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INSPECTION OF NATIONAL GUARD

Territorial Militiamen Make Good Showing

WELL DRILLED AND EQUIPPED

Adjutant General Tarkington is Pleased With Condition New Mexico Soldiers.

Adjutant General A. P. Tarkington, who accompanied Captain G. V. H. Moseley, U. S. A., on the latter's recent official tour of inspection of the New Mexico National Guard, is gratified at the showing made by the militia throughout the Territory. He is particularly pleased at the interest being evinced in target practice and the fine scores made in shooting.

"The annual inspection just ended is that which is required by the War Department to ascertain whether or not the National Guard is fully informed, armed and equipped for field service," he explained to a representative of the New Mexican. "I think there will be few things short in our guard, as I try to keep everything on hand, either with the companies, or stored and ready for issue at any time. Our guard is coming up, gradually. More interest is being taken in target practice, which is a very important matter, more interest is taken in encampments. With a larger appropriation for maintenance next year, a great many things should be done, which are now out of the question, for lack of a sufficient appropriation. The prospects for increasing the efficiency of the National Guard could not be better, as what was needed the most, more funds for maintaining the organizations, has been supplied, or will be supplied the first of the year. The armories also will help greatly."

Tells of His Observations.
While on the inspection trip the adjutant general made notes of his observations which are herewith reproduced:

"Signal Detachment at Roswell: Everything appeared to be all right in the detachment. The men were well furnished with clothing, arms and signal equipment including heliographs, signal flags, acetylene lanterns for night signaling, field telephones, climbers, plyers, insulators, brackets (and tentage and should be able to perform any duty required of them, in any ordinary emergency. The new armory when built at this place, should make this organization a very popular one."

Local Company in Fine Shape.
"Company F, Santa Fe: Company F, appeared to be in good condition, well equipped for field service. Officers and men apparently much interested in their work and in time of need, I believe would render a good account of themselves. The new armory authorized for the company, is a matter of much talk among the members and will, without doubt, increase the interest in the company to a very large extent."

Troopers at Meadow City.
"Troop A, East Las Vegas: Although some of the clothing shipped to the organization, failed to arrive in time to be used at the inspection, the troop, nevertheless, put up a very creditable inspection. The three officers of the troop, were new, having been appointed but a few weeks before and everything being considered, did very well, in my opinion. The new armory authorized for this organization in 1903, and which will, in all probability, be completed before the coming fall, is a matter of much interest both to the members of the troop as well as the citizens of the city."

Inspection at Albuquerque.
"Headquarters and Band, and Companies E and G, Albuquerque: All of the organizations were inspected at the armory of Company G. Some of the non-commissioned staff were absent, but it is impossible to have all of these men present on account of some being unable to get away from work, others out of the city. Company E was short a few men, the company having but twenty-three men in line, some of the men absent, could not get away from their work, several were out of town, the company was well equipped and I believe would turn out its full strength, in case of emergency."

"Company G, passed the inspection in excellent condition, the men were well equipped and from questions asked them, apparently ready to take the field at any time for service."

Regimental Band Good Organization.
"The First Regiment Band reported in service clothing, the same as the other organizations. This is certainly an excellent organization and I am proud of the band, not only because of its ability to render a first class quality."

MUCH SNOW FELL IN TAOS COUNTY

Will Be of Great Benefit to Ranchmen and Farmers—Extending Telephone System.

Dr. T. P. Martin, of Taos, who is a leading physician of northwestern New Mexico, was in the city yesterday on personal business. From him a reporter of the New Mexican gleaned interesting notes concerning present conditions in his section.

The recent snow storm extended all over Taos County and from five to twelve inches of snow fell, according to elevation; the snowfall in the valley was smaller but added greatly to the water supply. It was very cold for several days and the fruit crop was seriously injured by frost; indeed if there is any fruit at all this year the amount will be small. The outlook for the grain crop is splendid and late vegetables will be grown in abundance. The area under cultivation this year will be larger than ever before; the streams are full of water now and with the snow in the mountains a sufficient amount of water for proper irrigation is assured.

The Taos Telephone Company has about 200 miles of telephone wires in operation in Taos County with telephones at Taos, Ranches de Taos, Arroyo Seco, Arroyo Hondo and Talpa. Connections are made with the Western Union Telegraph lines at Tres Piedras station on the Denver & Rio Grande Railroad and messages from the north and south are telegraphed to Tres Piedras and then telephoned to the towns named. The company is engaged in constructing a line from Taos to Ute Park in Colfax County; a distance of 46 miles. This will connect there with the long distance telephone system of the St. Louis, Rocky Mountain and Pacific Railroad Company and at Raion with the Colorado Telephone Company's line. This extension will be completed and in operation by May 10th.

Business conditions in Taos County are good and everybody who wants to work can find plenty to do. There is a constant demand for good sheep herders and laborers in the coal mines and railroad camps in Colfax County. The tide of immigration has not yet struck Taos to any appreciable degree but there are several investors in the county who are examining land titles with a view to purchasing.

A. R. Manby of Taos, has purchased several thousands of acres of land in the Pedro Martinez Land Grant for a Colorado land syndicate and is continuing such purchases. A great deal of the land purchased can be put under irrigation and cultivation.

FUNERAL OF LATE HON. CARL A. DALIES

Services Take Place Today at Belen—Albuquerque Minister Officiates.

Funeral services were held this morning at Belen over the remains of Hon. Carl A. Dalies, whose sudden and untimely death is mourned by hosts of warm friends and admirers throughout New Mexico. The body was forwarded to Belen yesterday from the family home at Willard. Rev. Ernest Moser, pastor of the Lutheran Church at Albuquerque, officiated at the last sad rites. Interment took place in Belen, but the remains may be disinterred later and shipped for re-burial at Ripon, Wisconsin, the boyhood home of Mr. Dalies.

