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FIGHT OVER RIGHT-OF-WAY

Railroad Forces in Alaska in Bloody Battle

ONE DEAD, OTHERS WOUNDED

Trouble Occurs Near Valdez ---Lynching May Follow Capture of Murderers.

Portland, Sept. 26.—A cablegram to the Oregonian from Valdez, Alaska, gives meager details of a bloody battle yesterday morning in Keystone Canon, fifteen miles from Valdez, between forces of the Copper River and Northwestern and the Alaska Home Railroad Companies in contention over the right of way. It is said one man was killed and three others may die of their wounds.

The Copper River Railroad force was headed by Edward Hassey, ex-U. S. marshal for Alaska. Hassey hailed the Home railroad surveyors and said his men would shoot if they advanced a foot further in the canon. The surveyors continued to work. The cablegram says they were shot at from ambush and had no chance to fight or escape.

Deputy United States marshals are today scouring the woods for the men who did the shooting. Valdez citizens talk of summary justice should the guilty ones be captured.

RAPID PROGRESS IN BORAH CASE

Tedious Work of Identifying Documentary Evidence Completed—Sensational Developments Expected

Boise, Sept. 26.—Having accomplished much of the tedious work of identifying and placing on record the papers in about half a hundred alleged fraudulent claims filed on timber lands in the interest of the Barber Lumber company, the government attorneys in charge of the prosecution of United States Senator William E. Borah who acted as attorney for the company, began today to unfold in narrative form the details of the alleged conspiracy which is said to have begun in 1899 and to have continued in the filing in 1900 of the last of the 108 deeds to the lumber corporation.

Witnesses who are willing to confess to making false affidavits when taking out timber claims will have largely to do with the presentation of the government's case. In the opening statement to the jury M. C. Burch announced that the government would offer as one of its principal witnesses, George S. Long, who, it is alleged, acted as a "dummy trustee" to receive title to the claims from the "dummy" entrymen and transfer the property later to the Barber Lumber Company, a Wisconsin corporation. Former Governor Frank Steunenberg is named as the central figure in the government's case.

DENIES ITS COAL RATES ARE UNFAIR

Union Pacific Railroad Files Answer to Suit Filed By Nebraska Railway Commission.

Lincoln, Neb., Sept. 26.—In answering the complaint of the Nebraska State Railway Commission today before the Interstate Commerce Commission against the rate on coal shipments from the West, the Union Pacific railroad denied that the rates on its lines from Rock Springs and Havana, Wyoming, are unexceptionable and unjust and alleged that each and all these rates are, under all conditions and circumstances surrounding the said shipments, just, reasonable and lawful and not excessive, not exorbitant and not in violation of the act to regulate interstate commerce or amendatory acts. The Nebraska commission complained of a blanket rate of \$4.50 from Rock Springs and of \$3.50 from Havana.

CHOLERA EPIDEMIC SPREADS IN JAPAN

Fifteen Hundred Cases at Present in Empire—Heroic Measures to Eradicate Plague.

Tokio, Sept. 26.—Four cases of cholera are reported at Yokohama and several other suspected cases are under observation. A total of 1,500 cases of cholera throughout Japan are reported up to today and the government is taking vigorous steps to eradicate the disease.

SECURES ANOTHER BATCH OF PENSIONS

Delegate W. H. Andrews Reports Allowance of Fourteen Additional Claims of New Mexico Veterans.

A few days ago the New Mexican published a list giving the names and addresses of twenty pensioners, veterans of the Civil War, or their widows, to whom pensions or increases of pensions had been granted since the tenth of the present month and whose cases had been pushed, expedited and finally approved to a great extent owing to the assiduous and careful attention given them by Delegate W. H. Andrews before the Commissioner of Pensions.

Herewith is published a list of fourteen other cases which have been allowed and approved during the last few days also owing to the careful attention and energetic action on the part of Delegate Andrews. Thirty-four cases upon which favorable action has been secured in a little over two weeks by the pension office is a pretty good record for a voteless delegate from the territory of New Mexico and it is very doubtful if the most influential senator or member of the house of representatives of the National Congress could do any better. Delegate Andrews is certainly entitled to great credit for his excellent work in the matter of securing pensions for New Mexico veterans and for seeing to it that the just claims of all such are promptly and properly adjudicated by the pension office. RICH STRIKE MADE IN SIERRA COUNTY

Bonanza Copper Find on East Side of Cabell Mountains—Prospectors Rushing to Scene.

This mountain range is located east of the Rio Grande and several extensive mining properties are located there. Many prospectors are going to the location of the new find. Some of the ore on the new strike runs thirty per cent in copper. This is surface ore and is believed to be the outcropping of a big ledge.

