## WASHINGTON NEWS BUDGET

Sherman of New York Brings Up the Anti-Ticket Scalping Bill and the House Decides to Consider It by a Vote of 153 to 70.

## HANNA AND HOAR IN CONFERENCE

Strenuous Efforts of Republican Leaders at the National Capital for the Election of a Republican Senator from Oregon.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 27.—The senate committee on appropriations completed its consideration of the naval appropriation bill today. Among the changes is one fixing \$400 a ton as the maximum price for armor plate, and providing in case the plate cannot be procured at this price that the government shall establish a plant and make its own armor. The senate committee made provisions for three additional torpedo boats.

Chairman Hanna and family arrived this morning.

## ANTI SCALPING BILL.

Mr. Sherman, of New York, called up the anti scalper railroad ticket bill in the house today. Mr. Terry, Democrat, of Arkansas, raised a question of consideration against it. The house voted 153 to 70 to consider the anti ticket brokerage bill. This is considered a fair test of the strength of this measure.

## HANDLING OF THE MAILS.

The senate today after a squabble over a local street railway bill, took up the postoffice appropriation bill. A feature of its consideration was an attempt by Butler, of North Carolina, and Pettigrew, of South Carolina, to reduce railroad charges for carrying mail. An amendment with this in view was ruled out on a point of order.

## FOR A REPUBLICAN SENATOR.

Mr. Hanna had an extended consultation with Senator Hoar, chairman of the judiciary committee, upon the situation in Oregon. An effort is being made by Hanna, as chairman of the National committee to secure the election of a Republican senator from Oregon. Hoar indicated to Hanna the belief that an appointment by the government would not be accepted by the senate.

## Settlement Effected.

Chicago, Feb. 27.—Geo. Schneider, former president of the National Bank of Illinois, has effected a settlement of his indebtedness to the bank. A petition for his discharge from liability will be presented to the United States court in a day or two.

## TO OUST THE MAYOR.

Suit Against the Governor-Mayor of Detroit, Mich., Decided in Favor of the Defendant Official.

Detroit, Mich., Feb. 27.—The suit brought by D. W. H. Moreland, a member of the board of public works, to oust Mayor Pingree from office, was decided in favor of the mayor today by the circuit court, on a technicality. Moreland's contention was that when Pingree became governor he vacated the office of mayor. The court did not touch upon this point, but held that Moreland as a private citizen had no right in court and should have brought suit in the name of the attorney-general.

## Confessed Judgment.

Chicago, Feb. 27.—Wolffgang Hill & Co., clothiers, confessed judgment in the circuit court today for \$18,611 in favor of the Port Dearborn National bank.

## For Criminal Libel.

Pittsburg, Feb. 27.—Alfred Reed, proprietor, and Walter Crispy, political editor of the Commercial Gazette, recently convicted of criminal libel in the case of Senator C. L. McGee and Wm. Flynn, were fined by Judge White \$100 each, costs, each.

## A SPANISH VERSION.

The Spanish Premier Claims That Dr. Ruiz Was Not Beaten to Death.

Madrid, Feb. 27.—Premier Castiello at the cabinet council today declared that the differences with the United States in regard to the treatment of prisoners were without any importance. He added that the impartial inquiry into the death of Dr. Ruiz, who died in prison under circumstances which led to the report that he had been beaten to death, showed that the doctor died a natural death.

## Threatened With Destruction.

Indianapolis, Mich., Feb. 27.—Michigan is threatened with destruction by fire. J. F. Sunderstrom's store on Main street, and an adjoining business block are in ashes. Seven or eight business places immediately adjoining will be consumed, as a strong wind is blowing toward them. The fire department has nothing but a hand engine and a few hundred feet of hose. Two thousand feet of hose is now on the way by special train.

## TAKEN PRISONER.

A Greek Provision Steamer Falls Into the Hands of the Italians.

Canea, Feb. 27.—The Greek steamer Tyans, after landing provisions and ammunition at Platonia for the Greeks, took on board 100 prisoners. She was stopped at Drapona by the Italian warship and taken to Suda bay.

## Mediation Asked.

New York, Feb. 27.—A dispatch to the Herald from London says: A correspondent at Athens telegraphs that the Roman Catholic archbishop at Athens has sent a dispatch to the pope asking his consent to mediate between Greece and the powers.

## Embezzlement.

Lincoln, Neb. Feb. 27.—Ex-State Treasurer Joseph Bartley will be arrested this afternoon on a charge of embezzlement, warrants were sworn out this morning.

## WOLCOTT'S MISSION.

The National Review of London Says That Senator Wolcott Has Done Splendid Work in Europe.