TRAITORS SET ARSENAL ON FIRE

Startling Discovery is Made at Toulon, France

LOSS REACHES A MILLION

Blazes Started in Five Different Place at Once—Sentinels on Guard.

Toulon, France, April 24.—The damage done by yesterday's fire at the government arsenal amounts to \$900,000. An inquiry has established the fact that the flames broke out simultaneously in five different places. The area of the conflagration is surrounded by sentinels pending an investigation.

FISHING TUG LOST WITH ALL ON BOARD.

Harbor Beach, Mich., April 24.—The fishing tug, Searchlight of this port is missing and it is believed to have sunk in Lake Huron last night with its crew of six men.

PRESIDENT WILL STAND FIRM

No Reconsideration of Action in Hagerman Case

DISPATCHES OF NO AVAIL

Resignation Will Be Promptly Accepted—Curry Informed.

Special to The New Mexican.
Washington, D. C., April 24.—Your correspondent called at the White House this morning and has just left there. He is authorized to announce officially that the telegrams coming to the White House from various sections of New Mexico relative to the governorship, will have no effect whatever. The mind and the action of the President can not be changed on this subject. The information here is that the resignation of Governor Hagerman was mailed the day he reached Santa Fe. It should reach Washington on Friday and it will be promptly accepted.

The President will be at the opening of the Jamestown Exposition on Friday and on Saturday. Captain George Curry has been notified of his appointment. On Monday the President will return from Jamestown and on that day or the day following, Territorial Secretary James W. Reynolds will be notified to act as Governor until Captain Curry arrives at Santa Fe.

Democrats Busy in Hagerman's Behalf.

Albuquerque, N. M., April 24.—O. N. Marron, Summers Burkhardt and other intense Democrats here have been busy all week securing dispatches and signatures to petitions for Hagerman's retention in office. Macpherson, president of the Albuquerque Journal-Democrat Publishing Company, and Hening, secretary of the Bureau of Immigration, have been also very active. They have been helped by other Democrats and a few sore-headed Republicans who hold office under Hagerman or have been recognized by him as personal and political friends.

Money is being lavishly spent to make the Hagerman meeting at the Elks' theater tonight a success. It is reported that regular pay is offered to men about the streets to be present and shout for Hagerman and reform at one dollar per hour. On the other hand, strong dispatches approving the President's action have been sent to the National Capital by many leading Republicans, taxpayers and property owners of this city.

Thus far all efforts to secure a prominent Republican to make an address tonight has proved futile. A special effort is being made to have more women than men in attendance.

Las Vegas Endorses Curry.

Las Vegas, N. M., April 24.—Scores of dispatches and letters are being sent today from here to Washington, thoroughly approving of the change in the Governorship of New Mexico. Leading Republicans, merchants, property owners and others are aroused over the slander that President Roosevelt has sold the Governorship of New Mexico for the territorial delegates to the National Convention and resentment at the Hagerman crowd for voicing such calumny against the chief executive of the nation is heard on all sides.

New Appointee Suits Socorro.

Socorro, N. M., April 24.—For every dispatch favoring the retention of Hagerman as Governor, dozens of telegrams are being sent to Washington, D. C., congratulating the President upon the appointment of Captain George Curry to be Governor of this Territory.

Santa Fe Thanks the President.

The sun shines and the wind still blows. Doctor David Knapp this afternoon circulated a dispatch to the President in which the President's action in making a change in the Governorship of New Mexico is fully approved and declared to be the right thing at the right time, and in which he is sincerely thanked for the wise choice he has made as Captain Curry is very well and favorably known here. Doctor Knapp obtained many signatures from leading citizens, businessmen, property owners and taxpayers, regardless of politics. Members of the Republican County Central Committee and of the Republican Territorial Committee and county officials also sent separate dispatches containing expressions of gratitude because the stand taken by the President is for the best interests of the Republican party.

SEIZE LIQUOR STOCKS IN KANSAS

State Confiscates Property Valued at \$250,000

LID ON FOR ALL TIME

Supreme Court Names Receivers—Whisky Traffic at an End.

Topeka, Kans., April 24.—The State Supreme Court today appointed Judge S. H. Allen, G. H. Whitcomb and Judge T. F. Garver receivers for the Kansas property of the following brewery concerns:

Heims Real Estate Company; Ferd Helm Brewing Company; Kansas City Brewing Company, Rochester Brewing Company, Imperial Brewing Company, and the Jose Schiltz Brewing Company.

Big Loss to Brewers.

The value of the property of nine brewery companies and one wholesale whisky concern confiscated in Kansas, which has been turned over to a board of receivers named today by the Supreme Court is estimated at \$250,000. This property includes liquors, bar fixtures, wagons and animals and ware houses which are located principally in Topeka, Kansas City, Wichita, Leavenworth, Atchison, Salina, Iola, Galena, Pittsburg and Columbus.

State Will Sell Property.

Attorney General Jackson today declined to say in what manner the captured liquor would be disposed of. Whether it could be sold or would be destroyed, was, he said, a question he would not decide until he could confer with the receivers that have taken charge of the property of the enjoined concerns. The other property will be sold, he says, and the proceeds turned over to the state to defray the cost of the present suits.

FREIGHT STEAMER BURNS IN HARBOR

Destruction of Vessel Loaded With Cotton Causes Loss of \$75,000—Blaze Threatens Docks.

New York, April 24.—Harbor firemen had a hard fight today with a fire which destroyed the freight steamer Pioneer, causing a loss of \$75,000. The Pioneer had a cargo of cotton, jute, red lead and carboys of carbolic acid. The noxious fumes and dense smoke made it a hard fight but the flames were prevented from spreading to the pier and adjoining property.

