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LINCOLN COUNTY IS PROSPEROUS

Big Gain In Taxes Bears Out State- ment

INCREASE NEARLY \$200,000

Glance at Tax Rolls Proves Advance in Material Conditions.

Lincoln county in its tax assessments this year shows a gain of almost two hundred thousand dollars over the valuation of taxable property in 1906. The total valuation for 1907 is \$1,511,974 as against \$1,334,795 in 1906. This is a slight increase in the exemptions allowed which makes the amount actually subject to taxation this year \$1,263,195, or a net gain of \$175,086.

The largest individual increase indicated in the various classifications of property assessed for taxation purposes is in the number of sheep in which one item alone there is an advance over last year of \$137,501. A large gain is also shown in the valuation of city and town lots amounting to \$66,295. There is an increase in the assessments on railroads of \$11,434. Substantial gains are also shown in merchandise household goods, shares of bank stock and of capital in manufacturing, which is undeniable evidence of the prosperity and development of the county.

The largest decline is in the surface improvements of mines where a depreciation in value is indicated of \$32,385. Decreases are also noticeable in agricultural and timber lands which, however, are more than counter-balanced by the gains in grazing lands, coal lands and mineral lands other than coal.

The regular county levy assessed this year in Lincoln county is 25 mills and there is an additional levy of from 3 to 5 mills for school purposes.

GIFFORD PINCHOT VISITS TERRITORY

Chief Forester Spends Day in Albuquerque Confering With New Mexico Supervisors.

Albuquerque, N. M., Nov. 1.—Gifford Pinchot, chief forester in the national forest service, arrived here early yesterday morning and spent the day conferring with various forest officials from this vicinity in regard to the work of the department being carried on in New Mexico.

Mr. Pinchot came here from Arizona and California, where he has been on a general inspection tour of the national forests, and just previous to this accompanied President Roosevelt on his recent Mississippi river trip.

Mr. Pinchot departed on the east-bound limited last night for Washington, where important matters await his attention. The following supervisors and officials of the forest service were here to confer with Mr. Pinchot: D. D. Bronson, chief inspector of district No. 3, including New Mexico and Arizona; Will C. Barnes, inspector of grazing in the New Mexico-Arizona district; Hugh H. Harris, supervisor in the Mount Taylor and Manzano reserves; John Kerr, supervisor of the San Mateo, Magdalena and North Gila reserves; Charles H. Hinderer, acting supervisor of the Sacramento and Guadalupe reserve; Thomas R. Stewart, acting supervisor of the Jemez, Taos and Pecos forests; W. B. Hadley in charge of the Fort Bayard planting station; Charles L. Castle, assistant to the inspector of boundary work at Silver City.

COMPLETION OF BUILDING DELAYED

Girls' Dormitory at Indian School Will Not Be Finished For Several Weeks Yet.

The new girls' dormitory at the U. S. Indian Industrial school here which should have been ready for occupancy and turning over to Superintendent Clinton J. Crandall today, is not yet completed and will not be finished for two or three weeks. Under the contract the contractor M. M. Sundt of East Las Vegas is liable to a fine of \$20 per day for each day's delay. The building is a handsome two-story brick with an extensive basement. It will be heated by steam and lighted by electricity.

The new dining hall at the school is in use and although a very large hall it is crowded at meal time, there being 320 young Indians to take their three meals per day therein. The hall is 37 feet wide, 105 feet long, and has a height of 14 feet from floor to ceiling. It takes 48 electric lights to light it. The building contains a high and extensive basement in which there are kitchens, bakery, store rooms, and main dining hall. It is heated by steam.

LIFE CONVICT KILLS GUARD

Unsuccessful Attempt Made By Prisoner to Escape From Wyoming Penitentiary—Finally Suicides.

Laramie, Wyo., Nov. 1.—A special to the Republican from Rawlins says that a life convict named A. Echard, today shot and killed Ed Samuelson, day cellhouse-keeper at the Wyoming state penitentiary, in an attempt to escape. Echard had a pistol and a stick of dynamite and when Samuelson opened his cell this morning, the prisoner shot him dead. Echard then tried to dynamite the outside door of the penitentiary. Failing in this the convict then blew off the top of his head with the same weapon he had killed Samuelson with.

UTES AGREE TO LAY DOWN ARMS

Captain Johnson Persuades Them to Send Children to School and Obey Uncle Sam.

Omaha, Neb., Nov. 1.—Local army headquarters today received an official report from Captain Johnson, who was sent to the Cheyenne river Indian reservation to hold a pow-wow with the Utes. He found the attitude of the Utes very peaceful. Captain Johnson explained about the schools and secured their consent to having the children sent to distant schools.

TAFT WILL ADHERE TO ORIGINAL PROGRAM.

Manila, Nov. 1.—Secretary of War William H. Taft, returned to Manila yesterday and in the evening attended a banquet given in his honor at the Quill club, composed entirely of Americans. Secretary Taft has decided to adhere to the original program and will not leave for Berlin on November 9, as important business here is yet to be settled.

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PENNSYLVANIA WILL RETRENCH

Big Eastern Railroad to Curtail Expenses

UNABLE TO SECURE CAPITAL

Tightness of Money Market Responsible For Abandonment of Improvements.

