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## NO DAMAGES FOR DELAYS IN CATTLE CASE

**Says Justice Brown  
of United States  
Supreme Court  
in Decision.**

## TEXAS LAW TOO ARBITRARY

**And Hence Not Constitution-  
al--Rancher Had Sued  
Railroad --- Michigan  
Tax Case Decided.**

Washington, D. C., April 2.—In an opinion of Justice Brown, of the Supreme Court of the United States, delivered today, he decided the case of the Houston & Texas Central vs. J. A. Mayes in favor of the company. Mayes ordered seventeen cars in which to ship 625 head of cattle. The cars arrived twenty-four hours after the time set in the agreement. Mayes sued under the Texas law for damages done his cattle by the delay and also under the state law to recover \$25 per car on his contract with the company. The lower court upheld the complainant. The Supreme court, however, holds that the law that takes no account of accident is too arbitrary; that it encroaches on the federal control of interstate commerce and is, therefore, unconstitutional. Chief Justice Harlan and Justice McKenzie dissented.

**Michigan Tax Case Decided.**  
Washington, D. C., April 2.—The Supreme Court of the United States today decided the Michigan Railway tax cases involving the taxes of all railroads for several years, against the railroads. The opinion was by Justice Brewer. The case involved the validity of the Michigan law fixing the tax value of railroad property on the average value at which other property was assessed. As this nearly quadrupled the taxes paid by the railroads, they resisted and approximately \$2,000,000 in back taxes is now collectable.

## PENSION DAY IN HOUSE.

**And Large Attendance Resulted—  
Bill to Conference—Personal  
Liability Passed.**

Washington, D. C., April 2.—This being pension day in the House, there was a large attendance of members when that body convened. The pension appropriation bill was sent to a conference. The Naval Academy hazing bill conference report was adopted. The personal liability bill was called up, Mr. Sterling of Illinois stating its features.

**Urgency Deficiency Bill Tomorrow.**  
Washington, D. C., April 2.—When the Senate convened today, Senator Hale reported on the urgency deficiency bill and gave notice that he would call it up tomorrow.

**Personal Liability Bill Passed House.**  
Washington, April 2.—The personal liability bill passed the House today without a division.

**Democrats Will Filibuster.**

Washington, D. C., April 2.—Owing to the condition in which the statehood and freight rate bills are found, the Democrats in the House and in the Senate threaten to filibuster against legislation now demanding attention.

**Babcock Defeated for Chairman.**

Washington, D. C., April 2.—On call of the House today, Representative Babcock, of Wisconsin, was defeated for chairman of the Republican Congressional campaign committee for the coming Congressional campaign. The leaders are greatly troubled to find the best man for secretary of the committee. Delegate W. H. Andrews will be placed on the committee as the New Mexico member.

## POLITICAL FIGHT.

**Waxes Hot in Chicago Where Propo-  
sition to Buy Street Railways is  
an Issue.**

Chicago, April 2.—The utmost efforts are being made today by all the political parties to bring out as heavy a vote as possible tomorrow. The fight in several wards has reached a stage of intensity seldom equalled in this city. The chief fight centers around the proposition to sell \$750,000 of certificates for the purchase of street railways. A sixty per cent vote is needed to carry the proposition.

## WOLVES TROUBLESOME IN SOCORRO COUNTY

**Many Sheep Killed by Them—War of  
Extermination Commenced by  
Ranchmen.**

Reports from Socorro County are to the effect that stock men and sheep raisers are experiencing a great deal of trouble with lobos, of which there are at present a great number in that vicinity. They run in packs and on several occasions horses have been found which had been pulled down and killed by the wolves on the range. Stockmen in that county are taking action against these animals in an effort to exterminate them as nearly as possible by both poisoning and shooting them whenever an opportunity presents itself. One rancher set poison about his ranch one night and the next morning found that he had killed three lobos and thirty-seven coyotes.

