## NO CONFERENCE ON STATEHOOD BILL TODAY

**Conferees Beveridge and Brick Absent in Indiana.**

## OFFICERS CONGRESSIONAL COMMITTEE

**Are J. S. Sherman of New York, President, and H. C. Loudenslager of New Jersey, Secy.**

Washington, April 9.—There was no meeting of the joint conference committee on the Hamilton statehood bill today on account of the absence of Senator Beveridge and Representative Brick at Indianapolis, Indiana, on the occasion of the Republican state convention for the nomination of state officials in that city. There will be a meeting of the conferees as soon as Chairman Beveridge and Representative Brick return to the Capital.

**Officers of Republican Congressional Committee.**

Washington, April 9.—Delegate Andrews will tonight attend a banquet of the Congressional Republican Campaign Committee which will be held at the Hotel Raleigh. The committee was today organized and Representative James S. Sherman of New York was elected chairman, and Representative Henry C. Loudenslager of New Jersey was elected secretary.

**Kittrell Re-Appointed Postmaster.**

Washington, April 9.—Lucius K. Kittrell, of Socorro, was today re-appointed postmaster of that town upon the recommendation of Delegate Andrews, National Committeeman Solomon Luna and Chairman H. O. Bursum of the Republican Territorial Central Committee.

**Land for Utah University.**

Washington, April 9.—In the Senate today a bill granting the University of Utah a small tract of land not needed by the Fort Douglas Military reservation was passed. Senators Hale, Allison and Teller were appointed conferees on the urgent deficiency bill. Senator McLauren then discussed the rate bill.

**Deficiency Bill to Conference.**

Washington, April 9.—The urgency deficiency bill was sent to conference in the House today the House conferees being Messrs. Littauer, Tawney and Livingstone. The House then took up District of Columbia legislation.

**Report on Immigration Bill.**

Washington, April 9.—The House committee on immigration has agreed to report a bill making restrictive amendments to the immigration laws. A sub-committee has recently completed the measure, and it is being passed on by the full committee. The measure will not be made public until this work has been completed, but it is understood that the educational and physical tests as well as certain age qualifications will be required.

**Nominations for Postmasters.**

Washington, D. C., April 9.—The President sent the following nominations to the Senate this afternoon. To be postmasters in New Mexico: L. E. Kittrell, of Socorro; in Texas, D. C. Bellows, of Seymour; H. L. Sommerville, of Richmond; W. Pilley, of Willis Point; G. C. Ross, of Wortham; in Wyoming, F. A. Lucas, of Buffalo.

**Few Amendments to Rate Bill.**

Washington, April 9.—The Hepburn bill with a mild court review amendment is the solution to the rate discussion, most likely to be proposed by the Senate. It has been said at various times that the Hepburn bill would be shipwrecked in the Senate and on other occasions it has been said that it would pass without amendment, but neither proposition appears likely. There will undoubtedly be three weeks' of discussion on the matter, but when the opponents of rate control get their forces arranged as well as they can, debating will cease abruptly and voting will be a very small matter.

It is of considerable significance that the convention of state railway commissioners came out this week squarely for the President's solution, that the rate-making power be given to the Interstate Commerce Commission, and a provision inserted specifically for a court review that would protect all the constitutional rights of the railroads, and the great amount of money they have invested. The importance of the convention is the fact that

## STRIKE SITUATION

**Pittsburg Miners Again at Work With Few Exceptions—Anthracite Men Out.**

New York, April 9.—At the request of operators the conference between the committees of the coal operators and miners which was scheduled for today to consider the situation in the anthracite fields was postponed until tomorrow.

**Strikers Call Convention.**

Wheeling, W. Va., April 9.—A call was issued today by the Mine Workers' Union, for a convention in this city next Thursday, of the delegates representing the mines in eastern Ohio and West Virginia to consider plans for settling the strike. Prospects seem bright for an adjustment and an early resumption of work. Twenty thousand miners are affected.

**No Change in Anthracite District.**

Philadelphia, April 9.—Reports received today from the anthracite coal region state that at the beginning of the second week the suspension of coal mining shows practically the same conditions as existed a week ago. Work opens in Pittsburg District. Pittsburg, April 9.—There is almost a general resumption of mining operations in the Pittsburg district today. Only one large concern has so far refused to sign the scale but it is expected to pay the advanced rate when stored supply coal is exhausted.

