ESTIMATES PLACE DEAD AT 600

Details of Southern Mexico Quake Still Lacking

VOLCANO ABOUT TO ERUPT

People Waiting in Terror to See What Colima is Going to Do.

City of Mexico, April 19.—Details of the earthquake in Southern Mexico Monday morning are still lacking. According to the latest estimates based to a great extent on unconfirmed reports, six hundred are dead and over 3,000 were injured. It is impossible to estimate the property loss, but it will amount to millions of dollars. In the town of Chilapa, nearly fifty bodies have been taken from the ruins and nearly 800 are being cared for in temporary hospitals.

The people are now waiting in terror to see what the volcano of Colima will do. It seems on the verge of eruption and in the immediate danger zone are prosperous sugar and coffee plantations and several thriving cities. This volcano has terrorized Southern Mexico for half a century.

American Interests Escape Damage.

New York, April 19.—Private messages from the business interests in the territory affected by the earthquake in Mexico show that these interests suffered no damage at La Dieha in the state of Guerrero during the earthquake last Monday. Extensive business interests in which Americans are concerned and employed at Marques on the Pacific coast, although only about twelve miles from Acapulco, escaped damage.

A Repetition of Frisco Upheaval.

New York, April 19.—Professor C. P. Berkey, of the Department of Geology at Columbia University, says that the earthquake conditions prevailing in Mexico are exactly similar to those which prevailed in San Francisco, a year ago.

Mexico is comparatively a new region according to Professor Berkey, where the process of mountain formation is still going on, thus causing earthquakes. He continues:

Volcanoes Not Responsible.

"I cannot connect the present disturbances with any particular volcanic eruption although there are in Mexico now four active volcanoes. There is not, however, any necessary connection between these volcanoes and the present quake."

Another Severe Quake Recorded.

London, April 19.—John Milne, the seismologist, says that his instruments recorded a large earthquake beginning at 9:10 o'clock Wednesday night. It reached its maximum intensity at 10:05 o'clock and lasted a long time afterwards. He estimated it was 5,400 miles distant, probably in Mexico or in the northern part of South America. The Austrian observatory telegraphs that a great earthquake began at 10:15 o'clock, mid-European time Wednesday. The center of the disturbance was apparently 6,250 miles away.

RECEIVER FOR BIG OIL COMPANY

Federal Court Grants Petition of Stockholders of Uncle Sam Company—Millions Involved.

Topeka, Kans., April 19.—Judge J. C. Pollock in the United States district court here today announced that he would grant the petition of the complaining stockholders and appoint a receiver for the Uncle Sam Oil Company, whose secretary and treasurer, H. H. Tucker, Jr., was recently indicted on a charge of using the U. S. mails to defraud. The company has 10,000 stockholders distributed over all parts of the country. A statement issued on April 5th last, showed that the receipts from the sale of stock amounted to over a million dollars.

ENEMY WITHDRAWS FROM HONDURAS

Nicaraguan Troops Leave for Home—Peace in Central American Will Be Restored in Near Future.

Washington, April 19.—A tentative agreement for peace, according to advices received here today, has been arranged between Nicaragua and Salvador which will probably end the Central American war. Orders have been issued for the withdrawal of all Nicaraguan troops from Honduras and the peace negotiations are proceeding with every prospect of successful fruition within a brief time.

ADAMS GIVEN TEN YEARS IN PRISON

Raton Man Pleads Guilty to Second Degree Murder—Other Cases Disposed of.

Raton, N. M., April 19.—Cabe Adams, charged with the murder of Warren B. Middleton, in this city two years ago, withdrew his plea of not guilty when his case was called in the District Court here this week and through his counsel asked permission of Judge William J. Mills to enter a plea of guilty of second degree murder. This was granted and the court sentenced him to ten years' imprisonment in the Territorial penitentiary at Santa Fe.

The District Court which has been in session here for the past three weeks adjourned on Wednesday. The session just closed was a very busy one and a large number of cases were disposed of. Sentences were pronounced in the following cases:

In the case of James Givens, charged with larceny, a verdict of guilty having been brought in by the jury, the defendant was given a year in the Territorial penitentiary.

Juan D. Sandoval, found guilty of rape, had sentence suspended until the next term of court and was allowed to give bond in the sum of \$500. The defendant was tried during the present term of court on the above charge on the person of a girl under fourteen years of age and found guilty. He is fifty-seven years old, and a ranchman in the eastern part of Colfax county.

James Hall and James Garner, found guilty of stealing a small sum of money from a companion named Neighbors, were each given one year in the Territorial penitentiary.

Daniel Casados, a resident of the East Side, found guilty of assault with a pistol, was given ninety days in the county jail.

James Wilson, who was found guilty of the theft of a watch, was sentenced to one year in the Territorial penitentiary.

James O'Neal and Julian Torres were found guilty on the charge of robbery, the complainant being Martin C. Shoup, a workman in a railroad construction gang here several months ago. O'Neal was given two years and Torres one year in the Territorial penitentiary. The defendants were charged with the theft of two watches.

Joaquin Leyba, found guilty on the charge of assault and battery, was given ninety days in the county jail.

