Philadelphia, Oct. 23.—Three of the  
balloons that left St. Louis Monday  
afternoon passed over this city this  
morning. One was positively iden-  
tified as the German balloon Pommern,  
which was seen at Cleveland yester-  
day afternoon. Another was identified  
as the English balloon Lotus which  
passed over Wheeling, West Virginia,  
yesterday. A note dropped from the  
German balloon read:  
"Am 8,000 feet in the air and have  
traveled a thousand miles. Am try-  
ing to make Atlantic City."  
The third balloon was not identified.  
All were traveling in a northeasterly  
direction and unless they meet with  
an accident will land on the coast  
within a few hours.  
The balloons were seen by people  
in all parts of the city and created  
intense interest. In some places the  
crowd watching the balloons were so  
great that street car traffic was in-  
terfered with.  
Pommern Landed at Asbury Park,  
New Jersey.  
Asbury Park, N. J., Oct. 23.—The  
German balloon Pommern landed here  
about 9 a. m. today.  
Dusseldorf Descends Near Dover.  
Dover, Del., Oct. 23.—The German  
balloon Dusseldorf landed at Little  
Creek, three miles from this city at  
10 o'clock this morning.  
The St. Louis Alighted Near Baltimore.  
Baltimore, Oct. 23.—The American  
balloon St. Louis, with Hawley and  
Post aboard, landed about a mile south  
of Westminster, Maryland, at 6:40 a.  
m. today.  
The St. Louis could have remained  
in the air much longer but as the at-

fearing the balloon was approaching

TO THE RESCUE

Government Funds  
Save New York  
Banks

BIG FAILURE IN PITTSBURG

Westinghouse Concern Gces  
Under Receiver for  
Knickerbocker Co.

New York, Oct. 23.—A distinctly  
more favorable tone was evident in  
Wall Street at 2 o'clock this afternoon  
following the announcement that Sec-  
retary Cortelyou had made deposits  
of government funds in the various  
New York banks. The stock market  
has been holding better all day than  
was expected and the fact that the  
Trust Company of America had with-  
stood the rush of depositors to with-  
draw their money for four hours was  
an additional factor.  
Anxiety over the trust com-  
pany and banking situation  
continued to cloud the business  
horizon today, although the nervous-  
ness and alarm so noticeable yester-  
day were considerably lessened today  
by the presence of Secretary of the  
Treasury Cortelyou in this city and  
his promise to remain at the sub-treasury  
throughout the day. Secretary  
Cortelyou's statement which he made  
last night affirming the strong condi-  
tion of the national banks of this city  
had a good effect upon public sen-  
timent and served to relieve the ap-  
prehension of the business men that  
further curtailment of credits might  
hamper the financing of general mer-  
cantile affairs.  
Trust Company Requested Aid.  
The most unfavorable development  
of the night was the news that the  
Trust Company of America, one of the  
city's largest financial institutions,  
with deposits approximating fifty mil-  
lion dollars and total assets and li-  
abilities in excess of sixty millions, had  
requested the aid of the banks.  
This was followed by the announce-  
ment early today that Oakleigh  
Thorne, president of the Trust Com-  
pany of America, had sold a control-  
ling interest in the Central of Georgia  
Railroad, which he purchased jointly  
with Marsden J. Perry last July.  
Thorne declined to say to whom the  
road had been sold but denied that the  
sale was to the Rock Island interests.  
Big Institution Holds Up Under Run.  
A run on the Trust Company of  
America began this morning, over six  
hundred depositors crowding the of-  
fice of the trust company an hour be-  
fore the time for opening had arrived.  
It was stated that the company had  
twelve million of dollars in its vaults  
to begin the payment of depositors.  
A committee representing the banks  
of the city, began an exhaustive exam-  
ination of its books and securities this  
morning and it is stated if the result  
bears out the statements of its officers  
aid will be extended in whatever  
amount may be required.  
Receiver for Knickerbocker Trust  
Company.  
An immense crowd also surrounded  
the offices of the Knickerbocker Trust  
Company this morning in the hope  
that it would resume payments. The  
bankers do not regard the position of  
this company as very favorable and  
were inclined to permit it to go into  
liquidation.  
Acting State Superintendent of  
Banks Skinner, took possession of the  
Knickerbocker Trust Company just  
before noon on the advice of the at-  
torney general of the state.  
J. Pierpont Morgan practically as-  
sumed command in financial circles  
today, striving to bring order out of  
the present chaos and see what can  
be done to protect the large interests  
now in jeopardy. Up to now there  
has been no organization among the  
various trust company officers. Mor-  
gan and James Stillman, president of  
the National City Bank, are earnestly  
engaged in an effort to bring about a  
co-operation among those institutions.  
Secretary of the Treasury Cortel-  
you today made large deposits in the  
local banks. He is in close touch with  
the local situation and believes he will  
be able to cope with the situation. The  
amount deposited by the government  
could not be learned.  
Big Failure at Pittsburg.  
Pittsburg, Pa., Oct. 23.—The Pitts-  
burg Stock Exchange did not open  
this morning, members deeming it ad-  
visable that the Exchange remain  
closed temporarily owing to the de-  
moralized feeling in Westinghouse  
Electric. A meeting of the members  
was held and President R. C. Hall of  
the Exchange, issued the following  
statement:

COLONEL JAMES W. WILLSON.  
Superintendent New Mexico Military Institute Roswell, Elected Grand  
Master Free Masons of New Mexico.

Colonel James W. Willson is su-  
perintendent of the New Mexico Mil-  
itary Institute at Roswell, and one of  
the most prominent educators of the  
Territory. A native of Virginia, he  
was graduated from the Virginia Mil-  
itary Institute located at Lexington,  
that state, completing the course there  
with the class of 1894. He afterward  
went to West Point, Virginia, where  
he had charge of the military train-  
ing school until going to Roswell on  
the opening of the New Mexico Mil-  
itary Institute in 1898. He acted as  
commandant for three years and or-  
ganized the military department of  
the school. He is now serving his  
seventh year as its superintendent.  
The institution was opened with sixty-  
five students, a great many of whom  
were day students. Today the school  
is strictly a military institute, being  
the only one of its character in the  
Southwest. The school has now an  
enrollment of nearly two hundred ca-  
dets and is referred to by United  
States army officers as the "West  
Point of New Mexico." It has made  
steady and substantial progress under  
the superintendency of Colonel Will-  
son, whose thorough military train-  
ing well qualified him for the posi-  
tion, while his ability has been con-  
stantly augmented by experience.

SALE MADE IN LONDON

Five Brothers Now Practical-  
ly Without a Rival in  
Sawdust Arena.

New York, Oct. 23.—Announcement  
was made at the offices of Barnum  
and Bailey's circus in this city yesterday  
that Ringling Brothers, western circus  
men, had secured possession of Bar-  
num's "Greatest Show on Earth" and  
henceforth it would be run in connec-  
tion with their other arenic enterpris-  
es. The sale was made in London yes-  
terday. This transfer leaves the five  
Ringling Brothers practically without  
a rival in the circus world today.  
Both of these mammoth circuses are  
this season touring the United States.

JAIL DELIVERY  
AT ALAMOGORDO

Four United States Prisoners Make  
Sensational Escape—All Still  
at Large.

Alamogordo, N. M., Oct. 23.—A sen-  
sational jail delivery took place here  
about 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon  
and four prisoners, who were brought  
to the Otero county jail ten days ago  
for safe keeping, are still at large.  
The men were exercising in the  
corridor and rammed nine bricks out  
of the wall and squeezed through and  
dropped to the ground. They had  
about a half hour's start of the offi-  
cers before the alarm was given and  
mounts could be secured.  
The sheriff and several picked men  
are still scouring the country.  
Two of the men were counterfeiters  
and two burglars, all United States  
prisoners.  
They had nearly secured their free-  
dom from the Quay county jail, before  
being discovered and were here on  
account of the jail being stronger.