A prominent cattle man from Socorro, who was in the city yesterday, related quite a remarkable incident which occurred recently in connection with the fight stock men are making against the wolves. A sheep raiser had been missing sheep for some time and finally discovered that they were being carried away by lobos. He decided that he would at least try to reduce the number of wolves and accordingly left his adobe house early one morning with his rifle determined to get a shot at the pack. He had not gone far from the house when he discovered three of the animals feeding off the carcass of a sheep they had killed. He picked out the largest of the three and fired. The animal at which he had shot did not fall, but instead started directly for the ranchman's adobe house, the door of which had been left open. He followed, thinking to get another shot, but on reaching the house he was greatly surprised to see instead of a lobo, a large St. Bernard dog lying on the floor of his house stone dead. In some manner the dog had joined a pack of lobos and had been running with them and assisting in carrying away and killing the stock.

## ZIONISTS REVOLT AGAINST JOHN A. DOWIE, PROPHET

**Church Property is  
Turned Over to  
His Successor.  
Deeds Filed.**

## ALEXANDER GRANGER HEAD

**Of the Faithful—His Dis-  
missal Had Been Ordered  
by Man Whose Place  
He Took.**

Chicago, April 2.—An open revolt against John Alexander Dowie which took place yesterday, was followed today by a transfer of all the public property of the church of Zion to Alexander Granger, the man whose dismissal Dowie directed in a telegram from Mexico. A warranty deed and bill of sale, were filed today in the Lake County Circuit Court at Waukegan, Illinois, by W. G. Voliva, the present head of Zion, who was appointed by Dowie some months ago, by which all lands standing in the name of Dowie and his wife are made over to Granger for the benefit of Zion City and the followers of Dowie generally. Voliva holds Dowie's power of attorney and by virtue of it, he has turned over to Granger everything in Zion. Dowie's wife and son it is claimed by residents of Zion have allied themselves with Voliva.

**Dowie Notified by Telegram.**  
Late in the day a cablegram was sent to Dowie announcing that he had been suspended from the church he founded. It is declared to have advised that some followers practice polygamy and charges of extravagance and mismanagement were also made.

## R. L. BACA CHIEF DEPUTY SHERIFF

**To Fill Vacancy Caused by Resigna-  
tion of Jose L. Lopez.**

Jose L. Lopez, who for the past fifteen months has been chief deputy sheriff of this county, by appointment of Sheriff Antonio J. Ortiz, has resigned in order to give his time and attention to the working of his mining properties in the Golden district, South Santa Fe County. Mr. Lopez has performed the duties of the office effectively and fairly. The sheriff has appointed Ramon L. Baca, of this city to succeed Mr. Lopez and addressed the New Mexican in the matter as follows:

## JUAN JOSE BACA CROSSES DARK RIVER

**Old and Prominent Citizen of Socorro  
Died Last Evening at an Ad-  
vanced Age.**

Socorro, N. M., April 2.—Juan Jose Baca, one of the oldest and best known native citizens of this city, died suddenly last night at his home here. Mr. Baca was prominent in business circles and in politics for a great number of years. He was quite advanced in age and had held several offices of honor and trust, both elective and appointive during the past forty years. At the time of his death he was a member of the Board of Regents of the School of Mines, located in this city, and President of the School Board. The funeral will take place tomorrow from his late home in this town and the remains will be interred in the local Catholic Cemetery.

## BIG STRIKE OF COAL MINERS IN FULL SWING

**Men and Boys All  
Over Country Are  
Idle on Union's  
Order.**

## FINAL JOINT CONFERENCE

**Of Operators With President  
Mitchell in New York To-  
morrow to Try and  
Reach Settlement.**

Pending the outcome of the conference in New York City tomorrow between the coal operators and John Mitchell, the union president, the suspension in the anthracite fields is practically complete. Of 160,000 men and boys in the hard coal fields who were affected by the suspension, less than one thousand are at work. In the bituminous fields in many mining districts the miners are idle, chiefly owing to the celebration of the eight hour working day rather than because of the wage question dispute.

**53,000 Miners Out in Illinois.**

Chicago, April 2.—Without demonstration of any kind 350 coal mines in Illinois closed down today and 53,000 miners employed in the shafts remained at home in pursuance of the strike orders. The operators in Chicago announce that no precautions were taken to protect the mines, as they have faith in the promises of President Perry of the local district, that order will be preserved. Small forces of men, such as engineers, and pumps remain at each mine to protect the property from natural causes. The men striking will be allowed to occupy the companies' houses and non-payment of rent during the strike is not to be regarded as ground for eviction.