## ELECTION RETURNS.

**In Russia Show Magnitude of Victory of Anti-Government Party—Press Comments.**

St. Petersburg, April 9.—Belated returns today increased the magnitude of the opposition victory. Tula is the only province except Moscow which elected a majority of the conservative tickets. The Reich, the organ of the constitutional Democratic party says:

"If Count Witte last November had been able to feel the beating of the heart of Russia, and had listened to the words of M. Peterunkvitch, the world would not have witnessed the horrors of the present revolution. The voice of the people becomes clearer and louder daily. If the government does not listen to it the country is destined to pass through a cataclysm a hundred fold worse than anything which has yet transpired."

The Twentieth Century, formerly the Russ, declares the election proves that the opposition to the government extends from Finland to the Caucasus saying:

"When we recall the police preparations at the first stage of the elections; how many original electors or ornament our prisons and that the elections were held virtually under martial law, the result is even more remarkable."

## HAGUE CONFERENCE.

**Germany Wants Meeting Postponed Until Such Time as American Countries Can Participate.**

Berlin, April 9.—The Associated Press is officially informed that the German government suggested the adjournment of the peace conference at The Hague in order not to interfere with the Berne Red Cross conference. Germany has not suggested July but is trying to persuade Russia to postpone the assembling of The Hague conference so that the North Central and South American states may be able to send representatives to the European conference without interfering at the same time with the Pan-American conference.

**To Co-Operate With England.**

London, April 9.—The United States will have to support Great Britain in an effort to secure a postponement of the second peace conference to a later date than proposed by Russia.

## PATTERSON CASE.

**Motion Made to Set Aside Judgment in Fine of \$1,000 for Contempt of Court.**

Washington, April 9.—In the case of United States Senator T. M. Patterson of Colorado, a motion was filed today in the Supreme Court of the United States on behalf of the people of Colorado for a dismissal of the case of affirmation in the verdict of the Supreme Court of that state. Senator Patterson is under sentence to pay a fine of \$1,000 on a charge of contempt of that state's Supreme Court. The motion was taken under advisement.

**PLEADS NOT GUILTY TO MISAPPROPRIATING FUNDS.**

Boston, Mass., April 9.—Robert G. Porter, the private secretary to Senator Lodge pleaded not guilty today to indictments charging that he failed to turn over to the Republican state committee a contribution of \$225, received from John C. Bestgen in 1904, and was released on bail.

It represents all parts of the country, and is composed of men who have made a study of conditions relative to railroad rates.

## SOCIALIST RIOT IN STREETS OF SAN FRANCISCO

**Preceded by a Meeting in Sympathy With Arrested Men.**

## HUNG A RED FLAG ON A FOUNTAIN.

**Policemen Forced to Use Clubs Freely—Speakers Arrested—Mob Bombed Car.**

San Francisco, April 9.—The fiercest riot San Francisco ever witnessed in a generation was the sequel to last evening's meeting of Socialists held at Woodward's Pavilion, as an expression of sympathy with President Moyer and Secretary Haywood of the Western Federation of Miners. At the meeting some typical Socialistic speeches were made at which it was declared that Moyer and Haywood were innocent and if convicted they would not be hanged unless the entire United States Army was brought to assist at the execution. At the conclusion of the speech making a procession was organized and marched down town. At the corner of Kearney and Market Street, the busiest corner in the city, one of the paraders hung a red banner to the Lotta's fountain bearing the inscription:

"The Constitution be damned—so say the corporations."

George S. Holmes, a metal worker tried to address the throng which blocked the street when Policemen Steiner and Cavanaugh and Detective Thomas Ryan made their way through the crowd.

**Tore Down Socialists' Flag.**

Ryan tore down the flag and ordered Holmes to desist speaking. When the latter refused, the detective pulled him down. In a moment a riot was precipitated. The three officers used their clubs and managed to get their prisoners on a car which slowly made its way through the crowd. Almost instantly a shower of bricks and scrap iron from the new building were hurled at the car and a number of passengers were struck. In the meantime an alarm was sent to the police station and when the officers arrived they had to use their clubs freely to subdue the crowd. Several policemen were injured and seventeen rioters arrested. It was fully an hour before quiet was restored.

## DOWIE TRAIN LATE.

**Apostle Says Every Minute He Approaches Nearer Zion, However, Aids His Health.**

St. Louis, April 9.—At 10:30 o'clock this morning the train on which Dowie is coming north was reported at the Iron Mountain offices here to be four hours and five minutes late. It is expected to make up considerable time during the day's run.

