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## REPORT ADVERSE TO HARRIMAN

### His Railroads Guilty of Gross Violations

#### SHERMAN ANTI-TRUST ACT

#### Counsel Suggests Legal Proceedings Be Instituted --- Not Yet Accepted.

New York, May 15.—A portion of the recommendation of Attorneys Frank B. Kellogg and Charles Severance to the Interstate Commerce Commission concerning the Harriman railroad investigation, has been published here. It reviews the testimony and holds that railroad competition has been suppressed over an area equal to one-third of the United States; that contracts between the Union Pacific and Rock Island Railroads for the control of the Alton Railway, as well as contracts between the Union Pacific and Southern Pacific for the control of the Illinois Central and the San Pedro roads are all violations of the Sherman anti-trust act.

The report recommends that Attorney General Bonaparte institute proceedings to annul these agreements and also recommends that there should be new and effective laws to prevent the inflation of railroad securities and declares that the profits of the great railroad systems of the far West are being used to buy stocks and control systems in the East instead of building more roads for the development of the West as they should be.

Washington, May 15.—The recommendation of Messrs. Kellogg and Severance in regard to the Harriman railroads has not yet been accepted and confirmed by the Interstate Commerce Commission so that they stand at present merely as recommendations to the Commission and not as a report of the Commission itself.

Chairman Knapp and Commissioners Harlan of the Interstate Commerce Commission say that the commission has not yet made its report on the recommendations.

## MILL OPERATIVES GET MORE PAY

Leading Cotton Centers of Southern New England Grant Voluntary Increase of 10 Per Cent.

Boston, Mass., May 15.—According to advices from leading cotton mill centers of southern New England, fully 85,000 operatives will have their wages advanced about ten per cent beginning Monday, May 27th.

At this time it is unknown what action, if any, will be taken by the cotton men of northern New England. The wage question has not been considered by the Boston mill offices which control this section.

The Canadian cotton mills are also advancing the wages of their employees. Half a dozen corporations in the province of Quebec and two mills in St. John, N. B., advanced the wages of their employees about ten per cent this month.

## EXTREMELY COLD IN NEBRASKA

Killing Frosts Occur Over Central and Western Portion of State—Green Bugs Threaten Wheat.

Omaha, Neb., May 15.—The United States Weather Bureau station here reports killing frosts over central and western Nebraska last night and light frosts over the eastern portion of the state. Snow fell this morning at many points along the Missouri River. At Deadwood, South Dakota, reports say two feet of snow has fallen.

The heavy winds of the last three days are reported to have blown the green bugs practically all over the wheat growing sections, invasions being made in large portions not heretofore infected.

## STAGE CARRYING TREASURE BURNS

Coach Traversing Death Valley Accidentally Consumed, Together With \$28,000.

Los Angeles, Calif., May 15.—A story reached here of the accidental burning of a stage coach in Death Valley near Ash Meadows, Sunday, in which \$15,000 in bank bills and \$13,000 of registered mail were consumed. The stage is supposed to have caught fire from a cigar. The money was consigned to the Greenwater, California, bank.

## SLOW PROGRESS IN HAYWOOD CASE

Indications Are That It Will Be Another Week Yet Before Jury Is Secured.

Boise, Idaho, May 15.—With ten men in the jury box who have been passed for cause by both the prosecution and the defense, the trial of W. D. Haywood was resumed this morning. It is very probable that not more than two or three of the jurors now in the box will be allowed to remain after an examination with the privilege of a peremptory challenge is completed. This means that it will yet be sometime before the trial jury is secured.

The examination of talesmen in the selection of the jury today developed the existence of prejudice against Harry Orchard. While under examination by the defense, Samuel Wingate, passed by the state, frankly said he was prejudiced against the unoffered testimony of Orchard. Wingate said he would absolutely refuse to accept Orchard's story. Judge Wood sustained the state's challenge. The defense took an exception.

Later another talesman said he, too, would be unable to give the testimony of Orchard the same credence as he would give the testimony of other witnesses. The indication of this feeling led the state to cover this point in the subsequent examination of all talesmen.

## FIFTEEN BOYS MAKE FIRST COMMUNION

Partake of Host at Old San Miguel Church Under Direction of Christian Brothers.

Under the direction of the Christian Brothers of St. Michael's College, fifteen boys partook of their first holy communion this morning at mass celebrated at the historic old San Miguel Church.

Relatives and friends of the communicants filled the ancient house of worship at whose altar the Spanish settlers worshipped three centuries ago. The communicants were all dressed in natty black suits with the customary white ribbon bows tied around one arm and carrying a consecrated candle for use at this solemn ceremony.

## ABE RUEF ENTERS PLEA OF GUILTY

Defense Springs Sensation in San Francisco Extortion Case—Sentence Not Yet Passed.

San Francisco, Calif., May 15.—When the Ruef trial opened today Attorney Ache renewed his motion for a change of venue. Judge Dunne denied the motion but granted a recess until 2 o'clock in order that the attorneys might confer with Ruef "on a matter of considerable importance." When the court re-convened Ruef entered a plea of guilty.

Ruef's plea of guilty was to the charge of extortion on which the taking of testimony in his trial was about to begin. The specific charge in the indictment consisted of the payment to Ruef of \$1,175 by the proprietors of Delmonico's French restaurant to secure for this place his permission to sell liquor in private rooms.

## BIG JACQUOT RANCH SOLD

Emelio Valdez Purchases Same for \$23,000—4,000 Acres Comprise the Property.

Special to The New Mexican. Springer, May 15.—M. M. Salazar, of this town has just closed a deal whereby Emelio Valdez, of this section, becomes the purchaser of the well known Jacquot ranch, located sixteen miles southeast of Springer.