**May Break With President Mitchell.**

New York, April 2.—The Herald says: "Interest in the anthracite strike shifts to New York tomorrow, when the joint sub-committee of operators and miners will re-assemble in another effort to find a basis of settlement, and it is made more interesting by the report that the operators may seize the opportunity to finally break with President Mitchell and declare for an open shop. So far as the operators are concerned, they do not expect to come to any satisfactory understanding with Mr. Mitchell."

**All is Quiet in Strike District.**

Philadelphia, Pa., April 2.—Reports received today from the anthracite fields state that the suspension of mining is complete. No disturbances are reported from any section and the day has all the appearance of a holiday.

**No Trouble in Pittsburg District.**

Pittsburg, Pa., April 2.—Today being the anniversary of the granting of an eight-hour work day, almost every mine in the Pittsburg district is closed. Tomorrow, however, it is expected the miners employed by the Pittsburg Coal Company and by several other local operators, will return to work and that all the mines in District No. 5 will be running before the close of the week. These miners have received an advance of 55 per cent and will sign contracts today for two years.

**Total Suspension of Mining.**

Wilkesbarre, Pa., April 2.—In compliance with the order issued by President Mitchell to quit work there was a total suspension of mining in the Wyoming region today.

**Strike Progressing Quietly.**

Indianapolis, April 2.—Although half a million members of the United Mine Workers of America did not resume work today awaiting the granting of their wage scale demands by the coal operators, there is nothing at the headquarters of the union to indicate that anything unusual has happened. All officials are out of the city. President John Mitchell is in New York to meet the anthracite operators tomorrow.

Vice President Lewis is in Ohio, directing the strike in that state and the secretary and treasurer, Wilson, is at Clearfield, Pennsylvania, attending a joint conference of the central Pennsylvania district.

**No Strike in Pomeroy Bend District.**  
Pomeroy, Ohio, April 2.—There will be no miners' strike in the Pomeroy Bend District. The operators will pay the scale demanded and will sign this week for two years.

**Southwestern Miners Idle Also.**

Kansas City, April 2.—There was a complete shut down today in the bituminous coal fields in the Southwestern Miners Association District of Missouri, Kansas, Western Arkan-

## CLOSE CALL FOR AERONAUT

**Parachute Was Swept in Front of Ex-  
press Train—He Was Saved by  
Jumping.**

Chicago, April 2.—Battling with adverse currents of air, which were blowing him directly in front of the Illinois Central Express as he descended 5,000 feet from his balloon in a parachute, William Mattery, a French aeronaut yesterday fought for life while 5,000 people watched his struggles. The engineer did not see the aeronaut until he was less than 200 feet in the air directly in front of the train. He applied the air brakes, but could not stop the train. Mattery, exerting every muscle, tried to swing himself away. As the parachute sank to the ground he jumped and escaped death under the engine by two feet. The parachute was crushed.

## ALLEGED LAND FRAUDS

**Special Agent in New Mexico to In-  
vestigate Charges and Find  
Facts.**

E. P. Holcombe, a special agent of the general land office at Washington, D. C., arrived in the city Saturday and will spend several weeks in the Territory investigating matters connected with the disposition and sales of public lands. He was sent to this Territory by the general land office for that purpose and, although he is not certain just what will develop in the investigation, it is probable that his work will cover the Territory pretty generally. When seen at the Palace Hotel this morning, he said there was no secret connected with his being here for the purpose of investigating public land matters, but he declined to talk about his plans. That there has been fraud perpetrated in connection with the sale and disposition of government lands was evidenced by the recent appropriation of \$10,000 made by Congress for the purpose of carrying on an investigation.

## WAIVED HEARING.

**J. R. Nichols Arrested in Connection  
With Failure of Enterprise Bank  
Renews Bond.**

Pittsburg, April 2.—J. R. Nichols, charged with conspiracy to defraud in connection with the failure of the Enterprise National Bank of Allegheny, waived a hearing before United States Commissioner Lindsay today and renewed his bail for his appearance at the next term of the United States District Court, which meets in May. Nichols was bookkeeper to W. H. Andrews, the delegate to Congress from New Mexico.