**"Vindication Awaits Me," Says Dowie.**

Texarkana, April 9.—Dowie and his party arrived here from San Antonio this morning. To a reporter of the Associated Press, Dowie stated that every mile that drew him nearer to Zion his health improved and his spirits arose.

"This thing is a tonic to me," he said, "and will be the means of completely restoring my health. I feel that I am to be heard and that vindication is awaiting for me."

## HALLET RESIGNED; LEWIS APPOINTED

**Changes in United States Court of Colorado—Justice Campbell Lost Out.**

Washington, April 9.—Judge Moses Hallett of the United States District Court of Colorado, has tendered his resignation and it was announced today that the President had accepted it. The President has appointed Robert E. Lewis, formerly the judge in an El Paso County court, Colorado, to succeed Judge Hallett. Several members of the Colorado delegation in Congress discussed the appointment today. From reports they were inclined to favor the appointment of Justice John Campbell of the Colorado Supreme Court but Senators Teller and Patterson did not support Judge Campbell and it was finally decided that Judge Lewis be nominated.

## SAN JUAN COUNTY THE PROSPEROUS RAPIDLY GROWING

**Steady Improvement and Rise in Values Are Order of Day.**

## MANY NEW PEOPLE ARRIVING

**Judge Granville Pendleton of Aztec Gives Glowing Account of Growth of His Section of Southwest.**

Judge Granville Pendleton, of Aztec, who has for three terms represented the county of San Juan very efficiently and satisfactorily in the lower branch of the territorial assembly and who is the hard working and successful president of the Bureau of Immigration, and in town today in attendance on the meeting of the bureau, when called upon by a representative of the New Mexican talked in glowing terms of the advancement of his section. The Judge said:

"Conditions in San Juan County are improving more rapidly in the past few months than we really expected. The completion of the Denver & Rio Grande Railroad through Aztec and to Farmington is bringing many immigrants into our country; many of these people have capital and are investing largely. Every indication points to the fact that the Colorado & Arizona Railroad, which is really the Southern Pacific, is to commence work in the near future through the western portion of our county, opening our immense coal fields. The fact that the Southern Pacific has expended more than one million dollars in the purchase of coal lands in San Juan County and near Durango, Colorado, and the further fact that the road is completing its surveys, crosscutting and preparing for the grade and construction work is evidence that the managers are about ready to commence construction. A number of capitalists and moneyed men are figuring on ditch propositions and private reservoirs, and thousands of dollars are being invested in our county now where less than hundreds were invested heretofore. Farm lands and fruit lands are gradually advancing in price and notwithstanding these advances in price, large sums are now being invested where only small amounts were heretofore invested. The present conditions indicate that the Southern Pacific, or Colorado & Arizona line, will be built on a line north from Gallup, crossing the San Juan River at a point near Jewett, about twenty miles west of Farmington, running north through 'The Meadows' and the La Plata Valley to Durango, Colorado, the line being through the coal fields of San Juan County from Gallup to Durango. A syndicate has been formed and arrangements are being made for an electric car line from Farmington, the present terminus of the Denver & Rio Grande Railroad with the Southern Pacific at its crossing of the San Juan River at Jewett.

**Great Prosperity Now Prevails.**

"There is more prosperity in evidence in San Juan County at the present time by far than at any other time in its history. Many large farms are being cut up into smaller tracts of 10 and 20 acres, many new buildings are being constructed and a large acreage of orchards being planted. Every section of the county, under irrigation, is being rapidly developed and the towns and villages along the railroad are building up swiftly; the towns of Farmington and Aztec are among them and many new buildings are being erected. From 15 to 20 new buildings are now under course of construction in the town of Aztec and indications are that from 50 to 60 more will be completed during this spring, summer and fall; while the town of Farmington is enjoying equal prosperity. Around the towns of Aztec and Farmington nearly all the larger ranches and farms are being cut into smaller acreage tracts and sold to new comers who are building new houses, and planting new orchards, so that general improvement is in evidence on every hand. In the La Plata Valley, in the vicinity of the great coal fields, many changes are being made and with the building of the Southern Pacific this portion of San Juan County is attracting much attention. Many new settlers are coming into the country along the San Juan River, east of Farmington and Aztec, and the prices of land there is also rapidly advancing.

