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STATEHOOD BILL TO CONFERENCE

House Adopts Special Rule Vote 175 to 150.

SENATE ACTS TOMORROW

Humorous Speeches and Severe Scoring of Party Organization, Features.

Special to the New Mexican.
Washington, March 22.—After a hot debate, the previous question for the adoption of the rule for a vote upon the motion to send the Hamilton joint statehood bill as it came from the Senate to a conference committee, passed by a vote of 171 ayes and 140 nays. On adoption of the motion itself the vote stood 175 ayes and 150 nays. The motion made by Representative Williams of Minnesota, to eliminate New Mexico and Arizona from the provisions of the bill was laid upon the table on motion of Dalzell, of Pennsylvania. The vote to table the resolution was 246 ayes and 91 nays. The House confers named by Speaker Cannon are: Representative Hamilton of Michigan, Representative Brick, of Indiana, and Representative Moon, of Tennessee.
Senator Beveridge Insists on Senate Amendment.
Special to the New Mexican.
Washington, March 22.—In the United States Senate today, Senator Beveridge insisted upon the Senate amendment to the Hamilton joint statehood bill. The Vice President appointed a committee of conference on the Foraker amendment. On motion of Senator Foraker the appointment of a conference committee upon the bill itself was deferred until tomorrow at the morning hour.

Mr. Bede's Humorous Speech.
Washington, March 22.—Mr. Bede, of Minnesota, made a very humorous speech in the House today on the statehood question. He said he supported the administration on everything save statehood and whipping post bills. He praised the President for allowing a member of the House, (Longworth) to break into his private family without sounding the alarm, and also that when he gave his daughter away, he gave her to a good American instead of a degenerate foreign prince.
Statehood Question Was First Business
Washington, March 22.—A special rule sending the statehood bill to a conference was brought into the House by Dalzell, as the first business of that body today. Dalzell demanded a previous question and on a rising vote 149 voted for it and 124 against it. The roll call was secured on the demand of the minority leader Williams.
A regular roll call resulted in the ordering of the previous question. The vote being 171 to 140. Mr. Dalzell was recognized for twenty minutes and began an explanation of the reason for the special rule.
Republicans Who Voted With Democrats.
The Republicans who voted with the Democrats against the ordering of the previous question were: Adams, Babcock, Bannon, Bede, Beider, Bonyage, Brown, Calderhead, Cushman, Davidson, Esch, French, Fulkerson, Giffett, of California, Goellet, Gronlaur, Hayes, Herman, Howell, Humphrey, of Washington, Jones, of Washington, Kennedy, Knowland, McKinley, McCreary, McLaachan, McMorran, Marshall, Mondell, Mudd, Murphy, Needham, Tyn-dall, Smith of California, Wachter, Welborn, Woodyard, and Young.

Mr. Williams Wanted Confers Instructed for Senate Amendment.
Washington, March 22.—Mr. Williams tried to have the statehood confers instructed to concur in the Senate amendment omitting Arizona and New Mexico, but was defeated on a point of order. The legislative appropriation bill was then taken up.
A Choice of Only Three Ways.
"There were," said Dalzell, "but three ways to dispose of the bill. One, was to send it to the committee; another was to ask for the unanimous consent of the House and send it to a conference—this was impossible. The third method which was adopted, was to send the bill to a conference direct and there could be no just criticism if an orderly course were pursued. In opposition, Mr. Williams pointed out that the vote to adopt the special rule was a vote against a concurrence in the Senate amendments. Ordinarily under the rules the House motion to concur would be in order.

An Invocation of God's Mercy.
"The usual course of procedure this morning ought to be reversed," he continued. "We ought to have had first a reading and approval journal, then moving the previous question on this rule, and then the invocation by the chaplain for the mercy of God upon this Republican House." (Applause)

STILL AFTER MUTUAL LIFE.

Requisitions for Information Served on Members of Old Board of Trustees.

New York, March 22.—It was announced today that within the past few days every member of the old board of trustees of the Mutual Life Insurance Company, including all those who served between the dates of January 1, 1900 and December 31, 1905, has been served with a requisition for information as drastic as the Mutual's harshest critics could well demand. J. H. Choate is the author of the requisition and it is said to be issued with the unqualified approval of the Truesdale committee and of the Mutual's legislative administration.

CARS IN SNOW DRIFTS.

All Traffic Abandoned on Cleveland Southwestern Traction Line in Ohio.

Wooster, Ohio, March 22.—All traffic over the Cleveland & Southwestern Traction line between this city and Boca, a distance of forty miles, has been abandoned because of snow drifts in the cuts. Three cars with fifty passengers have been stuck by deep drifts five miles north of this city since 5 o'clock last night. Many men are shoveling the snow but a steady wind blows it back almost as fast as they can get it out.

COLLISION AT SEA.

Steamer and Schooner Meet Off Cape Henry Coast With Disastrous Results.

