TO-DAY'S CONDENSATION.

Ambassador Bayard has a gripe. The Earl of Colley, aged 61, died in London to-day.

The interminable Hayward-Ging case will be concluded in three days more at Minneapolis.

The Postal Telegraph company elected the old board of directors, except J. O. Stevens, who was succeeded by Edward C. Bradley.

Plans for the reorganization of the whisky trust have been perfected in Chicago. It is probable that each share will be assessed \$4.

The engagement has been announced of Miss Virginia Lowery, of Washington, to Duke Diercks, of Spain, the Spanish minister to Mexico.

Miss Jane Stewart, the actress, and daughter of Maurice F. Holahan, was privately married in New York to General Louis Auer, of Milwaukee, at the bride's home.

Fifty tramps invaded Decatur, Ind., last night, stealing, frightening women and begging. The marshal with a posse opened fire, killing and wounding three of them.

The Holdredge, Neb., National bank failed to-day. The controller of the currency will take charge. Capital stock, \$50,000; resources and liabilities not known.

The officials of the Texas & Pacific railroad emphatically deny the charge that the Texas Pacific has been cutting passenger rates on passenger business from California.

President Tracey, of the Republican National league, has called a special meeting of the league and national committee to meet in Washington, D. C., Saturday, March 2, to prepare for the national convention in Cleveland, Ohio, June 19 next.

A passenger train of ten coaches laden with religious pilgrims bound from the City of Mexico to the shrine of Sacra Monte was derailed yesterday and the engineer, an American, killed.

The wall of an old six story building at 43d street and 10th avenue New York fell this morning, killing and injuring many men who were working on it. So far three dead bodies have been taken out. There are probably a score of men still in the ruins, many of whom are believed to be dead.

A Toss Boomer.
Trinidad, Colo., March 1.—Another rich strike has been made at the La Belle, N. M., mining camp, on the government side. An assay of quartz found on the surface showed returns of \$499.98 in gold and silver.

Seven parties are interested in the claim among them District Attorney R. R. Rose, of this city. There is considerable excitement here and in camp in consequence of the strike.

The friends of Summit and Florida counties took their ducks to the wrong market.

Some of the legislative assemblymen have gone home to settle with an outraged constituency.

Now that the politicians have dispersed, let's talk business and whoop it up for New Mexico and her wondrous resources.

All hail to the Democracy of New Mexico. The party is all right. It can't be killed by the conduct of a few would-be bosses and boudlers.

It is now alleged that Miss Vanderbilt has, with the approbation of "the family," concluded to offer a suitable price for a titled husband. Doubtless she will "see" Miss Gould's bid of \$2,000,000 and "raise it" to \$3,000,000!

The Irish members of parliament have wisely concluded that, while Lord Rosebery has not done much for home rule, he is preferable to Salisbury. This doubtless prevented the downfall of the Rosebery government.

Old man Stewart will yet kill the goose that lays the silver egg if he isn't careful. His bobbing up in the senate to talk silver at such unseemly hours does far more harm to the good to the west's just cause. The Pops should muzzle him.

OBSERVES the St. Louis Republic: "Unless Democrats stick together they will make a Republican administration and a Republican congress, both of which will be directed by the old Sherman, Reed and Hoar influences. Instead of discussing contingent divisions, the whole Democracy would better be laboring for the most thorough union possible."

Under the circumstances it must be admitted by every one at all acquainted with the facts that Gov. Thornton did remarkably well in securing the confirmation of his appointees. The 31st legislative assembly has passed into history.

Let us see what the Martinez combine, which has so unrelentingly fought the executive at every step and waged war upon every measure for the good of the people and true Democracy, has accomplished.

In answer, the New Mexican will be borne out by the official record of the legislative proceedings when it asserts that the said combine has not succeeded in passing any measure, in either house, that it has advocated; nor has it, after all its boasting and self-assured importance, been able to defeat legislation suggested and supported by the better element of the Democratic party.