Philadelphia, Nov. 1.—The board of directors of the Pennsylvania railroad today declared the usual semi-annual dividend 3 1/2 per cent.

The directors gave out a statement declaring that the outlook for new capital next year was unsatisfactory and announced a decision to retrench during the coming year. This action was taken in the face of the statement made by President McCreery, Wednesday that the earnings of the company are eleven per cent greater now than at the same period last year.

This will somewhat delay the completion of the New York tunnel as a whole but it is proposed to rush work on the new terminal building in New York. All other improvements will be materially retarded by the proposed slower expenditure.

MURDERER IS GRANTED PARDON

Colorado Executive Gives Man Convicted as an Accessory in Double Killing His Freedom.

Denver, Nov. 1.—Thomas Brown, who was sentenced to the penitentiary for from five to seven years last July for the killing of Isaac Lebo and Chris Miller, members of the Western Federation of Miners at the election in November, 1904, was set free today, a pardon having been granted him by Governor Buchtel.

James Warford is serving a life sentence for the same crime. Brown and Warford were deputies at the election. At the trial of Brown, Warford testified that he fired the shots which killed Lebo and Miller. At the trial of Warford, Brown testified that he would have shot the two men if Warford had not. They claimed self-defense.

RAMSEY MUST PAY \$589,000

Ex-President of Wabash Railroad Loses Damage Suit in New York Supreme Court.

New York, Nov. 1.—A verdict of \$589,000 against Joseph Ramsey, Jr., former president of the Wabash railroad, in a suit brought by John S. Jones, a local financier and railroad operator, was handed down today in the supreme court.

Jones sued George J. Gould, William E. Guy and Ramsey as individuals, to recover \$460,000 which he alleged to be due him from the three defendants for securing for them 50,000 acres of coal lands in southern Ohio. Part of the money sued for, according to Jones, represented sums advanced by him in payment for the land and the rest for commissions, expenses and interest. Justice Goff held that neither Gould nor Guy were liable.

LOOKING AFTER INDIAN INTERESTS

U. S. Senators Teller and Curtis Investigating Charges of Fraud Perpetrated on Kickapoos.

San Antonio, Texas, Nov. 1.—Senators Teller, of Colorado, and Curtis, of Kansas, members of the Senate subcommittee on Indian affairs, appointed to take testimony in the case of the Kickapoo Indians of Oklahoma, are in this city en route to Eagle Pass.

They are going there to investigate charges of fraud which have been made with regard to the transfer of lands which are the property of the Kickapoos, and will be engaged in taking testimony there for the next three or four weeks.

SIX KILLED IN WRECK IN GERMANY.

Berlin, Nov. 1.—A mixed freight and passenger train was derailed today near Bingen-on-the-Rhine. Six were killed and fourteen dangerously injured. The locomotive and a passenger car rolled down the embankment and several freight cars loaded with stone fell on the passenger car, crushing it.

ACCUSED ACTOR STILL AT LARGE

Believed That Raymond Hitchcock Fled to Canada

WOULD BE SAFE THERE

Police Working on Several Clews in Hopes of Locating Fugitive.

New York, Nov. 1.—The latest theory regarding the whereabouts of Raymond Hitchcock, the comedian who disappeared on the eve of his indictment on a charge made by several young girls, is that the fugitive has gone to Canada. This information was furnished by a railroad conductor. Hitchcock will be safe from extradition if he is in Canada.

The police learned today that a man closely resembling Hitchcock, sailed on the Majestic Wednesday and a wireless telegram has been sent to the captain of that vessel.

The best clue however, points to Canada. A gateman at the Grand Central Station says he saw Hitchcock take a train for Boston on Wednesday, while there is a report at North Adams, Massachusetts, as to his being seen there by a hotel clerk. It is also asserted at North Adams that Hitchcock remained over night there at a private house, starting yesterday afternoon for Rutland, Vermont, and connecting at the latter place at nine o'clock last night with a train bound for Montreal.

CONTEMPT CASE BEFORE COURT

Number of Authorities Cited By Attorneys on Both Sides to Prove Their Contentions.

Arguments in the contempt proceedings against Ricardo Alarid took up most of the time today in the United States district court in this city. A large number of opinions of state and federal courts were cited by the attorneys on both sides to prove their contentions.

Attorneys T. B. Catron and R. C. Gortner as counsel for the defendant maintained that Alarid's answer was conclusive and he should be discharged as he had purged himself of the charge of contempt the allegations set up having been specifically denied under oath in the statement.

The vacancy in the United States grand jury which was caused by the discharge of David Catanach, who was dismissed at his own request owing to illness in his family, was filled this morning by the selection of C. O. Carlson who was one of the three veniremen drawn yesterday.

After the grand jury was reempaneled this morning it was excused until this afternoon at 2 o'clock and as Special Assistant Attorney General Peyton Gordon was still busy at that time with the contempt proceedings it was dismissed until tomorrow at 10 a. m.

VLADIVOSTOCK MUTINY SERIOUS

Torpedo Boat Destroyers Did Considerable Damage Before Being Silenced By Garrison.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 1.—According to the official report of the recent mutinous outbreak of sailors of Vladivostock, the crews of three torpedo boat destroyers, namely the Skerry, Serdittina and Trevoitsyn mutinied, hoisted a red flag and shelled the port, doing considerable damage to buildings and killing some civilians.

