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PATTERSON CAUSE OF A SENSATION

Introduces a Resolution Relating to Vote.

OBJECTS TO DOMINATION

Railroad Report Submitted to House--Bills Passed by Lower Body.

Washington, Feb. 5.—Senator T. M. Patterson caused a sensation in the Senate by introducing a resolution relating to the rights of Senators in voting on treaties.

Patterson's resolution recited that the action of the Democratic caucus indicating to the Senators how they should vote, was a plain violation of the spirit and intent of the Constitution of the United States; that each Senator was entitled to one vote and any attempt to coerce him was an invasion of the rights of state, that for any Senator to vote otherwise than his sense of duty dictates, degrades his high office and assails the dignity and standing of the Senate. The resolution was listened to with great interest by the Senators.

Senator Lodge had prepared a resolution similar to that of Senator Patterson declaring that a treaty like the Dominican treaty should not be made subject of party action, but withheld it when he heard that Patterson had proposed such a resolution.

Senator Tillman objected to the present consideration of the Patterson resolution, unless it was a question of personal privilege.

Patterson said it was not and gave notice he would discuss the resolution tomorrow.

The Senate committee on Philippines today agreed to report for confirmation of the nomination of James F. Smith of California, to be governor general of the Philippines.

Railroad Report.

President Roosevelt today transmitted to the House the report submitted to him by the interstate commerce commission regarding the alleged combination of the Pennsylvania Railroad and other railroads including the Norfolk and Western, Baltimore and Ohio, and Chesapeake & Ohio. The only definite facts known to the commission, having bearing on the subject, are those bearing on the annual reports filed by the companies named in compliance with section 20 of the act to regulate commerce, except as the same facts, or some of them have been disclosed from time to time in the proceedings before the commission.

The report does not undertake to say whether the act of Congress is violated, but in closing says that the published rates of several railroad names have been better maintained, and in some cases advanced, and that there appears to be less competition than formerly. However, this is true of competitive rates generally in other parts of the country.

Bills Passed.

Before the railroad rate debate began in the House two bills were passed. One provided for the setting aside of townships in the Flathead Indian reservation, in Montana; the other authorized the further expenditure of \$60,000 for county improvements from the sale of town lots in Lawton, Indian Territory. An hour to oppose the railroad rate bill was yielded to Littlefield of Maine.

Shipping Bill.

The Senate today agreed to vote on the shipping bill at 5 p. m. on Wednesday, the 14th instant.

The shipping bill was taken up at 2:15 in the Senate. Teller took the floor and denied that funds used in the irrigation service were in the nature of a bounty to the west. He contended that these funds were a loan and benefaction only, in fact that they draw no interest.

Arizona Marshal.

The Senate committee on judiciary today agreed to report for confirmation of Benjamin F. Daniels to be United States marshal for Arizona.

SAYS THAT HARRIMAN CONTROLS ILLINOIS CENTRAL.

New York, Feb. 5.—The Herald today says: "It was learned in this city that there are many indications that the Illinois Central Railway has been acquired by interests identified with the Harriman party. It has been known for some time that the Illinois Central holdings in the hands of this party have been figured as high as 100,000 shares of a par value of \$16,000,000. According to statements made by persons who are in a position to inspect the transfer books of the Illinois Central, there is evidence there that goes far toward confirming the story of the merger."

GERMANY'S VIEW.

Kaiser Does Not Approve of Plan Now Talked of For Policing Country.

Berlin, Feb. 5.—Germany's attitude towards a proposition to place the control of the Moroccan police in the hands of France and Spain is one of opposition since the arrangements would, according to the German view, amount practically to giving France full authority over the police which Germany hitherto has steadily resisted. The foreign office says that the delegates to the conference at Algiers will devote the next few days, while the conference is not sitting, to an informal exchange of views on the subject of the management of the police in an attempt to shape some acceptable plan for adjusting this vexed question.

BOUND OVER.

Jesse Stansel Held at Preliminary Trial for Killing of Sheriff Thompson.

Durango, Colo., Feb. 5.—The preliminary hearing of Jesse Stansel, charged with the murder of Sheriff W. J. Thompson, January 9, was concluded Friday, the decision of Justice of the Peace B. F. Houx being that Stansel be bound over to the district court under a bond of \$10,000. It is probable that Stansel will secure bondsmen today.

The defense rested its case after introducing three witnesses, George Olbert, Walter Campbell and W. P. Darlington. They testified as to what they had seen of the affair.

BREAK NOT REPAIRED.

Cable Companies Still Not Able to Give Communication With Number of Islands.

