PLANS OF MARY JAMES SCHOOL

Building is to Be Erected During Summer

ARCHITECT DISCUSSES PLAN
Structure Will Be of Spanish Mission Style—Contract Not Yet Awarded.

Actual construction work will soon commence on the Mary E. James Mission School for Boys which will be erected in Santa Fe by the Woman's Board of Home Missions of the Presbyterian Church as a companion institution to the Mary Allison Mission School for Girls. D. Everett Waid, of New York City, the architect who designed the building, is here in connection with the awarding of the contract, and looking over the ground where the structure will be reared. A number of proposals have been received from local and outside contractors for the construction work and the contract will probably be let either today or tomorrow.

Description of New Building.
The new building will be virtually a three-story affair as will have a basement story above ground. It will be rectangular in shape with a so-called hip roof, in general appearances something on the order of the Federal building. However, instead of being built of stone the exterior walls will be of cement stucco, the material used in the construction of the Alvarado Hotel at Albuquerque, and to adhere to the Spanish mission style of architecture. Red tiling will form the roof covering. Mr. Waid does not care to give out the estimated cost of the building before the contract has been awarded, but it is understood that the structure complete will represent an expenditure of close to \$50,000.

Architectural Effect in Proportions and Colors.
"The building will be a rectangular one and of very simple design," the architect stated this morning to a representative of the New Mexican. "The idea is to depend upon the general proportions and colors for the architectural effect. It will be two stories in height and will have a basement. The school is designed to accommodate thirty boys in addition to the superintendent and others of the faculty."

"As to the interior arrangement on the first floor will be offices, reception rooms, living apartments of the superintendent and the main dining-room and kitchen. The dining-room will be quite a large one and can be used as an assembly hall or entertainment room. The entire second story will be divided into sleeping rooms for the boys, these being fitted out so as to have two in each room instead of having large dormitories. Each boy will have his own little bed and clothes closet. There will also be a room on this floor for the matron as well as toilet rooms and linen closets."

Various Uses of Basement.
"Part of the basement will be equipped as a gymnasium and playroom in which the boys can amuse themselves during leisure hours. There will also be shower baths and toilet arrangements. In another part of the basement will be the laundry department. The heating plant will also be located in the basement. The building will be heated by steam."

The Mary Allison school has recitation rooms amply large enough for the pupils of both institutions and it has been decided to have the boys and girls in the same classes. This plan will obviate the necessity of two sets of instructors which would be quite an item of expense.

Window Balconies and Main Entrance.
Practically the only ornamentality attempted by the architect is in the window designs and the main entrance. Otherwise the building is to be severely plain. The windows in front on the main floor are to have little balconies extending out from them.

"Santa Fe certainly has some diverse styles of architecture," Mr. Waid remarked after finishing his description of the school. "I rather like the old architecture," he added.

FATAL REAR-END WRECK IN OHIO

One Killed, Another Fatally Injured, and Several Badly Hurt—All Were Trainmen.

Cincinnati, Ohio, May 9.—One man was killed, another fatally injured and two hurt in a rear-end collision at Jones' Station, seven miles south of Hamilton, Ohio, on the Cincinnati, Hamilton and Dayton Railroad today. The killed and injured were all employees. No passengers were hurt.

RED CLOUD MINING DISTRICT ACTIVE

One of the Oldest in New Mexico—Three Big Companies Now Operating There.

Thomas M. DuBois, acting superintendent of the Corona Queen Mining Company, in the Red Cloud mining district, Lincoln County, has been here for two days in consultation with ex-Governor M. A. Otero, president of the company, and Colonel George W. Prichard, attorney of the same. The Red Cloud mining district is one of the oldest in the Territory and twenty years ago was quite a producer of gold, copper and silver. There has been extensive development work done on various mining properties in the district. The principal features of the mineral are copper and iron. Three strong mining companies are now working there: The Corona Queen Mining Company with headquarters in this city; the Columbia Copper Company, of El Paso, Texas; Martin Fishback, engineer in charge, and the New Mexico Iron and Copper Company, of Denver, J. Morris Finn, president and manager.

There is only development and clean-up work now being done by these companies, as they are waiting for machinery which has been ordered and is on the way for the three. The principal machinery necessary at this time consists of steam hoists, pumps, iron furnaces and smelting outfits. There are 200 men employed in the district and the force will be augmented as soon as machinery which has been ordered arrives. There are very large veins of ore in the district carrying mostly copper and iron with some gold. Some of the ores assay very high in copper, one property of the Corona Queen Mining Company running as high as 67 per cent. in the red metal. The iron ore is abundant and the iron produced is of a high grade and especially fitted for Bessemer steel. The iron veins are very extensive and will be worked for many years to come before exhausted.

There is much flourstine ore in the Red Cloud district indicating that a greater depth bodies of ore carrying gold will be struck. Several smelter tests made by the three companies now operating in the district have proven very satisfactory.

The town of Corona contains now about 600 people and is constantly growing. There are two general merchandise stores, two hotels, two livery stables and the usual blacksmith and carpenter shops and other artisans. There are also three saloons, which, however, are not considered unmix blessings. The town is supported by the trade of the mining companies and by the money spent there by the miners from the Red Cloud district. It is also the center of a very fine sheep country, and much wool and many lambs are being shipped from there annually. It is believed that these shipments this year will be greater than they were last.