STANLEY HAS  
MAKING OF TOWN

In Heart of Fine  
Agricultural  
Country

PLENTY OF GOOD WATER

W. C. Asher, Owner of Town-  
site, Talks Enthusiastically  
of Its Prospects.

W. C. Asher, of Stanley, was in the  
city today on business. Mr. Asher was  
formerly of the state of Washington,  
but came to New Mexico about two  
years ago and engaged in the real es-  
tate business at Estancia, the county  
seat of Torrance county. He organized  
the New Mexico Real Estate Company  
at Estancia and looked after its af-  
fairs in that town until about a week  
ago, when he removed to Stanley,  
where he has purchased the townsite  
location of Stanley and the San Pedro  
addition. The townsite proper contains  
eighty acres of fine, level land and the  
San Pedro addition contains forty  
acres, making a total of one hundred  
and twenty acres. The railroad station  
of Stanley is located thereon and so  
is the principal business part of the  
town. There are three wells on the  
townsite, one owned outright by Mr.  
Asher, which contains one hundred  
and forty feet of water of the finest  
quality. The supply in that well seems  
inexhaustible. The other two wells on  
the townsite contain water of equally  
as good quality, one being 220 feet  
deep. The water supply for the town  
is ample. The wind-mills to pump wa-  
ter are now being erected and Mr.  
Asher, while in town today, purchased  
a third wind-mill for his well. This  
was purchased from the Santa Fe  
Hardware and Supply company.  
Town But Four Months Old.  
The town was started about four  
months ago and now contains about  
two hundred people. Twenty-six  
houses, business and residences, have  
been built since that time, all of good  
character, mostly frame.  
There is one hotel in active opera-  
tion and another hotel is being con-  
structed and will be ready within the  
next thirty days. There are three gro-  
cery stores, one hardware store, a dry  
goods store, two saloons, one black-  
smith shop and two lumber yards in  
the town now.  
A school district has been organized  
and Mr. Asher thinks by the first of  
January the school will be open. Coun-  
ty Superintendent John V. Conway is  
looking after this matter.  
Since the reduction in the forces  
of the Santa Fe Gold and Copper Min-  
ing company, at San Pedro, two weeks  
ago, the town has mostly to depend on  
its own growth and business and upon  
settlers in the surrounding country and  
some business from the mining camps.  
Homesteaders are going in steadily  
and quarter sections in the vicinity of  
Stanley are being taken up rapidly.  
Houses of newcomers and settlers can  
be seen in every direction. Six months  
ago there were none to be seen. The  
soil is of the finest and will produce  
the best crops indigent to the temper-  
ate zone. Water can be had in abun-  
dant by digging or drilling from fifty  
to one hundred feet. Said Mr. Asher:  
In Heart of Fine Farming Country.  
"I have been in the real estate busi-  
ness in various sections of the coun-  
try for sixteen years and have made  
up my mind that Stanley will be a good  
town on account of the surrounding  
country, which, in my opinion, within  
a year, will be fully settled. Many of  
the quarter sections have been taken  
by people who have come in during  
the past six months. They are a good  
class of farmers, thrifty and experi-  
enced. They do not fear the apparent  
dryness existing in that section and  
believe they will raise good crops by  
proper cultivation of the soil and hard  
work. I know something about wheat  
and have been in the best wheat rais-  
ing sections of Washington and Ore-

## CONGRESS SHOULD ADMIT NEW MEXICO.

The Denver Evening Post of Monday evening of this week prints a brilliant editorial in favor of granting statehood to New Mexico. On its first page it depicts New Mexico as a handsomely gowned lady knocking at the doors of Congress for admission and Uncle Sam saying: "Sure, Let Her in. She's a Peach." The editorial is set in large type, fills two columns and is the only editorial article on the editorial page. It reads as follows: "Statehood for New Mexico should be an immediate issue in the forthcoming session of Congress. To defer the granting of state rights to this sister territory of Colorado would be a peculiar injustice. The people of New Mexico have approved themselves good Americans during a territorial novitiate of fifty-nine years. It is not conceivable that any consideration of party politics will be permitted by Congress to delay the admission of our prospering neighbor. President Roosevelt has pledged himself to the admission of the new state in his own vivid way. On his recent Mississippi trip he invited the governors of Oklahoma and New Mexico to join him in these words: 'I want the governor of the territory that has become a state and the governor of the territory that is to become a state to ride with me.' We hope the senators from Colorado will take our view of the situation. It strikes us as a matter of fundamental justice and in no way of a partisan question that congress should immediately admit New Mexico to statehood and Arizona should follow New Mexico. Territorial government is foreign to the sentiment of democratic institutions and is an expedient rather than a principle. The shorter it lives the better it lives.