The property comprises 4,000 acres under perfect title. It is one of the finest ranches, not only in Colfax County, but in northern New Mexico and will yield in alfalfa and hay alone about a thousand tons annually. Included in the sale are two hundred head of graded cattle, a number of horses, improved farming machinery and utensils.

The price paid by Mr. Valdez is reported to have been \$23,000 of which \$12,000 were paid in cash while the remainder will be paid in yearly installments of \$1,000 each in eleven years.

Mrs. Jacquot, former owner of the place, expects to leave for California shortly where she will remain on an extended visit.

## NO STRIKE ON RIO GRANDE

### Officials and Trainmen Effect Compromise

#### DETAILS NOT YET KNOWN

#### Both Sides Made Concessions --- Happy Solution of Trouble.

Denver, Colo., May 15.—There will be no strike on the Denver & Rio Grande Railroad. The officials of the road and the representatives of the trainmen got together last night and reached a definite agreement to that effect.

While no conclusion has been reached as to the exact terms of the settlement, it was agreed that the men should not go out on a strike. It was announced that within two days the details of the settlement will be arranged.

Both sides made concessions, the exact nature of which have not been made public.

## BROUGHT TO PEN FOR SAFE KEEPING

Francisco Baca, Charged With Being Accomplice in Brutal Hillsboro Murder, Put in Prison.

Sheriff Ed Tafuya, of Sierra County, arrived in the Capital on the noon train from Hillsboro, having in charge Francisco Baca, whom he brought to the Territorial penitentiary for safe-keeping.

Baca is charged with being an accomplice of Mrs. Valentina Madrid and Alma Lyons in the murder of the Madrid woman's husband at Hillsboro several months ago. The two women were convicted at the recent term of court for Sierra County and sentenced to be hanged for the crime, but the case against Baca was continued until the fall term of court for that county.

Inasmuch as he is regarded as a desperate prisoner, the authorities thought it best to place him in the penitentiary for safe-keeping.

Sheriff Tafuya was accompanied by a deputy and Baca was taken from the train at the penitentiary switch.

## STATEHOOD FOR OKLAHOMA UNLIKELY

Washington Hears Governor Has Been Enjoined From Calling Election to Vote on Constitution.

Washington, May 15.—Although an enabling act was passed by the Fifty-ninth Congress for Oklahoma and Indian Territory to come into the Union as one state to be known as Oklahoma and, although a constitution has been gotten up, there is talk in official circles here that New Mexico may yet get ahead of Oklahoma as the forty-sixth state of the Union.

News has reached here that the Governor of Oklahoma has been enjoined from issuing a proclamation calling an election for the adoption of the constitution formed and from electing state officials of the new state of Oklahoma on account of many defects alleged to exist in the constitution.

## SPECIAL GRAND JURY CONVENES

In Denver to Probe Coal and Timber Land Frauds—Many Indictments Are Expected.

Denver, Colo., May 15.—A special federal grand jury, the first in Denver in many years, called to probe into the coal and timber land frauds and mining swindles, convened today. A dozen witnesses arrived from St. Louis today. The work of investigation will be in charge of Ernest Knaebel, special assistant to Attorney General Bonaparte and Ralph Hartsell, acting United States District Attorney.

## M'KINLEY COUNTY TO HAVE NEW COURT HOUSE

The Board of County Commissioners of McKinley County are advertising for bids for the building of a new court house and jail building at Gallup, the county seat. Contractors must furnish a certified check for \$500 with each bid to assure the good faith of the bidder. The proposals will be received up to 4 o'clock p. m. on June 3 at the office of the clerk of the board, F. W. Meyers, at Gallup. The official notice to contractors appears on page three of the New Mexican and the attention of contractors is called to it for further information.

## CONDUCTOR TURNS ROBBER

### On New York Street Car---Passenger Victim

#### POLICE ARE INVESTIGATING

#### Story of Patron that Employee of Down Town Line Robbed Him.

New York, May 15.—That the conductor of a Grand Street crosstown street car line, turned out the lights of his car, knocked him down and robbed him of \$90 while he was a passenger upon the car, was the complaint made to the police today by Antonio Kresnie, a hospital nurse.

Kresnie said that he boarded the car late last night, believing it would carry him towards Jersey City. Instead the car was going east. When it stopped at the East River terminal he declared the conductor in uniform entered the car, turned out the lights and attacked him with a black jack. While he was dazed he said the conductor robbed him of a gold watch, a diamond stud and all the money he had, and threw him from the car, which quickly started on its return trip.

The police are making a rigid investigation.

## BASEBALL PARK IS SURE THING

Local Company to Be Incorporated With Capital Stock of \$2,000—Grounds May Be Purchased.

Officers and a board of directors of the Santa Fe Baseball Association, have been elected and the organization will be incorporated shortly with a capitalization of \$2,000. The tract of land to be converted into a baseball park was surveyed yesterday afternoon, the lines for the fence, diamond and grand stand being staked out, and the work of fixing up the grounds will commence within a few days.

Levi A. Hughes is the president of the baseball association, Nathan Salmon, vice president; James B. Read, secretary and Simon Nusbbaum, treasurer. The board of directors consists of eight, as follows: A. J. Fischer, F. E. Nuding, Fred Muller, Charles Closson, Leo Hersch, James Read, W. H. Kerr and Frank Owen.

The directors held a meeting last night at which plans for the baseball park were discussed. It was suggested that it might be well to purchase the grounds outright and negotiations are now pending with this end in view.

The park is to be five hundred feet square and the fence to be built enclosing it will be eight feet high on top of which will be two feet more of wire netting. The grand stand and bleachers will have a combined seating capacity of about 1,000.