Cape Henry, March 22.—The German steamer San Miguel, bound from Baltimore for Port Maria and the schooner Ralph M. Hayward from New York, collided twelve miles off the coast here last night. The schooner is leaking badly and is beached at the Lynn Haven inlet. The San Miguel proceeded to Baltimore today. Her main mast was carried away, her deck trimmings and stack dismantled and a hole stove in her side near the water line.

Severely Arraigned Party Organization
—A severe castigation of the party organization was made by Mr. Humphrey of Washington, and Mr. Fulkerson of Missouri, followed along the same lines. Babcock predicted that today's action of sending the bill to a conference was the last that would be heard of it during the present session. He spoke in defense of the method made use of by Grosvenor, after which Mr. Bede kept the House in convulsions. He was against the rule. Mr. DeArmond of Missouri, spoke briefly and Mr. Dalzell closed.

Senate Confers to Be Selected Tomorrow.

Washington, March 22.—When the statehood bill was received from the House, Senator Beveridge, chairman of the committee on territories, moved that the Senate insist upon its amendments and agree to a request for a conference. Senator Foraker moved to amend the motion to provide that the Senate instead of the Vice President appoint the confers. The adoption of Foraker's motion would allow the opponents of joint statehood to name the confers. Upon Foraker's suggestion the whole matter went over until tomorrow.

Wants Larger Commerce Commission and Better Pay.

Washington, March 22.—The railroad rate bill was taken up and Senator Lodge addressed the Senate in support of his amendment, providing for the displacement of the present Interstate Commerce Commission by one of a larger number of commissioners and with longer terms of office and better pay.

Can Control Only Railroad Corporations.

Washington, March 22.—The conclusion to be reported to the House by the judiciary committee, will be to the effect that there is no constitutional authority for federal control of insurance or other state corporations, other than railroads. The report has been drafted by Chairman Jenkins of the committee, and has been turned over to the members of the committee for their perusal. An unofficial poll of the members of the committee has shown that with scarcely an exception they concur in the correctness of this conclusion. The report of Mr. Jenkins may therefore be taken as the basis of the answer the committee is to make to the House in compliance with the instructions of that committee.

Extends Time for Opening Shoshone Reservation.

Washington, March 22.—When the Senate met today the joint resolution extending from June 15, to August 15, 1906, the time for the opening of the ceded portion of the Shoshone Wind River Reservation in Wyoming was passed.

BOLD PLANS OF RUSSIAN WORKMEN

Some Favor Another General Strike in April.

TO PART RADICAL PARTIES

Will Send Delegates Secretly to Finland—Government Is Preparing.

St. Petersburg, March 22.—Animation among the workmen's organizations involves a bold plan to part the social Democrats, revolutionists and other radical elements and to send delegates elected secretly to a meeting to be called at some place in Finland, early in April, at which an ultimate plan of operation will be decided upon. A division of sentiment exists among the leaders. Some favor calling a general strike in the middle of April for the purpose of forcing the lower house of parliament to demand an immediate convocation of a constitutional assembly on a basis of universal suffrage but the more audacious, aim at setting up a provisional government. The authorities here who perfectly realize that something big is in stage of preparation and the interior minister, Durnovo has sent circulars to the governors general instructing them to take the "necessary measures" to meet the movement.

Manifesto Not Pleasing.

St. Petersburg, March 22.—The imperial manifesto and ukases of March 8, which incorporate in the fundamental law of the empire the provisions for a national assembly in Russia promised in the manifesto last fall are disappointing in many respects. One of the chief disappointments is the fact that they constitute neither a constitution nor a "bill of rights" for the Russian people. Although they create a popular assembly, the promises granted are so hedged about with restrictions that it will be more a parliament in name than in fact. The Emperor also retains the power to revoke what has already been granted. These things constitute the great victory, which the Russian people have won. They at least have an authoritative medium through which they can be heard, and it is in this assembly that the great historical struggle against privilege will be fought out.

MURDERER HANGED.

Gileppi Marmo, an Italian, Pays Penalty for Murder, After Trying to Escape.

Newark, N. J., March 22.—Gileppi Marmo, an Italian, was hanged here today for the murder of his brother-in-law. The murder followed a quarrel between the two men. The struggle which Marmo made to save himself from the gallows during the past two years was a most remarkable one. Not only did he exhaust all methods known to law but on at least two occasions he made sensational attempts to escape from confinement. One of these was made in the court room after he had been sentenced to death for the third time. He suddenly drew an iron bar from the leg of his trousers and made a break for freedom. He was overpowered after one court officer was severely injured.

CAME AS A CHALLENGE.

Russia Offends Germany and Hence Moroccan Conference Once More Fails to Agree.

Berlin, March 22.—Russia's instructions to Count Cassini, her chief delegate to the Moroccan conference, have affected the German government most unfavorably and came almost as a challenge at the moment that a settlement of questions in dispute at Algiers seemed certain. It is not improbable that the attitude of both the French and German delegates will be influenced thereby. Dispatches from Algiers today indicate an unyielding disposition on either side of the question of whether or not French and Spanish inspectors of police shall co-operate in each harbor or shall consist of four, exclusively French and four exclusively Spanish inspectors.

