SANTA FE SWEARS IN TRAINMEN AS DEPUTY SHERIFFS

Hobo Question on South End a Grave One.

TRAMPS INFEST EVERY STATION ON THE DIVISION

The hobo question on the Rio Grande division has come to a serious pass with the Santa Fe company, and the latter is now taking extra precautions to protect its employees and passengers from the attacks and depredations of lawless tramps along the line.

Yesterday a large number of south-end trainmen were sworn in as deputy sheriffs and will be armed and ready to handle the riff-raff when occasion requires. The hobos were never before so numerous and so offensive along the Rio Grande division. Many of them are desperate men who will stop at no crime, but most of them are men who live by a sneak thievery and petty misdeeds, common thugs and toughs.

The assault on F. H. Mudge, yardmaster at San Marcial, which occurred a few days ago, and numerous other overt acts by the hobos have caused the officers and employees of the railroad to feel some alarm. Most of the men come from the east and from Denver and are shipped to the Belen cut-off to work. Some of them make no pretense at working. They travel in bunches and pilfer and steal from the settlers along the railroad. At night there is one continuous string of fires along the line from Belen to El Paso, and the railway will put on a number of armed guards to protect their trains and right of way if the nuisance continues.

Isleta is the grand rendezvous of the great unwashed, although Belen is a close second, and they are scattered thick all along the line. Charlie Main, the special officer, who leads the strenuous life at the junction, keeps them moving pretty fast through that point, but it takes vigorous work. The railroad is being carefully watched, and the company is making a special effort to insure its property and passengers against trouble at the hands of the knights of the road. The recent cutting of the air hose on cars is a sample of the petty depredations committed by the hobos.

WELLS ARRIVES WITH JOHN JEROME WOODS WHO CUT THE AIR HOSE

Special Officer E. R. Wells, of the Santa Fe, arrived in the city yesterday with John Jerome Woods, better known as "Jerry Woods," who was arrested on suspicion of being the man who cut the air hose on the freight cars in this city.

Woods worked in the yards here as switchman and was discharged from the service of the company, and there is said to be quite a strong case against him.

Woods has protested his innocence and says that he has not gone near a car in the yards except on the night when he got out of town. Wells caught the man in a box car on a train at Rincon, and arrested him. He is now in the county jail and will be given a hearing in all probability on Monday.

BIG FORCE OF MEN BUSY ON IMPROVEMENTS IN THE LOCAL YARDS

There is "something doing" in the local Santa Fe yards this week. The raising and re-balling of the main track, the preliminary step in the transfer of the freight yards south, is now well under way. The track is being raised from a foot to eighteen inches clear through the present yard limits and a fine quality of gravel ballast from the big pits at Alameda is being put in. The gravel gives the main track a splendid solid roadbed and the re-balling is one of the most needed improvements executed here for a long time.

After the main track is put in shape work will begin at once on raising and moving the sidings and transferring the freight tracks from their present location, opposite the Alvarado, and across Railroad avenue, further south. A big train is now employed regularly in the yards and the force of men will be gradually increased as the work progresses.

Police Court. In Judge Crawford's court yesterday morning a negro named Percy Brown, and a man named Verne Snyder, were fined five dollars each for resisting an elderly native named Arredondo, over the head with a chair in the St. Elmo saloon. Herbert Stewart was fined five dollars for drunkenness and Harry Edmondson, August Wilking and Raymond Shepherd were dismissed with orders from the court to find work at once or get out of town.

"I never saw so many vagrants and paupers in this city," said the city marshal to a Journal reporter yesterday. "Where they come from I can't see, but there is a regular stream of them coming in all the time. While there are of course many habitual tramps and toughs there are, many cases which are really pitiable."

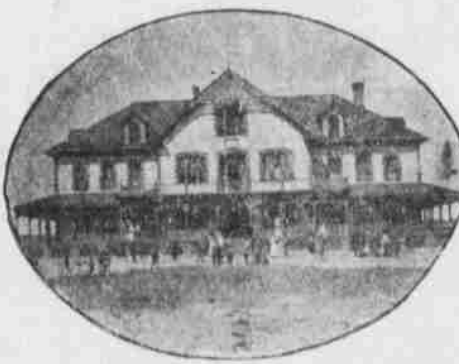

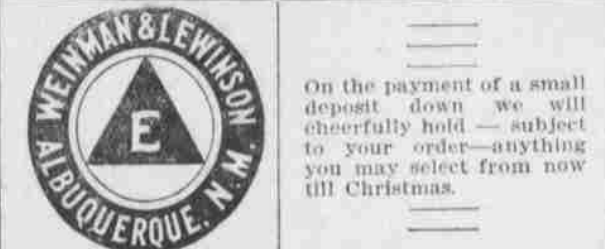

HOLIDAY RUSH IN POSTOFFICE IS IN FULL SWING

Yesterday First Day of the
Christmas Jam.

