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## PRISONERS FROM GRANT COUNTY

### Eleven Brought to Prison in One Batch

### TWO CONVICTED OF MURDER

### Silver City Jail Cleaned Out at Term of District Court Just Closed.

Eleven prisoners who were convicted of felonies of various kinds, two of whom were sentenced to life imprisonment for murder, were lodged in the territorial penitentiary today. They were all found guilty of the charges against them at the recent term of the district court of Grant county.

Accompanying Sheriff C. D. Nelson of Grant county who had charge of the prisoners were Jackson Agee, treasurer of Grant county; D. J. Mooney, a member of the board of county commissioners of Grant county, and James A. Shipley, deputy district clerk at Silver City. Sheriff Nelson and party expected to leave either late this afternoon or tonight on their return to Silver City.

**Convicted of Second Degree Murder.** Joseph J. Maloy and Luis Torres are the names of the convicts who were tried for murder and were found guilty in the second degree. They were each sentenced to ninety-nine years, which of course, unless their sentences are commuted or they manage to escape, means that they will spend the remainder of their natural lives in prison. Maloy was convicted of the murder of Deputy Sheriff Charles Smith, whom he killed seven or eight months ago at Silver City. Torres murdered one of his countrymen at the old mining camp of Santa Rita, which is located in the mountains east of Silver City.

**Wife Beater Gets Six Years.** The other nine prisoners were sentenced to terms of imprisonment ranging from one to six years for lesser crimes. Francisco Arroyos whom it was alleged attempted to kill his wife was sentenced to three years for wife beating and was given three years additional for drawing a deadly weapon. The sentences will run concurrently.

Thomas Greene of Lordsburg was sentenced to five years imprisonment for burglary. George S. Johnson, George S. Kelly and John B. Porter, all of whom also hailed from Lordsburg, were given three years apiece for burglary and larceny. Virgil Gregory and Charles Farre, of Lordsburg, received a year each for larceny.

Elesio Ortega was sentenced to three years in the penitentiary for an assault with a deadly weapon and similar punishment was meted out to Jesus Salais for carrying a deadly weapon contrary to law.

Deputy Sheriff John L. Bevinside, who accompanied Sheriff Nelson and party as far as Lamy, went from there to Las Vegas with two insane patients whom he placed in the territorial asylum in the Meadow City. They were Jose Macielas of Mimbres and William Ferris, of Pinos Altos.

**Pays Compliment to Judge Parker.** The Silver City jail was depopulated as a result of the cleaning up of the criminal docket in Grant county. County Treasurer Jackson Agee was a caller at the New Mexican office this afternoon and spoke in the most complimentary terms of Judge Frank W. Parker who is the presiding jurist of the judicial district embracing Grant county. "He is one of the very best men in the country," said Mr. Agee. "He is a very fair judge and attentive to his duties. Everybody down our way admires and respects Judge Parker."

Mr. Agee in speaking of the recent Republican territorial convention at Silver City said it was well attended and the citizens, regardless of politics, were glad it was held there. He stated that the big reception tendered to Governor Curry at the Elks' opera house there Friday night was a grand success. A large number of the townspeople turned out as well as the visiting delegates who had arrived that day.

## EX-GOVERNOR LANDS VERMONT SENATORSHIP.

Proctor, Vermont, March 24.—John W. Stewart, former governor of Vermont, was appointed U. S. Senator by Governor Fletcher D. Proctor today to fill the vacancy caused by the recent death of Senator Redfield Proctor.

## NEW POSTMASTER NAMED AT DAWSON

Washington, March 24.—Upon recommendation of Delegate W. H. Andrews and the Republican territorial and county central committees and petitions of citizens, G. L. Badford has been appointed postmaster at Dawson.

## AMERICAN CAR DUE IN FRISCO

Became Lost in California Swamps Last Night—Italian Car Out of the Race For Present.

San Francisco, March 24.—The American car in the New York to Paris race was lost in the swamps near Los Banos last night. The road was found early this morning and the trip toward this city was continued. The car arrived at Gilroy at 9:45 o'clock this morning and expected to reach San Jose at 11:30 o'clock. The time for its arrival in this city is placed at about 3 p. m. Arrangements have been made to ship the car by steamer to Alaska Friday or Saturday next.

## Italian Car in Bad Fix.

Ogden, Utah, March 24.—The Italian car is out of the race for the present. The machine, badly damaged, is to be brought back to Ogden from a point 90 miles west of the old Central Pacific railroad and repaired in the local machine shops. Before the car is in running condition the French and German cars may gain the lead.