It is also expected that the new cut-off of the El Paso & Southwestern Railway to the Dawson coal camps will start at Corona, thus making it an important junction and division point. The survey for this road starts at Corona, the cross sectioning is being done and it is understood that the survey has been finally approved by the management.

F. A. DuBois, father of T. M. DuBois, is the owner of the townsite and lots are selling rapidly at reasonable rates. The townsite is regularly and prettily laid out. No lawyer has settled as yet in the new town and this the people think is a good indication of prosperity, peace and quiet.

NOTED ARTISTS VICTIMS OF FIRE

Kansas City Conflagration Claimed Lives of Several—Searching Ruins for Bodies.

Kansas City, Mo., May 9.—The search for bodies was begun at daylight this morning in the ruins of the University Building which was destroyed by fire yesterday. One body at least is known to be in the ruins, that of Miss Aurora Wittebert, an artist, and it is believed that many others will be found. The known dead number two. These are Miss Wittebert and Professor George S. DeMare. It is believed that all of the injured will recover.

The most seriously hurt is a Miss Alexandra Blumberg, a Russian countess, whose skull was fractured in a fall from a ladder. Miss Blumberg is an artist and occupied a studio on the third floor of the building. She is a daughter of a Russian nobleman, once a member of the privy council of the Czar, who fell under the displeasure of the crown and was exiled after his immense estates were confiscated.

George S. DeMare who lost his life by jumping, was an artist of note. Miss Wittebert was a talented piano instructor and had a studio on the fifth floor. She is believed to have been suffocated.

U. S. BUSTS DRUG TRUST

Secures Permanent Injunction in Courts

NO MORE BLACK LISTS
Found Guilty of Combining and Conspiring to Restrict Trade.

Indianapolis, Ind., May 9.—The so-called "Drug Trust" was perpetually enjoined today from continuing its operations by the entering of the decree in the United States Circuit Court for the District of Indiana upon complaint of the United States government filed by Joseph B. Keating, United States District Attorney.

The defendants, ninety-two in number, who are members, officers, directors, agents and attorneys of the National Association of Retail Druggists, the National Wholesale Druggists' Association, tripartite proprietors the "Black List Manufacturers," "Direct Contract Proprietors," "Wholesale Contract Proprietors" and Charles C. Bombaugh, are perpetually enjoined from combining and conspiring to restrain trade in drugs, fix prices by agreement, black list retailers, who cut prices, or to refuse to sell to any retailer on any terms.

All publications of black lists are forbidden and all contracts and agreements covered by charges are declared void. Bombaugh was charged in the bill of complaint with being engaged in the printing and circulating of lists called "black lists."

The decree entered today was dictated by the government attorneys and agreed to by the defendants. It is a complete victory for the government.

THREE ON TRIAL FOR MURDER

Alma Lyons and Francisco Baca Being Tried at Hillsboro for Poisoning Former's Husband.

Hillsboro, N. M., May 9.—The May term of the district court for Sierra County was convened here Monday by Judge Frank W. Parker, with Clerk W. E. Martin at his post, and District Attorney H. S. Wolford and Sheriff Ed Tafolla in attendance. It is the term the last of the week as the last important case is now being heard.

It is that of the Territory vs. Mrs. Valentina Madrid, Alma Lyons, and Francisco Baca, who are being tried for the murder of the former's husband, Manuel Madrid, a couple of months ago. Madrid died from the effects of rat poison, administered it is alleged, by his wife who put the fatal substance in a cup of coffee. The last two defendants are charged with being accomplices in the crime.

Attorney Eliego Baca, a well known criminal lawyer of Albuquerque, has been employed to conduct the prosecution and he is said to have a very strong case against the prisoners which will probably result in their conviction.

VAUGHN QUALIFIES AS TREASURER

His Bond for \$200,000 Is Approved—Has Assumed Office—Nusbaum Remains Clerk.

Territorial Treasurer J. H. Vaughn furnished his bond this morning and assumed the duties of the office in accordance with the appointment made Saturday last by Acting Governor J. W. Reynolds.

Attorney General G. W. Prichard examined the bond and approved it as to its sufficiency and form. In accordance with law the bond was approved by Acting Governor Reynolds, filed in the office of the Secretary of the Territory, and his commission as treasurer was duly handed to Mr. Vaughn to whom the retiring treasurer, Levi A. Hughes, turned over the Territorial funds and the records and papers of the office, thereafter retiring. The bond is for \$200,000.

Simon Nusbaum, who has been the efficient and faithful clerk of the treasurer's office for six years will remain in his present position.

PAPER REVIVED AT LAS CRUCES.

The "Southwestern Farm and Orchard" has been revived at Las Cruces and the first number of the rejuvenated monthly of 12 pages has appeared. It is devoted to farming interests, especially of the Mesilla Valley. Allen J. Papen is the publisher and editor.

M'KINLEY COUNTY BOARD CHANGE

Thomas Pattison Succeeds W. L. Bretherton

LATTER GOING AWAY
Brief Sketches of Retiring and Incoming Commissioners.

Thomas Pattison, of Gibson, McKinley County, who was today appointed commissioner of the first district of that county to succeed W. L. Bretherton, is the manager of the American Fuel Company's properties in the county. He has been a resident of the county for five years. He is one of the best known citizens in it and is universally respected and liked. The interests of the American Fuel Company are great, the company employing nearly 1,000 men and working five of the large coal mines there.