"In the treaty of 1848 between the United States and Mexico, America inserted article three from the Louisiana treaty, which said: 'The inhabitants of the ceded territory shall be incorporated in the Union as soon as possible according to the principles of the federal constitution to the enjoyment of all the rights, advantages and immunities of citizens of the United States.' California was admitted to the Union two years after that treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo was signed. Nevada was admitted in 1864 and Utah in 1896. The present population of New Mexico is greater than that of Idaho or Delaware or Nevada or Wyoming. During the last ten years its wealth has grown enormously and the capital invested in its resources and industries is increasing very rapidly. It is attracting American population from every state of the Union and no one now suggests that its people are not quite competent to exercise all the functions of self-government. It is part of the philosophy of the constitution that the divisions of the union should be permitted to work out their own salvation as independent commonwealths, and those citizens of this country who live in any of its territories are debarred from exercising some of those rights of citizenship that are integral with the spirit of American freedom. A territorial condition is a subjective condition and there seems to be no sound reason for keeping the 200,000 residents of New Mexico subjects of America any longer. Congress should unlock the gates and give them full freedom of citizens. Trust the people of New Mexico.

"It always has 'paid' America and it always will pay to trust the people. Theodore Roosevelt and Governor Hughes of New York, enjoy the distinction in common of resembling Jefferson and Lincoln in this one thing. They trust the people. They are confident of the capacity of men to ultimately live up to their opportunities. They are troubled by no fine-haired hesitancy about training grown men to exercise rights before those rights are granted. It is their view that a man (or a country) can only reach salvation by being allowed to save himself. Territorial government is the wet nurse of citizenship and New Mexico reached years of discretion long ago. Congress should admit New Mexico to 'the union of these states.'"

Jacob Riis, the magazine and newspaper writer, says he can see clearly that President Roosevelt will be re-nominated. Jake evidently has a pair of sharp eyes.

These federal special assistant attorney generals and special agents of the general land office who are in New Mexico probing alleged land frauds, ought to be consistent and practice what they preach. During the present term of the United States district court in this city six members of the grand jury have been excused from duty, two at their own request and the other four were discharged by the court, the latter having been under suspicion it is said of revealing secrets of the grand jury room. If the four jurors so far forgot themselves and the charge of the judge administered to them as to communicate with outsiders regarding the proceedings in the grand jury room, they ought to have been summarily dismissed. The secrecy to be observed by a grand juror must also be observed by officials, but it seems that this has not been the case in at least one instance and it might be a good idea for the grand jury when it reassembles to do a little investigating on its own account in this direction. On Monday a blanket indictment was reported, charging conspiracy to defraud the United States out of certain coal lands in the northern part of New Mexico in which a large industrial corporation and nineteen individuals were involved. The names of this company and the indicted persons were suppressed pending the serving of warrants but somebody evidently a federal official who had access to the indictment gave the list of names to the correspondent of the Albuquerque morning paper on the same day the indictment was returned and before a single warrant had been served, giving the indicted persons an opportunity, if they so desired to evade arrest and leave the country, and thus defeat the ends of justice.

The New Mexican some time ago called attention to another breach of official etiquette at the time E. P. Holcombe was appointed late one evening as temporary clerk of the first judicial district court of which Santa Fe is the headquarters. The order appointing Mr. Holcombe appeared verbatim the following day in the same Albuquerque paper, but the strongest part of the affair is that this court order is not on record and the original copy has disappeared mysteriously. Whether it was simply misplaced or carried off surreptitiously is of course a matter of conjecture.

In this connection in justice to Mr. Wilson, who is at present clerk of the court, it might be well to state that he is above suspicion. Mr. Wilson has denied in positive terms that he gave any newspaper representative the list of names contained in the indictment referred to or knows who showed the local correspondent of the Albuquerque morning paper the missing court order.

Perhaps if these two incidents are traced down to their source it will be discovered that one person is at the bottom of both. Here is a chance for a little more investigation. The conscientious and honorable federal officials who are engaged in ferreting out alleged violations of the federal laws in this territory owe it to themselves to find out who it is that is betraying official secrets. If not, why not?

## LEGITIMATE BUSINESS AND WALL STREET.

The trials, troubles, tribulations and panics of Wall Street that have occurred during the past six weeks at most daily and on some days almost hourly, have not as yet shaken the business interests of the country and certainly have not yet impressed the remainder of the people of the land outside of Wall Street with apprehension of great financial disaster in store at an early date. The great west, the middle states, the southern states, the Pacific coast states and the staid old New Englanders, excepting a few financial centers where there has been too much speculation and the putting of too much wind and water into stocks of corporations are still getting on quite nicely and are not yet shaking in fear and apprehension of the dire results that are impending because Wall Street is unhappy and in sore straits.