## German Car in Wyoming.

Rock River, Wyo., March 24.—The German car left here at 7 o'clock this morning. The car tied up here last night, Captain Coppen being unable to pass over the mountains during the night.

## SLAYER OF COWBOY GUILTY OF MURDER

Thomas Johnson, Ranch Foreman, Convicted Before Judge Parker at Silver City.

Silver City, N. M., March 24.—Thomas Johnson, former foreman for the Lyons Campbell Cattle company, who shot and killed Joseph M. Cox, a cowboy at Cliff, this county, in a row over \$3 was yesterday found guilty of murder in the second degree.

Sentence was deferred pending a motion for a new trial, but it is expected however, that Judge Parker will follow in Johnson's case the precedent established in the present term of court of giving second degree murderers the limit, which is 99 years in the penitentiary.

That was the sentence given Joseph J. Maloy, who killed Charles Smith, deputy sheriff of Silver City last July, and to Luis Torres for the murder of Jose Duran at Santa Rita, September, 15 last.

## PROBING ALLEGED LUMBER TRUST

Investigation Begun at St. Louis Which May Be Followed By Suits of Ouster.

St. Louis, March 24.—An investigation which may be preliminary to suits of ouster in several states against a number of lumber companies on the ground that they are in a conspiracy to control prices and stifle competition was begun here today.

The investigation follows the ouster proceedings recently instituted in the supreme court by Attorney General Herbert S. Hadley in which forty-seven lumber companies are named as defendants. Missouri and Texas are the only two states that have the power through enacted legislation of conducting such an investigation preliminary to contemplated ouster suits.

## NAVY YARDS TO RUN FULL TIME

Necessary Appropriation to Keep Them Going Is Promised Secretary Metcalf By Congress.

Washington, March 24.—Assurances having been received from the leaders in Congress that immediate action would be taken on the emergency appropriation of two million dollars for armor and armament for the navy, Secretary Metcalf today informed the committee representing the workmen of the various navy yards of the country that no layoff of workmen would be necessary. It had been reported that wholesale discharges were to be made in the navy yards of the country because of the lack of funds. The committee representing the men had presented the urgency of the matter to the Congressional committee.

## SECRETARY TAFT IN NEW JERSEY.

Trenton, N. J., March 24.—Secretary of War Taft and Baron Takahira, Japanese ambassador to the United States, spoke before the chamber of commerce last night. A special reception to the distinguished visitors took place in the assembly chamber in the state house at 7 o'clock. The two houses were in session and the galleries and lobbies were crowded with spectators. Baron Takahira spoke only briefly. Secretary Taft was given a rousing reception. He dealt with the duties of legislatures and discussed the relation of the states to the federal government.

## GREWSOME FIND IN MAIL POUCH

### Portales Postmaster Discovers Body of Babe

### INVESTIGATION IS STARTED

### Mother Used U. S. Mails to Send Remains of Dead Infant.

Portales, N. M., March 24.—The tiny body of a newly born infant was discovered in a United States mail pouch by Postmaster C. O. Leach of the local postoffice a few days ago. The package containing the grewsome object was addressed to Roy W. Carr and the return address indicated the sender to be Ida Rhodes Carr, of Woodstock, Illinois.

## How Body Was Discovered.

The parcel, a box evidently some twelve inches long and four inches wide and thick, fell out of the mail pouch along with a hundred or so of letters. It had been forwarded from Roswell, the place to which it had been originally addressed. The parcel immediately attracted attention. The clerk laid it aside. Soon the clerk notified the postmaster. It was decided that the package contained the body of some dead animal. Postmaster Leach took the liberty of opening it. Under the lid was found a note and under the note the cadaver of a newly born infant.

The note was written on a small slip of paper in pencil, in good handwriting. It read: "I don't know what else to do. Burn it or do something. Right away. Don't open." The note was unsigned, but it is in the same handwriting as that in which the parcel had been addressed.

## Officers Begin Investigation.

The postmaster summoned the sheriff, the justice of the peace and Dr. C. T. White, the health officer. Dr. White examined the remains but whether he concluded that the infant had been still born or had been killed is not known. It took just 28 cents in stamps to carry the little body. Woodstock, Illinois, the address given by Ida Carr, has been notified and also Postoffice Inspector McKee, of Denver.

Roy Carr, to whom the terrible gift was sent, is evidently a Woodstock resident. He had been at Roswell and to that place the package was originally addressed. From there he came to Portales, leaving a forward address. With the postmaster here he had left word to have all his mail sent to Woodstock, the place from which the package came.