WITH CLEAN HANDS.
Now that it is all over the New Mexican doesn't mind taking the dear people into its confidence and asserting, without fear of successful contradiction, that there

never has been a moment during the past sixty days when the 31st legislative assembly could be characterized as Democratic. It was dominated by boodle influences and Republican bosses from start to finish, and yet, thanks to the shrewdness, tact and ability of such men as Curry, Dame, Hinkle, Victory, S. Martinez, Locke, Thompson and a few others, there was very little vicious legislation. Taking everything in consideration the New Mexican feels that true Democracy has come out of the ordeal with clean hands and a record to be proud of.

PRESS COMMENTS.

A Democratic View of It.
When we view the record of the present legislature, isn't it simply appalling to have forced upon us the knowledge that all our former laws have been so vicious and laid out of joint? But all this changed now, and we ought to thank the Lord for sending us such wise legislators. —Silver City Sentinel.

True as Gospel.
The amount of suffering among the people of the east is something fearful to contemplate. News come from Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Nebraska, Kansas and Oklahoma that thousands are starving. The cold weather is greatly increasing the suffering of these unfortunate people, while here in New Mexico no one is asking for aid. If a few thousand of these people would come here and farm the fertile lands of the Rio Grande valley, it would be a great relief to the overtaxed charitable societies there and would be of immense benefit to New Mexico. —San Marcial Bee.

On Statehood.
There is little or no hope for the passage of the territorial bills, and so the chances of New Mexico and Arizona for statehood will have to be deferred for some two years. It is a gross injustice to the people of both territories, and it may be said that the Republicans in the senate have not improved the outlook for their party by failing to urge the passage of the admission bills. It is probable, though, that both territories will be admitted by the next congress. By letting them in the Republicans would in a measure correct the evil done in this congress, and for which they are in the main held responsible. New Mexico and Arizona are both entitled to become states, and their development, in which the whole country is more or less interested, would be hastened and promoted by their admission. —Denver Republican.

The Study of Spanish.
Ex-Gov. Crittenden, of Missouri, who is the American consul general at the City of Mexico, expressed an opinion recently in regard to the study of Spanish by Americans to the effect that the Spanish language is the most valuable that can be taught in American public schools, next to English. In this opinion all people of the southwest who are informed regarding the use of that language in intercourse with the people of Mexico will coincide. In connection with the development of our trade with Mexico the Spanish language plays an important role and any young man who is able to speak it fluently can command a good position as the representative of an American commercial house. In the future trade with Mexico will hold a more important place than it does even now, and there is no doubt that ability to speak Spanish would aid in securing that trade to American merchants. Spanish is, therefore, much more valuable to Americans than the French or German, as far as trade relations with Mexico are concerned. —Denver Republican.

Wrong Ratio.
While congress is squabbling over the silver question and is unable to establish a positive ratio between gold and silver, Arizona has settled another ratio asked by the friends of the white metal.

In making up the cost of living in Arizona the money expended in educating the rising generation is no small item; yet that amounts drifts into insignificance when compared with what is expended in quenching thirst and drowning sorrow. This is a mineral country and the ratio of 16 to 1 must be maintained, so the citizens of this territory, according to the

governor's message, expend \$16 for liquor to \$1 for education.

Comparisons, it is said, are odious, and in this case certainly the blush of shame mounts the cheek of the average man when he contemplates the fact. While some 200 schools are maintained, over 7,000 children are in attendance and 126 days on an average are taught yearly in each district, there are 682 saloons running 365 days in the year and taking over the bar more than \$3,600,000 annually, or sixteen times the amount spent for education.

As the entire amount of gold and silver produced only equals the liquor bill it matters little about the ratio of gold and silver, so the parity between the saloon and the school house is kept at the normal condition of 16 to 1. It requires but 300 teachers to manage the schools while to run the wet goods department requires 682 proprietors or firms and at least 1,000 extra bartenders. So long as the present ratio is maintained between the saloon and the school house so long will tramps infest this fair, rich and productive country, and poverty will have a front seat at many a hearthstone; so long will want and despair, suicide and lunacy be on the increase. Already the number of suicides yearly is alarming, while the number of insane persons exceeds that of any state or territory in proportion to population. Is there something wrong with the ratio? Or is it in the quality of liquor dispensed? —Phoenix, A. T., Review.

