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CANNON HOTLY DEFENDS HIS POLICIES

TIMID SPEAKER LIKE CAT
IN HELL WITHOUT CLAWS

Scores Newspapers for Alleged
Selfish Motives of Fight to
Prevent His Re-election to
Congress in November.

(By Morning Journal Special Leased Wire)
Philadelphia, Pa., Dec. 18.—Speaker Cannon in an address at the annual banquet of the New Jersey Society of Pennsylvania, here, tonight took an unexpected fling at his critics and defended his policies and the manner in which the house was ruled at the last session.

"Fear," said Mr. Cannon, "caused the timid man to be afraid of the power who speaks to retain that power and listen to the improper proposals from without, and does not make a protest founded on high resolution, crowned with splendid courage and a desire to do right."

"Away with that old story of one man power and courage. Cannon made a protest against the bad power of the executive being made absolute and he was right."

"By a chapter of accidents I became speaker of the house. When the majority undertook to control the majority they were met with a refusal from the majority and the speaker of the house. The speaker would have been like a cat in hell without claws if he had not fought against such opposition."

"Rules were formulated for the government of the house. Those rules were right and proper. Under them the house wrote laws and proper legislative measures on the statute books. There were wild howls from partisan and selfish newspapers and magazines because the vote did not remove the House from its position on the printed paper and what paper they said they wanted it removed to the end of the world and would not let it go. But they could not show that the increase was due to the day and the speaker refused to allow the duty to be removed."

"They were ashamed," Mr. Cannon said, turning to Vice President James K. Shoup, who was a guest at the function, "to explain that this was the real reason for their opposition during this session and that they feared that nothing could be done without the aid of the majority. They called the head of the great American Federation of Labor and of the Anti-Saloon league, but the great republican party was in control and the government will go on."

He added that he was still speaker of the house.

URGE UNIFORM STANDARD
OF WEIGHTS AND MEASURES

Washington, D. C., Dec. 18.—At today's session of the conference of the state and national officers of weights and measures, the subject of uniformity of standards was discussed by Assistant Secretary of Commerce and Labor Wheeler, Director of Standards of the Bureau of Standards, and by Mr. E. H. Hunt, of California, and L. A. Plimmet, of Massachusetts. The conference urged congressional legislation making it an misdemeanor to use, sell or offer for sale a type of scale, weight or measure that has not been approved after careful examination by the bureau of standards. The conference also urged legislation by which the states would be provided with sets of standard weights and measures under certain conditions.

CEYLON PLANTERS PRESENT TEA TO SAILORS

Colombo, Ceylon, Dec. 18.—The chamber of commerce and the planters' association tonight gave a banquet in honor of the officers of the United States Atlantic battleship fleet. Sir Henry Edward MacCallum, governor of Ceylon, in a speech said it had been the great fortune of Ceylon to have a warm welcome to the fleet, and that its presence would be instrumental in the maintenance of peace. SEAMEN MAROONED THREE MONTHS ON ISLAND

Japanese Rescued by Cable Company's Vessel Tell of Struggle to Exist on Diet of Sea Birds and Fish.

(By Morning Journal Special Leased Wire)
Midway Island, Pacific Ocean, Dec. 18.—A story of marooned seamen, which was reported by the Commercial Pacific Cable company's schooner, Florence Ward, to deviate from her course from Honolulu to the cable station and run for Lee Herms Island for shelter, was the means of bringing about the rescue of three marooned Japanese, plunger hunters and sailing them from further torture and probably from starvation and death.

The Florence Ward is commanded by Captain George H. Pitt. She was bringing supplies from Honolulu when a heavy gale broke and she was compelled to seek shelter at Lee Herms Island, eighty miles south-east of Midway. Distress signals were observed on shore and Captain Pitt sent a small boat to investigate. Three Japanese were immediately taken aboard the Florence Ward, where they were given food and clothing. Through an interpreter one of the Japanese said they had been for three months without food except fish and sea birds. No fresh water was obtainable and the men were compelled to drink deeply distilled sea water.

When a life was required the men were compelled to light it by incense, trading the body of the dead upon small pieces of under through the crystal of a watch. According to the Japanese, the schooner Kiku Maru, of Shinagawa, Tokyo, Captain Sugie, put into Herms about July 1 and landed four men. From what would be learned the lack of the men presumably was caused by the shortage of sea birds. The Kiku Maru departed a few days later, leaving one month's provisions for the men on the island and intending shortly to return and take them off. The vessel never returned.

Shortly after the departure of the vessel a terrific storm broke and huge waves swept over the island, carrying away most of the supplies and efforts of the marooned men. On what was left they subsisted as long as it lasted. Fukumatsu Sufuyama, one of the men, described as a result of exposure and improper food and the other three men could no longer survive. The three are being cared for at the cable station, and in a few days will be taken to Honolulu by the schooner.

Eleven Soldiers Poisoned; Thirteen Ill From Drinking Filipino Beverage.

SEVERE WEATHER ON NORTH ATLANTIC

Westbound Liners Buffeted by
Storms Creep Toward New
York Away Behind Schedule

New York, Dec. 18.—With December on the north Atlantic at its stormiest, transatlantic shipping has been experiencing a severe buffeting. FINANCE AND COMMERCE

Wall Street.

New York, Dec. 18.—There was further weakness in stocks today but the market was not so entirely without support as was the case yesterday. Last prices in fact were little unchanged. Efforts were plainly seen during the early part of the day to arrest the decline. The restlessness shown by American Smelting at 53 and by United States Steel at 54 was an example. When the smelting stock began to break to new low levels the bears threw off their timidity and renewed the attack on the general list. The assumption is widespread that a concerted professional attack is responsible for the decline in prices and the quick rallies from time to time, indicating a hasty decline of shorts is corroborative of this view. The publicity of stock speculation, however, is beyond clear discernment and under close at the market attributes the semblance of bear operations to the masked purpose of a party long on stocks to dispose of the holdings, a bear told on prices tending to incline support of prices by inside interests where known speculative liquidation would be left to take its course. Much attention was devoted to American Smelting and to the published reports of a project to build rail smelters through the country and organize a formidable rival to the present dominant interest. While the intention to organize this competition was believed to some extent, the present weakness of American Smelting shares was ascribed partly to their vulnerable position by reason of over speculation and an advance of prices unwarranted by the dividend return, the earnings and the prospects in the trade. The close sympathy with its weakness shown by other stocks in the metal group even those supposed to benefit from the new smelting project was proof of this. The condition in the copper market was responsible for the daily for the sharp decline in Amalgamated copper and reports of a combination in process of formation to control the marketing of copper did not offset the knowledge that production was proceeding far in advance of consumption in that industry. The larger inferences drawn from the threat of smelting competition also hurt the market. The hostile array of financial groups was in unpleasant contrast with the hopes recently prevalent in the financial district of drawing together of all the great forces of wealth into harmony and co-operation. The passenger fare war opened up by the Wabash over bridge between Pittsburgh and Chicago had something of the same effect, with increased attention in an account of suspension that E. H. Harriman was a new power in Wabash affairs. A more rational explanation of the presence of liquidation in the stock market was found in the outlook for tomorrow's bank statement. The rise in money rates during the week seems to have attracted some funds from other points, the gain of this local banks on the balance in the interior movement rising sharply over last week to over two million dollars.







BIG LAND DEAL IN RIO ARRIBA COUNTY

153,000 ACRES TO BE THOROUGHLY DEVELOPED

30,000 Acres to Be Placed Under Irrigation While Remainder Is Rich in Timber and Mineral Deposits.