The Skerry, on board which were three revolutionary agitators, took the lead, the crew killing the commander and wounding the other officers. The shore batteries answered the fire and the Skerry was battered to pieces. The boilers exploded and a fire broke out inside. Nearly all the mutineers on the Skerry were killed.

The mutiny on the Travoitsyn was quelled by its own crew, after six mutineers had been killed and several wounded.

Harry Nietert, an American whose building was struck by a shell, was seriously wounded.

BIG RAILROAD BRIDGE COLLAPSES.

Manila, Nov. 1.—The new railroad bridge being constructed over the Pasig river, near Fort McKinley, collapsed today and sixty workmen were precipitated in the river below. Three Americans and twenty Filipinos were injured. The damage is estimated at \$100,000.

WILL NOT RETIRE FAT OFFICERS

Those Who Are Able to Perform Duties Required of Them to Remain in Army.

Washington, Nov. 1.—None of the army officers who failed to take the prescribed test ride by the president will be retired as long as he is fit to discharge the military duties he at present performs. An order was issued by the war department today requiring an even dozen of these officers to appear before a retiring board at the Washington barracks on November 2. This does not by any means represent the total number of officers who did not take the test ride, and others will be ordered from time to time before the same board, for it is the purpose of Acting Secretary Oliver to avoid any charge of discrimination as between the different boards by requiring all of the officers referred to, to appear before the tribunal governed by one act of instructions.

This retiring board, unlike the ordinary board, is not to inquire into the physical fitness of the officers who appear before it for any and all kinds of military duties. It will be instructed, however, to consider and report upon the ability of the officer to discharge the duties upon which he is at present engaged.

MOUNTAINS ARE NOW SNOW CAPED

Baldy's Old Pate With Its Ermine Covering Shines Like Diamonds of Newly Rich.

Mount Baldy's old pate was given another covering of snow last night and glistened in today's bright sunshine like the diamonds and jewels of the newly rich—a sight beautiful to behold. Most of the high mountains north and east of Santa Fe are now snow capped and the mantle of white extends down to the timber line.

In Santa Fe the temperature at 6 o'clock this morning was 36 degrees and the lowest during last night 35 degrees. The maximum temperature yesterday was 46 degrees at 1 a. m., and the minimum 38 degrees at 10:40 p. m., the mean temperature for the day being 42 degrees. The average relative humidity yesterday was 96 per cent, having been the same both at 6 a. m., and 6 p. m. The precipitation during the 24 hours ending today at 8 a. m., was 0.16 inch.

Today's official weather forecast for New Mexico is "Fair weather tonight and Saturday; colder weather in south portion tonight."

WHOLESALE GRAFT IN ST. LOUIS

Alderman Resigns Seat in House of Delegates and Confesses Everything to the Grand Jury.

St. Louis, Mo., Nov. 1.—Developments came thick and fast yesterday in the booze investigation being conducted by the grand jury after City Councilman G. C. Linde was indicted and charged with malfeasance in office. When the charge was made against Linde, he made a clean breast of his connection with contracts that have been let by the city, implicating several members of the city's legislative bodies and wholesale indictments are now expected later. Today Linde also announced that he would resign his office and would tell the truth before the jury.

The confession came at the close of an all night session of the grand jury, during which Linde was summoned to explain his relations to the Linde Carpet Company to which corporation it is alleged the house of delegates celanang contracts were sublet by the firm to which they were awarded. The indictment was returned under a law which forbids a city official having a financial interest in any contract under the city.

TRUSTY COMMITS DEADLY ASSAULT

Patient at Arizona Territorial Insane Asylum Attacks Superintendent With Axe—Had to Be Shot.

Phoenix, Ariz., Nov. 1.—Jeff Woods, a trusty patient at the territorial asylum for the insane, yesterday assaulted and badly wounded Dr. Roy Ferguson, superintendent of the institution, with an axe, inflicting severe cuts on his head and shoulders. Ferguson will recover. Woods while trying to escape was shot with two charges of buckshot but was not seriously injured.

WAGES OF BRITISH COLUMBIA MINERS CUT.

Seattle, Nov. 1.—The miners and smelter employees of the Granbery Smelter company at Grandforks, British Columbia, will have their wages cut fifty cents a day beginning today. The cut will affect all the miners in the Phoenix camp. Much uneasiness is felt over the situation as the union will decide whether the reduction shall be accepted or not.

MEETING OF CABINET TODAY

Financial Situation Chief Topic Discussed

CONDITIONS GRATIFYING

No New Action on Part of Government Warranted at Present.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 1.—President Roosevelt was in consultation with the cabinet three hours today. In that length of time the financial situation was discussed and it was stated that the satisfactory conditions at the present moment warranted no new action on the part of the government. Country at Large Not Dependent On Wall Street.

New York, Nov. 1.—Senator Francis E. Warren of Wyoming, who has just returned from abroad, was greatly interested in the recent financial disturbance when he landed. He said he believed there was no occasion for any alarm as the recent troubles were merely caused by the swinging back of the pendulum.

