## BATTLES ARE ALMOST OVER

Bitter Election Contests in New York and Philadelphia Near End

## JEROME SURE TO WIN

McClellan and Hearst Fight is Warm—Weaver Claims Victory—Fight in Ohio.

New York, Nov. 6.—With tonight will close the campaigns in several of the states and tomorrow the balloting will be done. While state and county tickets are to be chosen in many parts of the country on Tuesday, the interest in this year's election centers in New York City, Philadelphia, where Weaver is fighting the regular Republicans, and in Ohio.

The biggest and most bitterly contested struggles have been waged in New York and Philadelphia. The Philadelphia battle has become so bitter that it has extended to the entire state of Pennsylvania.

### Mayorality Fight Hot.

The battle for the mayorality of New York, has been a most singular three cornered fight, which has daily grown warmer and closer, until on the eve of election it has simmered down to a contest between McClellan, the candidate of corrupt Tammany and Hearst, the Independent Municipal Ownership advocate. Ivins, the Republican candidate, appeared to be a slow third. Never has his candidacy been taken seriously, for he is the plaything of a discredited state boss.

Jerome, who has made an independent fight for the district attorneyship, is selected as a winner by all parties. He is receiving support from Republicans, Hearstites and Tammany men alike. Everywhere he has been given great ovations, and at the Jerome meetings, where the names of Hearst and McClellan and Ivins have been cheered, the fighting district attorney has received the united applause of the audience.

### Jerome's Election Sure.

Poor Osborne, who was Jerome's assistant, and who allowed the law-breakers to nominate him to oppose his chief, gets but little comfort out of his meetings, for, although the regular candidate of Tammany, the greetings he has received at the McClellan meetings have been cold. Where the Tammany mayorality candidate has been received with cheers and shouts, Osborne has been given but a few hand claps and his attack on Jerome has proved anything but popular.

As matters now stand the election does sheet picks Jerome as a sure winner. McClellan is a favorite for the mayorality honors with Hearst a close second. Odds on the mayorality contest have dropped from 10 to 6 to about 10 to 9 and some money has been placed even. However, the Hearst supporters are still seeking odds.

The straw vote taken by the New York World gives the Municipal Ownership candidate a lead of about ten per cent over the Tammany man, while the candidate of the Republican boss is out-distanced by about fifty per cent. Tammany leaders made light of the vote, contending that it has been doctored in the office of the World to bolster up the chances of Hearst.

Monster mass meetings, at which the campaign will formally close, will be held tonight by all the mayorality candidates. Every effort possible will be made to get out great crowds. The meetings Saturday night were well attended.

### Fight in Philadelphia.

Philadelphia, Nov. 6.—Mayor Weaver and regular Republicans are both claiming victory on the eve of election, but among the people the changes of the reform mayor's city ticket are said to be better than the chances of the regulars.

At least a majority of 30,000 is the claim of the Weaver men, while the Republicans say that their county officers will win by a "safe majority."

Today closes the hottest campaign ever waged in the city of Brotherly Love. The Weaver men have broken away from the regular Republicans and are claiming that they stand for reform in the government of the city.

All kinds of sensational charges are made by both sides. The regulars claim that Weaver is trying to control the election through the police force. It is a fact that the mayor has announced that any policemen found working for the Republican ticket will be dismissed from the department.

On the other side the Weaverites contend that the regular Republicans have stuffed the poll lists and that attempts will be made to repeat votes. The names of many dead men, it is said, have been put on the election register.

It was announced today that Mayor Weaver may cause the arrest of the

men who are accused of perpetrating the illegal registration.

### Ohio Battle Bitter.

Cleveland, Ohio, Nov. 6.—After one of the most bitter fights in the history of Ohio it looked today as if Governor Herrick has downed his opponents and will, on Tuesday, be re-elected. Despite the mudslinging campaign, in which the personal character of the chief executive has been attacked, Herrick has daily grown stronger. His Democratic opponent has gained few votes.

The speech of Secretary Taft, delivered two weeks ago, has been a wonderful hold to the Republicans. Taft's strong independent address, in which he endorsed Herrick and censured Boss Cox has been a wonderful vote getter. Governor Folk, of Missouri, who has been in Ohio in the interest of the Democratic ticket has made a good impression, but it is doubtful if he has been a securer of votes.

### Cox May Win.

In spite of the great fight put up in Cincinnati against Coxism, it looks as if the advocate of corruption has been victorious. He has in complete control the election machinery and behind him is the police department to a man.

### Managers Make Estimates.

Columbus, Ohio, Nov. 6.—The chairman of the Republican state central committee claims that Herrick will be elected by a majority exceeding 83,000, while the chairman of the Democratic committee claims Patterson will win by a majority of at least 20,000.

### Both Claim Victory.

Chicago, Nov. 6.—With the general expectation on all sides that the vote will be light, the managers of both the Republican and Democratic organizations have expressed confidence of victory at the poles tomorrow.

### From Other States.

Louisville, Ky., Nov. 6.—Interest in tomorrow's election centers in the choice of a mayor for Louisville. Paul C. Barth, the Democratic nominee, and J. T. O'Neal, the Fusionists' candidate, have made active campaign.

Indianapolis, Ind., Nov. 6.—Both Republicans and Democrats claim to be confident of victory in the city election tomorrow.

Baltimore, Md., Nov. 6.—The leaders of both parties are expressing confidence on the result in Maryland. An amendment to the constitution which virtually disfranchises the negro will be voted on.