MORE FALSEHOODS ARE EXPOSED IN BURSUM CASE

Colorado Title and Trust Company Dared Not Submit Its Expert's Report

Filed Voluntary Stipulation—Hearing Fair and Through—Decision in Accordance With Law and Evidence.

Under the heading "Left-Handed Vindication," the Albuquerque Morning Journal of date September 25, published an editorial on the outcome of the case of Holm O. Bursum versus the Territory of New Mexico for adjudication and decision in the claims heretofore set up by the Hagerman fake reform administration and supported by the ex-parte report of an alleged expert accountant that Mr. Bursum had been guilty of embezzlement, malfeasance and misfeasance in the management of the so-called convict earnings' fund of the territorial penitentiary while superintendent of that institution for seven years. The editorial is intentionally and vindictively misleading in parts, absolutely untrue in other parts, and a dastardly and venomous attempt to besmirch Mr. Bursum and to keep him before the people as a defaulter and as a dishonest official. The editorial reads:

"First reports of the Bursum trial at Silver City gave the public to understand that the case went to trial on its merits, that the court had before it the Safford report, the report of the Colorado Title and Trust Company and the territory's bill of exceptions, drawn by Mr. McHarg, and signed by Attorney General Prichard. But the official record shows that when the case was reached in court the bill of exceptions had been overruled, the report of the Colorado company was excluded by stipulation, approved by the court, and which became part of the record, and that there was absolutely nothing before the court except the skeleton of the Safford report after all references to the Colorado report had been eliminated—and as the essential part of the Safford report consisted in the main of attempts to refute the findings of the Colorado report, there was practically nothing left for the court to pass upon except the bare and uncontested demand of Mr. Bursum for judgment against the territory in the sum of four thousand, three hundred and thirty-three dollars and sixty-six cents, and as there was no objection to the claim on the part of the territory, the court could do nothing but grant it.

"All that is clear enough and requires no explanation, but why the territory should withdraw all the foundations upon which it could defend itself and its treasury, and allow judgment to go against it by default, is one of those abstruse legal problems which the Morning Journal, not being up in the intricacies of the law, does not attempt to explain—especially in view of the fact that the attorney for the Colorado Title and Trust Company has said in a published interview that he is prepared to prove the correctness of the report made by his company, in any proper proceedings. But no doubt all this will be made clear in due time, so that the public may understand it."

The Facts in the Case.

First, "the first reports of the Bursum trial at Silver City gave the public to understand that the case went to trial on its merits," and so it did. Traveling Auditor Safford was on the stand for over three hours, and was carefully and thoroughly examined, as to the subject matter of his report and the exceptions.

Second, the court had before it the report of Referee Safford which was very voluminous and contained about 175 typewritten pages of items in detail which did not appear in the cooked up report of the so-called expert, Francis P. McMahon, whose report was not presented because the representatives of the Colorado Title and Trust Company stipulated it should not be so, evidently fearing and believing that their clients would be injured were they to present the report in court and that it would be proven that many items in their report were erroneous, untrue, cooked up, fixed up and based upon false testimony, upon no foundation, and upon incorrect and careless examination of the records and vouchers of the convicts earnings' fund. They could have had their day in court had they dared to take it, but they dared not. They could have filed a petition for intervention or a motion as interested parties to get a status in court but they failed to do so, utterly so, and placed themselves out of court of their own volition. Now they appear in the columns of the Albuquerque Morning Journal whose columns are ready and open to them for a consid-

eration right or wrong, and how! "stop thief," "close the stable doors after the horses are stolen."

McHarg Did Not Draw Bill of Exceptions.

Third, the statement that Mr. McHarg drew the bill of exceptions is untrue. Attorney General Prichard prepared the bill of exceptions and then requested Mr. McHarg to furnish such items of exceptions as he desired to have appear in the bill and the record. Mr. McHarg furnished some exceptions, but on account of the very objectionable, unlaurelike and improper language contained therein, Attorney General Prichard declined to accept them, and struck out the objectionable language. Thus revised and placed in proper language, these exceptions furnished by Mr. McHarg were incorporated in the general bill of exceptions and allowed to go in the record. Then and there the then attorney general advised E. Peyton Gordon who represented Mr. McHarg in a conference with the attorney general that unless these modifications were accepted he would not sign their exceptions; that he would furnish his own exceptions, and they could take whatever course they thought proper. The exceptions furnished by Mr. McHarg did not go to the meat of the matter and in controversy, but were of a general nature which in some particulars would call for evidence to sustain them before the court which is a very unusual proceeding.