It is expected to have the park ready for the opening game about the first of June.

## DAYS OF SPRUCE BEETLE NUMBERED

Deadly Enemy to Rocky Mountain Forests to Be Extirminated—Discovery By New Mexican.

Washington, May 15.—The forestry bureau has taken steps to eradicate the Englemann spruce beetle which has been attacking Rocky Mountain forests. As a result of investigations made by A. D. Hopkins of the bureau of entomology, in the Lincoln forest reserve in New Mexico, an effective campaign can be waged against the pest.

The government entomologist discovered that the grubs may be killed by removing the bark from the lower trunks of the trees before the first part of May. The broods pass the winter and spring in the inner bark of trees attacked by the parent beetle during the preceding summer. That as many as possible of the insects might be destroyed, the forest service during the past spring permitted the free use of infected timber to all persons who would remove the bark from the lower and middle parts of the trees. The peeled logs were allowed to remain in the woods until all the infected trees that could be felled were down and the bark removed. The work of fighting the destroyer can be successfully accomplished only before the first part of May. This year's campaign is over, but will be renewed next spring.

## SANTA FE OFFICIALS VISIT THE CAPITAL

Special Train Carrying Men High in Operating Departments of Big Railroad System Spend 5 Hours Here.

Thereafter they went north intending to stop at several other cities en route to Kansas City and Chicago. The party consisted of J. M. Kendrick, second vice-president; James E. Hurley, general manager of the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe Railway system proper with headquarters at Topeka; R. J. Parker, general superintendent of the Western Grand Division with headquarters at La Junta; James M. Kern, division superintendent, East Las Vegas; these officials are on an inspection tour of the road and its different stations and while in the city gave considerable attention to railroad affairs.

Thereafter Mr. Kendrick, who is accompanied by Mrs. Kendrick and their daughter, Miss Helen, and General Manager Hurley enjoyed the many attractions here and Santa Fe's fine climate. The ladies were especially pleased. They also called on some of the officials and other leading citizens and renewed acquaintances. The editorial office of the New Mexican Printing Company was visited and literature descriptive of this city and of the surrounding country and of New Mexico in general was furnished. ## LITTLE SYMPATHY FOR MURDERESSES

Feeling Bitter Against Hillsboro Women Condemned to Die—Prepare for Hanging.

Hillsboro, N. M., May 15.—Feeling here is very bitter against Mrs. Valentina Madrid and Alma Lyons, who were convicted here in the district court last week of the brutal murder of the Madrid woman's husband and who were sentenced to hang by Judge Frank W. Parker.

There is little hope that the sentence will be commuted, as a majority of the people are in favor of the execution of the death sentence. The hanging is set for June 7th and already preparations are underway for the erection of the scaffold.

The prisoners are closely guarded but as they are women there is not much danger of their escaping. Neither seem to realize the enormity of their crime. Both have strong hopes of escaping the gallows by having the death sentence commuted to life imprisonment.

## SEVEN DENTISTS SECURE LICENSES

To Practice Their Profession in New Mexico—Pass Examination Before Dental Board.

All seven of the applicants who appeared for examination before the Territorial Board of Dental Examiners at the meeting of that body here Monday and Tuesday have been issued licenses to practice their profession in New Mexico.

They are: Dr. C. M. Standfill, of Albuquerque; Dr. Joseph Witscher, of Albuquerque; Dr. Charles A. Eller, of Albuquerque; Dr. R. Fred Pettit, of Albuquerque; Dr. L. R. Hough, of Portales; Dr. J. J. Clarke, of Artesia; Dr. J. G. Hall, of Pecos.

Dr. R. L. Barton, of Lordsburg, made application for a license but failed to appear for examination as required by law, whereupon the secretary of the board was instructed to notify him at once to discontinue practicing dentistry in the Territory.

## FIRE DESTROYS ANCIENT CHURCH

El Paso, Tex., May 15.—The Catholic church at Ysleta, twelve miles east of this city, the oldest church in North America, and said by some to be the oldest church on the western hemisphere, built hundreds of years ago by pioneer priests, was destroyed by fire last night. The origin of the fire is unknown, but is believed to have been caused by the candles on the altar.

## PIERCE MUST RETURN TO TEXAS

### And Face Indictment Charging Perjury

#### UNABLE TO SECURE RELEASE

#### On Writ of Habeas Corpus in St. Louis Court—Fought Extradition.

St. Louis, Mo., May 15.—H. Clay Pierce, chairman of the Board of Directors of the Waters-Pierce Oil Company, was today remanded to the custody of Sheriff Matthews of Travis County, Texas, to answer to an indictment charging perjury, by a decision rendered this morning by Judge Adams in the United States Circuit Court.

Judge Adams denied the application of Pierce's counsel for a writ of habeas corpus. Pierce is wanted in Texas to answer to an indictment charging perjury in an affidavit made by him in May, 1906, to the effect that the Waters-Pierce Oil Company was not a party to any pool, trust, confederation or commission in restraint of trade.

After Judge Adams read the decision, Attorney Priest immediately asked that a stay of execution of the court's order be granted until two o'clock this afternoon to enable him to decide whether to make an appeal to the United States Court of Appeals or directly to the United States Supreme Court. Judge Adams granted the request.

Attorney Barclay, representing the state of Texas, asked that the court increase the bond of \$10,000 under which Pierce was released from custody when he surrendered May 8, but the Judge stated that the bond would remain at that amount until two o'clock.

Pierce had nothing to say as he left the court room with his attorney.

## WEATHER CLEARS MERCURY RISES

Light Frost is Predicted in North Portion Tonight, But Indications Are Cold Snap is Over.