Lincoln, Neb., Nov. 6.—The Republicans claim the state by a plurality ranging from 25,000 for Supreme Judge to 32,000 for regents. The Fusionists assert their ticket will be elected but give no figures. The gift of \$100,000 to the state university by John D. Rockefeller is the only issue of the campaign so far as public agitation is concerned, the Fusionists insisting that the gift be returned.

### MILLIONAIRES PENSIONS.

Men of Great Wealth Seeks Government Aid to Get on Honor Roll.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 6.—Pensions for millionaires is one of the new developments under the executive order of last year making age the only disability necessary for the granting of a service pension.

According to Commissioner of Pensions Warren, the application of a millionaire for a pension has been recently favorably passed upon. He does not want the pension, for the money, but simply to perfect his record of honorable service in the Civil War.

This view of the age disability order is being taken by many well-to-do veterans who would not otherwise apply for pensions. The fact that they are eligibles and performed the service stipulated in behalf of the government, and that the government is willing to recognize this service by a pension and the accompanying records of the same, make the service pension a desirable addition to family records.

The commissioner does not look upon this claim of pensions as an undesirable burden for the government to bear. He takes the view that the money is used by the applicant to relieve want.

### MEAT PACKERS MUST NOW PAY FOR LABELS.

Chicago, Ill., Nov. 6.—Beginning with today, the new order of the Secretary of Agriculture, putting the cost of the meat inspection labels on the packers, goes into effect. Heretofore, the government furnished the labels free of charge. Another innovation, which goes into effect today, is the extension of the inspection service to many independent packers of smaller capacity, who are engaged in the business of exporting meats. The number of inspectors has been somewhat increased for the purpose.

### FOOTBALL INJURIES ARE FATAL TO GIRL PLAYER.

Elkhart, Md., Nov. 6.—Miss Berna Decker, daughter of Judge Decker of this city, died today of extreme peritonitis, contracted as the result of a football game played between two teams of girls last Saturday.

## GOVERNMENT MAY COLLAPSE

Official Appeal to People is Issued by Russian Ministers

## ASKS FOR CONFIDENCE

Bears Count Witte's Earmarks and Tells of Conditions—Odessa Dead Number 3,000.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 6.—The Official Messenger prints this morning a carefully worded appeal to the people for confidence. It bears Count Witte's earmarks and hints strongly that the empire is threatened with dismemberment, unless the people rally to support.

The appeal calls attention to the different character representation with which the government is being besieged to quell the existing disorders in the country. Some of them complaining of the zeal of the troops and others of their inaction, some ask for military protection and others for the entire removal of the soldiers.

### More Than 3,000 Killed.

Odessa, Nov. 6.—The town is quiet today. It is now estimated that the killed and wounded during the recent riots here will number 6,000, more than half of whom were slain. The city hospitals alone contain 2,000 wounded.

### Troops Charge Mob.

Tomsk, Siberia, Nov. 6.—The troops were forced to charge with bayonets against a mob pillaging the Jewish houses here. A number were killed and many were wounded. The city is half sacked.

### Manifesto Arrives.

Helsingfors, Finland, Nov. 6.—The imperial manifesto meeting most of the demands of the Finlanders, arrived here last night. The constitutionalists are satisfied and Socialists, who threatened to make a demonstration, have thus far been quiet.

### MANY ARE HURT.

Several Automobile Accidents Occur at Los Angeles and One Woman is Killed.

Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 6.—In an unprecedented series of automobile accidents in Los Angeles, during the past twenty-four hours, one person was killed, one perhaps fatally injured and six others more or less seriously hurt.

Mrs. H. T. Austin was instantly killed and Miss Edith Polley's skull was fractured while two others were injured by the machine stalling on the street car tracks in front of a rapidly moving car. Two other persons were run down by an automobile, while driving. Still another two were hit by an automobile. In addition a collision between two automobiles injured several, who, however, proceeded to their homes before their names were ascertained.

### STOCK IS MISSING.

Receiver Cunningham of Enterprise Bank Cannot Find \$30,000 Worth of Securities.

Pittsburg, Pa., Nov. 6.—Eighty thousand dollars' worth of stock of the Santa Fe Central Railway, of which the late Cashier Clark of the Enterprise National Bank was treasurer, is reported missing. Receiver Cunningham of the defunct bank, has not been able to find them.

### PRINCE LOUIS TAKES LUNCH WITH PRESIDENT.

Washington, Nov. 6.—An invitation from the President to Prince Louis to luncheon informally at the White House has caused the Prince to shorten his visit at Mount Vernon and the Dolphin will return to Washington about 1 o'clock. The Prince will be driven direct to the White House. After the luncheon he will take leave of the British Ambassador and then will go to Annapolis.

### ALEXANDER IS SERIOUSLY ILL AT SANITARIUM.

Deerfield, Mass., Nov. 6.—The condition of James W. Alexander, former president of the Equitable Life Association, was reported last night as serious. He is confined to his bed at a sanitarium and will not be able to leave Deerfield for several months, even under the most favorable circumstances.

### OVERLAND LIMITED TRAIN IS WRECKED.

Salinas, Cal., Nov. 6.—The Overland Limited No. 9, coming west, was wrecked today between Santa Margarita and San Luis Obispo, by the explosion of a package of dynamite lying on the track. The engine was damaged considerably. As far as is known no one was injured.