Fourth, the full report of Referee Safford consisting of over 200 pages and containing every detail of the receipts and expenditures of the convicts earnings' fund in question was before the court and this matter was gone into thoroughly by the court, and the judge was fully advised in the premises so that he could proceed and give judgment advisedly and in accordance with the evidence and the law in the case. The Colorado Title and Trust Company had voluntarily by stipulation asked not to be considered a party to or in the case and the report made by its alleged expert and most of it by a drunken and disreputable, unprincipled loafer, was not placed before the court at all, although the plaintiff's attorneys were perfectly willing to have this done. To people generally this action of the Colorado Title and Trust Company certainly indicates strongly that it was afraid to come before the court and have its report analyzed and examined no matter what its attorneys or backers may say or claim at this time. The fact remains that the company stipulated itself out of court and was glad to do so, wanted to do work and took every possible opportunity to do so. The motion to this end came from the company's attorney and not from the plaintiff. The plaintiff's attorney, H. M. Dougherty, was ready to show to the satisfaction of the court, the holowness, the falsity, the errors, and the cooked up character of its so-called expert's report.

Fifth, naturally the bill of exceptions was not sustained by the court because there was nothing tenable in it and it had to be over-ruled. It makes precious little difference what the Colorado Title and Trust Company or its attorney claim. Indeed it certainly appears and that very strongly that of their own volition they wanted nothing to do with the case like the flowers that bloom in the spring.

Sixth, the statement that the report of the referee was a skeleton one is another malicious and downright untruth. The report contained every item investigated by the referee and upon which proof was had, testimony adduced and on which the conclusion of the referee were based.

Seventh, the statement that the territory allowed judgment against itself by default is another malicious falsehood. The territory was defended and its interests carefully looked after by its attorney general, Judge Albert B. Fall, and the statement made by the Albuquerque Morning Journal is a disparagement upon the attorney general's legal ability and an impeachment of his official integrity, and professional honor.

Why and Wherefore Not Material.

TAKING EVIDENCE IN MURDER CASE

Henry Romero Is Allowed to Testify in Trial of Benito Chaves and Raimundo Ronquillo.

Territorial district court for Santa Fe county reconvened this morning at 9 o'clock, Judge John R. McFie presiding and Clerk Francis C. Wilson, at his desk. The territory was represented by O. A. Larrazola as special counsel.

Jose G. Griego was substituted yesterday afternoon on the regular panel of the petit jury to fill the vacancy caused by the sudden illness of Policarpio Valencia, which interrupted the trial of the murder case of the territory versus Benito Chaves and Raimundo Ronquillo. The jury sitting in this case which was re-sworn yesterday afternoon consists of Alen Archuleta, Margarito Chaves, Bernardo Chaves, Teofilo Lopez, Encarnacion Salazar, Vidal Trujillo, Chas. Wheeler, Jr., Luis Moya, Secundino Griego, Doretto Sais, Pasquel Sais, and Jose G. Griego.

Considerable time was taken up today relative to the introduction of testimony by Henry Romero, who is one of the principal witnesses for the prosecution, and is now serving a term of life imprisonment in the territorial penitentiary for murder committed in Rio Arriba county. Romero was present at the time Rufus O. Tucker was killed in this city on the night of June 10, 1906, and whom the defendants in this case are charged with having murdered.

Attorney T. B. Catron who is counsel for the defendants objected to permitting Romero to give testimony on the ground that being a convict the latter's evidence was invalidated. He maintained that the law enacted by the recent legislature allowing convicts to testify did not affect Romero. However, the court allowed Romero to go on the stand and Mr. Catron could attack the credibility of the witness.

Romero's examination consumed an hour or more. He related the circumstances connected with the tragedy which occurred at a "baile," Chaves, he said, struck Tucker a blow with his fist which knocked Tucker down and then Chaves and Ronquillo kicked the prostrate man repeatedly. Upon cross examination, witness said that the dead man was intoxicated at the time and was ejected from the dance hall, but returned almost immediately.

Romero was called upon by the counsel for the prosecution to describe in detail the manner in which Tucker was lying when it is alleged he was kicked and beaten to death by Chaves and Ronquillo. William Tucker, a brother of the deceased, volunteered as a subject in showing to the jury the position in which his brother was lying after being knocked down.

Vicente Escudero, who had testified yesterday morning before Juror Valencia became sick and had to be excused was recalled yesterday afternoon after the jury had been re-impaneled and told again what he knew of the tragedy. He was present at the dance and saw the fatal affair. He claimed to have seen Tucker knocked down and kicked. Florantina Lobato who was examined this morning before Romero told a story which practically corroborated that of Escudero. She said she saw Chaves kicking at Tucker while the latter was lying down but did not know if he actually kicked Tucker.

