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LIFE SAVING CORPS FOR RESCUE WORK IN COAL MINES

STATIONS TO BE LOCATED IN PRINCIPAL FIELDS

Important Project Set on Foot by Geological Survey With View to Minimizing Disasters in Underground Workings.

(By Morning Journal Special Lensed Wire) Washington, Dec. 27.—Carrying out its efforts to reduce the number of fatalities in coal mines, the United States geological survey is about to establish rescue stations in the principal coal fields of the country. In addition to the experiment station now located at Pittsburgh, it will be the purpose of the experts to reach the miners and mine bosses how to use the most approved apparatus for rescue.

Government mining engineers will be assigned to the stations and will be ready at a moment's notice to go to any disaster. They will be equipped with oxygen helmets, which will enable them to enter mines at once even though it is filled with gas or smoke.

It is the intention to have every station fitted up with an air-tight room, where gas can be generated. The coal mining companies have been invited to send picked men to these stations, where they will be trained by government experts in the use of oxygen helmets.

One of the stations will be at Trumbull, Ill. This station will take care of Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Iowa, northern Missouri and Western Kentucky.

A second station will probably be located at Raton, N. M., to take care of New Mexico, Colorado, Utah, Wyoming and Montana. The largest coal output in New Mexico and Colorado comes from the Trinidad field, which is immediately accessible to Raton.

Another station is suggested for that district, to be located at Salt Lake City. This will be central for the several Utah fields, and will be accessible to the Montana fields and also the Washington fields.

Mr. Sims was engaged in his office preparing to appear before the grand jury.

It was reported that Morris & Co. will be the first witnesses. It is expected that they will be questioned regarding the rates of transportation of various packing house products and the manner of making shipments. If present plans are carried out a small army of deputy marshals will descend upon the stockyards during the week to serve subpoenas on other witnesses.

ARRANGEMENTS FOR AMERICAN EVACUATION

Troops Sail for Stations in United States Commencing New Year Day; Small Force Remains Until April.

(By Morning Journal Special Lensed Wire) Havana, Dec. 27.—New Year's day will witness the beginning of the evacuation of Cuba by the army of occupation which has been in possession of the island since October, 1906. The first provisional regiment of marines, numbering about 500, which will be among the first troops to leave, are now concentrating at various posts at Camp Columbia. About half this regiment will sail from Havana on January 1, on the cruiser *Pratt*, which arrived here from Porto Moxor and Sheridan port News. The *Pratt* will return about the middle of the month and embark the remainder.

Headquarters of companies A, B, C and D, Twenty-ninth infantry, will embark on the transport *Sumner* at Matanzas on December 31. The transport will proceed to Havana and embark companies E, H and G, stationed at Guayama, and company K, stationed at Guayama. The *Sumner* will sail from Havana January 1 for Newport News, the ultimate station of these companies being Fort Shafter.

SERIOUS FALLING OFF IN TRADE WITH FOREIGNERS

Both Imports and Exports Show Alarming Decrease.

Washington, Dec. 27.—That the falling off of approximately \$100,000,000 in imports and exports in 1908 is mostly part of a general condition which has prevailed the world over, is shown by the monthly statement of the bureau of statistics. Of the twenty-five principal countries of the world whose foreign commerce the bureau records month by month, all but four show a falling off in imports and exports.

The principal decrease on the import side occurred in trade with Europe, and on the export side in the trade with the United States. These marked reductions in the United States are not entirely the result of a falling off in the quantity of merchandise moved into or out of the country.

Imports from Europe in the ten months for which detailed figures showed a decrease from \$425,000,000 in ten months of 1907, to \$436,000,000 in a similar period of 1908.

Exports to Europe show a decrease of 2 percent, while those to North America show a decrease of 21 percent.

