BRIEF WIRINGS.

A New Star Route.
WASHINGTON, Dec. 31.—Star mail service is established once a week on route between Miami to Garcia, N. M., from January 16, 1893, to June 30, 1894.

The Tariff.
BERNE, Switzerland, Dec. 31.—The Swiss government has resolved that the tariff on imports from France shall go into effect this day. All hope of a commercial entente between the two countries is now gone.

Naval Changes.
SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Dec. 31.—Commander Joseph Skerrett, until now in command of the Washington navy yard, will to-day succeed Acting Rear-Admiral Brown in command of the Pacific squadron.

The Columbian Stamps.
WASHINGTON, Dec. 31.—With the close of the year the government announces the appearance of the Columbian postage stamps. They are in fifteen different values and are to be for sale only during 1893.

Pacific Coast Traffic.
ST. LOUIS, Dec. 31.—The Southern Pacific railroad company has taken important action in the nature of a boycott, against the Northern Pacific, in relation to Pacific coast passenger traffic. After to-day it will not accept single or round trip tickets to Oregon or California points via the Northern Pacific or Canadian Pacific.

Foreign Immigrations.
NEW YORK, Dec. 31.—All of the trans-Atlantic steamship lines in the North Atlantic Continental Steamship association are expected to stop all immigrant traffic beginning at midnight to-night. The first boats to leave under the new regulations will depart from New York and Southampton and Liverpool next Tuesday and Wednesday. They will carry only first and second-class passengers, all of whom will be asked to pay the increased rates for passage.

The G. A. R.
MILWAUKEE, Wis., Dec. 31.—The following rule has been promulgated by Commander-in-Chief Weissert, of the G. A. R., and goes into effect at once: From and after January 1, 1893, the per capita tax to the national headquarters will be 25 cents per annum. It was stated in general order No. 2 of this series, that this tax would begin from June 30, 1892, but when the full records of the national encampment was obtained, it was found that it would bear no other interpretation than is given here.

Stewart's Prediction.
NEW YORK, Dec. 31.—Senator William M. Stewart, of Nevada, is in town. "The monetary conference," he said, "is a failure. It won't amount to anything. If the Republicans do not hurry up and pass a free coinage bill this winter they will not carry a state west of the Rocky mountains in 1896. If the Democrats do not pass a free coinage bill when they come into power the Populists will elect a president in 1896."

Special Privileges.
CHICAGO, Dec. 31.—An agreement has been reached by the roads in the Central Traffic association in regard to clerical men's permits for 1893. The rule adopted to become effective Jan. 1, provides that rates for clerical men shall be one-half of the lowest unlimited rate, and that this concession shall be available only to regular clerical men, sisters of charity, and missionaries under ecclesiastical authority. The roads have also created a permanent board of arbitration, composed of Chairman Walker and Commissioners Blanchard and Donald, to adjust questions pertaining to Central Pacific association affairs only.

The Week of Prayer.
NEW YORK, Dec. 31.—To-morrow begins the week of prayer in all the churches in the Evangelical alliance. The topics for prayer have been given out by Dr. Josiah Strong, general secretary of the Evangelical alliance in the United States. Sunday is fixed as a day for sermons on "Gifts for Men." Monday, Jan. 2, is the day for humiliation and thanksgiving. Tuesday is the day for "The Church Universal." Wednesday is the day for "Nations and their Rulers." Thursday is the day for "Foreign Missions." Friday is the day for "Home Missions." Saturday is the day for "Families and Schools."

Express Change.
NEW YORK, Dec. 31.—At midnight to-night the Adams Express company will take charge of the express business on the Burlington Railway system, heretofore occupied by the American Express company between Chicago and the Missouri river and west of the Missouri river by the Wells-Fargo company. A new feature contemplated is running a through car from New York over the Pennsylvania line to Omaha and Denver. This is the first attempt of the Adams company to come into the northwest, their operations having been mostly confined to the middle and southern states. After January 1, the Adams company will command the express business on about 38,000 miles of railroad.

THE TREASURY.

President Harrison Upsets the Plans of the Wall Street Manipulators.

NEW YORK, Dec. 31.—The Times states that Secretary of the Treasury Foster's trip to this city was not on private business as was given out, but was for the purpose of consulting Wall street magnates on the proposition to relieve the money market and check the export of gold by having the government issue from \$50,000,000 to \$100,000,000 of bonds. The Wall street men were in favor of the scheme, and the speculative contingent were in high feather. The president's co-operation had been counted on as sure, but this confidence was suddenly discovered to be delusive. Secretary Foster before he suddenly left town to go west is credited with having received this dispatch from Washington:

"I want no new bonds issued under my administration. Take no steps. Do nothing." (Signed) B. HARRISON.

The Times says that Mr. Foster met the Wall street men at a club house on Fifth avenue and had a prolonged conference. Some of the most notable men in the street are said to have been present and an agreement was formed on the financial policy of the government. The action of President Harrison upset their plans entirely and there is now prospect of an issue of bonds to stop the stringency in the money market.