## BUREAU OF IMMIGRATION

**Met in Regular Annual Session this Afternoon—Work During Year Very Satisfactory.**

The Bureau of Immigration of the Territory of New Mexico met this afternoon at 2 o'clock in regular annual session according to law. There were present the following: Granville Pendleton, president, Aztec; William B. Bunker, vice president, Las Vegas; Joseph W. Bible, treasurer, Hanover; Alfred Grunsfeld, Albuquerque; Roman Armijo, Socorro; Max Frost, secretary. The business of the Bureau was of a routine character. The accounts of the treasurer were examined and found correct. The secretary submitted a report as to the work of the Bureau during the past year, which was discussed and approved. The business and methods of operation of the Bureau for the present year were considered and laid out. The results of the work of the Bureau for the past year were found very satisfactory, many letters from leading railroad officials and prominent citizens of this Territory and from the states were read, proving that much good work had been performed and that the good the Bureau was doing in inducing the right kind of immigration to New Mexico was constantly extending. The accounts and financial reports of the secretary and treasurer were found to be correct, the expenditures incurred were found to be in accordance with law, and all due economy consistent with the proper and efficient carrying out of the objects of the Bureau was shown to have been exercised. The Bureau then adjourned to meet at its next annual session or at the call of the president, should an emergency for such action arise.

## NEW MEXICO MILITARY INSTITUTE

Roswell, April 9.—A preliminary contest for the purpose of selecting cadets of the lower classes to compete with the senior class in the final debate at commencement took place on Monday last. The contestants prepared their orations unassisted by the instructors and though they displayed a tendency to crudity and nervousness, they acquitted themselves most satisfactorily. The three successful men were H. H. Calk, R. E. McComas, Major Martini, Professor of modern languages, and Captain McClure, professor of Latin and classics.

Arthur Samworth left today on a furlough for his home in El Paso, on account of the serious illness of his mother. It is to be hoped that this absence will be only temporary and that he will be able to resume his studies in the near future.

In spite of the threatening appearance of the weather last Tuesday, a very interesting game of baseball took place between the New Mexico Military Institute and the Roswell team. The former maintained their well established reputation and played a splendid game up to the fifth inning, when a typical sand storm forced them to call it off. The score was 11 to 1, in favor of the New Mexico Military Institute.

Extensive improvements have been made on the Institute property and with the budding of spring, the grounds have been turned into a park of verdure. Cement sidewalks have been laid; flowers and trees planted, and additional labor employed to preserve and improve the harmony of the external environments.

The library has been greatly improved this session and new books are being installed every month. Last week something over one hundred volumes selected from the best works of the classical and modern writers, poetry, novels, reference books, etc., were placed in this room.

## BIG VOLCANO VESUVIUS STILL PLAYS HAVOC

**Causing People to Flee in Terror to Naples for Safety.**

## THOUGHT SOVERIGNS PERFORMED MIRACLE

**When Eruptions Ceased as King and Queen Reached Desolated Districts—A Popular Benediction.**

Naples, April 9.—Better news was received this morning from the villages about Mount Vesuvius, the violence of whose eruption yesterday, spread panic through that region. Since last evening the stream of lava that was moving towards Torre del Annunziata, has been stationary and the eruptions of the volcano less violent. The rain of ashes ceased for a time last night but showers of cinders again fell upon Naples at intervals today.

**Refugees in Naples.**

One hundred and fifty thousand refugees from the afflicted districts are in Naples. The ten thousand inhabitants of Bosco Terica have all fled from their homes. King Victor Emanuel and Queen Helene today made a trip to the villages at the foot of the volcano. When the last train was leaving Bosco Trecca, a fresh crater opened near the station. The refugees from Ottaviano say their houses and five churches have collapsed from the wave of ashes.

**People Thought a Miracle Was Wrought.**

Torre del Annunziata, April 9.—The people of this town are tremendously excited. The women are especially in a state of panic. A rumor was started that the visit of the King and Queen and Duke Aosta had resulted in a miracle. Singularly enough, shortly after the arrival of the sovereigns and while the King and Queen were trying to console the people, they repeating frequently "have courage, be strong," the wind suddenly changed and the atmosphere, which up to that moment had been impregnated with sulphurous gas and suffocating fumes, cleared away and the sun burst forth, the stream of lava stopped its march after having destroyed a section of the northeast part of a suburb and the air rang with benedictions for the King, from his devoted subjects. The King and Queen wished to visit other districts but railroad traffic was interrupted and they were forced to return to Naples whence they set out for Ottaviano and Torre del Greco.

**Unprecedented Amount of Ashes.**

Naples, April 9.—The quantity of ashes and cinders thrown up by Mount Vesuvius in the last twenty-four hours is unprecedented. An analysis shows the discharge is chiefly composed of iron, sulphur and magnesia. The evacuation of the threatened towns and villages continues. At many places the people are suffering from panic and a state of great confusion exists. It is now estimated that half a million people have fled from their homes. Many persons are leaving Naples in alarm and traffic on the railroads is congested.