WOULD ADJOURN PARLIAMENT

Many Provincial Governors in Russia Arriving at St. Petersburg to Urge Its Dissolution.

St. Petersburg, April 24.—Several provincial governors have arrived in St. Petersburg to support the movement of the Reactionists in favor of a dissolution of Parliament on the ground that its debates are causing dangerous agitation and ferment. This it is alleged, is especially noticeable in the provinces where agrarian disorders last year took place.

DECLINE IN DEATH RATE ON ISTHMUS

Health Conditions in Canal Zone Are About as Good as They Will Ever Be, Says Chief Sanitary Officer.

Washington, April 24.—Health conditions in the canal zone are about as good as they ever will be, according to a report from Colonel Goras, the chief sanitary officer, for the month of March. Since last August the death rate has steadily declined until now it is 19.40 per 1,000 as against 33.72 in August.

BREAD MAKERS ENGAGE IN RIOT

Striking Bakers Attack Fellow-workers in Paris—Police Arrest Twenty.

Paris, April 24.—Strikers attacked several bakeries today in an attempt to intimidate the bakers who are at work. Many windows were broken. Some of the men stormed a bakery in Rue De Ramey and maltreated the workers whereupon bystanders joined in and routed the strikers. Twenty arrests were made.

SANTA FE CENTRAL PUTS ON NEW TRAIN

Daily Between Santa Fe and Estancia to Handle Increased Business on This Road.

It is gratifying news to the people of this city that the business of the Santa Fe Central Railway is steadily on the increase and that this is especially the case between Santa Fe and the town of Estancia, the county seat of Torrance County. The increase is especially great in freight traffic and in order to meet the increased demands for services, General Manager Grimshaw has put on a special freight train daily which leaves here at 7 o'clock in the morning and runs between this city and Estancia, stopping at Kennedy, Stanley, Moriarty, McIntosh and other stations between this city and Estancia, delivering and taking on passengers and freight and returning to this city on the evening of the same day.

This new train enables traveling men to visit the leading towns in the Estancia Valley, transact business and return here the same evening. Although the service was only inaugurated yesterday morning, already traveling men and Santa Fe people having business along the Santa Fe Central Railway have found it profitable to take the trip.

The road is handling a good deal of business for the Santa Fe Gold and Copper Mining Company at San Pedro by hauling coke from Kennedy, to Stanley station and copper matte from Stanley to Kennedy where shipments are transferred to the Santa Fe Railway system for the east.

The Santa Fe Gold and Copper Mining Company has put the road from Stanley to San Pedro in fine condition and its teams and teamsters are now using it. The shipments both from and to San Pedro are growing constantly and are adding materially to the business of the Santa Fe Central Railway.

MAY SOLVE MARVIN MYSTERY

Deck Hand Arrested Charged With Murder of Missing Youth—Denies Guilt.

Dover, Del., April 24.—Frank H. Butler, a deck hand on the steamer John P. Wilson, was taken into custody today, charged with the murder of Horace N. Marvin, the four-year-old son of Dr. Marvin of this city, who mysteriously disappeared March fourth last. The theory of the detectives is that the boy was murdered or accidentally killed and that Butler had something to do with the case. Butler denies all knowledge of the disappearance of the child.

U. S. ROADS USING CANADIAN CARS

Which Has Caused Shortage on English Government Railway—Want Rolling Stock Returned.

Moncton, New Brunswick, April 24.—An investigation by the traffic manager of the Inter-Colonial Railroad, into the shortage of freight cars has disclosed the fact that several thousand cars of the government railway are on United States lines. The government is endeavoring to have the cars returned.

ARTILLERY TO DISLODGE BANDIT

Notorious Russian Brigand Mortally Wounded

REFUSED TO SURRENDER

Succeeded in Killing Several Policemen—House Blown to Pieces.

Warsaw, Russia, April 24.—The notorious brigand, Stanislaus Lis, the author of many crimes, was captured today at Lublin, mortally wounded, after the house in which he sought refuge had been blown to pieces by an artillery fire.

Killed Several Policemen.
Lis when he saw a detachment of police advancing on his house, barricaded himself within and opened fire, killing several policemen. Troops were then summoned but they were unable to dislodge the bandit.

Artillery Played Havoc.
Finally several field pieces were brought up and eight shells hit the house demolishing it. The infantry then stormed the ruins and found Lis desperately wounded, trying to reload his revolver.

WILL INSTITUTE CRIMINAL ACTION

As Result of Quaker State Capitol Graft

\$9,000,000 WERE SPENT

For Furnishings—Many Instances of Extravagance and Overcharges Found.

Harrisburg, Pa., April 24.—As a result of the investigation by the legislative commission into the expenditure of \$9,000,000 for furnishing and decorations of the new state Capitol, it is probable that criminal proceedings will be instituted by the state against certain persons who have prominently figured in the investigation.

Many Charges Substantiated.

The commission has been investigating charges of extravagance, overcharges, duplication in payments of bills and fraud for nearly two months and has yet to take the testimony of many important persons who have knowledge of the subject.

To Institute Criminal Action.

Whether civil suits can be brought has not been determined, but the members of the commission are convinced that it has been demonstrated that criminal actions can be brought.

SUCCESSOR TO LATE ARCHBISHOP

Official Insignia of the Pallium Invested on Archbishop Blenk of New Orleans.

New Orleans, La., April 24.—Before a distinguished representation of the Roman Catholic hierarchy of the United States, including Cardinal Gibbons, two archbishops and sixteen bishops, the Pallium was today invested on Archbishop Blenk of New Orleans. This insignia is an official recognition by the church of Archbishop Blenk's succession to the functions and authority of the late Archbishop Chapelle whose arch episcopal province comprised Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, Arkansas, Texas and Oklahoma.

TAFT'S ULTIMATUM TO REPORTERS

Presidential Aspirant Positively Refuses to Issue Any Statement as to His Political Purposes.