## BLACK HAND PLOT.

**To Assassinate Royal Family of Spain  
Unearthed by Authorities—No  
Details.**

Madrid, April 2.—The Spanish authorities have discovered an anarchist plot at Lebrija, twenty-nine miles from Seville, the notorious center of the Black Hand, to assassinate the royal family during the visit of King Alfonso and the Dowager Queen, Christine, and the sister of the King, Infanta Maria Teresa, to Seville, during the Holy Week. Censorship prevents the sending of details.

The prospects are that a large number of mines will be in operation tomorrow.

**Captain Fred Fornoff  
Appointed as  
Chief and is in  
Charge.**

## ONLY ONE CHANGE MADE

**Cipriana Baca Retained as  
Lieutenant—Robert Lewis  
Sergeant—Headquarters  
at Santa Fe.**

Following closely upon the appointment of Fred Fornoff of Albuquerque, as captain of the Mounted Police of the Territory, today the remaining officers and privates in the force were re-commissioned and sworn into office at 2 o'clock this afternoon. The list of officers and members of the force is as follows: Fred Fornoff, Albuquerque, captain; Cipriano Baca, Socorro, lieutenant; R. W. Lewis, Socorro, sergeant; R. C. Huber, Santa Fe; E. R. Stewart, Aztec; Ramon Gomez, Santa Fe; M. S. Avant, Lincoln; W. E. Dudley, Alamogordo; R. J. Putnam, Socorro; Julius Meyers, Estancia; J. J. Brophy, Lincoln, privates.

**Personnel of the Force.**

The only new appointment made so far by Captain Fred Fornoff was that of R. C. Huber of this city. Mr. Huber is an old officer and a personal friend of Captain Fornoff, and the latter is very confident that Huber will make an efficient officer.

The time of service of W. D. Dudley of Alamogordo has expired but he will continue on the force for the present at least. One vacancy exists and that will be filled by Captain Fornoff as soon as he looks over the Territory and becomes better acquainted with conditions as they exist.

Captain Fornoff will put forth an effort from the beginning to improve the force, and the organization under him expects to demonstrate to the territorial officials that its members can make their services invaluable. The work for the present at least will continue along the lines which have been formerly followed, but Captain Fornoff expects to investigate conditions and necessities carefully in order to learn where the men can be stationed to the best advantage. Captain Fornoff will have an office in the Capitol building within a day or two.

**Headquarters in Capitol Building.**  
Captain Fornoff has taken apartments temporarily at the Claire Hotel but will later secure a residence in Santa Fe. He will make his headquarters in the Capitol building where an office will be assigned to him. At present he is conducting the affairs of the police in the office of Game Warden Page B. Otero.

## ABOLISH MAIL STAGE.

**Frontier Vehicle to Give Place to the  
More Modern Automobile for  
Mails.**

Roswell, N. M., April 2.—It is reported here that the automobile line between this city and Torrance which has been carrying the United States mail for some time, has proven such a success that the postoffice department has offered the automobile company the contracts for carrying the mails in a number of places in this Territory with a view to abolishing the slower stage coach. The matter is under consideration and it is currently reported that the company will accept the offer both for this Territory and Arizona. The Roswell-Torrance line has demonstrated the feasibility of using the "Angel Makers" for such purposes and the government desires to install other lines. Three new machines have been ordered for this line making six machines.

## CHINESE AND RUSSIAN

**Troops Reported at Fighting Point in  
Manchuria—Discharging of Sol-  
diers Stopped.**

Moscow, April 2.—The Russkoe Slovo has received a sensational telegram from a correspondent at Harbin, Manchuria, saying that hostilities are imminent between the Russian and the Chinese troops. It intimates that the Chinese influenced by the Japanese demobilization of troops has been stopped and that General Gaidoff, the Russian commander in chief, has issued instructions to prepare for eventualities.

## THE CONVENTION OF THE SOUTH WESTERN COMMERCIAL CLUBS.

The convention of Southwestern Commercial Clubs, to be held under the auspices of the Business Men's League, April 16 and 17, will be one of the most unique commercial events which has ever occurred in the United States and will be undoubtedly of great benefit to the Southwest.

The Business Men's League is the commercial organization of St. Louis which represents most of the business interests of the city and it extends its work out through the Southwest. The League has the idea that the Southwest is not being sufficiently advertised, and that if the Commercial Clubs of the states and territories in this section were to assemble and agree upon a plan of exploitation, it would result in large development of the Territory and in inducing capital and immigration.