Pierce Appeals; Gives \$40,000 Bond.

When court re-convened at 2 o'clock this afternoon, Attorney Priest gave formal notice that two appeals would be taken from the decision of Judge Adams, one to the United States Circuit Court of Appeals and one to the United States Supreme Court. The court then admitted Pierce to bond in the sum of \$20,000 on each appeal.

After straying around in the north temperate zone at frequent intervals since the advent of the glad spring-time Santa Fe's climate seems bent upon making amends now and the indications are it will behave henceforth. There is some consolation in the fact that while unseasonable weather has been obtaining here the same has been true throughout the entire country.

Today's weather forecast calls for fair weather tonight and Thursday with rising temperature. A light frost is predicted tonight in the north portion of New Mexico. During last night the temperature dropped down to 26 degrees in this vicinity, the temperature here at 6 o'clock this morning at the local weather bureau station registered 30 degrees. Ice formed in shallow water three-quarters of an inch thick and the accompanying frost was killing in effect.

In Santa Fe yesterday the maximum temperature was 45 degrees at 4:15 p. m., and the minimum temperature 32 degrees at 3:30 a. m., making the mean temperature 38 degrees. The relative humidity was 71 per cent and the precipitation .002 inch.

## FRISCO CAR STRIKE HAS BEEN BROKEN

Strike-Breakers Successfully Operating Lines—Company Issues Warning to ex-Employees.

San Francisco, Calif., May 15.—One hundred and fourteen cars of the United Railroads are being operated on seven lines in this city today, the routes being the same as yesterday except that the Haight street line has extended its service from 19th Avenue to the Cliff House. The United Railroads officials make no secret of their intention to re-arm their operatives if the lives of any of them are sacrificed.

## ANOTHER BRACE GAME BY THE ALBUQUERQUE "COYOTE."

Another confidence game has been commenced by the Albuquerque Morning Coyote; it is again to be played upon the President of the United States, who, if possible, is to be hoodwinked and supplied with a lot of trumped up, or misleading, or false information and trumped up and ridiculous statements to induce him to reconsider his action in the "affair Hagerman." The President is to be induced, if possible, to take for gospel truth the stuff that is to be submitted to him by the Morning Coyote's gang because "We, the people of New Mexico," consisting of a clique of selfish politicians and speculators in the Duke City, of some personal friends and of many Democrats who wish the Republican party anything but good, want it and need it in their business.

No longer is President Roosevelt to be accused of having committed "a fearful crime against civilization" and perpetrated "awful outrages against honesty and morality in New Mexico" by accepting the resignation of the ex-Governor; no longer is he to be charged with having taken this action in order to secure the New Mexico delegation to the next Republican convention for his own use and purposes; no longer are the dear people to be told that the President acted as he did because he wanted to materially aid and benefit the New Mexico ring of grafters and bootlickers and desired to strengthen the "rotten and corrupt Republican machine" that through its work he might secure the delegation and also force joint statehood upon the dear people of the two Territories. This is all to be forgotten and is never again to be mentioned and it is to be presumed that it was never said, never charged, never printed and never reiterated for many a time.

On the contrary soft soap, honey and molasses galore are to be used henceforth. President Roosevelt's doctrine of the "square deal" is to be invoked, and upon that talk and the sugar-molasses-honey treatment he is to be brought around to see the error of his ways, to undo his crimes and outrages, and to give what the coyote gang desires. The first hand in the play was played in yesterday's editorial columns of the Albuquerque Morning Coyote and appeared under the heading of "A Square Deal." It is not as good an attempt as might have been made as insincerity, hollowness, and deception lurk in every line. This first round in the brace game is republished herewith as a matter of record and to demonstrate that no one at all acquainted with the situation is afraid that it can be worked successfully. The fake editorial reads:

"No matter how much the American people may divide upon political questions, social questions, or even religious questions, they can always be relied upon to stand shoulder to shoulder in favor of the 'square deal.' That is the inside secret of President Roosevelt's great popularity throughout the country. The people everywhere regard him as the champion of the square deal, and therefore they are with him, heart and soul. And that also is the secret of former Governor Hagerman's remarkable popularity throughout New Mexico. They believe, or rather they know, that he has not been given a square deal, and hence practically the whole people of the Territory, without regard to party, sect or creed, are lined up with him, though he is out of office, and men who, previous to his removal, did not know or care anything about him, are now among his most enthusiastic supporters, not because of their friendship for him personally, but because of their regard for the square deal, and especially because of the high regard in which they have always held President Roosevelt, and their desire to let him know that he has been deceived by a gang of unprincipled political tricksters into turning his back upon that great American principle for which he has been regarded as the most eminent champion.

"That is the chief reason for the Morning Journal's regret of the late political blunder. Not that it likes Hagerman less, but Roosevelt more, and is anxious that he should know the extent and enormity of the devilish trick that has been played upon him by his false counsellors."

## PLOW DEEP, HARROW OFTEN.

This is great weather for the dry farmer, that is if he is wise and cultivates his soil in such manner as to retain the moisture that has been falling the past two months. The man who started last fall to plow deep and harrow frequently is certain of a bumper crop this fall, and he will demonstrate that with his method, almost

one-half of the area of New Mexico can be put under successful cultivation. Conditions are similar in eastern Colorado which, like eastern New Mexico is receiving thousands of settlers who will engage in dry farming. Their success, of course, will depend upon observance of the above simple rule, the preservation of moisture in the soil by cultivation. Says the Denver Republican in dwelling on this point:

"Successful farming on the unirrigated plains of this state, where the climate is arid or at least semi-arid, depends upon the employment of means and methods to offset the natural disadvantages. Seed selection and proper tillage are the keys to success.