Captain Gregory Page arrived at noon today from his home in Gallup bringing with him the resignation of Mr. Bretherton, and a petition numerously signed by tax payers, property owners and citizens generally, asking for Mr. Pattison's appointment. Mr. Bretherton has served as county commissioner of McKinley County since its organization seven years ago and has made a splendid record as an official and as a citizen.

Bretherton Was Well Liked.
"It is with great regret," said Mr. Page, "that the tax payers, property owners and people of the county view his departure from among their midst. During his residence there Mr. Bretherton has been in charge of the coal mine interests owned by ex-Senator W. A. Clark, of Montana, which properties were recently sold to the American Fuel Company."

Mr. Bretherton and family have gone to Trinidad where they will reside hereafter and where Mr. Bretherton will have charge of the coal properties owned by Senator Clark in Las Animas County, Colorado.

New Commissioner Republican.

The new county commissioner is married and with his family lives at Gibson, which is three miles from Gallup. He is one of the most efficient coal mine managers in the county and stands high in every way. He is a staunch Republican which is all the better and the more creditable to all concerned, especially to the appointing power, which during the past ten months has certainly favored Democratic applicants to office more than it has Republicans.

PENITENTIARY BOARD AWARDS CONTRACTS

Local Merchants Lowest and Best Bidders in Most Instances—In Session Today.

The Territorial Penitentiary Commission reconvened today pursuant to adjournment yesterday. President Joseph F. Sulzer presiding, and Charles F. Easley at his post as secretary. All the members were present.

Practically all of the time yesterday and today was consumed in considering bids for various supplies for the penitentiary. Local merchants were awarded the bulk of the contracts.

The contract for groceries was divided between H. B. Cartwright & Brother, of Santa Fe, Gros, Kelly & Company, Browne & Manzanarez Company, and Charles Hild & Company, the last three firms being of Las Vegas. Leo Hersch of Santa Fe secured the contract for furnishing flour and grain. The dry goods contract was apportioned between Sellman Brothers Company, Adolph Seligman, Nathan Salmon and John Dendahl, all of Santa Fe. The Santa Fe Hardware and Supply Company was awarded the contract for furnishing most of the hardware. Local firms also secured the leather contract.

The Armour Packing Company secured the contract for furnishing meats, sausage and lard. The prison board adjourned at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon subject to the call of the president.

ONLY THIRTEEN OF 200 PASSENGERS PERISHED.

Montevideo, May 9.—An official report says that all the passengers, who were mostly Spanish emigrants, of the French steamer Poltou, wrecked off San Jose Ignacio yesterday, have been rescued with the exception of thirteen. Seven of these are known to have drowned and six are classed as missing.

BRYAN MAY FORCE ROOSEVELT TO RUN

Oklahoman Says He is Only Man Who Can Beat Nebraskan—Garfield and Pinchot Coming to New Mexico.

Washington, May 9.—Former Delegate to Congress Dennis Flynn, of Oklahoma, who is in the National Capital, says that President Theodore Roosevelt is the only Republican who can beat William Jennings Bryan in the Presidential race next year. He believes that Bryan will be surely nominated by the Democratic convention.

Pinchot Coming West.
Chief Forester Gifford Pinchot, head of the Bureau of Forestry will leave here tomorrow for the West, over the southern route via St. Louis, New Orleans and El Paso, Texas. He is anxious to reach New Mexico as soon as possible and will inspect the national forests in New Mexico and Arizona.

Secretary Garfield Also Coming.
Secretary of the Interior James R. Garfield is preparing for a western trip and will leave the National Capital at an early date. He will attend the conference of Governors of western states and territories which will be held in Denver about the middle of June. W. A. Ballinger, commissioner of the general land office will be with Secretary Garfield part of the time.

BURNS PROMISED TO THROW FIGHT

But Changed Mind After Entering Ring and Went and Won—All Bets Were Declared Off.

Los Angeles, Calif., May 9.—A sensation cropped out here today as a result of last night's battle between Tommy Burns of this city and "Philadelphia" Jack O'Brien for the heavyweight championship of the world, in which Burns easily defeated O'Brien after twenty rounds of tame fighting.

In a statement today Burns declares that he promised to lay down and let O'Brien win the fight. He said there was no chance otherwise to get O'Brien into the ring. He said that he resolved as soon as the gong sounded for the first round to break his promise and he determined to go in and win. Burns says that he was instrumental in having all bets called off as he did not want the public tricked. Manager McCarey, of the Pacific Athletic Club today confirmed Burns' statement.

TRAIN PLUNGES OVER EMBANKMENT

Fatal Wreck on Burlington Near Chicago Caused By Broken Rail—One Killed, Many Hurt.

Chicago, May 9.—Suburban passenger train No. 114 on the Burlington, running between Aurora, Illinois, and Chicago, was wrecked today near Lawndale, six miles from this city. Mrs. Mary Miller was so badly injured that she died later. Thirteen others were seriously injured. The engine struck a broken rail and jumped the track. It rolled down the bank dragging with it the first passenger coach and baggage car. The coaches in the rear left the rails but remained upon the embankment.

CARNEGIE ABOARD STRANDED LINER

Big Trans-Atlantic Steamer Baltic Goes Ashore Off New York—Passengers in No Danger.