The convention will last two days and will be devoted to discussion of such subjects as may be arranged by the program committee, which is now at work, closing with a banquet given by the Business Men's League to the delegates. The Governors of the ten states and territories, which are generally included in the Southwest, have been invited and several of them have already accepted. Governor Hagerman has not yet indicated whether he can go or not.

The acceptance from commercial organizations and the editors of newspapers in the Southwest, who have also been invited, already number more than three hundred, including representatives from Colorado, Missouri, Kansas, Indian Territory, Oklahoma, Arizona, Arkansas, Utah and Texas. The responses from New Mexico so far have been very few. This is undoubtedly a mistake. New Mexico should be well represented at this convention and all of the larger commercial organizations in the Territory should send the two representatives who were invited by the Business Men's League, so should the newspaper editors as can afford the time attend this convention. The press of the large cities of the country will undoubtedly give much space to this gathering, will interview the delegates about their respective sections, and those who are present will have an unusual opportunity to advertise the resources of their vicinities. It is to be hoped that the commercial organizations of New Mexico will at once give attention to this matter and send word to the Business Men's League as to their representation.

### CONDITION OF THE COUNTRY.

Despite occasional convulsions and shrieks on Wall Street, the business of the country is going on, and indeed is steadily increasing. Confidence in the stability and honesty of purpose of the American government is greater than ever before and people in this country generally are well contented and satisfied with the existing condition of affairs; to be sure, there are labor strikes, there are trust magnates, there is injustice here and there, and so on and so forth, but upon the whole candid and well posted observers must admit that the country is not at all going to the "demnition how wows." The Washington Post puts the situation tersely and correctly when it says that the hopes and fears of dealers in stocks are always the reflections of personal policy, courage, or timidity. A leading operator shivers, and his fellows shudder. He glows with enthusiasm, and they shout with exultation. The financial columns of the newspapers are mirrors of the transformations. The country at large pays small heed to these true or false emotions, but proceeds calmly on its profitable career. With every man who will work steadily employed at maximum wages,

with demands for hundreds of thousands of more men on construction works and in agricultural pursuits; with all the products of the soil finding ready sale, and all the metals of the earth in tremendous supply unable to keep up with the enormous demands, at the highest prices for generations; with a hundred millions of dollars of new gold every year from our own mines being added to our currency and our exploits giving us the call on other hundreds of millions of gold produced abroad, the business men and the workers of the country need pay little attention to the buzzing of the drones in Wall Street. They produce nothing themselves, and only exist on the surplus earnings of the persons who do produce.

They are dependent on the country and not the country on them.

### A SQUARE DEAL FOR DELEGATE ANDREWS.

"We presume the New Mexican still sees a halo floating just above the horns of 'Bull' Andrews—Roswell Record. The New Mexican sees no halo about the head of Delegate W. H. Andrews, neither does this paper see any halo about the head of any man, no matter what his name and no matter what his station. It does not believe that divinity of any kind hedges about any human being, but right here it desires to say that Delegate W. H. Andrews is doing his duty manfully and carefully at the national capital; that he is looking out for the best interests of New Mexico whenever and wherever necessary and defends the same against all attacks and against all comers, especially from Democratic Congressmen from the State of Texas who would rob the people of this Territory whenever and wherever a chance offers. Delegate Andrews is all right.

There will be but one ticket in the field in Raton tomorrow. It will be non-partisan and the candidates thereon are claimed to be good and proper men for the positions for which they were nominated. This will insure the right kind of a government for the Gate City for the coming two years, and no trouble, expense, turmoil or racket on election day. In this city, on account of the over-bearing ambitions and selfish schemes of a few bosses behind the so-called independent citizens' movement, the fight for city offices had to be inaugurated; however, the end is nigh and the matter will be settled tomorrow for two years to come. If a majority of the citizens of Santa Fe know what is good for them they will vote for the Republican city ticket.

In Las Vegas and in Albuquerque they have what may be properly called by-partisan city tickets in the field. There will be no scrimmage and the nominations for city officials have been about evenly divided between the two great political parties, the Republican and the Democratic. This will save much time, expense, trouble, hot air, fiery eloquence, newspaper articles, etc., etc. In this city a similar arrangement could not be made on account of the presence of a few bosses who insisted in bringing forth the independent citizens' movement for their own aggrandizement and to further their own political schemes. This is the situation in a nutshell and is a fact.

