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## MANY RIOTS IN RUSSIA

Outbreaks Follow the Celebrations in Honor of People's Victory

## HUNDREDS ARE KILLED

In Every Section of the Empire Troops Clash With People--Socialists Are Active.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 1.—A light fall of snow covered the city during the night but this morning a drizzling rain helped to dampen the ardor of the crowds, already exhausted by the demonstrations of yesterday. The re-appearance of patrols of horse and foot soldiers also exercised a restraining influence. Many railroad employees are ready to return to work and those in favor of continuing the struggle have difficulty in holding the majority. The students and the Social Democratic leaders, who continue to declare that only a democratic republic will suffice, are using every means in their power to keep up the enthusiasm and drive the people into an armed collision with the troops. A score or more big meetings are announced for today.

The news from the provinces shows that the whole empire was plunged into great excitement yesterday. Clashes and sanguinary encounters occurred in many places. In some towns the mobs obtained control and forced the release of political prisoners. The Cossacks were turned loose and beat back the crowds at Kazan, Kishineff, Kieff and other places.

**THIRTY-SEVEN KILLED.**  
Odessa, Nov. 1.—Conflicts between Cossacks and students continue. During fighting between the roughs and Jews in Dalnitskay Street last night, thirty-seven persons were killed and eighty-one seriously wounded.

**BODIES ARE REMOVED.**  
Kieff, Nov. 1.—The bodies of five persons killed and forty-five wounded were removed from the town hall today. The hall was utilized as a hospital and morgue during the riots.

**COSSACKS SHOOT TO KILL.**  
Minsk, Nov. 1.—Crowds of people in an attempt to storm the prison here yesterday were beaten off by the Cossacks, who fired several volleys at the mob. Many persons were killed and more beaten with whips.

**IGNORE MANIFESTO.**  
Warsaw, Nov. 1.—The disorders continue throughout this vicinity. Conflicts between the populace and the soldiers are frequent. The authorities are charged with ignoring the Imperial manifesto and general depression prevails everywhere.

**HUNDREDS ARE SLAIN.**  
London, Nov. 1.—A dispatch to a news agency from Odessa says mobs of rioters have broken loose in various parts of the city and have been in conflict with the students, resulting in much blood being shed. It is estimated that fully a hundred persons have been killed. There was a lull in the fighting about 3 o'clock, but the people are panic stricken, fearing another eruption.

**JEWISH QUARTERS SACKED.**  
Kieff, Nov. 1.—The populace seized the town hall yesterday and revolutionary speeches were being delivered to crowds from the balcony when the Cossacks appeared. Some of the people inside the building were armed and a regular engagement ensued, resulting in many being killed and wounded on both sides. The Cossacks finally routed the crowd and captured the building. After dark, the Jewish quarters were sacked.

**BUILDING IS BURNED.**  
Tver, Nov. 1.—During the rioting here yesterday the governor and the mayor, with the aid of city employees barricaded themselves inside the city hall to prevent the progress of the mob. The dragons were summoned but they were beaten off by the mob, which set fire to the building. The troops eventually obtained the upper hand.

## ALBUQUERQUE MAY HAVE A NEW SANITARIUM

A sanitarium for the treatment of lung and throat diseases may be established at Albuquerque. It will be modeled after Santa Fe's tent city at Summit. Dr. A. W. Field, of Aurora, Illinois, is back of the enterprise. He says if a suitable site can be secured an open air sanitarium will be built. Albuquerque physicians are co-operating with Dr. Field.

## NEW SANTA FE YARDMASTER ARRIVES AT ALBUQUERQUE.

W. B. Johnson, the new Santa Fe yardmaster at Albuquerque has arrived in the Duke City from Denver. It took charge of his office today. Mr. Johnson, is a railroad man of vast experience, having been connected with the Wabash and Pennsylvania system in Chicago for a number of years. He was an assistant yardmaster for the Santa Fe at Denver.