"This truth cannot be too firmly impressed upon people seeking homes in that part of the state, and nothing but evil can come from misrepresentation. The man who, coming from beyond the Missouri River, concludes that the people of Colorado have been stupid in thinking the climate of the plains region semi-arid, will find in course of time that the inhabitants of a country are much more likely to understand its natural conditions than strangers. The climate of Colorado has not changed. Concerning this let there be no doubt or question whatever.

"The unchanged climate is a factor in the problem of agriculture on the plains which cannot be ignored. Sooner or later it will assert itself whether men like it or not. It has to be reckoned with, and every farmer should be made to understand and appreciate this from the beginning. If his farming does not differ from that which is approved in humid regions he will certainly fail, and no amount of rain which may fall this year or which may have fallen last year will change this truth. Success may for a year or two crown the efforts of those who ignore climatic conditions, but sooner or later it will be shown that only they can prosper who employ the Campbell process or some other method adapted to local conditions."

## THE OKLAHOMA GERRYMANDER.

The Democrats had a majority of ten to one in the Oklahoma constitutional convention and naturally gerrymandered that would-be commonwealth into congressional and legislative districts so as to give their party everything there was in sight and the Republicans practically nothing in the way of chances to carry congressional districts or even a small proportion of the legislative districts. Under this state of affairs President Roosevelt may decline to approve the constitution formed and submitted to him for approval. In this matter the Los Angeles Evening News thinks that one of the chief objections to the new Oklahoma constitution is its exceedingly unfair gerrymander of the new state in the interest of the Democrats. If the President should refuse his approval of the constitution on these grounds, the precedents are strongly with him. Wherever state constitutions have called for fair opportunities, gerrymanders have been repeatedly upset. In defense the Oklahoma Democrats say they are merely doing what is done elsewhere. But it is not done elsewhere under the operation of good state constitutions.

## WILL BE EASY FOR CURRY.

The McKinley County Republican, published at the county seat of Gallup, by-the-way a prosperous and growing town, voices its opinion of Captain George Curry in the following rather unique style:

"Captain George Curry, the newly appointed governor, is on his way to New Mexico. A man who has stuck to the hurricane deck of a bucking broncho, branded calves with one hand and kept the old cow off with the other, charged up San Juan hill, hunted bear and buffalo, sat in the Council of this Territory, fought Moros and held Samar Island, will find it a delightful rest to sit on the lid at Santa Fe. Being Governor of New Mexico for such a man will be easy. Those who know Governor Curry say that he will be Governor and no one will tell him where to head in and make it stick."

## A HEARTY WELCOME FOR CURRY

The Tucuman News editorially urges that a grand reception be given to Captain George Curry upon his inauguration as Governor of New Mexico. The paper handles the subject in good shape and declares:

"The people of New Mexico are preparing to give Captain Curry a welcome that will equal anything of the sort that has previously occurred in the Territory. This will be a fitting

tribute to a worthy son of this great commonwealth, who will doubtless appreciate the recognition that we are going to give him, even more than the honor of being the Governor of his home state. His friends and admirers, as many of them as possible, should make it a point to be on hand when this function is pulled off to show him that his fellow New Mexicans have faith in him and are glad to welcome him back home."

Concerning the action of the President in designating Secretary of the Territory, J. W. Reynolds, to act as Acting Governor until the arrival of Captain George Curry from Manila and his assumption of the duties as Governor of the Sunshine Territory, the Carlsbad Argus believes that the appointment of Territorial Secretary J. W. Reynolds as acting Governor during the time intervening until the arrival of New Mexico's new Governor, was a popular move upon the part of President Roosevelt. Secretary Reynolds is a man of splendid executive ability, and will attend to the duties of his own office and those of Governor, devoting half of each day to the two.

It was well for the city council this week to provide by ordinance for the extension of pavements to the city limits on Palace Avenue, especially if steps are taken to enforce the ordinance effectively and equitably. Of course, as long as property owners on other portions of the street or on other streets, have been permitted to defy paving ordinances passed months and even years ago, it would be expecting too much from property owners on more remote portions of the same streets, to lay pavements. Pavement laid here and there on a street, with long stretches of unpaved sidewalks between, is of no use to any one in particular or to the community in general.

The tax-dodgers, knockers and the coyotes are fearful that the Republican party of the Sunshine Territory will not be united in the coming campaign and will not be successful. They need not worry. The Republican party of New Mexico of late years especially has exhibited a great knack of taking care of itself in very good shape when occasion demanded.

Garfield and William McKinley. Should Secretary of War William H. Taft be successful in 1908 the Buckeye State will share even honors with the Old Dominion.

Congressman Champ Clark, of Missouri, gives the dear people notice that he will accept the Democratic nomination for the presidency should no one else want it. This gay and gallant Missourian has evidently forgotten that Colonel William Jennings Bryan is very much alive and still very active.

They are looking for ideal cavalry horses for the United States Army. By and by they will look for ideal men in the cavalry branch of the army. The chances are that they will succeed in obtaining neither. Ideal men and ideal horses are rather scarce upon this mundane sphere.

Wheat is above the dollar mark per bushel and the farmers of the great West do not care whether or not the tariff did it. They are satisfied with the fact and will vote the Republican ticket accordingly. Prosperity always helps the Republican party.

Colonel William Jennings Bryan boldly asserts that he expects to remain actively in politics for the next twenty-five years. A dire and fearful threat this, but "there is many a slip twixt the cup and the lip," and especially in politics.