MRS. HUNTINGTON SECURES DIVORCE

Question of Alimony Not Presented—She Alleged Her Husband Deserted Her.

San Francisco, March 22.—Superior Judge Graham today granted a divorce to Mrs. Henry E. Huntington on the ground of desertion. No request for alimony was made and her attorneys refuse to state whether or not there was a money settlement.

LIST OF DEAD AND MISSING, 48

As Result of Denver & Rio Grande Wreck.

OPERATOR LIVELY FOUND

Is at Home in Munsfordville Kentucky, But Willing to Return.

Denver, March 22.—S. Frank Lively, the Swallows operator, whose unfortunate nap caused the collision at Adobe last Friday, is at his home at Munsfordville, Kentucky, according to a dispatch received here today. He says he went home to rest and would return to Colorado if wanted. It is becoming more certain that the death list in the accident was between 40 and 50. The list of those unaccounted for at the Denver & Rio Grande headquarters shows that 48 are missing. Undoubtedly a number of those unaccounted for are alive but it is also believed many of them are dead.

CONFERENCE CONTINUES

Behind Closed Doors—Operators and Miners Are Trying to Arbitrate.

Indianapolis, Ind., March 22.—The joint scale committee of the joint conference of coal operators and miners of the central competitive field and southwest district again went into executive session today to continue the contest over the wage scale. The situation before the doors closed on the two meetings was the same that confronted the operators and miners when the former conference was adjourned February 24, following a disagreement. The two sides were apparently no nearer a settlement today. It is admitted by both sides that should there be an agreement at this time the wage scale agreed upon would be in force for one year only.

French Miners Smash Wagons.

Lens, France, March 22.—Reports from the various mining centers show that the strike is now general. Some disorders occurred and a number of company wagons were smashed. Twelve hundred additional troops have arrived here and the whole district is now occupied by the military forces.

CONFESSES TO MURDER.

Attendant in Arizona Insane Asylum Says She Forced Patient to Take Turpentine.

Phoenix, Ariz., March 22.—The coroner's jury which investigated the death of Sallie Jones an inmate of the insane asylum here, returned a verdict yesterday stating that the deceased came to her death as the result of turpentine poisoning administered by Hallie Jenks, an attendant. The attendant was arrested and was arraigned today. Her arrest was ordered by the district attorney on the strength of a signed statement which he claims she made, saying that she held the deceased down upon a bunk in the cell and stuffed her mouth full of rags saturated with turpentine. It is also asserted that turpentine was poured in the woman's mouth.

PRESIDENT NOT PLEASED

With Decision in Packer's Case Rendered in Chicago Yesterday—Held Conference.

Washington, March 22.—President Roosevelt held an extended conference today with Attorney General Moody, Secretary of War Taft and James G. Garfield concerning the adverse decision rendered in Chicago, yesterday by Judge Humphreys in the beef packers' case. The decision relieves the individual officials of the packers' corporation from prosecution. An effort to appeal the case will probably be made, but in any event a bill will be introduced in Congress to provide a remedy for such cases. It provides that in all criminal prosecutions the United States shall have the same right to appeal that is given the defendant.

TRAINS COLLIDE

Webster City, Iowa, March 22.—Fast passenger train No. 1 on the Illinois Central railroad due here at 3:05 o'clock this morning collided with a freight one mile west of Duncombe. Fireman William Cutting was killed and a dozen others badly, but not fatally injured. A passenger coach was turned into a temporary hospital where the injured were cared for pending their being brought to a hospital here.

COURT NEWS.

Macpherson Enters a Plea of Not Guilty to Indictment for Libel.

The District Court of the First Judicial District of the County of Santa Fe met this morning at 9 o'clock, with Judge John R. McFie presiding. The following business was transacted:

In the case of the Territory vs. Andres Allre, charged with assault and battery upon Cecilia Sanchez, the defendant pleaded guilty and a fine of \$5 was imposed by the court.

On account of a technical error in the indictment against Jose Antonio Maestas, who was charged with having torn down a fence on the land of Benito Maestas, the case was dismissed. In drawing up the indictment the word unlawfully was omitted without which the action of tearing down the fence constituted no criminal offense. At the conclusion of this case the court adjourned until 2 o'clock this afternoon.

Before the adjournment of court last evening, a demurrer to the form of indictment was filed by Attorney Benjamin M. Read, in the case of the Territory vs. Luis Maes, charged with assault with a deadly weapon upon R. Bustos. The demurrer was sustained by the court.

The case of O. W. Piery, charged with having obtained money under false pretenses to the extent of \$600 from Thomas P. Gable and Joe Lacombe, proprietors of the Claire Hotel and Bar which was to have been taken up this morning was continued until tomorrow morning, on account of a witness, who has been subpoenaed from Indian Territory having been delayed, en route. Attorney Mark B. Thompson has been appointed by the court to defend Piery who has been in the county jail, having been unable to secure bond.