"These panics cannot hurt the country," said the Senator, "I have noticed that the country after such financial depression is much stronger than it was before. The fundamental industries of the nation are never shaken by these conditions. I am not advocating any idea to take the powers or rights away from the states but I do think something stronger than state control is necessary to govern the trust companies. These companies should have at least twenty-five per cent of their funds in reserve but we find when an upheaval comes that some of them have only five per cent. Oklahoma Banks to Re-Open Monday.

Guthrie, Okla., Nov. 1.—Four hundred bankers, representing the Oklahoma and Indian Territory Banking associations, in convention in the assembly rooms of the lone hotel here last night, agreed on a plan to re-open all banks early next week.

Oklahoma and Indian Territory banks, which have been closed since Monday last, under the legal holiday plan of Acting Governor Charles Folsom, will re-open for business under the limited payment system not later than Monday. This is the sense of the resolutions adopted by the Oklahoma and Indian Territory Banking Association. The resolutions in part follow:

"First. That the banks of Oklahoma and Indian Territory open for business as usual not later than Monday, November 4.

"Second. That they do not pay in cash on any account on demand, to exceed \$5 in any one day or \$15 in any one week, until the shipment of money is resumed from the money centers."

Santa Rosa Bank Adopts Clearing House Plan.

Santa Rosa, N. M., Nov. 1.—The First National bank of this place has notified its patrons that until further notice depositors will be paid in New York or local exchange instead of currency. The bank officials say this move is necessary on account of being unable to receive from clearing houses currency in settlement of their credits. The First National bank of Santa Rosa is one of the soundest and best managed banks in New Mexico. The present stringency in the eastern money markets has made it most difficult to receive the money due the home bank from its eastern correspondents.

IOWA BANK FAILS; CASHIER SUICIDES

Bad Loans Wrecked Institution—Two Other Banks Forced to Close Also.

Grand Island, Neb., Nov. 1.—The Commercial State bank of this city closed its doors today. Fifty thousand dollars of the funds of the bank were in the First National bank of Charleston, Iowa, whose cashier committed suicide yesterday. The deposits of the Commercial State bank are \$380,000. Local banks will assist and a receiver will probably not be asked for. This is the second bank to close its doors as a result of the failure of the Charleston bank, the bank of Russell, a private institution, having suspended yesterday.

PLAGUE CLAIMS THIRD VICTIM IN SEATTLE.

Seattle, Nov. 1.—Mrs. George Osborne died this morning and physicians give bubonic plague as the cause of her death. This is the third death from the plague in Seattle, two being in the Osborne family.

MORE SUPPORT FOR STATEHOOD.

The Silver City Independent, the ablest and fairest Democratic paper in the Territory, has joined the statehood movement, and that in good style. This is in refreshing contrast with the policy of the Democratic papers in the Pecos valley in southeastern New Mexico, with the Daily Democratic sheet at Roswell at the head. These papers are either openly opposed or underhandedly against the proposition. There are a few other Democratic papers throughout the Territory that are in the same category and they are led by the Albuquerque morning paper. The Independent puts itself on record editorially in its last issue in the following:

"In the interest of single statehood leagues should be formed throughout the county in every precinct. The first suggestion as to this form of organization to further single statehood emanated from our esteemed fellow citizen, Hon. Robert Black of this city. When the subject was first introduced and it was known that President Roosevelt favored the idea, Mr. Black wrote Colonel Max. Frost and suggested leagues as the best method to bring about the desired result—an unbiased opinion of the voters of New Mexico irrespective of party and party affiliations on this all important subject. Who will be the first to move in the matter in Silver City?"

"The statehood movement is gaining ground rapidly throughout the length and breadth of the Territory. The recent visit of Governor Curry to Roswell and adjacent country was met with an ovation in the broadest sense of the term—an ovation to an old citizen, a resident of former days, who unaided and by the force of his individual energy has raised himself to the highest office in the Territory; an ovation to the chief executive whose individual help and influence center in single statehood, and a tribute of respect and love, irrespective of party creed or affiliation, to the man who has placed New Mexico closer to the sisterhood of states than any other individual now residing in the Territory.

"Statehood is all that we need to become one of the most thickly populated districts in the west, and statehood will develop a territory rich in mineral resources, an area in the broad domain of the United States which has no equal in point of diversified mineral, agricultural and horticultural resources as our own New Mexico. Immigration is constantly adding to our population, and with statehood we will double our present population in two years. It is to be regretted that Governor Curry's itinerary prevented him from visiting Silver City during the present month. Assurances, however, are not wanting that the governor will visit Silver City in the near future, and during his visit he will be the recipient of many courtesies and attentions from the people as governor of New Mexico, as Captain Curry of the Rough Riders, and many a warm greeting from old-time friends who knew him in other days as plain George Curry, a representative citizen of New Mexico."

UNCLE SAM'S GREAT PENSION SYSTEM.