## MINES AND MINING.

## Santa Fe County.

The Engineering and Mining Journal of this week has the following interesting resume of mining operations in Santa Fe County:

"The lead smelter at Cerrillos and its tributary mines are still closed, in spite of the rumors of early resumption of production. The Tiffany turquoise mines also, nine miles north of Cerrillos, are idle, but south of the railroad mining is reviving. At the Madrid coal mines, the coal washer and mine are quiet, though some prospecting is going on, and some coal is being extracted for local use.

"In the Tuertos range activity prevails. At the New Placers, near Golden, the Gold Bullion Company is the successor of the Monte Cristo Company in the ownership of 480 acres of the best located ground. The dredge owned by the latter concern was brought from Washington gulch, Montana, but was overwhelmed by a cloudburst after a short trial. A new dredge, built by the Marion Steam Shovel Company, has just been started. It is of the dipper type, with 75 cubic yards per hour capacity and runs on four trucks, set on two tracks. Water, for washing the screened gravel from the dredge, is got from five artesian wells, yielding some 25 gallons per minute, when pumped by rods, actuated by electric motors run from a central power plant.

"Down the gulch from the New Placers, on a mesa, are the beds of gold cement which are owned by the Interstate and sister mining companies, of which Captain Farley is manager. The 30-stamp mill on them is now idle, but it is planned to erect a supplementary cyanide plant soon, and to start milling again. For a water supply, these companies have a spring and three artesian wells.

"Across the valley from the New Placers, in the Ortiz mountains, the Old Placers are shut down and even the Mexican hand-farmers have now been stopped by the Galisteo Company, which holds the lease of the Ortiz land grant.

"The Santa Fe Copper Company is now running both mine and smelter at full capacity, with Mexican labor. The San Pedro mine's daily output is about 100 tons of chalcopryite-garnet ore, and this is smelted in a single blast furnace. The fuel is Colorado coke, hauled for 20 miles by wagon from Cerrillos, and the shipment through the same point is copper matte, running 50 to 75 per cent. A new Franklin 15-drill compressor is being installed in the smelter power house, to run rock drills and two hoists in the mine. William Tudor, Jr., is superintendent."

## Socorro County.

It is again reported that the Helen Mining Company, operating the Confidence and other properties, intends to install a cyanide mill of large capacity and there is good reason to believe that the report is well founded. The old process employed, pan amalgamation, did not save more than 60 per cent of the values and the mine was closed about four years ago until a more satisfactory process could be found. This has been demonstrated in cyaniding and concentration in the Last Chance property. As is well known the Confidence property is the best developed of any in the district, having about 25,000 feet of work. The greatest depth reached is over a thousand feet. It is estimated that the production of this property has been approximately one million dollars. The Helen Mining Company owns a group of thirteen claims. The principal producers being the Confidence and Black Bird.

## KANSAS CITY

## LIVE STOCK

Supply of Range Cattle Below the Average—General Market Advances 10 to 25 Cents.

Special to the New Mexican. Kansas City Stock Yards, May 13.—The supply of range cattle for the

past week has been moderate, one-fifth less than in any recent week, at 32,000 head. The general market advanced 10 to 25 cents, fat steers from Colorado feed lots selling at \$5 to \$5.50 showing the full advance over the previous week. Stock and feeding grades made advances of 10 to 15 cents, stockers reaching \$5.35, feeders \$5.45, and calves \$5.25, bulk of the stock cattle from \$4 to \$5. The run today is 10,000 head, moderate when the good market last week is considered, and those who are predicting small runs for this month find confirmation in the run today. Prices are generally steady today, and the market without any special feature, except that there is a latent feeling of excitement, in sympathy with unusual advances in wheat lately, which may come to the surface in the shape of a sharp turn in the market any time. Cattle owners are apparently resting in a safe position.

Sheep and lamb receipts last week footed up 30,000 head, run today 8,000, market steady today at a range 10 or 15 cents above a week ago. Three thousand Texas muttons and as many Texas goats were included in the supply last week, the muttons of inferior quality, going to feeder buyers at \$5.30, and the goats selling around \$4 to \$4.40. Woolled stock is scarce, lambs late last week at \$8.20 to \$8.55, some medium quality lambs today at \$8.40, Colorado spring lambs last week at \$9, clipped fed western wethers \$6.25, yearlings \$6.75, ewes \$5.75 to \$6.10, a few woolled ewes at \$6.75. Three doubles of Texas muttons sold at \$8.55 today, but stuff from that territory this season will be of medium quality account of short pasture, and total receipts from there will likely be of small volume.