Anna Jones, the colored woman who was found guilty of stealing the sum of \$60 from Julian de Herrera, a Mexican coal miner in Gardiner some months ago, was given one year in the Territorial penitentiary.

Effie May Wallis, who pleaded guilty to writing a threatening letter for the purpose of extorting money, was sentenced to one year in the Territorial penitentiary.

PRISONERS FROM ROOSEVELT COUNTY

Trio Sentenced to Territorial Penitentiary for Terms of Imprisonment From One to Three Years.

Convicted of felonies at the recent term of the District Court of Roosevelt County, three prisoners were brought to this city last night by Sheriff Joseph Long and his deputy, J. B. Crawford, and were lodged in the Territorial penitentiary.

The convicts were Fred Ritter, aged 41, who was sentenced to three years' imprisonment for forgery; Charles Wolf, aged 37, two years for drawing and flourishing a deadly weapon, and M. M. Scott, aged 43, one year for carrying and drawing a deadly weapon.

INTERNATIONAL LAW SOCIETY MEETS

Secretary of State Elihu Root Responds to Address of Welcome.—Washington Scene of Sessions.

Washington, April 19.—The American Society of International Law met in this city today in its first annual session. After the address of welcome which was replied to by Secretary of State Root, the president of the society said that the morning and afternoon session would be devoted to papers and a general discussion of these topics.

COLORADO MAN LOSES LIFE IN HOTEL FIRE

Elmira, Ohio, April 19.—The Hotel Campbell in Athens, Pennsylvania was destroyed by fire early this morning. Elam Kendall, of Cripple Creek, Colorado, was unable to get out and lost his life. Several others were injured by jumping.

UNCLE SAM ABOLISHES COLORADO LAND OFFICE

Washington, April 19.—The United States land office at Gunnison, Colorado, was today abolished and the register and receiver were ordered to transfer the archives to the Montrose office at Montrose, Colorado.

CAPTAIN CURRY ARRIVES IN JULY

Territorial Secretary J. W. Raynolds Has been Named as Acting Governor During Interim—Hagerman's Resignation was Demanded Says Report.

Washington, April 19.—It was learned from official sources at the White House today that Governor Hagerman, of New Mexico, who tendered his resignation as executive of that Territory yesterday to President Roosevelt, was given a tip by a "pre-emptory request" that his resignation to take effect immediately was what the President desired.

Before action was taken on Hagerman's resignation, Delegate Andrews had a long conference with the President.

Captain George Curry, the new Governor, is personally known to the President and is at present Governor of the Island of Samar in the Philippine Islands. He is a resident of New Mexico where he is well known and universally liked.

An order has been issued from the White House by which James W. Raynolds, at present Secretary of the Territory, will assume the duties of acting Governor until the arrival of Captain Curry which may be three months.

Delegate W. H. Andrews of New Mexico, will leave for the Territory, the latter part of next week. In the meantime he has many matters here of interest to New Mexicans to look after before leaving for Santa Fe.

BLIZZARD RAGES IN COLORADO

Wyoming and Northern New Mexico Also Enveloped

GREAT DAMAGE ANTICIPATED

Fear That Fruit and Early Vegetables Have Been Killed.

Denver, Colo., April 19.—The terrific snow storm which has prevailed in the Rocky Mountains for two days, spread over Colorado, Wyoming and a portion of New Mexico today and the Weather Bureau predicts that it will continue for twenty-four hours. Snow began falling at Denver early this morning with the temperature down to 36 degrees. A strong wind was blowing early this morning, but this subsided as the day advanced and the temperature rose. Great damage to fruit and early vegetables is apprehended.

Heavy Snow in Oklahoma.

Oklahoma City, Okla., April 18.—Reports from western Oklahoma say that a heavy snow is falling from Chickasha, Indian Territory, to Amarillo, Texas, and north to the northern limit of Oklahoma. At Gerry, Oklahoma, the snow is reported to be falling so fast as to make it difficult to keep trains moving.

DUKE'S MIXTURES AGAIN VICTORIOUS

High School Boys Go Down in Defeat This Time by Score of 9 to 6—An Interesting Game.

Two games played and two games won is the record so far this season of the Duke's Mixtures, one of the latest recruits to the baseball contingent of Santa Fe. They defeated the High School team yesterday by a score of 9 to 6. The game was replete with pretty plays and among the features were two home runs. The batteries were J. Alarid and P. Alarid for the victors and E. Safford and J. Safford for the vanquished.

RAIN PREDICTED NORTH AND EAST

Partly cloudy with rain in north and east portions tonight and Saturday was the forecast for New Mexico sent out today by the Weather Bureau. The temperature here at 6 o'clock this morning was 37 degrees. The lowest temperature during last night was also 37 degrees. The maximum temperature yesterday was 63 degrees at 2:30 p. m., and the minimum temperature 40 degrees at 11:15 p. m., making a mean temperature for the day of 52 degrees. The relative humidity was 30 per cent. The precipitation last night was only a trace.

PHILIPPINE CITY SWEEP BY FIRE

Town of Iloilo is Destroyed By Con- flagration

20,000 RENDERED HOMELESS

Terrific Earthquake Damages Other Towns in Islands —Manila Shaken.