Mayor Sparks is entitled to the votes of the progressive and decent voters of the city of Santa Fe tomorrow. His record is clean and he has rendered the city good service as mayor and in procuring the donation of the Fort Marcy reservation to the city board of education. He is capable and experienced and, if elected, he can be depended upon to make a good record.

Manuel B. Otero for city clerk and James B. Read for city treasurer on the Republican ticket, should receive a majority of the votes of the capital tomorrow. They are young men, ambitious in the right direction and competent for the duties of the positions for which they have been nominated. Help them along by your votes tomorrow.

Leo Hersch, Republican candidate for the city council from the Third Ward, is well deserving of the votes of his fellow citizens. He is a property owner and a business man. He has served once in that position with a creditable record. If elected, he will watch out for the best interests of the city.

The Democrats of Tennessee are now engaged in a fierce factional fight over the election of a governor this fall. The Republicans of the state, unfortunately, are not in position to take advantage of this state of affairs. They have troubles of their own.

A St. Petersburg dispatch says that many of the so-called Christians in Southwest Russia are preparing for more Jewish massacres on Easter Day. It seems that Russia has not yet had her fill of misery and the spilling of blood.

The opinion of District Attorney Frank W. Clancy of the Second Judicial District, that sheep are to be assessed and taxed in the county in which the owner of the animals resides, is good sense and good law.

### WHERE DOES MR. RODEY PLACE HIMSELF?

"Delegate Rodey is back from Washington. He admits that the joint statehood bill cannot go through Congress without the Foraker amendment, and at the same time reiterates the idiotic assertion that only the corporations and tax dodgers are opposed to joint statehood. Mr. Rodey is not remarkably gifted when it comes to horse sense, but he certainly has enough gray matter in his cerebrum to know better than to make such fool statements. It would be interesting, under Mr. Rodey's ingenious classification, to know where he places the native people of San Miguel county, a very large majority of whom are against the joint statehood bill, and who were enthusiastic when the Senate defeated it, where also are the people of Flagstaff, who turned the American flag upside down when the Hamilton bill passed the House."—Las Vegas Optic.

And it would be still more interesting to know where Mr. Rodey places himself. The New Mexican knows of the time when Mr. Rodey was perfectly willing and ready at all times to accept favors from corporations. As far as tax dodgers are concerned, this paper, were it of the betting kind, would wager twenty to one that the majority of the men who pull the strings for the Albuquerque Joint Statehood League and made arrangements for Mr. Rodey to stay two and a half months in Washington recently, are tax dodgers and that their assessments on taxable property are ridiculously small and low.

R. J. Mangum, editor of the Times, at Alameda, Texas, is perfecting arrangements to put a newspaper plant at Brownhorn, in Roosevelt County, and is soon to commence the publication of a weekly newspaper at that point. Roosevelt County is evidently in the public eye as it is receiving many immigrants and new settlers and as more newspapers are being started within the county limits right along.—The more the better.

## STREET TREE PLANTING.

Santa Fe Property Owners Should Heed the Ordinance in Such Cases Made and Provided.

To the Editor of the New Mexican. Now that the time for tree planting has arrived, and the city council has passed an ordinance by which our streets can be beautified in an intelligent manner, I beg to call general attention to the desirability of prompt and generous action in this matter.

The passage of this ordinance is the most progressive case of local legislation tending to the beautifying of our city, that we have had in a number of years; but unless attention is constantly drawn to it by the press, I fear that it will be forgotten or disregarded by many of our people. For instance, in passing through a street of considerable importance a day or two ago, I noticed several shade trees which had just been set out, but they were only five feet from the side of the street. The street, itself, was fifty feet wide, so that under the ordinance, the curb line of the sidewalk should be twelve feet from the property line and the tree line two and a half feet inside of that, or nine and a half feet from the property line. These trees therefore will have to be removed to their proper places sooner or later, and the longer they remain, the more difficult such removal will be.