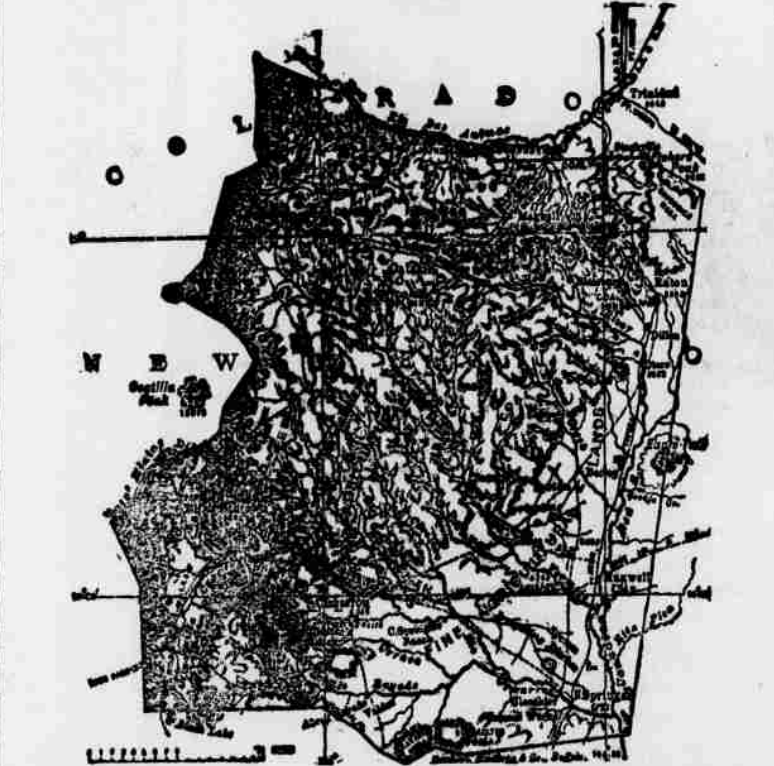

CLOSING SCENES.

Sudden Termination of the 31st Assembly—A Readable Record of the Last Day's Proceedings.

Some Measures that Failed to Become Law—Executive Appointments—Kindly Interchange of Sentiment.

The 31st legislative assembly adjourned sine die at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon. To many this action was unexpected, but to those on the inside of the deal that had been made it was no surprise. It was known early in the day that, in pursuance of an agreement between themselves, Messrs. Larragotte and Abeyta would vote with the five Republicans for adjournment whenever a proposition to go into executive session was made. This plan was carried out and the council adjourned without notifying the executive of its intention. Five minutes later the house also ceased to exist.

The Council.

YESTERDAY AFTERNOON'S SESSION. Upon Mr. Perea's motion all original bills with amendments were for the rest of the session to be considered engrossed.

Mr. Victory called up H. J. R. No. 15, Mr. Leaden's resolution for the investigation of the White Ash mine disaster.

Mr. Chavez thought that the present law, with its coroner's juries, etc., was amply adequate to meet the demands of the present emergency and objected to a suspension of the rules for a consideration of the resolution.

Mr. Victory then moved a suspension of the rules for the purpose of considering the matter.

This motion was carried by a vote of 9 to 2, Messrs. Chavez, Desmarais and Larragotte voting "no," so that the resolution was considered.

It was then passed by a vote of 10 to 2, Messrs. Larragotte and Chavez voting "no."

H. B. No. 104, Mr. Carr's bill preventing the presence of minors in the gaming rooms, was called up on motion of Mr. Perea and passed by unanimous vote.

C. J. R. No. 16 was introduced by Mr. Victory.

This resolution provides for an appropriation of \$325 to defray miscellaneous charges such as the personal expenses of the visiting committees, the rent of committee rooms, etc.

The resolution passed by a vote of 9 to 2, Messrs. Ancheta, Curry and Perea voting "no."

H. B. No. 30, Mr. Leaden's bill for the protection of laborers and requiring payment of wages and penal provisions, was called up by Mr. Chavez.

Mr. Victory said that the bill was a bid for popularity by the gentleman from Valencia.

There being objection the bill was not considered by the council.

C. B. No. 36, allowing county assessors to appoint deputies, was called up.

Mr. Galles here moved to adjourn sine die.

Mr. Bunker moved to go into executive session.

Mr. Perea moved to table the Bunker motion and the vote was announced as resulting 6 to 6.