Washington, April 24.—In answer to a specific question as to whether he intended to make any announcement in the near future regarding his political purposes, Secretary Taft today said he certainly would make no such statement before his Ohio trip, which begins Friday, and that he was not prepared to state whether he would have anything to say after that trip.

FOOTPADS KILL INSURANCE AGENT

Official of Big Company Found Dead in an Alley at Fort Dodge, Iowa.

Fort Dodge, Ia., April 24.—O. H. McCaffrey, general agent of the American Independent Life Insurance Company was found dead in an alley in the center of the city this morning. The boy was lying face downward with the head half buried in a pile of ashes. McCaffrey's head had a dozen abrasions and the skull was badly fractured. As no money was found in his pockets it is surmised that robbery was the motive for the crime.

SURPRISE EMPLOYEES BY RAISING PAY

Rhode Island Corporation Grants Ten Per Cent Increase in Wages Just to be Doing Something.

Providence, R. I., April 24.—An announcement of 10 per cent increase in wages on a basis of ten hours a day, to go into effect on Sunday next, was made today by the management of the Rhode Island Company, a corporation that operates practically all the street railway lines in the state. The raise was granted without any request from the men.

VELOCITY WINS RICH SUBURBAN HANDICAP

London, April 24.—The city and suburban handicap at Epsom today was won by Velocity, with Lario second and Succor third. Thirteen horses went to the post.

EARNING POWER AND TAXATION.

The assessment of railroads is proving a difficult problem to Boards of Equalization in many states of the Union. In Minnesota, a special legislative investigating committee was appointed to determine what should be the valuation of railroad property and it reported that the average in Minnesota should be about \$27,000 a mile. This does not say that this would be an equitable figure in other commonwealths where population and traffic are far less per mile than in Minnesota. This commission found that the railroads of the state were capitalized at \$56,000 a mile. In Colorado, all the railroads claim to have suffered a great reduction in their earnings. The Burlington was to have its assessment reduced on that account from \$13,000 to \$7,000 a mile, and other railroads in proportion. Great care should be taken in taxing corporations, but it is manifestly unjust to assess them at ten or twenty per cent of their real value when other citizens are assessed thirty to forty per cent or even a greater portion on the property they possess. While earning capacity and actual earnings should have some bearing on fixing assessed valuations, yet, there are valuable properties not earning anything at present and still justly subject to taxation. There are vacant lots, unimproved lands, standing timber, idle mines, which should be taxed fully as much as similar property that is being utilized by its owners. In fact, in other countries, unimproved lots and lands are the subject of special taxation and the owner of such lots and lands must divide with the government the so-called unearned increment, that is, the increase of value in such lots and lands. That there is some justice in this is evident, for the man who holds on tenaciously to an unimproved lot, refuses to sell it at a reasonable price, often has his holdings doubled and trebled in value by the improvements made by a more enterprising and public spirited neighbor and therefore receives an unearned increment that should be heavily taxed. A somewhat similar parallel is presented by railroads which are capitalized far above the cost of construction, the property having been increased that much in value simply by the natural growth of the country through which they pass or by enterprises giving the railroad traffic, but created by outside capital. This represents an unearned increment just as much as the increase in the value of a lot by a neighbor building a fine mansion adjoining it; and certainly should be subject to taxation.

In New Mexico at this time assessments of the main lines of railroads are quite fair. Of course, these lines do a great through business and their value as continental lines is constantly on the increase, but so are the operating and maintenance expenses. Take it all in all, New Mexico is not badly off in the line of assessments of railroad property.

SHOWING THEM UP IN THEIR TRUE COLORS.

The principal supporters of Governor Hagerman's policy and of his retention in office are not the Republican newspapers of New Mexico; on the contrary only the Democratic daily and weekly papers of the Territory are on his side and so is also the Albuquerque Morning Fakir Journal, a yellow sheet whose political opinions are always for sale and which has fought the Republican party and its candidates for office in the last two campaigns venomously and vindictively.

The Albuquerque Evening Citizen in a recent issue shows up the real character of the Morning Fakir Journal and proves conclusively that neither it nor its managers are entitled to public confidence or worthy of the least attention.

The episode is connected with a county printing graft in Bernalillo County, in which the Morning Fakir Journal and its managers are deep in the mire, and the Citizen presents this in rather good style as follows:

"The Evening Citizen on Saturday contained an editorial showing that D. A. Macpherson and the Democrat Publishing Company had forced a combine with the former management of the Citizen to hold up the county. The morning paper, apparently, does not like to delve into its own filth and would prefer to let the matter end where it is. It again employs that great Democratic weapon of silence. The Citizen challenges the morning paper to deny the truth of the statements published on Saturday.

"The statement in an out-of-the-way corner of the morning paper to the effect that Macpherson knew nothing of the deal, because he was in California, is to laugh. If a little thing like that graft deal of the morning paper

could send Petite Danny to California, then he ought, according to the eternal fitness of things just now, go to California or some foreign province a little further south."

THEIR EFFORTS WILL BE UN-AVAILING.