## MUST LOWER TUNNEL.

**Chicago Street Railway Company Loses Case in Supreme Court—For Common Good.**

Washington, D. C., April 9.—Whether the Chicago street railway company at that city shall remove or lower its tunnel under Chicago river at Van Buren street was today decided by the supreme court against the company on the ground of an exercise of governmental authority in the interest of common welfare.

## ARGUMENT HEARD.

**In Rebate Cases in Kansas City Against Packing Houses, Railroads and Individuals.**

Kansas City, Mo., April 9.—The various motions, pleas and orders, growing out of the indictment last December of five local packing houses, three railroads, the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul, Burlington and Alton and a number of individuals charged with giving or conspiring to give rebates, were argued here today in the United States district court.

## THE ALGECIRAS CONFERENCE.

The European monarchies are congratulating each other over the result of the Algeiras conference. France is happy because it has come out on top. England is glad because it helped France. Germany has no kick coming because Emperor Wilhelm's vanity has been gratified by the acknowledgment that Germany is "some pumpkins." Spain feels good at being once more in the diplomatic swim and Italy is satisfied because France has been helped. Even your Uncle Sam feels proud because he has had something to do with the job and has again appeared as a successful peace maker. As to Morocco itself that cuts no ice. To be sure the Moroccans do not amount to much and are very little good either to humanity or to themselves, but then they naturally object to being handled without gloves and without being asked "by your leave."

Algeiras has again proven itself an important place. In 1711 the Saracens then gained their first foothold on the Iberian Peninsula. During the first decade of the nineteenth century, many important naval fights occurred in its vicinity between the English and the combined French and Spanish fleets and recently it has been again called to the attention of the world by the diplomatic conference just ended there. The Kansas City Journal in considering the result of the conference makes sensible and correct comment thereon saying that the conference at Algeiras over the spoliation of Morocco has ended at last to the satisfaction of all concerned—with the exception, of course, of Morocco. That unhappy African sultanate is in the regretful mood of a man who has been robbed and stands by while the high waymen are dividing the loot. Morocco is expected to be gay and light-hearted because the sultan's horses and shoes, or sandals, have been left to him. A terrible European war has been averted and the diplomats will return to their various capitals full of virtuous satisfaction at their accomplishments.

It is hard for the average person to augur just what has been done to Morocco. In the dispatches we learn that France has gained a great diplomatic victory in being allowed certain police privileges. It sounds like the confidential reports of a Democratic caucus. We understand, for instance, that France is to be allowed two sergeants and twelve patrolmen at Tetuan, with a captain and patrol wagon at La Rache. An ambulance station with a corps of plain clothes men and mob guns will be established at Casa Blanca and Tangier is to be placed in charge of a lieutenant from France. As a concession to Spain, which, we must assume, helped stuff the ballot boxes at Algeiras, that country is to have representation among the water wards.

It appears that this long conference at Algeiras was in settlement of claims of Germany and France, over influences and concessions in Morocco to which neither had a moral right. Besides the police there was the bank to be considered. The first French victory came when France demanded that these two propositions be considered together, while Germany demanded a separation. The cards fell favorably to France, which was supported by Great Britain, Russia, Italy, Spain, Portugal and the United States. Only Austria remained on the German side. Morocco was not considered, although it was Morocco's country that was being torn and traded. There is grim humor in the report that "Sweden did not vote on this proposition," believing, presumably, that it didn't make much difference whether Germany or France got the bone. Germany consoles itself that it has really won a victory and with true Teutonic cunning points to the professed discovery that it has only one friend, Austria, to depend on in future "international discussions." The triple alliance being broken, Germany will now go to work

building a bigger navy and completing its military system, in order to stand a better chance when the next helpless principality is to be sandbagged and looted.

## THE BEAN IN THEIR OWN EYE.

The Congressional delegation of the great state of New York is solidly arrayed against the just claims to separate statehood of the Territory of New Mexico. The grave and reverend Senators and highly intelligent and finely educated representatives from the Empire State assert vehemently and emphatically that the people of the Sunshine Territory are unfit for statehood and should be kept out of the Union for ever and ever, in order not to endanger the power of New York and other eastern states in the Senate and therefore in the government of this country.