New York, Feb. 5.—Communication with the West Indies, south of Kingston, Jamaica, was still interrupted early today and the officials of the cable company could not say when they would be likely to get cable news through. At the commercial cable office, it was said the company had no idea what was wrong, and that not a word of news had been received since the break in the line between Kingston and Porto Rico a few days ago.

SAD END.

Prominent Society Woman Commits Suicide While in Fit of Melancholy.

St. Louis, Feb. 5.—Mrs. Lillian G. McNair, prominent in society and champion woman golf player of St. Louis, shot and killed herself today at her home. Mrs. McNair has been under treatment for nervous melancholia for some time and plans had been made by her husband to take her to a health resort. She was 34 years old and had two children.

Her husband, L. G. McNair is one of the most prominent real estate and business men in the city.

YOUNG MAIL THIEF.

Fifteen Year Old Negro Boy Robs Postoffice at South McAlester.

South McAlester, I. T., Feb. 5.—A fifteen year old colored boy who gave his name as Paul Carry, was caught in the postoffice here last night while rifling the mail that had been stolen from lock boxes.

The postoffice had been robbed Saturday night in the same manner, the robber stealing numerous letters containing checks, many of which were found upon the streets.

Checks to the amount of several thousand dollars are missing.

NOT GUILTY.

Mrs. Helen Schmidlap Acquitted of Murder of Husband By Denver Jury.

Denver, Colo., Feb. 5.—Mrs. Helen Schmidlap, accused of murdering her husband by shooting him on July 9th, last, was acquitted at 10 o'clock this morning after the jury had deliberated over forty hours. The previous trial resulted in a disagreement.

COAL ADVANCES.

Chicago Firms Fear Strike and Twenty-Five Cents More a Ton is Charged.

Chicago, Feb. 5.—Because of the possibility of a strike of the coal miners a number of wholesalers in this city today advanced the price of soft coal 25 cents per ton.

AMERICAN COUNTESS WANTS A DIVORCE.

Paris, Feb. 5.—Countess de Castellaine, (formerly Anna Gould) today entered a plea for divorce from her husband.

STATEHOOD COMES UP ON FIFTEENTH

It is Agreed to Discuss Measure at That Date.

RAYNOLDS' CONFIRMATION

Recommended by Sub-Committee--Work Benefiting New Mexico.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 5.—At the morning hour in the United States Senate today, Senator Beveridge moved that the Hamilton joint statehood bill be taken up for consideration.

Senator Lodge, of Massachusetts, objected and stated that, while he favored the bill, he desired that all bills in the hands of the committee to which there were no objections, should be reported first. Senator Foraker announced that he was ready to vote upon the Hamilton joint statehood bill at any hour and at any day and believed that the Senators were all prepared to do likewise.

During the debate, two Democratic Senators indulged in very hot and uncompromising language, one of them being in favor of passing the Hamilton bill and the other sturdily opposed to its consideration and passage.

Other Democratic Senators participated in the discussion and denounced the Hamilton joint statehood bill as a gross outrage and even in stronger words. It was about agreed upon that the Hamilton joint statehood bill should be made the unfinished business of the Senate by February 15 or even sooner and should thereafter be considered daily at the morning hour until disposed of.

Raynolds' Report.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 5.—The subcommittee of the Senate committee on territories this forenoon made a favorable report on the nomination of James W. Raynolds to be secretary of the Territory. After an exhaustive and careful investigation of the charges filed against the secretary, these were found to be baseless and untrue. The report of the full committee will be made to the Senate on Friday next and will also be favorable to Raynolds.

Railroad Taxes.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 5.—Representative Hamilton has introduced a bill providing that all railroad property within the territories of New Mexico and Arizona should be taxed as other property now is on and after January 1st, 1906. This means that all railroad property, tracks, buildings, locomotives, and cars, etc., situated within the territories will be taxed at a higher rate than heretofore and upon the same ratio as real estate and personal property are now being taxed.

New Mexico Irrigation.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 5.—Delegate Andrews, National Committee man Solomon Luna, U. S. District Attorney V. H. H. Llewellyn, G. A. Richardson and R. L. Young, are here and are working hard to have prompt and favorable action taken by the Secretary of the Interior on the two irrigation projects now pending before the department, namely, the Elephant Butte Reservoir System, in the Rio Grande Valley, and the Pecos Valley Irrigation System, in Eddy County.

GARFIELD SILENT.

Attorney General Moody Says No Information Was Given Him By Commissioner.

Chicago, Feb. 5.—Attorney General Moody, who is here, said today in answer to questions:

"I notice that the attorneys for the packers have produced evidence to the effect that Commissioner Garfield said he would not give the department of justice any information he secured from the packers. If he ever said that he certainly kept his word, for the department of justice never received any information from him. Neither did we receive information from the President nor any of the subordinate officials of the department of corporations."