POSTMASTER HOPKINS MAKES
ELABORATE PREPARATIONS

"Today has been the first day of the real holiday rush in the post office," said Postmaster Hopkins, last night, "and from present indications, I believe we will have the heaviest holiday business we have ever handled." The postmaster has been making careful preparations for the heavy business to come this week, and although the heaviest business since the last holiday season was done yesterday, there was no crowding and no unnecessary delay. Beginning tomorrow it will be a more difficult problem for the rest of the week. Signs have been printed which will indicate the stamp and weighing windows, the registry windows, and distributing windows, so that the public will only have to "read the signs" to avoid confusion. The postmaster is anxious that the people prepare their packages properly for registration before coming to the registry window. This has been one of the causes of infinite trouble, both for clerks and patrons in the past and it is hoped it can be avoided this year. Before a package can be registered at a postoffice, it is necessary to have the name and address of the sender clearly written on the outside of the package. No pens are kept at the registry windows, for to do so would result in a stream of people writing there, and thus delaying the game. The postmaster, therefore, urges everyone with a registered package to have the address of the sender written clearly on the package before going to the window. This will prevent any delay. Several extra tables will be placed in the lobby of the postoffice today for the convenience of the public. Inside the office even more elaborate preparations are being made. Long tables are being arranged behind the delivery windows so that packages can be laid out there in regular order, right at the hand of the delivery clerks, and it seems that the office is ready to handle all the business that comes. On the Sunday before Christmas day, when the rush of incoming packages will be heaviest, the postmaster has arranged to extend the usual Sunday hours so that complete delivery can be made. The hours for next Sunday have not been determined on, but the office will probably be open from 8 o'clock in the morning until noon, instead of the usual hour from 10 to 11.

HUGE STEEL GIRDER CRUSHES ARM OF BRIDGE MAN

FRANK DUERR HAS NARROW
ESCAPE FROM BEING KILLED

Frank Duerr, a car repairer of Las Vegas, was quite seriously injured while at work with a wrecking gang a short distance north of Bernalillo yesterday afternoon. Those who witnessed the accident say that Duerr came within an ace of having his life crushed out by a big steel girder, and that he only saved himself by jumping. As it is, he has a dislocated right shoulder, his wrist is sprained very seriously and some of the smaller bones are believed to have been broken. Duerr was working with the wrecking crew who were engaged in reloading a car of bridge steel which went in the ditch recently at that point. He was guiding a big girder which was being hoisted, when one of the chains broke and he and the girder crashed to the ground. Duerr jumped, saved his life by a narrow margin and escaped with the injuries above mentioned. An ambulance was wired for to this city, and when the work train pulled in it was met by the company surgeon and Duerr was taken to the Sister's hospital where his injuries were attended to. He has a wife and family living at Las Vegas to which point he will probably be taken in a few days.

NO CLUE TO MURDER BY JORDAN IN COLORADO

COUNCIL CREATES SALARIED OFFICE OF CITY ENGINEER

In Spite of Vigorous Protest by Alderman Ifield.

REPORT OF WATER EXPERT TO BE MADE PUBLIC MONDAY

The city council held a special meeting yesterday afternoon in the office of City Clerk Harry P. Lee to attend to some important business. The ordinance creating the regular position of city engineer with salary attached was passed, to go into effect sixty days after its passage. The new official will be named at that time.

The special committee to get a report on valuation of the present water system and the cost of building a new plant announced that Mr. Riffles, the expert employed, had made his report and that it would be formally tendered to the council at the regular meeting Monday night.

The city engineer ordinance was passed only after a great deal of discussion. The committee to report on the ordinance was divided and Chairman Ifield presented a minority report, saying that he did not believe the city is at present justified in employing another salaried official, owing to the depleted condition of the till. Aldermen Gilleswater and Bailey, the other members of the committee, insisted that the city was able to stand the expense and that it is necessary to have a city engineer paid by the city to devote all his time to city work.

After the usual preliminaries the ordinance was finally passed upon motion of Alderman Hanley. Mr. Ifield objected vigorously, as he said the present city engineer knew the ropes better than a new man could know them for many moons, and gave it as his opinion that it would be impossible to get a competent man for less than \$150 a month. Mr. Hanley, on the contrary, said he was positive a good man, a graduate of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, who knew civil engineering from a to z, could be secured for a consideration of \$1,200 a year.