London, Feb. 27.—Several prominent bimetallicists whom Senator Wolcott saw here, are convinced that he has done splendid work in Europe. I. J. Marx, editor of the National Review, says: "I am convinced if the incoming administration follows Wolcott's inquiries with the purpose and determination of a satisfactory international solution of the monetary question, it will make McKinley's presidency more famous than any of its predecessors. Europe looks to him (McKinley) for the next move. John Bull will not block the way."

## Fight at a Dance.

Victoria, Texas, Feb. 27.—A dispatch from Tangle says that a terrible affray took place at a dance in which ten persons were killed and fifteen others seriously wounded. A young man insulted a young woman and this led to a general fight in which knives and pistols were freely used.

## Bank Statement.

New York, Feb. 27.—Following is the weekly bank statement: Reserve, increase, \$1,855,025; loans, decrease, \$1,137,900; specie, increase, \$1,123,300; legal tenders, increase, \$1,005,800; deposits, increase, \$1,098,700; circulation, decrease, \$123,200. The banks now hold \$57,220,925 in excess of all legal requirements.

## MULLANPHY BANK FAILURE

The First Institution of the Kind to Fail in St. Louis for a Good Many Years.

St. Louis, Feb. 27.—The Mullanphy Savings bank, a state institution, was closed today by the state bank examiner. J. H. Rottman is president of the institution.

The Mullanphy Savings bank has been in operation more than twenty-five years. The statement issued February 26, was as follows: Liabilities, capital stock, \$100,000; surplus, \$5,204; demand deposits, \$248,182; time deposits, \$396,088; certificates, \$80,608; cash, \$5,204; cashiers' checks, \$3,439; bills payable, \$45,000; total, \$806,089. Resources: Bills receivable, \$561,753; bonds, \$54,081; real estate, \$89,112; cash in vault, \$12,246; cash in banks, \$58,172; total, \$806,044. Yesterday the Continental bank cleared, which the Mullanphy bank cleared, notified the chairman of the Clearing House association, that it would not clear for the Savings Institution any longer, because of its condition.

Bank Examiner Austin had examined into the banks condition, and finding it unsatisfactory so reported to the Continental. Last night, the examining committee of the Clearing House association met to devise some means for carrying the bank over, but decided it could do nothing. This becoming known to some of the depositors, about forty this morning began a run. Examiner Austin promptly closed the doors and the depositors were put out. There was much indignation among the depositors, who are mostly poor people who can ill afford to lose their savings. It ensued a sensation as this is the first bank in St. Louis to fail for many years.

## Rumor Denied.

London, Feb. 27.—The Greek charge d'affaires denies that King George intended his intention of accepting the demands of the powers.

## Destroyed by Fire.

Canton, O., Feb. 27.—The immense plant of the Middlebranch Portland & Diamond Cement company burned this morning. Loss \$200,000, partially insured.

## King May Abdicate.

Paris, Feb. 27.—Reports are current here and elsewhere in Europe today, that if the powers insist upon the Greek troops evacuating Crete, King George will abdicate in favor of Crown Prince Constantine, duke of Sparta.

## Boiler Explosion.

New Bedford, Mass., Feb. 27.—A boiler exploded at the Acushnet mill today, wrecking a part of the plant. After the fire was under control, a search among the ruins of the boiler house disclosed the body of Manuel Mendonca, the fireman. Another employee, Arthur Ashing, was burned to death. Half a dozen others were injured.

## THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY

The Best Measure Yet Passed—Reel Sugar Factories, Woolen Mills and Smelters Exempted from Taxation for Five Years.

## THE CAPITAL REMOVING QUESTION

Legislature Adjourns Until Monday That Committees May Consider the Many Bills Referred to Them.

## LEGISLATIVE GOSSIP.

What's the matter with getting after Gov. Thornton with some red-hot dispatches?

Hon. J. A. Ancheta stood by his opinion, regardless of the pressure brought to bear for the division of Grant county. Silver City Enterprise.

Councilman Hughes' opinion on the capital removal question: It is said that a majority of the legislature is in favor of the removal of the territorial capital to Albuquerque.

Councilman Spies proposes to make a red-hot fight on this capital removal business, and his Republican friends in the council will do well to stay by him. A hint is all that is sufficient or should be.

Councilman Hughes gave the New Mexican the cheering intelligence this morning, that the capital removal fellows claim 16 votes in the house and eight in the council. Mr. Hughes is the Tiebreaker claimant of New Mexico.

Hon. Charles Spies led the Republican members in the fight for the preservation of Grant county and will be gratefully remembered by the people of this section.—Silver City Enterprise.

