No Change.
Bismarck, N. D., Feb. 11.—Practically no change has taken place in the senatorial situation to-day.

Wanders Leads.
HELENA, Mont., Feb. 11.—Sanders led in the vote for United States senator yesterday. No choice.

Sentence Commuted.
CITY OF MEXICO, Feb. 11.—President Diaz has signed a commutation of the death sentence passed on Col. Nieves Hernandez to fifteen years in prison.

Ingersoll on "Lincoln."
New York, Feb. 11.—To-morrow night at the Broadway theater, Col. Robert G. Ingersoll will deliver his new lecture "Abraham Lincoln," in honor of the anniversary of Lincoln's birth.

Boston's Great Athletic Events.
BOSTON, Feb. 11.—The games of the Boston Athletic association will be notable to-day because Yale and Harvard have entered teams to compete for athletic honors. A number of New York athletes will also compete in the games which will be held in Mechanics' hall.

Better Wait Awhile.
New York, Feb. 11.—The citizens of many coast cities will to-night give a testimonial banquet and reception to Dr. William T. Jenkins, health officer of this port in the hall at 59th street and Madison avenue. The doctor will be congratulated on his work in saving this continent from an invasion of cholera. Erasmus Wiman is chairman of the reception committee.

A Sensible Conclusion.
WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—In the Senate, Mr. Frye, in reporting back adversely certain amendments referred to the committee on commerce, (proposing river and harbor appropriations) said that the committee on commerce would not recommend any further river and harbor appropriations.

Wyoming Legislature.
CHEYENNE, Feb. 11.—In the senate to-day a committee of three was appointed to investigate the acts of the state board of live stock commissioners. In executive session action upon the appointment of Louis Miller, of Laramie, as fish commissioner, was deferred until the 18th inst.

In Honor of Abraham Lincoln.
New York, Feb. 11.—The Lincoln banquet in honor of the anniversary of Lincoln's birth, which occurs to-morrow, begins to-night. Most of them will of course take place on Monday. Among the more notable banquets to-night are those at Troy and Des Moines. To-morrow the Sons of Veterans will attend divine services in a body. At Philadelphia, Rev. Duncan Mc Gregor will preach the annual sermon and in New York the Sons of Revolution will attend services at St. Paul's chapel, Trinity parish, and listen to the annual services by Dr. Brockholst Morgan. The sermon will be by Dr. James S. Stone, of Philadelphia.

THE GOLD RESERVE.

The Banks Will Aid in Keeping Up the U. S. Treasury Reserve.

New York, Feb. 11.—The continued exports of gold from this city to the continent of Europe have at last forced the treasury department to view the situation with some uneasiness. Accordingly Secretary Foster in an informal way conveyed a desire to the associated banks of this city for their aid. In discussing the matter a member of the clearing house association said: "As a result of the expressed desire, the clearing house committee authorized the chairman of the association, President Williams, of the Chemical National bank, to arrange with the various banks carrying large sums of gold, to carry over enough to the treasury to offset the withdrawals of gold for export. The result was that \$2,000,000 of gold was deposited and legal orders taken by the banks in exchange. This not only met the limit of assistance that will be given, but further sums of gold will be turned in as desired by Secretary Foster. The clearing house committee will probably meet to-day to take further steps in framing a definite policy and a conference of bankers may also be held to discuss the question. The banks of the city hold about \$80,000,000 which will be available if required to maintain the reserve. It was reported that each of the banks assisting the treasury would send \$500,000 each to the treasury. President Williams, of the Chemical bank, said the report was true. He said, "The object of course is to spare the treasury the necessity of cutting into their \$100,000,000 reserve. They now have \$108,000,000, but the action of the banks will hold it where it is until relief comes from elsewhere." "Shall you meet further withdrawals in like manner?" "Yes, sir, that is to say these banks which have already acted on this policy, will continue to do what they can to guard against the depletion of the treasury."

CONDENSED NEWS.

Judge Gresham Once More.
New York, Feb. 11.—Judge Walter Q. Gresham is to be secretary of state in Cleveland's administration. This fact became positively known here to-day to a few persons. The offer of the post has been made to Judge Gresham, and he accepted. Cleveland himself will make the fact known in a day or two.