Referring to the tearing of hair and wearing of sackcloth and ashes in Wall Street these days the Washington Post, about expresses public sentiment throughout the country very fairly when it editorially holds that the flurry among the copper gamblers will

furnish another excuse, doubtless, for a spasm or two on the part of Wall Street. The old street's nerves have been badly shaken ever since it was discovered that the rest of the United States was independent of the convulsions that agitate the street. A few manipulators of copper stocks and copper mines having come to grief while engaged in the gentle occupation of cutting one another's throats, there is talk of wild agitation and "shrinkage of values."

If there is no other shrinkage than Wall Street values, the country will stagger along under the shock. It has survived the shrinkage of about ten billions of values, according to the Wall Street estimate, and yet every man with real money in his pocket is as well off as ever. If the country can stand the enormous theoretical losses already incurred, it might as well be confessed that it could get along without any Wall Street.

The allegation that legitimate business is so inextricably mixed with Wall Street gambling that it cannot be separated is pure nonsense. The legitimate business of the country is better off when it keeps out of Wall Street. One of the reasons why Wall Street is suffering such acute pangs just now, in fact, is the scarcity of suckers. When the outside crop runs short, the sharks must feed upon themselves, and it is little wonder that there is an uproar.

The public is not biting on the seductive schemes of Wall Street. Of course, the President is to blame. That was made clear by the Wall Street thief who recently embezzled \$100,000 and lost it. If Roosevelt had not butted in, the thief would have made \$1,000,000 in gambling before the market turned. But since Wall Street struck hard times, it is tough on thieves and gamblers. They are being run to jail and into bankruptcy at a fearful rate. No wonder Wall Street sees a panic ahead!

## THAT SAN JUAN COUNTY SECESSION MOVEMENT.

Referring to the unpatriotic and reprehensible movement in the county of San Juan for the annexation of that county to the state of Colorado, led by A. M. Edwards, member of the Territorial bureau of Immigration and Price Walters, member of the board of penitentiary commissioners, and a few other soreheads the Carizozo Outlook a bright and public-spirited newspaper published in the growing town of Carizozo, makes editorial comment which impresses one as correct and timely. Says the Outlook:

"A little band of agitators in the northwestern part of the territory, headed by one A. M. Edwards, are said to be making quite a talk about trying to have San Juan county annexed to Colorado. This would be quite amusing if it were not for the fact that such talk gets into a certain portion of the newspapers and is taken by people in the east who do not know the facts as an evidence that a considerable number of people in that county desire to leave the Territory of New Mexico and become a part of Colorado, which is not the case. The better class of citizens of the territory have no objections to Mr. Edwards, or any other person who does not feel satisfied with New Mexico, moving to Colorado, but if they will not do that they might have decency enough to desist from abusing the land that is furnishing them their support. The greater portion of the citizens of San Juan county are loyal to New Mexico and will do their full share in securing her admission to the Union and join the rest of us in making her the best state in the Union."

## WITHOUT BLATANT SELF-ADVANTAGING.

Several months ago a Federal grand jury in this city returned indictments charging subornation of perjury in connection with certain coal land entries, thirty miles south of Santa Fe. The evidence in these cases was presented by U. S. Attorney W. H. H. Llewellyn and he secured the indictments without finding it necessary to bulldoze the court or jurymen, without blatant self-advancement or seeking to make political capital in favor of a political faction discarded by the President of the United States and the people of the Territory. New Mexico grand juries have been transacting business, the course of justice has run smoothly and fairly and as a rule there has been less lawlessness in New Mexico than in any other commonwealth, whether it be lawlessness of wealth vested interests or the lawlessness of greed, or avarice on the part of less wealthy individuals. Fortunately, New Mexico will be in all likelihood be a state within less than a year and can then control its own government, administration of justice, and legislation and will give evidence to the world at large that it has been shamefully maligned, not only by agencies from without but by libellers within its boundaries.

Governor Curry is "swinging around the circle" in southeastern New Mexico and there will be something doing there in the agitation for statehood for the territory when he gets through. Curry is all right and knows the political ropes of the territory.

And yet the government of New Mexico lives and what is more in all human probability will change from a territorial to a state government within the next year. Considering circumstances this change can not come any too soon.