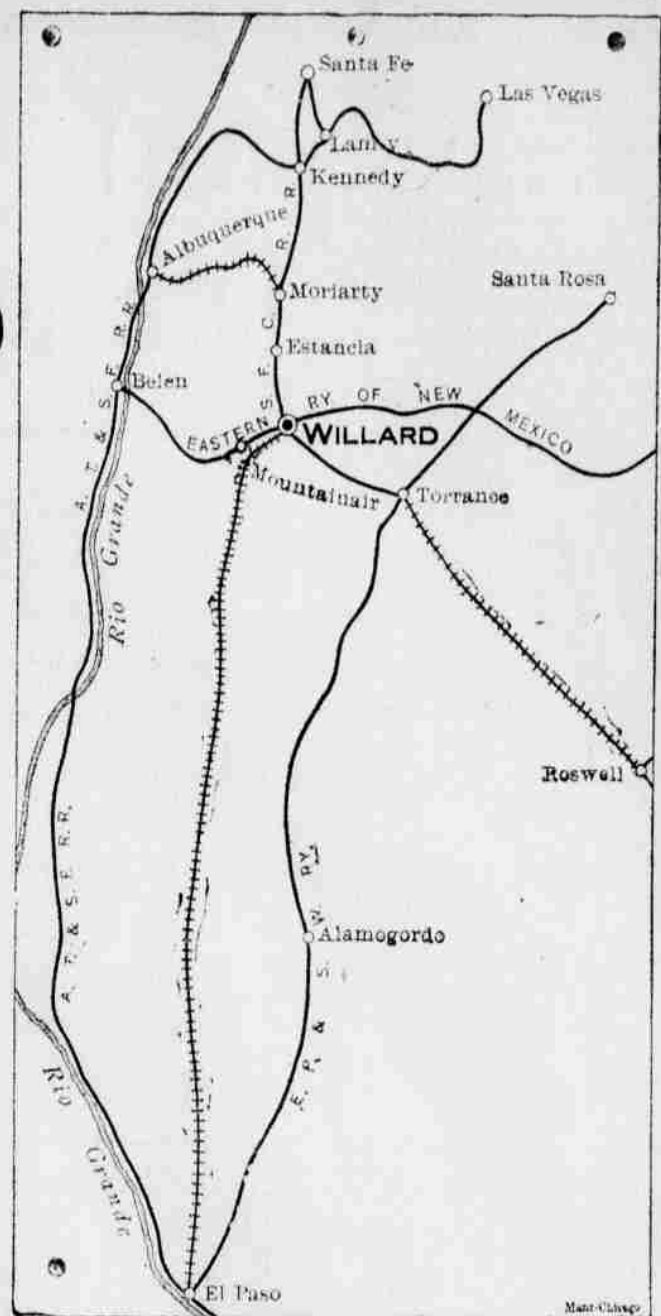

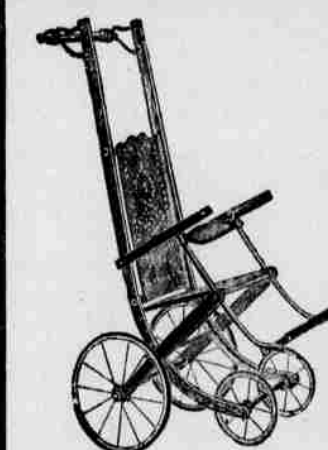

The recent cold snap caught a good many housewives with their stoves down and no little inconvenience was felt in a number of Santa Fe homes. However, today gives promise that summer is here in earnest and a sigh of relief is heard on every hand.

Manager W. H. Kerr, of the Santa Fe baseball team announces that he has secured a game with the Albuquerque McIntosh Browns for Thursday, May 30th, Decoration Day. ### ESTANCIA VALLEY FARMERS BUSY

Hundreds of New Settlers Engaged in Plowing and Seeding—Putting in Big Orchard.

Special to The New Mexican.

Estancia, May 15.—Farmers in the Estancia Valley have been busy for some weeks, plowing and seeding. The recent snow and rainfall have put the ground in thoroughly good condition and this fact is being utilized to its fullest extent by the husbandmen who are increasing in number right along.

Two of the settlers originally from Missouri have received a consignment of 13,000 fruit trees, mostly apple, and have planted about 10,000 of these on the two homesteads owned by them a short distance from this town. Two other settlers have broken 150 acres which they put into corn before the snowfall of three weeks ago. This tract will have to be reseeded as the seed corn heretofore planted was killed by the cold weather.

One huge steam plow is at work in the valley on different claims and another is on the road. The steam plow now in use has contracts for all the work it can possibly do for the next five months. The work is done on shares at a certain figure per acre and the owners of the plow find it profitable. A steam thrasher will be brought to the valley in time for fall crops and especially to thresh out peas and other cereals to be used as feed for live stock.

Preparations for a great Fourth of July celebration at Estancia are already underway and the men who have it in hand propose to make it a success. There will be an old-fashioned barbecue, speaking, fire works at night and very likely a dance.

The people of Estancia have concluded to hold a Torrance County fair at the county seat about a week before the Territorial fair at Albuquerque and will make a strong effort to make it what it ought to be, namely, a complete exhibit of the great resources of their county. This year the Torrance County Fair Association means business.

There is much building going on in Estancia and more would be the rule could lumber be obtained. This is hard to get and it is rising steadily in price. The saw mills in the Manzano mountains are as busy as they can be.

Homeseekers and homestead entrymen continue to come into the valley more especially in its northern portion and as yet there seems to be no check to the arrival of these immigrants who are a very desirable class and mostly well-to-do people.

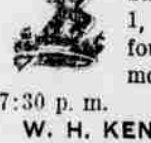

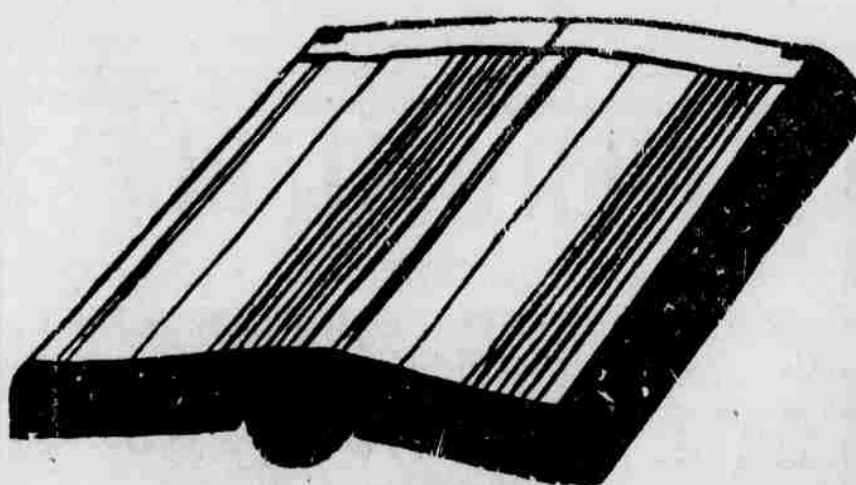

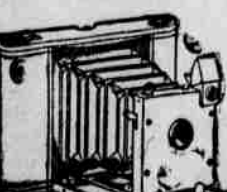

### TAKING CARE OF NEEDY CHILDREN

Superintendent C. E. Lukens, of Children's Home Society, Tells of His Work.