Dr. David Knapp who held a post mortem examination over the remains of Tucker on the witness stand this afternoon said that in his opinion Tucker's death was caused by an internal hemorrhage in the left plural cavity, which was found during the autopsy to be filled with blood. Two of the ribs on the left, side he said, were fractured and there were bruises on the body.

At 3:30 o'clock this afternoon the prosecution rested its case and the examining of witnesses for the defense was begun.

FATHER FREED SON IS HELD

Man Arrested at Phoenix on Charge of Robbing Mexican Malls, Released But His Boy Must Answer Crime.

Phoenix, Ariz., Sept. 26.—G. G. Levier, who was held here for extradition on complaint of the Mexican government which charged him with larceny of two checks from the Mexican mails, was discharged on motion of United States Attorney Alexander, who caused the warrant to be issued on which Levier was jailed last July.

Levier's son, Fred G. Levier, will be tried at Tucson on an identical charge of larceny. Both father and son claim to be innocent of the crime charged and assert their arrest is only a ruse to get them across the border into Mexico where they would be prosecuted on political charges.

NORTH DAKOTA AND DELAWARE NAME NEW WARSHIPS.

VOLIVA DESERTS ZION CITY

Dowie's Successor Gives Up Fight There

TO FOUND NEW COLONY

Not to Be Located in New Mexico, However,—Loses Options on Land Here.

Chicago, Sept. 26.—Wilbur Glenn Voliva, who successfully grasped the reins of government of Zion City from the hands of John Alexander Dowie and expected to reign in his stead after the death of Dowie, last night announced to a thousand of his followers in that city torn by factions, that he had given up the fight there.

Voliva said he had lost the options upon land, near Las Vegas, New Mexico, where he expected to found a new colony, but that he would buy property adjacent to Zion City and found a colony there. No explanation how he lost the New Mexico options was vouchsafed by Voliva. It is generally understood that he failed to receive the financial backing he had expected.

Voliva said he had received formal notice from John C. Haley, receiver of Zion City, to vacate the premises he used as offices and for a publication plant. Voliva branded his treatment by the receiver as persecution.

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LIPTON TO CONTEST AT ALL HAZARDS

Has No Thought of Not Sending a Yacht to Sandy Hook—Disappointed But Not Discouraged.

London, Sept. 26.—Sir Thomas Lipton, although bitterly disappointed at the failure of the New York Yacht club to accept his recent challenge, today authorized the Associated Press to announce that he has prepared to challenge with a ninety-foot boat under the New York Yacht Club rules.

Sir Thomas Lipton has not given up hope of sending a yacht to Sandy Hook in 1908. He has already telegraphed Willie Fife, his designer, to come to London for a consultation. Sir Thomas is emphatic in declaring he would not challenge under the old rule as no designer of note in Great Britain is willing to design a boat similar to the previous Shamrocks and the danger of sailing such freaks across the Atlantic is so great that Sir Thomas is unwilling to risk any lives in such a venture. He said he had been led to believe if he challenged under the "universal rule" for races in the United States there was every possibility of the challenge being favorably received. Hence his disappointment at the refusal of the New York Yacht Club to accept his original challenge.

GIBSON AND INGRAM ARE ACQUITTED

Grant County Cattleman Found Not Guilty of Murder of Frank Watson, Killed in Feud.

Silver City, N. M., Sept. 26.—The jury in the case of William Gibson and John Ingram, charged with the murder of Frank Watson, returned a verdict of not guilty late yesterday afternoon.

This was one of the longest murder cases tried in Grant county for many years and has been in progress for the past nine days. The case attracted attention throughout southern New Mexico.

The killing occurred while a number of cattlemen were rounding up some hogs and the bulk of the testimony was that deceased rode up to a point near where the work was in progress and that when Gibson and Ingram went towards him, having heard that he had threatened them, he drew his gun and the shooting then commenced.

EXPLOSION WRECKS FLORAL CONSERVATORY.

Pleasant Hill, Mo., Sept. 26.—A boiler exploded early today in the conservatories of George M. Kellogg, a florist, three miles from here, partly destroyed the building. The damage will reach \$75,000. These conservatories are among the largest in the middle west.

THREE CUBAN GENERALS TAKEN INTO CUSTODY.

Havana, Sept. 26.—The secret police today arrested General Maase Parra, General Juan Ducassat, and General Laramit charged with conspiring against the public order.

THE COLORADO TITLE AND TRUST COMPANY STIPULATION

The Albuquerque Citizen which is on the ground and knows all the parties interested very well takes the right view in the Bursum case in its comments on the course of the Albuquerque morning sheet and an attorney of the Colorado Title and Trust Company in endeavoring to mislead people who happen to be readers of the Albuquerque morning sheet by fake assertions and misrepresentations of the proceedings of the court on Friday and Saturday last in which judgment was given Mr. Bursum for \$4,333.66 and in which the report of Referee Safford establishing conclusively that the convicts' earnings fund of the territorial penitentiary was honestly and faithfully administered was approved by the court and the case closed in every particular in favor of Mr. Bursum.