## WOMEN MAKE BOLD THREAT

Wives of London's Unemployed Men Say Bloodshed is Possible

## "MARSELLAIS" IS SUNG

Premier Balfour Hears Woes of Female Deputation—Say Husbands are Desperate.

London, Nov. 6.—The desperate condition of the poor of London was brought to the notice of Premier Balfour today by a remarkable deputation of the wives and other women relatives of the unemployed, who did not hesitate to tell the premier that unless something is speedily done to lessen their sufferings there will be bloodshed.

"Don't forget that hungry men are desperate men," said one speaker.

Enormous crowds of women, from all parts of London, marched through the streets headed by the deputation which Balfour received at the office of the local government board.

"The Marseillais" was heard as the procession advanced. Perhaps it was the first time it was ever heard under such circumstances in London.

### MASONS PURCHASE BLOCK.

Premises on South Side of Plaza Will Be Permanent Home—Finest Temple in Territory.

Negotiations have been going on for some days for the purchase of the premises and the block on San Francisco Street, originally built by Levi Spiegelberg, and purchased some years ago by George W. Hickox, between the building committee of Montezuma Lodge No. 1, A. F. and A. Masons and the owner. It is understood that the trade has been closed and that Montezuma Lodge has purchased the block. The deed and necessary papers were prepared today by Attorney R. H. Hanna and sent to Mr. Hickox at Albuquerque for execution. The purchase price is private.

The Masons intend to use the entire second story for lodge rooms for the different Masonic bodies located in this city, viz., Montezuma Lodge No. 1, A. F. and A. Masons, Santa Fe Chapter No. 1, Royal Arch Masons, Santa Fe Commandery No. 1, Knights Templar and Santa Fe Lodge of Perfection No. 1, A. F. and A. S. R. The intention also is, if necessary, in due course of time, to add a third story to be used for a Scottish Rite Cathedral. Within the next few months, the second story will be converted into suitable lodge rooms for the bodies of the York Rite of Free Masonry and into a Scottish Rite hall, there being plenty of room for all purposes for the present. The Masonic bodies here have taken the necessary steps to raise the required part of the purchase money and have succeeded.

The building is a very substantial one and the second story, with certain adaptations and changes, will make the finest lodge hall and rooms in the Territory. The entire building will be a Masonic Temple, of which New Mexico Masons may justly be proud.

Plans for the modification of the second story and for a suitable lodge hall there will be procured as soon as practicable, and work thereon will commence in a few months.

Although Masonic lodges have been in existence in this city since the time of the American occupation in 1846, the Masons have not had a building of their own since 1857. They then owned a building and grounds for a few years and up to 1857 on lots located near the present Loretto Academy. This building, which was a two story adobe structure was swept away by the floods of that year in the Santa Fe River and the lots sold. They have paid in rent since that time thousands of dollars, which money would have been trebled sufficient to have constructed one of the largest and finest buildings in the Territory for their use.

### CATRON BUYS MINE.

Santa Fe Man Purchases Big Interest in Valuable Property Near Silverton.

A dispatch from Silverton, Colorado, says: The one-sixth interest of Charles Thayer of Santa Fe, New Mexico, and one-sixth of the interest of George Bibbs of this city, in the Fairview-Thunder property, located near the great Champion mine on Sultan Mountain, just above the town of Silverton, has just been sold to Thomas B. Catron of Santa Fe. The amount of the purchase price cannot at this time be ascertained, although it is understood to have been a handsome figure. This property is regarded as one of the most promising on Sultan Mountain, especially since the adjoining Champion group has developed into one of the biggest producers in San Juan County.

## GETS DOCTOR'S CAP.

Bishop Kendrick Is Presented With Hood by the Vestry of Episcopal Church.

The feature of the occasion, at the meeting of the vestry and Guild of the Church of the Holy Faith with Bishop Kendrick on Saturday evening, at the residence of Hon. L. Bradford Prince, was the presentation to the Bishop of the proper hood and cap of a Doctor of Divinity, bearing the colors of Marietta College. The Bishop graduated from that institution in 1856, and the college conferred on him the degree of D. D. in 1883, but, with characteristic modesty, he had never provided himself with the insignia of the degree.

When the guests had assembled on Saturday evening, Governor Prince arose and addressed Bishop Kendrick as follows:

"My dear Bishop: Everyone within your wide jurisdiction holds you in special honor for the simplicity and lack of ostentation in your life and character, and we all know that you are no lover of excess in ceremonies. But for years the custom has been increasing, until now it is almost universal, that those who hold high collegiate degrees shall wear the insignia of their decorations on ecclesiastical occasions at the opening services of general conventions, the laying of corner stones and consecration of churches, and whenever a procession forms part of a ceremonial, in academic affairs, at college commencements and all occasions where educational institutions and interests are promoted, the custom is now general that the absence of the doctor's hood is more noticeable than its presence.

"Mindful of these facts, and knowing that you have long held the degree of doctor of divinity from Marietta College, whose reputation for sound scholarship stands very high, some of your friends have thought that it might not be inappropriate or unacceptable for them to present to you the hood and cap properly showing the colors of that college. In order to be perfectly correct, we corresponded with President Perry, and I hold here his letter, in which, after stating that the college colors are navy blue and white, and are registered with Cotrell & Leonard he adds: 'I am very glad that the Bishop is to have a suitable hood, and wish I could see him wear it.'