While it may be trespassing on the kindness and public spirit of the press, yet I think the advantage would be great, if our newspapers, during the next month, would keep the regulation as to tree lines standing in their columns, so that it would be continually before the eyes of the people, not only to prevent mistakes in distances, but also as a constant reminder of the desirability of planting at this time.

The Board of Trade has appointed a committee to endeavor to arrange for the purchase of ornamental trees at low rates, and no doubt you will shortly have a report from them. This communication is not intended to touch any matter within the sphere of their duties, but simply to urge that, when trees are planted, they be located on the proper lines as fixed, not only by our own ordinance, but by the established customs in all American towns.

And, while drawing attention to the progressive and modernizing provisions of that ordinance, let me add a word of thanks to the city council for the specially progressive and modernizing feature that provides that hereafter pavement shall be placed in residence streets, in the center of the sidewalk, instead of being jammed up against the fence line as has been done in most cases heretofore. I am quite sure that there is not a piece of sidewalk pavement in a residence street in any town in the United States, from Eastport to San Diego, that is pressed up against the property line, except those that we have in Santa Fe. Where the idea came from, it is difficult to say, though I have heard that such pavements exist in some towns built in steep places in the Apennines and the Pyrenees; but certainly it is un-American and the reverse of modern. We have a curious and most inexcusable example of this on the east side of Washington Avenue, where the sidewalk is 20 feet wide and the tree line 17 feet from the fence, yet the pavement is put directly against the latter. Now that such an excellent spirit is manifested, in favor of public improvements and the beautifying of the Capital City, let us hope that we have had the last of these anachronisms.

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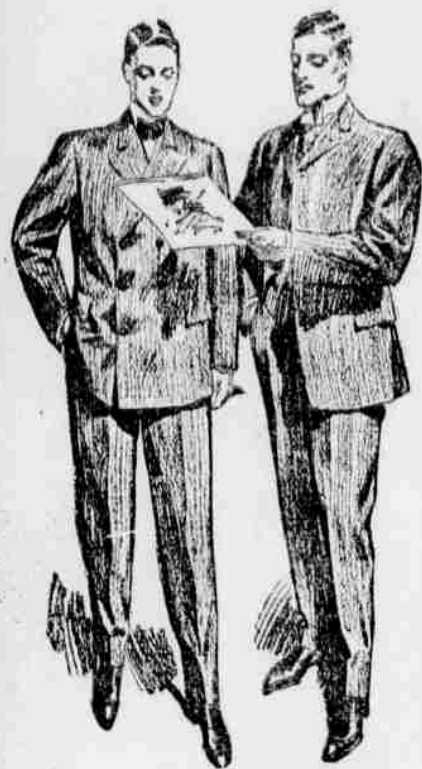

Dr. Roseberry, of Gardiner, Colfax County, a well known physician of that county, died suddenly Wednesday of tuberculosis.

O. W. Wolhuis died this week at his home in Maxwell City. His death was not unexpected for he had been quite low for some time.

Elder J. J. Lockhart, one of the best speakers and most earnest preachers of Texas, has arrived at Roswell and will be there a week or two. He will preach a series of sermons at the Christian Church.

The big Corliss engines for the smelter at Jarilla Junction, Otero County, have arrived. Within a few days the skeleton of the mill will loom up and then the work of construction will proceed faster than heretofore.

In the first base ball game of the season, the New Mexico Military Institute team beat the town team of Roswell by a score of nine to three. The town boys played well individually, but for team work the Military Institute boys had the advantage.

Frank Grygla, special agent of the general land office with headquarters in this city, is in Roswell investigating the alleged land frauds in that valley. He will assist Grosvenor Clarkson in the work and expects to be in the county seat of Chaves County for about a month.

The Robert E. Lee and Nelly Bly mines, situated in Taos County, near Tres Piedras, have been sold to the North American Mining Company. The price paid for the Robert E. Lee is not made public, but it is understood that the company paid \$25,000 for the Nelly Bly. Shipments of ore were made this week.

The horticultural commission of San Juan County met in Aztec, that county, recently and organized according to law. The county was divided into seven districts and inspectors were appointed for each district. The officers and directors of the commission were elected and will hold their offices for the ensuing year.

Two hundred feet of the Grand Canal in the Salt River Valley were washed out by the recent storm at the head. There was also a jam of brush at the joint head of the Salt and Maricopa dams, but it has been cleared up and water will be run in the Salt dam shortly.