## BRITISH SHIPS HAVE ARRIVED

English Squadron in Command of Prince Louis at Annapolis

## OFFICERS WELCOMED

Admiral "Bob" Evans Heads American Reception Committee--Entertain Elaborately.

Annapolis, Md., Nov. 1.—The British fleet under command of Prince Louis of Battenberg, who bears a special message from the monarch of the British Empire to the President of the United States, arrived off of Annapolis today. As the prince set foot on American soil he was greeted with all honor due his rank by Admiral Sand's, superintendent of the naval academy, and Governor Warfield, of Maryland.

**Arrival of Squadron.**  
The guns of the American squadron boomed a salute. Every ship of Rear Admiral Evans' squadron was gallily dressed and the rigging manned by Jack Tars in their best duds, when the British cruiser squadron steamed into the harbor today. It was a magnificent spectacle which warmed the heart of every seadog and tuned the enthusiasm of the people of Annapolis to the highest pitch. First came the armored cruiser Drake, 14,100 tons, the Prince's flagship, followed in single line by the Bedford, the Cornwall, the Barwick, the Essex and the Cumberland, each of 9,800 tons. The rules of naval etiquette were closely adhered to in the greeting passed between the two squadrons and the strictness with which every detail of the formalities was observed made the reception of the visitors highly impressive.

After the British squadron had reached its anchorage, the steam launch of the American flagship, the Maine, took Rear Admiral Evans and the officers of his staff to the Drake.

**Visit Other Ships.**  
Later in the day Admiral Evans exchanged visits with the commanding officers of the other ships of the British squadron and the steam launches of the battleships and cruisers were kept busy all day carrying officers in dress uniforms from one ship to the other. There will be no further entertainment of an official character today, excepting a formal return of the visit of Rear Admiral Evans by the commander of the British squadron.

The staff of Prince Louis consists of Flag Captain Mark E. F. Kerr, member of the fourth and fifth classes of the Victorian Order; Flag Lieutenant Gerald Sowerby; Secretary Edward P. Shearne, and Engineer Commander William F. Pamphlett.

**Elaborate Program.**  
The program for the entertainment of the visiting fleet is quite elaborate and includes many interesting social and spectacular functions. Tomorrow Rear Admiral Evans will entertain Prince Louis and the British officers at dinner on board the Maine. On Friday Prince Louis and his officers will go to Washington for a short official visit. At three o'clock on Saturday afternoon President Roosevelt will give a reception at the White House in honor of the visitors, which will be followed by a state dinner in the evening. While the prince and his staff are in Washington, the American officers in this city will do their utmost to entertain the British visitors. There will be a number of dinners, receptions and other entertainments, including a football game between cadet teams.

Prince Louis will return to Annapolis on the night of the fourth, or on the following day and on Monday he and his officers will be entertained by Rear Admiral Sand's, superintendent of the Naval Academy. On the afternoon of Monday the American squadron under the command of Rear Admiral Evans will start for New York, to be there ready to receive the British squadron, upon its arrival on the ninth.

## VOTING MACHINES ARE EASILY MANIPULATED.

San Francisco, Nov. 1.—A voting machine to be used at the coming municipal election on November 7, was given a test yesterday before committees representing the Fusionists. A Linotype operator on a newspaper showed that by placing a small rubber band in a certain place near the name for the fusion mayor the machine would not register for the mayor.

## MILLIONAIRE COAL MAN DIES IN CHICAGO HOSPITAL.

Chicago, Illinois, November 1.—Charles J. Devlin, millionaire coal operator of Topeka died at Elizabeth hospital in this city today as result of a second attack of paralysis. He suffered his first stroke last summer at Topeka and this fact led to a failure of his vast interests.

## LYNCH NEGRO AFTER DRAMA

Brainebridge, Ga., Mob, Fired by "The Clansman" Avenges Sheriff's Death.

## MAKES MIDNIGHT RAID

Takes Colored Prisoner From Jail to Bridge and Leave Body Hanging to Beam.