**Arrests Will Follow.** The postoffice inspectors have not yet had time to discover who the man and woman are. If they are man and wife, which the similarity of their names might imply, there would seem to be no reason for the secrecy or for the woman's appeal to have the body cremated. The deed is evidently the horrible climax of some act of love and shame. The body was very decomposed and it will be hard to tell as to whether the infant was still born, died a natural death after birth or was killed by neglect or force.

Arrests will immediately follow.

## TAMMANY HALL TO BE WELL REPRESENTED

Present Indications Point to Record Breaking Delegation From New York at Denver.

New York, March 24.—From present indications New York City will send almost a record breaking delegation to the Democratic national convention at Denver in July. It is estimated that Tammany hall will be represented by not less than fourteen hundred members. At first it was thought that the delegation would be far below that usually found at the national conventions, but Thomas F. Smith, secretary of Tammany Hall, now announces that the party will be if anything, larger than usual.

## WEALTHY STOCKMAN FACES SERIOUS CHARGE.

Omaha, Neb., March 24.—John A. Wishard, a prominent and wealthy stockman of Stanton county, was arrested today on a charge of violating the federal banking laws. The indictment was returned by the federal grand jury at Marshall, Texas. Wishard appeared before the U. S. court commissioner and arranged to give bond for his appearance before the U. S. court at Marshall. Wishard is heavily interested in the cattle business in Texas. He declares he does not know the meaning of the indictment.

## SCORE HURT IN KENTUCKY WRECK

### Passenger Train Collides With Freight

### OPERATOR NOT ON DUTY

### Had Been Laid Off and Freight Was Running Without Orders.

Lexington, Ky., March 24.—Twenty persons were injured, four fatally in a wreck of a passenger train between Burgh and Highbridge early today on the Queen and Crescent railway. The wreck was caused by a collision between the Blue Grass Special and a fast freight train. The freight is said to have come through Burgh without orders, the night operator having been laid off and the day operator not having reported for duty.

The trains came together with a terrific crash. Both engines were demolished and several coaches of the passenger train were telescoped. The fatally injured are all trainmen and include the two engine crews. The wreck tied up all traffic on the road the greater part of the day.

## YOUTH IS ARRESTED ON SERIOUS CHARGE

Pedro A. Sandoval is Accused of Using Mails With Intent to Defraud and is in Jail.

Accused of using the mails with intent to defraud, Pedro R. Sandoval was arrested yesterday afternoon by Sheriff Charles C. Closson and is being held in jail here pending the arrival of a postoffice inspector from Denver. The circumstances surrounding the case are rather peculiar.

A Mrs. Martin, of Denver, recently made inquiries through the newspapers of her home city as to the whereabouts of her young son James Martin who had run away and had not been heard from since. Sandoval it is alleged wrote to Mrs. Martin stating that he knew where her son was and requested that the boy had asked him to write to her for \$35.

Instead of sending the money as requested a brother of Mrs. Martin came to this city at once to find the missing boy and if possible, take him back to Denver. It appears that he doubted the story Sandoval is said to have written to Mrs. Martin and to satisfy his suspicions addressed a decoy letter to Sandoval. Sandoval called at the postoffice yesterday afternoon and was given the decoy letter. It stated that a money order for the amount mentioned was at the Wells-Fargo Express company's office and it was there fifteen or twenty minutes later Sandoval was taken into custody.

The young man who is accused of using the mails with intent to defraud is a deaf mute, and received a liberal education in a college at Washington.

## KANSAS CITY BANK TO RE-OPEN MONDAY

Reorganization of Commerce National Has Been Perfected—Ridgelys to Control.

Kansas City, March 24.—The National Bank of Commerce, which failed recently with liabilities of thirty-nine millions, will re-open for business on Monday next, with W. B. Ridgely, comptroller of the currency, as president; George T. Cutts, formerly of New York, and St. Louis, vice-president; Edward Ridgely, New York, cashier.

The first legal move in the reorganization plan was taken yesterday when the stockholders met and formally voted to increase the capital stock from one million to two million dollars and to increase the number of directors from fifteen to twenty-one.

Tomorrow the stockholders will meet and formally pay over to Receiver Cutts \$2,550,000. This money will represent the additional one million dollars capital and the money subscribed to take up slow paper held by the bank.

## TWO PRISONERS ARE DISCHARGED FROM PRISON.

Thomas Price and Daniel Roibal were discharged from the Territorial penitentiary today, having served their terms of imprisonment less the time allowed for good behavior. Price was sentenced to two and one half years from Lincoln county and Roibal to one year from San Miguel county. The latter was a federal prisoner, having been convicted of a violation of the Edmunds' act.

