THE Denver and Albuquerque newspapers have just discovered that something is likely to happen in the southwestern railway world.

HARMONY in Democratic ranks in New Mexico continues a never ending source of worryment to the territorial Republican organs. Their efforts to stir up strife are really amusing.

IF Delegate Catron had been on duty at the meeting of the house committee on territories on Wednesday his vote would have at least made the adjournment proposition a tie. A little more "brain and energy" needed there!

THE present congress is very quick to respond to Delegate Catron's call to curtail the personal liberty of the people of the territories, but when it comes to fulfilling a pledge as solemn as international treaty can make it and conferring upon our people the full dignity of American citizenship, why, that's another thing. It is an outrage.

"We can get along very well without prize fights," says the Washington Post, Republican, "but," adds the Post, "what will impress every thoughtful man—and impress him with pain and sorrow—is the fact that the United States senate takes more interest in prohibiting a contest between two obscure and insignificant ruffians than it does in rescuing the national finances from a condition of insolvency. The prize fight bill goes through with a hurrah. The revenue bill lies in a senate pigeon-hole, a thing of unconcealed contempt. The grave and revered senators who have our destinies in their hands are moved to feats of almost superhuman energy in expediting a measure affecting a few hundred roughs and betting men now gathered together at El Paso. Those same grave and revered senators have nothing but indifference, neglect and animosity for a measure affecting every legitimate business interest in the whole country. We ask any thoughtful and intelligent human being to say whether this is a reassuring spectacle."

HAS IT COME DAFT?

Watch the governor whitewash those two delinquent Democratic sheriffs.—Albuquerque Citizen.

Hear that, will you, and Sheriff George Sena is the only Republican officer holder in Lincoln county, while in Taos county Bonifacio Barron is not the sheriff, but the tax collector. The Citizen, in its rabid desire to say something mean about Gov. Thornton seems to have completely lost its head, for it was this same up-to-date sheet that informed its long suffering editorial readers the other day that the assessed valuation of taxable property in New Mexico is "about \$26,000,000."

CZAR REED'S DICTUM.

Czar Reed's dictum has prevailed. The long delayed meeting of the house committee on territories was held on Wednesday and the fight which the present leaders of the national Republican party have made on the admission of Arizona and New Mexico as states culminated in the adoption of a snap-judgment motion to adjourn right in the midst of the proceedings. This action was taken by a vote of 5 to 6, showing that but eleven of the fifteen members of the committee were present at the meeting. Following is a full list of the members of the house committee on territories:

Republicans—Scranton, of Pennsylvania, chairman; Perkins, of Iowa; Lefevre, of New York; Avery, of Michigan; Harris, of Ohio; Hadley, of Illinois; Knox, of Massachusetts; Taft, of Ohio; Lowe, of

New York; Catron, of New Mexico; Murphy, of Arizona.

Democrats—Harrison, of Alabama; Turner, of Virginia; Owens, of Kentucky; Cooper, of Texas.

Those who voted for adjournment, which, under the circumstances, is equivalent to final and ultimate defeat of the statehood proposition, so far as concerns this congress, were: Knox, Hadley, Taft, Lowe, Harrison and Owens. Harris and Lefevre, two other Republican members of the committee, were among the absentees and are said to be in favor of any action that will defeat the admission of new states. Those members who voted against adjournment were Perkins, Turner, Scranton, Avery and Cooper. Delegates Catron and Murphy are not mentioned in the Washington dispatches as having been present, and if they were present they were not allowed to vote. It is probable that they were present, however, and that, in further accord with Speaker Reed's dictum, they were prohibited from voting, a thing unheard of in the annals of national legislation, and a dastardly outrage not only upon the people of the territories but upon all citizens who value the principles of American liberty and the rights of free speech.

PRESS COMMENT.

Simply a Suggestion.

St. Catron has been in Washington two months and the bill providing for the admission of New Mexico in the union still lingers in the hands of the committee on territories. Our delegate ought to exercise some of his "brains and energy."—Silver City Eagle.

Cue-rious and True.

The king of Corea has ordered his subjects to cut off their queues, but this will not force the links of the Republican "endless chain." of the Rio Grande valley to dispense with the ones it receives from their ruler in Santa Fe.—Albuquerque Democrat.

A Straight Free Coinage Party.

It is now conceded, even by Democrats who favor the gold standard, that it will be necessary for the Democrats of New Mexico to nominate a free silver man on a free silver platform for delegate to congress this fall. This goes to show that the free coinage idea has made progress in New Mexico during the past two years and that the Democratic party is keeping pace with the progress of the cause.—Silver City Eagle.

Reed's Outrageous Determination.

It seems to be a fact that Speaker Reed has determined that neither Arizona nor New Mexico shall be admitted by the present congress. He has the power to defeat a bill for their admission and he is disposed to exercise it so as to prevent any addition to the silver strength in the senate. Thus it appears that the people of these territories are to be deprived of one of the rights of American citizens because their views on an economic question do not accord with those entertained by a certain element in the east. If this is not ostracism on account of political opinion, we do not know what to call it.—Denver Republican.