"While the smallness of the gift did not permit many actually to participate in procuring it, yet in making this presentation I feel that I can truthfully say that it carries with it the esteem, the affection and the love of all your people."

The Bishop made a very touching and appropriate response, in which he said that he would principally prize the gift as an expression of the good will of the people.

The hood is a beautiful piece of workmanship, made by Cotrell & Leonard, who are the authorities on all such matters. The ecclesiastical color is scarlet, just as the doctors of law wear purple, those of medicine, green, and those of philosophy, blue. In this case, the scarlet border is of rich velvet, and on the lining, which shows the college colors, blue and white, they are arranged in a chevron form, which is very effective. The cap has a gold tassel, to which all holding the degree of doctor are entitled.

The presentation was a complete surprise to all those present, and was a very pleasing feature of the evening's entertainment. It is understood that the donors included friends of the Bishop in Santa Fe, Albuquerque, Las Vegas, Silver City, El Paso and Prescott, thus representing all sections of his jurisdiction.

Before this time, the only academic hood in New Mexico has been that of Hon. L. B. Prince, as doctor of laws of Kenyon and Colorado Colleges.

### ASK FOR ACCOUNTING.

Denver Men Want G. Hill Howard to Render a Report on Big Land Deal.

Suit has been brought in Denver by I. B. and J. C. Porter to compel G. Hill Howard of New Mexico to give an accounting for the proceeds of a sale involving the disposal of 156,000 acres of ranch land. They ask that a receiver be appointed.

The plaintiffs sold the land for Howard sometime ago. The agreement, the complaint avers, was that the net price to be received by Howard was 75 cents per acre and that all money which should be paid over and above that amount should go to the Porters for making the sale. The plaintiffs sold the lands for \$250,000, just \$132,000 more than Howard had asked, and they claim that amount as their due.

### DENVER MAY NOW BUILD AUDITORIUM.

Denver, Colo., Nov. 6.—The Supreme Court today rendered a decision modifying its former decision in the auditorium case, and allowing the city to issue \$400,000 in bonds for the construction of an auditorium.

## MINERS MAY ORDER STRIKE

Employees in Anthracite Collieries Prepare for a Big Battle.

## WANT EIGHT-HOUR DAY

Recognition of Union Will Also Be One of the Demands—Organization Is Strong.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., Nov. 6.—The union miners of the anthracite region are making energetic efforts for the coming convention of the United Mine Workers, which will be held in Shamokin, Pennsylvania, next month. It is well understood that the action of the convention will largely depend upon the numerical and financial strength of the organization at the time of the convention. It is believed, that Mr. Mitchell, the leader of the Mine Workers, in whose judgment they have unlimited confidence, would not sanction the formulation of any demands which might lead to a strike, unless the organization is sufficiently prepared for such a severe test. For that reason the United Mine Workers of this district are carrying on an energetic campaign to strengthen the ranks of their organization and bring its membership to at least 120,000 to 150,000.

### Demand Recognition.

Conventions of two of the three districts included in the organization have already declared themselves for an eight hour day and recognition of the union, the two chief objects, according to Mr. Mitchell's statements, which the union seeks. It is generally believed that the demands of the United Mine Workers, provided their numerical and financial strength warrants it, will include recognition of the union, an eight hour day, the weighing of coal and payment by weight for a ton of 2,000 pounds, instead of the 2,800 pounds which is called a ton in some of the collieries, a new conciliation board of three members, continuation of the sliding scale feature of the present agreement, and also the check weighmen and check docking boss features of the agreement.

### Will Present Demands.

When the demands are formulated and approved by Mr. Mitchell, it is expected that Mitchell and a committee of the three district presidents, Nichols, Dettry and Fahey will be appointed to visit the coal operators in New York, to submit the demands of the men. With the approach of the date of the convention the local branches of the organization are increasing their efforts and their officers report that their campaign is crowned with gratifying success. During the month of October many thousand new members have joined the organization and the latter is said to be in a flourishing financial condition. Many of the operators express the opinion that the efforts of the union will not be sufficiently successful to warrant the union making a determined fight for the eight hour day and recognition. They seem to believe that Mr. Mitchell will preserve a conservative attitude and will not lend his hand in any attempt to involve the union in a war which would be disastrous without enough numbers and money to back it.

### COSTILLA CASE ON TRIAL.

Attorneys Will Try for Decision on Law Points—Day and Night Sessions.

In the case of the settlers of the town of Costilla versus the United States Freehold Land and Immigration Company, which was called last week in the First Judicial District Court of the county of Santa Fe has developed to a point where the case is now being heard by the court and the jury selected Saturday. Following is a list of the jurors:

The attorneys do not seem to think that very much of the case will be left to the decision of the jury, as each side hopes to demonstrate to the court that it is merely an interpretation of the laws of New Mexico that is required to decide the case, and therefore the jury will have nothing to decide, or if it does it will be merely a case of deciding the points of law as outlined by the court.

The court convened this morning at 10 o'clock and will hold daily and nightly sessions from now on until the case is decided.

### RUSSIAN JEWS WILL RECEIVE NO HELP.

Washington, Nov. 6.—President Roosevelt has decided that no action can be taken by this government at present, which will be of benefit to the Jews of Russia.