Dr. C. E. Lukens, superintendent of the Children's Home Society, will resume active work on the beneficial objects for which the society is instituted and for which it works at an early date. He will remove with his family to Albuquerque from Roswell and will make the former city his headquarters. The following letter received in this city by one of the members of the society is full of interest to all persons with humane instincts and who believe in doing good. The letter explains the situation in New Mexico strongly, but truthfully and is of public interest. Mr. Lukens writes: "Dear Friends and Helpers:

"You have doubtless wondered that you have not heard personally from the Superintendent of the Children's Home Society, or at least received our paper, the Home Evangel.

"Our work for the children is going on, but on account of the sickness of my family with scarlet fever, and our being under quarantine for the past three months, barring a few days, I have been unable to move my headquarters to Albuquerque, and not having a settled office I have not issued the paper. We will begin the issue, however, in June, as in a couple of weeks I will be in my Albuquerque office.

"While up to April the first I was unable to give my whole time to the work, yet we have been able to help a number of needy children to comfort and homes, besides doing the work of organization and home-finding. Six little ones have been helped and given homes, and I am now looking up the cases of four more.

"The need is greater than I had thought, not a town I have visited but has presented its case of orphan

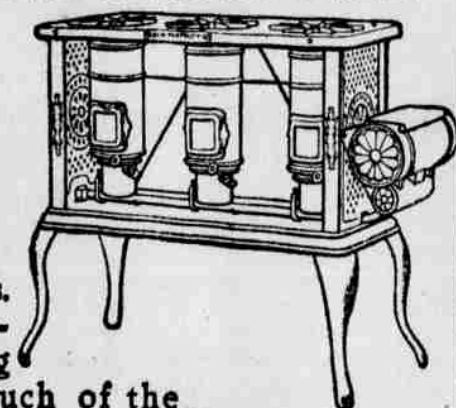

or deserted children, or of children in evil environment—some of them most cruelly treated.

"Last week I arrived in one of the Pecos Valley towns just one day too late to rescue three little ones who were in the hands of a drunken and opium-eating mother. She was arrested and placed in jail but broke her way out. The next day she was put on the train with the children, a babe of nine months, a little girl of five years and a boy of seven. While in the station, in a rage, she threw the baby across the waiting-room. The officers, not knowing of our work, and not knowing what else to do, sent her out of the town with the little ones still in such care.

"Our work is not only to help the orphan and deserted children, but also the children of such parentage or care. The Territorial laws will give possession of the children to our society when proof is offered as to the delinquency of parents. We are very anxious to get hold of all such children and ask you to help by interesting your town and county officers. You can telegraph the superintendent at his office in Albuquerque, and he will be on hand to help. Our hearts must go out to the little ones who have been so cruelly deprived of blessings of love and home.

"Three little ones were reported to us by one of our lady managers. The superintendent visited the home and found that the mother had been dead six months. The father was a drunkard and had deserted the children of ten for a week at a time. There was a two-year-old baby and two little boys, four and six years old. One day, cold and hungry they appeared at the home of a neighbor and when she came to the door, looked up in her face and said: "We're not hungry." In forty-eight hours the superintendent had them clothed and given a home.

"Let me hear from you in a case of need or if you know of a home. On behalf of the destitute and homeless and loveless little ones, I am

## TORRANCE COUNTY AGAIN IN LEAD

During Past Ten Days Thirty-seven Original Homestead Entries Have Been Made There.

Torrance County has again taken the lead in the matter of homestead entries with a total of thirty-seven original homestead entries filed at the local U. S. land office during the past ten days or since May 1. Guadalupe County is second with twenty-eight and Santa Fe is third with a total of twenty-five. The other homesteads taken up are divided between Bernalillo, San Miguel, Valencia, Colfax, San Juan and Mora Counties.

Since May 1 a total of 185 original homestead entries have been recorded at the local land office. There have been several final homestead and desert land entries filed, but these have not yet been entered on the record books.

## Special Use Permits Upon Land Applied For.

Chief Forester Gifford Pinchot has sent out National Forest Order No. 34, which outlines, under the heading of "Special Use Permits Upon Land Applied for Under the Act of June 1, 1906," matters of vital interest to settlers residing upon the national reserves. The order reads:

"To Forest Officers in Charge: "Settlers who settled on national forest land before its withdrawal and are awaiting survey to make entry, have the same rights to occupy and enjoy their holdings under Regulation 1 (The Use Book, p. 20) as homestead entrymen, and may at their option await survey or apply for the examination of their lands under the act of June 11, 1906, with a view to opening them to homestead entry. "Persons who settled in trespass before January 1, 1906, and have not abandoned their claims, may, if qualified, take advantage of the act of June 11, 1906, and in the meantime may occupy and enjoy their holdings without permit. Other applicants under this act, may secure, without charge, a permit for the agricultural use of so much of the land applied for as, in the opinion of the supervisor, is chiefly valuable for agriculture, provided that the land is not adversely claimed under settlement made before its withdrawal, or after its withdrawal and before January 1, 1906. Land covered with a stand of merchantable timber should not be considered chiefly valuable for agriculture under this paragraph."
