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## INVESTIGATION TO BE EXHAUSTIVE

### Assistant Attorney General Opens Office Here

#### WORK MAY TAKE YEARS

**Mr. McHarg Declines to Discuss Plans Other Than Admit Nature of Mission.**

Divers and sundry charges filed in Washington have led to the investigation of alleged land frauds in New Mexico. It is stated that the inquiry will be a searching one and that the probing process may consume a year or more. Although the report cannot be verified it is rumored that prosecutions will follow if the charges of illegal disposition of Territorial lands are found to be borne out in fact.

Special Assistant Attorney General Ormsby McHarg who has arrived in Santa Fe for the purpose of investigating the alleged land frauds in New Mexico has opened up an office in a suite of rooms on the second floor of the Federal building. Associated with him is E. P. Holcombe, a special agent connected with one of the divisions of the Department of the Interior, who a year ago or so spent several months on a similar mission in New Mexico. Mr. McHarg it is understood will also be assisted in making his investigation by the field force of special agents of the U. S. Land Office in this city, which is headed by Captain Frederick C. Dezendorf.

"I am not at liberty to give out any of the instructions I received from the Department of Justice relative to my proceedings here," Mr. McHarg stated last evening to a reporter of the New Mexican. "There is absolutely no political significance to be attached to my appointment or this investigation. Later on there may be some news to give out but not now. I don't want to try any cases in the newspapers."

Since the arrival of Assistant Attorney General McHarg and his clerical force rumors have been flying thick as to the exact nature of their mission. These reports are for the most part simply conjecture and with little or no foundation in fact. It is understood that the land investigation now going on in the Territory will not be exparte but the validity of every transaction since certain parts of the public domain in the Territory was segregated for donations to Territorial institutions will be considered.

**Declines to Discuss Charges.**  
When asked as to the nature of the charges which had been filed Mr. McHarg declined to discuss them. "There is nothing to give out for publication yet. If anybody is interested to know what the charges are they can be seen on file in Washington." With that the interview closed.

Mr. McHarg laid particular stress upon the fact that there was no politics or spite work in the present investigation. He said he did not owe his appointment to any political influence and came out here unbiased and unprejudiced. This is his first visit to New Mexico.

The charges of alleged land frauds are said to involve sales to corporations in which individuals were alleged to have been used as stool pigeons and applicants, illegal sale of timber on school lands, illegal fencing of the public domain, and the intimidation of settlers.

Mr. McHarg has all of the appearance of a college bred young man and he is, having graduated from the law department of the University of Michigan. His legal residence is in North Dakota but for seven years or more past his official duties have kept him almost constantly in Washington. Although comparatively young his hair which was once jet black is streaked with grey. He is easily approached and engaged in conversation and talks freely upon contemporaneous subjects with the exception of the business that brings him to the Sunshine Territory. When that is broached he closes up like the proverbial clam.

Mr. McHarg although young in years has had much legal and official experience. He has been a practicing attorney for twelve years. He has served as clerk of the committee on pensions of the U. S. Senate and was also private secretary to U. S. Senator Porter J. McCumber of North Dakota for some time. In these positions he naturally became well acquainted with many of the leading statesmen, official members of Congress and politicians in Washington, and who visit the national capital. The position he now holds is the one of special assistant attorney general under the Department of Justice and is the only one.

## HAGERMAN A STUBBORN WITNESS

**Refused to Answer Questions in Sargent Case on Hearing Before Referee Bishop.**

In the hearing held last evening at the office of A. B. Renahan, attorney for petitioner, before Charles L. Bishop, referee, in the case on relation of W. G. Sargent, auditor of the Territory, for a judicial determination and decision as to the use and purposes of the contingent fund of \$1,200 per annum for the office of the auditor, ex-Governor Herbert J. Hagerman was called as a witness. It was sought by Attorney Renahan to establish by the witness, the said Hagerman, the modus operandi in the expenditures of the appropriations of the contingent fund in the executive office by the ex-Governor as its incumbent and the uses to which the contingent fund was put then and there. It was understood that this testimony was to be used as a basis for an argument before the court.

It appears that Auditor W. G. Sargent believed that the contingent fund appropriation was for his personal use and benefit, and not for official expenses, and appropriated the sum of \$2,300 for the fifty-sixth and fifty-seventh fiscal years to his own use and benefit accordingly. The question sought to be settled is, whether this action on the part of Sargent was illegal or legal.

Ex-Governor Hagerman declined to answer the questions put to him in the examination. He admitted that the vouchers for the expenditures of the contingent fund in the executive office during his incumbency as governor for fifteen months amounting to \$3,750 were in his possession, but would not state if for official items or expenses. Among the questions asked by Attorney Renahan was one in which the attorney desired to be informed if the expenses for a reception given by the ex-Governor at the executive residence were paid out of the contingent fund appropriated for the use of the Governor. This Hagerman declined to answer.