## DELEGATE ANDREWS ENTITLED TO A "SQUARE DEAL."

"A meeting of the Republican central committee of New Mexico is to be held in the city of Santa Fe on Friday of next week, the 10th instant, for the consideration, as we are told, of important questions now pending, and of great interest to the people and the Republican party."

"In this connection the Morning Journal desires to call attention to a matter which it believes to be of more importance to the Territory, and especially to the Republican party, than any of those which the chairman likely had in mind when calling the meeting, and that is the necessity which circumstances have recently forced upon us of taking some positive measures as a party, to relieve ourselves as far as may be in our power to do so, of the unutterable disgrace in the eyes of the whole country, of being represented in Congress by our present delegate elect."

be idle to indulge in criminal the responsibility for election. It is better for knowledge frankly that he party, just as he worked usher of the Enterprise while the Republican party on the territory cannot wipe out the whole account with a pistol bullet, it can mitigate to a great extent the disgrace it has brought upon itself and New Mexico, and win the respect of the American people, by a resolution of the central committee asking him to resign, and in case of his failing to do so, asking Congress to refuse to admit him."—Albuquerque Journal.

The New Mexican's Albuquerque morning contemporary is very much too previous in its demands as given in the editorial quoted. In fact, it has acted not only hastily and prematurely, but also unjustly and unfairly in the publication of the editorial. The Territorial Republican Central Committee contains some of the brightest most level headed, and most fair minded citizens of New Mexico and these citizens will act upon their own responsibility and upon the dictates of their own consciences, as well as upon what is best, as they see it, for the interests of the people and of the Republican party in all matters coming before them.

In the case of Delegate W. H. Andrews, nothing could come before them except certain allegations and charges, made mostly by newspapers politically and personally opposed to the Delegate and certain statements made or reported to have been made by the dead cashier of the failed Enterprise National Bank, and certain reports, mostly indefinite, by officials investigating the bank's affairs. The strongest point made against the delegate so far is that a suit to recover \$55,000 has been filed in a Pittsburgh court by the receiver of the bank, in which suit, although civil, the press dispatches say that criminal actions on the part of Mr. Andrews are alleged. This is the case stripped of all newspaper vociferations and verbiage. Nothing so far has been proven.

Under the law, every man is deemed innocent until proven guilty. The Journal, evidently for ulterior motives calls upon the Republican Central Committee to constitute itself, accuser, witness, prosecuting attorney, jury, judge and to condemn Delegate Andrews without proof, or definite charges or indictments, without trial, without the testimony of witnesses, without knowledge of facts in the case, without defense, and simply because that paper wants to, and because such a course would suit the purposes of its owners.

If Delegate Andrews is guilty of even one-tenth of what is charged against him by hostile Pennsylvania newspapers, where a remarkably bitter and fierce political campaign is on, the law will be found plenty strong enough to reach him. After trial it will pronounce him innocent or guilty. Should the former come to

pass, the Republican Central Committee would find itself in a remarkably unfortunate position, were it to follow the unjust and premature demands of the Journal. Should the law declare Delegate Andrews guilty, then and there will be the proper time to take action by the committee, if same shall be found necessary. This is not likely to happen, as should one-tenth of the charges, be proven upon due trial, the law itself, will leave no necessity for action by New Mexico's Republican Central Committee, or any other body of New Mexico citizens.

In the meantime, Delegate Andrews is entitled to a "square deal." If the offenses charged against him are found to be true, he will doubtless receive merited punishment. Until after due trial and conviction, he is entitled to be considered innocent and no judgment at the bar of public opinion or by an organized body, such as the Republican Central Committee, or a Republican convention, should be had in any way, shape, manner or form.

If all the reports and charges are based on facts, then his case looks unfavorable, but that does not change the fact that the delegate is entitled to a "square deal" and a thorough investigation of the charges made.

New Mexico is much better off, than are, for instance, the state of Oregon in the case of U. S. Senator Mitchell and Representative Williamson, both convicted in a United States court of serious crimes, or the state of Kansas in the case of U. S. Senator Burton. Their cases have gone to the U. S. Supreme Court and until they are decided there, neither the governors, the legislatures nor any other organized body of citizens in those states will take action or will superogate to themselves the duties of courts and of the people in elections. The New Mexican, if Delegate Andrews is guilty, will not endeavor to palliate or condone his offenses; but proof positive must first be adduced before deserved punishment can or should be meted out. Certainly, sane persons will not consider the columns and columns of printed matter of late published in Philadelphia and Pittsburgh newspapers and by correspondents of yellow papers, as proof positive. They would not be sane and well-balanced were they so to do.

## THE WORK OF IRRIGATION.

The Earth, a monthly journal published by the passenger department of the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe Railway Company, in its last number truthfully says that:

"Wherever water has had to do with the raising of crops in an arid country, the value of lands has been measured more by the water than by the quality of soil, and has jumped from nothing to as high as \$1,500 an acre. In many cases these lands are remote from transportation facilities. The United States Government is foremost among nations to encourage private irrigation enterprises, particularly the smaller projects that are more feasible. According to the latest census report, private enterprises placed irrigation systems in thirty-one States and Territories. The expense of projects is estimated at \$93,000,000, which is believed to be low. A total area of 9,500,000 acres has been covered by these systems. In an arid region water is only required to make its tillable portions the most fertile areas in the world. With the vast expanse of forest-covered watershed which must drain into the innumerable lakes that dot the surrounding country, the water supply there is well nigh inexhaustible."