They say that the citizens of this Territory are unfit for statehood because many ignorant people live here; because they do not understand or care for the principles of this government and because generally speaking they are "no good." These Senators and Representatives never look at the conditions of their own chief city and compare matters there with those obtaining in this commonwealth. Were they so to do, New Mexico would have the best of the bargain by a long distance. In this Territory people accused of crime are, in the great majority of cases, tried and if found guilty, convicted and punished. Punishment is assessed according to the nature of the crimes of which they are found guilty. In Tammany New York they do business upon a different basis. The city government and the police department are in with the criminal classes and crime is rampant.

## MAKE SANTA FE A CITY OF TREES.

With dandelion and apricots in bloom at Santa Fe, the time has come for the planting of shade and fruit trees. No better service can be done the city by any one, than the planting of trees and yet it is a task, rather a pleasure, whose cost is slight and the reward of which is great. No home so humble but that it can be made a palace by the planting of trees and shrubs and no home so splendid but that it will not gain in beauty by the shade of tree or blossom of lilac. What trees to plant is an important question and is well answered for New Mexico by Fabian Garcia of the College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts in a recent bulletin issued by the New Mexico Agricultural Experiment Station. Make Santa Fe a city of trees, of lilacs, of roses, of orchards and all of its minor defects, real or imaginary, will be forgotten by tourists, by visitors and by newcomers, while to the residents, the beauty of foliage and shade will ever be a source of pleasure and delight.

## A SERIOUS QUESTION TO CONSIDER.

The situation concerning the Hamilton statehood bill in Washington is clearing and it is becoming more apparent daily that the bill with the first Foraker amendment will pass the 59th Congress, be signed by the President and become law. The first Foraker amendment provides for the separate vote of the people of New Mexico and Arizona upon the question of the adoption of the constitution for the new state to be submitted to them at the same time that the election of state officials is to be held, therefore it will be well for the citizens of this Territory to commence to consider this matter very seriously. It is a condition, not a theory, that will confront them and a very serious condition, the most serious ever in their history. The New Mexican assumed that this would be the final outcome of this matter months ago and it has no cause as yet to change its views on the subject.

## SCHOOL GARDENS IN NEW MEXICO.

Miss Katherine L. Craig, state superintendent of schools of Colorado, has issued an official circular in which she urges the establishment of gardens in connection with the public schools. She rightly says that the cultivation of the soil is the best manual training that can be given a child. She believes in a regular course in gardening and maintains that incidentally it offers the most substantial basis for reading, writing, language work, arithmetic, nature study and physical exercise in the open air and sunlight. The New Mexican has advocated the establishment of school gardens in New Mexico for years past, knowing that the principal industry of the Territory is agriculture and that the tilling of the soil is the most certain guarantee against poverty in the commonwealth. Santa Fe too should have its school gardens and the sooner the work is taken up, the greater the credit to be given the Board of Education and city school superintendent.

"It is time to clean up the city,"—Las Vegas Optic.

Yes, and it is more than high time that the city of Santa Fe be cleaned. This may not happen until the new city administration comes in and very likely not thereafter. It seems that the present administration is waiting to go out and the new administration is waiting to come in, in the meantime, residents and sojourners suffer from the unsightly and dirty condition of the thoroughfares and business streets.

## TAXATION OF TIMBER LANDS.

There are thousands and thousands of acres of timber land in various counties in the Territory that are assessed at less than one-tenth of their value. These are found to a great extent, in western Colfax County, in Taos, in Rio Arriba, in Santa Fe, McKinley, in Valencia, in Torrance, in Lincoln, in Otero, in Socorro and in Sierra Counties. Here is a hint to the assessors which they should heed and by which they should profit. Take for instance, the huge landed property of the American Lumber Company in Valencia and McKinley Counties! Look at some of the timbered land grants in northern Santa Fe, in Rio Arriba, in Taos and in Colfax Counties. Look at the timber in the Manzano range, in the Sacramento and White Mountains. Within a few miles of this city there are very valuable timber lands which are assessed at a song.

Raton is to have another eastern railroad connection. The Santa Fe, Liberal and Englewood Railroad Company has been organized to build from Des Moines, Union County, to connect the Colorado & Southern with the Rock Island System at Liberal, Kansas, and the Santa Fe system at Englewood, Kansas. The Santa Fe, Liberal and Englewood will be an extension of the Santa Fe, Raton & Des Moines Railway which will build from Raton to Des Moines. The new company is capitalized at \$6,000,000 and the incorporators are New York, Trinidad, Colorado and Raton parties. Let the good work go on.