STRIKE ANTICIPATED OF COAL MINERS.

Indianapolis, Feb. 5.—It was intimated at the international headquarters of the United Mine Workers of America today that before the adjournment of the present session of the executive body, Secretary Treasurer W. B. Wilson will be instructed to prepare a formal strike order effective April 1, in order to avoid the necessity of re-assembling the board after the adjournment of the present session.

COLD WAVE OVER MANY OF STATES

Zero Weather and Snow Cover Vast Territory.

26 BELOW IN WISCONSIN

Storm Drifting Southward--Missouri Among Blizzard Suffering States.

Milwaukee, Feb. 5.—Wisconsin is experiencing the coldest weather of the winter, the temperature ranging from one below in Milwaukee to 26 below in Superior.

Snow in Ohio.

Cleveland, Feb. 5.—Snow has been falling throughout northern Ohio for more than 24 hours. Traffic on many steam and electric roads is seriously delayed today.

Way Below Zero.

Des Moines, Ia., Feb. 5.—The cold wave in Iowa reached a maximum at Charles City where the mercury dropped to 12 degrees below zero. At Des Moines it is five below. A high wind has caused much suffering to the stock.

Cold Today.

St. Louis, Feb. 5.—The blizzard of yesterday gave place to a clear cold day today. The temperature is six above and about four inches of snow are on the ground.

Cold in Missouri.

Kansas City, Feb. 5.—A cold wave was general in this part of the southwest last night, and is moving towards the Gulf according to the local weather bureau. Zero weather prevailed in northern Missouri and through Kansas. At Amarillo, Texas, it was eight above and at Ft. Worth 14 below. Moderating weather is predicted for the next twenty-four hours.

JANUARY WEATHER.

Santa Fe Has Sunshine Every Day During First Month of the Year.

According to the report of the U. S. Weather Bureau in this city, there was not a single day in January that was without sunshine. Only one day was clouded while thirteen days were partly cloudy and 17 days were clear.

There were thirteen days that had 100 per cent of sunshine. The precipitation for the entire month amounted to only .35 of an inch and the greatest precipitation for any 24 hours was only .17 of an inch. The deficiency in precipitation since New Year is .24 of an inch.

The lowest temperature recorded during the month was zero while the highest was 52 degrees in the shade and 79 degrees in the sun. The mean maximum temperature was 40 degrees, and the mean minimum 17.5 degrees, while the deficiency in temperature since New Year amounts to nine degrees.

The greatest daily range in temperature was only 33 degrees on January 23, and the least was 12 degrees on January 15.

The prevailing direction of the wind was from the northeast and the total movement was only 5,840 miles or 7.3 miles an hour. The maximum velocity was only 34 miles an hour and was noted on January 19, coming from the southwest. Not a single fog was observed and no snow is reported on the level.

The mean relative humidity was 50 degrees, at 6 a. m., 61 per cent and at 6 p. m. 56 per cent. The sunshine for the month amounted to 76 per cent, much below the average for January, but far above what it was anywhere else.

MANY KILLED.

Bomb Explodes and at Least Twelve Persons Lose Lives in Building.

Berlin, Feb. 5.—The Lokal Anzeiger today prints a dispatch from Kattowitz, Russian Silesia, announcing that a private house at Silce, across the Russian frontier, has been destroyed by the explosion of a bomb. The bodies of twelve persons can be seen in the ruins and it is believed many others were killed.

JEWISH PROFESSOR.

First Member of Creed to Serve in Russian University Approved Today.

St. Petersburg, Feb. 5.—A Jew Professor Ravitz, has been appointed an instructor at Moscow University with the sanction of the minister of the interior. Hitherto Jews have not been allowed to hold faculty positions in Russia.

Donnelly came to Cincinnati with Secretary Call to settle the strike of the butchers at the Abbot Company. Foul play is suspected.

SOCORRO COUNTY'S STEADY ADVANCE

W. E. Martin Tells of Numerous Improvements.

MANY SETTLERS EXPECTED

Electric Plant to Be Built and New Bank Opens Soon--Bohemian Colony.

W. E. Martin, the efficient and popular clerk of the Third Judicial District Court, and who has represented the county of Socorro four terms in the Council and House of Representatives of the Legislative Assembly, with great credit and ability, was a visitor to the Capital City last week.

Mr. Martin is a firm believer in the future of New Mexico and in particular of his home county and town of Socorro. Regarding them he said:

"Both county and town are rapidly forging ahead, not booming, but making steady growths. Socorro County is principally known for its mines and its livestock, both of which it has in generous quantities. Although the winter season is usually a dull time in mining fields there is at present a large amount of work being done in the Magdalena mining district.