A recount was demanded and the motion to go into executive session was tabled by a vote of 7 to 5, Messrs. Bunker, Desmarais, Garcia, Victory and Curry voting "no."

Mr. Larragotte moved to adjourn sine die, which motion Mr. Galles seconded.

The vote then proceeded on the motion to adjourn.

This motion prevailed by a vote of 7 to 5, as upon the last motion.

Mr. Ancheta tried to edge in a vote of thanks to President Curry, but was crowded out by the death knell announcement from the chair:

"The council stands adjourned sine die."

Immediately upon adjournment, President Curry resumed the chair and in a neat speech thanked the council for its kindness and courtesy.

"I entered upon the duties of the position without previous experience," he continued, "I realize that I have made mistakes, but have tried to be fair and impartial. I shall remember as long as I live the courtesy with which I have been treated by the members of this body and I feel that I shall carry home with me the sincerest friendship of and for every member of this body, not excepting the gentlemen of the minority who have ever been mindful of me in their conduct in this assembly."

Mr. Curry's remarks were heartily applauded and at their conclusion, Mr. Galles took the chair.

Mr. Hadley was called upon to respond and he replied: "I can hardly find words to express the deep thanks of the minority for the kind words just uttered by our late presiding officer. I am very certain that the gentlemen who have just left the chair have endeavored to do his duty to the people conscientiously and thoroughly. As a member of the minority I desire to bear witness to the success which has attended his efforts and to say that he has a place in my heart as well as in that of each member of the minority. He has made the people of New Mexico one of the best representatives in the history of the territory, and I extend to him in behalf of myself and the others on the floor of the late council our sincerest thanks and our heartiest good wishes."

Mr. Chavez here mounted his desk and said, amid applause, "As the oldest servant and a man who has served with the minority I second the remarks made by Mr. Hadley and bear witness to the integrity and capacity with which President Curry has presided in this body. He is a man in the truest sense of the word."

Journal Clerk John L. Zimmerman rose to a question of personal privilege. He begged in behalf of the employees of the council who had served the territory for the last thirty-five days without compensation to extend a heartfelt acknowledgment of gratitude to Chief

Clerk Lucero who had so considerably superintended the work in the council since its assembling.

Interpreter Nestor Montoya followed with a statement that while the other branches of the assembly might have decided to quit, the third house was still in session. He therefore called a session of that body to meet at 8 o'clock in the evening.

After giving "three cheers for the war hero," Valencia, the council for the second time stood adjourned sine die. It had gone out as it came in, with a blaze of oratory.

The House.

YESTERDAY AFTERNOON'S SESSION. As soon as the house had met, a motion was made to adjourn sine die at 4 o'clock.

This motion was carried by a vote of 15 to 6.

Mr. Pina moved to take a recess for an hour. This motion was lost by a vote of 10 to 11.

C. B. No. 14, the Desmarais bill, preventing crimes against the elective franchise, was called up on motion of Mr. Carr, and passed by a vote of 17 to 4.

Substitute for H. B. No. 32, Mr. Hinkle's bill for the protection and promotion of horticultural interests in New Mexico, was next taken up.

Mr. Lacombe moved its indefinite postponement, while Mr. Hinkle moved its passage.

The former motion prevailed by a vote of 14 to 6, so that the bill was killed.

H. B. No. 203, providing a punishment for the fouling of waters of streams, was next taken up on motion of Mr. Gutierrez and passed by a vote of 15 to 4.

C. B. No. 80, Mr. Curry's bill requiring the advertisement of the sale of lands under legal process, was passed by a vote of 18 to 0.

C. B. No. 87, Mr. Ancheta's bill to enable the probating of foreign wills, was passed by a vote of 18 to 1.

H. B. No. 119, Mr. Lucero's bill providing for the opening of roads, highways and public streets, was passed by a vote of 18 to 7, and the action thus taken was, on motion of Mr. Hinkle, enched.

Mr. Martin offered an amendment to H. B. No. 118, regulating fair and racing associations, and the bill, as amended, passed by a vote of 18 to 2.

Mr. Christy, by unanimous consent, on behalf of the committee on engrossed and enrolled bills made a report on H. B. No. 112, the bill perpetuating L. C. Fort in office.

The hour for adjournment having arrived, Mr. Sanchez feelingly expressed the thanks of the house to Speaker Dame, for his uniform fairness, ability and courtesy.