At a session of the District Court of the First Judicial District of the county of Santa Fe, held at 2 o'clock this afternoon, Judge John R. McFie presiding, the appeal case brought by Tomas Roybal against Vicente Roybal, was dismissed on account of the appellant having failed to docket the appeal within the specified time required by law.

In the District Court at 2 o'clock this afternoon, Judge John R. McFie presiding, appeared Daniel A. Macpherson, president of the Democrat Publishing Company of Albuquerque, indicted for criminal libel by the recent territorial grand jury of this county, in company with his attorney, A. B. McMillen, and waived formal arraignment on the indictment. A plea of not guilty was entered in his case with leave to withdraw the same if found desirable. This evening the defendant and his attorney will examine the indictment. The case will not be tried at the present term of court, this upon the request of defendant and his attorney.

TWENTY-ONE EARTHQUAKES

Do Terrible Damage on Ustica Island—Convicts Attempt Escape But Are Subdued.

New York, March 22.—A cable message to the Herald from Palermo says: "There have been twenty-one earthquakes on the island of Ustica during the past three days. The population is terrorized. A great valley has been formed in the center of the island and all the houses have been demolished.

The island is used as a penal settlement for hardened criminals. These made an effort to escape but were subdued by the guards. One of the three mountains on the island is reported in eruption.

CATRON FOR MAYOR.

Independents to Nominate and He to Accept—The Goose Hangs High.

The New Mexican learned late this afternoon on good authority that ex-Delegate Thomas B. Catron has consented to accept the nomination for mayor of the city on the Independent Citizens ticket and that he will be so nominated. It is understood that the combination which will nominate him has had a rather tough job in finding him the goose hangs high. The contest will be a pretty one. As far as the New Mexican is concerned it rather enjoys such performances.

COLLINS SECURES ASSESSOR OFFICE

County Commissioners Approve His Bond.

TAKES SPEEDY POSSESSION

Obtains Records By Forcing Locked Door—Andrews Out in Cold.

The adjourned meeting of the Board of County Commissioners of this county was held at 10 o'clock this forenoon in the court house according to adjournment from last evening. There were present: Chairman Arthur Seligman, Commissioner A. L. Kendall, of Cerrillos, and Commissioner Jose Inez Roybal of Pojoaque. Probate Clerk Marcos Castillo was at his desk. Glenville A. Collins, appointed assessor by Governor Hagerman, and his attorney, R. H. Hanna, were in attendance. Edward Andrews was represented by A. B. Renahan, his attorney. The latter presented the official bond of Mr. Collins as assessor of Santa Fe County in the sum of \$2,000 furnished by the United States Realty and Guarantee Company, of Baltimore, Maryland, which after due examination by the board was approved. Immediately upon approval of the bond Assessor Collins went to the assessor's office in the court house. He found same locked and no one present. Deputy Assessor A. P. Hill was outside of the room.

Forced Door.

Assessor Collins took the lock off of the door, entered the office and took possession of the furniture, books and paraphernalia therein. District Attorney E. C. Abbott and R. H. Hanna, attorney of Assessor Collins were present.

During the sessions of the board the attorneys on both sides did much talking and made some eloquent speeches. The members of the board listened but said nothing. County Commissioner Kendall moved that Mr. Collins' bond be approved. Thereupon Commissioner Roybal moved to lay Mr. Kendall's motion on the table. The vote upon this proposition stood two, namely Seligman and Kendall, against one, Roybal in favor. Then the original motion of Commissioner Kendall was taken up. This was voted upon and stood two for approval—Seligman and Kendall, and one against, Roybal.

Approved Bond.

Commissioner Roybal then presented a resolution reciting that while the board had approved the bond of Glenville A. Collins as assessor, it has not receded and did not recede from its action, appointing Edward Andrews assessor of Santa Fe County. This motion was defeated by two to one—Seligman and Kendall against, and one, Roybal in favor. Both members Seligman and Kendall explaining their vote by stating that the approval of the bond was a ministerial act and that it had nothing to do with the right of either applicant to the office. Thereafter the board adjourned to meet April 2d in regular quarterly session.

This may be taken that Mr. Collins is now de facto and de jure assessor of the county of Santa Fe and in possession of the office. Edward Andrews who has acted as assessor for some days under and by virtue of an appointment by the Board of County Commissioners is confined to his home by illness today. In response to a telephone call by a reporter of the New Mexican he stated that he was not ready to say at this time what his future action would be; that he has the matter under consideration.

This afternoon the petition for a mandamus, filed by Glenville A. Collins to compel the county commissioners to approve his bond as assessor was dismissed, the county commissioners having approved his bond during their session this morning.

Andrews to Make Assessment.