## HURRAH FOR JUDGE ABBOTT!

Hurrah! for Judge Abbott, and bully for Sheriff Perfecto Armijo! What was deemed impossible six months ago is coming to pass. Sheriff Perfecto Armijo of Bernalillo County, last Sunday, saw to it that the saloons of the Duke City were closed tight, in front as well as at the back doors. When the New Mexican began its campaign for equal enforcement of the Sunday law throughout the Territory and supported Judge John R. McFie in enforcing it at Santa Fe, not only the people and press of Albuquerque, but many people in Santa Fe insisted that this enforcement would never come to pass, that the case of Albuquerque was hopeless, that Albuquerque without open saloons and open gambling on Sundays would be like Hamlet with Hamlet left out. But six short months of newspaper agitation have wrought a change and Albuquerque will be as orderly a city on Sunday as is Santa Fe. That this will redound to the benefit of the Duke City and its people in general goes without saying, for no town ever gained permanent prosperity by countenancing law breaking or encouraging gambling.

The statement of the Duke City who are carrying the joint statehood balloon on their shoulders and who want to control everything political and official in their proposed State of Arizona, are nervous and rattled these days. They are running about like chickens with their heads cut off; they see spooks in every corner, and gigantic combinations of rascally opponents to undo them in their schemes in every nook. They are so self-important that they think everybody is after them; they have no peace of mind, but have many and many a sleepless night. The wicked fee when no man pursueth."

## BEST FOR THE REPUBLICAN PARTY.

All the declarations of the sensational press to the contrary notwithstanding, President Roosevelt is not taking any hand in the political contests of the different states which will come to their climax at the polls tomorrow. He has refused to endorse the Republican candidates for mayor of New York, for Governor of Ohio, or the Republican candidates in Pennsylvania. However, members of his cabinet have taken sides, for Secretary Root has declared against the Republican candidates in Philadelphia, and Secretary Taft against the Republican candidates in Cincinnati. There is no denying, that the indirect influence of the President is for an independent spirit in politics, and the placing of righteousness above strict party lines. It is well that it is so, and in the end best for the Republican party, which can remain the dominant party only so long as it keeps itself clean and nominates and supports clean candidates. It is a lesson that has been learned in Santa Fe and elsewhere, but that is too often forgotten by leaders of all parties.

## SOME GOOD WORK BY THE MOUNTED POLICE.

The territorial mounted police have again proved their worth and value to New Mexico by putting an end to a gang of fence cutters in eastern San Miguel and Guadalupe counties. Eight of the suspected men are in jail and will meet their just deserts. What is even better, such fear has been struck into the hearts of other evildoers that the lawless portion of the inhabitants upon the eastern New Mexico ranges will lie very low in the future. These rustlers have many crimes charged up against them, among them the assassination of the late Colonel J. Franco Chavez. Their raids, extending from Lincoln and Otero Counties on the south to Union county on the north, have retarded the settlement of those sections by small stockmen and farmers now, that some of their ringleaders have been apprehended and their followers have been cowed, every settler in those sections will breathe easier, and will bless the Thirty-sixth Legislature for enacting the Mounted Police law.

Germany has a law compelling a man, before he marries, to advertise an announcement of the intended ceremony in his former place of residence, as well as in the place of his birth. This is done to prevent bigamous marriages, such as are too frequently reported in the United States. An investigation recently made in manufacturing cities of Massachusetts shows that there are more bigamists than divorced people, owing to the ease with which men move from place to place, and in each place can contract a marriage, although not divorced from a former and deserted wife. The German law is a good one, and should be part of the uniform divorce law that President Roosevelt will advocate in his forthcoming message to Congress.

The Boer colony in Mexico, started several months ago, after looking over lands in this Territory and the neighboring republic, has been abandoned. The Boers did not like the restrictions of colonial community life, nor the laws and government of Mexico. They were a restless lot, spoiled by the freedom of the life on the veldt. It is only one out of every twenty colonies planted under such circumstances that ever prosper and the conditions for that prosperity are hard work, and self-denial, for the first five years of the colony's existence at least. The opportunities for the individual to do well in American towns and on American farms are too many, to make the rigid colony life attractive to the average man.

The City and County of Denver alone collect a greater sum in county and city taxes than do the Territory of New Mexico, all of its counties, all of its cities, all of its towns, and all of its school districts, in Territorial, county, city, school and special taxes. While the tax rate in New Mexico seems high, yet, the low assessment rate makes taxes very low compared with the taxes collected in neighboring commonwealths.

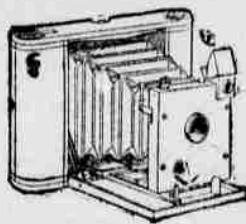

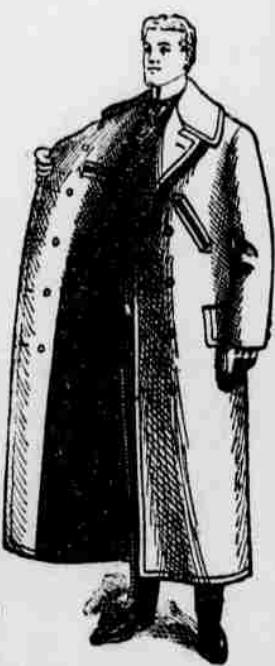

dence of Governor and Mrs. Prince Saturday afternoon for the purpose of receiving Bishop Kendrick, of New Mexico and Arizona, who has been at the rectory of the Church of the Holy Faith for several days past. Bishop Kendrick left this morning for a brief visit to points in San Juan County. He is expected back on Thursday.