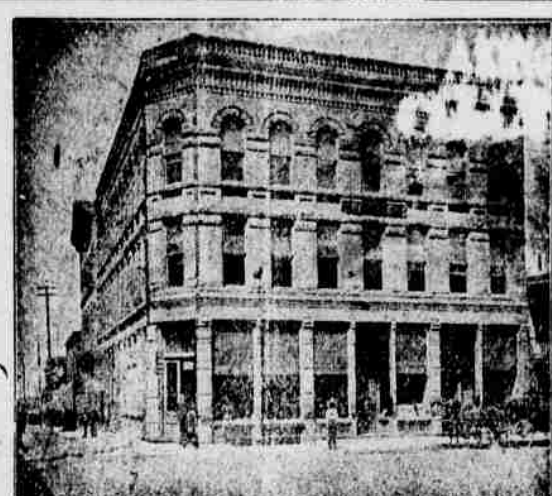

### TEXICO TOWNSITE CASE SETTLED

Long Drawn Out Contest Is Decided in Favor of the Intervenor in the Suit.

Texico, N. M., Oct. 23.—The long drawn out contest over the Texico townsite has been decided by the register and receiver of the United States land office at Clayton. The decision is in favor of the intervenors, and the effect is to make of the Texico townsite a government townsite. The original entry of Ragsdale has been cancelled and the application of James D. Hamlin to lay scrip on the land rejected.

This leaves the land in question government land, subject to entry only as a townsite.

Hamlin has the right of appeal from the decision of the register and receiver, and should he elect to appeal, the matter will go before the United States land commissioner.

In case that he does not appeal the land in question is open to entry as a government townsite.

### ROSWELL TO VOTE ON WATER WORKS

People of That Thriving City Will Act On Proposition For a Plant.

Roswell, N. M., Oct. 23.—The city council has prepared an ordinance legalizing the appointment, existence and duties of the waterworks commission and now awaits the return of Mayor Stockard from Dallas, Texas, to pass the ordinance and have it signed by the mayor.

The ordinance will call an election to vote upon the issue of \$120,000 waterworks bonds and \$35,000 sewer bonds, as the present sewer system will have to be enlarged and extended.

After being idle for 12 days on account of delay in receiving a car of crude oil with which to operate, the Roswell Gas company is again furnishing gas to its consumers.

### ALBUQUERQUE YOUNG MAN GUILTY OF FORGERY.

Albuquerque, N. M., Oct. 23.—Alber to Luna was found guilty of forgery in the district court here, the jury recommending the prisoner to the clemency of the court. Luna on December 1, 1906, passed a worthless check on the bartender at Graham Brothers' saloon. The evidence showed that while intoxicated, Luna offered in payment for drinks a check for \$75, purporting to be signed by Andres Romero and indorsed by Luna. The check which was made out on the First National bank was at once discovered to be worthless and the indictment of Luna resulted. His father, in the meanwhile, made good the amount of the check. Luna's self defense was that he was very drunk and did not know what he was doing.

### SAN MIGUEL COUNTY TO HAVE STATEHOOD CLUB.

Las Vegas, N. M., Oct. 23.—Steps are being taken towards the organization in San Miguel county of a statehood league. A league, whose single object shall be the acquisition of single statehood for New Mexico and whose sole aim and purpose shall be the uniting of the people of this county in one great movement for the freedom of New Mexicans from the present form of territorial government.

A number of prominent men, politically and business men who have no leaning toward politics are anxious to see the league formed at once. President Buddecke of the Commercial club left yesterday afternoon for Socorro where he will consult with H. O. Bursum, chairman of the Republican central committee and upon his return he will take steps towards the immediate carrying out of the league plan.

### BAGGAGEMAN FIRED FOR DEADHEADING TRUNKS.

Albuquerque, N. M., Oct. 23.—The local trainmen are circulating a petition asking for the reinstatement of Night Baggage Master G. I. Brown, who has just been discharged by Superintendent W. K. Etter of the Rio Grande division. Brown received his walking papers for permitting baggage belonging to trainmen seeking employment to be shipped free. Brown, who occupied the office for six months declares he merely followed the custom observed by his predecessors in office.

The Kearny Monument.—In Plaza. Erected by the Daughters of the American Revolution.

The Conda.—At southeast corner Plaza. End of the historic Santa Fe Trail. Now Exchange Hotel.