Manila, P. I., April 19.—The town of Iloilo was totally destroyed by fire today and twenty thousand people have been rendered homeless as a result. The flames are still raging and the fire has passed beyond all control. The damage cannot be estimated at this time. Only meagre reports have been received so far as all telegraph communication has been cut off. The town of Iloilo is situated on the Island of Panay and is one of the largest and most important towns in the Philippine Islands.

Islands United By Earthquakes.

Reports have been received here from South Luzon of a severe earthquake in the town of Nueva Caceres, the capital of the province of Aribos Camarine, and also at Tayabas, in the province of Tayabas, in northern Luzon. Great destruction of buildings is reported, but so far no mention has been made of any loss of life. A severe quake was experienced here at Manila with intermittent shocks for three hours this morning. Three of the shocks were quite severe, but the majority of the others were scarcely perceptible.

NEBRASKA LAND GRAFTERS GUILTY

Three Men Convicted at Omaha of Entering Into Conspiracy to Defraud Government.

Omaha, Neb., April 19.—Thomas M. Huntington, Ami B. Todd and Fred Hoyt were convicted in the United States District Court here today on charges of conspiracy to defraud the government out of about half a million acres of public lands in Sheridan and Cherry Counties, Nebraska.

HUNDREDS PERISH IN TYPHOON

Which Recently Swept Over Caroline Islands—Cocanut Trees Destroyed.

Berlin, April 19.—A cable message from the governor of the island of Yap, announces that a disastrous typhoon swept over the Caroline Islands March 28 and that two hundred and ninety of the 2,800 natives of the Ulithi group were drowned. All the coconut trees were destroyed and a famine threatens the survivors.

BOY MURDERER SECURES LIBERTY

Isaac D. Cobbling, Who Killed His Father Released From Penitentiary After Serving Sentence.

Isaac D. Cobbling was released today from the Territorial penitentiary and sent to his home at Clouderoff by the Society of the Friendless. He had been convicted of the murder of his father when between twelve and thirteen years old and sentenced to a term of three years' imprisonment in expiation of his crime.

Mercy was tempered with justice in the conviction and sentence of the boy who had slain his own father, owing to the extreme youth of the slayer and the pathetic circumstances. The little fellow, in spite of his tender age, was compelled the herd sheep for his father who lived on a ranch in Dona Ana County and one day several of the sheep strayed away and could not be found. The youthful sheep herder feared to report the loss to his father who had been in the habit, it is said, of mistreating him. He realized that his father would whip him if he told of his misfortune and with a dread of further parental chastisement he secured a gun and shot his father. The wound proved fatal.

The Society of the Friendless became interested in the lad and upon his liberation secured him transportation to his home at Clouderoff.

HOGS FATTENED ON PEAS IN DEMAND

Another Shipment of Porkers From Colorado Pass Through City En Route to California.

Fattening hogs on peas is developing into an important industry in the San Luis Valley, and a large percentage of the porkers are finding their way to the markets of California.

Sixteen carloads of pea-fattened hogs from the Colorado valley left this city yesterday via the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railway, half of the shipment being billed to Los Angeles, and the other half to San Francisco. The swine arrived here the day before over the Denver & Rio Grande Railroad, having been transferred here from narrow gauge to standard gauge cars.

Already this season over twenty thousand hogs have been shipped from the San Luis Valley through this city to Los Angeles and San Francisco. Other shipments are booked to follow.

RAPID RISE IN RIO GRANDE AT EL PASO

El Paso, Tex., April 19.—The Rio Grande has been rising rapidly at this point since yesterday morning, and this morning nearly all of the sandbars had been covered. Before night it is expected that the banks will be full.

The current is swift and while there is no prospect of a flood stage being reached there is already some uneasiness among the people who live along the river.

Melting snow in the mountains is said to be the cause of the present rise.

PANHANDLE STOCK MEN NEW OFFICERS

Roswell, N. M., April 19.—The eighth annual convention of the Panhandle Stockmen's Association which has been in session here adjourned yesterday. Amarillo, Texas, was selected as the place for the next meeting. The following officers were elected for the ensuing year: T. S. Bugbee, president; T. J. Richards, first vice-president; George M. Slaughter, second vice-president; A. H. Brainard, secretary; E. T. Ware, treasurer.

LAND FRAUD PROSECUTION FOREIGN TO MURDER CASES

Denver, Colo., April 19.—In an interview with an Associated Press representative today Judge M. C. Burch, special assistant United States attorney general, who recently returned from Idaho, denied that there was any connection whatever between the prosecution of the land fraud cases in that state and the trial of the Western Federation of Miners' officials.

IRATE ARIZONA WOMAN SLAYS HER HUSBAND

Globe, Ariz., April 19.—Officers left here yesterday for Pinto Creek, where they were called to arrest Mrs. Fred Walteck, who had shot and killed her husband, a miner employed by the Calumet & Globe Company. Before her marriage Mrs. Walteck was employed as a "nightingale" in a saloon here.

MRS. McLEAN ELECTED PRESIDENT D. A. R.