It is being demonstrated right along and that to the satisfaction of every citizen of the Territory who desires to keep posted upon political affairs that the so-called special dispatches which have appeared in the columns of the Albuquerque Morning Fakir Journal concerning the Hagerman episode were cooked up and dished out in the office of that paper and that without the least regard to truth or facts. These dispatches were all of the great grapevine and fake variety, and simply gotten up for the purposes of deception and to bolster a lost cause. The hysterical and silly editorials in the same sheet and the assumption that a small clique of selfish, concealed and vindictive Democratic bosses and sore-head Republicans in Albuquerque were "the people of New Mexico" and demanded Hagerman's retention in office have been fully exposed and have become a laughing stock throughout the Territory. The Macpherson-Albuquerque Morning Fakir gang and the Hagerman officials who are putting up the boodle, represent the people of New Mexico no more than the celebrated "three tailors of Tooley Street" represented the people of England, and the man or the woman who thinks that the President of the United States will be influenced by cooked-up petitions, by mandarin and padded telegrams and paid-for newspaper dispatches and editorials reckons without his or her host and will find that all these efforts will prove futile and unavailing. Charging the President of the United States with having committed a crime against civilization in his action in the Hagerman removal case and assailing trusted officials in the national capital and accusing them of malfeasance in office will be found of no avail. Hysterical and silly editorials and venomous and vindictive appeals to low prejudices and personal animosities can not restore the confidence in Hagerman which President Roosevelt no longer feels and that rightly and justly.

HAGERMAN'S SUPPORTERS.

The Albuquerque Morning Fakir Journal has been violently and vehemently opposed to Republican success during the 1904 and 1906 campaigns in New Mexico. It fought the Republican candidate for delegate to Congress during these elections and also the regular Republican legislative and county tickets in Bernalillo County. Thereafter it slandered and libeled the Republican majority in the House of Representatives of the Thirty-seventh Assembly. The paper has always been for sale to the highest bidder, politically and otherwise, and hence its course was not a surprise. The Roswell Record claims to be the only real Democratic daily paper in the Territory, and is as vindictive, as virulent and as hostile to Republican party measures and principles and probably more so than any other Democratic daily or weekly in the whole country.

The Albuquerque Morning Fakir and the Roswell Democratic sheet are howling themselves hoarse these days and are working as hard as they know how for Hagerman's retention in office because they believe that this would mean Democratic victory in the Sunshine Territory in the next year's campaign and that the Republican party would be defeated and many thousands majority in either the Territorial or State election next November. This is what they are working for and hence their course. There is not a single really Republican newspaper in New Mexico that is not approving the change announced by the President in the executive office of New Mexico and there is not one that does protest against it. Every Democratic and anti-joint statehood paper in Arizona have also lined up in support of Hagerman and against a change of Governor of New Mexico. Certainly these facts show conclusively which way the wind blows and where the efforts now being made in Hagerman's behalf come from.

THE RIGHT MEN SELECTED.

The commission to revise the laws of the Territory provided for by a law enacted by the Thirty-seventh Assembly organized in this city yesterday by the election of Charles A. Spiess, of Las Vegas, as chairman and Benjamin M. Read, of Santa Fe, as secretary. These selections are very appropriate and proper. Mr. Spiess is one of the foremost practitioners and among the

attorneys in the lead of the New Mexico bar. Mr. Read is a very studious and hard-working lawyer and his thorough acquaintance with and knowledge of both the English and Spanish languages will be found of great value in the work of the commission. Mr. Read was the official translator to the commission that revised the statutes of New Mexico in 1884 and did excellent work in that position. At yesterday's meeting preliminary steps of considerable importance were determined upon and there is every reason to believe that the commission will render the service expected of its members and will present a code of laws for enactment by the next Assembly of the Territory or by the first state Legislative Assembly of New Mexico that will be creditable and compare favorably with the best statute books in the most progressive and advanced states in the Union.

THEY WANT ROOSEVELT TO BEG FOR MERCY.

That the virulent attacks of the Fakir Journal upon President Roosevelt are inspired by the Hagerman party is indicated by a lengthy interview in the Denver News secured at Trinidad, Colorado, as Governor Hagerman and his lieutenants passed. The spokesman of the party, not only reiterated the infamous falsehood that President Roosevelt is seeking a third term, but also that therefore he traded the governorship of New Mexico for the votes of the Territory in the next national convention. The spokesman went even farther and threatened not only the Republican party in New Mexico with disruption, but intimated that the rupture would extend beyond the borders of this commonwealth. Ye gods and little fishes! After vilifying the President, threatening him with dire vengeance, they expect a Roosevelt to get on his knees, crawl to the cross and humbly ask the forgiveness of Danny Macpherson and his disreputable bunch.

Three leading citizens of the Territory, men, who have done great and successful work in its advancement and progress for many years have been held up for months past and are now being called by the Albuquerque Morning Fakir Journal and the gang controlling it "the Andrew-Llewellyn-Barsum ring of grafters and boodlers" and even worse names have been applied to them in the columns of that yellow sheet for the purpose of weakening the Republican party and doing all possible injury to the men named. Is it not high time that the respectable and decent citizenship of this Territory resent this outrage and these assaults, libels and slanders upon citizens who deserve well for the good they have done and the efficient and successful part they have taken in the upbuilding of this Territory, in its progress and improvements in every way?

HOW THEY LOOK AT IT IN OTERO COUNTY.

The Alamogordo News is evidently "on to" the situation and tells of the way the people of Otero County look upon the change in the executive office of New Mexico, and the retirement of Hagerman. It makes this very clear and plain in the following from its last issue:

"We are more than well pleased, in fact we are 'delighted,' Mr. President. 'In the meantime Democrats who are 'delighted' with Hagerman who now get busy to explain the reasons why, etc. 'Hagerman's reign was short and bitter. Ta, Ta.' Evidently the people of Otero county and of Alamogordo do not agree with the Albuquerque Morning Fakir Journal and the gang behind it.

The Las Vegas Optic is not a prophet, nor the son of a prophet, but it is dollars to doughnuts that the following prediction will come true: "In a week from today, it will be practically impossible to find a man who will admit that he sent a telegram to Washington in support of Hagerman."

In fact, if some of the deluded people who still look upon Governor Hagerman as a saint with a halo around his head, would know of all the incidents and the devious doings of the Hagerman administration from coal oil inspection jobs to other episodes there would be very little sympathy lost upon him by those people who make a special profession of holiness and righteousness.