The people of the United States are the most generous of all the nations on earth in taking good care of the soldiers and sailors who fought their battles and served their country in the hour of its need. The great military nations of Europe have pension systems that are well developed and have existed for many years, but none of them compare in generosity, in liberality, and in justice to Uncle Sam's pension system. The amount paid out annually is tremendous but the people grudge it not, quite the reverse, they are willing to increase it by millions and billions and as long as necessary that the men who saved the Union and upheld the flag of the country since 1860 may feel that their services are fully appreciated and that the nation regards them with gratitude and with a kindly feeling. The New York Commercial in considering the pension appropriations tells an interesting editorial tale:

"A decrease in the number of pensioners without a decrease, proportionately or actually, in the disbursements for pensions is one of those things which excite a healthful curiosity and inquiry. When an actual increase in the value of the pension roll is noted along with a decrease in the number of pensioners on that roll,

we all become Missourians with a prompt 'show me.'

"The actual figures in the annual report of the commissioner of pensions show the greatest falling-off of pensioners for any year, or an aggregate of 18,000 less than at the close of the previous fiscal year. The number on the roll June 30 last was the smallest since 1893 and amounted to 967,371. The annual value of the pension roll at that date amounted to \$140,850,880, and this was \$4,613,131 greater than on the corresponding date in 1906. During the last fiscal year there were additions to the roll—new pensioners, restorations and renewals—of 31,034 persons, which was less than the death losses among survivors of the civil war alone.

"The apparent phenomenon of an increasing fund and a decreasing list is of simple explanation. Of special causes therefor is the act of February 6 increasing the rate of pensions. Of general causes, operative at all times, there are the belated applications of those entitled to pensions by veterans of the civil war, carrying arrears of pension, and by their widows. Many of these pensioners are reluctant to apply for government aid until forced to do so by personal or family misfortune.

"Under all the circumstances it is idle to look for any great decrease in the amount of pension disbursements for years to come. From this time on there will be great losses by death among the survivors of the civil war and their dependent widows; and in the days of the next generation it is probable that the pension amounts will show a material decrease, but hardly until then."

BRYAN WILL BE A CANDIDATE.

While he will be a candidate Colonel William Jennings Bryan is swinging around the country talking to the people and giving them to understand that he does not contemplate in any manner being a candidate for the Democratic nomination for the presidency next year, his relatives and friends especially in the states that during the past ten years at one time or another went Populist, are very busy laying wires and putting up jobs to secure delegates favorable to advance Colonel Bryan's ambition for the nomination and paying no attention to his denials and assertions that he will not be a candidate.

The New York Evening Sun is "onto" the scheme, and tells what is going on in the colonel's own state in Nebraska in the matter. Says the Sun: "While Colonel Bryan is busy talking in the east Thomas Allen, of Lincoln, his brother-in-law, who is also chairman of the Nebraska state Democratic committee, has come out with the following statement:

"Certainly Mr. Bryan will be a candidate for the Democratic nomination. He hasn't made much of a secret of his intentions along that line."

"Was it in the bosom of the family or in political circles that the Thomas Jefferson of the twentieth century was so frank? Whatever the circumstances under which the great man declared his intentions, there can be no doubt that by this time he has come to the conclusion that the Democratic nomination is a good thing to have in the house, and that it is very unreasonable to assume that the temporary interruption in his private ownership of the same interfered to any real extent with his proprietorship."

Five years ago there were not a half dozen settlers within a radius of ten miles of the town of Moriarty in the northern part of the Estancia valley. Today there are over 200 homestead settlers there which means that over 30,000 acres of public land have been entered, a large portion of which will be devoted to agriculture and live stock raising purposes. Part of this section is in Santa Fe county. The business there is constantly increasing and the merchants of this city should look after it. It is but their own fault if they do not secure it.

The Washington Post calls attention to the following important omission in the Oklahoma constitution: "The Oklahoma constitution also fails to stipulate that true Oklahomans shall not eat pie with a knife."

The wool growers and sheep raisers of New Mexico are prosperous. They should give due credit for this to two agencies. One of them is providence and the other is the protection policy of the Republican party.

FIVE STRONG REASONS.

Five strong and indisputable reasons why New Mexico is entitled to statehood are given by the Socorro Chieftain in a recent issue. These are convincing and should be read far and wide. The Chieftain says:

"New Mexico is entitled to statehood by virtue of a promise made in the treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo that she should be granted statehood soon. For sixty years she has been waiting for that promise to be fulfilled.

"New Mexico is entitled to statehood because in times of the nations great need she has furnished more loyal troops in proportion to her population than were furnished by any state in the union.

"New Mexico is entitled to statehood because there dwell within her borders more than three hundred thousand law-abiding, patriotic, intelligent, and progressive Americans who would be a credit to any great commonwealth in the land.

"New Mexico is entitled to statehood because of her loyalty to the principles of that great political party under whose direction our country has reached heights of achievement undreamed of by the Americans of fifty years ago.

"New Mexico is entitled to statehood by every principle of right and justice and she looks to the Sixtieth Congress of the United States to apply those principles in her behalf."

The people of New Mexico must not take things for granted if they would secure statehood for the Sunshine Territory in the coming year. President Roosevelt is very friendly to the project and will help along wherever possible, but strong contrary sentiment existing in the East will have to be overcome in the 60th Congress. Therefore united and strong efforts on the part of the people of the territory will be absolutely necessary to bring about success. Considerable in that line has already been done with U. S. senators and members of the House of Representatives of the coming Congress by Delegate W. H. Andrews, while Governor George Curry and other leaders have devoted themselves so far strenuously to "getting the people together" at home.