Representatives Senn, Malinas Martinez, Muholland, Cristman and Reynolds are on a visit to Las Vegas today on an inspection tour of the insane asylum and the Normal school in that city.

If any of our good friends in the council attempt to put up a job on Councilman Spies, they will find themselves reckoning without their host. This has reference to the capital removal question and to some of Mr. Spies' Republican colleagues.

Messrs. Fall, Curry and Martin led the hardest fight ever made in the New Mexican legislature, against the division of Grant county. Few men ever had to battle against the pressure which was exerted to influence these gentlemen, and in this proportion are the people of Grant county indebted to them for their services in maintaining the integrity of Grant county.—Silver City Enterprise.

## The Council.

## FRIDAY MORNING.

Council met pursuant to adjournment with the president in the chair and all members present.

Journal of previous day's session was read and approved.

Mr. Martin presented a petition from the citizens of Socorro county, requesting the passage of a law giving the county commissioners the right to appoint a county stock inspector of cattle and sheep, and upon his motion same was referred to the committee on territorial affairs.

A message was received from the house of representatives announcing passage by that body of and requesting concurrence of the council in the following bills: H. B. No. 51, An act derogative to several sections of chapter 56 of the laws of New Mexico of 1893; H. B. No. 93, An act providing for the proper indexing of recorded conveyances; H. B. No. 105, An act referring to bridges and ditches; also an amending bill to the house in the passage of C. B. No. 76, An act amending section 2363 of the Compiled Laws.

The president presented a petition from the citizens of Pecos No. 5 from the county of Rio Arriba, requesting to be annexed to the county of Taos. Same was referred to the committee on counties and townships.

Mr. Curry presented a petition from the citizens of Lincoln county, requesting the appropriation of \$2,500 for the purpose of building a wagon road from the county of Lincoln to the Rio Grande.

Mr. Hughes introduced C. B. No. 101, An act to remove the capital from Santa Fe to Albuquerque. Said bill was referred by title. Upon motion of Mr. Martin, rules were suspended and the bill read a second time in full. Mr. Martin then moved that the bill be translated, printed and referred to a special committee of three to be appointed by the chair.

As an amendment, Mr. Martin moved that it be referred to the committee on municipal and private corporations. Mr. Chavez moved that it be referred to the committee on capital. Mr. Duncan moved that the bill be suspended and the bill read a third time by title preparatory to its passage, but subsequently withdrew the motion. Mr. Martin was referred upon the motion to refer said bill to the capital committee, and roll call being demanded, the vote resulted in a tie and the motion was lost.

As an amendment to the motion of the gentleman from Socorro county, Mr. Fincial then moved that the bill be referred to the committee on municipal and private corporations, and roll call being demanded, the vote resulted in the negative, and the motion was lost.

The question then recurred upon the motion of Mr. Martin, and roll call being demanded, the vote resulted in the affirmative, motion prevailed and the chair appointed members of said special committee, Messrs. Curry, Spies and Hughes.

Bills on their third reading being in order, report of the judiciary committee was read recommending passage with amendments of C. B. No. 21, An act in relation to corporations, with reference thereto.

Upon motion of Mr. Fincial the report was adopted.

Upon motion of Mr. Fincial amend-

ments embraced in the committee report, to wit, the striking out of sections 1, 15 and 16 were adopted.

Upon motion of Mr. Fincial the bill as amended was read a third time by title preparatory to its passage.

Mr. Fincial then moved that the bill be amended by passing, and roll call being demanded the vote resulted in the affirmative and C. B. No. 21 as amended duly passed.

Report of judiciary committee was read recommending the passage of C. B. No. 61, An act relating to executions, and Mr. Fincial moved that the report be adopted, and roll call being demanded the vote resulted in the affirmative and motion prevailed.

Upon motion of Mr. Duncan, C. B. No. 61, An act relating to executions, was read a third time by title preparatory to its passage.

Mr. Fincial then moved that said bill do pass, and roll call being demanded the vote resulted in a tie and the bill failed to pass.

Report of the committee on mines and mining was read recommending the passage of C. B. No. 41, An act to amend the section of mines and mining property.

Upon motion of Mr. Archuleta the bill was adopted.

Upon motion of Mr. Fincial the bill was read a third time by title preparatory to its passage.

Mr. Archuleta moved that the bill do pass, and roll call being demanded the vote resulted in the affirmative and C. B. No. 41 duly passed.

Report of judiciary committee recommending to amend section 4 of chapter 45 of the 29th legislative assembly entitled, An act relative to the killing of animals for meat.

Upon motion of Mr. Spies report was adopted.

