## POPS FIGHT OVER PLATFORM

### Conglomeration of Freakish and Silly Planks

### HOT TIME AT ST. LOUIS

### Rows Occupy Attention of the Delegates--Speeches Border on Anarchy.

St. Louis, Mo., April 3.—(Bulletin 4 p. m.)—Thomas Watson of Atlanta, Georgia, and Samuel W. Williams of Vincennes, Indiana, were nominated by the Populist party for president and vice-president respectively.

St. Louis, Mo., April 3.—The platform to be submitted to the Populist convention was completed at day-break after an all-night session of the committee on resolutions. Much consideration was given the money plank and when it was finally accepted by a majority vote of the committee it was not acceptable to the minority and a fight over its phraseology on the floor of the convention is certain. A debate is also expected on the tariff plank. As prepared by the committee this plank declared that the issuing of money is a function of the government alone and should not be delegated to any corporation or industry. The demand is made that money be issued direct to the people without the intervention of banks and be full legal tender for all debts, both public and private.

**Pending Currency Bills Denounced.**  
The present working of the national banking law is criticised and a demand is made that the power to issue money be taken from the banks. The Aldrich currency bill is denounced as is also the Fowler currency bill. The plank on trusts demands that the government own and control the railroads and all public utilities which, in their nature, are monopolies. The ownership of general telegraph and telephone and telegraph lines and a parcels post is also asked. The taxation of monopoly privileges while they remain in private hands is another feature of this plank. The initiative and referendum and the power to recall from office all disloyal and inefficient representatives is advocated.

**No End of Planks.**  
Other planks are the enactment of legislation looking to the improvement of conditions for the wage-earners, the abolition of child labor and the suppression of sweat shops, the abolition of convict labor as opposed to free labor and the exclusion of foreign pauper labor, an eight-hour work day and legislation in favor of safety appliances for workmen, the enactment of an employers' liability act within constitutional bounds, the immediate adoption of precautionary measures to prevent a repetition of the recent mining disasters, work on public improvements in times of depression for unemployed men, the passage of a law prohibiting the courts from assuming jurisdiction involving the constitutionality of any law enacted by Congress and approved by the president, the maintenance of farmers' organizations and the extension of their power and influence.

**The First Clash.**  
The first clash in the convention came on the report of the committee on permanent organization that George A. Honnecker, of New Jersey, be made permanent chairman. W. B. Jones of Nebraska moved as a substitute that the temporary organization be made permanent. Chairman Coxey asked him to withdraw the motion and upon his refusal the substitute was lost by a vote of 486 to 281. Honnecker was then elected permanent chairman.

**Anarchistic Address.**  
Honnecker made an address of considerable length in which he vigorously attacked the courts of the country under whose ruling he declared many gross injustices had been committed. He also attacked the Democratic party for its conduct toward President Cleveland in the railroad strike of 1894 and the Republican party for sending troops into Idaho during the strike of the miners several years ago. Honnecker deprecated the present industrial situation of the country and declared that the opportune time for a revolution was present and asserted that it only needs the "genius of Robespierre and the eloquence of Danton to set the country ablaze." Following his address the report of the committee on resolutions was presented.

**Row Over Resolutions.**  
The report of the committee on resolutions was attacked by T. H. Tibbles a statesman from Nebraska, who said

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## TAFT FRIEND OF SOLDIER

In an Address on "The Army of the United States" He Urges Better Treatment of Enlisted Men.

Columbus, O., April 3.—Secretary of War William H. Taft rounded out a busy day here yesterday by speaking last night at the annual dinner of the Columbus Board of Trade. The secretary arrived here during the day and spent the greater part of the forenoon in his rooms at the Chittenden hotel, engaged in the preparation of his speech and disposing of official business. In the afternoon he held a conference with V. I. Vorys, manager of his canvass for the presidential nomination, and other prominent Republican leaders of the state. Later the secretary held an informal reception for Governor Harris and other state officials and the candidates on the Republican state ticket, who had been called to Columbus by the meeting of the Republican state central committee for the purpose of perfecting the state organization.

Secretary Taft left this morning for Chicago, where he will remain over tomorrow.

At the annual dinner of the Columbus Board of Trade at Memorial hall last night about 1200 guests were seated at the tables and the galleries were filled with ladies.

Secretary Taft's subject was "The Army of the United States," and in an address of about an hour's length he pleaded for better treatment of the nation's soldiers. He told of what had been done to bring the regular army to a higher standard of efficiency and of what it is hoped to accomplish. He urged the people of the country to learn the lesson taught by past experience and to prepare for war before the arbitrament of the sword might become necessary. The address was listened to with deep interest and was frequently applauded.

## MITCHELL TURNS DOWN BIG JOB

Declines Offer of Special Commissioner to Study Labor Conditions in Panama Canal Zone.

Washington, April 3.—John Mitchell, former president of the United Mine Workers of America, called on President Roosevelt today and on leaving the White House he said the president had offered him the position of special commissioner to study and report labor conditions in the Panama canal zone. Mitchell said he was unable to accept it as it was necessary for him to recover his health before he could take up work of any kind.