The slimy gyrations and libelous editorials and news comment of the Albuquerque morning sheet and the stand taken by the Colorado company's attorney are placed before the people in their true light and as they should be. In view of the prominence of Mr. Bursum in the political and business life of this territory and in order that the people might be fully informed, the New Mexican has given the case a very thorough airing and much space of late. This must be continued until the dirty conspiracy against Mr. Bursum is shattered entirely and thoroughly demolished. This is about the case, and hence this disgraceful chapter in New Mexico's history will soon be closed. The following editorial from the Citizen is pointed and certainly interesting to the people. The paper says that it is with considerable interest that the confiding public read in the morning paper today that a certain Albuquerque attorney, who represented the Colorado company in the Bursum suit in Silver City, admitted that he had secured a meaningless sort of a compromise for his client and therefore sat silent, although declaring that he possessed the evidence to show that the report of Referee Safford was not true and that H. O. Bursum was guilty of the misappropriation of prison funds. This statement is particularly interesting in view of the fact that this said attorney was one of the moving spirits and leading lights in the recent so-called reform and good government regime.

This attorney states through the columns of the morning paper that he was prepared to go into court and disprove the statements of Referee Safford and H. O. Bursum.

But despite the fact that the attorney general of New Mexico was present and was forced to admit that he had been unable to find any evidence against the truth of Mr. Safford's report, this attorney and advocate of good government and reform, sat stolidly in the court room and heard Mr. Bursum secure a judgment against the territory for \$4,333.66, knowing, according to his own statement that he could prove that the report of Referee Safford was untrue and that such a judgment was an absolute wrong to the territory and to the people of New Mexico who pay the bills.

Does this attorney mean to admit that he is an accessory to the fact? Does he mean to say that he sat there in court knowing Mr. Bursum guilty and that he forgot his long lost principles of good government and reform and would not lift his voice in protest?

Certainly the interview of that said attorney could not be otherwise construed.

Now The Citizen as stated yesterday does not believe that Mr. Bursum is or ever was guilty of the charge against him. The Citizen does not believe for one minute that this attorney could have proven that Mr. Bursum was guilty. The Citizen stated yesterday that the men who so actively prosecuted Mr. Bursum when he was to a certain extent unable to defend himself, were too craven to appear in open court, and attempt to prove their assertions.

That this attorney secured a half hearted sort of a compromise for his client to cover a possible damage suit, does not in the least exonerate the said attorney from giving to the proper territorial officials such evidence as he might have in his possession. It does not explain why he sat silent in that court room when a judgment was being rendered against the territory, and did not tell what he knew if he knew anything at all about the case.

The versatile attorney should explain how he can harmonize good gov-

ernment and reform with compromising a case out of court when he had in his possession the evidence needed to protect the people from an injustice. The truth of the matter is that Mr. Bursum's case was irrefutable and the so-called expert's report prepared for the late boy governor did not stand an impartial examination. Mr. Bursum received simple justice at the hands of a court and he does not need protection from his friends—nor his enemies either.

THE PAPER TRUST SHOULD BE FOUGHT.

The El Paso Herald makes a very timely and good suggestion which should be followed promptly by the newspapers of the state of Texas. It is that a co-operative paper mill should be established to supply the newspapers in the Lone Star state with printing paper and also that more of the necessities of consumption by the people be manufactured and prepared at home.

The paper trust is one of the worst despotic and meanest of the many trusts that oppress the people of this country and rob the plain people unmercifully and constantly. A few months ago it was announced that the attorney general of the United States had succeeded in "busting" the paper trust. Now it appears that a more gigantic, more unscrupulous and more thieving trust is to be organized which in its operations will be especially harmful to the newspapers. The plan of the Herald if adopted will certainly help the Texas newspapers but would not do much good for New Mexico on account of the roundabout and long haul to reach the territory, either by the way of Trinidad or by the way of Dalhart and the El Paso and Southwestern Railroad or via El Paso. The Herald's opinions are well worth attention, the paper says:

"The white paper market situation throughout the United States has become so serious that the associations of newspaper publishers are holding meetings and trying hard to devise some remedy. The supply is short, and prices a third higher than they were a few months ago. All the western mills have been absorbed, or are about to be absorbed, in a gigantic combination, which, it is said, will result in further price increases.