Bainbridge, Ga., Nov. 1.—Wrought up to a high pitch of anger against negroes by the presentation of Thomas A. Dixon's play, "The Clansman," a mob of 300 men stormed the jail at midnight, took out Gus Goodman, a negro who had fatally shot Sheriff Stegall, and lynched him. The lynchings were not masked.

The terrified captive was dragged through the streets to the Flint River bridge in the suburbs and suspended to a beam, where the body remained hanging all day, an object of grim curiosity to hundreds.

Goodman yesterday afternoon shot and killed a negro woman, and when Sheriff Stegall attempted to arrest him, wounded that official. Another officer arrested the negro. A number of men held a meeting and determined to lynch the negro if the physicians found the sheriff's wound would be fatal.

A mob formed, and when at midnight the doctors declared Stegall would die, it moved on the jail at once, and thirty minutes later the negro was lynched. The sheriff died as the negro was suspended.

The feeling against negroes, never kindly, has been embittered by the deeds of negroes during the period of reconstruction have been revived, and the whites have been wrought up to a high tension.

## FINISH THEIR WORK.

Morton Committee Makes Sensational Discoveries in Equitable Life Investigation.

New York, Nov. 1.—The expert accountants employed last June by President Morton, of the Equitable Life have completed their work and turned in their report. The findings are said to have surprised even those who expected discoveries not touched upon by the investigating committees. The report will not be made public until after the next meeting of the directors.

## TEACHERS ARE SCARCE.

Hard Matter to Find Sufficient Number to Fill the Vacancies in the Territory.

There is a decided scarcity of applications for positions as teachers in the public schools of New Mexico at present, which makes the securing of competent instructors no easy matter. The fact that the laws of New Mexico in regard to teaching require those desiring certificates to pass an examination, in which they must make a general average of 90 per cent, deters a great many that might otherwise make application, while low salaries also keep many away. Speaking of the matter Professor Hiram Hadley, superintendent of public instruction for the Territory of New Mexico says: "We find it no easy matter to secure competent material of which to make instructors for our public schools. Daily I receive communications from different cities throughout the Territory informing me that they are in need of teachers. While there are still a fair number of applicants for the positions that we have open from time to time, I find that they, upon learning the rather low salary as fixed by law in this Territory for the remuneration of school teachers, decide that they do not want to come, unless, perhaps, they be someone who wishes to come here for the benefit of his or her health, but as the Territorial law requires that each applicant shall file with the board by which he is employed, a certificate from an official physician stating that he is free from tuberculosis, this keeps this class of teachers from coming here.

"Salaries are low, too. In some parts they are very low. In many of the country schools and in the grades of the city schools, the salary is about fifty dollars a month."

Speaking further of the matter, Mr. Hadley said that at present there were several good opportunities open for teachers that could speak both the Spanish and English languages.

## CONTEST GROWS WARM

Fight for Mayoralty Becomes Bitter in New York City--Two Noon-day Riots.

New York, Nov. 1.—Two campaign incidents which resulted in the tearing down of two anti-Hearst banners and caused much excitement among thousands of people, occurred in two different sections of the city today, during the noon hour.

The banners were similar to those ordered down by Mayor McClellan last night, red flags supported by a hand labeled Hearst and an American flag with the supporting hand marked McClellan and under the two the query "Under Which Flag."

In both cases the American flag was reverently treated, while the red flag was trampled into the ground. Mayor McClellan today expressed disapproval of the use of the red flag and also directed Tammany speakers that they must not be guilty of personal abuse of any of the opposing candidates.

Charles F. Murphy, leader of Tammany Hall, said today that Tammany was not responsible for the flags. "We have nothing to do with them," said Mr. Murphy. "These flags were put up by business men."

## FIREMEN GIVE SMOKER.

Hallowe'en Festival One of the Most Enjoyable Affairs Ever Held by the Department.

The Santa Fe Fire Department last night entertained invited guests with one of the most enjoyable smokers ever given by the Department, the occasion being the Silver Anniversary of the Fire Department, in commemoration of the twenty-fifth year of its existence.

