## **U.N. Observer Group (onuca) To Monitor Activity On Honduran-nicaraguan Border**

On Aug. 31, Gen. Victor Suanzes, head of the UN observer group in Central America (ONUCA), told reporters the mission had opened an office in Danli, Honduras. Suanzes said government officials in Tegucigalpa were concerned about the possible use of Honduran territory by Nicaraguan "recontras" to launch attacks, and had requested that ONUCA set up monitoring activities along the Honduran-Nicaraguan border. ONUCA commenced operations in Central America in 1989. The observer force, comprised of 130 persons from 11 countries, maintains two offices in Guatemala, four in Honduras, four in Nicaragua, and one in the Gulf of Fonseca. Four persons were assigned to the Danli post. (Basic data from AFP, 08/31/91; ACAN-EFE, 08/30/91, 08/31/91)