Upon motion of Mr. Archuleta the bill was read a third time in full preparatory to its passage.

Mr. Duncan moved that the bill do pass, and roll call being demanded the vote resulted in the affirmative and C. B. No. 49 duly passed, and roll call being demanded the vote resulted in the affirmative and C. B. No. 49 duly passed.

Mr. Curry moved that the vote by which C. B. No. 61, An act relating to executions, failed to pass be reconsidered. Roll call being demanded the vote resulted in the affirmative and motion prevailed.

Mr. Fall then moved that C. B. No. 61 do pass, and roll call being demanded the vote resulted in the affirmative and C. B. No. 61, An act relating to executions, duly passed.

Report of judiciary committee was read recommending passage of C. B. No. 26, An act relative to the recognizances, and Mr. Duncan moved that the report be adopted, and roll call being demanded the vote resulted in the affirmative and C. B. No. 26 duly passed.

Business on the president's table being in order, H. B. No. 38, An act to amend the license law, was read a third time by title. Upon motion of Mr. Chavez the rules were suspended and the bill read a second time in full and referred to the committee on finance. H. B. No. 88, An act in relation to mining claims, was read a third time by title. Upon motion of Mr. Duncan rules were suspended and the bill read a second time by title and referred to the committee on public lands. H. B. No. 26, An act to amend the law referring to the jurisdiction of justices of the peace in habeas corpus cases, was read a third time by title. Upon motion of Mr. Duncan rules were suspended and the bill read a second time by title and referred to the committee on judiciary. H. B. No. 55, An act to govern the issuing of licenses for the sale of intoxicants in incorporated cities, towns or villages in the territory of New Mexico, was read the first time by title. Upon motion of Mr. Duncan rules were suspended and the bill read a second time by title and referred to the committee on finance. H. B. No. 97, An act regarding the irrigation of Pecos No. 3, in the county of Mora, was read the first time by title. Upon motion of Mr. Duncan rules were suspended and the bill read a second time by title and referred to the committee on finance. H. B. No. 111, An act for the protection of game and fish, was read the first time by title. Upon motion of Mr. Duncan rules were suspended and the bill read a second time by title and referred to the committee on territorial affairs. H. B. No. 110, An act to provide for the payment of licensees by persons owning or controlling nickel in the slot machines, was read the first time by title. Upon motion of Mr. Duncan rules were suspended and the bill read a second time by title and referred to the committee on finance. H. B. No. 4, requesting congress to take steps to confine the Navajo Indians within the limits of their reservation, was read the first time by title. Upon motion of Mr. Fincial rules were suspended and the bill read a second time by title. Upon motion of Mr. Hughes, in was then referred to the committee on territorial affairs.

H. B. No. 51, An act derogative to several sections of chapter 56 of the laws of New Mexico of 1893, was read the first time by title.

Upon motion of Mr. Duncan, rules were suspended and the bill read a second time by title and referred to the committee on judiciary.

H. B. No. 93, An act providing for the proper indexing of conveyances, was read the first time by title.

Upon motion of Mr. Duncan, rules were suspended and the bill read a second time by title and referred to the committee on printing.

H. B. No. 103, An act referring to bridges and ditches, was read the first time by title.

Upon motion of Mr. Duncan, rules were suspended and the bill read a second time by title and referred to the committee on irrigation.

The president laid before the council a communication from the secretary of the territory, enclosing letters from D. R. Francis, secretary of the interior, and Senator C. A. Davis, chairman of the senate committee on territories, with reference to the Avery or Knox bill, stating that the clauses governing militia warrant debt was stricken out before said bill passed the house of representatives.

On motion of Mr. Chavez, the communication was received and laid upon the table.

C. B. No. 76, An act amending section 2368 of the Compiled Laws, returned from the house of representatives with an amendment, was taken from the president's table and amendment read.

Mr. Fincial moved that the council concur in the amendment adopted by the house, which motion prevailed.

The president announced having signed H. B. No. 83, An act to prevent the pollution and befouling of streams, springs, lakes, etc., and to provide a punishment therefor; also council substitute for H. B. No. 29, An act relating to evidence and qualifications of witnesses in the District court, the same being properly attested by the chief clerk.

Under the head of unfinished business, C. B. No. 11, An act to simplify the procedure in civil cases, was taken up for consideration.

Mr. Fincial moved that the same be made a special order for Monday morning, March 1, 1897, immediately after reading the journal and the motion prevailed.

## The House.

## FRIDAY MORNING.

The house was called to order at 10 a. m. with the speaker in the chair, and all members present.

Mr. Luna moved that the reading of the journal be dispensed with and the same stand approved. The motion prevailed.