## EXPRESS COMPANIES MUST OBEY LAW

Attorney General of Nebraska Refuses to Dismiss Pending Litigation.

Lincoln, Neb., March 24.—In a letter to Attorney R. W. Breckenridge, of Omaha, Attorney General Thompson declares he will never dismiss the cases pending against the express companies doing business in Nebraska. This declaration was in answer to a suggestion from Attorney Breckenridge that the litigation be ended:

"I know of no conduct on the part of the express companies that merits the clemency you suggest. They have shown little or no disposition to obey the law. On the contrary they have manifested a reckless disregard for the law and have defied it in nearly every instance. Their attitude has been exasperating and reprehensible."

Suits have been started in the supreme court to enforce the Sibley act reducing express rates 25 per cent. Complaints have also been filed in the county court alleging that the express companies have failed to state the salaries of their officials in their annual reports.

## COUNTRY RESUMING NORMAL CONDITION

The "October Panic" is Already a Thing of the Past—Railroad Business Picking Up.

Washington, March 24.—Every indication points to an improvement generally in the railroad and industrial situation of the country, according to reports made by the great railway systems of America to the interstate commerce commission. These reports are to the effect that, while the railroads suffered to some extent by what has come to be referred to as the "October Panic," the loss was by no means so serious as generally has been supposed.

It appears from the reports that the effect was felt particularly by the eastern lines and by the lines in the southeastern part of the country, a few of which were embarrassed, not only by a falling off of revenues, but by their inability to obtain ready cash with which to carry on improvements which they had begun while the western lines and the trans-continental roads have not suffered materially from the financial depression. The figures available to the interstate commerce commission indicate also that the general condition in the country is improving materially, with a prospect that it soon will be normal or better.

## MURDERER GETS LIFE SENTENCE

Frank Berlin, Alias Frank Brown, Given Maximum Penalty For Killing George S. Van Sickle.

Alamogordo, N. M., March 24.—Frank Berlin, alias Frank Brown, but who, when asked by Judge Mann what his real name was, said it was Stephen Berlin, was on Saturday sentenced to 99 years in the territorial penitentiary by Judge Mann for the murder of George S. Van Sickle at Orogrande last spring. In this case, the defendant entered his plea to guilty of second degree murder, rather than go to trial. It is said here that Berlin is a deserter from the United States army and for that reason assumed his various aliases.

Court is practically over here, the jury having been discharged by the court last Saturday morning. During this term, but one criminal case was tried by jury, which resulted in an acquittal. The jury has been busy, however on civil cases, and Judge Mann has succeeded in clearing the docket of this county and getting rid of much dragging litigation.

## MURDER NEGRO IN COLD BLOOD

Night Riders Drag Helpless Man From Bed and Shoot Him Down—No Motive For Crime Known.

Hopkinsville, Ky., March 24.—Thirty night riders invaded Gold Pond, in Trigg county, last midnight and there dragged a negro in the employ of the Independent Tobacco Growers' association from his bed and commanded him to run. When he failed to obey the riders, they began firing at him. Two bullets penetrated his body and he was found in a dying condition near his home today. No motive is known for the crime.

## ITINERARY OF BATTLESHIP FLEET SETTLED UPON.

Washington, March 24.—It was decided at a cabinet meeting today to accept the invitation of China to have the battleship fleet visit a port of that country on its return voyage from the Pacific. It was also decided not to accept any further invitations. All other stops except at places where invitations have already been accepted will be strictly for coaling purposes.

## HEAVY FREEZE IN MESILLA VALLEY

### Hail and Snow Accompany Drop in Temperature

### DAMAGE TO FRUIT FEARED

### Fog Protected Trees to Some Extent—Considerable Rain Also Fell.

Anthony, N. M., March 24.—The hail storm of Sunday followed by the drop in temperature during the afternoon and night did a great deal of damage to fruit trees in this vicinity. There was a heavy frost and the damage done by the hail storm in the afternoon was increased by the freeze during the night. On account of the warm days during the past two weeks, early fruit trees were in bloom and leaving out. While it is impossible to tell just how much is destroyed, it is certain the loss is considerable.

## Protected by Fog.

Las Cruces, N. M., March 24.—A heavy fog is all that protected crops in this vicinity Sunday night from damage by the extreme cold weather. Sunday was very cold and disagreeable. At night the temperature sank into the 30's and only the foggy night saved the fruit. As it is the loss will be slight, although lower down the valley great damage is reported.