Mr. Christy supplemented this with the thanks of the house to the board of trade and to Secretary Lorion Miller for their aid in the matter of legislative quarters and in other directions.

On motion of Mr. Hinkle a vote of thanks was extended to Chief Clerk Serna and his assistants.

A sine die adjournment was voted by 20 to 3.

Speaker Dame, before announcing the vote, acknowledged the kind and courteous treatment which he had always received at the hands of the house. He said that he would always look back with pleasure to the honor of having presided over this most intelligent and honorable body.

A blow of the gavel followed and the house of the 31st legislative assembly had passed into history.

EXECUTIVE APPOINTMENTS.

Gov. Thornton this morning made the following appointments: As district attorney for the counties of San Miguel and Mora, A. A. Jones, of Las Vegas, to succeed L. C. Fort, whose term of office has expired; J. E. Wharton, to be district attorney for the county of Lincoln, under the bill just passed by the assembly.

As members of the board of health: George S. Enderday, of Albuquerque, for the county of Santa Fe; Joseph M. Cunningham, of Las Vegas, and W. E. Egert, of Santa Fe, for the homeopathic school; and Francis H. Atkins, W. R. Tipton, J. H. Sloan and James J. Shuler, of Raton, for the regular school. These appointments taken in conjunction with those confirmed by the council during the last sixty days fill all of the offices within executive gift, with the exception of that of superintendent of public instruction, in which office the present incumbent, Hon. Amado Chavez, holds over.

EMPLOYEES' PAY QUESTION.

The supreme court is to-day hearing argument on the territorial employees' pay question. By agreement of counsel, the Celso Baca case and the mandamus case against Chief Auditor Perez, which have both been appealed, are being considered together. The court will render its decision immediately, although the formal opinion will not be handed down until the regular term next summer.

For the employees' side, Judge H. Warren, Judge A. B. Atkins, W. R. Tipton and Mr. John H. Knebel. Judge J. R. McFie, who brought the Celso Baca suit, left for Las Cruces last night and Mr. T. B. Catron, who subsequently argued the matter, has also pulled out of the controversy as well as out of town, having gone to Las Vegas last night.

THEY WERE WATCHED.

A happy gathering was that in the parlors of the Palace hotel last evening at 8 o'clock. It marked the end of the social side of the legislative session and in the fraternal commingling of those who had recently been antagonists in the political sparring matches on the floor of either house was to be seen an exemplification of "the eternal brotherhood of mankind."

Mr. Perea and Mr. Victory, the two most indefatigable "scrappers" in the late council, were on hand; Mr. Martin and Mr. Carr, foremost in the pleasure of this final reunion, all about the latter's bills having been repeatedly tabled at the instance of the former; Speaker Dame was unruffled in his serenity after his final rulings upon points of order made by the belligerent gentlemen; Mr. Moran and on the whole the occasion was a fitting finale to a session which has been characterized by the making of many friendships that

will survive the storms of future political controversy.

A number of ladies graced the occasion by their presence and when Col. A. J. Fountain, of Las Cruces, took the floor, he had a most attentive and sympathetic hearing in his speech accompanying the presentation of an elegant watch to Councilman Curry. Col. Fountain, speaking as one of Mr. Curry's constituents, gave eloquent expression to the high appreciation in which that gentleman is held by the people of the district in which he lives.

He said that the residents of the five counties represented by Mr. Curry could not regard him but with esteem and admiration. In "conclusion he handed to Mr. Curry the beautiful gift with the sentiment: "Take this as an evidence of the esteem of your people and with it their best wishes for your future happiness and prosperity." The watch bore the inscription: "Senator George Curry, from his constituents. Santa Fe, N. M., 1895."

Mr. Curry responded in a few fitting remarks expressive of the appreciation and pride with which he received this testimonial, especially in view of its being a gift from his constituency. He said that he had anticipated the duty honorably and fairly and took occasion to add that in his labors for the good of the people of his district he had found a most able and congenial collaborator in the person of the eloquent senator from Grant, Mr. Ancheta, who, in common with himself, represented the people of Dona Ana and Grant counties.