Washington, April 19.—Mrs. Donald McLean was elected president of the Daughters of the American Revolution today and the remainder of the administration ticket was successful.

CHILE VOLCANO STILL ACTIVE

New Craters Adding to Work of Destruction

PEOPLE PANIC STRICKEN

Earthquake Shocks Continue Accompanied By Subter- anean Explosions.

Limá, Peru, April 19.—The volcano Payeheman in the province of Valdivia, Chile, is yet in active eruption and several new craters have developed and opened. The losses in the neighborhood are enormous and the inhabitants are panic-stricken. Showers of hot ashes are falling and there are continued earthquake shocks accompanied by subterranean explosions. The frightened inhabitants are fleeing in all directions.

BOLD ATTEMPT TO WRECK FAST TRAIN

Men Who Placed Obstructions on Track of Maricopa and Phoenix Railway Are Captured.

Phoenix, Ariz., April 19.—Two men are in the branch county jail in Tempe, charged with an attempt to wreck the Maricopa and Phoenix flyer by placing obstructions on the track eight miles from Tempe at an early hour yesterday.

But for Bridge Engineer Charles Howard, who was himself thrown from the track with a small handcar, the train, which did not come until several hours later, might have been derailed.

Howard was working his machine at a fast clip when the front wheel struck two angle irons which are used in fastening rails to ties. The handcar was derailed, Howard getting a bad fall, but receiving no serious injuries.

Superintendent Scott was notified in Phoenix and went at once to Tempe, where he joined Marshal Eastwood and together they went in search of two men who had been seen near the obstruction by Howard.

When Superintendent Scott and Marshal Eastwood reached the scene of the obstruction they found the same two men who were hurriedly walking along the track. Eastwood brought the mback to Tempe, where they were lodged in jail.

Officers are inclined to believe that the men deliberately planned to wreck the train.

FIRE DESTROYS 100 AUTOMOBILES

Explosion of Gasoline in Big St. Louis Garage Causes Loss Estimated at \$225,000.

St. Louis, Mo., April 19.—An explosion of gasoline caused a fire in the garage of the Mississippi Valley Automobile Company today that extended across the street to the Central Auto Exchange garage destroying both buildings and about 100 automobiles. The loss is estimated at \$225,000.

PRESIDENT ENLARGES NEW MEXICO RESERVE

Washington, April 19.—On April 15 the President signed a proclamation creating the Gallinas national forest in New Mexico. By this proclamation about 40,000 acres are added in a strip which encircles the original forest completely, except at the southwest corner. The added lands are slightly alienated and consist entirely of the timber land and wood land types. A considerable quantity of merchantable yellow pine is included, but the larger part of the forest growth is juniper and pinon.

ROUGH RIDERS MAY NOT HOLD REUNION THIS YEAR

Prescott, Ariz., April 19.—President Hunter of the Rough Rider association stated yesterday after conferring with the "Bucky" O'Neill Rough Rider Monument Commission here that the Rough Rider reunion would not be held in this city this year as planned owing to the inability of President Roosevelt to attend. Hunter stated that he doubted if a reunion would be held at all until 1908, when Prescott would entertain the gathering.

EMPEROR OF JAPAN WELCOMES GENERAL BOOTH

Tokio, April 19.—The Emperor of Japan has joined in the popular welcome to General Booth of the Salvation Army and will receive the general in special audience tomorrow.

THE CHANGE IN NEW MEXICO'S GOVERNORSHIP.

For the past six months the New Mexican has made a consistent, insistent, and persistent fight for a change in the governorship of the Sunshine Territory, and its efforts have had something to do with the change which took place yesterday as announced from Washington. The fight made by this journal was commenced and carried on for the benefit of the whole people generally and for the Republican party of New Mexico in particular. It is well known to all fair-minded citizens who pay attention to New Mexico's political and material conditions that had Governor Hagerman remained as executive for any length of time the results of his administration and the acts of some of his subordinate officials would have brought about great disaster to the Territory and would have been the undoing of the Republican party of New Mexico.

Naturally and consistent with human nature and especially with some human nature in New Mexico, Governor Hagerman had the support of those whom he appointed to office; of those members of the Republican party who wanted to get even with other members of the party and who cared more for this than they did for the good of the party; of quite an element that is always ready for a change, follows the political wind and of mighty little thinking; of the yellow sheets and newspaper slanders and libellers like Macpherson's Albuquerque Morning Fakir and Mason's Democrat copper-head sheet in Roswell; of those who wanted executive favor and who saw office and gain, patronage and profit, graft and boodle; also of a few citizens who thought they were doing right or who were honestly mistaken in their views. The number of the latter, however, to the credit of the Territory be it said was not large.

The charges preferred were signed by prominent and influential citizens, were very serious and supported by affidavits and that fully substantiated. In fact, they were all based upon Governor Hagerman's own acts during the past six months and had the sessions of the Assembly lasted four months instead of two, their number would have easily been doubled and probably trebled as more of his acts during the four months' sessions would have been illegal, improper or reprehensible, and would have served as foundations for more charges.