New York, May 9.—The White Star liner Baltic, which ran its nose into a mud bank in Swash Channel, an hour after it left the pier yesterday bound for Liverpool, was still hard aground early today. Repeated efforts at high tide this morning to pull the liner off failed. The sea is smooth and there is no danger to the large number of passengers aboard. Among these are Andrew Carnegie and wife, H. H. Rogers and wife and the Countess of Yarmouth, sister of Harry Thaw.

ALL QUIET IN FRISCO TODAY

No Further Disorders in Railway Strike and No More Arrests—Mayor Gets Busy.

San Francisco, Calif., May 9.—Up to 11:30 o'clock today there had been no further disorder in the street railway strike and no arrests had been made. Mayor Schmitz has summoned a committee of fifty prominent citizens to meet him this afternoon to devise some method of keeping peace in the city and settling the disturbed labor union. Most of the citizens summoned served on a similar committee in the government of the city after the fire.

U. P. TO DECLARE QUARTERLY DIVIDENDS

New York, May 9.—The Union Pacific Railroad dividends were today placed on a quarterly basis instead of semi-annually, and a quarterly dividend of 2 1/2 per cent was declared.

HAYWOOD ON TRIAL FOR LIFE

Hearing Begins in Famous Idaho Murder Case

EXPECT LONG LEGAL BATTLE
If He is Convicted Others Will Be Tried; Otherwise All Will Go Free.

Boise, Idaho, May 9.—W. D. Haywood, secretary and treasurer of the Western Federation of Miners, was today placed on trial here for complicity in the murder at Caldwell, Idaho, on December 30th, 1905, of former Governor Frank Steunenberg. Haywood is one of the four defendants charged with this murder, the others being Charles H. Moyer, president of the Western Federation; George A. Pettibone, a former member of the executive committee and Harry Orchard.

No Jurors Chosen Yet.

Up to this afternoon no jurors had yet been chosen. Of the original panel four were excused by the court, two because their business interests would suffer, one because of the severe illness of his wife and the fourth because he had been appointed a patrolman since being drawn. The examination of the seventh talesman by the prosecution was in progress at the noon recess. Of the other six, three were excused for biased opinions and three were temporarily passed.

The State's Witnesses Disclosed.

The counsel for the state disclosed the names of the witness for the state before the examination of the talesman began. The list contains 151 names, including former Governor Peabody of Colorado, his daughter Miss Cora Peabody, W. E. Carlton, president, and C. C. Hamlin, secretary, of the Mine Owners' Association, of Cripple Creek; General Sherman M. Bell, Bulkeley Wells, adjutant general of Colorado; Julian Steunenberg, brother of the dead governor; Steve Adams, Frank A. Fenn, of the United States Interior Department in charge of forest reserves in Idaho, and Harry Orchard.

Orchard Chief Witness for State.

The last named is expected to be the most important witness for the state against Haywood, Moyer and Pettibone. He is said to have confessed to the murder of Steunenberg and to have implicated the other three defendants. The fact that Haywood's case was called first indicates that the prosecution considers the case against him the strongest. If he is convicted the trial of Moyer and Pettibone will undoubtedly follow. If Haywood is acquitted the case against the others will doubtless be abandoned.

No Clemency for Orchard.

It is said that the evidence against Orchard is of such a nature that he cannot hope for other than conviction of murder in the first degree, regardless of the verdict in the other cases. Orchard, it is said, has been promised no clemency whatever in giving evidence for the state.

Able Array of Counsel.

Speculation as to the length of Haywood's trial resulted in guesses of from two weeks to five months. A formidable array of counsel has been engaged on both sides. In charge of the prosecution are James H. Hawley, of this city; United States Senator W. E. Borah, County Attorney O. M. VanDyke and George Stone of Caldwell, who is specially employed to represent Canyon County where the murder was committed. Representing the defendants are Attorneys E. F. Richardson of Denver; Clarence Darrow, of Chicago; Edgar L. Wilson, of Boise, John F. Nugent, of Boise, and Fred Miller of Spokane, Washington.

LEFT POVERTY BEHIND AT 116 YEARS OF AGE

Mexican Woman Reared in Luxury Dead at Ciudad Juarez—Supported By Daughter.

An El Paso news item is to the effect that Maria Benavides died a few days ago in Juarez, Mexico, in an old hovel in which she had carried on a miserable existence for years at the advanced age of 116 years. She came of a good family. As a girl and in middle age she was in affluent circumstances. The husband was a Frenchman who came to Mexico with the French troops under Marshal Vazaine with the ill-fated Emperor Maximilian. For the past thirty years she had been in great want and poverty but was faithfully attended by a daughter who, however, earned hardly enough to keep body and soul together.

THE CAREER OF EX-GOVERNOR ROSS.