"The town of Magdalena, aside from the cattle and sheep shipments, is becoming a good business point for all the western part of Socorro County.

Steady Growth.

"My home town is growing steadily. Max Kirchman is installing his Bohemian Colony and is meeting with success. He has sent out thousands of circulars asking for subscriptions in forwarding his project.

"As he represented to have sufficient backing, he has been criticized by many for sending out such circulars. It is only fair to him to state that he does so because he has secured options on so much property of value that he thought local people might wish a chance to invest and if he refused them the opportunity, they would resent it. Mr. Kirchman has secured options on the fire clay works, the brewery and ice plant, and Greenwald's roller mills. He has also bought valuable real estate and will build a hotel and a large mercantile store. He is making arrangements to drill for artesian water with which to irrigate the uplands. This colony will be a great thing for Socorro and the county generally."

"An irrigation company composed of P. J. Savage, M. Cooney, W. Hamill and Robert Collins is sinking a well, putting in an eight inch pipe and an improved pumping plant. This company expects to irrigate about 15 acres of land three-quarters of a mile above Socorro and plant the entire farm in vegetables for which there is always a demand.

Modern Improvements.

"We will also have an electric light plant in operation as soon as Manager Frank Owen of Santa Fe can come and place the machinery. The company to operate the plant has been organized and the necessary money has already been subscribed and paid in.

"Our telephone system under the management of T. J. Mathews is doing a good business and now has 150 local phones. Long distance connections have been installed to Kelly and Magdalena on the west, to San Antonio, eleven miles south, and to Carthage twenty-two miles east. Connections via Albuquerque, and Santa Fe, will soon be completed to Denver.

"C. T. Brown, a mining expert, and W. H. Byerts, one of our well known citizens, are improving their properties. Price brothers expect to open a new bank soon. Abeyta and Terry is the firm name of a new real estate company. Local businesses have taken quite a little spurt and the town has every indication of a rapid advancement.

"From reports I have received, live stock generally over the county is in good condition despite some severe weather this winter. The county is well stocked with good cattle and the sheep are in fine shape. The range never looked more promising as the heavy snows of the past month, make the crop of grass assured by lambing time. Residents of Socorro County feel that the dawn of general prosperity is at hand and personally I think they are right."

SERIOUSLY INJURED.

While making an experiment in the laboratory of science hall in Albuquerque, yesterday, Dr. G. W. Tight, president of the University of New Mexico was seriously injured by an explosion of gasoline. The entire covering of the scalp on the right side of his head was torn away, the ear and flesh being laid against the back of the head. It is not known just how the accident happened.

COMMISSIONER GARFIELD AND THE BEEF TRUST.

A series of complications, which may result in a verdict against the government, has developed in the trial of the Chicago packers for violations of the interstate commerce law. Louis C. Krauthoff, former general counsel for Armour & Company, gave evidence that the Chicago packers were promised immunity from prosecution by Commissioner of Corporations James R. Garfield; that under this promise they consented to his scrutiny of their books and private records, and that after having enjoyed the confidence of the packers while he gleaned the information, he, Garfield, showed bad faith by turning the evidence over to the Department of Justice for criminal prosecution. Mr. Krauthoff further said: "I then asked him, Mr. Garfield, what use the President of the United States wished to make of the information?" He answered with emphasis, that of course the President of a great nation would not allow anything to happen to which any one could take exception. When the witness was first asked to tell what took place at the conference with Mr. Garfield, that official leaned over quickly and spoke to District Attorney Morrison, who immediately objected vigorously to the admission of the evidence. Judge Humphrey, after listening respectfully while the attorney spoke, said: "The jury is entitled to the facts in the case." The witness also stated that Mr. Garfield gave him to understand that the President would not use the evidence in a criminal prosecution, but that he would simply embody it in his message to Congress in support of certain remedial legislation that might be desired and on that understanding, he, the witness, had advised his clients to give Mr. Garfield access to their records. As the case is still pending, the New Mexican will give no opinion. On the other side District Attorney Morrison said to newspaper men: "We are not through with this case yet. We may have witnesses who will give a different view of the immunity plea. Besides, there was much allowed in the evidence that I do not think relevant to the issue. It is too early to make predictions. We have a long way to travel yet." And so the case stands.

GETTING AFTER THE CIGARETTE.