On another page of this issue the New Mexican publishes an editorial which appeared recently in the Deming Graphic, a paper published in the prosperous county seat of Luna County, treating of the recent reorganization of the Bureau of Immigration and the capture of the organization of that bureau by Macpherson and his ilk for the benefit of the Albuquerque Morning Fakir Journal. The Graphic presents the situation in a graphic and interesting manner and the editorial should be read and heeded by those who have the best interests of the Territory at heart. It will be found on the third page of this issue.

The Democratic Roswell Record, next to the Fakir Journal, the chief support of the Hagerman administration, does not like Captain Curry. It plainly says so and does not beat around the bush like the Fakir Journal and is therefore deserving of some credit for showing its true nature. A foe in the open is always worthy of respect while a bushwhacker is contemptible in politics as elsewhere.

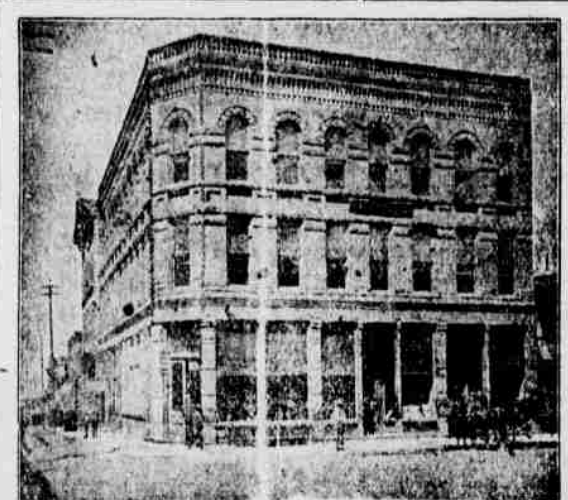

RIGHT VIEW OF REORGANIZATION

Bureau of Immigration By Deming Graphic

SCHEME SHOWN UP

In Its True Colors And For The Information of The People.

The Deming Graphic, a paper which has the courage of its convictions, and is growing steadily in influence and circulation, treats the recent reorganization of the Bureau of Immigration and the passing of the bureau into the hands of Macpherson, president of the Democrat Publishing Company of Albuquerque and of City Editor Henning of the Albuquerque Morning Fakir Journal in the right way in an interesting editorial in a recent issue, the editorial reading:

"The Albuquerque Journal, its manager, Daniel A. Macpherson, and his man Friday, have won a Pyrrhus victory in annexing the Territorial Bureau of Immigration as 'Second Fiddle' to the Journal office. According to Pronouncement No. 1, issued by them, the bureau and its secretary will make frequent excursions, so that the Territory may have the privilege at regular intervals of paying the expense of seven gentlemen on pleasure jaunts to portions of New Mexico which may seem worthy a visit at that particular time of year, and which will no doubt be glad to entertain Mr. Macpherson's Bureau and his man Friday, and to gaze upon their benignant countenances. Naturally, the Journal complains that the income of the bureau in the past, under the able secretaryship of Colonel Max. Frost, was expended for printing, for sending out of thousands of descriptive pamphlets advertising the resources of every part of New Mexico, inducing homeseekers to set their faces toward the Land of Sunshine, and capitalists to invest in the development of wealth. Such a course, in the nature of things, appears unintelligible and foreign to Macpherson and his man Friday, who have visions of champagne suppers given in their honor by local chambers of commerce who will gather to listen to the 'heap' big talk and grandiloquent advice which the guests of honor will presume to give them upon the occasion of their visit. After the clans have been gathered four or five times from Farmington, from Roswell, from Hanover, from other remote corners of the Territory, however, and have presented their transportation and incidental bills, even Macpherson and his man Friday will realize that \$2,000 or even \$4,000 a year appropriated for advertising the Territory, presents little opportunity for 'rake-offs'; they will begin to feel that the Governor has handed them a gold brick, that they have won a Pyrrhus victory.

"In the meanwhile, New Mexico will have some opportunity for reflection and regret. While vainly looking for the new publications which the bureau ought to issue, but will not issue, the taxpayers will come to some sense of appreciation of the loyal work of the former secretary of the bureau. They will remember with gratitude that at one time they commanded the talents, the ripe knowledge, the energy of a man to whom the secretaryship was not a plaything, a side issue, but serious business to which the gave the best that there was in him. They will compare the past publications, their quality, and quantity, with what the new secretary is publishing; they will know that the name of the former secretary has become a household word in the home of the many who have come to New Mexico during the past



years through reading his books or who corresponded with him or sought him personally to gain the information they wanted and needed, before breaking home ties to set up their altars in a new land. They will realize that junketing trips and grandiloquent talk at midnight banquets do not bring immigration nor investors.

"It is not merely an idle complaint that in the office of every western railroad advertising agent can be found the publications of the Bureau of Immigration while Colonel Max. Frost was its secretary. Those publications are consulted again and again in devising and compiling advertising matter that brings results; that are classics in their particular fields. New Mexico was indeed fortunate in having at its command a man so well versed in every industrial phase, in every aspect of life in the Southwest; who knew intimately and thoroughly from personal contact, every portion and every resource of this magnificent commonwealth. His work brought results, and disinterested people, naturally, cannot understand why the services of such a man should be discarded at a time when they were repaying the commonwealth a thousand-fold their cost; discarded for no other reason than to gratify a passing political whim and to reward a yellow dog newspaper and an irresponsible scribbler for the harm they have done the Territory, the Republican party and the people."

TUCUMCARI TO BECOME DIVISION POINT

Tucumcari, N. M., April 24.—It is authoritatively stated that the Rock Island and the El Paso & Southwestern Railways at this point have reached a traffic agreement whereby the two roads will erect a fifteen-stall round-house and shops to accommodate both roads at this point. Work, it is said, will begin on the new shops immediately.