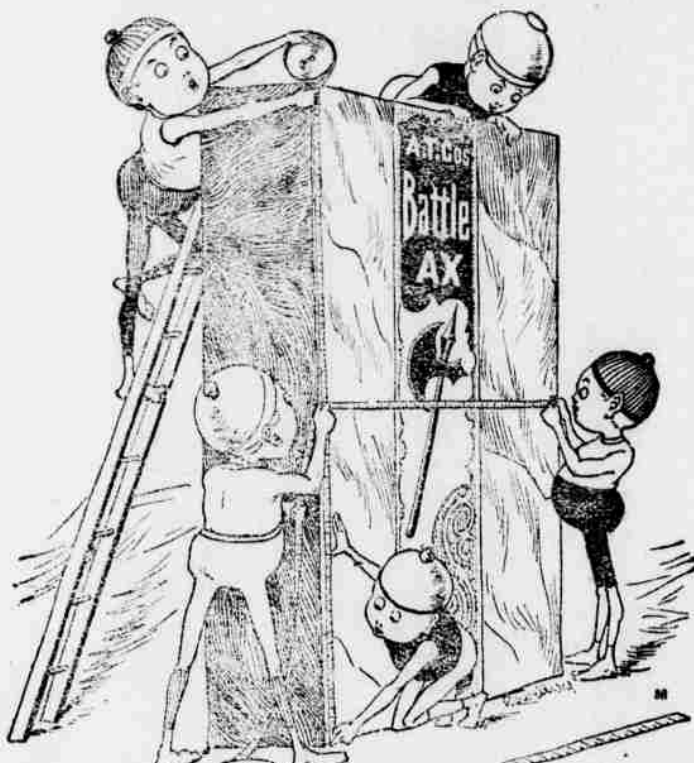

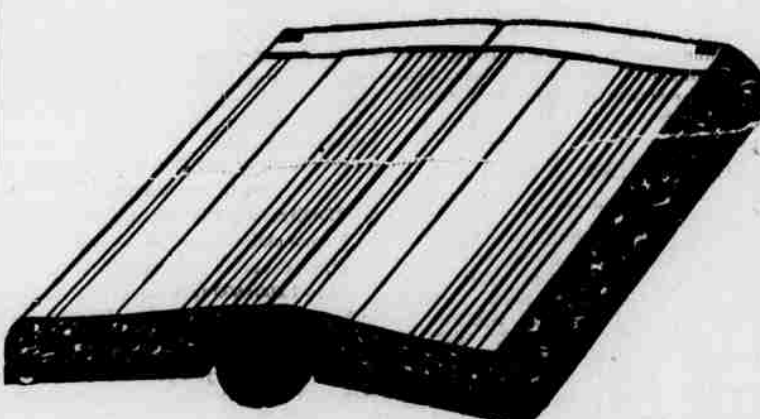

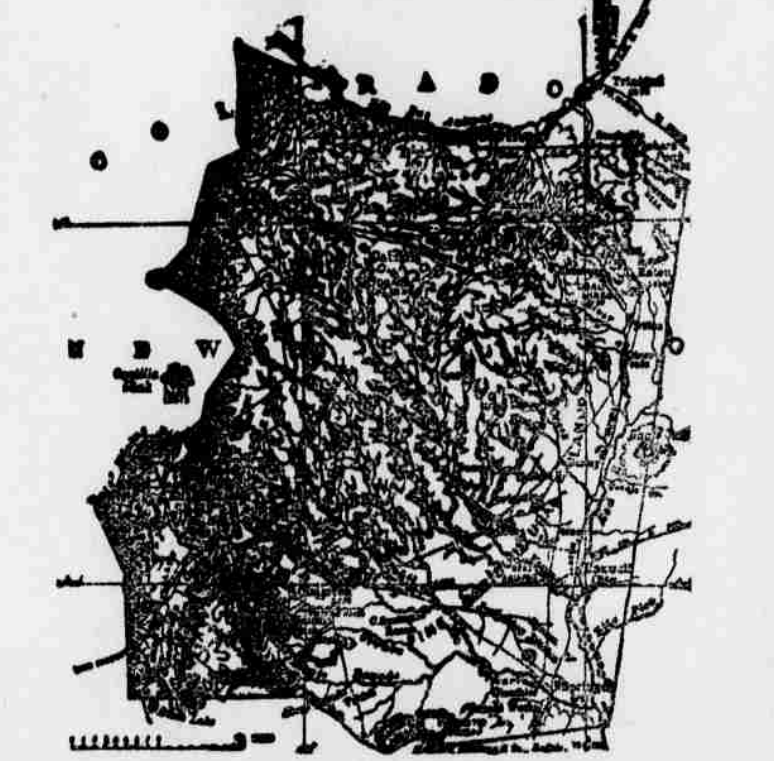

THE FOUNTAIN AFFAIR.

Brannigan and Van Patten Still Out—Oliver Lee's Movements—Sentiment at Las Cruces.