## Storm at El Paso.

El Paso, Tex., March 24.—The heaviest rain of the year, accompanied by hail, which in connection with the low temperature recorded possibly did some damage to the fruit crop of the valley, visited El Paso and vicinity Sunday.

During the day a total of .32 of an inch of rain fell, which was by far the heaviest shower of the year, in fact being practically the only one worth recording. Preceding the rain, a heavy hail storm raged for several minutes, accompanied by a sudden drop in the temperature of about twenty degrees.

The storm seemed to be general over this section according to reports received here. The weather reports show that as far east as Del Rio a rainfall of .22 of an inch was recorded, while a trace of rain and a light snow fell at Santa Fe.

## Snow in Southern New Mexico.

Snow fell in the mountains to the north of Anthony Sunday and all along the ridge of the mountains to the north for over one hundred miles. At Engle, Sierra county, the snow drifted and was several inches deep.

Passengers arriving yesterday from Silver City state that a blizzard, accompanied by a heavy fall of snow, visited that city Sunday afternoon and night. At Deming, a heavy, warm rain fell, and between Deming and Rincon there was another heavy fall of snow.

It rained Sunday in the Mesilla valley and there was quite a heavy frost there yesterday morning, which made the fruit growers fear for the safety of their crops.

## DEATH CLAIMS ENGLISH DUKE

Spencer Compton Cavendish a Victim of Heart Failure—Prominent in Public Life.

Cannes, March 24.—Spencer Compton Cavendish, eighth duke of Devonshire, died here today of heart failure. He was born July 23, 1833.

## Leader in Politics.

London, March 24.—The death of the Duke of Devonshire leaves a gap in the public life of Great Britain for he had a large following in the country and as president of the Unionists Free Trade League, he took an active part in the campaign against tariff reform. Few men had spent a more active political life than the Duke. He had been almost continuously a cabinet member in charge of some important department. He was twice offered the premiership, but both times refused.

The Duke left no immediate family and the Dukedom passes to his nephew, Earl Cavendish, who married a daughter of Lord Lansdowne.

## INQUIRY BEGUN INTO ANARCHIST'S DEATH.

Chicago, March 24.—Coroner Hoffman today commenced taking evidence in the inquest on the body of Lazarus Averbuch who was killed by Chief of Police Shipley three weeks ago after he had attempted to assassinate the chief. To prevent any demonstration of anarchists or other reckless persons a strong guard was placed about the room where the proceedings were held.

## THE STAMP ACT OF MARCH 22, 1765.

The "Stamp Act" which was passed by the British Parliament, March 22, 1765, by a majority of 294 to 42, was a stupid piece of tyranny whose object seemed to be to insult the already outraged American colonists and to goad them into open rebellion. During the debate Charles Townsend spoke of the colonies as planted by the care of England. It was then that Colonel Barre, an Irish member, broke out in brilliant defense of the colonies.

"They planted by your care!" he exclaimed. "No your oppression planted them in America." They nourished by your indulgence! They grew by your neglect of them. "As soon as you began to care about them, that care was exercised in sending persons to rule them in one department and another, who were perhaps, the deputies to some member of this house, sent to spy out their liberties, to misrepresent their actions, and to prey upon them; men whose behavior on many occasions has caused the blood of the sons of Liberty to recoil within them. You call England the mother country, and she has proved herself a step mother."

The celebrated Irish statesman Edmund Burke and several English members also opposed the passage of the measure, but it was passed. It provided that every business document was illegal and void unless written on paper bearing the government stamp the prices rated from one shilling, upwards according to the importance of the document. Thus the bed-rock principle: "No taxation without representation," for which the American colonists had persistently struggled, was ruthlessly violated, and trampled under foot.

The result in America, as we might have been expected. In the Virginia legislature the immortal Patrick Henry made that glorious speech, that will live as long as the republic exists. What school child does not know it! "Caesar had his Brutus, Charles the First, his Cromwell, and George the Third—'Treason!' cried the speaker. 'Treason!' treason!" echoed from every part of the house. But Henry was not a man to be intimidated, by such slavish outcries; he did not hesitate an instant, but rising to a loftier attitude, he concluded with the firmest emphasis, "May profit by their example. If this is treason make the most of it!"

The Massachusetts Assembly met the same week as that of the legislature of Virginia, and sent letters, in the names of the house to every assembly as far south as South Carolina, inviting them to assemble and take action on the crisis they were in. As the assemblies met they pronounced the stamp act illegal and nine assemblies appointed their delegates in answer to the invitation of Massachusetts. Thus originated the first Continental Congress.