WITHIN FIVE MINUTES' WALK FROM PLAZA.

Roman Catholic Parochial School.—On Water Street.

Public Library.—On Washington Avenue. Built and maintained by the Woman's Board of Trade.

Federal Building.—Headquarters of Federal Land Office, Internal Revenue Service for New Mexico and Arizona, Surveyor General, Weather Bureau, Forest Supervisor of Pecos, Jemez and Taos National Forests, U. S. Attorney for the Pueblo Indians, and other Federal officials.

Cathedral.—On Cathedral Square. Original structure commenced in 1612, destroyed in 1680. Modern structure not complete. When complete to have twin steeples and to be cruciform. Contains a number of paintings by old masters. Reredos behind altar was erected by Governor del Valle and his wife in 1761. Fine old paintings and rich vestments in rear of Cathedral.

From here start annually the famous Corpus Christi and the historic De Vargas processions. In rear of altar two Franciscan Friars, murdered by the Indians, are buried.

Loretto Academy.—On College Street. Oldest School for Girls west of the Missouri. Quaint cemetery in rear.

Kit Carson Monument.—In front of Federal building.

The Court House.—On Palace Avenue. Contains County Offices and Court Rooms.

Loretto Convent.—On College Street. Occupied by Sisters of Loretto.

Saint Vincent's Sanitarium.—On Palace Avenue.

Saint Vincent's Orphans' Home.—On Palace Avenue.

Saint Vincent's Hospital.—On Palace Avenue.

Loretto Chapel.—On College Street. One of the most perfect specimens of Gothic Architecture in America. Built from design by French architects.

Bishop's Residence.—On Cathedral Street. A adjoining is the beautiful "Bishop's Garden" with historical spring, lakelets and fine orchard.

Archbishop's Residence.—On Cathedral Street.

TEN MINUTES' WALK FROM PLAZA.

Santa Fe Race Track and Baseball Park.—Laid out in 1907 southwest of the city, not far from Indian School.

San Miguel's Church.—On College Street. Believed to be oldest church building in the United States still used for public worship. Built either in 1598 or 1607. Destroyed in 1692. Rebuilt in 1710. Renovated in recent years. In rear of auditorium stands bell cast in Spain in fourteenth century. Vespers Sunday evenings at 6 o'clock, attended by Christian Brothers and pupils of adjoining Saint Michael's College. At other times, admission 25 cents. Adjoining is the oldest cemetery in the South-west.

Presbyterian Mission School for Girls.—Grant Avenue.

The Mary James Mission School for Boys.—On Federal Street.

The Santa Fe High School.—On the Old Fort Marcy Military Reservation famous in military annals and after abandonment granted to the City of Santa Fe for public school purposes.

The Garita.—On the hill below and west of Fort Marcy. Ancient Spanish fortress along walls of which malefactors and traitors were executed. Adjoining oldest cemetery in the United States.

Saint Catherine's Indian School.—Opposite National Cemetery. Conducted by Sisters of the Holy Sacrament. Indians from many tribes in attendance.

United States Indian Industrial Training School.—South of the city. One of the large Federal Indian Schools of the United States with almost 400 pupils, representing a score of tribes.

Sunmount Tent City.—At the foot of Talaya Mountain, southeast of the city and overlooking it. A Sanitarium successfully conducted for the cure of consumptives.

The Territorial School for the Deaf and Dumb.—This is the third of a trio

Old House.—On De Vargas Street opposite San Miguel Church. Tradition has it that it was built by Pueblo Indians long before Spanish occupation and was occupied by Onate in 1598. It has been continuously occupied since but upper story was removed in recent years while interior has been frequently renovated. Without doubt the oldest continuously occupied house in the United States.

The Capitol. Dedicated 1900 replacing that destroyed by incendiaries in 1892. All Territorial offices and Territorial library in building. Fine view of city and mountains from dome. In Capitol park are to be found larger variety of trees than in any other park in New Mexico.

United States district court reconvened this afternoon at 2 o'clock but there being no cases for trial or other business before it at this time adjournment was taken until Monday. Judgment was rendered yesterday by Judge John R. McFie in the district court of Santa Fe county against all "persons, lands, real estate and property described in the delinquent tax list in the county of Santa Fe for the years up to and including 1898. The judgment covers fifty-two typewritten pages containing descriptions of the property delinquent and the amount of taxes due thereon. An order of sale has been signed by the court.