That fearlessness and honesty are not the only factors in material success was strikingly illustrated in the career of the late Governor Edmund G. Ross who departed this life yesterday at his home in Albuquerque. Had he possessed tact and the faculty of being able to select safe advisors, he undoubtedly would have maintained the political eminence he gained at one time and might have left a competency to his family instead of becoming a mere memory in the political arena and being pinched by want in his old age. To understand better the career of Governor Ross, it must be remembered that he gained his early education and training, not in academies, but in the rough school of life. He was a native of Ohio and at the age of ten entered a printing office as an apprentice. At the age of twenty-one he was roving through Indiana, Illinois and Wisconsin working in different printing offices. When 25 years old, in 1851, he at last settled down, choosing Milwaukee as his home. There he worked in a newspaper office for five years. In 1856 he organized a party of Free Staters to travel overland to "bleeding" Kansas. For three years he published, with his brother, the Topeka Tribune and after being an active participant in the "Border War," was elected a delegate to the Wyandotte Constitutional Convention which framed the constitution under which Kansas was admitted into the Union as a state. In 1859 he founded the Kansas State Record which later was merged into the Topeka Capital, and in company with his brother erected a three-story concrete building for his newspaper plant, the first structure in Topeka devoted exclusively to the newspaper business. In 1862 he raised a company of volunteers at Topeka; in 1864 he was promoted to major and during the Price raid served as colonel on the Union side and participated in many engagements in one of which three horses were shot under him. Upon his return to Kansas he re-engaged in the newspaper business but was soon after appointed United States Senator by Governor Samuel J. Crawford, to fill the vacancy caused by the suicide of Senator James Lane. Ross was elected Senator the following year by the legislature to serve the term expiring in 1871, and in this period gained the distinction which gave him national prominence, for he was one of the five Republican Senators who voted against the impeachment of President Johnson. As only one vote was lacking to secure the two-thirds majority of the Senate necessary for impeachment of the President, every conceivable pressure was brought to bear upon Senator Ross, who had been a "Union" Democrat, but was elected as a Republican. However, he remained firm and his stand has been justified by the subsequent course of events, although for the time being he was execrated by the Republican party which he left and persecuted in the state of Kansas so that after his return, he could not even secure a position as typesetter in the newspaper office he had formerly owned. He engaged in a number of newspaper enterprises, and essayed the role of a professional reformer who was most vindictive in denouncing existing political methods. This made him neither friends nor gained him wealth, and he found it advisable to leave the state, coming to Albuquerque in 1882 where for three years he worked at the case from which he was elevated to the governorship of the Territory in 1885. No more unfortunate appointment could have been made. Although honest and sincere in his desire for reform, which present day professional reformers very seldom are, he lacked tact to put into force his intended reforms. Instead, his administration proved to be the most stormy in the modern history of New Mexico. There was constant political turmoil which reacted upon business and other enterprises, and it was with a sigh of relief that most people heard of his retirement. Governor Ross went back immediately to the case, working for a while on the Daily New Mexican. In 1893 he took charge of the Deming Headlight and during Cleveland's second administration was again a candidate for the governorship, but unsuccessfully. Two years as secretary of the Territorial Bureau of Immigration under the administration of Governor Thornton, closed this remarkable political and journalistic career which furnishes excellent material for a novel, a romance woven into the fabric of the history of Kansas and New Mexico. There were thrilling incidents in that life, there were moving

ments of proud triumph, of high honors attained, of victories achieved, but accompanying all was an undertone of failure, of work incomplete, which is always the lot of men of strong character, of dominant qualities, but who lack executive talents, who have aggressiveness without tact, who chafe at restraint, disdain the advice of those more experienced and worldly-wise, and who instead surround themselves with men who, although ambitious, are visionary and unreliable as counselors, and in reality are mere sycophants or selfish egotists.

ALL NOT LOVELY IN OKLAHOMA.

All is not as lovely as it might be and the state goose in the would-be state of Oklahoma is not hanging as high as many people think. An examination of the constitution to be submitted to the people of Oklahoma and Indian Territory in a few weeks, has demonstrated the fact that it is a very tough document and contains some of the craziest isms of modern times, as well as a thoroughly thought-out plan to make the new state reliably Democratic for the next five or six decades, the good Lord only knows how long. He will not tell. The Republicans have awakened and the fight on the crazy quilt document has been commenced. The situation is something of the kind that might be expected of the New Mexico Democratic bosses and newspapers, were they to obtain control of a constitutional convention, either for the Territory of New Mexico, or the joint state of Arizona.

The Kansas City Journal describes the situation interestingly and convincingly in an editorial that says that despite the early hopes of both Democrats and Republicans in Oklahoma and Indian Territory, the newly formulated constitution has become a vital political issue. The election which sent a paltry handful of Republican delegates to the constitutional convention was not dominated by strict party issues. There were so many questions to be met and answered that electors voted for the men they thought represented most of the issues the electors themselves favored. The Democrats were strong on promises, and as they gave comprehensive indorsement to about every theory and principle offered, the people entrusted to Democratic hands the work of making a constitution.

When the Democrats found that there was little or no opposition to them in the convention they did the natural thing. They proceeded along political lines, especially in establishing representative, congressional and judicial districts. They imagined that their party had been indorsed by the voters instead of the roseate promises of the Democratic candidates. The obvious conclusion of these false promises was that both Oklahoma and Indian Territory were overwhelmingly Democratic. The constitutional convention became hysterical with party power. The delegates went to extremes and it was utterly impossible for the few wise and conservative Republicans in the convention to stem the tide.

The constitution was formulated and given out for public consideration. It was then seen that the Democratic delegates had failed to keep their promises; that they had laid the foundation for a Democratic party machine which, if ratified by the people, would mean almost perpetual Democratic ascendancy. It did not take long for the fire to start and spread over both Territories. The voters saw where they had been fooled and tricked.