The House of Representatives of the Ohio legislature has passed a bill, prohibiting the manufacture and sale of cigarettes in the Buckeye State. It is believed that the Senate will concur and that the Governor will approve the measure. This is a great step forward in the right direction. A bill of similar import was introduced in the Thirty-sixth Legislative Assembly of this Territory, but failed to pass. Nevertheless, the time is coming, and that rapidly, when such a measure will meet with approval in a New Mexico assembly. The adulterated and drugged cigarettes, which are now the order of the day, are of detriment, especially to boys and young men under twenty. Their manufacture and sale should be prohibited because such would be for the best interest of the commonwealth.

Cigar and cigarette manufacturers have made vast sums of money for many a long year and they can afford to go out of the business, one and all. For, at any rate, the good of the community should be placed far above the good of any set of manufacturers, especially when the manufactured articles are proven to be unwholesome and detrimental.

The town of Socorro has grown rapidly in population and in importance of late. During the past five years, it has gained nearly 1,000 people. It is estimated that its population now is 2,500, that is, in the town and the precincts constituting it. One indication of its steady growth is the fact, that it now has 156 telephones in use and that a company has been organized which will supply electric power and light and that within the next few months. Straws of this kind show conclusively which way the wind blows in the Gem City.

GIVE US THE AMERICAN WAY.

The attempt of Congress to force the union of New Mexico and Arizona into one state is an innovation on all former legislation for the admission of states into the Union.

Before the Civil War, the contest was between free and slave states, each of the former watching that the latter should not obtain a preponderance in Congress; and the latter doing their utmost to prevent their antagonists from gaining any advantage over them; hence, it was sought to balance the admission of free territories as free states with the admission of slave territories as slave states. Under the conditions then existing, such contention was inevitable; but with the abolition of slavery, those conditions and contentions passed away.

Since then the struggle has been between the two great national parties, each endeavoring to reap as much political advantage as possible from such admissions. Except in the case of Kansas, which was bitterly contested by the free state men and the slave owners, when the corrupt administration of Buchanan interfered in the interests of slavery, the people have been given the utmost freedom in deciding their future, without the intervention of either the legislative or executive branch of the government. All this is reversed in the present case. The Foraker amendment is an effort to give each territory the right to decide for itself on the matter; and Senator Foraker's reputation as a broad minded patriotic statesman is too well established to suffer any diminution from the reckless statements of yellow newspapers. His plan is the straightforward, American way to settle the dispute; but the joint statehood boomers do not want that plan, it is too fair and equitable. They talk very loudly of their confidence in the people of New Mexico, but they fear to trust them to decide for themselves whether they desire to be joined with Arizona or not. On the other hand, the New Mexican is willing and anxious to trust the people for whose best interests it has worked for over forty years to decide this and every other question that may come before them, in their own way; this the joint statehood boomers are afraid to do; that is the difference between the New Mexican and them. The people may be relied on to judge correctly on the merits of their true friends, and the yellow papers that are merely trying to deceive them; the New Mexican will abide cheerfully by their decision.

SANTA FE COUNTY TAX MATTERS.

On account of poor bookkeeping and probably something else, the county of Santa Fe for several years prior to the removal of a defaulting county treasurer in 1903, had not received the tax collections through court process, that it was entitled to. The sums involved are not large, it is believed, but nothing of the kind should ever be allowed to occur in accounting for county funds. A better system of accounting is now in force and Traveling Auditor Safford is giving the subject careful attention. The policy that obtained a few years ago in making settlements with delinquent tax payers at 52 cents on the dollar was inimical to the public interests and unfair to the honest tax payers. No more of it should be tolerated. This policy set a premium for tax dodgers and acted as a fine and punishment upon the honest tax payers. The county commissioners, the district attorney and the collector, in all delinquent tax collections and suits, should not make compromises or rebates in settlement of delinquent taxes. They should insist that what is lawfully due the county in such matters should be promptly collected and properly accounted for. From information received the financial books of the county in the collector's and treasurer's office, for the past two years have been kept better and more correctly than ever before. The new system inaugurated by Auditor Safford has worked better and more satisfactorily than any heretofore existing since the creation of the county.

The antics of the Albuquerque Fakir Journal are becoming funnier daily. During the 1904 campaign, the paper deserted the cause of ex-Delegate B. S. Rodey and yelped at him whenever and wherever it possibly could. Since then, times have changed, and the paper is now yelping for him. In the 1904 campaign, it attempted to support Delegate W. H. Andrews, but failed ignominiously, as the vote in Albuquerque and in Bernalillo County polled at the November, 1904, election clearly indicates. Delegate Andrews received only about 175 votes in Albuquerque and only about 750 in the county of Bernalillo. The paper now yelps at the Delegate because it found out last year that he could not be used as a cat's paw to haul the chestnuts out of the fire for the land ring and the money changers who control that paper and whose schemes it represents. This is the long and short of it.