The Southwestern will handle all freight from Tucumcari west and the Rock Island will double back east from this point. Material for the new shops is now arriving and it is said that the two roads will employ between 400 and 500 men here.

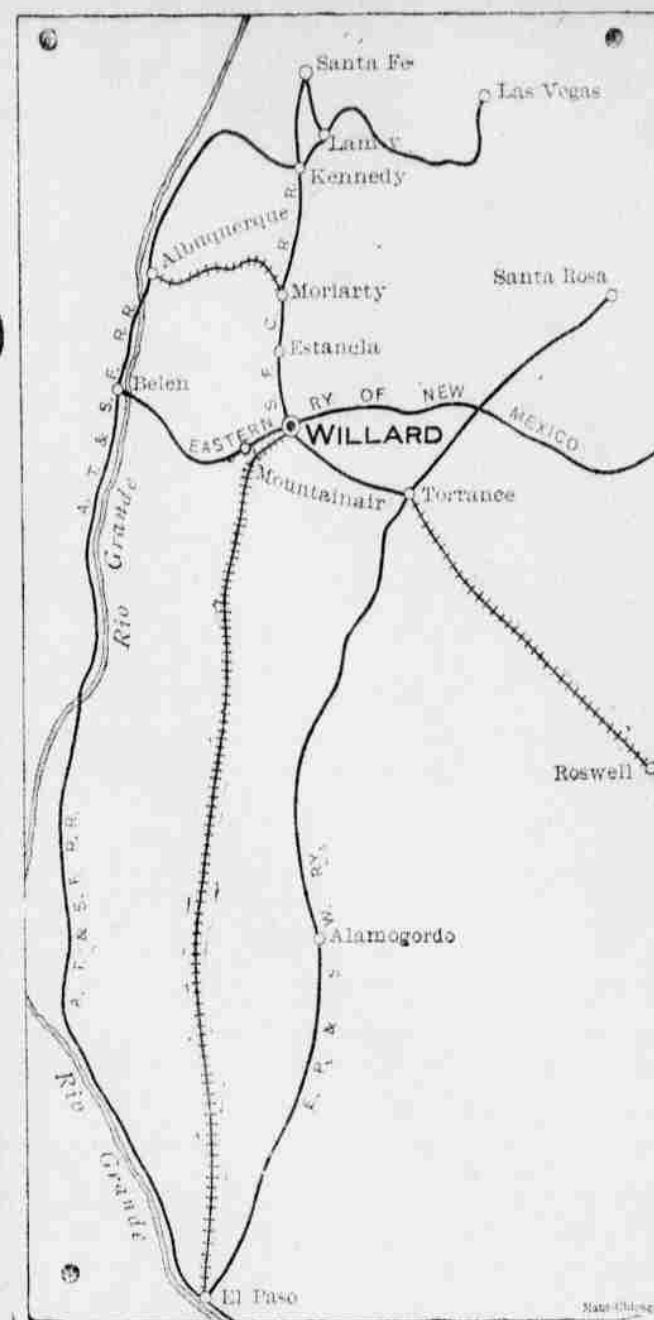

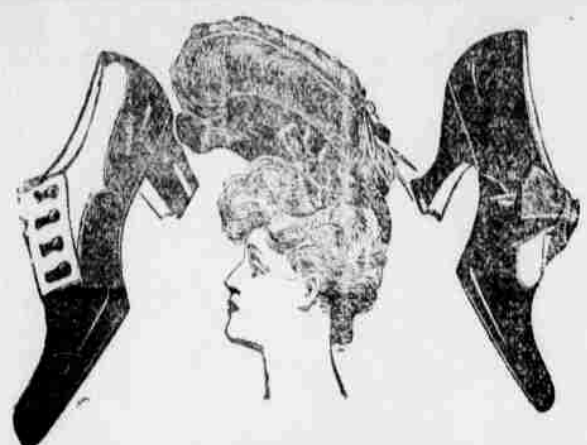

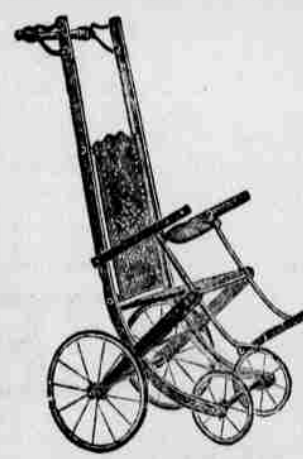

KANSAS CITY LIVE STOCK MARKET

Supply From Range Country Small—
Prices Advance All Along
the Line.

Special to The New Mexican.

Kansas City Stock Yards, April 22.—The supply from the range country last week was small, and prices advanced all along the line, now standing at the highest point of the season on all killing grades. The supply of cattle today is 14,000 head, market steady, except that stockers and feeders are a little lower than the phenomenal figures reached a week ago. Farm work is keeping some buyers at home, and the high prices induced some owners to turn their cattle loose, but as the beef cattle market shows no signs of weakening country grades are sure to be in strong request. Stockers are selling at \$3.80 to \$5.30, feeders \$4.75 to \$5.35, good fleshy feeders selling right along with fair to good fat steers which range from \$5.15 to \$5.75. Colorado steers sold last week at \$4.50 to \$5.50, cows \$3.50 to \$4.00, heifers \$4.00 to \$4.60, bulls \$3.50 to \$3.80, a few stags at \$4.50, stockers \$4.50 to \$4.90, stock cows at \$3.50. The general cattle demand shows an extraordinary capacity, and as receipts are likely to be smaller within a short time, in view of the fact that a good many cattle have been drawn in ahead of time by the good market, still higher prices are looked for.