The guests assembled at Firemen's Hall, where they were welcomed by the reception committee, after which they proceeded to the large banquet room of the Claire Hotel, which was tastefully decorated for the occasion, firemen's paraphernalia being the chief objects used in the decorative scheme.

After all the guests had assembled Chief Frank Owen, toastmaster of the occasion, arose and proposed the toast, "President Roosevelt." After that Judge A. L. Morrison arose and responded to a toast with a short but interesting speech on "Fire Departments, Old and New." "Commercial Value of Fire Departments to Cities" was responded by O. A. Larrazolo, of Las Vegas. "The City of Santa Fe" was next offered, to which Mayor A. R. Gibson responded. "The Moral Obligation of a Community to the Volunteer Firemen" was then discussed, after which the guests adjourned to the dining room, where Caterer Edward Ehle served a luncheon.

## FIRST INDIAN DIVORCE.

Pueblo Red Skin Wants an Absolute Separation From his Squaw. Action is Begun.

Luis Abeyta, of the Isleta Pueblo, has begun action in the Bernalillo district court at Albuquerque to secure an absolute divorce from his wife, also an Isletan. It is the first time in the history of the county that an Indian has sued for a legal separation from his wife. Attorney W. C. Heacock appears for the Indian, having the distinction of bringing the first action of the kind on record.

The institution of marriage, although missionaries have struggled long and earnestly to plant it among the pueblo people, has only recently been observed, and it is of sufficient rarity to make each marriage interesting. The action of the last legislature in requiring a uniform system of licenses served to make the Indians more careful and marriages by legal procedure are becoming frequent. There has always been, of course, the marriage formality of the tribe. But divorce is the latest institution of civilization to find its way into the Pueblos.

## HEAR REBATE CASE TODAY

Commerce Commission Begin Probe Into Private Car Lines

## SANTA FE SYSTEM HIT

Great Southwestern Road is an Offender According to the Testimony of Witness.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 1.—The inquiry into the operation of private refrigerator cars on the trans-continental railways was begun today by the Interstate commerce commission. The cases in which hearings are being held are directed by commission against the Santa Fe and the Southern Pacific railways, the Armour car lines, the Santa Fe Refrigerator Dispatch and American Refrigerator Transit Company.

The principal witness today was J. S. Leads, General Manager of the Santa Fe Refrigerator Dispatch, who gave startling testimony concerning rebates and declared his inability to break up the practice. "The cars operated by the Santa Fe Refrigerator Dispatch," said Leads, "are owned by the Santa Fe railway and are leased by the dispatch line."

## CAPTURES CONVICT.

District Clerk Romero Finds Romualdo Varela on His Casa Grande Ranch.

Romualdo Varela, an escaped convict from the territorial penitentiary was captured yesterday by Secundino Romero, district clerk at Las Vegas, at Mr. Romero's Casa Grande ranch. Varela made his get-away last June, while employed upon the Scenic Highway.

The capture of the escaped convict was most dramatic. Mr. Romero was leaving his ranch home early in the morning, when he found Varela standing at his door, armed with a Winchester. The plucky district clerk returned to his room and secured a gun. He then followed the convict, capturing him. He was turned over to the authorities.

The convict told his captor that his first impulse was to run, but that he hastily reflected that Romero was a crack shot and would promptly bring down his horse and then have him at his mercy. Accordingly he made up his mind to fight and believing Romero would come around the house from the back, had leveled his rifle and was expecting to shoot him dead the moment he appeared. The clerk's quickness and cleverness upset his calculations.

The capture of Varela is one of the most satisfactory things of the kind that has happened in a long time, as he was without question a dangerous man to be at liberty. He has served only one month of his penitentiary term.

## READY FOR TRANSFER.

National Fraternal Tuberculosis Hospital at Las Vegas to Be Turned Over to New Management.