BRIEF WIRINGS.

NEW YORK, Dec. 31.—The Authors' and Actors' carnival which began at the Lenox Lyceum December 19 closes to-day.

WASHINGTON.—Under orders issued by the postmaster general the fee on registered mail matter will from this date be 8 cents instead of 10 as formerly.

NEW YORK.—Owing to the secession of immigration four of the contract labor inspectors have received notice from Washington that their services would be no longer required after this date.

LAKEWOOD, N. J.—The most superbly equipped club house in the United States will be dedicated to-night and to-morrow with a series of New Year's festivities. The ball room will accommodate over 2,000 people.

NEW ORLEANS, La.—To-day at Sportsman's park the all-Ball championship of the south will be decided. The game to be played is between the Southern Athletic club eleven, made up of the best players in Louisiana, and a crack team made up of Alabama men. Yale and Harvard university men are on both teams.

NEW YORK.—The Gridiron club of Washington, of which Frank Hutton is president, which contains the best newspaper men at the National capital, is to be given a dinner to-day on a volunteer of the law in the senate was sufficient to withstand any assaults that might be made on it. THE SAN JUAN PLACER.

The Rush from Durango—An Excursion and Stage Line.

DURANGO, Colo.—There is no abatement to the excitement over the gold fields in southern Utah. From fifty to sixty people left here yesterday by rail teams and pack animals, via Mancos. The rate has been established from here at \$15 to the camp. This rate covers the carrying of blankets and some wearing apparel, six days' rations and the privilege of riding most of the distance. Several letters have been reported to have been received from parties who are there, but as to their contents no definite information can be learned. The letters are reported to have been mailed from a point called Riverside. Definite and positive information is expected from the camp in a few days from a reliable source.

DENVER.—King & Brownson will to-morrow start their stage line from Dolores to reach City and will in time extend it further in the direction of the new gold fields in the San Juan country. This stage line will connect with the Denver & Rio Grande railroad at Dolores north-west of Durango and it is expected that Bluff City can be reached in twelve hours from Dolores. It is expected that this will cause a great deal of travel to the fields by way of southern Colorado.

The Prize Ring.

NEW YORK, Dec. 31.—It is announced that the date of the Fitzsimmons-Hall battle which occurs before the Crescent City Athletic club of New Orleans has been changed until March 8.

BUFFALO, Dec. 30.—Jim Daly, James J. Corbett's ex-sparring partner, polished off Tom McCarthy, of Olean, N. Y., in twenty-eight rounds at the Buffalo Athletic club last night, but only after the best heavy weight battle ever seen in or about the city. The men fought for a purse of \$2,000 and a side set of \$1,000. Over 700 spectators saw the contest and went away well satisfied. Daly fairly out-generated his opponent. His cleverness brought his victory, for his condition was below that of McCarthy.

SAN FRANCISCO.—Johnny Van Heest, of Wisconsin, the bantam, was picked at odds of twenty to fifteen as the prospective winner of the fight with Sol Smith at Los Angeles, at the California Athletic club. A \$2,000 purse and the prospect of a match with Dixon was the inducement that brought the men together. Smith won the fight in the fourteenth round.

PARIS, Dec. 31. Cholera continues to spread in northern France. In the town of Gravelins three deaths and one new case were reported Wednesday and three deaths Thursday.

The A. & P. Grant.
WASH. POST, Dec. 31.—Secretary Noble yesterday approved a list No. 2, embracing 194,576 acres of land lying within the property limits of the grant for the Atlantic & Pacific railroad company within the Santa Fe, N. M., land district.

Governor-Elect Dying.
NEW YORK, Dec. 31.—News of a most reliable nature comes from Winchester, the home of Governor Eliot Turner, that he is nearing his end from a complication of diseases. In the event of his death the speaker of the senate would be the acting governor, and a lively tussle is going on for the place.

Dr. Briggs' Triumph.
NEW YORK, Dec. 31.—The trial of Dr. Briggs, charged with heresy, before the New York Presbytery, closed last evening. The result of the vote was adverse to sustaining the charge and appealing the case to the general assembly, which meets in Washington in the spring. There is much rejoicing among the friends of Dr. Briggs over the result.

The Republican Steering Committee.
WASHINGTON, Dec. 31.—The Republican caucus will not appoint a new "steering committee." The present committee, composed of Senators Hoar, McMillan, Chandler, Teller and Mitchell, will be continued in force and will conduct all the business that will come within the province of a steering committee.

After the Kid.
WASHINGTON, Dec. 30.—Adjutant General Williams has received a telegram from Gen. McCook at Los Angeles, Cal., saying that Capt. Myers' 11th infantry had a brush with "Kid's" band yesterday, a few miles north of San Carlos, A. T., and captured John Long's daughter and one horse, but the renegades escaped in the darkness. Gen. McCook says that four detachments of troops are on the trail of "Kid" and that all possible steps are being taken for his capture.