The ordinance does not specify the salary to be paid the new official, this to be regulated by the council. The ordinance will be required to deposit a bond of \$1,000 for the faithful performance of his duties, turning over of moneys, etc.

A Kick on Live Wires.
Fire Chief Tishler was present at the meeting with a kick. Mr. Ifield told the council that it has come to his knowledge that the Electric Light company is stringing uninsulated wires back of the new Methodist church. "In the event of a fire," said Mr. Ifield, "a stream of water from a hose crossing these unprotected wires will convey the current to the brass nozzle and shoot the man holding the hose." Mr. Ifield said he believed it was highly dangerous to leave the wires in this condition and he was instructed by the council to interview the light company and have the matter looked after.

No other business of importance was transacted.

PRETTY PARKS LAID OUT IN THE TERRACE ADDITION

The improvements in the Terrace addition are coming on apace. The sand hills at the end of East Silver street are no longer sand hills, and a broad plaza is rapidly taking the place of the bumpy and rutted and other irregularities in the landscape that once greeted the eye in that vicinity. The well on the mesa for the water supply plant for the Terrace addition is down over 200 feet and the men are preparing to case it and get the hole ready for the electric pump. The company will be required to deposit a bond of \$1,000 for the faithful performance of his duties, turning over of moneys, etc.

The purchase of a park on the mesa by the Driving Club is taken as a hopeful sign. It is expected the racing men will agitate the question of improving the University road, when confronted with the necessity of daily driving two or three miles over it.

Yesterday a message was sent to his wife at Ypsilanti, Mich., but she cannot believe that her aged husband has died a tramp in New Mexico.

Last evening she sent the following message to the local undertakers: "Wire full description of the remains. I am in doubt." And from this it is apparent that the lady cannot believe her husband has been returned to such straits. A complete description was promptly forwarded to her and an answer is expected today.

PROPRIETOR OF ICEBERG IS FOUND NOT GUILTY BY JURY

ALASKA COMPANY WILL INVEST IN KELLY DISTRICT

Expert Ferrin Deeply Im-
pressed by Visit.

MINERS AND PROSPECTORS
FLOCKING TO MAGDALENAS

C. A. Ferrin, mining expert, representing the Northern Mining and Trading company, one of the largest of the large mining companies of Alaska and the northwest, left yesterday for his home in Berkeley, California, after spending a few days at Kelly inspecting the Kelly and Graphic mines and other property in that district.

The Kelly mining district is one of the greatest prospective producers of zinc ores in the country, and has the present activity in the two biggest mines and the number of investors and miners flocking in, its prospects were never better.

The Graphic, which is owned by the Sherwin-Williams Paint company, of Philadelphia, shipped over a million dollars worth of zinc ore last year. The profits from the copper ore paid all the expenses of mining, which included the driving of a big tunnel and the installation of much new machinery. The mine has more ore in sight than at any time in its history and the ore which was thrown over the dump and discarded as worthless, is being shipped to the smelters at a big profit. There is one vein of copper which carries 5 feet of the native product and the ore from this vein nets the company \$1,500 a car without sorting.

The Stauffer Chemical company, of San Francisco, sent a corps of engineers and experts into the camp the first of the week. These men are going over the ground, and it is understood will report favorably. The Stauffer Chemical company is one of the wealthiest companies in San Francisco and owns zinc mines in all parts of the country.

Ferrin is Surprised.
"I was never more surprised in my life over a mining camp," said Mr. Ferrin yesterday before leaving for Berkeley, and Los Angeles. "Of course, expected to see a good camp, but I had no conception of the size of the ore bodies. In the Graphic mine slopes measuring 5 to 30 feet are opened up for a great distance and the ore seems to be continuous for miles. Copper, lead and zinc ores in big bodies abound and the foreman of the mine simply fills orders for any number of tons of a certain class of desired ore. The reports which had been furnished me on the ore bodies were more than conservative."

Mr. Ferrin is a man of very few words, but from the brief conversation had with him, several facts are evident. He is much taken with the Kelly camp and if he so reports, his company will invest on a large scale. If they do this they will put in the best mining machinery that money can buy. Mr. Ferrin has made all of the investments for the company in the northwest, has handled an immense amount of money and has cleared enormous profits from all his investments.

Mr. R. W. Hadden, who was instrumental in bringing Mr. Ferrin to New Mexico was induced to come here by C. W. Stubbs, of this city, who is probably the best posted man on mining matters in the territory. Mr. Hadden found the Kelly district to be far better than Mr. Stubbs had represented it and he secured options on a large block of ground.

The bringing to New Mexico of Mr. Ferrin's syndicate will mean a new era in mining here, and that other big companies will invest in the territory.