In answer to a question the ex-Governor admitted that he could not keep the contingent fund money drawn by him from the Territorial treasury separate from his private funds. It also appeared that he procured vouchers for his expenditures. Attorney General George W. Fitch represented the Territory at the hearing. Ex-Governor Hagerman was called to testify by Attorney Renahan, but it is not believed that the latter will ask for a rule of the court to compel him to answer the questions so far propounded to him in the hearing.

## INVESTIGATION TO BE THOROUGH

**Complete Record of All Alleged Illegal Land Transactions in New Mexico Made in Washington.**

Washington, July 9.—A complete record of all alleged illegal land transactions in New Mexico including such as it is alleged ex-Governor Hagerman has been connected with, has been made at the Department of the Interior and will be sent to Santa Fe for a thorough investigation. Certain transactions connected with a large body of land in Chaves County are also to be investigated. Delegate W. H. Andrews was at the department of the Interior today and examined allotments to Navajo Indians who have left their reservation. He also visited the departments of state, of war and the postoffice department on business connected with New Mexico affairs.

## FARM HOME BURNS CHILDREN PERISH

**Parents Awake to Find House in Flames and Escape, While Four Youngsters Are Cremated.**

Suisun, Calif., July 9.—Four children of Mr. and Mrs. Charles L. Campbell, of Suisun Valley, lost their lives in the burning of the family home. The parents awoke in time to escape. When the parents awoke the house was in flames. They made frantic efforts to save the children, but could not. Both were badly burned, but will recover.

## ROCKED THE BOAT; THREE DROWNED

**Foolhardy Man Acted Smart With the Usual Result—Dead Members of Launch Crew.**

New York, July 9.—Three members of the crew of the steam launch Yacona, belonging to Henry Clay Pierce, of St. Louis, were drowned in the Hudson River early today when a small yawl was capsize by a sailor who rocked the boat. The men were returning to the launch from shore leave when the boat capsized. The Yacona came into port yesterday after a cruise in Long Island Sound.

## GERONIMO VIOLATES PAROLE

### Famous Apache Warrior Attempts to Escape

#### OVERTAKEN BY SOLDIERS

**Was Fleeing Across Texas Panhandle for New Mexico When Captured.**

Cache, Okla., July 9.—The famous old Apache warrior Geronimo, who terrorized the Southwest for many years, while attending a celebration at Cache, under parole as a guest yesterday, attempted to escape across the Texas Panhandle into New Mexico. He was missed about eight hours and a detachment of soldiers from Fort Sill captured him last night.

The old warrior had heard of the troubles of the Apaches who, according to a recent report, have threatened to go on the war path, and he wanted to help them fight. He has been having domestic troubles of late, his eighth wife having left him and recently he drank liquor to excess.

Recently Geronimo joined the Dutch Reformed Church to which President Roosevelt belongs, in the hope, it is said of obtaining a pardon.

## FRANCE DEPLORES WAR-LIKE ASPECT

**Government Issues Statement With Reference to Sending of Big Fleet to Pacific Waters.**

Paris, July 9.—The French government greatly deprecates the alarming view of the Japanese-American situation taken by the Paris press and it has inspired the statement based presumably upon the foreign offices' advice, placing a most optimistic construction upon the plans to dispatch the American fleet to the Pacific, which was given out this afternoon as follows:

"Much surprise is manifested in diplomatic circles over the excitement caused by the plan to send the American battleship fleet to Pacific waters. Instead of a step causing alarm there is reason to believe that the decision of the American government implies that the negotiations proceeding between Washington and Tokio cabinets are making favorable progress. The American government beyond doubt would not order this naval movement if it was likely to embarrass negotiations which have been going on for some time between the two governments."

## WRECK ON SANTA FE DELAYS TRAINS

**Eastbound Passenger Trains Nos. 2 and 10 Are Reported Indefinitely Late.**

Traffic on the main line of the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe Railway was seriously interrupted today on account of a wreck which occurred a few miles south of Lamy Junction.

The Santa Fe-Lamy train left this city on scheduled time this morning but did not return until this afternoon at 2 o'clock. It was held at the junction on account of delayed connections both east and west. Trains Nos. 2 and 10 from the west and south were reported as being indefinitely late. The east bound trains were laid out owing to a freight wreck south of Lamy. It is reported that one freight car was derailed and the track was torn up.

## FATAL COLLISION ON SOUTHERN ROAD

**Passenger Train Runs Into Engine—Fireman Fainted When He Saw Crash Coming.**

Mobile, Ala., July 9.—In a rear-end collision on the Mobile & Ohio Railroad near Whistler, Alabama, today, five miles from this city, Thomas Dease, engineer of the passenger train was killed and two other trainmen injured, a colored fireman probably fatally.