F. H. Pierce of Las Vegas, who has just returned from an eastern trip, said yesterday that all arrangements for the transfer of the Fraternal Hospital at Las Vegas to the new management are completed. The big sanitarium will probably be turned over to Dr. H. A. Warner, the new head of the institution, about November 15.

The formal transfer of the property will be made at a business meeting of the directors. It is said in the east that Dr. Warner has secured the support of millions of fraternalists, who have agreed to contribute a small amount monthly to support the institution until it is placed upon a paying basis.

## ASKED FOR PARTICULARS.

Santa Fe Railway Wants Caledonian Fuel Company to File Bill in Its Rebate Case.

The Santa Fe Railway Company has petitioned the court to have the Caledonian Coal Company to file a bill of particulars in the \$400,000 damage suit brought by the company against the railroad for alleged discrimination in rates.

Attorney Neill B. Field, appearing before Judge Abbott, in chambers at Albuquerque, for the Caledonian Coal Company, resisted the granting of the petition on the ground that it is a case on the part of the railroad company to learn how the Caledonian company is going to try its case, and what grounds the company has for action.

## LEGAL BATTLE HAS OPENED

Title To Tract in Northern Taos County To Be Determined

## CITIZENS OF COSTILLA

Against United States Freehold Land and Immigration Company--Many Thousand Acres Involved.

The case of the Protective Association of the town of Costilla vs. the United States Freehold Land and Immigration Company had its first hearing this morning before Judge John R. McFie, of the First Judicial District Court. This case is one of the most important that has been up for trial in the district court for some time, inasmuch as the land involved in the suit amounts in all to almost 250,000 acres. The land in litigation is situated in the northern part of Taos County, in is a part of the Sangre de Cristo Land Grant.

## History of Grant.

In the year 1844, the Mexican authorities made a grant, containing 1,000,000 acres, to certain Mexican citizens, in the northern part of Taos County, which then included what is now part of southern Colorado, for colonization purposes. In 1860, the Congress of the United States, confirmed this grant made by the Mexican authorities, and the lands therein contained, were afterwards acquired by purchase by the U. S. Freehold Land and Immigration Company. Almost 250,000 acres of this grant are situated in what is now Taos County in this Territory and on this, the towns of Costilla, Questa and others are situated.

On December 2, 1880, a patent was issued by the land office at Washington, giving the United States Freehold Land and Immigration Company a clear title to this immense tract. Since then the land has been sold and divided, until now the above company only has in its possession about 250,000 acres, the amount in litigation in the present case. This is located entirely in New Mexico, being in Taos County, in the northern part of the Territory.

## Cause of Suit.

In the little town of Costilla live some 134 settlers who came to that part of the country ten or more years ago, settling upon part of this land grant, situated in and around the town they have since built up to its present size. They were a thrifty class of settlers, and for years they tilled the soil reclaiming the arid land from the desert wastes. The United States Freehold Land and Immigration Company, recognizing the fact that they were a thrifty lot, permitted them to dwell thereon, free from rents and taxations, allowing them the income they derived as fruits of their labor in return for cultivating the soil and building up the country. For a period of ten years they dwelt upon the land in undisputed possession. Then came a day when they felt that the land was theirs by right of possession, inasmuch as they had dwelt thereon for ten years and forthwith announced themselves as owners, under the laws of New Mexico in reference to the statutes of limitations.

## Ejectment the Action.

The United States Freehold Land and Immigration Company, claiming that the land was theirs by right of the grant made in 1844, and since confirmed by Congress, and claiming that they had paid taxes upon it since the patent had been issued them in 1880, denied the right of the Costilla settlers to claim this land and the present suit is the result. The Costilla settlers claim the land by settlement under the New Mexico statute of limitation and the United States Freehold Land and Immigration Company wishes them evicted. That is the case as it now stands.

