WASHINGTON NEWS BUDGET

The Arbitration Treaty Referred Back to Committee on Foreign Relations on Motion of Senator Davis.

TO BE CONSIDERED ON WEDNESDAY

President McKinley Spends a Busy Day in Receiving Visitors and Discussing Matters Relative to Important Foreign Appointments.

Washington, March 8.—The rush toward the White house was unabated today. Callers came with the intention of placing questions, offices and other matters before the president. The president was at his desk at 9 o'clock. John Hay, who is expected to be nominated ambassador to the court of St. James, had a brief talk with the president, and then gave way to Senator Wolcott, who was with the president 15 minutes. Secretary Sherman called at 10:40 a. m., passing into the cabinet room, where the president joined him. It is understood that the call related to important foreign appointments. The conference between the president and Secretary Sherman, occupied a full hour. Those best informed say that it related mainly to the initial work of the state department.

Senator Kyle, of South Dakota, recently elected as a Populist, was among those who called to confer with the president.

The senate adjourned today until Wednesday. Most of the session was spent in executive session, only routine business occupying half an hour of the open session.

ABITRATION TREATY.

In an executive session of the senate today, Senator Davis, chairman of the foreign relations committee, offered a resolution referring back to the committee the treaty on arbitration, and it was agreed to. At the close of the session of congress all pending amendments offered in the senate proposed by the committee failed, and they will have to be reordere. The resolution led to considerable discussion.

As soon as Senator Davis offered his motion to refer the treaty back to the committee, Senator Morgan raised a point that this could not be done. There was considerable discussion of the parliamentary status of the treaty. After it was explained the resolution was adopted without division. A meeting of the foreign relations committee has been called for Wednesday, when the treaty will be considered. Opponents of the treaty say there will be a great deal of discussion before the treaty can pass.

WELL DESERVED PROMOTION.

Benjamin Franklin Peters, of Harrisburg, Pa., was today appointed chief clerk of the navy department vice Benjamin M. Peters, resigned. Peters was appointed to one of the lowest clerkships in the navy department 15 years ago. Of late he has been holding the position of appointment clerk.

BUSY DAY FOR OAKS.

Secretary Day had an exceedingly busy day receiving senators and members of the house and other high government officials. He saw all who called. Attorney General McKenna's time was entirely taken up by callers.

LEGISLATIVE GOSSIP.

Philadelphia, March 8.—Captain John D. Hart was convicted of filibustering today and was refused a new trial by Judge Butler and sentenced to two years imprisonment and a fine of \$500 and costs \$5,000. Hart was taken to prison immediately.

GENERAL STRIKE PROBABLE

A Dispute Between Labor Organizations Causes a Series of Strikes Which Will Probably Involve 10,000 Men.

New York, March 8.—The first of a series of strikes that will probably involve 10,000 mechanics of the building trades was ordered by a committee of the board of waiting delegates as the New Columbia college builders. Over 500 workmen quit, and the committee proceeded to other large buildings to order strikes. It was said that every large structure in the course of construction in this city would "be struck" before the day ends. The strike is the outgrowth of a dispute between the labor organizations as to which should control work on the elevators.

Plasterers on a Strike.

Chicago, March 8.—About 2,000 plasterers and hod carriers struck this morning, and work on practically every building in course of construction in the city, has been brought to a stand still. Before noon several contractors signified a willingness to agree to the terms of the strikers.

A special meeting of masons and builders this afternoon adopted resolutions setting aside the agreement between the Bricklayers union and association on the subject of employing non-union labor. It is feared when the arbitration board goes out of office, on the first of next month, a general strike of bricklayers will be declared.

AMICABLE ADJUSTMENT.

The Reply of Greece to the Powers Will Be in a Conciliatory Tone and Will Offer Troops to Restore Order.

London, March 8.—The Stock exchange opened distinctly buoyant, on the general opinion that the Cretan question will be peacefully settled. It is reiterated here that a complete agreement exists between the powers as to effective measures to be immediately taken against Greece, in the event of her declining to comply with the demands of the powers in the withdrawal of Greek troops from Crete, and the recall of the Greek fleet from Cretan waters. The Princess of Wales feels great anxiety regarding the position of her brother, King George.

It is learned upon good authority that the Greek reply to the identical notes of the powers will be in a conciliatory tone, fully recognizing the high aims of the powers. It will offer to withdraw the Greek fleet from Cretan waters. While pointing out that it is impossible to withdraw Greek troops from Crete, it will offer to place the troops under control of the powers to restore order. Finally the reply will suggest that Creteans be allowed to choose their own government.