"Paper for southern consumers comes mainly from Maine and northern New York, while western and southwestern consumers are more apt to receive their paper from Wisconsin. In either event, the freight rates are tremendous for the long haul, and as the supply must not fail, in the case of a newspaper, it is necessary to keep several months' supply on hand.

"In Texas, Louisiana, and Arkansas there is an abundance of paper pulp material. What is the reason the Texas dailies cannot organize a co-operative paper mill, that will relieve the situation, if it cannot supply the whole demand? We might as well save the first cost and the freight to the state.

"The same argument applies to nearly everything El Pasoans and Texans consume. Wherever possible, the raw materials should be made up at home into useful articles. Our food products, much of our house fittings and furnishings, many articles of clothing, bagging and sack cloth, and innumerable articles of staple demand might be made much nearer home than they are now, and great saving effected in the freights both ways.

"The co-operative paper mill would be a good object lesson in Texas industrial possibilities."

THE FORTY-SIXTH STATE.

It is not probable that President Roosevelt will withhold his approval of the constitution of the new state of Oklahoma, with all its faults and all its frailties, and therefore it is reasonable to suppose that Oklahoma will by the end of the year be the forty-sixth state in the Union. The constitution which the people of the coming new state have adopted is of their own making and they will have to abide by its good and bad provisions. The Brooklyn Standard Union, published in the far-off east and where they do not know very much about the Southwest, takes a rather sensible view of the situation in the coming new state. The Brooklyn Standard Union believes Oklahoma election figures will probably not be complete for many days, since seldom are so many complicated issues presented to an electorate as were propounded for decision there. It appears, however, that the

Territory has voted for statehood—gerrymander and doctrinaire Constitution and all; to extend Indian Territory liquor prohibition over Oklahoma, and to choose a Democratic governor, in accordance with the politics of the two Territories as revealed in the partisan choice of the late Constitutional Convention. The Republican candidate, however, appears to have made a surprisingly good run.

Should President Roosevelt find that the Constitution adopted conforms to the enabling act of Congress and provides a republican form of government, Oklahoma with its half-dozen electoral votes will participate in the next Presidential election. Upon its admission, the last square mile of soil acquired by Jefferson in the Louisiana purchase will be incorporated into the sisterhood of states. It will be the first state, since Florida, and Texas in 1845, to be admitted out of that portion of the Union which the Missouri Compromise of 1820 fixed as the domain of slavery.

The first constitution contains enough of bad to have made it worthy of rejection, but also some good. If it is held valid, Oklahoma will not only be far ahead of all Southern states in the regulation of child labor, but also in principle will excel many Northern states. Its drastic anti-corruption provisions are seed for the sprouting of a bumper crop of law suits, and under its elaborate direct-voting schemes it may go the farthest toward abolishing representative government, and may out-Kansas the best standing records for political freakism.

"New Mexico is getting ready to ask admission into the Union as the State of New Mexico; and it is believed with the assistance of our Delegate Hon. W. H. Andrews, that the door this time will be opened unto us. New Mexico has the population, the wealth and all the necessary qualifications, and why should she not be admitted?" —Las Cruces Citizen.

There are no good substantial reasons whatsoever why New Mexico should not be admitted into the sisterhood of states during the coming year. A strong effort will be made for the passage of an enabling act during the 60th Congress by Delegate Andrews supported by Governor Curry and a vast majority of the people of New Mexico.

It seems that there is to be no change in the governorship of Arizona and that Governor Joseph H. Kibbey will serve out his term of office. It is reasonable to suppose that the report is true. Governor Kibbey has made a good executive and as the joint statehood agitation is settled in the sister territory there appears to be no good reason for making a change in the gubernatorial office in Arizona. This condition is absolutely the reverse from the one which existed in New Mexico during the Hagerman regime of imbecility. Then and there the public interests, the good of the commonwealth and a majority of the people especially the Republicans desired a change and it came.

"The man who thinks a constitution can be prepared in a few days would no doubt make his appearance in the convention with a ready to wear constitution in his pocket." —Las Vegas Optic.

"The probabilities are that this would be an improvement on the constitution adopted by many people after long time spent in its preparation, in Oklahoma." —Lordsburg Western Liberal.

The possibilities would change into fact. The delegates to the New Mexico constitutional convention now elected would not need to half try and then do much better than the Oklahoma delegates.

Six years ago the Spanish War Claims Commission was organized for a term of two years. It is, however, still doing business, although mighty little of it and its members are drawing pay with the usual regularity and precision exhibited by other federal officials. However, there is trouble. Ex-Senator William E. Chandler, chairman of the commission has resigned because he does not like one of its members and because the president will not remove this man from office. The chances now are that the commission will not last much longer as Mr. Chandler would not have resigned a long tenure of office.