The firemen, when he discovered that the collision could not be avoided, became unconscious just after applying the air brakes, but he did not apply the air in time to prevent the crash.

## HEAT IN CHICAGO KILLS FIVE PERSONS.

Chicago, July 9.—Five persons died in Chicago yesterday of heat. Ten more were stricken and three of these may die. The maximum temperature was 84 degrees but the humidity was excessive.

## BOY CRUSHED UNDER CARS

### Fearful Accident Claims Fred McBride

#### DEATH WAS INSTANTANEOUS

**Body Badly Mangled—Son of Agent of Denver and Rio Grande Railroad.**

A fearful accident by which one of the brightest boys of Santa Fe lost his life occurred this afternoon in the yards of the Santa Fe Railway on the south side. Fred McBride, nine years of age, oldest son of Mr. and Mrs. F. H. McBride, was the unfortunate principal in the sad affair.

About half past two this afternoon the body of the poor child was found, one arm badly crushed and the body cut up severely. There were no eye witnesses to the sorrowful occurrence and the unfortunate boy was instantly killed.

It is reported that the boy was run over by a switch engine which was switching about the yards in charge of Engineer Schultz. It seemed that the wheels of one freight car passed over the child's body. How the boy came to be there and what he was doing is not known at this writing. This may be developed later.

The body was removed to the undertaking establishment of Dudrow & Montenie where it will be prepared for interment.

Dr. David Knapp was summoned to the scene of the accident but as death was instantaneous his services were not needed.

The fatality occurred at the east side of the Santa Fe Railway depot where freight cars are loaded and unloaded. The boy, it is presumed was playing on the platform and fell under the car which crushed over his life. Only one wheel passed over his body and his was extinct when railroad employes reached his side.

Mr. McBride who is the agent of the Denver & Rio Grande Railroad in this city, and Mrs. McBride, are highly esteemed and well known and have the sympathy of the community in this their great and sudden affliction.

## ALIENIST TO EXAMINE MRS. MARY EDDY

**Appointment of Dr. Jelley, of Boston, as Co-Master in Hearing Causes Much Surprise.**

Boston, July 9.—Counsel for the defense in the litigation surrounding the affairs of Mrs. Mary Baker G. Eddy continued today. The conference which began last night continued today. It is intimated that the principal subject under discussion is the recent appointment of an alienist as one of the co-masters with Judge Aldrich to report upon the competency of Mrs. Eddy.

Dr. Jelley Summamed. Concord, N. H., July 9.—Dr. Jelley, of Boston, has accepted his appointment as co-master to determine the competency of Mrs. Eddy.

## STOCKMEN ADOPT ULTIMATUM TERMS

**National Livestock Exchange Will Not Allow Any Sales Subject to Post Mortem Examination.**

Chicago, July 9.—At a meeting yesterday with the largest attendance in years, members of the National Livestock Exchange adopted ultimatum terms which are in direct opposition to the tentative agreement reached Friday by the heads of the big packing houses and representatives of live stock exchanges in Kansas City, Omaha, St. Louis, Chicago, and Sioux City. The position of the commission men, as indicated by their action yesterday, is that the big packing houses shall not handle any tagged heifers and cows which are subject to a postmortem examination. This class of cattle, if the commission men win their point, will go to independent plants.

## DYNAMITE CAP BLOWS OFF BOY'S HAND

Special to the New Mexican. Estancia, N. M., July 9.—Edwin Garvin, the ten-year-old son of E. T. Garvin, a rancher residing seven miles north of here, had a part of his left hand blown away by the explosion of a dynamite cap today. The wound was dressed by Dr. T. H. Garvin, the boy's grandfather, who was present at the time of the accident. The lad is expected to recover.

## PROCEEDS OF PRISON LANDS

**Secretary of Penitentiary Board Makes Report, Giving Detailed Statement.**

Secretary Charles F. Easley of the Board of Penitentiary Commissioners, as was stated in yesterday's New Mexican, has compiled a detailed statement showing the receipts and disbursements of funds derived from the leasing and sale of lands donated for the maintenance of the Territorial prison by the federal government. This was done in compliance with instructions recently received by Acting Governor J. W. Reynolds from the department of the interior requesting an accounting of all lands set aside for the support of various Territorial institutions under act of Congress.

According to Mr. Easley's report the balance on hand June 1, 1907, in the permanent improvement fund was 45 cents and in the income fund \$188.44, making a total balance in both funds of \$188.89. The income fund consists of the receipts from the leasing of the land, while the money received from the sale of land is credited to the permanent improvement fund. The total gross receipts from the leasing of penitentiary lands up to date were \$2,372.71, and the total gross receipts from the sale of penitentiary lands were \$25,506.42. Deducted from these receipts were the expenses incurred in the selection of the tracts which in the case of the income fund amounted to \$103.65 and in the permanent improvement fund of \$381.26, making the total net receipts of both funds \$27,879.13.