Later.—The reply of Greece to the identical notes of the powers, delivered at Athens on Tuesday, insisting upon withdrawal of Greek troops from Crete, and of the Greek fleet from Cretan waters, was received here at noon. It conforms to the forecast cabled exclusively to the Associated Press.

A cabinet council was immediately held, after which the Marquis of Salisbury went to Windsor to consult the queen. There was great animation in the foreign office. Nearly every ambassador called during the day.

The reply of Greece is regarded in official circles here as of the most favorable nature. It is believed that the crisis will be ended as the Greek note at least furnishes a basis on which a compromise satisfactory to all, can be speedily reached.

Mrs. Beecher Dead.

Stamford, Conn., March 8.—Mrs. Henry Ward Beecher died today upon the tenth anniversary of the death of her famous husband. She was 85 years of age. Mrs. Beecher has been sinking since Saturday noon, and during 24 hours preceding her demise she was unconscious.

LEGISLATIVE GOSSIP.

Militia Warrant Schemers' Bills Passed—Good Work Done Today.

Pity the poor, old, needy and sorrowful "militia warrant owners."

What's the matter with Colonel J. Frank Chaves as a legislator. He's all right.

The "militia warrants" are on deck again. Like a bad penny, you cannot lose them.

Pity the poor blind, who see nothing but 50 year 4 per cent bonds for a couple of million dollars of "militia warrants."

The time has come, the walrus said, to talk of other things. Meaning thereby \$2,000,000 worth of fraudulent militia warrants.

The New Mexican is under obligations to Chief Clerk Holt of the council and Chief Clerk Reid of the house. These two gentlemen fill their respective positions with fidelity, unvarying courtesy and ability.

These poor, down trodden, hard working laboring men, the "militia warrant" owners, are supplicating legislative help upon headed knees and in piteous accents, but nevertheless with great persistency and much shrewdness. Poor devils, they must be awfully hard up.

The occupancy of the president's chair by Temporary Chairman Martin and his manner of conducting business in the council, is so acceptable, that he is invariably re-elected during President Joseph's absence to preside. He was again in the chair this morning.

The council this morning passed council bill No. 88, An act providing that cities and towns of New Mexico may have many lands, and house bill No. 79, An act in relation to incorporated towns and cities. The conference committee of both houses, appointed to formulate a substitute for council bills No. 9 and 47, in relation to fees and salaries of district clerks and county officers, by the chairman, Mr. Curry, introduced council bill No. 120, as the report of the committee.

A RICH DISCOVERY.

Castle Rock Near Golden Proves to Be Full of Gold—Southern Santa Fe County Busting with Activity.

Cerrillos, N. M., March 8.—On Saturday the Fitzgerald mill at Golden was sold by the sheriff to satisfy an execution held by H. G. Coors, of Las Vegas, for \$479. The property was bid in by Mr. Coors who immediately re-sold it to Bryden & Rogers who have been operating it under a lease for some time. The mill is now working under contract on ore from the Carley & Aranda strike.

The Gold Standard mine, near Golden, has attracted considerable attention during the past week on account of the increased richness of the ore taken from the main shaft, at a depth of 30 feet. Crystal quartz with nuggets of gold sticking in it which will run thousands of dollars to the ton compose the greater part of the pay streak. The vein continues to widen with depth and has the appearance of being permanent. Nothing to compare with the ore now being taken from this mine has ever been seen in this part of the country, and seldom seen any where else. A surprising discovery was made last week within about 2,500 feet of the discovery shaft of this mine. A great ledge of rock known as Castle Rock, crops out for 100 feet, at least 30 feet wide, and fully 40 feet high, looming up in the distance far above the surrounding country. Very little attention has been paid to it until one day last week a miner working for Carley & Aranda, broke a piece from this ledge, tested it by panning and found to his surprise that it was rich in gold. If this immense ledge should prove to be the outcrop of the mother vein of that part of the Golden and San Pedro section, New Mexico will have a second Cripple Creek. It will be thoroughly investigated at once.

The Monte Cristo Mining company at Golden has completed its test by sinking a placer gravel on its extensive grounds near town and are cleaning up today. We trust the result will be satisfactory as the future operations of this company depend on it.

The C. & C. company, at San Pedro, started up its new gasoline hoisting engine yesterday and it works like a charm.