It is apparent that the change is welcome, is timely and appreciated, and that the good citizenship of New Mexico, not including those personally interested, fully approves the action of the President and the appointment of Captain George Curry as Governor of the Sunshine Territory. In this instance as in thousands of others, during its long existence as a newspaper the New Mexican did its duty as it saw it by the people, against powerful opposition, from open and secret enemies, as against great odds and at heavy expense and much loss. This paper felt, and was sure, that as soon as President Roosevelt became fully conversant with the facts as they existed, the action that was announced yesterday would be taken by him for the greatest good of the greatest number and because the exigencies of the case demanded it.

The selection of Captain George Curry was not only a very pleasant surprise but a genuine Rooseveltian surprise and one that has endeared President Roosevelt and has made him closer to the people of New Mexico than ever before and certainly they have admired, respected and loved him to a remarkable degree before this auspicious and popular episode.

ADVERTISING MAKES BUSINESS.

Advertising makes business and business makes advertising. Both should go hand in hand and the merchant who persistently and properly advertises is bound to be the gainer and make back the money spent for advertising a hundredfold. This statement is an axiom these days. In this city, unfortunately, and in New Mexico in general, merchants do not do sufficient advertising and hence lose trade. The El Paso merchants are great advertisers and are constantly adding to the business and trade of their city. This is also the case in Denver only to a much greater degree. Both these trade centers are getting business that legitimately belongs to the wholesale and retail merchants of this Territory. Albuquerque and Las Vegas are much better advertising towns than is this city. This is an unfortunate fact which tells unfavorably in many directions and ought to be remedied speedily. An instance of the kind is cited by the

Pueblo Chieftain and it is one that is in point and should be heeded by Santa Fe merchants and business men in particular and by those of the Sunshine Territory in general. It will be remembered that during the recent printers' strike in several of the Montana towns, the newspapers suspended publication and operations. The strike is now settled and they have resumed publication. The Chieftain says:

"Seldom has there been a more convincing demonstration of the value of newspaper advertising than just now comes from Butte and Anaconda, Mont. After about six weeks' suspension the papers in these cities have resumed publication, and each one of them is carrying an amount of display advertising that is remarkable. The former patrons of the papers have hastened to come in with double and in instances triple the space formerly used, while there is conspicuous many newcomers.

"The strike in Butte and Anaconda, which resulted in a suspension of the papers, did far more injury to the merchants of those cities than it did to the principals in the controversy. Reports from the northern cities show that the receipts of the great mercantile establishments showed a most discouraging decrease even from the first day when newspaper advertising space was not available. The offerings of the business houses failed to longer come to the notice of the shoppers. The merchants resorted to handbills, banners and all sorts of devices to attract the attention of the buyers, but with disappointing success.

"With the re-appearance of the newspapers daily the commercial dealings of the Montana cities have revived greatly. The merchants have come to appreciate the value of newspapers advertising more than even before. They are showing their appreciation by rushing forward to place their announcements before the people, and they are reaping the beneficial results in a largely increased volume of business."

AN APPRECIATIVE COMPLIMENT.

In commenting upon the recent change of the secretaryship of the Bureau of Immigration, the Silver City Enterprise looks upon the change in a manner that is certainly very gratifying to the editor of this paper, who recently retired from the secretaryship after eight year's service. The editorial mention is quite complimentary and fully appreciated. Says the Enterprise:

"Col. Max Frost, editor of the Santa Fe New Mexican, stepped down and out this week as secretary of the Bureau of Immigration, being succeeded by H. B. Henning city editor of the Albuquerque Morning Journal. This month completes Col. Frost's eighth year in his present term of that office, he having served a previous term from 1889 to 1895, making fourteen years in all devoted to boosting New Mexico. During this same time, Col. Frost has rendered signal service to the Territory in advertising her resources and in correcting wrong ideas and misapprehensions of the Territory. The seed sown in those earlier years is beginning to bear abundant harvest as may be seen by the strong tide of immigration that has set in towards New Mexico and in which there is scarcely a community but what has benefited by this influx of settlers composed of the best elements in the middle west and southern states. The literature sent out by the Bureau during Col. Frost's term as secretary has been remarkably accurate and gratifyingly free from exaggeration and bragado. Conditions were pictured as they exist, no more no less but facts and figures were marshalled forth in such array as to convince the most sceptical that there was a land of immense opportunity for the investor and the laborer alike.

"To make two blades of grass to grow where now there is only one, to cause the sun-baked plains to give up their precious wealth of water and yield their tribute to the guiding hand of man and furnish sustenance to thousands of happy homes to make the mountains yield their hidden wealth of precious minerals and in so doing furnish lucrative employment to many more thousands and at the same time add to the world's wealth—this has been Col. Frost's ambition and life-work and the measure of his success has been limited only by physical inability and not by any lack of enthusiasm or love for the work. The board has done and will continue to do good work in bringing settlers to New Mexico and without any disparagement to the ability of Mr. Henning, or to any of Col. Frost's predecessors, we believe that the retiring secretary is the best informed man on condi-

tions in New Mexico who has ever held that office."

A COWARDLY SLANDER OF PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT.