Under act of Congress of June 21, 1898, there were selected for the enlargement and maintenance of the Territorial prison a total of 49,672.32 acres. Of these 8,309.18 acres have been sold and 2,156.72 acres leased.

The following are itemized statements of the receipts in both income and permanent improvement funds, the former being marked in the report as Exhibit A, and the latter Exhibit B.

## METCALF CALLS IT PRACTICE CRUISE

**Secretary of Navy Deplores War-Like Aspect Given to Transfer of Battleship Fleet.**

Oakland, Calif., July 9.—Secretary of the Navy Metcalf, deprecating the war like aspect that has been given the order for a cruise of the great battleship squadron from the Atlantic to the Pacific coast, said last night that the proposed movement was a practice cruise and that the fleet would not be kept permanently in the Pacific Ocean. With considerable emphasis the secretary voiced his opinion that the war-like interpretation given the fleet's movements was not justified by the facts.

## TELLER RUYAN TO PLEAD INSANITY

**Man Who Stole \$96,000 From Trust Company Enters Plea of Not Guilty When Arraigned.**

New York, July 9.—Chester H. Runyan, paying teller of the Windsor Trust Company, who is charged with absconding with \$96,000 of the company's funds was arraigned today and pleaded not guilty. His counsel asked for an adjournment until next Monday and it is believed his plea will be insanity. His counsel said today he had learned that the prisoner's maternal grandfather was in an insane asylum and that Mrs. Runyan believed her husband's mind to be affected.

## HAYWOOD SOON TO KNOW FATE

### Famous Trial at Boise Nearing Close

#### DEFENDANT TO TESTIFY

**Moyer Will Be Followed on Stand By Fellow Prisoner—Outcome in Balance.**

Boise, July 9.—The reading of the depositions taken in San Francisco in connection with the explosion at the residence of Fred Bradley, whom Harry Orchard swore he twice attempted to assassinate, continued this morning as one of the closing features of the defense in the trial of William D. Haywood. It is not likely that Moyer will go on the stand before tomorrow. His testimony will probably take one day. Thursday, Haywood will be called. His examination will probably take the remainder of the week.

#### All Denied Orchard's Story.

The first testimony read this morning was that of J. B. Reilly, who lived near the Bradley apartments. Reilly declared he passed the Bradley house but a few minutes before the explosion and saw a Japanese servant cleaning the front stoop and vestibule. He did not believe it was possible for anyone to place a bomb in the manner indicated by Orchard in the time which elapsed between his passing and the report of the explosion.

The next deposition was that of Mrs. Charles Pickard, who, as Mrs. Crow, had been employed at the Bradley house as a cook. She told of smelling gas in the house for several days prior to the explosion and had called upon the gas company to complain. The witness denied absolutely that she had gone to the theater with Orchard as he testified. She declared he told a falsehood when he testified to that effect.

The next deposition was that of Mrs. Lucy A. Cummings, who occupied one of the flats in the building with the Bradleys. She described the explosion as the most terrible noise she had ever heard. The witness and her husband were at breakfast and both jumped up exclaiming: "it's gas." Gas had been leaking in the house for some time. Rushing into the hall she smelled gas, but no powder. She did not know, however, whether dynamite smelled like ordinary powder or not.

#### Firemen Smelled Gas.

John J. Eckelman, a member of the San Francisco fire department, who was with the company which responded to the fire alarm following the explosion, reported smelling gas strongly when he arrived at the house. The explosion was not a sharp report as he remembered it but a loud roar. Several other firemen gave similar testimony. One of them, John W. Barry, said he had had considerable experience with dynamite explosions and that they differed in sound and effect from that of the Bradley explosion.

The reading of the depositions will require the entire afternoon session. There was an interruption immediately after the noon recess, however, to call one witness.

## TO RID HERSELF OF GOLD BRICK

**American Girl Institutes Suit for Divorce From English Earl—Once an Actress.**

Edinburgh, Scotland, July 9.—The wife of the Earl of Rosslyn, formerly Miss Anna Robinson, of Minneapolis, has sued for a divorce. The Earl is now living in Paris. The Earl and Miss Robinson were married in London March 31st, 1905. For a time Miss Robinson was upon the stage. She made her debut in "The Governor of Kentucky."

## BIG HOTEL FOR SAN ANTONIO HOT SPRINGS

Special to the New Mexican. Albuquerque, N. M., July 9.—W. H. Greer, who returned last night from the San Antonio Hot Springs, 17 miles north of the Jemez Hot Springs, announced today that a Chicago Company has taken over the springs and will at once begin the erection of a thirty-five-room modern hotel, small electric light plant and will make other improvements at the springs. Greer leaves for Chicago tomorrow to consult with the promoters who it is said intend to have the resort open by next season. An automobile line will be operated between this city and San Antonio to convey guests to and from the resort.