The question of statehood is attracting attention all over the country and there is much advice given the people of the territory some of it good and some of it not so good. The following from the Pueblo Chieftain is rather good:

"Encouraged by presidential favor, the people of the territory, some of it ceasing actively toward separate statehood. It is doubtful whether the passage of an enabling act can be secured at the next session of Congress, and there are some reasons for believing that the best plan would be to call a constitutional convention and present a ready made constitution to Congress for its approval."

The Bureau of Forestry is doing some good work on the national forests in New Mexico. However, the greatest good that the service could bring about would be the construction of the Scenic Highway between this city and Las Vegas across the Pecos river national forest. This highway would open up to tourists, to travelers, to persons seeking health, rest and recreation during the spring and summer of each year the most magnificent mountain country and the best health giving climate on God's green earth. Chief Gifford Pinchot of the Bureau of Forestry while in New Mexico should not fail to make a careful and thorough inspection of the Pecos river national forest and its many scenic beauties with a view to posting himself thoroughly and helping to obtain the speedy construction of the Scenic Highway by the forestry service.

It is high time that the United States fulfilled the solemn treaty obligation entered into with Mexico 59 years ago and give statehood to New Mexico. Commenting upon this the El Paso Herald truthfully says:

"It is 59 years since the United States government, by the treaty of Guadalupe Hidalgo, solemnly promised with respect to New Mexico: 'The inhabitants of the ceded territory shall be incorporated in the union of the United States, and admitted as soon as possible, according to the principles of the federal constitution, to the enjoyment of all the rights, advantages, and immunities of citizens of the United States.' It is time the Republican party were fulfilling this pledge."

President Roosevelt is of the opinion that a census will have to be taken in New Mexico and Arizona before statehood can be given the two territories. No one objects to the census, as in many ways this would be a great benefit provided it were taken accurately and rapidly and New Mexico were to be admitted in time to vote for the next presidential election. The people of the Territory would very much like to cast their ballot for the Republican candidate for the presidency and elect four Republican electors to the electoral college.

Secretary of the Treasury Cortelyou may not be a great financier but he certainly proved himself equal to the occasion when he gave substantial and kindly aid to the New York financial institutions during the fracas last week. After all there is nothing like being successful.