It is reported that the placer miners have made a new discovery of pay gravel near San Pedro and are doing well, extracting the gold with small dry washers. Clarence Muller, a native of New York state, died yesterday morning of typhoid fever, after a three days' illness, at the residence of Col. J. S. Hatcherson at Golden.

Hon. James Lucas, of Cerrillos, made a trip to the Golden camp on mining business Tuesday last.

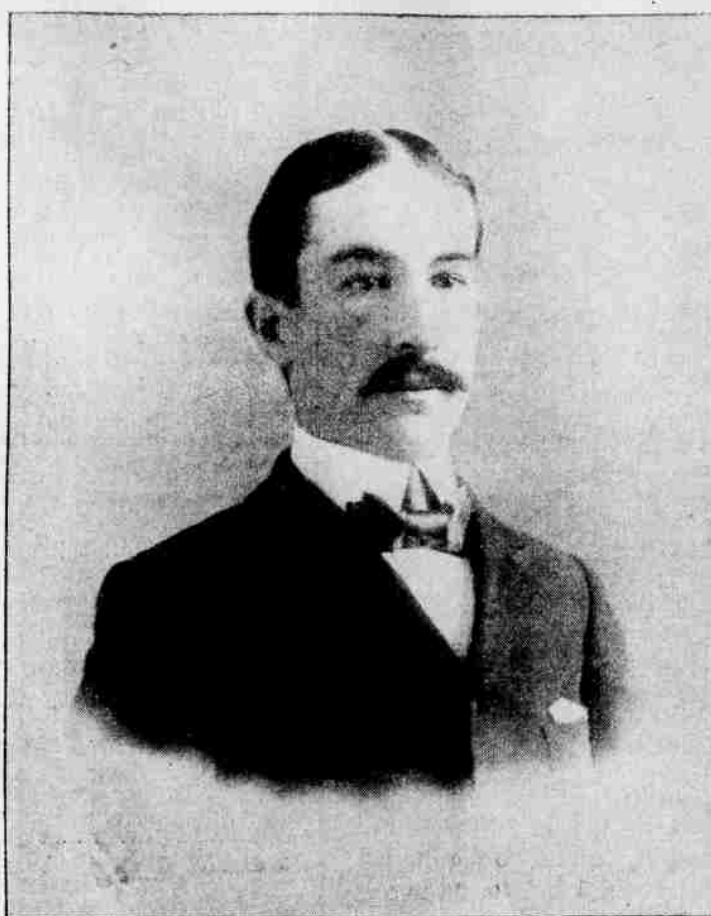

is the son of the late Hon. Tranquillo Luna, was born in Los Lunas, N. M., on June 16, 1870.

As a boy he was given an excellent education, attending the Las Vegas Jesuit college and afterwards going to Georgetown college in the District of Columbia. Coming from an illustrious and active family, his father having represented New Mexico as a delegate in the Forty-seventh and Forty-eighth sessions of congress, Mr. Luna came into official life while yet quite young. He entered upon his political career as interpreter for the Second judicial district of New Mexico; during the Twenty-ninth legislative assembly he was chief clerk of the council. In the years of 1893-94 he filled the positions of county and probate clerk of Valencia county, and in 1894 was elected sheriff of that county, holding the office for two years, making an excellent and enviable record in these positions. In last November he was elected a member of the house of representatives of the present legislature. He is a powerful and fluent public speaker and an aggressive and successful politician. His county, Valencia, is the soundest Republican county in the territory. Politically Mr. Luna is a Republican. Since attaining his majority he has taken

a very active part in the politics of the territory, and as a recognition of his services he was chosen as the only delegate from New Mexico to represent the Republican league of the territory at the National convention of Republican league clubs held in Nashville, Tenn., but was denied the pleasure of attending the convention by illness in the family. In the legislature, by his attention, knowledge of parliamentary law, education and bright mentality he has risen to the rank of a leader on the Republican side of the house.

Mr. Luna was married to Miss Berenice Keyes, daughter of Maj. A. S. B. Keyes, of the United States army, on July 31, 1895, and his home life has proven most happy.

The son of a distinguished family, which for several generations has furnished able men and acknowledged leaders in territorial affairs, Mr. Luna set out upon a career of great promise, with every advantage of fortune and education. He has held many responsible positions for a young man, and has discharged every trust reposed in him with that high degree of honor and fidelity characteristic of the members of his family. Mr. Luna has undoubtedly a brilliant career before him.

GOV. THORNTON HOME.

He Talks of the Objects and Results of His Visit to the Capital.