Good may come even out of the beef trust. That outfit is fighting the proposition to reduce the duty on hides. Its managers are evidently of the opinion that the cattle raisers of the arid west cannot stand any more robbery.

There is one excellent reason why Japan will not have a chance to buy the Philippines. Uncle Sam does not want to sell them, despite the solemn warnings of the anti-imperialists.

NEW MEXICO CONDITIONS AS THEY ARE.

The best estimates agree that New Mexico today contains 300,000 people, and that the real value of its property is nearly \$300,000,000. This, therefore, cannot be called a poor Territory. The census also shows that the proportion of foreign born citizens is smaller in the Sunshine Territory than in any of the states of the Union. The Congressmen, Senators and newspapers opposed to this Territory who throw aspersions on it, do it either for their own purposes or through ignorance. In either case their attacks are absolutely unjustified and unfair. Even cutting the real value of the taxable property to one-half, namely, to \$150,000,000 New Mexico need not be ashamed. That sum makes a very good showing for 300,000 people. There are no millionaires here; the wealth is pretty well distributed and while there are many, comparatively speaking, poor people yet they own their own little farms and have their own land holdings upon which they make a contented and fair living. This state of affairs compares more than favorably with that now existing in the richest states of the Union where there are paupers by the tens of thousands on one hand and a few many times millionaires on the other.

Delegate W. H. Andrews is hard at work to induce the Fifty-ninth Congress to pass a measure introduced by him and having for its object the establishment of a port of entry and customs collection office in Albuquerque. The imports and exports of that town may not be large at present, but there is hope for the future. At any rate, the establishment of a port of entry there will help the town and advantage this Territory. The New Mexican hopes that the Delegate will be successful.

Nevertheless and notwithstanding, the insurgents in the National House of Representatives are Republicans. Ex-Delegate Rodey and the Albuquerque Fakir Journal say that they are not, but the facts are against that combination.

U. S. Senator Chauncey M. Depew, of New York, has not yet announced his resignation from the directorates of the seventy-nine corporations of which he is a member. Hurry Senator, the people are becoming tired.

Between the coal companies and the railroads the coal consumers of New Mexico are having a rather dear time of it.

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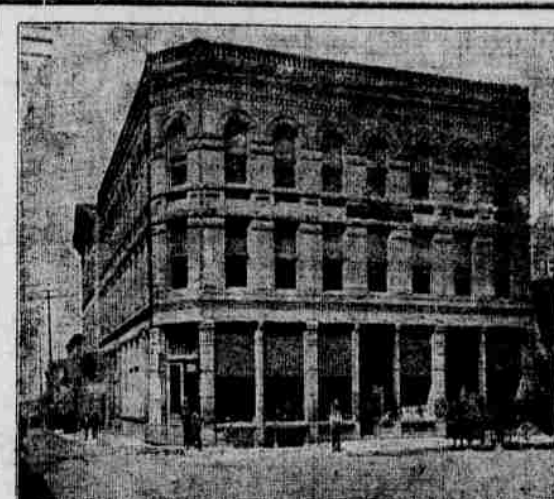

MINES AND MINING.

Lincoln County.

George G. Thorp last week sold the Honeybee Copper mine at Jicarilla, to Edward Fox, who has interested Chicago capital in the further development of the property. An eighty horse power steam hoist and air compressor will be among the improvements. The same company also intends to let a contract for 300 feet of development work on the Hawkeye.

The snow drifts at Parsons having partially disappeared, preparations are being made to resume work at the Parsons mill. A fine body of gold ore has been developed and will furnish the milling ore during the spring and summer.

Rio Arriba County.

Work is to be resumed in spring on the Dillon tunnel at Bromide.

N. T. Hall is running a tunnel to cut the ore in the Sixteen to One in the Bromide District.

Mining operations have not been resumed on the Tampa at Bromide but the pumps are kept running to keep the shaft free from water.

The new owners of the Minneapolis in the Bromide district have resumed work in the main shaft and are developing a good body of ore.

R. Cole is sinking to the 300 foot level on the Sardine in the Bromide district, following the ore body struck in the beginning of his operations.

R. W. Tandy is working the Red Fishure group at Bromide, despite the deep snow and cold weather.

J. T. Blanton who recently bought the Stone in Eureka gulch, is doing extensive development work.

C. E. Belden in doing assessment work on the Atlantic Mining Company's claims at Hopewell encountered a good sized vein of copper ore in the tunnel he is driving.

J. T. McKinley who a few weeks ago relocated the Bear Mountain property at Hopewell is doing considerable development work.

The work of unwatering the North American at Lordsburg, was completed last week and the work of sinking on the main shaft was resumed. The new pump is handling the water without difficulty. The shaft will be sunk to a depth of 500 feet.