This afternoon it was learned through A. B. Renahan, the attorney for Andrews, that the latter intended to make an assessment of the taxable property in the county even if he had to make the returns on brown paper and use 10 cent note books as assessment rolls. This the New Mexican desires to inform Mr. Renahan and Mr. Andrews will not be necessary. If they will pay cash the New Mexican will cheerfully furnish them any and all books and papers that may be necessary for the performance of the duty Mr. Andrews says he will undertake.

EVEN HANDED JUSTICE SHOULD BE DONE.

The territorial grand jury of Santa Fe County has found indictments for criminal libel against the manager of the Albuquerque Journal and the editor of the Albuquerque Industrial Advertiser, the offences, so the indictments allege, being connected with the publication of certain articles in the papers named which reflected seriously and to the damage of James W. Ray, holds when he was being considered for re-appointment and when his nomination to be secretary of the Territory was pending in the Senate committee on territories. The papers in question at the times that the indictments charge the offences, certainly contained articles that were libelous and grossly so. The New Mexican then and there remarked that it was high time that something was done in this Territory to shield officials and citizens from unjustified and unjustifiable newspaper attacks, and from damages resulting from the publication of false and malicious charges by such papers.

The New Mexican fears no libel law. When it makes assertions which reflect on the official conduct of officials or men in public life it stands prepared to go into court and prove the truth of the assertion. Unfortunately, there have been and there are newspapers in this Territory that do not act upon that principle. That their editors and owners should be punished just as are other persons who transgress the laws of the Territory is too plain, just and simple a proposition to need argument. That every man and woman should be protected by law from uncalled for assaults and untrue accusations by newspapers is a maxim that every decent man and woman will acknowledge and that fully. The official and the public man, call him statesman or politician, be he an office holder or not, is entitled to the full protection of the laws against injury and injustice by newspapers. A man's or a woman's good name is his or her property and one of the dearest possessions he or she can have on earth. Gang sheets in Albuquerque or elsewhere should not be allowed to assail such without being called to account. The libel law cannot and will not hurt the newspapers that make honest charges against public officials or public men, or give the news of the day, although they may not be of the complimentary kind, when it is shown that the papers' doing so were actuated by honest motives and had the basis of truth behind their assertions and allegations.

A few years ago a paper in this Territory, which after that time passed into other hands, libelled the editor of the New Mexican. An indictment for criminal libel was found and a civil suit instituted in this district. The affair did good at that time and was settled. The New Mexican is not interested in this present matter except that it believes that even handed justice should be done to all concerned. More anon.

FISH HATCHERY FOR NEW MEXICO.

House Resolution 7103, now pending in the House of Representatives and entitled "to authorize the establishment of fish culture and biological stations in the United States, and for other purposes," provides for the establishment, in various portions of the country, of fish hatcheries. It is an omnibus bill as it intends the establishment of twenty such stations. Delegate Andrews succeeded in having his bill for a fish hatchery in New Mexico incorporated and, if the measure passes, of which it seems there is but little doubt, New Mexico will have a fish hatchery in active operation in the near future. The bill says: "Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the secretary of commerce and labor be, and he is hereby authorized, empowered, and directed to establish the following fish cultural

and biological stations for the investigation of problems connected with the marine-fishery interests of the regions adjacent thereto; and for the necessary surveys, purchase of land, erection of buildings and other structures, and the proper equipment of such stations and the sums following each item are hereby authorized to be appropriated."

There are two stations that are to receive an appropriation of \$50,000 each and eighteen are to have an appropriation of \$25,000 each. Among the latter is New Mexico.

The New Mexico fish-cultural and biological station should be located on the Pecos River and on the Pecos Forest Reserve where the United States has ample land, water and full authority. Such a location will be near three railroads, the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe, the Denver & Rio Grande and the Santa Fe Central Railway systems. It can be easily and comfortably reached from Glorieta over the Santa Fe, from this city and from Espanola and Santa Cruz on the Denver & Rio Grande. It will be centrally located and in one of the most beautiful mountain sections not only upon this continent, but truly on the whole globe. Delegate Andrews is sanguine that the measure will pass. He is doing everything possible to wards this much desired end and is having the active help of the entire Pennsylvania delegation, Senators and Representatives, in his endeavors.

ALONG THE EASTERN RAILWAY OF NEW MEXICO.

A gap of fifty-eight miles remains to be finished on the Eastern Railway of New Mexico. This is located between Sunnyside on the Pecos River and Epris, the station where the Eastern Railway will cross the El Paso & Southwestern Railroad in Lincoln County. Trains are now running on the division between Texico and Sunnyside, a distance of seventy-six miles, and the mountain division between Epris and Belen via Willard is completed and ready for operation. The completion of this division of this road means a great deal for eastern and central New Mexico. It will shorten the time of travel and the hauling of freight between these two sections of the Territory considerably, in addition to cutting down the time between Chicago and San Francisco via the Santa Fe system several hours. The gap of fifty-eight miles should be completed and it is believed will be by the first of June and at the latest by the first of July. Through heavy freight shipments to and from the Pacific coast will then be routed by this line. The country along the route is settling rapidly. The farmers, who are taking up homesteads upon the public domain there intend to become permanent settlers.