President Roosevelt is to hunt bear in the swamps of Louisiana. The New Mexican, however, does not understand how the president can do so when he could easily come to the Pecos national forest east and north of this city, kill bear, mountain lions and lynx as well as big mountain wolves to his heart's content and enjoy New Mexico's magnificent climate, grand atmosphere, salubrious, tonic and ozone atmosphere and its beautiful and attractive mountain scenery. Even with President Roosevelt there is no accounting for tastes.

Strange to say despite the assertion that the Colorado Title and Trust Company had plenty of evidence to prove conclusively that its report in the Bursum case on the management of the convicts' earnings fund during the Bursum administration was correct and true the people of the Territory favored and believed Bursum's side of the matter. This is a case in which the people are not fooled.

The baby ex-governor is learning and probably now believes "that he who laughs last laughs best."

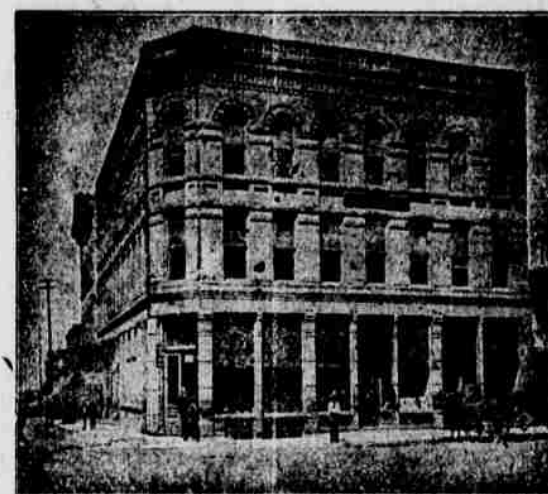

PUTTING DOWN EXPERIMENT WELLS

Agricultural College After More Water For Irrigation—Work to Begin on New Y. M. C. A. Building

Special Correspondence.

Las Cruces, N. M., Sept. 26.—The College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts, the territorial institution located at this place, is putting down a number of experimental wells for irrigation purposes on the Mesa, east of the college buildings. The first of the wells is now down 71 feet and is to be drilled to a depth of fifty feet more. The well is put down to the water level and cased with cement and a twelve-inch pipe will be put down the rest of the way. At a depth of seventy feet the Rio Grande water level is reached. Dr. O. H. Brown is the contractor who is sinking the well.

The new college Y. M. C. A. building will be commenced at the Agricultural College the first of next week. The building is to cost \$15,000 and is to be paid for entirely by private subscription. It will be the first college Y. M. C. A. building west of Kansas City. The Board of Regents have leased the association grounds for the building just outside the campus.

The real estate firm of Sattly and Baker have purchased a tract of 500 acres of land north of town about two miles and are dividing the land into 15-acre tracts. They will build houses on the land and sell these on the installment plan.

The Mesilla Valley Land company, is developing a tract of seven hundred acres of land just across the river from Mesilla Park. The company will take water out of the Rio Grande river for the irrigation of the land.

The Rev. T. L. Lalancie, pastor of the M. E. church south, left today for Alamogordo, where he goes to attend the meeting of the conference of his church.

Mrs. Katherine Moore left the last of this week for a visit of two months to her old home in Kentucky.

The new public school building at Mesilla Park is completed. The building is very much needed for additional room for the rapidly increasing school enrollment.

W. E. Baker, manager of the Las Cruces Telephone company, is making some extensive improvements on the plant. The office will be enlarged and a cable will be put in from the central to all the main leads.

WILLARD TOWNSITE CASE ADJUSTED

Members of Company Meet Requirements of Land Commissioner and Expect Patent in Few Days.

A special dispatch from Willard to the Albuquerque Evening Citizen says:

"A member of the Willard Townsite company stated today that the confirmatory power of attorney requested by the United States land commissioner at Washington before he would validate the Sioux Script, on which the title to the townsite of Willard rests, had been secured and was not en route to Washington.

"It is expected that within a few days from its receipt there, the patent to the land at Willard will be issued in favor of the Willard Townsite company and further difficulty will be adjusted.

"The men who jumped town lots in the expectation of holding them have decided that they have no rights in the matter and are leaving the lots. A few cheap lots near the outskirts of the town are occupied by squatters, but there will be little difficulty in settling with them as soon as the patent is issued.

"The routine of the land office at Washington has been responsible for considerable delay in securing the patents but the matter has now been finally adjusted, according to the townsite officials, who say that they have fully complied with all the requirements of the land commissioner. Willard is growing rapidly and many new people are coming in. A number of homes are being built and the business done by the local merchants has never been better at this season of the year."

