### FINANCE AND COMMERCE

**Wall Street.**

New York, Oct. 3.—There was a large speculation in stocks again today, but the movement was constantly shifting. There was a palpable effort to divert the speculation into some of the low-priced railroad stocks and some of them responded with a show of strength. The movement, however, lacked spontaneity and was clearly due to professional initiative rather than on actual development regarding these properties.

The market did not fully recover at any time from the break in Atchison, which dropped from 19 1/2 in the morning to 19 1/4, closing at a net loss of 3 1/2. When Reading ran off to 150 1/2 in the late dealings after having sold at 154 1/2 in the morning, the closing of the market became weak all

around.

**Chicago Board of Trade.**

Chicago, Oct. 3.—The reported purchase of American wheat by foreigners caused a slight advance in wheat prices here today, final quotations on

the December delivery being up 5/8c. Strength in the wheat market developed late in the day, sentiment early in the session being quite bearish. December opened 3/8c lower at 75 1/2c, sold off to 74 1/2c@75c, and then advanced to 75 1/2c@76c. The close was at 75 1/2c. Scattered selling by commission houses caused an easy undertone in the corn market early in the day but later this weakness gave place to a strong feeling. December opened a shade to 1/2c lower at 42 1/2c@43c, sold between 42 1/2c and 43c, and closed at 44c. Oats were quiet and steady. December opened unchanged at 24 1/2c, ranged between 23 1/2c and 24 1/2c, and closed at 23 1/2c.