So far, the agricultural experiments in the new settlements during the past two years have proved successful and it is believed this will continue. If so, Roosevelt, Guadalupe and Torrance Counties as well as that part of Valencia County east of the Rio Grande will, within three years, increase largely in population and in taxable property. Statehood or no statehood, New Mexico is growing and even the Congress of the United States cannot retard this. Settlers follow railroads and the railroads are building.

ANOTHER ALBUQUERQUE JOURNAL LIE NAILED.

The Albuquerque Fakir Journal in yesterday's issue concerning the indictment found by the territorial grand jury of this county against the president of the company, D. A. MacPherson, has the following to say: "The indictment, it is understood, is based on the libel law passed by the Santa Fe office holders during the last session of the legislature, and which is a revival of the ancient libel law of 1892."

Again the Journal lies and knows that it lies. The libel law enacted by the 26th Legislative Assembly was not passed by the office holders, but was passed by a heavy majority in each House of that Assembly. The Santa Fe office holders, whoever they may be, had precious little to do with it. It was the people of New Mexico in Legislative Assembly who did the act in question. The bill was drawn originally by Thomas Benton Catron and was passed by the Twenty-eighth Assembly of which he was a member. In 1893 the statute was repealed but was re-enacted last session. The vote upon the question stood in the Council, ayes, Ballard, Chaves, Greer, Leahy, Marth, Martinez, Miller, Montoya, Read, Clarke; noes, Catron. And in the House, ayes, Baca, Duran, Griego, Howard, De Leon, Lucero, Luna, Lynch, Ortiz, Pendleton, Sanchez, Sandoval, of Sandoval, Stockton, Wright and Williams; noes, Ellis, Mirabal, Sandoval, of Santa Fe, Dalles, speaker. This vote shows the temper of the people right well and it will do the Journal no good to lie about this or any other official or political occurrence. Its lies are so palpable that they are easily nailed and shown up.

NEW EDITION OF "TO THE LAND OF SUNSHINE."

The Silver City Enterprise, after due examination of the merits and demerits of the new publication by the Bureau of Immigration of "To the Land of Sunshine" which contains 446 pages, half of them illustrations, gives the volume the following favorable comment:

"The Enterprise is in receipt of a revised copy of the interesting volume entitled 'To the Land of Sunshine,' edited by Colonel Max. Frost and Paul A. F. Walter, and issued by the Bureau of Immigration. The first edition of 6,000 copies of this book was early ex-

hausted and a second edition, enlarged and revised, has just been printed by the New Mexican Printing Company. Typographically the book is a gem and would do credit to the largest print shops in the east. Regarding the contents the Enterprise had occasion to comment favorably on this volume something over a year ago when the first edition was printed and it can only add to this comment by saying that the present edition is better than the first, especially for Grant County, in that considerably more space is devoted to the mining industry than in the previous edition and the latest official information and statistics systematically classified are embodied in the work in order to make it more valuable for reference. The book will be distributed throughout the east and wherever it is read it is certain to dispel many gross misconceptions of New Mexico, to say nothing of bringing hither a very desirable class of immigrants."

The sun of prosperity will shine upon Uncle Sam's dominions during the present year, of that there can be no doubt. In railroad circles, it is said, that the various roads of the country have given orders for the construction of locomotives, sleeping cars, passenger coaches, freight cars and similar material and equipment amounting to over one hundred millions dollars to the manufacturing concerns in such lines. When railroads are busy and prosperous, the people are likewise.

The New Mexican still believes that the people of this Territory and of Arizona will be called upon to vote on the joint statehood question this year of our Lord. This paper may be mistaken in this assertion but it does not believe so. In no way can any harm come by definitely declaring and ascertaining the will of the citizens of the two territories in the matter. This paper believes that the sooner the question is decided the better for all concerned.

The laws of the Territory of New Mexico and much better enforced throughout its confines than are the laws of the state of New York in New York City, or the laws of the state of Illinois in Chicago or the laws of the state of Missouri in St. Louis or in Kansas City. This is a fact proven by the records. You see Senators and Congressmen from those states assert that this Territory is unfit for statehood. Check is no name for it!

The United States Senate is getting to consist of younger men. There are only ten men in that body over seventy years of age. The facts above do not seem to have improved the Senate to any alarming extent. Quite often in the present session it has acted in a very unbecoming manner, especially while considering statehood for the territories.

There is much difference in what you call it. In New York state recently a man who was found guilty of the vulgar crime of theft was sentenced to twelve years' imprisonment in the penitentiary, while a bank cashier who pleaded guilty to "abstraction, embezzlement and false entry" received six years in prison.

The prohibition party of the country is already busy in looking about for a candidate for President in 1908. Some believers of that party must have been in the habit before they became prohibitionists of taking early drinks.