## INSIDE REFORM IN BERNALILLO COUNTY.

The inside of the deals that were made by the bosses of the silly people who were bamboozled by a few designing gangsters into joining the so-called good government league of Bernalillo County are now coming to the front, much to the amusement of those who had heard something about them before and much to the discomfort of the gangsters and fake reformers who fooled the great majority of those who were inveigled to vote for what was then called the good government league ticket in the Duke City and in the county of Bernalillo. It now appears that John S. Beaven, collector, and Siegfried Grunsfeld, assessor, elected upon the fake reform ticket, want the four per cent commission on assessments and tax collections allowed to such officials in other counties of the Territory, and they want these fees just about as much as do assessors and collectors in other counties who are entitled to them under the law. The fake reformers under the leadership of ex-Governor Herbert J. Hagerman induced the 37th Legislative Assembly to enact a law reducing the fees of the officials named in counties of "Class A" from four to three per cent. This was done as a dust throwing fake reform act but it does not go down with Messrs. Beaven and Grunsfeld although they ran and were elected upon the fake reform ticket. The Albuquerque Industrial Advertiser, a Democratic newspaper and preaching pretty good Democratic doctrine, lets this ugly and mangy cat out of the bag in the following editorial:

"Things are getting interesting in the Albuquerque reform line. The following colloquy which took place between Little Danny Macpherson of the Morning Journal and John Beaven, treasurer of Bernalillo County, who was elected on the reform ticket, is worth reading. Here it is:

Beaven, calling upon Macpherson to protest against the enforcement of the law made by the last legislature which reduces the percentage he is to receive for his valuable services as treasurer, said: 'Why shouldn't I have my full four per cent? (amounting to about \$12,000). Didn't I pay \$2,000 to the campaign fund of the people's party?'

"Wasn't I the only Democrat on the ticket?'

"Wasn't the Democratic party sacrificed to allow some of you fellows who could not get in the Republican party to break into office?'

"Wasn't the Democratic party sacrificed in this county for the purpose of giving me this job and securing my \$2,000?'

"Didn't Marron engineer the scheme?'

"Didn't Field and Burkhardt make friends with Marron and fall into line?'

"What would have become of the people's party ticket if it hadn't been for this?'

"Didn't you make a trip to Santa Fe and fix Ruppe and Sulzer so that when this bill for the reduction of salaries came up they sold me out and voted for it?'

"Grunsfeld was sold out too, wasn't he, in just the same way?'

"Didn't this bill simply cut our salaries and leave the rest of them alone? I intend to have all I can make out of this office if I have to go into court to get it.'

"Then Danny caught his breath and said:

"Do you, A REFORMER, intend to tell me, a reformer, that you gave \$2,000 to the campaign fund to corrupt the people's vote?'

"Yes," answered Beaven, "and you know I did it too. You got some of the money."

"Further deponent saith not."

## THE GREAT GROWTH OF THE UNITED STATES.

The gigantic growth of the United States since the Civil War is not thoroughly understood by people generally. The figures are too tremendous to be really grasped by the average man of business who has about all he can do to attend to his own affairs and once in a while dabble in politics or take a vacation. If the average citizen could or would take time to read statistics describing this enormous advance even then the array of figures would astound and non plus him as his mind would scarcely grasp their immensity and magnitude. Commenting on the subject the Pueblo Chieftain remarks that the capitalization of corporations in the United States and Canada, is fixed at \$30,000,000,000, of which \$33,000,000,000 belong to the United States, according to Moody's manual for 1907. This immense total is divided into four divi-

sions—steam railroads, public utilities, industrials and mining. The railroads head the list with securities aggregating \$15,000,000,000 while mining is at the bottom of the roll with capital invested up to \$2,500,000,000.

In this compilation several items are omitted that would send the total up to much higher figures. Many of the smaller corporations are left out and bank capital is also omitted. Were all these included it is the belief of experts that the corporate securities of the United States would reach a grand total of at least \$40,000,000,000. Immense as this sum is, it is only about one-third of the country's total wealth. Computed on the rate of expansion shown by the government's figures for 1900 to 1904 the market value of the tangible property of the country would reach the immense aggregate of \$120,000,000,000 for 1907.

Probably a better idea of the immense growth in the wealth of the country can be secured by a comparison with other years. The corporations of the United States in 1907 control property amounting to almost as much as the total wealth of the entire country in the year Garfield was elected to the Presidency. When compared with the year of Lincoln's first campaign it is found that the 1907 corporate holdings amount to two and a quarter times the total wealth of the entire country. These comparisons are evidence of the giant strides that have been made during the past half century in developing the resources of this country.