The Albuquerque Fakir Journal, true to its nature, yesterday in a double column editorial makes a cowardly, contemptible, covert attack upon President Roosevelt. After discharging its editorial filth without effect against the leading Republicans of the Territory it aims its mudslinging higher, this time at the President of the United States. Thirty-six hours after it telephoned its Santa Fe correspondent that Governor Hagerman had been forced to resign it had the temerity to say in effect that if President Roosevelt forces Governor Hagerman into retirement, it is in exchange for the votes of New Mexico at the next national convention, this despite the emphatic declaration of the President that under no circumstances would he be a candidate for re-nomination or re-election. In other words, it charges President Roosevelt with the same political traffic that has brought the Hagerman administration to its inglorious downfall. This should be sufficient to make the Fakir Journal execrated by every Republican, for thus far, even the rankest Democratic papers have not dared to attack directly the honesty of motive the integrity, the high ideals of the Rough Rider President. The Fakir Journal accuses Colonel W. H. H. Llewellyn and Delegate W. H. Andrews of being the other parties to the unholy deal and they need as little defense as the President. They are in good company and the appointment of Captain George Curry as Governor of New Mexico shows on its face to the simplest minded that no political deal was thought of, except to give New Mexico the very man it needs to assure a strong administration of public affairs. That Captain Curry is an intimate friend of Colonel Llewellyn, and that Territorial Secretary J. W. Reynolds, appointed acting Governor, has been and is the pet aversion of the Fakir Journal, is proof that President Roosevelt has fathomed the nature and the motive of the vicious attacks made upon Republican leaders and now being made upon himself.

CIRCUMSTANCES ALTER CASES.

Attorney General W. C. Reid is slowly coming around to the opinion that not all of the Territorial officials who preceded him were grafters and acknowledges that he has chosen at least one of them as a model of official propriety, although Mr. Reid's chief held up his hands in holy horror when some one brought him the tale that a former attorney general who received but a portion of the salary and perquisites that fell to the lot of the present attorney general, had dared to represent any other interest than the Territory in any court. But that is not any worse than signing a petition that a lease of almost fourteen thousand acres of school lands be granted a cattle company at a time when a lease of more than a quarter section was unlawful, and then going to Washington in official capacity to lobby for a bill making larger leases lawful.

The Territory of New Mexico is represented at the National Capital by a man who is in the best sense of the appellation the delegate from the people of the Sunshine Territory to the National Congress and who represents the people in a remarkably able, efficient and successful manner. The work of Delegate Andrews speaks for itself and in no uncertain tones. Since he has been delegate of the people to the Congress of the United States he has made the best record and has done more for the advancement of the Territory than has any delegate since the organization of the Territory. Delegate Andrews is all right as his record fully proves and as existing conditions absolutely demonstrate.

A poor, old stranger, suffering from locomotor ataxia, unable to earn money or to work for board, has been lodged in jail at Las Vegas for ninety days because of his inability to pay a board bill. This is but one incident out of many which shows the necessity of each county making provision for a poor house or poor farm at which indigent persons can be taken care of. In some sections of the country poor farms are self-sustaining and they should come near paying their own way in New Mexico. It is disgraceful, almost barbaric, to send a sick, disabled, old man to jail for debt.

The New Mexican has received many dispatches from many citizens from many of the towns of the Territory reached by telegraph and telephone expressing gratification at and approval of President Roosevelt's action in superseding Governor Hagerman with Governor George Curry. The favorable sentiment is as unanimous as anything in that line can possibly be. The new appointee is very well known, especially in the central and southeastern sections of the Sunshine Territory. As far as Governor Hagerman is concerned there is "many a dry eye eye after him."

Danny Macpherson, controller of the libels, slanders and falsehoods that appear almost daily in the Albuquerque Morning Fakir Journal and are directed against leading and respectable citizens of the Territory, will have to give up his office of lick spittle in extraordinary and as boot lick par excellence to the executive of the Sunshine Territory, as the new Governor cannot and will not be reached by lick spittles and boot licks.