Washington.—The conviction has become so strong here that Gresham is to be the new secretary of state that Senator Gorman and other Democratic leaders have joined in a telegram of congratulation to the judge.

Frank Hith.—A Detroit anarchist, committed suicide.

Eight new typhus cases were reported in New York yesterday.

Robert Spencer, a wool dealer at Philadelphia, has failed. Liabilities, \$300,000.

There is no change in the senatorial situation in North Dakota and Washington.

The Unhappy boy, Mark, one of the Sioux murderers, has been captured at Pine Ridge.

Charles W. Garner, a Parkhurst agent, has been found guilty at New York of extortion.

A receiver has been asked for at Pittsburg to wind up the affairs of the Economic society.

The Oregon senate has passed the world's fair appropriation bill over the governor's veto.

Louis F. Martin, ex-congressman from the Louisiana district, died at New Orleans, aged 72.

The Minnesota legislature has passed a bill which closes all the pool rooms and betting privileges.

The Fremont hotel at Red Bluff, Cal. burned. Loss, \$25,000. Charles Humbert was burned to death.

The contract of the exclusive sale of beer on the World's fair grounds was secured by the Pabst Brewing company of Milwaukee.

Black Horse, a son of the famous Sioux chief Young-Man-Afraid-of-His-Horse, was shot yesterday, got drunk and was arrested.

The Epworth league in session at Chicago decided to hold the international Methodist conference at Cleveland, Ohio, July 6, 7 and 8.

A strike is imminent at Cincinnati among the employees of the Pennsylvania road. The men denounce the company for dismissing union men.

Mr. Teller presented in the senate a petition signed by 450 citizens of Denver protesting against the repeal of the silver purchase act and urging the passage of a free coinage bill.

Montana Republicans came within two votes of securing the re-election of Senator Sanders. The vote stood Sanders 31, Clark 21, Dixon 12.

The county insane asylum, four miles from Dover, N. H., was burned and forty-four lives were lost. The main building in which were over 100 of the county poor, caught fire, but was saved by the heroic efforts of the inmates who carried pails of water and extinguished the flames.

TERRITORIAL TIPS.

LAS CRUCES LOCALS.
Thirty scrapers and fifty men are now at work on the Dona Ana ditch.

James Crenshaw has created a large steam flour mill near Pine Springs.

Clas Keyser, of Earlham, was held up by one Lorenzo Tallas, a constable, and another man named Deffin, and turned over his wallet to them.

Fred Piontkowsky is now assistant chief engineer for the Pecos Valley Development company of which C. B. Eddy is president and W. A. Hawkins and A. B. Fall attorneys.

Herman Greenwald, of Bosque Seco, is now in charge of the timber lands of the Barola estate and has also charge of the Casad estate lands in that section, having the sale of all timber out from these two estates.

The season of wind storms and sand is once more with the residents of southern Mexico.

The Tres Hermanas promises to come to the front very shortly as a first-class mining camp. Some good finds are being made there. The ore is high grade silver.

The large merchandise store of M. W. McGrath & Co., at Lordsburg, has been attached by the sheriff. The amount of the liabilities is said to be about \$1,000. Some El Paso merchants are interested.

The preliminary hearing in the case of Robert Milliken, treasurer of the American Silver and Lead Mining company, on the charge of embezzlement, was postponed until February 20, on account of the illness of Judge Field, who is suffering from an attack of erysipelas.

The seven Chinamen recently taken into custody by the custom officials at this point, for trying to enter the United States through Old Mexico, have been remanded back to China by United States Commissioner McKee. A United States marshal has taken them to San Francisco for shipment.

Harper Bros., two of the owners of the famous Doe Cabezon mine, 200 miles southwest of this point in Sonora, Mexico, have just arrived with another shipment of forty tons of rich ore, which runs over \$700 per ton. One specimen lump weighs nearly 800 pounds, and is on exhibition here. It averages very nearly \$1 a pound.

The railroad is coming sure—so "they" say.

M. Whiteman has a fine artesian well on his lot on Pecos street. This makes the eleventh well in Roswell.

The stockmen of Chaves county will hold their annual meeting at the court house on the 15th of this month.