O. H. John, formerly station agent for the Santa Fe at Waldo, has arrived in Santa Fe, and is getting things in shape for the establishment of a laundry in this city. Mr. John has secured the vacant building next to the Catholic church, near the Denver & Rio Grande cut-off, and is at present busy installing the machinery for the new laundry. He will put in about a \$2,500 equipment, and expects to have things running in about two weeks.

A large number of sheep, which have been examined by the government sheep inspectors, arrived at the local Santa Fe Central yards today and will be shipped out tonight over the line of the Denver & Rio Grande Railroad to the San Luis Valley. About 9,750 sheep were in the yards this morning, and as soon as these are shipped a new lot will be shipped in, as the Santa Fe Central Railway is handling them as fast as the connecting roads can furnish cars for transportation.

The many friends of H. S. Lutz, who was recently promoted to be agent of the Santa Fe system at Albuquerque, after serving many years in the same capacity in this city, will regret to hear that ill health has compelled him to relinquish his position at the Duke City and to seek a transfer to some station in California or in Kansas, at which the duties are less arduous and the altitude less than in New Mexico. He was offered the agency at Raton with promise or promotion to Trinidad, Colorado, but had to decline this on account of the altitude of those two points.

Several stockmen of Santa Fe and surrounding country are preparing to make a protest against the orders issued by the Bureau of Animal Industry requiring the dipping of all cattle. They declare that the order will cause a great loss to them, and in consequence are trying to secure a modification of the same. They must either obey the order or run the risk of paying a fine, should they ship without dipping, but they hope by bringing the matter to the attention of the secretary of agriculture, to secure a deferment of the order, so that they will not have to dip before spring.

The forecast for New Mexico is cloudy tonight and Tuesday with local rains. The maximum temperature at midnight Saturday was 46 degrees, the minimum being 35 at 8:20 a. m. The mean was 40 degrees and the relative humidity 92 per cent. The precipitation was 0.26 of an inch. For Sunday in Santa Fe the maximum temperature was 44 degrees at noon, the minimum being 39 degrees at midnight. The mean was 42 degrees and the relative humidity 77 per cent. The precipitation was 0.01 of an inch. The temperature in Santa Fe registered 34 at 6 o'clock this morning.

The city council, in its session this evening should pass the necessary ordinances requiring the construction of sidewalks on Lincoln Avenue and on Upper Placae Avenue and the necessary crossings from the Plaza to the Federal building. These walks and crossings are especially demanded by the fact that this street is much frequented by school children, and also by people having business at the Federal building. The board side walks along the Fort Marcy Addition are a nuisance and a disgrace and the sooner they are removed and displaced by substantial brick sidewalks the sooner the best interests of the city will be served.

## ARIZONA NEWS NOTES

In a quarrel with his wife at Mammoth, Gil Ariaza shot and fatally wounded the woman. An hour after the shooting Ariaza was shot in the leg by Justice Kegel. He will recover.

The lands in Yuma County are assessed at less value than property in any other county in Arizona. Land in Graham and Maricopa Counties is assessed at 50 per cent of its valuation, while Yuma farming land is on the assessment roll for 25 per cent of its cash value.

Word has been brought to Tucson of a fatal accident in the Sierrita Mountains last Saturday in which William Harris lost his life. Harris was at the bottom of a well and was struck on the head by a bucket filled with dirt that fell from the surface. Death was instantaneous.

A. V. Smith for many years a resident of Nogales, died in that city last week. Mr. Smith was engaged in the jewelry business. He is a native of New York. During the Spanish American war he served in the regular army and later did military duty in the Philippines. He is survived by a widow and infant child.

At a meeting of the board of governors at Phoenix on Saturday morning, a telegram was read from B. A. Fowler, acting for Receiver Steele of the Arizona Water Company, in which it was stated that the property can be bought for \$250,000. Governor Kibbey was instructed to tell Fowler that the price is exorbitant. A year ago the company wanted \$1,000,000 for the same property. The government estimates its value at \$250,000.

John Byron, a section foreman employed by the Southwestern Railway Company, dropped dead in the Orient Saloon in Bisbee a few days ago. He was standing in the rear of the bar room when he suddenly toppled over. Death was due to heart failure brought on by over indulgence in intoxicating liquors. The deceased was seventy years of age and unmarried. He had been a resident of Bisbee and other Arizona towns for a number of years. As far as is known he has no relatives living.

B. A. Packard, territorial fair commissioner for Arizona stated that at the last meeting of the territorial fair commissioners held at Phoenix, it was decided to offer \$1,500 in drilling prizes and in addition, the championship cup of the Territory to remain the property of the winner so long as he remains in Arizona. Mr. Packard said it is the intention of the commissioners to have double and single drilling contests. None but residents of the Territory will be allowed to compete for the Arizona championship.

Judging from the following telegram received by Mayor C. A. Overlock of Douglas from Captain Thomas Rynning, the search for the missing Grindell party in Mexico is at an end. Captain Rynning wired from Guaymas, Mexico, as follows: "It will cost \$500 to start the expedition from here. Will you accept draft for that amount. Hoffman, a member of the Grindell party, will accompany me. Must know immediately or cannot charter vessel." To this Mayor Overlock replied that it would be impossible to raise any more money in Douglas for the purpose of searching for the lost party.