T. W. Greer last week shipped four carloads of ore from the Aurora, near Lordsburg. The shipment was made to the smelter at El Paso, Texas.

Jacob Zimmerman, an old time miner in southwestern New Mexico died last week at Pyramid of pneumonia.

T. A. Lister has taken an option on the Robert E. Lee mine near Lordsburg. He has put ten men to work on the property and is sinking a shaft to follow a surface lead.

The Bonney Company closed down last week on its mines near Lordsburg. The reason given is that the hoist in the main shaft has been discovered to be unsafe and work will not be resumed until a new hoist is installed, which will take fully a month.

Work has been suspended on the mill of the International Gold Mining and Milling Company at Malone and at present it does not look as if the mill would be completed although several rich stringers in the mines lead to the belief that they contain good ore bodies. Michigan parties are interested in the property.

The Burro Mountain Copper Company has installed a three hundred light capacity generator and engine at Leopold. The plant includes a marble switch board used for lighting the mines, mill and other buildings of the company.

Since New Year fifty new locations have been made in the Apache district

and filed with the probate clerk. A number of these claims are being developed, giving new life to this old district. The ore bodies lie in limestone at or near a porphyry contact. The ore is a silver copper carbonate. The Apache group has been producing steadily for years.

C. M. Park & Company, leasing on the Hidden Treasure at Chloride Flat have uncovered a pocket of high grade ore which they are shipping. Manuel Taylor is taking good ore from the same property and J. W. Fleming is encountering good ore in a lease on the Hidden Treasure. Wayne Whitehill and Robert H. Bell are taking out good ore from the leases on the same group.

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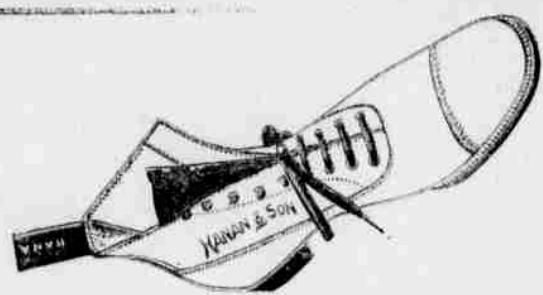
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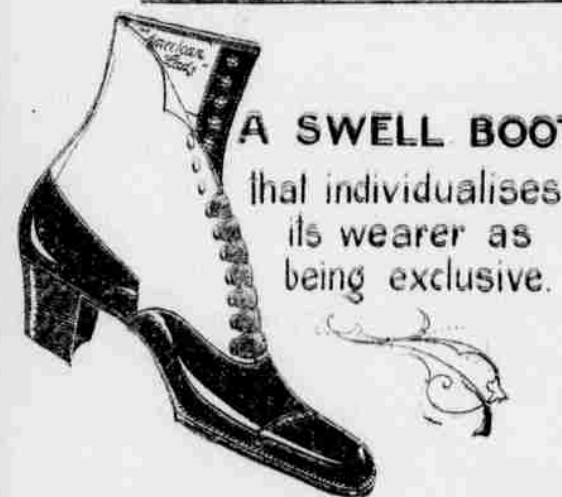

NEW MEXICO HAPPENINGS

The sale of property for delinquent taxes of 1904, is now going on in Las Vegas and will be continued until the 12th of the present month.

Dr. A. B. Wascome died last week at his home near Roswell. Dr. Wascome was well known throughout the entire county of Chaves.

Mrs. J. B. Daily died last week at Roswell, while sleeping in a chair. Heart disease was the cause of her demise. She leaves a husband and one daughter.

Work on the new school house for Greenfield in Chaves County, is being pushed and the building will be finished soon. The contract price is \$13,349.

The strike of coal miners all over the country that is expected to start soon, will not effect the Gallup, McKinley County mines, as the miners there are not organized.

The county commissioners of Chaves County have authorized the construction of a bridge across the Rio Felix, at a point near the town of Hagerman, Chaves County.

Mrs. J. J. Deiss, died recently at her home in Roswell, of consumption. She had been a sufferer for many years. A husband and one child remain to mourn her demise.

M. M. Dutcher, city circulator on the Albuquerque Citizen, was severely bitten, in the Duke City, on last Thursday, by a vicious dog. Santa Fe is not the only place that has trouble with dogs.

The Hagerman Improvement Company has applied for a charter and will soon commence work on the erection of a two story brick building to be occupied by it. As the name implies, the company will work for the improvement of Hagerman, Chaves County.