A posse headed by Capt. Brannigan, who is a man of experience, judgment and discretion, is searching the Jicarillas and Sacramentos for a clew in the Fountain case, and another posse under ex-Sheriff Van Patten is working through White Sands and the adjacent country. Inspector Fowler, Ben Williams and two or three others are also out. The Las Cruces Independent says:

"It is reported that they secured justice's warrants for Oliver Lee before they left here. Oliver Lee arrived in Las Cruces to-day, having started as soon as he received information that he was being talked about in connection with the Fountain case. Sheriff Sosa, of Lincoln, brought with him the warrants issued in his county for Mr. Lee, and Mr. Lee's first business in town was to hunt up Sheriff Sosa and give bonds for appearance in court."

This warrant charges Lee with cattle stealing. The Independent adds: "There is no division of feeling among the reasonable citizens of Las Cruces. The horror and grief are shared by all, and sympathy and commiseration are extended by all to the family of Col. Fountain. Should the crime be fastened upon any man or band of men, the demand for the most extreme punishment known to the law would be met by no dissenting voice. The officers of the law have done and are doing all in their power to solve the mystery and detect the criminals."

MARSHES OFFER REWARD.

At the regular communication of Montezuma lodge, No. 1, A. F. & A. M., held at Masonic hall last evening, a communication was read from Aztec Masonic lodge of Las Cruces reciting the circumstances surrounding the mysterious disappearance of Col. A. J. Fountain and his son, Henry, on February 1; that Col. Fountain was a member of the Masonic order in good standing; that Aztec lodge had appropriated \$200 as a reward for the solution of the mystery and was pledged to make the amount \$700, and soliciting the co-operation of Montezuma lodge here.

After the reading of this communication the lodge in this city promptly passed a resolution expressing its horror of the kidnapping of Col. Fountain and his little son, tendering sympathy to the afflicted relatives and friends of the missing ones, appropriating \$50 toward the fund for rewards and pledging more if necessary.

It is presumed that the other Masonic lodges of New Mexico will take similar action. It is the view of local Masons that if ever an emergency arose in which their fraternity was called upon to fly to the rescue of a brother and his family it is surely presented in the case under consideration.

It may be added that Gov. Thornton is seriously considering the advisability of increasing his offer of \$500 to a \$5,000 reward for the apprehension of the captors and probable murderers of the missing father and son, contingent of course upon the approval of the next general assembly.

A Lover's Festival that Originated in the Fifteenth Century—Shakespeare Alludes to it as the Mating Time of Birds.

This is the 14th of February or St. Valentine's day. It was established as a festival day in England, Scotland and France about the fifteenth century and was for years very popular among the upper classes and at many European courts.

On Valentine's eve spinners and bachelors were accustomed to meet in a social way, write upon bits of paper the names of a number of spinners and bachelors of their acquaintance, throw them into a basket, and then draw them out one at a time, each being exercised that each should draw one of the opposite sex, the person thus drawn being the drawer's Valentine.

The festival was introduced into America at an early day, but its observance has since undergone material changes, and is annually becoming less and less general, at present being limited to friends exchanging anonymous communications with each other, the same being made in verse or verse referring to a variety of topics, the subject being also illustrated by cuts of an amusing or sentimental character.

It is a very old notion, alluded to by Shakespeare, that on this day birds begin to couple. Hence, perhaps, arose the custom of sending on this day letters containing professions of love and affection.

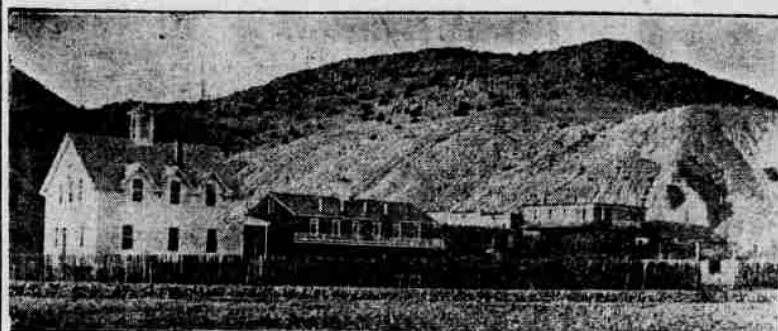

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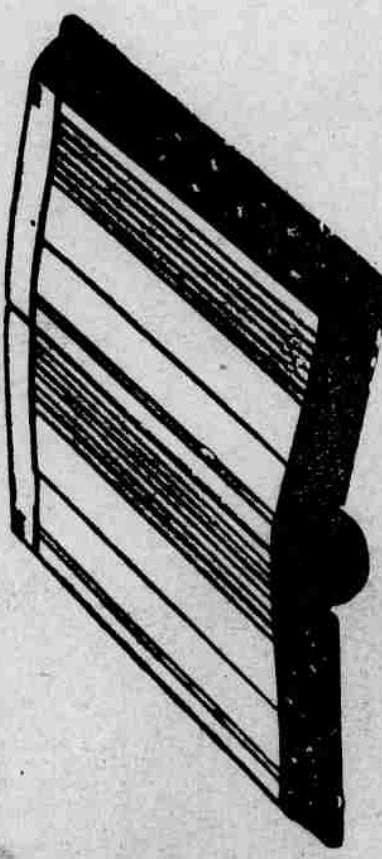
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