The oil trust is not bothering itself about the proposed coal miners' strike. If the latter does come, the oil trust will be benefited. That trust seems to be both lucky and rich.

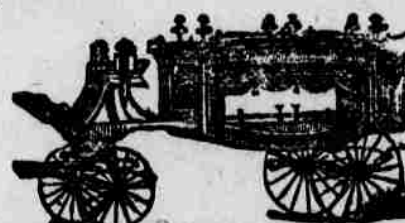

BUILDING A NATION OR STATEHOOD FOR NEW MEXICO

A Short Sketch of Uncle Simeon Patience, a Statehood Pioneer.

Specially Contributed to the New Mexican.

(Continued From Tuesday)

If there is any class of individuals that Uncle Simeon dislikes, yea, even hates, more than another, it is those calling themselves secret service men, or detectives, whose business it is to pry into other people's affairs. He does not deny that at times detective work is essential; that sometimes in hunting down criminals and ferreting out crimes which have shocked a whole community, a detective may be of service, for which the public may be grateful. But between this kind of a detective and those secret agents who are sent into one country by another, or at the instigation of some private interest, or for a private purpose, to inquire into the habits and customs of a people for the purpose of unfavorable comment and abuse, there is a very wide difference.

Uncle Simeon read the letter of his friend with deep indignation. When he laid the letter down he arose to his feet and commenced to walk the floor. As he thought over the conduct of Senator Narrow his anger increased.

"Is it possible," he said to himself, "that human liberties and human rights have no meaning in a Territory? So Senator Narrow and his abettors are determined to keep us out. Of this I have no doubt. He wants all the facts he can get as to our polygamous indulgences in this Territory. Well, let him have the facts. If there is anything of that sort in this Territory, let it be exposed. He says to his Handy man that too many cases cannot be reported, nor can they be made too strong. What does he mean by that? Strong words for a Senator of the United States. He wants the cases reported at all hazards, and then he wants them manufactured as strong as they can be made. Truth, honor and fairness are not to enter the case. He wants certain things reported, and they must be reported. The facts he wants must reflect upon the people of a helpless Territory, who cannot defend themselves on the floor of the Senate, where he will use them. Facts, did I say? Why not call them lies and be truthful? Too many states he says have been admitted from the west; that section of the country is acquiring too much prestige and power in the Senate. There is the utterance of a man entirely too 'narrow' for the position he occupies. In what respect is the west acquiring too much prestige and power? Has the west been an obstruction to our country's growth or prosperity? Does not the west go in as good measure to make up this great territorial empire of ours? Are we not all citizens (except those who live in a Territory) of a common country? Can any special good come to the west, that does not correspondingly help the east? Where does the gold go to that we dig out of our mountains? Where goes the cattle—not only of a thousand, but of ten thousand hills of the west? Who gets our sheep and the millions of fleeces taken from their backs, if not our brothers of the eastern states? Where are the great undeveloped resources of our country if not in the west? In what respect has the west over been disloyal to the general government?"

At this point Uncle Simeon terminated his utterances of disgust and resumed his seat, he took up his pen and wrote his friend in Washington as follows:
"My Dear Perry: Your letter of the 4th instant, telling me of the interview between Senator Narrow and his man Handy, came this morning. While I knew that the enemy was straining every point to defeat us, I did not suspect that methods that would put an Apache chief to blush would be resorted to. It does indeed look as Sen-

ator Narrow says, 'that they have arrived at the point where they are not so particular about the means they use to keep the Territories out.' This is a most important confession, and explains the sentiment of some others in Washington besides Senator Narrow's. The only difference between him and them, so far as I can see, is that he, in this particular, has been a little more frank than they.

"The attack on us, I notice, is to be very sweeping in its scope. We are not only to be held up to scorn for having too many wives, but we are to be condemned for not having sufficient appreciation of books. In other words, we are not a lettered people, and cannot read and write as well as we ought. We are also to be taken to task because we are not all of the same race. I suppose if we were all Americans, or Germans, or French, or Spanish, this objection would be removed. But how about our eastern states? Only yesterday I saw that there were over a million immigrants that had already landed at Ellis Island this year. How many Presidents of the United States will spring from these potential fathers and mothers none of us can tell. Nor are they all of the same race. There are among them Russians, Hungarians, Finns, Lithuanians, Greeks, Brogyors, Italians and Turks. This is a great invasion of a foreign force to mix in the politics of the country and to assist our eastern friends in corrupting biennial and quadrennial elections. Of course, we have nothing of that sort in these Territories. Nor is our population a mixed one. The people who live here are either Anglo-Americans or Spanish-Americans. Unlike the horde of foreigners just mentioned, most of the people who live in this Territory were born here—born under the flag of the United States, and have some knowledge as to what that flag represents. There are no foreigners practically in the Territory, but if there were, in what respect are our foreigners to be regarded with less consideration than the foreigners in the states of New York, Michigan and Indiana.