Hendricks Talks About Kelly.
J. P. Hendricks, secretary of the Tri-Bullion Mining company, which operates the Kelly mine, adjoining the Graphic property, passed through the city last night on his way to Denver.

Mr. Hendricks says that things are humming in the camp these days and that miners, prospectors and investors are coming in every day. "Every house and room in Kelly is crowded," said he, "and it will be necessary for my company to erect a boarding house in a short time. There are four to seven cars of ore a day shipped from the camp and this amount will be greatly increased in a very short time. Both the Kelly and Graphic are installing new machinery and both mines are putting on every miner that is available. Experienced men are coming in daily from Cripple Creek and elsewhere. Twenty-two miners arrived in a bunch the other day and were all set to work at once."

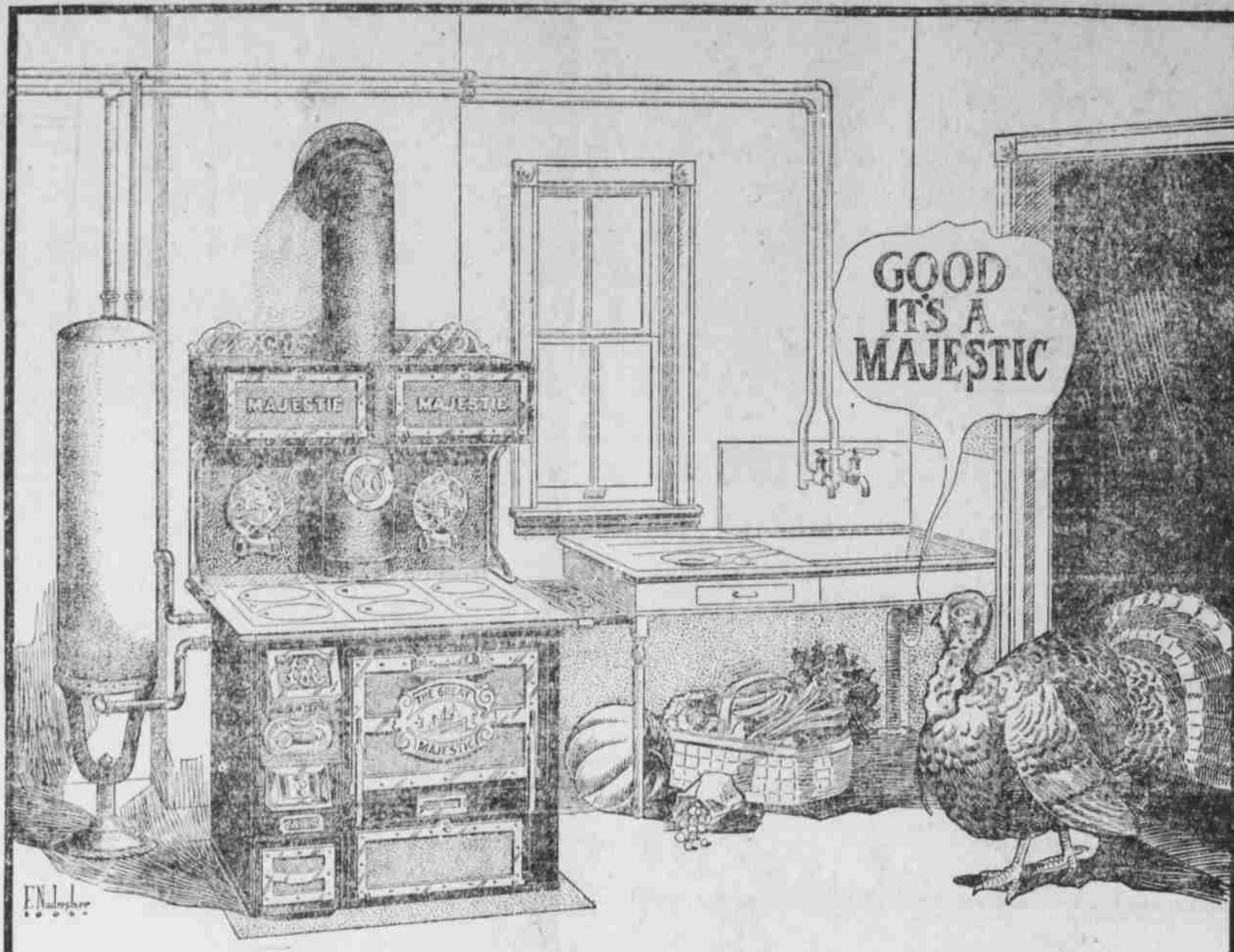