KANSAS CITY LIVE STOCK

Big Run of Cattle and an Extraordinary Demand Features of Last Week—Receipts 94,800 Head.

Special to the New Mexican.

Kansas City Stock Yards, Sept. 26.—A big run of cattle and an extraordinary demand were the features last week. Receipts were 94,800 head, including 14,400 calves, the biggest run ever known at this market, and the demand not only absorbed this great total, but the number held over at the end of the week was reduced 2,000 head, as compared with close of previous week. The market declined 10 to 25 cents during the week. Supply was 10,000 less than on last Monday, or 19,000 head, market strong to 10 higher, she stuff 5 to 15 higher. Purchases of stockers and feeders last week broke all previous records at Kansas City or at any other market in the world, a total of 1,350 car loads to country points in Missouri, Kansas, Illinois, Iowa and other states, in the order named. A great many country buyers are here and the limited supply makes a good market on country grades. Wyoming killers sold at \$45 here today, Colorado later at \$3.90 to \$4.25, panhandles around \$4.00, feeders at \$3.75 to \$4.65 stock steers, 3.35 to \$4.25, western cows, \$2.85 to \$3.45, panhandles and New Mexico, \$2.65 to \$3.10, calves, \$3.75 to \$6.00. The exceptional demand from all sources, together with the quick recovery of the market today on reduced supplies, indicates that October prices will likely be more attractive than present range, in view of reduced marketing likely to develop within the next week or two.

Sheep and lamb supplies last week were 41,000 head, market steady for the week on sheep, but lambs declined 10 to 15 cents late in the week. Supply today is 11,000 head, including a good share of country kinds, and the market steady. Western wethers and yearlings for killers bring \$5.40 to \$5.85, ewes \$5.25 to \$5.50, lambs, \$7.00 to \$7.40. There is a strong demand for feeding stuff, lambs at \$6.60 to \$6.85, yearlings \$5.45 to \$5.70, and extraordinary prices are being paid for breeding ewes, at \$5.35 to \$6.75. With country buyers taking nearly 50 per cent of the receipts, the market is likely to stand up under pretty liberal receipts.

Among the representative sales were the H. O. W. Cattle Company, of Logan, New Mexico, 404 cows at \$2.60, and J. P. Stone, of Portales, New Mexico, 98 cows at \$2.55.

**AROUSES IRE
OF OIL COUNSEL**

Frank B. Kellogg Representing Government in Standard Hearing, Scores a Point.

New York, Sept. 26.—The pipe line station of the National Transic Company, a Standard Oil corporation at Centerville, on the state line, Counsel Kellogg contends is a terminal station which was built in 1906 on the advice of John G. Milburn of the counsel for the company. Milburn is now representing the Standard Oil Company in the federal hearing now in progress in this city. It is contended by the government that the Centerville station was built as a nominal delivery point in 1906 to evade the Hepburn act, which provides that pipe line carriers shall submit schedules of tariff to their terminals. It is the government's view that the company's real terminal is Bayonne, New Jersey.

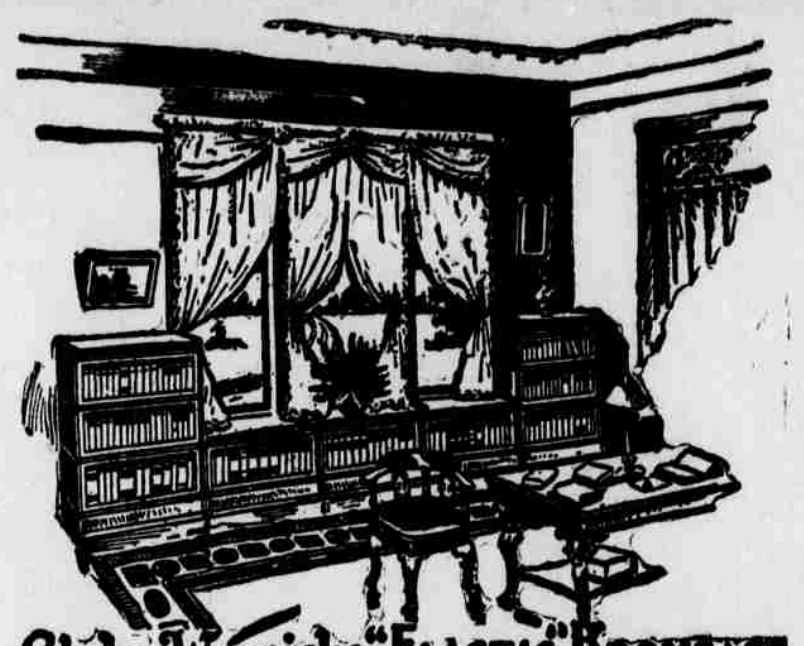