For over a hundred years it has been the boasted pride of the American citizen to point to our national government as the government for the home of the oppressed of other countries, but why discriminate against our own people, who happen to live in a Territory? Charity for those who require it has a beautiful face, but why should it have a sweeter smile for a stranger than for a friend. We always have a higher respect for the parent who looks after the wants of his own children before he turns his attention to those of his neighbor. Charity begins at home in a nation, as it does in an individual.

"Senator Narrow claims we speak too little English and too much Spanish. I confess we speak both rather fluently, but except the English, there is no language with which we, as a nation, are more concerned than the Spanish. In the Philippines we have assumed charge of ten millions of people, who, with slight exceptions, speak nothing but Spanish. Porto Rico, a possession of ours, has a Spanish-speaking population. Cuba, whose government is a creation of ours, and whose people look to us for their protection, is a Spanish-speaking island. Mexico, our door-neighbor, and a country in which millions of American wealth has been invested, and where thousands of Americans reside, is a Spanish-speaking country. South and Central America, for which we advocate and enforce the Monroe doctrine, speak the same language. With what foreign language are we as much concerned as with the Spanish? In the Philippines we have taken upon ourselves the role of teacher and guide. We must know the Spanish in those islands as well as in Porto Rico before we can teach their people the English. The young men of New Mexico are already at our foreign courts as interpreters of Spanish, and the day is coming when they will be there as ministers and ambassadors. Spanish schools will be opened in this country at no distant day, which the young men of the east will attend to prepare themselves for their political, social and business relations with our Spanish-speaking colonies, and with our neighboring Republic south of us.

"How silly the objection that Spanish is spoken to some extent in New Mexico? But after all, my dear friend, these objections, as numerous and as ridiculous as they are, are only excuses to cover up a prejudice on the part of some, against the growing west. It is history repeating itself. We always have among us a short-sighted class of men who cannot see into the future a day ahead.

"I presume the secret agent" will

be here soon. I will keep my eye on him when he makes his appearance. In the meantime, I will consider the proper plan to circumvent any evil work he may intend under the direction of his employer—Senator Narrow. Your friend, "SIMEON PATIENCE."

AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENT.

Mr. and Mrs. Wills, Guests at the Palace Hotel, While Recovering From Injuries.

As the result of an automobile accident which occurred at Raton while they were making the trip from Colorado City to Santa Fe in an Olds-Reo runabout, Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Wills of New York City, are nursing severe injuries at the Palace Hotel, where they expect to remain until they have recovered from the effects of the accident. They will then continue their trip to California.

It was the intention of Mr. and Mrs. Wills to make the trip from Colorado City to Santa Fe in the runabout, and then turn the machine over to a party of friends in this city, who would take it back to Colorado Springs while they continued the journey west. No difficulty was experienced until they were leaving Raton. At that point Mr. Wills, who is familiar with the running of an automobile, was driving the machine at a speed of less than fourteen miles an hour, as he considered it advisable to run slowly on account of the arroyo, fifteen feet deep which extended along the side of the road. They were running within a few feet of the edge of the highway from which there was a sheer drop to the ground below, when one of the front tires burst, causing him to lose control of the runabout.

The machine at once started towards the edge of the road, and Mr. Wills was unable to steer it from its course. Just as it went over the edge Mrs. Wills with great presence of mind, threw one arm around her husband's neck, and to this Mr. Wills attributes the fact that they were not instantly killed. As it was Mr. Wills lost six of his front teeth, had his face badly contused, and was injured about other parts of his body, while his wife fared equally as badly, her face being also badly bruised. One of her arms was injured, and one of her sides was severely sprained. The automobile was a total wreck. As soon as they were able to recover themselves, they returned to Raton, and came from that city here. Both Mr. and Mrs. Wills are under the care of a physician, and do not expect to be able to continue their trip to California for at least ten days.

CHARGED WITH

PERJURY

Jose Pleno Arrested at His Home in Galisteo, By U. S. Deputy Fornoff.

Jose de la Cruz Pleno was arrested at his home in Galisteo on the charge of perjury, by United States Deputy Marshal Fred Fornoff, Tuesday. At the last term of the United States Court for the Fourth Judicial District held at Las Vegas, an indictment was returned against Pleno charging that he perjured himself before the board of pension commissioners in his efforts to secure a pension for a man, who it is alleged, had never been in the United States Army.

According to the indictment, a man appeared before the board of commissioners, and requested a pension, representing himself to be a soldier who had served in the army, and who was entitled to a pension. Pleno, it is alleged appeared before the pension board and testified that the applicant was the man, he pretended to be in order to assist him in securing the pension.

The commissioner of pensions instituted an investigation, and learned that the man under whose name the applicant was applying for the pension was dead. It was then that the indictment was returned against Pleno, and subsequently a warrant was issued for his arrest. Pleno furnished bond of \$1,000 and will be tried in Las Vegas at the next session of the United States District Court.