Speaker Dame's turn came next, and Representative Christy, in presenting him with a beautiful watch, referred to the arduous duties devolving upon a speaker and said that Mr. Dame had been a model presiding officer, and was a man who had never failed to do his duty fearlessly and honestly. He said that the inscription upon the watch was placed there advisedly and that its donors were "friends" in the truest sense of the word.

Mr. Dame responded appropriately, thanking those who had thus remembered him and expressing his certainty that the friendship with which the remembrance was tendered was heartily reciprocated.

The inscription within the watch was "Presented to Wm. E. Dame, speaker of the house, 1895, by his friends."

Col. Fountain here again took the floor and said: "Now that you two gentlemen have been watched and chained, it is eminently appropriate that you should be censored. The good people of this historic capital, headed by Mr. Stann, desire to express their appreciation of your efforts in behalf of this beautiful city. They offer their heartfelt thanks and express the hope that the next legislature will find you both among its members."

A handsome gold-headed cane was then presented to Mr. Curry and to Mr. Dame, who each suitably acknowledged the gift.

Gov. Thornton, who had meanwhile entered the room, was called upon and was greeted with applause. He took occasion to refer to the true men of the present legislature and to say that there were in New Mexico as elsewhere many men who were not afraid to do their duty fearlessly and honestly. He said that with probably one exception the present assembly had passed no bad laws and had shown its wisdom by the defeat of many measures that should not have become law. He thought that on the whole the present assembly had done its duty honestly and fairly and that the people of New Mexico had gained by its work.

Speeches followed from Colonel Chavez, who was introduced as "the Nestor of the late assembly," Mr. Ancheta, "the youngest and most eloquent member of either house," Mr. Martin, "the youngest member of the lower house," who thought that "without the presence of such men as Mr. Curry and Mr. Dame there is no telling where the assembly would have been at;" Mr. Galles, who "had talked less than any member of the late council;" Mr. Victory, "the able and learned solicitor general;" Mr. Pedro Perea, "the most obstreperous member of either house;" Mr. Carr, whom many present thought to be deserving of the title just applied to Mr. Perea; Mr. A. A. Jones, who, as introduced by Col. Fountain, enjoyed the distinction of having been "the only Democratic nominee who failed of confirmation at the hands of a Democratic council;" and many others.

Instrumental music by Mr. A. M. Bergere and sparkling champagne liberally served closed the delightful episode and the sine die adjournment then taken was accompanied with much more numerous regrets than had characterized the late dissolution of either of the two houses.

THE DEPOSITORY SCANDAL.

The Albuquerque banks investigation committee appointed by the house made their report to that body yesterday. The report sets forth the fact that the committee proceeded to Albuquerque, but were unable to make any examination of the books on account of the telegraphic orders from Comptroller Eekles published in the New Mexican some days ago. The report continues:

"Being unable to gain access to the books of said bank, your committee deemed it best not to enter into any investigation whatever of the matters submitted to us."

"Your committee are of the opinion that the best interests of the people of the territory demand a full and thorough investigation of such matters, and believe that upon proper presentation of the facts to the treasury department at Washington, D. C., and to the president of the United States, authority will be granted for a legislative committee to examine all of the books, papers and records of said Albuquerque National bank; and that the whole truth regarding the transactions which your committee were to investigate may become known, therefore your committee respectfully recommend the passage of the joint resolution herewith submitted as a part of this report. Your committee called upon the receiver of the New Mexico Savings Bank & Trust company, J. E. Saint, who readily acceded to a request for an examination of the books and accounts of his institution, and upon the statement of said receiver regarding the condition of the territorial funds in said bank as true and correct, and believe that said receiver is justified in the statements made re-

garding the final payment in full of the balance due the territory. This statement of the receiver is herewith appended and made part of this report."

The joint resolution referred to in the report never got further than the clerk's desk in the house, however. Like many another good measure, "it died a born-again."

The report of Receiver Saint, of the New Mexico Savings Bank & Trust company, which was submitted with the committee's report shows that that institution had \$5,020.92 of territorial funds at the time of its failure and that dividends to the amount of \$5,208.36 have been paid, leaving a balance due of \$4,812.56. Saint expresses it as his belief that the creditors will be paid in full and that within the next sixty or ninety days 25 or 30 per cent more of the indebtedness will be paid off.