## Much Legal Talent.

This morning at 9 o'clock the attorneys, that have been retained on each side, met in the First Judicial District Court in the opening battle of the struggle for these thousand of acres. Abbott & Abbott, of this city, assisted by Albert Smith, of Denver, Colorado, together with E. C. Van Delst, Manager of the Costilla Land and Investment Company, of Colorado Springs, are representing the U. S. Freehold Land and Immigration Company, while Charles A. Spies and O. A. Larrazolo, both of Las Vegas, are representing the 134 settlers of the town of Costilla, who are bringing the suit to determine the ownership and right of title to the 250,000 acres, in the name of the Protective Association of Costilla.

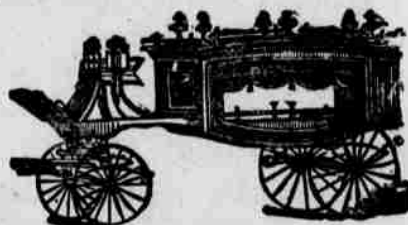

## MINES AND MINING.

### Valencia County.

Forty miles south of the pueblo of Zuni, in the western part of Valencia County, there is a deposit of salt which is not only of great geologic interest, but promises to prove of considerable economic importance. It is briefly described by N. H. Darton in the year-book of the United States Geological Survey, which is entitled "Contributions to Economic Geology, 1904."

The locality is 80 miles south of Gallup, on the main line of the Santa Fe Railway, and about the same distance west of Magdalena, on a branch of the same railroad system. This deposit has been a source of supply for the Indians and white men for several centuries, and of late the salt is hauled to ranches in a wide surrounding district. The present output averages only approximately 1,000 tons a year, valued at about \$2.50 a ton. A small colony at the locality collects the salt in a very crude manner.

Ordinarily, persons desiring a supply go to the place and help themselves. The deposits occur in a lake, which occupies a portion of the bottom of a deep impression in a plain of Cretaceous sandstone. This depression is about a mile in diameter, and has walls of sandstone, in part capped by lava, averaging about 150 feet in height. The lake is about 4,000 feet long, east and west, and about 3,000 feet wide, and is apparently shallow. The water contains about 26 per cent of salt, mostly chloride of sodium. The region is arid and the evaporation causes the crystallization of the salt, especially in the shallow waters.

A large amount of salt could be obtained by properly conducted solar evaporation of the lake water. By washing the salt with a small amount of the lake water the more soluble foreign salts are removed and almost pure chloride of sodium remains. The lake resembles the northeast of Estancia, Torrance County, owned by the Pennsylvania Development Company.

### Lincoln County.

A car of new machinery has arrived for the Eagle Mining Company operating near Bonto. The company now has four mills in operation and this will add a fifth. About \$50,000 is to be expended for further development of the property. The stockholders of the company were visitors at the property last week.

Michigan people have undertaken the task of reorganizing the company that owns the Vera Cruz mine at Nogal and which has been in financial difficulties. It is understood that all the obligations have been paid and that the five Huntingtons will soon be grinding ore again.

### Sierra County.

The Empire Gold Mining and Milling Company is preparing to transfer ore from the Bonanza mine near Hillsboro to the mill by rail, a distance of almost a mile. Tracklaying is in progress for that purpose. Ten additional stamps for the mill are on the ground and they will be in operation before December 1.

### Otero County.

The Excelsior Company is taking steps to install a plant of machinery on its property at Jarilla.

The Jarilla branch of the El Paso & Southwestern is to be extended through the gap near the Lucky at Jarilla to the Bl-Chance property on the north side of the Lucky Flat. The shaft is to be equipped with a modern hoisting plant and work is to be started this month removing ore from the forty foot vein of the property. The ore is a heavy sulphide.

The Southwest Company operating at Jarilla intends to carry on extensive diamond drill operations to prove the ground on its properties to a great depth. It is the plan of the company to drive the second level of the Lucky West to a point where it will come out through the hill on the south side, above the railroad track, then the tramway and the ore bins are to be moved, and the ore which stands between the second level and the surface is to be sent down by gravity. The north drift on the first level is likewise to be driven to daylight.