**DISTRIBUTE FUNDS  
FROM LAND SALE**

Money Paid By Pennsylvania Development Company Divided Among Different Institutions.

Acting upon instructions of Ormsby McHarg, special assistant to the attorney general of the United States Territorial and Commissioner Robert P. Ervén has distributed among three territorial institutions the sum of \$1,133.74 which represents the final payment of the Pennsylvania Development company on the tracts of timber land purchased by it from the Territory, and which transaction because of irregularities in the delivery of the deeds was directly responsible for the removal of ex-Governor Hagerman.

Former Territorial Land Commissioner A. A. Keen to whom the money was paid declined to have it divided among the several territorial institutions and therefore kept the fund intact. When Mr. Ervén assumed the duties of land commissioner in the spring of the present year he followed the example of Mr. Keen and did not distribute the fund until notified to do so by Mr. McHarg.

The New Mexico Deaf and Dumb Institute of this city is the principal beneficiary, having had placed to its credit \$5,728.08 in its permanent improvement fund, and \$116.84 in its income fund. Other territorial institutions to which the remainder is distributed are: New Mexico School of Mines at Socorro, which received \$2,760 in its permanent improvement fund, and \$56.06 in its income fund, and the New Mexico Reform School at El Rito which secured \$2,400 for its permanent improvement fund and \$48.76 for its income fund.

The following is a copy of the letter addressed to Mr. Ervén by Special Assistant Attorney General McHarg ordering the former to distribute the money which was done accordingly:

"Mr. R. P. Ervén, commissioner of public lands, Santa Fe, New Mexico. "Sir—My attention has been called to the fact that the Pennsylvania Development company made a payment of some \$10,000 to your predecessor in office, same being the last payment upon lands which said company attempted to purchase from the Territory of New Mexico; I understand that this money has not been distributed to the territorial institutions entitled to receive the same, and I have to advise you that unless steps are taken to place this fund at the disposal of the institutions entitled there-

into under the act of June 21, 1898, as special assistant to the attorney general of the United States, under my instructions from the attorney general will be directed to pursue such course as I deem necessary under the provisions of that act, to see that this fund is properly distributed.

"You have full power under the law to make the distribution and I trust that there will be no delay in attending to the matter. I will be obliged to you if you will kindly inform me when you have taken this action.

**CLOSE FINISH IN GREAT  
BALLOON RACE.**

St. Louis is 700 miles on an air line. Abercorn Made Good Flight. St. Louis, Oct. 23.—A message received by the Aero Club states that the German balloon Abercorn landed at Manassas, Prince Williams county, Virginia, at 7:10 o'clock today. The distance covered was 680 miles in an air line from St. Louis. The Abercorn was the smallest balloon in the race and has the distinction of having crossed the Alps. It was piloted then as now by Paul Meckel.

How Cup Will Be Awarded. St. Louis, Oct. 23.—The James Gordon Bennett cup will be awarded to the balloon that has covered the longest distance from St. Louis in a straight line, regardless of how long the balloon may have been in the air or how many miles it actually traveled. Records for flight distance and for duration were broken by nearly every balloon in the race. The German balloon Pommern, which landed at Asbury Park, covered an air line distance from St. Louis of 880 miles and at noon appeared to be in the lead, Oscar Erbelock, the pilot of this balloon did not descend until he actually confronted the ocean and might easily have exceeded the world's record for a long flight of 1,200 miles, made by Count De La Vaulx, when he sailed from Paris to Kieff, Russia, if this condition had not been encountered.

At one o'clock this afternoon with only one balloon, the French Lisle de France to be heard from, the German balloon Pommern, which landed at Asbury Park, this morning, covering 880 miles, had a lead of 90 miles over its nearest competitor, the German Dusseldorf, which landed at Dover, Delaware.

French Balloon May Yet Win. Philadelphia, Pa., Oct. 23.—The French balloon Lisle de France, which passed over Mount Holly, twenty miles northeast of here at noon today, has been reported near Hightown, New Jersey, moving in the direction of Long Branch and not far from Asbury Park, where the German balloon Pommern landed.

The embarrassment is attributed to the inability to secure funds on account of the stringency in the money market. The amount involved will run into the millions.

Westinghouse Electric sold down to sixty at the New York stock exchange today, a decline of 19 5-8 points from last night.