The California Limited No. 2, west bound, and the Atlantic Express, No. 2, east bound, met in a head-on collision at Cosmo switching station, near Flagstaff, at 9 o'clock last night. No one was killed, but fifteen passengers are known to have been injured. —Daily International American of March 28.

A. J. Rouneseville, of Williams, was recently appointed a member of the board of pharmacy by Governor Kibbey, vice C. A. Cover, resigned. Thomas J. Hunt, of 623 Walnut Street, Philadelphia, was appointed a commissioner of deeds for Arizona. J. Weinberger, of Globe, Gila County, and Thomas J. Norris, of Prescott, Yavapai County, were appointed notaries public.

A "boose" trust is the latest commercial combination to fasten its tentacles on Tucson and the Old Pueblo is staggering under an edict of saloonists announcing that beer will be raised to ten cents a glass after April 1st. The saloonists are working against the \$200,000 bond issue proposition which comes up shortly for the third time, having been twice defeated. Much bitter feeling is being shown.

The county recorder's office of Maricopa County is in many respects a model office and while it reflects great credit upon the Democratic party, yet Recorder Leonard is the man at the helm and the one who has so nicely guided the business affairs of that office, says the Phoenix Enterprise. An examination of the books of the recorder's office for 1905 shows that the county cleared \$8,100 above all expenses and that a large sum was paid into the county treasury for the uses and benefits of the county.

The work on the factory of the Eastern Sugar Company at Glendale is progressing even faster than it was expected by the most optimistic of those who are interested. The brick work will be completed by the first of the coming week on all of its outside buildings with the possible exception of the office and it is not impossible that that building will also be included. Most of the heavy machinery to be used in the factory is in place and twenty-two cars have been shipped from the east and are now at different points on the road.

### INTERESTING DATA ON APRIL WEATHER

Issued From the Local Weather Office. —Covers Period of Thirty-three Years.

The following data covering a period of thirty-three years have been compiled from the records in the local weather office. They are issued to show the conditions that have prevailed during the month of April for the above period of years but must not be construed as a forecast of the weather conditions for the coming month.

The mean or normal temperature was 47 degrees. The warmest month was that of 1902, with an average temperature of 52 degrees. The coldest month was that of 1874 with an average temperature of 42 degrees. The highest temperature recorded during the above time was on April 28 and 29, in 1879, which was 81 degrees. The lowest temperature during the same period was 11 degrees on April 8, 1875. The average date on which the last killing frost occurred in the spring was on April 15. The latest date of killing frost in the spring, was on May 18, 1878.

The precipitation for the month, either rain or melted snow or both, was .79 of an inch. The average number of days with .01 of an inch or more were five. The greatest monthly precipitation was 2.10 inches in 1900. The least monthly precipitation was .01 of an inch in 1893, and also in 1895. The greatest amount of precipitation recorded in any 24 consecutive hours was 1.27 inches on April 24, 1890. The greatest amount of snow fall recorded in any twenty-four hours (records extending to winters of 1884 and 1885, only) was 10.5 inches on April 12, 1896.

The average number of clear days was 14; partly cloudy days 12, and cloudy days 4.

The prevailing winds have been from the southwest with an average hourly velocity of 8.3 miles. The highest hourly velocity of the wind was 44 miles from the southwest on April 25, 1892.

## ZINC MINES SHUT DOWN

In Kansas-Missouri District Price of Ore Is to Remain Unchanged.

A Galena dispatch says: "At a recent meeting held by several of the large mine operators of the Missouri-Kansas district, a shutdown of a majority of the big zinc mines of the district was agreed upon. The producers announce that the shutdown will be for an indefinite period, as a remedy for strengthening the price of ore. The surplus ore in the district is estimated at 12,000 tons and is sufficient the producers say to enable the buyers to keep the price down.

One hundred mining companies and close to 1,000 miners are affected. In the Missouri-Kansas zinc ore market the buyers were unsuccessful in forcing any reduction as has been their custom the last few weeks. The highest price reported as having been paid was \$49 for the output of the Bumble Bee mine, representing a basis price of \$46 for 60 per cent ore. In nearly every sale reported the price was unchanged.

The shut-down took effect Saturday last, March 31st.