L. M. Long has sold his property, consisting of land and water-rights, eight miles southwest of Roswell, to the P. & I. Co. Consideration, \$20,000.

Messrs. Vetter & Bolder have partially developed, on the mesa five miles from this city, an inexhaustible quarry of fine onyx as can be found anywhere. The face of the quarry is over 1,200 feet in length and over ten feet in depth. How far down the ledges extend they do not know, but enough has been ascertained to convince the most sceptical that the quarry is of almost priceless value.

Ash Upson, so well known in Roswell, is supposed to be dead. The old man left Uvalde, Texas, last October, to visit his mother 90 years old, who resided at Bristol, Conn. He found her upon her death bed. Ash longed to return to his Texas friends, and though in feeble health, started for Uvalde on the 9th of January. Since that time nothing has been heard of him, and it is feared that he now lies in an unknown grave, in a strange land, and that his fate may never be known.

The Colored People's World's Fair club is doing active work.

Thos. R. Gabel, general superintendent of the Atlantic & Pacific, has gone to Denver.

The Democrat says members of the city police are "hold-ups" and play their tricks on the public streets.

There is pending now before the examiners of the district court, resulting in the court house being crowded daily by hundreds of our native citizens, contests for the office of mayordomos of the Atreco and Los Duranes acequias, justice of the peace of old town and also justice of Rancho de Arreco.

EDDY RECORDS.
The artesian well lost its tools in the well Saturday, but they were promptly fished out, and work is now progressing again. The hole is now down 1,700 feet.

John Starkey, the horse thief, was bound over last Saturday to appear before the grand jury. His bond was fixed at \$900. He will go into retirement until court sets.

Sheriff Kemp is after the delinquent tax payers, and after the 20th of February, he is going to seize on the personal property of all those who have not paid up, without deviation or discrimination.

David B. Merry came down from Pecos country, having been engaged there for the past month in laying out work for the reservoir and canal to be constructed there in the near future.

Donald Allen, general manager of the P. V. railway, tendered his resignation last week, and Jeff N. Miller, formerly connected with the Texas & Pacific railway at Dallas, Texas, has been appointed. Mr. Miller is a railroad man of experience and knows all about the business from spikes to locomotives.

The advance agents of the Democratic office seekers are already in Washington in full force.

Taxes should be made payable twice a year and thusly would the burdens of the people be lightened.

Governor Boies is too ambitious to go into Grover Cleveland's cabinet; Caesar's vaulting ambition was the cause of his untimely death.

That noble Trojan Ed. Murphy, junior senator of the United States from New York, will stand by Tammany Hall and against Grover Cleveland.

The bond of the territorial treasurer is an enormous one and he should be left free to deposit the territorial funds where his best judgment dictates.

The measure demanding a fair rate of interest on territorial deposits is a just and fair one; but why can not county and municipal deposits in banks be included?

The legislative assembly should not adjourn without making much needed changes for the better in the fee system for county officials in New Mexico.

The house should agree with the council upon some sort of a bill for taxation of sleeping car companies; they should be taxed in one way or another. The people demand this.

The house should take up the council bills for taxing insurance and express companies and should pass them. There are mighty few days of the session left wherein to enact this to the people very beneficial legislation.

The American minister to Hawaii is a brick. The way to establish a protectorate is to establish one; this was done by Minister Stevens in the Sandwich Islands and this country will stand by him.

There is no material difference between the finance bills, Mr. Hubbell's in the council and Mr. Hopewell's in the house. Hence, there is no good reason why a conference committee should not agree and good and progressive financial legislation be had by the 30th assembly.

Looking at the record of the Parkhurst reform movement in New York, we are constrained to admit that the movement has so far produced a glittering and grand array of perjury and blackmailing and persecution of a few unfortunate Magdalens without checking vice in Gotham.

The Wyoming legislative assembly has passed a joint memorial asking congress to pass the omnibus bill for the admission of the four territories, now pending in the U. S. senate. Keep the good work up constantly and energetically. New Mexico will remember this. The west and south must stand together.

The assembly should not adjourn without passing the bill establishing a territorial board of equalization. Such a board with more ample powers than the present board is absolutely needed. Local boards of equalization can not do the work demanded by the public interests. A board free from local influences and with plenty of power to act for the interests of the entire territory is what is necessary.