During the following summer bales of stamped paper arrived, and the commissions for the new officers to sell the stamps. This was the signal for the expression of popular indignation. The collectors were hanged in effigy; they were waited on and compelled to decline acting. When a vessel arrived in the harbor of New York, with stamps on board the vessel was boarded, the packages of stamps seized—taken on shore, and a bonfire made of them.

In South Carolina the stamp act was publicly burned, while the bells of Charleston tolled, and the flags on the ships in the harbor were hung at half-mast. These examples were followed by all the colonies and the indignation thus aroused, never waned, in any of them. At length, on March 18, of the following year, the ministers seeing the blunder they had made urged the repeal of the infamous stamp act—their creatures obeyed them in this as they had done for its enactment; and it was repealed on that day, by a majority of 275 to 167. Great joy followed the repeal, as it was regarded as a triumph of liberty, and in the exuberance of their feelings, full length portraits of Barre and Conway, another friend of the Colonies, were ordered to be placed in Faneuil Hall, Boston. A statue of George III, cast in lead, was set up in the Bowling Green, New York, and it may be added that his statue was taken down and cast into bullets, of which good use was made during the Revolution. And thus the notorious stamp act was passed—repealed, and wiped out of existence.

It should be remembered that the

name of Barre is perpetuated in America in the name of the Pennsylvania town—Wilkes-Barre.

## THE SILVER CITY CONVENTION.

Saturday's Republican convention at Silver City was a grand affair from every standpoint. A great outpouring of representative Republicans from all the counties except one was unexpected and therefore all the more gratifying. The personnel of the convention contained many of the best, most progressive and most valuable citizens of the Sunshine Territory. The deliberations were dignified and in every way proper.

The sentiments of the Republicans of this great territory were expressed in terse, but yet convincing and powerful language. They leave no room to doubt which side the 35,000 Republicans of the territory are on. The loyal and true Republicans then and there assembled showed that they had taken no stock whatever in the libels and slanders on some of the leading men of their party by a few yellow sheets of no politics except those dictated by greed, graft and venom and by self interest. The delegation selected to represent New Mexico at the Republican national convention in Chicago is a very creditable one and the selection of Hon. Solomon Luna for another term as a member from New Mexico on the Republican national committee meets with approval everywhere.

The resolutions declare strong approval of the Roosevelt policies, not excluding the deserved and timely removal of a fake reform ex-governor. They stand strongly by the policies and official actions of Governor Curry as good an executive and as able, honorable and farseeing an executive as has any one of the 45 states under Uncle Sam's dominion. They speak in no uncertain tones in acknowledgment of the efficient and very beneficial services of New Mexico's tried and hard working delegate in Congress W. H. Andrews. They sound the slogan for statehood and indicate in no uncertain tones that the people of New Mexico are united and firm in this demand. They proclaimed fully their approval of the conduct of the political campaigns of those charged with such conduct and expressed their confidence in their ability and honesty. They acknowledge in no unmistakable language the valuable services of the fifty Republican newspapers in the territory, excluding of course, the morning yellow sheet in Albuquerque, and express their gratitude for the valuable services rendered by the Republican press. They requested the Congress of the United States to pass the bill introduced by Delegate Andrews to create a seventh judicial district here and to extend the provisions of the Carey act to this territory. They endorse and commend the work heretofore done by the board of control of the National Irrigation Congress and pledge to do what they can to make the congress a success.

The delegates did what was expected of them. They placed their party on record unequivocally as true to Republican principles, approving the good accomplished by the Republican party of the nation and Territory and naming as Taft instructed delegates, men who will make themselves felt in the national gathering and will be no discredit to New Mexico from any standpoint, but who will size up very favorably with delegates from the greater states of the union.

The convention made a splendid record and its members are entitled to the thanks of the Republicans of the Sunshine Territory for the carrying out of the wishes of their constituents in such complete and satisfactory manner.

The Albuquerque morning yellow sheet heads a false, misleading and shady account of the work of the Republican territorial convention on last Saturday in its yesterday's issue as follows: "Sentiment points plainly to the end of Andrews in New Mexico affairs." The head line is a deliberate falsehood conceived in iniquity and published with malice aforethought. Absolutely nothing happened at the convention that sustains the lie. The sentiment for and the appreciation of Delegate W. H. Andrews' valuable service during the past three years as a delegate from New Mexico in the Congress of the United States was universal, sincere and true and was voiced in unequivocal terms in the resolutions unanimously adopted.