The Republicans of both Territories have signified their determination to fight the new constitution to the last ditch. If the instrument were only tinged with Democratic partisanship or merely took fair advantage of the opportunity for party supremacy, there is little likelihood of its being seriously opposed. But the Democrats have gone to the point of larceny of the people's rights. They have made it impossible for the average Republican to indorse a constitution which he has been predisposed to indorse because of the long struggle for statehood in which all parties engaged. There is no reason to believe that Oklahoma is hopelessly Democratic. Indeed, the fight that is now beginning may demonstrate some startling surprises. Had the Democrats done fairly they would have benefited immeasurably as a party through the adoption of their constitution. As matters now stand there is a good chance for the defeat of the constitution, which would have the effect of throwing both territories back to the starting point in the race for equal standing in the sisterhood of states.

REID'S STATEMENTS NOT BORNE OUT BY FACTS.

In a recent speech delivered at Roswell by W. C. Reid, who held the office of Attorney General under the Hagerman administration to the detriment of the people and the disgrace of the administration, Reid asserted that "It was the duty of Governor Hagerman to deliver the deeds to the Pennsylvania Development Company for certain timber lands purchased by the said company from the Territory, after the Attorney General had so advised the Governor." Lawyers and laymen who understand the situation differ materially with this statement and assert that it is "rot." No matter how many opinions the Attorney General rendered, ex-Governor Hagerman certainly had no right whatever to assume the functions of an office that had gone out of existence, and that at the time he did so was absolutely void. In addition, in Reid's speech, he further conveys the impression that ex-Governor Hagerman had taken steps to see to it that the money received from a representative of the company for the delivery of the deeds was not distributed. He said in effect that if the court should hold that the deeds were unlawfully delivered, no harm has been done as Governor Hagerman caused the money received from the Pennsylvania Development Company to be deposited in a separate fund and there held. This is evidently a flagrant attempt to deceive the public and manufacture sentiment in favor of Hagerman, because it is a well known fact which has been conclusively proven by indisputable testimony, that ex-Governor Hagerman, subsequently to the consummation of the deal, insisted that Commissioner Keen should apply and distribute the money received from the Pennsylvania Development Company, and even went so far as to threaten to remove Commissioner Keen if he did not comply with his wishes. It is solely due to Mr. Keen's sterling honesty and unflinching courage that the money received from the Pennsylvania Development Company is still held in a separate fund. If ex-Governor Hagerman had had his way it is believed the money would have been distributed long ago.

MORE RESIGNATIONS SHOULD BE TENDERED.

"The resignation of Mr. Hughes as treasurer of the Territory cannot be regarded as an indication that all the Hagerman appointees will rush in with their resignations. Mr. Hughes and Governor Reynolds are warm personal friends. This is simply a case of where the honor, the work and the emoluments will again be permitted to go one way. In other words, it is a satisfactory re-adjustment of the old condition disarranged by the boy governor."—Las Vegas Optic.

It may be that other officials appointed by ex-Governor Hagerman will resign and again it may not be. There are certainly two or three who should resign, especially because they are incompetent for the offices they hold and sold out to the Hagerman regime. Particulars later. In the meantime the people will watch and pray.

"Attorney General Reid has decided to defer handing in his resignation until the arrival of Governor Curry. Some say that he thinks this action will completely overwhelm the new Governor, but the fact probably is that he simply wants to hang onto the public seat a little longer, realizing that it is his last chance."—Las Vegas Optic.

The New Mexican does not care to do an injustice to any man even if opposed to him politically and otherwise. It is understood that Reid's resignation of the office of Attorney General is on the way.

It is charged that there is a combine amongst the wool buyers and wool dealers in the far East to bear the price of the southwestern wools which will be coming into the market in the next three months. The report is more than plausible, but as wool growers are in good condition financially they may not prove as easy marks as in years gone by. They may hold out for higher prices and the chances are if they do that they will get them before many months, especially the New Mexico wool raisers.

An immense amount of water is flowing to waste in the Rio Grande and its tributaries, including the Santa Fe. This is not all. There are many convenient sites for storage reservoirs and vast areas of land that would produce abundantly if irrigation water were available for them when needed. In other words, New Mexico has by no means reached the limit of its development along agricultural lines even leaving out of consideration dry farming and irrigation by pumping.

Another Republican paper quite well pleased with the change in the gubernatorial office is the Santa Rosa Sun which recently remarked editorially: "If Governor-to-be Curry could see all the good things that are being said about him in the Territorial press, he would be proud indeed. And so far as we know they have been telling the naked truth."

U. S. Senator Charles Dick, of Ohio, predicts that Republicans of the Buckeye State will agree in all essentials during the coming campaign this year and next and that harmony will prevail. Senator Dick is thoroughly posted upon higher Republican affairs and his prognostications are much more than likely to prove true.

MINES AND MINING

Rio Arriba County.

The placers near Hopewell are being developed by the King William Mining and Milling Company. The past three years the company has been cutting through a jam that filled the canon below the Low Flat and work has been resumed for this season. It is under the direction of J. M. P. Gill. The boulders and gravel are torn from their bed by the hydraulic giant. The company has constructed a reservoir on the Fairview Placer. It holds 100,000,000 gallons and is now full of water. Another reservoir is to be built above this, later this spring. The richness of the gravel has been proved by several test holes. The company is promoted by Boston people.

Taos County.

Considerable attention is being paid to the large zinc deposits at and around Red River owing to the increased demand and higher prices received for that metal. J. T. Heathman and Kansas City parties are developing the Bartlett at the mouth of the Columbine for that purpose. A wide lead, carrying zinc and copper has been uncovered.

Otero County.

The Electric Mining Company is prosecuting development work on the Placers near Ore Grande and is at present sinking a well. If necessary, to a depth of 1,000 feet in order to obtain the necessary water.