Governor Thornton returned from his trip to Washington last night and was seen at his office by a New Mexican representative today. He was asked regarding his trip, and in reply said:

"I saw the president and attorney-general in regard to the Borrego cases, and Mr. Cleveland rendered his decision on the petition for executive clemency. He refused to further interfere, holding first, that he had no jurisdiction in the case; and second, that from the merits of the case the men deserved hanging. He had been led to believe that it was a United States case, and was informed that no harm would be done by a stay of execution for a few days, and for that reason the reprieve was granted, that the case might be examined.

"Inaugural day was beautiful, all that could have been asked, and the ceremonies were upon a grand scale. There seemed to be entire good feeling on the part of everybody, and the new administration assumes charge under very favorable auspices."

Lieut. V. E. Stottler Ordered Here as Indian Agent.

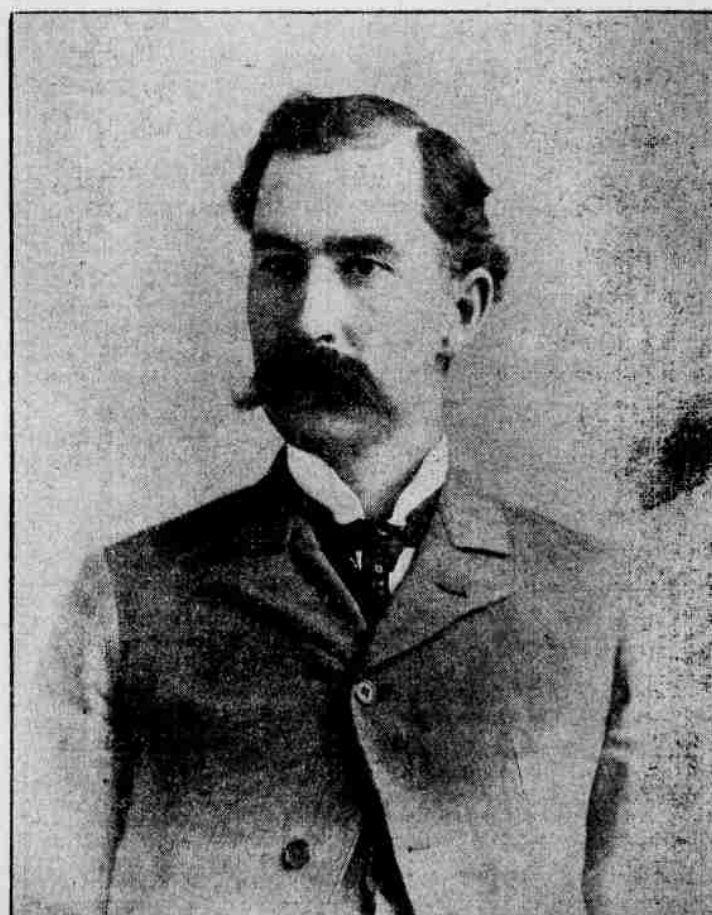

is a native of Frankfort, Ky., born November 26, 1861. He was educated in the public schools of his native city, and upon attaining man's estate engaged in farming, real estate and the cattle business. In 1880 he commenced reading law at Frankfort, and in due time was admitted to the bar. He came to New Mexico in 1887 and settled at Las Cruces, where he engaged in the practice of his profession. He has succeeded in building up a large and lucrative practice, besides taking a prominent part in the public affairs of the territory. Mr. Fall has always been an ardent Democrat, and upon the ticket of this party, was a member of the lower house of the territorial legislature in the 1890-1891 session. In 1892 he was elected a member of the council, and in this capacity pleased his constituents so well that he was returned as a member of this body for the session of 1896-1897. A few days since he was confirmed as solicitor-general for the territory, a position for which is eminently qualified.

Mr. Fall was appointed associate justice of the supreme court in 1893 by President Cleveland, and served in this position until March, 1895, when he resigned.

Mr. Fall is a very able lawyer, and is retained as counsel for some of the largest corporations in New Mexico. He is a man of very decided opinions, but on the other hand also a very competent, energetic and experienced legislator. He is a good speaker and well versed in public affairs.

Although a resident of New Mexico but nine years, he has by his strong personality made for himself a very prominent place not only in his party, but also in public affairs generally. The old adage, that "nothing succeeds like success," is very fully illustrated in his public career. On May 7, 1888, Judge Fall was married to Miss Emma Morgan at Readyville, Tenn. Four children have blessed their union, all of them now of school age and attending school in northeastern Texas.