## THE YELLOW SHEET'S OPPOSITION AS POLITICAL CAPITAL.

That the hatred and malicious attacks of the Albuquerque morning yellow sheet form a good political recommendation was once more demonstrated by the results of the Republican territorial convention at Silver City. Holme O. Bursum who has been constantly and continually libeled by the Albuquerque sheet, was chosen unanimously as one of the six delegates to the Republican national convention. Colonel W. H. H. Llewellyn who has been outrageously slandered by the sheet is another of the delegates. Ex-Governor M. A. Otero, who was incessantly persecuted by the yellow publication and whose successful nine years' administration is still being called an era of graft and public debauchery by the yellow Albuquerque contemporary, heads the delegation to Chicago. Judge Albert B. Fall who was denounced by the same paper for his attack upon the horde of special agents, etc., and who, the sheet intimated, was in co-operation with land thieves, is a fourth member of this delegation. Charles A. Spess who was attacked by innuendo and openly by the Santa Fe correspondent of the Albuquerque morning yellow sheet, during the recent Federal grand jury investigations, is the fifth member, and the sixth member is Hon. Thomas B. Catron, who, as attorney for Ricardo Alarid, came in for his share of vituperation by the paper. Among the alternates is noted Gregory Page who only a few days ago was pilloried as the author of a plank in the McKinley county Republican platform, denouncing the yellow sheet, Delegate W. H. Andrews and the party leaders, who are the special object's of the paper's venomous attacks, were endorsed and praised. Hon. Solomon Luna, whom it was sought to injure by charging terrible election frauds, in Valencia county, was endorsed for national committee. Yet, that paper professes itself to be well satisfied with the outcome of the convention, although at the same time it continues its unceasing attacks upon the men and principles endorsed and honored by the convention. Truly, it is to laugh, and the victims of the fakir sheet's malice, can well afford to be proud of its continued attacks upon them, although for the sake of decency, district attorneys and grand juries should do their duty and bring the sheet to the bar of justice for its outrageous libels and slanders upon the leaders of the Republican party.

## A DEMOCRATIC PHANTOM.

That the fear of a heavy Democratic vote in eastern New Mexico, although carefully nursed and emphasized by the Democrats, is without grounds, is shown by the vote cast at the Democratic primaries in Roswell last week. Although there was a heated contest over the nomination for city clerk, and an effort was made to bring out every Democratic and doubtful vote, the total vote cast was only 560, although two years ago Larrazolo received 800 votes in Roswell. At Artesia, this month, a bitterly contested local option election brought out only 213 votes, although two years before at the general election, 315 votes were cast. At a recent local election, Texico, went Republican by eight votes, and Elida also went Republican. Of course, the Albuquerque yellow journal makes it serve its nefarious purpose to proclaim loudly that the Democratic vote of eastern New Mexico will swamp the Republican ticket this fall, but as a matter of certainty the eastern counties will be found to be more evenly politically divided than ever before, and the vote polled, owing to the fact that many of the newcomers will not be entitled to vote or are not sufficiently interested as yet in territorial affairs or have neglected to qualify, will not be much larger, except in a few localities, than two years ago. The chances for Republican success this fall, with leaders like Governor Curry, National Committeeman Solomon Luna, Hon. H. O. Bursum, Delegate Andrews and the host of old timers now working in harmony, and joined with the energetic new blood, are better than they have been at any time before in the history of the territory.

Too many cutting affrays, too much bad whiskey and too much carrying of knives seem to be conditions now in this city and this is not at all pleasant to contemplate. Within a very few weeks two stabbing affrays evidently caused by the use of poisonous liquor have occurred. They are a disgrace and a shame. The principal in one of these affrays has been indicted, tried and convicted and sentenced to the penitentiary. This should have been a warning to the man who did the stabbing last Saturday night. Disreputable saloons and bawdy houses in this city should be suppressed and that speedily by the authorities.

It should be pleasing to the people of the territory that the newspapers here are nearly all Republican in politics. The people will not be worried or disgusted with too many campaign lies. This will be left to the papers controlled by "our friends, the enemy" and as their number is small and their circulation limited, their influence can not be very great.

Some newspapers throughout the country have claimed that Secretary Taft can not be elected if nominated. Nevertheless the secretary will take his chances and trust to the good sense and patriotism of the American people.

"The West Point of the Southwest."  
Army Officer Detailed by War Department. Army Inspectors RANK SCHOOL IN CLASS "A."