## TO BECOME ACQUAINTED WITH NEW MEXICO.

The business men of El Paso are planning a trip throughout New Mexico with a view to visiting the principal cities and towns along the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe Railway and its tributary lines, the El Paso & Southwestern Railroad and connections and other roads in the Sunshine Territory. The idea is an excellent one and must redound to the benefit of all concerned, if carried into effect. The New Mexican is not exactly in love with El Paso and its strong Democratic citizenship from a political standpoint, but the New Mexican, endeavoring to be fair and just towards all, politics or no politics, cheerfully admits that for enterprise, go-ahead-spirit, vim and modern progress the Pass City takes the cake in this section.

This newspaper therefore urges the El Paso business men to organize this excursion and become acquainted. The El Paso Herald, a remarkably good newspaper, enterprising, progressive and straightforward, in a recent editorial, urges this course, and the New Mexican takes pleasure in reproducing the editorial with much approval and favor. The Herald says: "When the El Paso business men, 100 strong, start out in the second week of October to tour New Mexico, they will go not so much to extend El Paso's trade as to learn something about the country they live in. Lamentable ignorance prevails about the New Mexico country on which we depend commercially to a considerable extent. It is time our people were getting acquainted with their neighbors, and finding out something about the wonderful progress of the last few years."

"It is hoped that the October trip will include Silver City and Deming, as well as the Pecos Valley country and some of the Rock Island territory. Few El Pasoans often get off the main lines of travel, and our eyes need to be opened to our own possibilities as shown by what the smaller towns have already accomplished. In some matters of city improvement we have much to learn from our neighbors."

"Let business men begin to plan now for the October trip, so that not less than 100 heads of firms can go."

## A WORD TO DISTRICT ATTORNEYS

Danny Macpherson and his lying sneak of a correspondent in this city will get their deserts, never fear. It is a long lane that has no turn and the slanders and libels upon prominent Republicans, citizens and officials will come home in due course of time and in a manner that will teach these fellows lessons which they evidently need and that very much. In the meantime it is pertinent to ask why the several district attorneys of the Territory who are sworn to see to the faithful execution of the laws and to present all infractions of the laws before grand juries have carefully and studiously neglected so to do in cases of criminal libel although the records of the counties show that they have drawn their salaries and fees with great regularity. There is a stringent law against libel upon the New Mexico statute books and it is

well known to decent citizens that the requirements of this law have been violated for a year past and especially during the fake reform administration of Hagerman, with impunity, with recklessness and with malice prepense. The New Mexican calls the attention of these honorable gentlemen and sworn officers of the Territory to these infractions and that especially in the counties of Bernalillo, Santa Fe, Chaves and Eddy. If the present libel law is not sufficiently stringent to bring well known and constant offenders to justice then the district attorneys ought to proceed under the common law which certainly is more strict than the present statute. It is high time that this dirty, cowardly and dishonest course of a few libelling and slandering yellow sheets in New Mexico were brought to a close. The district attorneys know this better than anyone else. If they will not proceed, why not? The people would like to know.

## YES, THE GAME IS UP.

The political situation in the Sunshine Territory is properly and timely portrayed in the following editorial item by the Deming Graphic, which paper evidently knows whereof it speaks. The Graphic holds:

"The Albuquerque Journal is tearing its hair over the removal of Trelford as it did over the kind message Hagerman received to quit. In both cases there were good reasons for action. Hagerman, it was proven, was incompetent, and Trelford has been shown up as a man of brutal, cruel instincts, as unfit for the position of superintendent of the penitentiary as a Fiji Islander. The removal of these two gentlemen has been an uplifting step toward cleaner and better government in New Mexico, and as a result the inconsistency of the Journal with its great battle cry of down with the grafters and the bootlickers is highly amusing to say the least."

"What reform is being brought about in the Republican party today is being done by the true and tried leaders, who are honestly and fairly trying to get the Republican party in New Mexico back on the firm footing and in the honorable position it enjoyed before its disruption by poor misguided Herbert."

"Probably the Journal realizes the game is up and its wallings and gnashing of teeth are but the signal that it can't hold the Bureau of Immigration job more than a fortnight longer."

## ANOTHER APPROVAL.

The Silver City Enterprise, published at the prosperous capital of Grant County, and a decent and progressive paper, has joined the many newspapers which have approved the action of Acting Governor Reynolds, in the removal of Trelford from the important position of superintendent of the Territorial penitentiary. The Enterprise remarks on the case:

"Superintendent Arthur Trelford who for the last year has been superintendent of the New Mexico penitentiary, was on Saturday removed by Acting Governor Reynolds, on charges of cruelty and inhuman treatment to the convicts. The charges were borne out by the facts submitted at the hearing and in view of these facts the Governor had no alternative. Trelford is an importation from the Fort Leavenworth federal prison and his appointment was resented at the time by the majority of New Mexico people who believed there were just as good and capable men in New Mexico who could run the penitentiary as there were in Kansas. In view of later developments, their belief was only too true. Mr. Trelford's successor is a New Mexico product who has served four terms as sheriff of Colfax County and is spoken of as one of the bravest, most humane, and highest minded officers in the Territory."