The Republican Senators.
WASHINGTON, Dec. 31.—Within a day or so, after the re-assembling of congress, the Republicans senators will hold a caucus to determine upon the order of business that is to be pursued. Referring to the financial measures that had been introduced and particularly those which had the repeal of the Sherman law in view, Mr. Mitchell said that he did not think any serious attempt would be made to force those bills to a vote. In both houses he thought there was a large majority against the repeal of the act which authorizes the secretary of the treasury to purchase silver. He was very positive that the majority against the repeal of the law in the senate was sufficient to withstand any assaults that might be made on it. This congress, he says, will do nothing in the matter of financial legislation.

The Territorial Educators.
The most successful educational convention ever held in the history of New Mexico concluded a three day session at Las Vegas Thursday. It was attended by teachers from all sections of the territory, some fifty educators being present. Prof. Chase, Gen. Hobart, Miss Heath and other Santa Feans returned from Las Vegas last night and speak enthusiastically of the high character of the convention's work. The visitors were splendidly entertained by the people of Las Vegas.

The banquet at the Montezuma was all that the reputation of that hostelry led any to expect, and the teachers were loud in their praise of this manifestation of Las Vegas hospitality.

Prof. Hiram Hadley, of the agricultural college, Las Cruces, is also just in from Las Vegas, speaks in very happy terms over the work of the convention and thinks it shows most admirably the substantial progress New Mexico is now making in all matters pertaining to popular education.

accommodations, and several sanitary in-
stitutions for the benefit of health-seekers.

RESOURCES.
Santa Fe county has an area of 1,498,000
acres and a population of 16,010. The principal
occupations are mining, sheep and cat-
tle raising, truck farming and fruit growing.
The valley soils are especially adapted to
horticulture, and there is at hand a never
failing market in the mining camps.

In the southern portion of the county
mining forms the principal industry, the
large deposits of coal, lead, silver, iron, cop-
per and gold, in veins as well as in the form
of placer gold, at Cerillos, New Placers
(Dolores), Golden and San Pedro being just-
ly noted for their richness.

But it is to Santa Fe's superior climatic
advantages, and its fame as nature's most

Fe bases its great future upon. The highest

POINTS OF INTEREST.
There are some forty various points of
interest in the historic interest in and about
the ancient city.

The old adobe palace stands on the spot
where the old Spanish palace had been erected
shortly after 1605. That ancient structure
was destroyed in 1680, and the present one
was constructed between 1687 and 1716.

The chapel of San Miguel was built be-
tween 1630 and 1680. In the latter years the
Indians destroyed it. Fully restored in 1710,
it had previously and after 1683, been the
only Spanish church in Santa Fe. It still
remains the oldest church in use in New
Mexico.

The walls of the old cathedral date in part
from 1622; but the edifice proper is from the
past century.

Other points of interest to the tourists
are: The Historical Society's rooms; the
"Garcia," the military quarters chapel and
cemetery of Our Lady of the Rosary; the
church museum at the new cathedral; the
archbishop's garden; church of Our Lady of
Guadalupe with its rare old works of art;
the soldiers' monument, monument to the
Pioneer Path-Finder, Kit Carson, erected by
the G. A. R. of New Mexico; St. Vincent's
hospital, conducted by the Sisters of Charity,
and the Orphan and industrial school, the In-
dian training school, Loretto Academy and
the chapel of Our Lady of Light; the Ramo-
na Indian school; St. Catherine's Indian
school.

The sight-seer here may also take a
vehicle and enjoy a day's outing with both
pleasure and profit. The various spots of
interests to be visited are Tesuque pueblo,
taking in the divide route, Monument rock,
up in picturesque Santa Fe canon; the Aztec
mineral springs; Nambe pueblo; Agua Fria
village; the turquoise mine; place of the as-
sassination of Governor Perez; San Ildefonso
pueblo, or the ancient cliff dwellings, beyond
the Rio Grande.

THE MILITARY POST.
At Santa Fe is the oldest military estab-
lishment on American soil, having been in
almost continuous occupation since 1602
when the Spaniards first established here
their base of operations. Old Fort Marcy
was built by U. S. soldiers in 1846 and the
new post was occupied a few years later.

From this it will appear that Santa Fe is
relatively warmer in winter and cooler in
summer than other places having nearly
the same annual temperature. Compare
the difference between the coolest month
and the warmest month for these places.
In Santa Fe the monthly range is 39.8, in
Boston, 45.1; Albany, 49.4; Buffalo, 44.8;
Detroit, 44.6; Grand Haven, 43.7; North
Platte, 52.3. We find that Santa Fe has the
spring temperature of northern Illinois and
Indiana, the summer temperature of north-
ern Wisconsin and Michigan, the autumn
temperature of Wisconsin and Michigan,
and the winter temperature of central
Illinois and Indiana. In other words, by
staying in Santa Fe, the invalid gets the
favorable summers that a resident of Spring-
field, Illinois, can get only by emigrating
annually to Lake Superior.

furnished by the U. S. local weather bureau.