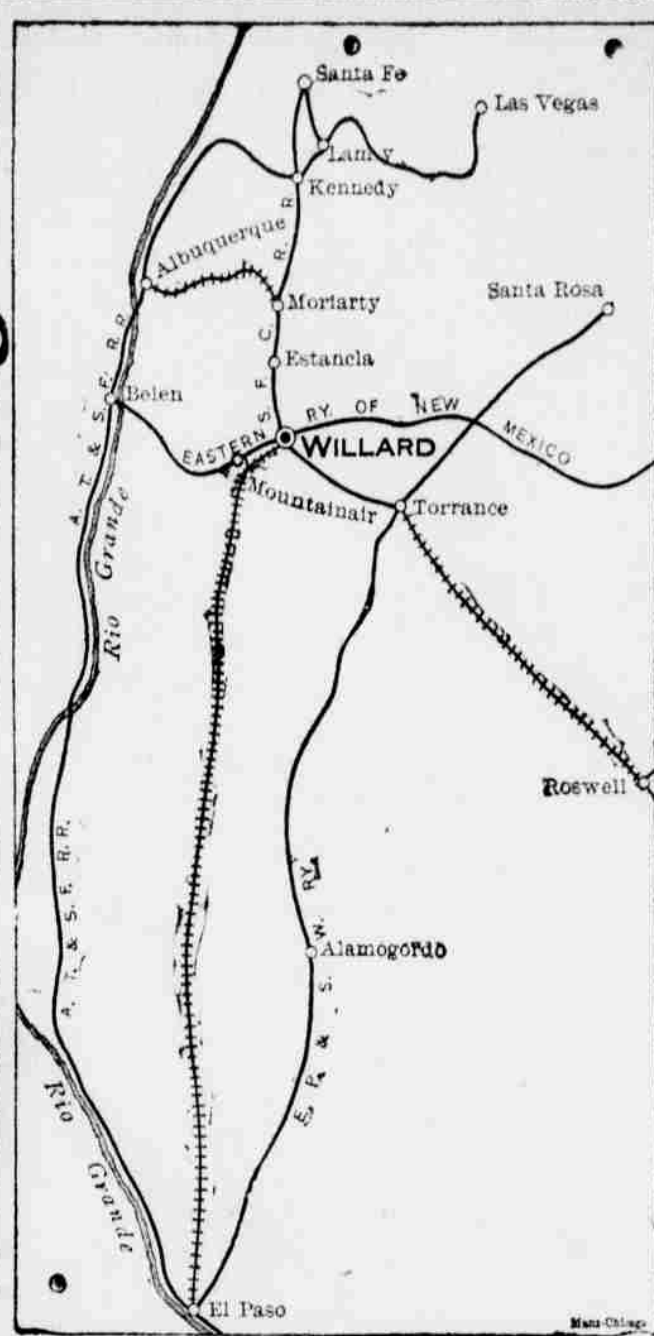

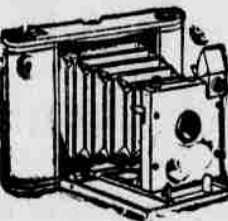

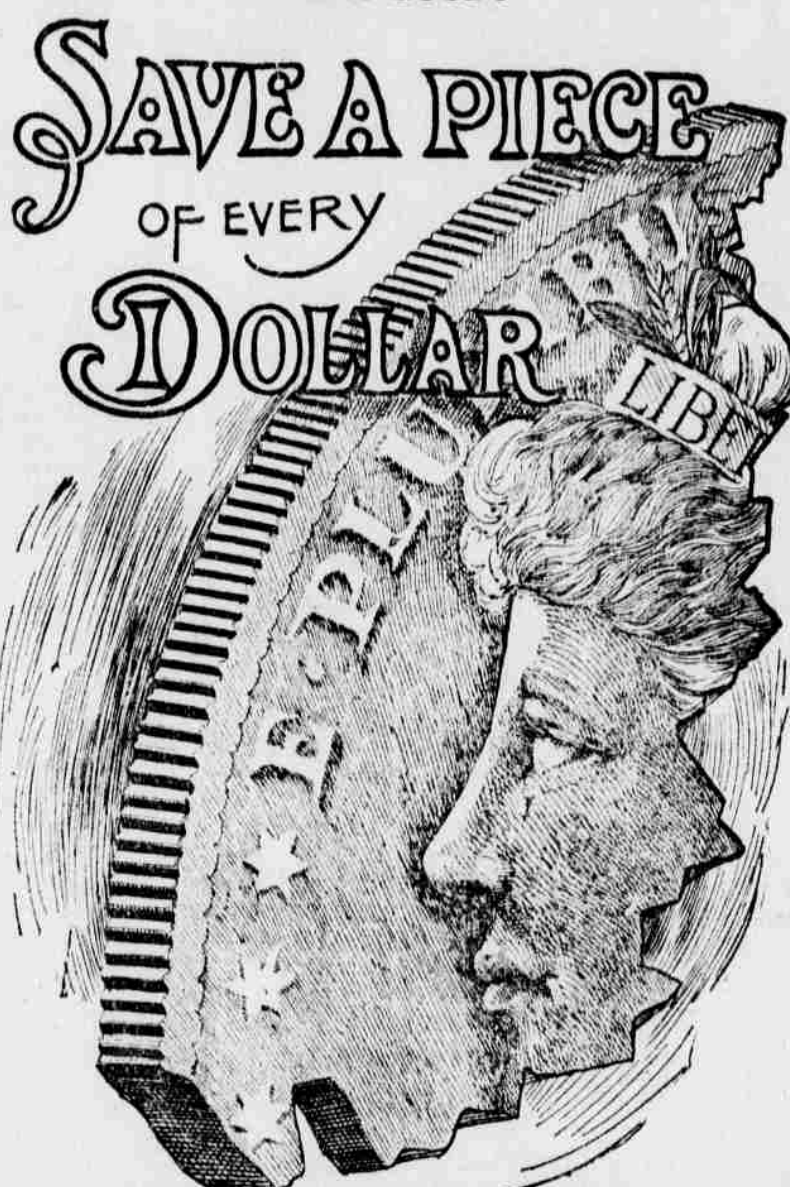

month last year and 19 1-2 per cent less than last month, which would indicate a decided decline in the amount of business transacted by the community. 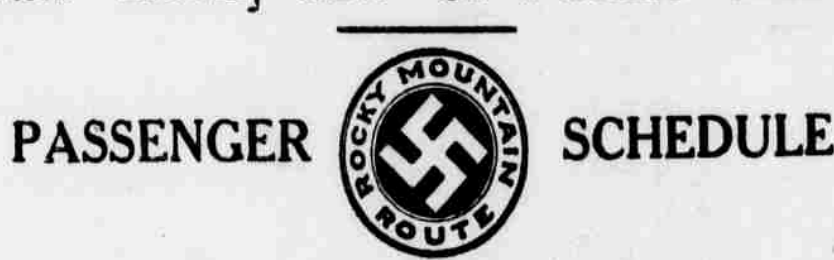