The Boston-Jarilla Company is sinking a double compartment shaft on its property and will go to a depth of 500 feet.

San Miguel County.

Discoveries of ancient Spanish mines are becoming plentiful as prospectors begin to cover the ground of New Mexico's mining districts more thoroughly. On the east side of the Organ mountains, between Soledad Canon and the Cox Ranch, W. H. Skidmore of El Paso, Texas, recently picked up small pieces of ore that assayed \$2,000 in gold and silver, the find being made near an old smelter in Fillmore Canon which was operated in 1850 in connection with a mine near-by. W. P. Bates also reports the finding of an old mine twelve miles north of Waco water tanks. There are about 300 tons of rich silver ore on the dump.

Grant County.

R. A. Filtz, manager of the Sutton Consolidated Mining Company has returned to Lordsburg, from a trip to Elgin, Illinois, the headquarters of the company. The directors ordered him to develop a strike recently made and to continue sinking the main shaft on the Last Chance. H. M. Sholly will take charge of the mining operations.

L. R. Boyd, president, and Warren Craig, secretary, of the Monte Rico Mining and Milling Company, who spent several weeks at Lordsburg looking over the holdings of their company, a few days ago returned to Washington, Pa. The company owns ten claims on Lee's Peak which are developed by ten shafts from ten to seventy feet in depth, besides numerous open cuts. On the Don Carlos claim, on the southwestern slope of the peak, is a ledge fifteen feet wide, of copper carbonates from which assays run 12 per cent copper and 18 to 23 ounces of silver per ton. On the Lunas claim the shaft is down 30 feet and from it in sinking have been taken ten tons of galena, which will run 40 per cent lead. A shaft, at least 500 feet deep, will be sunk, work to begin in the beginning of July.

Considerable trouble is experienced at the National Mines at Stein's Pass in pumping water from the 900-foot well, the sucker rods breaking frequently, the ash rods not being strong enough to withstand the strain of the life. This week the company is substituting steel rods. On account of the lack of water, the sizers recently installed have not been run thus far. Work is being prosecuted on the 200-foot level where the vein is 15 feet wide. At the same time a 5 by 5 foot raise is being dug from the 200 to the 150-foot level out of which good ore is being taken from which three tons of shipping ore have been sorted.

E. A. Kingsbury, of Los Angeles, California, a mining engineer, has been retained by the recently organized Century Copper and Gold Mining Company to superintend its work on its properties near Lordsburg, which is to be resumed in June. A deep shaft is to be sunk on the Old Applegate from the bottom of the prospect shaft which is in good condition.

Socorro County.

The Mogollon Gold and Copper Company reports a valuable strike made a few days ago in its new shaft on the Cooney mine. The new shaft is a continuation of the old shaft and the strike was made between a depth of 600 and 700 feet and assays \$105 in gold and silver to the ton. There was a sudden change in the ore from a copper bearing bornite to gold and silver values.

Another strike is reported from the Deadwood adjoining the Last Chance at Mogollon. It was made by Manager Earl Cleveland at a depth of between 300 and 400 feet and consists of an eight-foot body of high grade ore gold and silver ore, supposed to be a contribution of the vein of the Last Chance.

A third strike is reported by Daniel Bechtel, an old time miner, who has uncovered two feet of good ore on his property near the old Cooney Ranch.