## "INADVERTENTLY" A GOOD WORD.

"Inadvertently" placing an important public document among one's private papers after leaving high office might be considered all right by fake reformers and yellow sheets in their pay, but plain and decent people have the right to view the matter differently and what is more they are doing it. Before long it will be made public who paid for the 15,000 copies of Export McMahon's cooked up and fixed report on penitentiary financial matters under H. O. Bursum as superintendent. Everybody who knows anything at all knows that the Albuquerque Morning Coyote Journal and the gang behind it were paid well for their dirty work in publishing the report and sending thousands of copies of the same broadcast over the Territory, ostensibly in the cause of good government, purity and reform, in reality to injure and destroy the reputation and standing, financial, political and personal, of an honorable man and square official. All in due course of time.

The records of the Territorial penitentiary show that during the fourteen months of the mismanagement of that institution by the Kansas appointee of a fake reform administration no less than seventeen convicts escaped and that most of them were never successfully administering a prison captured. This may be called efficiency, close attention to duty and by the fake reformers and the Hagerman adherents but the "plain people" those who believe in law and order in decency and proper administration of official trusts will call it something else, namely, inefficiency, sham, fraud and misfeasance in office.

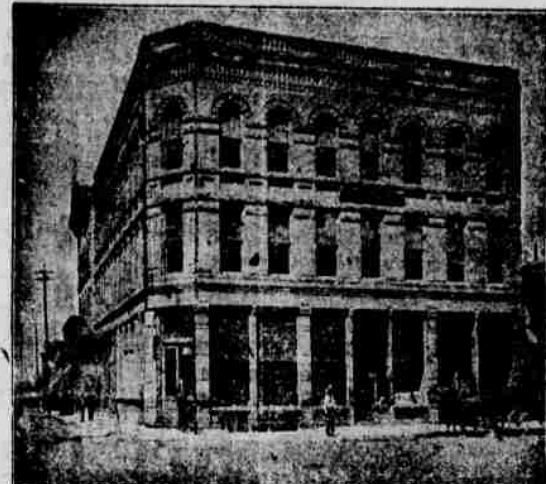

A few days after her departure for the far north a telegram was received in Gallup announcing the sudden death of her husband and it is not thought that Mrs. Penn will learn of the sad bereavement until she reaches home. It is feared the shock may prove fatal as she is not in very good health.

The Board of County Commissioners of Torrance County, acting under a law recently enacted authorizing the board to appoint one pupil from that county to a free scholarship in any Territorial Educational Institution, at its meeting last week appointed Acasio Eduardo Gallegos. The young man is the son of Acasio Gallegos of Torreon and last year attended the Las Vegas High School. He will attend the Territorial University at Albuquerque.

Mrs. Charlton and two daughters, Madge and Alice, narrowly escaped death in a runaway accident at Clayton on the Fourth. While driving along the street a small bow threw a bunch of firecrackers under the horse they were driving which so frightened the animal that it plunged to one side, upsetting the rig and throwing the occupants out. While all received painful injuries, no serious results are expected. The buggy was completely demolished. The victims were the family of Dr. Charlton and were to have left the following day for a journey in California.

One of the most daring robberies in the history of Eddy County took place at Carlsbad last week when the safe in the saloon of Sol Schoonover was robbed of \$1,320. The money was in cash, \$1,100 belonging to J. N. Hewitt, who conducted the gambling in the saloon and \$220 to Schoonover the owner of the saloon. The combination on the safe was worked and the saloon was entered by means of a skeleton key. Sheriff Christopher and the local police are at work on the case and it is said that the officers have a good clew which may result in a sensational arrest. None of the money has so far been recovered.

Hubbell Son & Company and for the years 1900 to 1906 inclusive, against Robert W. Spier; which said back assessments for said years upon coupons of bonds of the County of Santa Fe in judgments were made by the assessor according to law; were taken up and considered, and the act of said assessor in making said assessments was on motion unanimously approved by the board.

In order that the said parties so as-

sessed might have opportunity at the July session of this board as a Board of Equalization to object to the valuations so assessed, if they so desire, as well as to object to the assessments—FIVE

That said A. B. Renehan, as attorney for the board, providing the district attorney is disqualified, perfect appeal in said cause of S. S. Beaty, relator to the Supreme Court of New Mexico, with all convenient speed.

To these ends the said A. B. Renehan is hereby employed by the said board.

### WEEKLY WEATHER BULLETIN

For the Week Ending Monday, July 8, 1907.