That the farmers of the Mesilla Valley are in earnest about doing everything in their power to aid the construction by the federal government of the Elephant Buttes Dam and Reservoir, is shown by the election of last week, in which the land owners of the valley voted to ratify the contract with the government binding themselves to repay the government for the outlay incurred in constructing the proposed irrigation system. Only four votes, representing \$3 acres, were cast against the ratification, while the vote in favor of the contract represented 24,316 acres.

"When Arizona and New Mexico come into the Union as one state the fight over the site for the Capital may speedily depopulate it,"—Erie, Pennsylvania, Times.

The ignorance of eastern newspapers is astonishing. The Times is a paper printed in a good sized eastern town and is supposed to be read by intelligent people. Items like the above in its columns prove conclusively that it is not worth the paper that it is written on and that people who pay their subscriptions to it are losing money.

The town of Orogrande, although but a few months old, has concluded to incorporate and be managed by a town government. The county commissioners of Otero County at their meeting Monday last, passed a formal resolution authorizing the incorporation. Orogrande is evidently a lively youngster and the mining district tributary to it is more than lively and busy. Wherever you turn in New Mexico, progress and advancement are the rule and retrogression is the exception.

There are huge coal piles in New Mexico but they are in the ground. Hence, the people are compelled to pay very exorbitant prices for a poor quality of coal. By and by the people will have an inning in this and other lines wherein they are now unjustly oppressed.

Richard Mansfield has announced that he expects to retire in 1909; he evidently gave this date that people may prepare for it. He seems to forget that people, as a rule, have prepared for the emergency long ago.

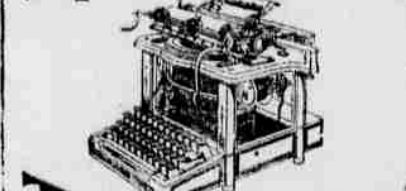

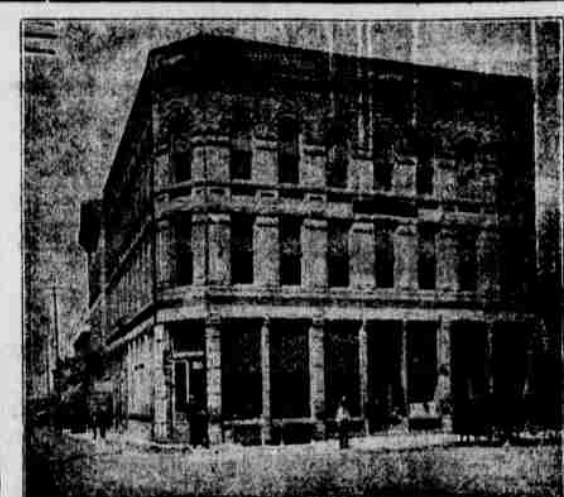

### SAN JUAN COUNTY NEWS

Development and Improvement the Order of the Day—Aztec and Farmington Elections.

In San Juan County the man with the plow is busy. April has appeared with a warm smile and the tillers of the soil are jubilating over the prospects for the coming year. The county is more than keeping pace with the general growth of other sections in the Territory. One of the most encouraging things is the certainty that much work will be done on new irrigation enterprises during the present year. The construction of any one of the proposed canals will add many thousand acres of fine land to the tillable area of the county. Enterprise here is awakening to the possibilities of fruit growing and many efforts are being made to furnish water for the arid but fertile mesas. At Flora Vista a hydraulic ram is being put in to carry water above the grade of the ditch. In other sections the gasoline engines are used. At Fruitland a large water wheel will be installed to generate electric power to be used in pumping water to the high lands along the San Juan. The progress of the county is general and of a very substantial kind.

At Aztec many new buildings have been erected and many more are contemplated for the accommodation of the "new comer." The large farms and ranches are being divided into smaller tracts to supply the demand for five, ten and twenty acre lots any one of which will produce a handsome living for the owner. The plan of subdividing these larger tracts is being followed extensively at Farmington and other sections of the county. Aztec enjoyed an election thrill on prohibition and high license last Tuesday. The high license ticket carried the day.

