETTER SINCE IRRIGATION CAME

Santa Fe Magazine as Usual Devotes Considerable Space to New Mexico and the Southwest.

The November number of "The Earth," just issued by the Santa Fe company from the Chicago publication office is an especially valuable one and shows that the company is carrying out its intention of devoting energies at present to the advancement of New Mexico and its resources. The November number contains an article on "Irrigation in the Interior of New Mexico," by H. L. Van Dine, well known here. "The Progress of Irrigation in New Mexico," by Colonel Max Frost, "Mineral Wealth of New Mexico," by Prof. F. A. Jones, of Albuquerque, "Colonizing the Santa Fe Southwest," by General Colonization Agent Charles L. Searles, of the Santa Fe, and numerous others, all handsomely illustrated. The leading editorial says of the Carlsbad project in New Mexico:

"The Carlsbad project in the Pecos Valley, New Mexico, is prosperous. At no time since irrigation began twenty years ago, has the whole country been in better shape than now. Crops are excellent; corn, small grain, alfalfa from and the like yielding heavy returns of the high quality that only can be produced in the soil. The climate is better than in any other part of the country under cultivation. The year is longer than at any time in the past, the demand for the products is still far beyond the supply, and the price received is, therefore, high and means big profits to the producer. Winter wheat which sold at \$1.55 a hundred pounds at the time of threshing in June are now worth \$2.25 a hundred. Corn sells at \$1.20 a bushel and alfalfa at \$12 a ton. Potatoes, peaches, apples, grapes and other fruit have been sold at cents per pound and up, very little being marketed at less than 5 cents.

A large acreage of alfalfa was cut for seed, the average yield being 250 to 300 pounds to the acre. Much of this seed alfalfa has been marketed at 15 cents to 17 cents a pound. In addition to the alfalfa, hay is taken from the same land this year making the average return from good alfalfa from \$25 to \$75 an acre. Is it any wonder the farmers are planting more alfalfa this fall?

The cotton growers look forward to a bumper crop. The zone at Carlsbad and Loving being on a flood under this season. This land will yield out at least a bale and a half to the acre. The cotton in this dry climate produces an excellent staple and is clean.

This is a busy time. In addition to taking care of the crops, alfalfa and small grains, like winter oats, are planted extensively. Alfalfa planted in the fall is in full corn at the following season, one cutting following the other from the last of April to the first of November. Small grain is harvested in time in the spring to follow with corn or some other fall crop. This leaves the land busy the entire year.

Alfalfa mills are being installed at various points in the valley. Alfalfa must have come into public favor so quickly and in such large quantities that the production is unable to keep up with the demand. This is the cause of the green alfalfa and the Pecos valley product will be the need in the land. Next season Pecos valley alfalfa will be shipped in sacks extensively.

It is surprising how few settlers have found their way to the project during the quiet summer months. Much land has been sold to men who have come to work immediately to have their work done. They grasp the advantages of this country, and their children, and have disposed of their holdings in the east to establish permanent homes under the Carlsbad project. The majority have purchased small farms with the view of practicing intensive cultivation and producing "much from little" which is possible here. The water is abundant and the soil is rich and fertile. The new settlers come from the best farming sections of the United States, bringing with them the most modern methods of farming.

The water supply of the Carlsbad project is certain and stable. The reservoirs are full and overflowing and a great deal of water is passing by down the river. The reclamation service is now at work on the large reservoir, known as McMillan, which will store a greater amount of water than ever has been done in the southwest. This will enable the farmer from this on need not fear long dry spells that may come. The water is here and waiting for his call to turn it to the crops whenever needed.

But some reliable one must be left to watch the property and to guard the forest from the depredations of timber thieves, both large and small, and Mr. Eldridge had helped to buy the tract, had braved every risk of it in making the "settlement" of its value in the purchase price, and he knew every foot of it and the timber standing upon it. Mitchell, years before, the good wife of Mr. Eldridge had died, his children had grown up and married, and he had long been a man who would rather be alone with himself than alone with a crowd around him.

Moreover, he loved the woods and the mountains and he loved his horse, his dog and his books, and his own philosophy which, in 1902, Messrs. Mitchell brought him to remain and guard their property in the mountain forests, and to become their agent there, he consented.

So, after ten years, Daniel Eldridge has lived alone upon that property, out in the mountains, coming out to visit the city of Albuquerque for drives or walks at a time, whenever the game prompted him to do so.

At length, when in 1905, came the organization of the American farmer company, with its capital of \$5,000,000, and the purchase by them of the vast tract of timber from the Mitchell brothers, and the building of their railway, and erecting of their mills in Albuquerque, the new venture was desired by Mr. Eldridge to stay with them and to continue the guardianship of the standing timber so rapidly increasing in value with every year. He looked upon the matter as the beginning end of his life's work, and decided to accept the offer.

So, for forty-three years, ever since the close of the war, which he entered as a mere boy, Daniel Eldridge has practically continued in the employ of one interest, and has a sense of usefulness before him yet.