Santa Fe, N. M.  
The weather of the past week has been unusually warm in the southern counties, especially during the fore part. In northern counties it was comparatively much cooler, with unseasonably cool nights. The sunshine was about the average for this part of the season, the sky being almost cloudless during the first part of the week, but generally cloudy and threatening during the latter part, with almost daily thunderstorms in the northern districts. The rainfall was very light, practically inappreciable, over the plains and in scattered localities the drouth is beginning to be seriously felt. Conditions are much more favorable in and near the mountains. Notwithstanding the frequent rains in the mountains the flow of streams is decreasing somewhat, but there is no complaint of an insufficiency of water for irrigation purposes.

The following notes, selected from the reports received this week, will give the conditions more in detail:

Albert, Union Co.—H. M. Hanson—The weather continues dry and hot, and rain is badly needed. Vegetation is wilted. It was unusually warm on the 29th, with hot, dry winds; the temperature reached 103. There have been showers in the vicinity, but only a trace of rain at the station. The lowest temperature was 60 on the 2d and 4th.

Bloomfield, San Juan Co.—Fred LeClerc—The weather has been warm and dry during the week, the highest temperature, 101 on the 3d, breaking the record at this station. The rivers are still high but are beginning to decrease. The lowest temperature was 44 on the 2d.

Cambray, Luna Co.—F. S. Case—The weather has been hot and dry. The highest temperature was 108 on the 2d; lowest, 70 on the 4th.

Carlsbad, Eddy Co.—Raymond DePue—This has been a very warm week, the mean maximum temperature being over 101 degrees. The hottest day was Saturday the 29th, when the thermometer reached 110. The lowest temperature was 60 on the 4th.

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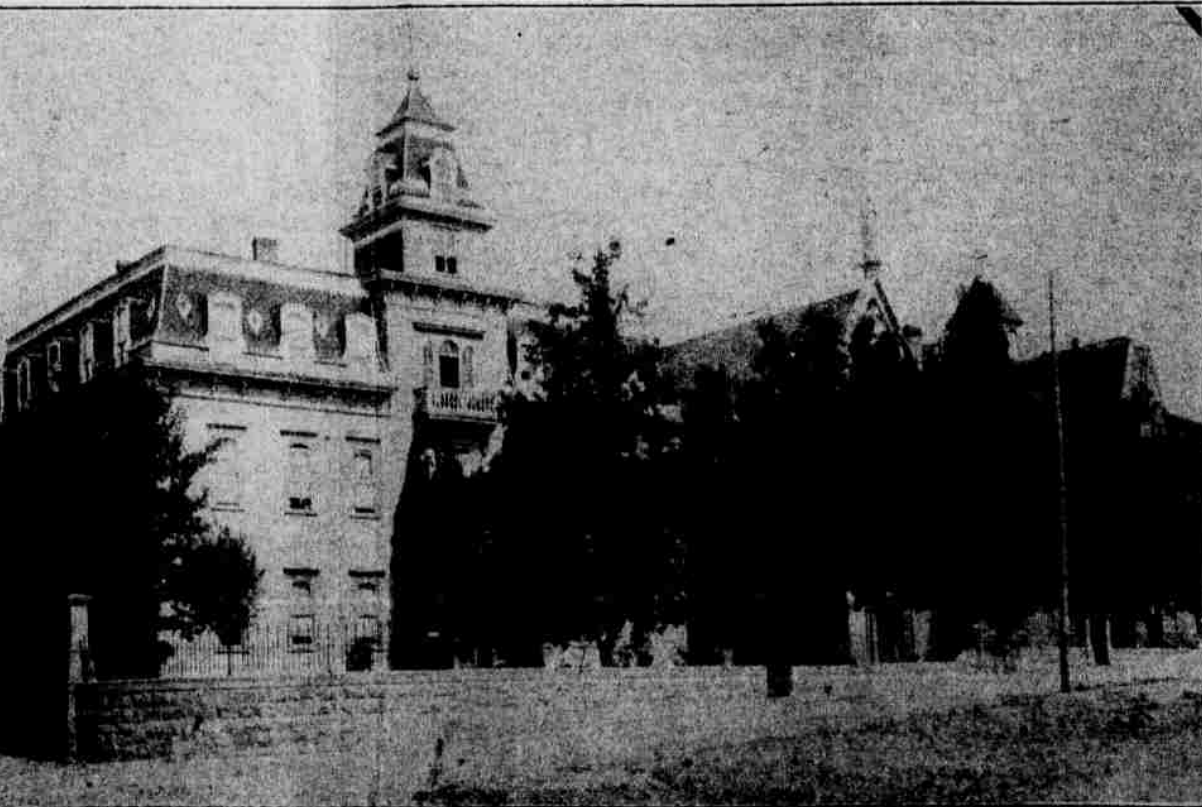