Mr. Luna moved and asked unanimous consent that C. B. No. 79, An act providing for appeals from the Supreme court by the territory or any county, and providing for the expenses thereof, be read the third time by title preparatory to its passage. There being no objection, unanimous consent was granted.

Mr. Luna moved that C. B. No. 79 do now pass. The roll call was ordered with the following result: Ayes, 20; nays, 4. Whereupon the chair stated that C. B. No. 79 having received the majority votes of this house declared the same passed.

Upon motion of Mr. Senn the house resolved itself into a committee of the whole for the consideration of H. B. No. 56, An act to amend an act amending section 935 of the Revised Statutes of New Mexico. The chair called Mr. Bateman to preside. After the committee of the whole house had arisen the chair called the house to order and Mr. Bateman, chairman of the committee of the whole house, reported with the recommendation that it be passed.

Mr. Bateman moved that H. B. No. 96 do now pass. The roll call was ordered with the following result: Ayes, 19; nays, 5. Whereupon the chair stated that H. B. No. 96 having received the majority votes of this house declared the same passed.

Mr. Lujan by unanimous consent introduced H. B. No. 121, An act with reference to wells with water power. By unanimous consent was considered read first and second time by title, ordered translated, printed and referred to committee on labor. On motion of Mr. Lujan H. B. No. 121 was made the special order for Tuesday at 10 a. m.

On motion of Mr. Luna the house took a recess until this afternoon at 2 o'clock.

## FRIDAY AFTERNOON.

The house was called to order at 2 p. m. with the speaker in the chair. A quorum being present the house proceeded to business.

The chair announced that council substitutes for C. B. No. 24 and 29, Acts to encourage beet sugar factories, woolen mills and smelters, was made the special order for this afternoon. The clerk stated that the bill was not in his hands. Mr. Bateman informed the house that council substitute for C. B. No. 24 and 29 was in his room, having been referred to him as chairman of the committee on finance.

Mr. Senn moved that the chairman of the committee on finance, Mr. Bateman, be requested to bring council substitutes for C. B. No. 24 and 29 to this house immediately for the consideration of the same. The motion was carried.

Mr. Luna asked unanimous consent for the consideration of C. B. No. 14, An act to provide for the election of county judges, constables and school directors in the territory of New Mexico, and that he be allowed by unanimous consent to make a report on the same. Unanimous consent was given. The report was made with the recommendation that it be not passed, but that an accompanying message be sent to the governor.

Mr. J. N. Jaquez member of special committee disagreeing.

Mr. Malinas Martinez moved that the majority report of the committee be adopted. Mr. Smith asked to have substitute for C. B. No. 14 read in full for information. Mr. Martinez withdrew his motion in order to have bill read as requested by Mr. Smith.

The chair stated that the majority report of the committee was adopted and a substitute for C. B. No. 14 was adopted. Mr. Jaramillo moved in order not to have any doubt as to the tabling of C. B. No. 14, moved that C. B. No. 14 be put indefinitely. Roll call was ordered with the following result: Ayes, 13; nays, 4.

Whereupon the chair stated that the motion having received the majority of the votes of this house to postpone C. B. No. 14 indefinitely, declared the motion as having prevailed. Mr. Luna moved that house substitute for C. B. No. 14 be read the third time by title preparatory to its passage. The motion was carried. Mr. Luna moved that house substitute for C. B. No. 14 do now pass, and roll call being demanded the motion prevailed. On the proposition of shall the main question be now put, the motion prevailed. Roll call was ordered on the passage of house substitute for C. B. No. 14, with the following result: Ayes, 15; nays, 9.

Whereupon the chair stated that house substitute for C. B. No. 14 having received the majority votes of this house declared the same passed.

Mr. Bateman stated that by direction of this house, he delivered council substitute for C. B. No. 24 and 29 without any recommendation as to the committee voted no meeting. Mr. Senn moved to go into a committee of the whole for the consideration of council substitute for C. B. No. 24 and 29. Mr. Cristman moved to amend the motion of Mr. Senn by moving that the bill be read the third time preparatory to its passage.

A message from the council was announced stating that the council agreed to the concurrence of this honorable body in the passage of the following council bills: C. B. No. 61, An act relating

to executions. C. B. No. 41, An act for the protection of mines and mining properties. C. B. No. 19, An act to amend section 4 of chapter 45 of the twenty-ninth legislative assembly, entitled An act in relation to the killing of animals for meat. C. B. 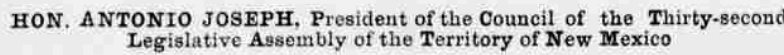