In Farmington there is much activity in building. During the last five months there has been an average of over one business or residence building built per week. This average would be even greater but lack of all kinds of building material has made it impossible for contractors to accept work. Contracts have been let for some fifteen new structures which will be rushed to completion just as soon as material can be had. Three cars of fruit trees were received from Utah last week with three other cars to come from Kansas; to say nothing of several small consignments of trees received this spring. These tree shipments represent many thousand trees which when planted will cover considerably over 600 acres of land in the vicinity of Farmington. Other large shipments of trees have been received at Aztec and other points. The election for trustees of the town was colored with an issue on high license or no saloons. Very little ginger was displayed although nearly every vote in the town was polled. The high license men were elected by an average majority of 31 votes. The poll list shows an increase of over 33 per cent in the voting population of the town during the past year.

The people of San Juan County would like to have statehood and in this respect are very much like the bachelor maid who wanted a man—most any kind, just so it is statehood.

## NEW MEXICO HAPPENINGS

C. E. Dagnette, the outing agent for the Indians of the southwest, is conducting negotiations with coast line railroads for supplying them with Indian labor.

The farmers of Sandoval County are in a happy frame of mind because of the plentiful rainfall during the past week and the excellent prospects for a big crop.

The New Mexico Association of Congregational Churches and Mission Teachers, held a meeting in Albuquerque, Friday, Saturday and Sunday, last. They discussed their work and each secured many valuable pointers.

The heaviest rain storm of the year struck Albuquerque Friday afternoon and for a time the inhabitants thought that it would be useless to buy the water works of that city. No damage and much good to crops resulted from the rainfall.

It is estimated that more tourists, healthseekers and farmers arrived in New Mexico this year than in any time past. What is of more importance, is the fact that many of them located here and are now good progressive citizens.

It is currently reported that the large sulphur deposits in the Nacl-

miento country are to be opened up by Denver parties and that considerable costly machinery will be installed soon. Two representatives of the company which will handle the fields are now investigating conditions.

The Rock Island & Southwestern Railroad is enlarging its yards at Tucumcari, in order to be able to handle an output of 250 cars of coke and coal daily from the Dawson mines. This mine formerly sent out 60 cars daily but is increasing the amount because of a larger demand. Additional revenue will result to Tucumcari residents.

It is reported that nearly 300 indictments for alleged violations of the law were returned by the recent Grant County grand jury. One indictment is said to be against the El Paso & Southwestern Railroad for running its trains on Sunday. There is considerable feeling among residents of Paradise and Rodeo because of the wholesale arrests being made by the officers for the alleged violation of the Sunday law.

## ARIZONA NEWS NOTES

Hon. B. A. Fowler, of Phoenix, has defeated Dr. W. E. Wilbur, of Mesa, for president of the Salt River Valley Water Users' Association by 12,000 majority.

Poles are being distributed along Stone Avenue for the Tucson Electric Railway Company, while the men are digging holes in which the poles are to be placed.

The baseball game Saturday between the Indians of the Phoenix Indian school and the high school of that city resulted in a decisive victory for the Indians, they winning by a score of 17 to 5.

Charles Hanson of the Monte Vista mine reports that his property is being developed rapidly, and that the work of development is showing the property to be better as it proceeds. The amount of work up to the present time amounts to about 1,400 feet.

W. F. T. Donald, president of the Oriental Copper Company, and A. S. Mills, superintendent, established a new automobile speed record between their property and Phoenix Saturday evening, when they made the thirty mile run in two hours and fifteen minutes.

The receipts of the postoffice at Phoenix for the year ending March 31, were \$35,625.67, which advances the postoffice in that city to the highest grade possible for a second class office, and indicates that before long it will attain a position among the first class offices.

Forest rangers have recently been instructed, under the new regulations, to assist in the protection of all stock grazed on the forest reserves under permit. Under these instructions rangers are required to investigate cattle killed on the range or being driven away and report any such illegal acts to the proper authorities.

C. M. Etter, general manager of the Arizona extension, went to Phoenix a few days ago to get more teams to rush the work of completing the extension as rapidly as possible. He had 120 men at work, and only thirty teams. About fifty teams were needed. The teams were secured and the work will probably be completed in ten days.

The Queen Hotel at Douglas, which was closed by litigation last November, will be again opened to the public as soon as the Provident Mutual Building and Loan Association of Los Angeles can arrange with the right people to take it in hand. The furniture has been replaced as a result of the agreement, and everything is being put in readiness for the opening.

Lafayette Meyers, assistant general manager of the Glendale Sugar Beet Company, states that all the machinery has been installed in the new factory and that it will be completed within a short time. The brick work has all been completed, and everything indicates that the factory will be ready by the time the beet crop is harvested. The beets are looking fine, and everything points towards a good crop. The raising of sugar beets promises to become a great industry in the vicinity of Phoenix.