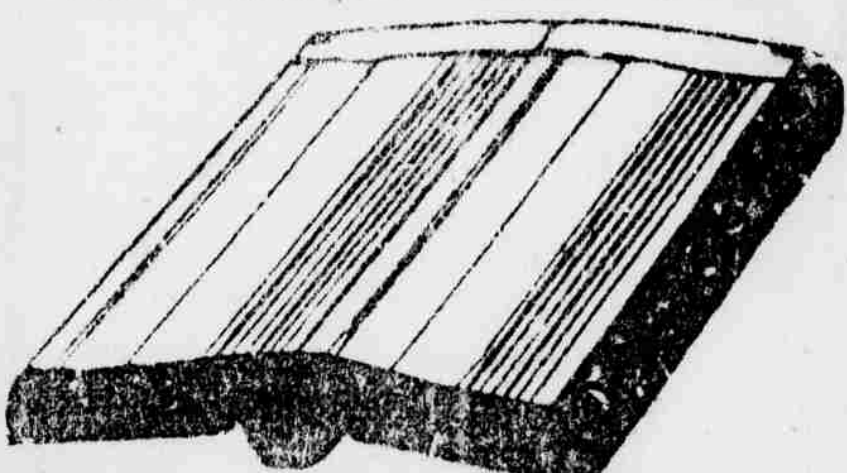

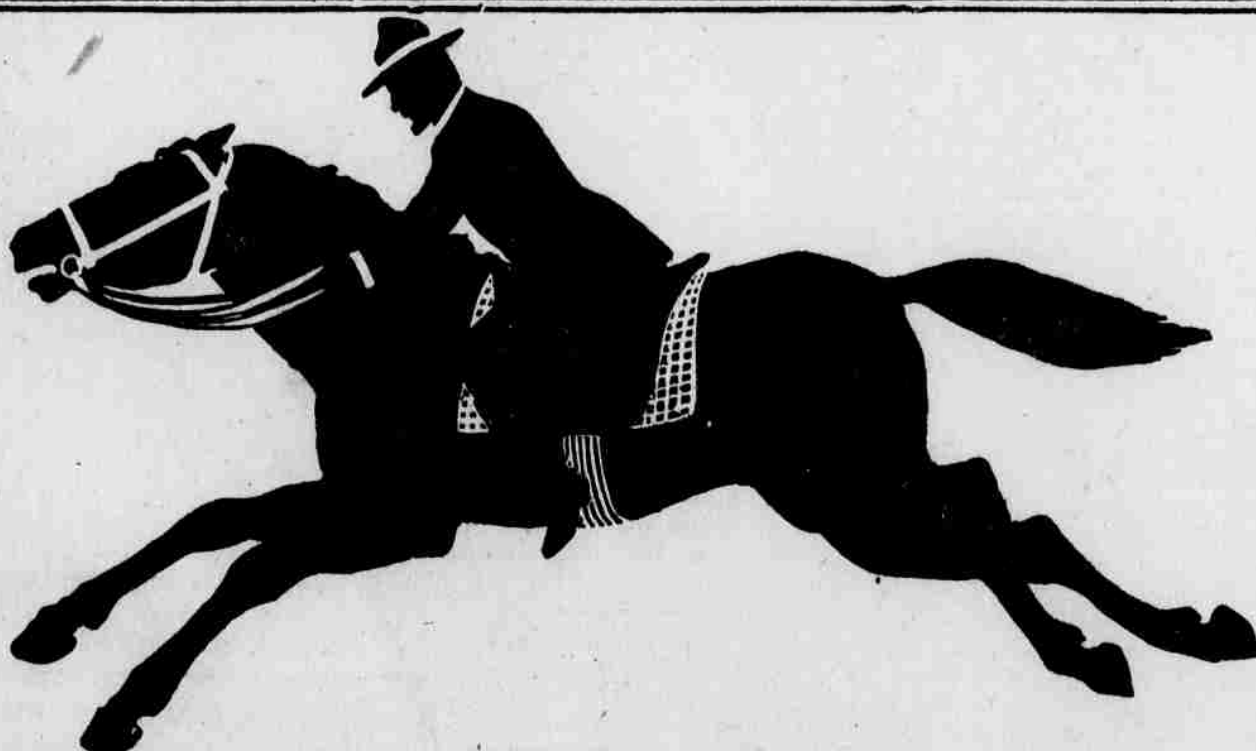

NOVEMBER AN UNCERTAIN MONTH

Climatological Record For Past Thirty-Two Years Shows That Weather Is Apt to Be Variable.

During the past thirty-two years November has had a variable climatological record at Santa Fe, according to the statistics kept by the Weather Bureau. The month may be mild with temperature running as high as 77 degrees, such as was recorded on November 2, 1878, or it may bring the first real touch of winter with a minimum temperature of 11 degrees below zero such as was recorded on November 18, 1880. Its average temperature may run as high as 44 degrees as during November 1878, which was the warmest November on record in Santa Fe, or it may be as low as 29 degrees, like the November of 1880, which was the coldest November on record. The mean temperature of November during those 32 years has been 39 degrees. The earliest date for killing frost has been September 25 and the average date for the first killing frost has been October 19, but so far this year, no killing frost has occurred, which shows that the fall has been unusually mild. The average precipitation for November has been .77 of an inch; the average number of days with .01 of an inch or more of precipitation 4; the greatest monthly precipitation was 3.39 inches in 1905; and the least monthly precipitation, nothing, in 1903. The greatest amount of precipitation recorded in any 24 consecutive hours was 1.29 inches on November 22 and 23, 1905; while the greatest amount of snowfall recorded in any 24 consecutive hours was 5 inches and occurred on November 25, 1888. The relative humidity for the month has been 48 per cent, 54 per cent at 6 a. m., and 42 per cent at 6 p. m. The average number of clear days has been 19, partly cloudy 8 and cloudy 3. The prevailing winds have been from the northeast, the average hourly velocity 6.3 miles, the highest velocity of the wind was 51 miles an hour from the southeast on November 22, 1905. Of course, these data must not be construed as a forecast, for November weather at Santa Fe is as variable as that of fickle April, except that November generally has a high average of sunshine.