Sensational prices are paid each day in the sheep pens, the new record of \$8.65 for Colorado fed lambs being established today, bulk of lambs today at \$8.55 to \$8.65. Medium grade lambs sold at \$8.35 today, clipped lambs, \$7.00 to \$7.25, which range is 25 to 35 cents higher than a week ago. Woolled ewes sold at \$6.50 today, clipped wethers at \$6.10 Friday, clipped ewes \$5.50 to \$5.60. Run last week was 31,000 head, increased somewhat by the phenomenal prices. Here, as well as in the cattle market, present runs are at the expense of the supply that would naturally appear within the next few weeks. Run today is 11,000 head but no great number is in sight for balance of the week.

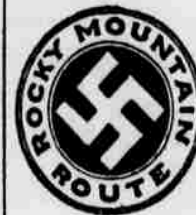

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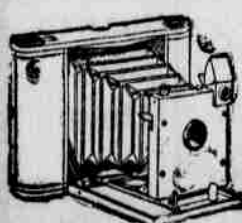

For seasoning soups try one ounce of long pepper and always scald it in boiling water and drain before adding to the soup.

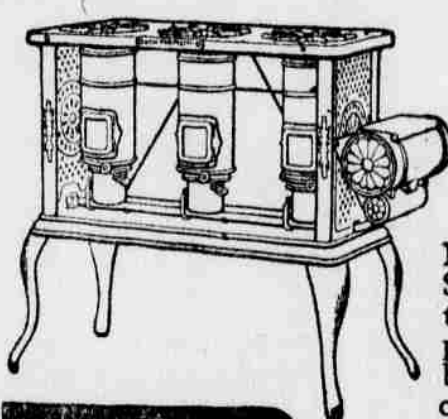
Put a lump of sugar in with the green vegetables you are about to boil, and it will greatly improve their flavor and also retain their color.

NEW MEXICO DEBT BEING PAID OFF

Territorial Treasurer Takes Up \$40,000 Worth of Matured Current Expense Bonds.

Territorial Treasurer Levi A. Hughes today forwarded to New York City a draft for the sum of \$48,475. Forty thousand dollars of this will be applied in taking up that amount of current expense bonds falling due May 2, and the remainder for the payment of interest on the entire bonded indebtedness due May 1.

The time and option of these current expense bonds were twenty years. They were issued May 2, 1887 under the administration of Governor Prince and the original issue was for \$150,000. Fifty thousand dollars more will be due and payable on November 1, 1907.

CATHOLIC PRIEST IN CRITICAL CONDITION

Rev. Anthony Jouveaneau, of Bernalillo at St. Vincent's Sanitarium Suffering From Paralysis.

With his entire right side paralyzed and unable to speak coherently, Rev. Anthony Jouveaneau, of Bernalillo, a well known and popular Catholic priest who has charge of the parish there, is in a critical condition at St. Vincent's Sanitarium in this city. He was brought here three weeks ago and while there has been little perceptible change in his condition it is doubtful if he can recover.

Father Jouveaneau is about sixty years of age and has enjoyed good health until recently. He was stricken with paralysis on the evening of Good Friday. Father Jouveaneau is a native of France, but has been following ministerial duties in New Mexico for a good many years and was the founder of St. Katherine's Indian School in this city.

DR. DAVID KNAPP RECORDS FIRST BIRTH CERTIFICATE

The first certificate of the birth of a child, required by the provisions of a law enacted by the Thirty-seventh Legislative Assembly was furnished today by Dr. David Knapp of this city and filed with Probate Clerk George W. Armijo at 8 o'clock this morning upon the opening of the office of the probate clerk in the court house.

The new statute provides that a physician, mid-wife, nurse or attendant at any birth or death shall furnish a certificate of the event to the probate clerk and ex-officio recorder of the county, wherein such occurs at once for record.

In this case the certificate shows the child to be the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jose Gutierrez, born early this morning and that Dr. David Knapp was the physician in attendance. The name of the child could not be given as it will be several days before it will be baptized.

TRAINMEN DEMAND CHICAGO SCALE

Denver & Rio Grande Employees Spurn Offer of Road's Officials. Appeals to Uncle Sam.

Denver, April 24.—The United States government will be asked to mediate between the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad and its trainmen in an effort to bring about a settlement of the difficulties existing over the scale question. L. E. Shepherd, assistant grand chief of the Order of Railway Conductors, and W. T. Newman, third vice president of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, held a final conference with the officials of the Rio Grande Railroad yesterday and notified them that the trainmen had rejected almost unanimously the offer of the company's management of an increase averaging 3.63 per cent and that nothing less than the Chicago scale agreed upon recently at a meeting of the general managers of western railroads, and representatives of the trainmen, which granted a ten per cent increase in wages with a regulation of the working hours, would be acceptable to the Rio Grande men.

They were told that the railroad would appeal to Washington. The representatives of the trainmen responded that as a concession to the public they would withhold further action until Washington could be heard from, but that only mediation and not arbitration would be consented to. They also declared that they would wait a reasonable time upon a reply from Washington, but that a strike would be declared unless word came that the national government was willing to extend their good offices and that very soon.

Ninety-one per cent of the conductors voted to reject the company's offer of a 3.63 per cent increase and ninety-seven per cent of the trainmen did likewise. The conference has been on since April 2.

SPECIAL TAX LEVIES FOR SCHOOL PURPOSES

Department of Education Receives Pleading News From Rural Districts.

"You might say that I am receiving favorable reports from school directors all over the Territory in regard to the levying of special taxes for school purposes," Superintendent of Public Instruction J. E. Clark stated yesterday to a representative of the New Mexican.

Professor Clark is gratified to know that the new educational law is meeting with favor and he is especially pleased over the fact that special levies for the support and improvements of the rural schools are being made throughout New Mexico.

Under the new law a special levy is required to be made for school purposes or the school district neglecting to do this loses its share of the Territorial apportionment.