Last week while George Kind, of Taylor, Colfax County, was driving from Dawson to Maxwell City, his team ran away, throwing himself and the other occupant of the vehicle to the ground. Both men were badly bruised and scarred but otherwise they are all right.

J. C. Adams, secretary of the National Fraternal Sanitarium Association, which is to locate a sanitarium in Las Vegas, writes to Las Vegas people, that he has issued calls to all the societies, that have given it as their intention to contribute to the support of the institution for the funds necessary for the erection and equipment of the sanitarium.

The Santa Fe Railway track between Gallup and Puerco, for a distance of a hundred miles, is soon to be taken up and new rails and ties are to be put down and the old rails will be replaced with 85 pound steel. Roadmaster Hutchinson of that division of the road was in Albuquerque Thursday for the purpose of securing workmen to start on the relaying of the tracks and so far has secured about one hundred laborers.

TO "PEN."

Jap Clark Placed in Safe Keeping
By Deputy Sheriff of Torrance
County.

James C. Chaves, deputy sheriff of Torrance County, today took "Jap" Clark, a cowboy formerly employed by the Block outfit of the El Capitan Land and Cattle Company, who is awaiting the action of the grand jury of Torrance County, on a charge of shooting and killing James Chase, a former deputy sheriff, in Torrance, last April, to the territorial penitentiary for safe keeping. Clark is being held without bond but will receive a re-hearing in the habeas corpus proceedings brought by his attorneys before Judge Edward A. Mann, of the Sixth Judicial District Court, at Estancia, February 25.

Clark was seen by a New Mexican reporter at the jail and said:

"I am still hopeful that I shall secure bond at the hearing in Estancia, and if I do I will be able to get back to work in time for the spring round-up. I do not object to being sent to the penitentiary as I made friends of the guards there before and know that I will receive the best of treatment. However, I am tired of confinement and hope that it will soon be ended."

SUPREME COURT.

Thirteen Decisions Handed Down During This Session—Cases Heard on Schedule.

The recent session of the Supreme Court which was adjourned until February 28, after the meeting Friday afternoon, has been a very busy one. Just before adjournment the court affirmed the decision of the lower court in case number 1031, entitled Elias Chaves and Emilia Chaves de Armijo, appellees, vs. Benjamin Myer, adm., and Maria A. de Lucero and J. Blas Lucero, appellants. Burkhardt was the attorney for the appellees and Childers was attorney for the appellants.

During the sessions the court handed down decisions in 13 cases, 25 cases were argued and submitted and were taken under advisement; motions for re-hearing were denied in four cases and three cases were dismissed. Among the cases docketed, only four were continued for hearing at later dates.

This is a very creditable showing and proves that the members of the court are not given to idleness. The cases of the court were taken up and heard according to the dates on the docket except in a few instances where the attorneys asked for further time.

GREAT PROSPECTS.

Malaquias Martinez of Taos, Says Conditions Could Not Be More Favorable.

Malaquias Martinez, member of the board of penitentiary commissioners, arrived in the Capital yesterday from his home at Taos and will spend several days here visiting friends and attending to business. Mr. Martinez said that everything was prosperous in and around Taos and that the prospects were good for a season of plenty.

"Sheep and cattle are doing fine despite some rather cold weather," he said, "The range is in the best condition, better than it has been for years, and this bids fair to be a banner year for livestock in all branches. The heavy snows assure plenty of water by lambing time and if the weather is not severe then, lambing will be very good and the increase great. I never saw conditions more favorable for everything than they are at present."

MEETING OF BOARD OF EDUCATION HELD TODAY.

The Board of Education held a meeting at 3 o'clock this afternoon in the office of Judge N. B. Laughlin which was an adjourned session from Saturday. At Saturday's meeting the board adopted the plans and specifications submitted by I. H. Rapp, architect, of Las Vegas, for the new school building in the first ward. The board ordered a call for bids for the erection of this building published and this appears for the first time in today's New Mexican. The plans and specifications prepared by the city engineer for cement sidewalks in front of the new high school building were also adopted. The contention was that should brick sidewalks be selected, it would be some time before the material could be secured.

The new school building for the first ward will contain two good-sized class rooms, fitted up in modern manner and with all conveniences. The structure will be sufficiently ornamental to add considerably to the appearance of the first ward. It will be one story high with slanting roof. It is thought that the bids will be in the neighborhood of \$5,000 for its erection.

LAND COMMISSION IN SESSION TODAY.

The United States land commission was in session this afternoon in the office of Commissioner of Public Lands A. A. Keen, Governor Herbert J. Hagerman attended the session. Other members of the board are Attorney General George W. Prichard, Surveyor General M. O. Llewellyn and Commissioner of Public Lands A. A. Keen, ex-officio secretary.