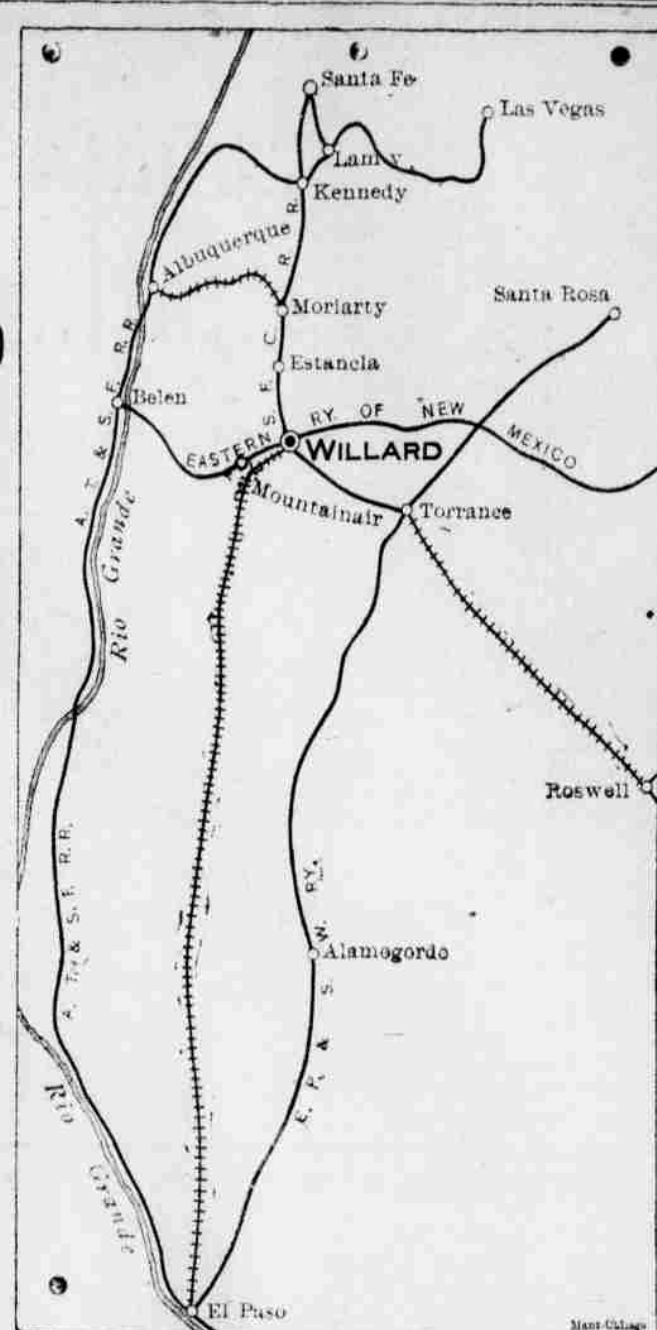

GRANT OWNERS AID IRRIGATION PROJECT

Report That They Are Opposed to Elephant Butte Dam and Reservoir is Erroneous.

B. M. Hall, supervising engineer of the United States Reclamation Service at El Paso, Texas, and who is in charge of the preliminary work on the Elephant Butte Dam and Reservoir System, informs the New Mexican that but a small portion of the Armandis Land Grant in Socorro and Sierra Counties is included within the Elephant Butte Dam and reservoir system and that the statement that the owners of the Grant are holding out for big prices is a mistake.

The New Mexican has received information from other sources to the effect that the owners of the grant will do whatever they can toward aiding the project, especially as both its construction and its operations when completed will increase the value of their land holdings adjacent to the system greatly.

TAOS COUNTY DISTRICT COURT

Many Cases to Be Heard at Session Which Opened Monday—Grand Jury at Work.

Taos, N. M., May 9.—The regular session of the district court for Taos County convened here Monday, Judge John R. McFie presiding, and Clerk A. M. Bergere at his post. The Territory is represented by District Attorney R. C. Gortner and Assistant District Attorney C. C. Catron. Sheriff Donaciano Graham is also in attendance.

The court organized by appointing Jose D. Sena, of Santa Fe, interpreter; H. C. Clancy, of Santa Fe, stenographer for the grand jury, and Blas Salazar, Emilio Mondragon, Clemente R. Mascareñas and Samuel Quintana, bailiffs.

The grand jury was organized and Hugh Perry appointed foreman by the court. The jury is now at work. Its members are as follows: Manuel Basquez, Anastacio Martinez, Justo Espinosa, Antonio Medina, Hugh Perry, Daniel Pacheco Donaciano Campos, Juan B. Fernandez, Jose de la luz Martin, Rubel Aguilar, Santiago Ledoux, Manuel Barela, Ruben Cortez, Seferino Martinez, Jose Dolores Cruz, Miguel Casados, Jose L. Fernandez, Manuel Valerio, Lauriano Hidalgo, Tranquillino Montoya, Gavino, Martinez.

In the cases of the Territory vs. Antonio Trujillo, charged with murder, and Elmar H. Norris, charged with a violation of the gambling law, continuances were granted upon motion of counsel for the Territory.

In the case of the Territory vs. Joseph P. Haynie, charged with allowing minors to frequent his saloon, upon motion of the district attorney the case was continued over the term.

In the case of the Territory vs. Jose Montañer, charged with criminal libel, the case was dismissed upon motion of the district attorney.

In the case of the Territory vs. Manuel Vargas and Santos Vialpando, charged with murder, the defendants were arraigned and both pleaded not guilty.

Rafael Vigil, charged with assault with a deadly weapon, the defendant was arraigned and pleaded not guilty.

In the case of the Territory vs. Jose I. Sandoval, charged with assault with intent to rape, the defendant was arraigned and pleaded not guilty. Later Sandoval was allowed to withdraw his plea and a motion to quash the indictment was sustained and the case dismissed.

In the case of the Territory vs. Jose Florencio Chacon, a civil suit, a continuance was granted until next term.

In the case of the Territory vs. Felix Sanchez, charged with rape, the defendant was arraigned and pleaded not guilty. Later the defendant was allowed to withdraw his plea of not guilty and a motion to quash the indictment was sustained and the case dismissed.

In the case of the Territory vs. Manuel Vargas and Santos Vialpando charged with murder defendants were arraigned and both pleaded not guilty.

In the case of the Territory vs. Julian Vigil, charged with unlawfully handling a deadly weapon, upon motion of the district attorney the defendant was discharged.

In addition to a number of minor civil cases were taken up and disposed of.

The present term of court is a busy one.

ARREST BOOKKEEPER FOR EMBEZZLEMENT

Louis B. Huning, Prominent Young Business Man of Albuquerque, in Trouble.

Albuquerque, N. M., May 9.—Louis B. Huning, a well known young business man of this city, and bookkeeper for some time of the McIntosh Hardware Company, was arrested last evening by Deputy City Marshal Kennedy upon a warrant sworn out by John C. Nead, a member of the McIntosh Hardware Company, before Justice of the Peace George Craig, charging Huning with the embezzlement of trust funds of the company aggregating \$3,500, and diverting the same to his own use. The date of the first embezzlement is placed in the information on September 3, 1906. Bail in the sum of \$5,000 was required in default of which Huning was sent to jail. The affair has caused quite a sensation here as Huning is well connected in this city and in Valencia County.

WEATHER FORECAST SLIPPED A COG