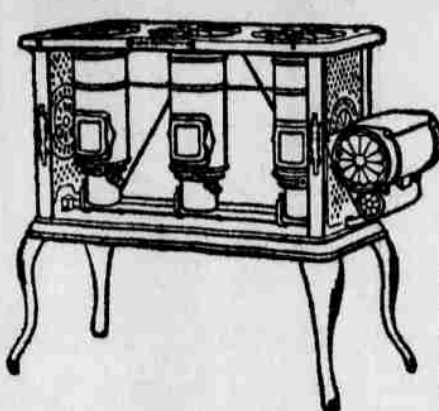

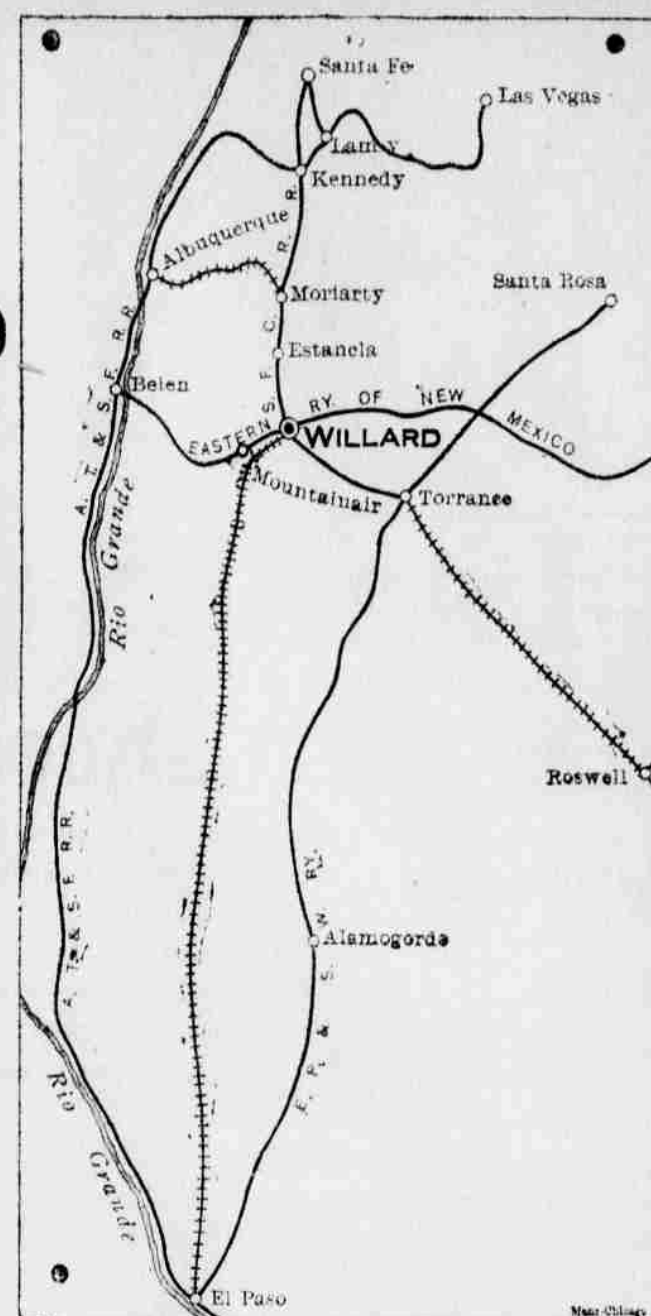

CRUSHED TO DEATH IN MACHINERY

Horrible Accident at Roswell Cement Plant—Victim a Young Man From Missouri.

Roswell, N. M., April 19.—A horrible accident occurred at the Acme Cement Company's plant near this city on Wednesday afternoon resulting in the death of Willard R. Sampson, a young man hailing from Albany, Missouri.

At the time of the accident Sampson was running a half-pickler, when in some unknown manner his right arm was drawn into the machinery. Before the machinery could be stopped Sampson was drawn into the teeth of the machinery and his arm torn out at the shoulder and his head frightfully crushed.

The injured man was brought at once to St. Mary's hospital in this city, but despite the efforts of the physicians to save his life he passed away the next morning.

The remains were prepared for burial and shipped to his home in Missouri upon instructions from his parents.

CIRCULAR LETTER.

Office of Superintendent of Public Schools, Santa Fe County.

Santa Fe, N. M., April 15, 1907.

To School Directors and School Teachers, Santa Fe County, New Mexico:

Sirs:—This Circular Letter is for the purpose of calling your attention to the most important sections of the new School Law, which was passed by the last Legislative Assembly, and which is now in full force and effect. Your Superintendent of Public Instruction demands rigid enforcement of this law, and we should proceed at once to comply with its requirements.

A majority of our County Teachers have in the past labored under the impression that the County Teachers' Institute is not for them, and each year requests to be excused from attendance are forthcoming, always in the nature of asking a special favor. The very fact that there has been a great scarcity of teachers for the rural districts, has had a great deal to do with the granting of excuses to absentees; this year, however, there will be no excuses granted from this office, as it will be a matter for the Territorial Board of Education to consider, and dispose of. Read Section 4, Chapter 27, School Laws. The following is from Superintendent Clark's Circular Letter to County School Superintendents: "We shall be very strict in the matter of issuing excuses to teachers for non-attendance at Institutes."

The next County Teachers' Institute, which will be held at the High School in this City, commencing August 12th, 1907, and ending August 22nd, will be most beneficial to County Teachers, as the entire attention of the Conductor, and Instructor, will be devoted to their interests. Prof. J. A. Wood, who has had charge of the County Institutes for some time past, has been retained as Conductor, and an Instructor in primary methods will also be employed.

The next Teachers' examination will be held at the High School in this City, on August 23rd and 24th, 1907, at the close of the Institute; and all those desiring to teach school in this County should attend, and obtain certificates, as it will be very difficult to obtain permits, the new law forbids the issuing of special permits twice to the same person.

Under the new Law the Scholastic year shall end June 15; statistical reports from Directors, Secretaries, and Clerks, shall be filed in the office of the County Superintendent within ten days thereafter; as the report of the County School Superintendent must be on file with the Territorial Superintendent of Public Instruction, on or before July 15.

"The Territorial Board of Education will adopt Text Books June 10th. All

schools, rural, village, town, and city, must use the books adopted. There will be no alternative. We shall secure lower prices by this plan. All parents will appreciate this."