PLAN MODEST REQUEST TO BRITISH GOVERNMENT

Cleveland, Dec. 27.—In the interest of peace and tranquility between two great world powers, England and America, plans are being perfected to invite the English government to participate in the commemoration of the one hundredth anniversary of the defeat of the English by Perry on Lake Erie.

Arrangements are being made by Ohio to promote a grand peace carnival and join the industrial exhibition to be held on the island of Put-in-Bay.

CANADA AND MEXICO TO PARTICIPATE IN CONSERVATION CONFERENCE

President Roosevelt Forwards Invitations to Sister Nations to Have Representatives at Gathering in Washington in February.

SUGGESTS PLAN TO DEAL WITH ENTIRE CONTINENT

Problem of Best Use of Natural Resources One Affecting All Nations Alike Declares Mr. Roosevelt in Letter.

(By Morning Journal Special Lensed Wire) Washington, Dec. 27.—It was announced at the White House today that a conference looking toward the conservation of the natural resources of North America would be held February 18 next at the White House.

Letters suggesting the plan have been addressed by President Roosevelt to the governor-general and to the president of Canada and to President Diaz of Mexico. They will be delivered to the officials in person by Gifford Pinchot, chairman of the national conservation commission, and chief forester of the United States.

Mr. Pinchot will first visit Canada, leaving tomorrow. He will then carry the invitation to President Diaz at Mexico City.

The proposed conference is the outgrowth of the two conservation conferences in which the governors of the states and territories were the principal participants. At the national conference representatives of the Canadian government expressed their interest in the movement. Out of this grew the idea of a North American conference.

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BOSTON BANKER MAY SUCCEED DOCTOR ELLIOT

Harvard Men Hear Vacant Presidency Has Been Filled.

New York, Dec. 27.—A report was current among prominent Harvard alumni in this city tonight that James S. Storrow was to become the immediate successor to Dr. Eliot as president of that university, to be succeeded in turn within a few months by Nicholas Murray Butler, now president of Columbia. This report could not be confirmed tonight.

Mr. Storrow is a leading member of the Boston banking firm of Lee, Higginson & Co. If the report is correct his expressed disinclination to accept the Harvard presidency may have been overcome by the plan of making his incumbency of the office temporary and having Dr. Butler succeed him within a year.

NATIVES RESIST ORDER AGAINST POPPY GROWING

Chinese Troops Called Out to Enforce Anti-Opium Edict.

Amoy, China, Dec. 27.—Orders were issued Saturday to a number of natives at Tungan, twenty miles north of Amoy, to cease planting opium poppies. They declined to acquiesce and a riot followed in which one officer and ten civilians were killed.

The population of Tungan is an army and 500 troops have been sent there to restore order. The authorities announce their determination to enforce the anti-opium edict.

AUSTRIA HAS BIG FORCE IN ANNEXED PROVINCES

London, Dec. 27.—A dispatch from Vienna to the Daily Express says that Austria-Hungary has a force of 150,000 men in Bosnia and Herzegovina ready to invade Serbia at a moment's notice.

State Department Confirms
Resignation of Ambassador
Which Terminates Dis-
tinguished Diplomatic Career.

Washington, Dec. 27.—The resig-
nation of Lloyd C. Griscom, ambas-
sador to Italy, reported in an Associated
Press dispatch from Rome last night,
was authoritatively confirmed by the
state department. Ambassador Gris-
com's resignation takes effect March
1st. Mr. Griscom has had a dis-
tinguished career in the diplomatic
service of the United States. His first
service in that field was as secretary
to the ambassador to Great Britain in
1882. On July 24, 1889, he became
secretary of the legation at Constan-
tinople, and two years later was ap-
pointed envoy extraordinary and min-
ister plenipotentiary to Persia. He
was appointed United States minister
to Japan in 1902, serving in that
country until January 25, 1906, when
he was appointed ambassador to Bra-
zil. He was named ambassador extra-
ordinary and plenipotentiary to Italy
December 25, 1906, by President
Roosevelt.