GOOD APPOINTMENTS.

The legislative council did well indeed in confirming the governor's appointments for the offices of auditor, treasurer and superintendent of public instruction on yesterday; three better men for the positions named could not have been found in the territory. The New Mexican's compliments to Auditor Demetrio Perez, Treasurer R. J. Palen and Superintendent of Public Instruction Amado Chavez and continued success to them.

BEST IN PEACE.

The title fight over council bill No. 40 giving the judges of the supreme court and the governor power to remove district attorneys and territorial officers was settled in the council yesterday by the governor's veto. It is the only measure so far that had any politics in it. Indeed, the New Mexican is assured that but for a mistake in one vote the bill would have never passed the council in the form that it did. Councilman Fall made a very strong and persistent fight to have it passed but failed. The thing is dead for this session. R. J. P.

JUDGE GRESHAM FOR SECRETARY OF STATE.

Judge Walter Q. Gresham, so it is reported upon reliable authority, has been offered the portfolio of state by Mr. Cleveland. It is claimed that on the ever bubbling silver question and the serious tariff question, Judge Gresham is fully in accord with the views of Mr. Cleveland. Well, it is Mr. Cleveland's lookout! Under the constitution he is entitled to choose such confidential advisers as he desires. Judge Gresham made a very creditable record as a cabinet officer under a Republican administration and there is no good reason why he should not make a good one under a Democratic administration.

GOOD WORK.

The act exempting all irrigation systems heretofore to be constructed in New Mexico from taxation for a period of six years, passed both branches of the assembly yesterday. It was a good day's work. Every reasonable thing that tends to draw capital into this territory should receive consideration at this time, and this bill will certainly go a long way toward that end. It is wise because the construction of such works must be relied upon to make our lands of value and fruitful, and when once water is upon these lands they immediately become subject to taxation, whereas without the irrigation systems they would lie forever barren, unproductive and not even worth looking after for purposes of taxation.

THE WEST LEADS.

The west has again turned down the gold bugs in congress. Not even Mr. Cleveland's threat has served to prevent the house of representatives from voting not to interfere with the Sherman silver purchase law, and the sentiment of the senate is quite as much opposed to it, so that question is settled for this session. Nor is it at all probable that the next congress will have the nerve to repeal this act unless something far more beneficial to the silver interests is offered. After all their boasting the Democrats will have to lean largely upon the Populists in the next congress and the Populists are not gold-bugs, whatever else may be said of them. Under the circumstances, therefore, it is now quite apparent that the absolute control of all national legislation has at last been wrested from Wall street domination. The west is to the fore and Wall street wail.

A TIMELY AND PROPER MEASURE.

Senator Martinez' bill, providing a schedule of prices for the publication of public and legal notices and for publishing all such in newspapers of the territory, is a timely and proper measure; it should receive the approval of both houses and of the governor speedily. The newspapers of New Mexico, regardless of party affiliations, are doing a great and hard work for New Mexico and for every individual section of this commonwealth, and should be aided as much as possible.

The fullest publicity should be given to the proceedings of county commissioners, publication of rewards and election proclamations, all kinds of legal notices and, in fact, all like matters of public interest. The surest way to reach the people is through the newspapers. The more fully the people are informed of what goes on, the better for the public good and private interests. Pass the bill.

THE RAILROADS IN CONGRESS.

The inter-state commerce commission deserves credit for the strenuous fight it has made to compel the railroads to adopt some modern system of coupling cars. Three years ago its secretary, Mr. Edward A. Moseley, began an agitation in congress to compel the railroads to adopt some uniform pattern of car couplers; and commenced to gather the statistics of casualties of railway employees. These figures were used by Senator Cullum in last Tuesday's debate in the United States senate. It is demonstrated that the average period of immunity from injury of a railway employee is less than ten years. In other words the number of men killed and injured in ten years is equal to the total number employed during any one year of the term. This is a greater hazard than is incurred by soldiers in time of war. The bloody Napoleonic battles, and the late civil war caused less risk to the men engaged than the railway service. It is to be further considered that these men are the very flower of our manhood and racy of the American soil.