Summers, of Louisiana, believes there are between 5,000 and 10,000 people affected with tuberculosis in the city of New Orleans, who are entirely ignorant of the sure cure that the climate of New Mexico is capable of rendering. Mr. Summers called for several copies of the bulletin, "How I Cured Myself of Consumption in New Mexico," published by the Bureau of Immigration, to send to his friends in the south in order that they may learn of the safe refuge for them in the Sunshine Territory and not become victims of the "white plague."

It is reported that the Right Rev. A. Van de Vyver, Bishop of Richmond, has resigned, and may be named as the successor of the late Archbishop Chapelle in the Archdiocese of New Orleans. Mgr. Chapelle died shortly after the outbreak of yellow fever in that city. Another prelate who is mentioned as a possible successor to Mgr. Chapelle is the Right Rev. Henry Granjon, Bishop of Tucson, Arizona. Dr. Granjon lived at St. Mary's Seminary, this city, for several years prior to his consecration, and was at the head of the society for the propagation of the faith in the United States.

The state-fish commission of California has written the New Mexican Game and Fish Warden, Page B. Otero for permission to trap turkeys and quail in the Territory and ship them to California. As the law explicitly

stipulates that there shall be no trapping of birds in the Territory, Mr. Otero was forced to answer that he could not grant permission to defy the law. Mr. Otero expressed himself as being of the opinion that the law was a very poor one, as the exchange of birds between states, thereby mixing the breed, could not help but work to the benefit of both communities.



### THE LAGUNA PUEBLO IN VALENCIA COUNTY

Now Numbers 1,400 People—Well-to-Do and Hard-Working Inhabitants  
—Three Schools There.

Special Correspondence New Mexican. Laguna, N. M., Oct. 31.—The Indian Pueblo of Laguna leads all the other pueblo communities in New Mexico in educational matters. The first government school here was opened in 1870 by Colonel W. G. Marmon. Previously a parish school under the auspices of the Catholic Church was taught by Don Manuel Cassias, now living in the town of Juan Tafoya.

A large number of Laguna children have been taught in training schools, notably Carlisle. There are now excellent day schools in the different Laguna villages.

Following is a list of teachers and other employees of the Indian Bureau: Laguna.

Mrs. L. H. Pilcher, teacher; Miss A. Sheffield, housekeeper; I. L. Jones, M. D., physician; R. W. Cassidy, farmer; Mrs. J. H. Babbitt, field matron; Gaylord Steele, policeman.

Paguete. Miss E. Craycraft, teacher; Miss Daisy Schumann, housekeeper; Miss M. E. Dissette, field matron; Charles Carr, policeman.

Mesita Negra. Miss O. Kessell, teacher; Miss M. S. Marmon, housekeeper.

Paraje. Miss F. J. Dennis, teacher; Miss J. Dorris, housekeeper.

Seama. Miss E. Young, teacher; Miss M. Analla, housekeeper. Of these employees seven are of Indian blood.

Postoffices have lately been established for the convenience of employees and educated Indians at Paguate, Casa Blanca and Seama.

These villages are parts of the Laguna Pueblo community.

A sheep dipping plant with a large capacity is being established four miles north of Laguna.

A large number of men from the pueblo are employed on the Santa Fe-Pacific Railway principally in the round house and shops at Winslow, Arizona. The population of the pueblo numbers about 1,400, living in seven villages. The people cultivate small farms and gardens and have many improved fruit orchards and a few vineyards. They own sheep, cattle, horses and burros, in considerable numbers.

The white people of Laguna, outside of the government employees, are Gus Weiss, manager of the S. Bibo Mercantile Company store, Gunn Brothers, millers and merchants. The agent and other employees of the Santa Fe-Pacific Railway Company, and the old timers, R. G. Marmon and George H. Pradt, well known surveying engineers.

Mr. Marmon has good accommodations for tourists and visitors and teams for expeditions to Acoma, the "Mesa Encantada" and other points of interest.