### PARTICULARS OF LOS TANOS ACCIDENT

Carelessness of Boy Resulted in Explosion of Dynamite Which Cost Two Lives.

Los Tanos, N. M., March 24.—An investigation by the coroner's jury into the frightful accident which occurred here last Wednesday, costing the lives of two persons and serious injuries to three others, shows that it was due to the carelessness of a boy.

Seawright who was in charge of the drilling of the city well, gave one of his assistants instructions to place several sticks of dynamite in the oven of the cook stove in his home to thaw out so as to be able to blast the well at an early hour. The explosive was placed in the stove by a 15-year-old boy who forgot and closed the oven door. The stove was very hot and in a few minutes a terrific explosion followed, completely wrecking the small frame house and instantly killing Teleforo Chaves and Eduardo Valverde, two well drillers and seriously injuring Seawright. Mrs. Seawright and Emelio Crespin.

The injured were taken at once to Santa Rosa for surgical attention. It was found necessary to amputate Seawright's right leg, because it was so badly mangled.

**TAX DODGER****LOSES POSITION**

Mayor of New York Separates Delinquent Official From Soft Snap.

New York, March 24.—Tax Commissioner N. J. Muller was removed from office last night by Mayor McClellan. In his letter to Muller announcing the dismissal, the mayor explains that during his term of office, Muller's duty assessed taxes, with penalties and interest amounting to thousands of dollars have remained unpaid. He also called attention to the fact that Muller appeared to be the heaviest delinquent tax payer in the borough of Richmond, his home county, and that the city was compelled to advertise his property for sale.

Muller, who is 70 years of age, was for years the Democratic leader of Richmond, and is the owner of much land on Staten Island. He was appointed tax commissioner June 7th, 1904, by Mayor McClellan. The salary of the office is \$7,000 a year.

**FOUR ALDERMEN TO BE ELECTED**

Also Five Members of School Board at Coming City Election in Addition to Mayor and Other Officials.

Santa Fe Republicans and Democrats will both have their city conventions on April 1 and its dollars to doughnuts somebody is going to get fooled. The Republicans will meet at the court house in the afternoon to complete their city ticket and the Democrats will gather at the same place in the evening on a similar mission.

The mayoralty contest it is believed will narrow down to Jose D. Sena and Charles Haspelmath, the former as the Republican nominee and the latter as the candidate of the Democrats. Mayor T. B. Catron who was elected two years ago on a fusion ticket, has, it is said, decided not to run for re-election as head of the city administration. The Socialists may possibly put up a ticket of their own or else join forces with the Democrats.

Five members of the city board of education and four members of the city council are to be elected at the coming city election. One of the vacancies in the school board was caused by the resignation of A. C. Ireland. S. Spitz was appointed to fill the vacancy but this appointment only holds good until the election when a permanent successor to fill out the unexpired term of two years will be elected.

The members of the school board whose terms expire this year are Judge N. B. Laughlin of the First ward, Charles F. Easley of the Second ward, Thomas B. Catron, of the Third ward and James L. Seligman of the Fourth ward. The hold-over members of the board are Jose D. Sena, Jose C. Sanchez and Jose Segura. Mr. Segura has been absent from the city for some time but has not resigned and it is understood that he intends returning shortly.

Four aldermen will be elected, one from each ward. The councilmen whose terms expire this year are Alderman H. S. Kaune, of the First ward; Alderman Marcellino Garcia, of the Second ward; Alderman Celso Lopez, of the Third ward, and Alderman Teodosio Castillo of the Fourth ward. Two of the retiring members are Republicans and the other two are Democrats. Of the four hold-over aldermen are also two Republicans and two Democrats. They are Alderman George W. Armijo, of the First ward; Alderman Pedro Quintana, of the Second ward; Alderman John H. Walker, of the Third ward, and Alderman Roman L. Baca, of the Fourth ward.

**STABBING NOT IN FRONT OF SALOON**

So Says One of Proprietors of St. Elmo Club—Claims It Took Place on Water Street.

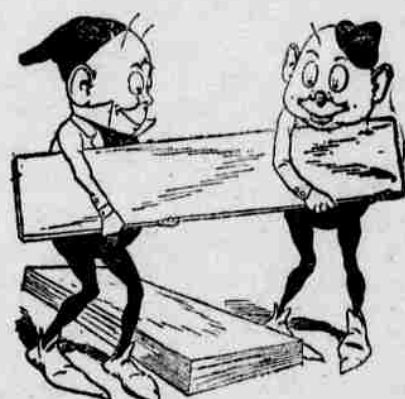