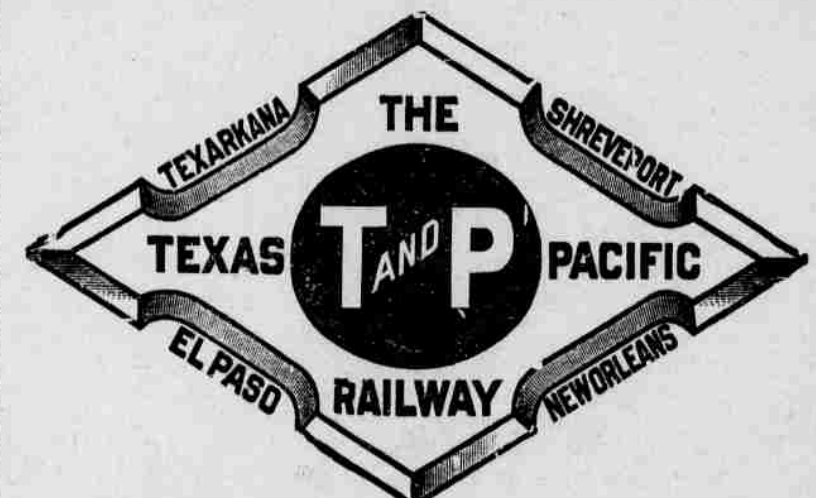

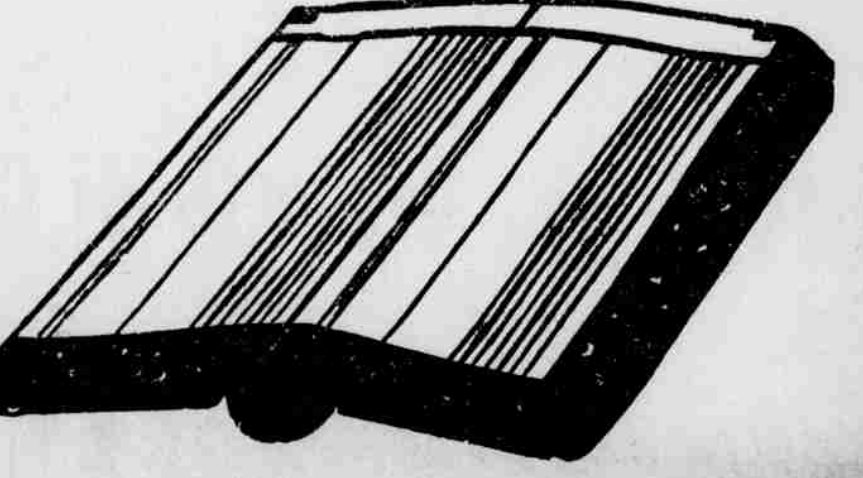

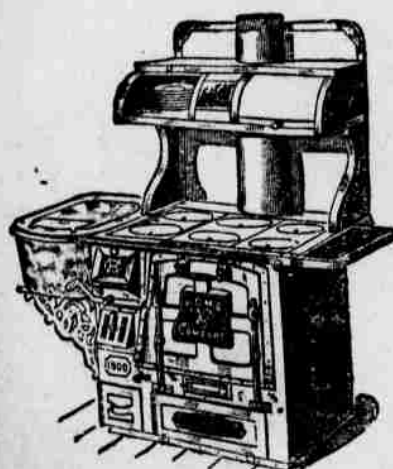

**Postmaster Appointed.**  
Leslie P. Shupe has been appointed postmaster at Canjilon, Rio Arriba County, to succeed William K. Shupe, resigned.

**Civil Service Examination.**  
John K. Stauffer, secretary of the local civil service board, today announced an examination for janitor of the federal building in this city. No educational test will be given and therefore it will not be necessary for applicants to appear for examination but certain blanks must be filled out by applicants which must be sent in by November 18, and which can be procured from Secretary Stauffer. The position carries with it a salary of \$540 a year.

ROBS A WOMAN.

Assistant Postmaster at Clifton is Waylaid By Lone Highwayman Loses Cash.

Mrs. M. B. Emerson, assistant postmaster at Clifton was waylaid last week while on her way home from the postoffice at about 9:30 o'clock. A shopping bag, in which she carried the keys to the postoffice and some change, was snatched from her hand. The robbery occurred near the railroad yards. To get to her home Mrs. Emerson was obliged to cross the tracks. As she was in the shadow of a car, a man jumped out and grabbed the bag she carried.

Before she could call for assistance the robber had made good his escape, disappearing behind a moving train.

The authorities think the robbery was committed by a tramp. Until new locks can be provided, the stamps and other valuables at the postoffice will be kept in a vault at the bank.

GALLUP CITIZENS TO VOTE ON WATER BOND ISSUE.

The board of trustees of Gallup has decided to place before the voters of the village for decision, the proposition to issue bonds to the value of \$10,000. The money is to be used to construct a water supply. At present the city secures its water from one small well and from the railroad company. The question will be voted upon on December 5.

EMPLOYEE STEALS MONEY FROM CASH DRAWER.

John Heaton, employed as a cook at Peter Kitchen's restaurant at Gallup, has been sentenced to serve thirty days in the county jail for robbing his employer's cash drawer. Heaton asked permission to sleep in the restaurant. This was granted and at night he broke open the till and took the money it contained.