Laguna is a comparatively new community. It was established in May, 1697, according to Bancroft, by "rebel Queres of Cieneguilla, Santo Domingo and Cochiti."

On the Fourth of July, 1699, the new pueblo submitted to the Spanish authorities, Governor Cuervo being present.

There were a few Acomas living near the site of the new village and it is certain that a considerable number of Acoma families joined with the "Rebel Queres" in building the village, they being of the same race and having the same language.

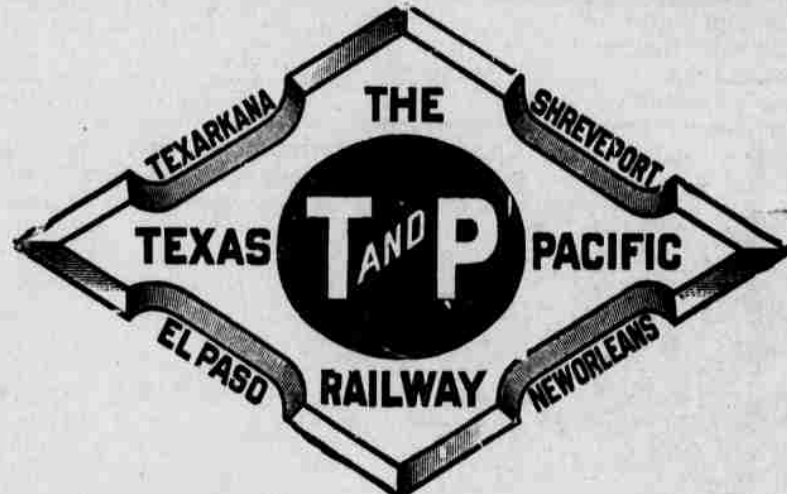

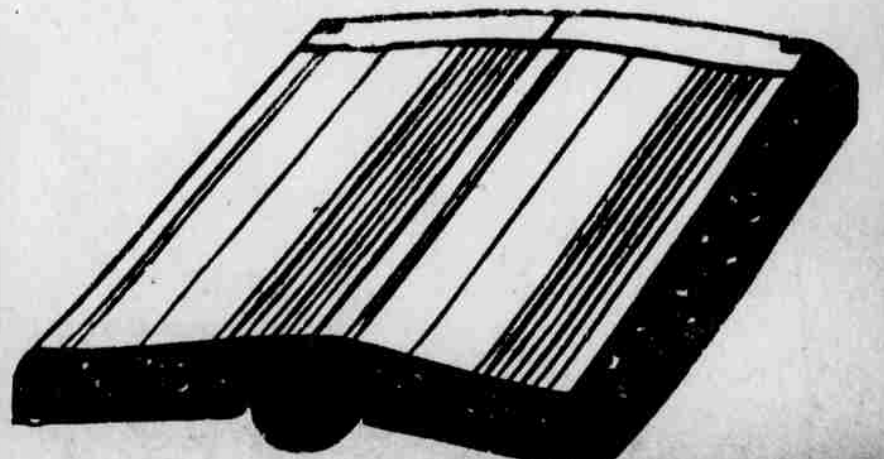

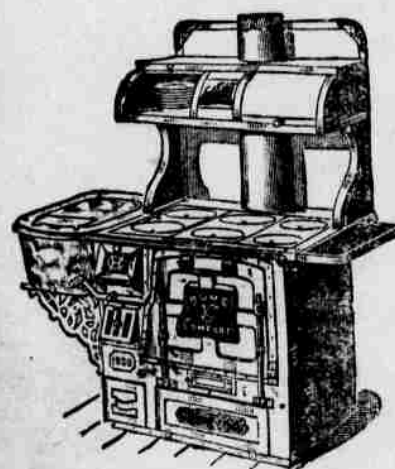

Just as he put his head inside the door some one struck him. Metzgar says that the whole affray was without provocation upon his part. No arrests have been made.

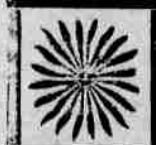
