## **Nicaragua: On Deportation Of Foreigners Opposed To German Reunification**

On Oct. 9 in a communique, the Interior Ministry confirmed the deportation Oct. 6 to Panama of East German citizen Dorothea Shultz and Dutch journalist Murietta Elizabeth Josepha. Schultz and others reportedly "altered the public order" during an Oct. 4 ceremony celebrating German reunification. The event was attended by President Violeta Barrios de Chamorro. Schultz was removed from the salon by West German ambassador Georg Boomgarden's bodyguard. Josepha, Schultz, two German men, and a Nicaraguan were arrested. According to Notimex, the two men a carpenter and an electrical engineer were not deported because of their valuable work in development projects. The Nicaraguan was later released.