I call your attention to the Poll Tax Collection Law, which provides that on demand of Clerk of School Board, the employer of men, liable to payment of poll tax, shall furnish list of names. If clerk finds names of persons who have not paid such tax, employer shall pay same, and deduct from wages of employees. Penal clause.

The new Educational Law makes it imperative on all school boards to levy at least a three mill levy on all taxable property within their respective districts. This must be done, on, or before, the first Monday of May, 1907. Any School Board failing to do this, will be deprived of its share of the apportionment arising from the three mill levy of the Territory.

The new Law does not require the City teachers of Santa Fe, to attend the County Institute. This will be a great benefit to the County teachers, as all the time and attention of the Conductor and Instructor will be given for the special benefit of the County teachers.

A first class instructor will be employed to assist the Conductor in the teaching. Every teacher is expected to enroll the first day of the Institute, or as soon thereafter as possible. There will be no expense except the nominal fee of \$2.00 to be paid at the time of enrolling. It is proposed to make this Institute the most interesting and beneficial to the County teachers of any ever held in this County.

Teachers who do not attend this, or some other Institute, need not ask for any favors. Every person who thinks of teaching should begin now to get ready to attend the entire session of the Institute. Very truly yours,

SMALLPOX BREAKS OUT BISBEE PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Bisbee, Ariz., April 19.—The public schools have been closed because of the discovery of smallpox, although there are no serious cases in the city. All school children, however, must be vaccinated before the schools will reopen. The first case was that of a Mexican who had the disease in its worst form. However, he is now on the road to recovery. Two children of Mr. and Mrs. I. E. Salladay, residing on Buffalo Hill, are suffering from varioloid, a mild form of smallpox, but neither child is in bed.

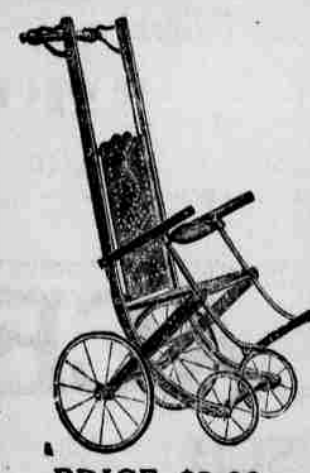

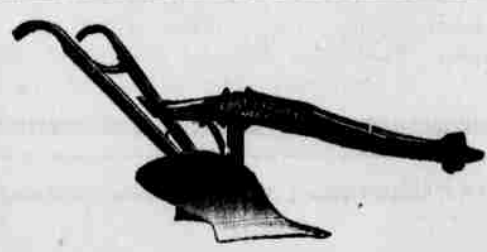

Fancy Arkansas Strawberries, Florida Red Ripe Tomatoes, Home-grown Asparagus and Pie Plant at H. S. Kaune & Company.

The remains of the late Miss Francis Viaz were buried this morning in Rosario Cemetery. Funeral services were held at the residence followed by requiem mass at the Cathedral.

A silver musicale will be held at the home of Mrs. C. A. Haynes, 114 Johnson Street, this evening. Everybody is cordially invited to come and bring their friends. The best local talent of Santa Fe will render a program well worth hearing. The proceeds are to go to the Organ Fund. The admission will be a piece of silver.

Fresh strawberries have made their appearance in the local market and are retailing variously from 15 cents a pint to 20 and 25 cents per quart. Most of the berries being received here are from Arkansas and they are of good size and flavor. Fresh red ripe tomatoes are also offered from Florida. Home-grown asparagus and pie plant are among the new arrivals. The former is selling retail at two bunches for 25 cents and the latter at 5 cents per pound.

Forty-five saplings have been set out around the grounds of the Central school building, replacing the young trees planted last year which have died. The trees which have just been planted are elms and South Carolina poplars which have been found to grow better than other varieties of shade trees in this region. Superintendent J. A. Wood, of the city public schools, has also had planted about thirty shade and fruit trees on his premises near the Palace Hotel.

He was at the time of his death secretary and treasurer of the Raton Electric Light & Power Company and was one of its heaviest stockholders, and devoted his entire time for the past two years to the upbuilding of this enterprise.

The deceased leaves a widow and little daughter to mourn his loss.

DURANGO EDITOR IS IN FEDERAL TOILS

Denver, Colo., April 19.—Charged with using the mails for the circulation of obscene literature, particularly in articles written upon the Thaw trial, Colonel David Day, editor and proprietor of the Durango Democrat, has been arrested and must stand trial before the federal court. He was indicted by the federal grand jury.

Day has been complained of more than once in the past, and there is said to have been a concerted movement on the part of some Durango citizens to have his sheet kept out of the homes of that city. In this particular instance it is said to have been Durango people who brought the mat-

ter to the attention of the federal authorities.

His stories of the Thaw trial are said to have been even more objectionable than the nature of a large part of the evidence made necessary. Having provided a \$500 bond for his appearance at the May term of the federal court, Day is now at liberty awaiting his turn on the docket. Colonel Day formerly edited a paper at Ouray called "The Solid Muldoon," which had a reputation of more than local scope because of his free and easy comments.