## GERMAN CAR IN UTAH; ITALIAN IN CALIFORNIA.

Ogden, Utah, April 3.—The German car in the New York to Paris race departed from here at 10:30 o'clock this morning without undergoing any repairs.

## TROOPS CLASH WITH RIOTERS

### Blood Flows in Streets of Italy's Capital

### GENERAL STRIKE FOLLOWS

### Martial Law Proclaimed in Rome as Result of Serious Disorders.

Rome, April 3.—A general strike was proclaimed as a protest against the fatalities in connection with the disorders on the streets here yesterday, when the troops fired on and killed three rioters and wounded fifteen others, four mortally. The strike was not very successful on the start and most of the shops remained open.

**City Under Martial Law.**  
The government has taken energetic action to restore order and the whole garrison of the city was held in readiness. Several demonstrations were broken up by charges of troops with fixed bayonets. Seventy anarchists were surrounded by troops and arrested.

**Mail Carriers Join Strikers.**  
By noon the movement became more general. The drivers of mail wagons used to collect mail from the street boxes refused to continue work and were replaced by soldiers. The wagons are being escorted by cavalry. One of the men injured yesterday died today.

## ANTI-GAMBLING STATUTE DOES NOT APPLY TO SLOT MACHINES

### Judge Edward A. Mann Renders Exhaustive Opinion in Case of Territory vs. Charles R. Jones

### DEFENDANT SECURES RELEASE ON HABEAS CORPUS WRIT

### Decision Just Handed Down Settles Mooted Question Which Has Been Much Discussed Since New Law Became Operative.

Judge Edward A. Mann, of Alamogordo, presiding over the Sixth judicial district, in an opinion just handed down in the habeas corpus proceedings of Charles R. Jones, of Santa Rosa, who was arrested on two separate charges of violating the anti-gambling law, first by operating and running gambling games, and second by running a lottery, the court holds that the anti-gambling statute enacted by the Thirty-seventh Legislative Assembly and which became operative on January 1 last, does not apply to slot machines. The defendant therefore is discharged from custody by the court on the ground that the complaints against him do not charge an offense under the statutes of the territory. As the opinion settles a much mooted question it is printed in full herewith:

**Review of Case.**  
In the District Court of the Sixth Judicial District of the Territory of New Mexico, Within and for the County of Guadalupe.

In Re, Charles R. Jones, Habeas Corpus.  
One Charles R. Jones was arrested on two separate criminal warrants issued by a justice of the peace of Guadalupe county, based upon complaints, duly sworn to, charging him with two separate offenses against the laws of the Territory. First, running and operating gambling games. Second, running a lottery.

Jones, while under arrest and in the nominal custody of the sheriff of Guadalupe county, filed his application for writ of habeas corpus in the district court of Otero county, setting out the facts substantially as contained in the stipulation herein-after referred to. A writ was issued to Martin Serrano, sheriff of Guadalupe county, and on January 10th the said Serrano appeared before this court with the said Jones in custody and made due return to the writ, setting up his warrant as cause for holding said Jones in custody.

Counsel thereupon entered into a written stipulation of facts which is as follows:

"It is hereby stipulated and agreed by and between the undersigned, that the following facts shall be and constitute the basis upon which the court may act in determining its action upon this application for writ of habeas corpus.

"That on the 13th day of January, 1908, the relator, Jones, being the owner and proprietor of a saloon in Santa Rosa, Guadalupe county, Territory of New Mexico, did run and operate the following device or apparatus which was kept and exhibited and owned by him at his saloon in said town, and which is the slot machine mentioned in the complaint filed before the magistrate, copies of which are hereto attached and made a part hereof, to-wit: A case, box or frame about five feet high and about four feet wide; that on the inside thereof a certain machinery so constructed as to make it work automatically when in running order; that there are a number of slots of different colors on the top of the machine and if the player puts a nickel into the slot of any color and pushes down a crank, it starts a circular disk to revolving, containing colors corresponding to the colors on the slots and if the color shown by the indicator over the disk at which the disk stops revolving is the same color as the slot in which the coin was deposited, a certain valve will open and pay out to the player from one to forty times the amount played by the player according to the color played by him. If the indicator does not stop at the color played, the player loses the amount played. That there is a common fund placed in the machine by the relator and constantly kept there against which the players can play, to which the player's losses are added and from which his winnings are taken. In other words; if the nickel is placed in the green slot and the disk stops at the point so the indicator points to the green color on the disk, it pays five times the original nickel played, and the yellow pays ten, the white twenty and the blue forty when similarly played. If, on the other hand, the indicator shows on some color which the player has not played, his money so played by him goes to the common fund and becomes the property of the relator and is lost to

the player. Whether the player wins or loses is wholly a matter of chance. The machine above described is a game of hazard or chance in which small sums are volunteered or ventured for the chance of obtaining a larger sum of money. The machine above described is what is known as a "percentage game," that is, the chances are unequal in favor of the owner.

"That on the said January 13th, 1908, complaints, copies of which are hereto attached, were duly made and filed in the office of the justice of the peace in and for Precinct No. 8, Guadalupe county, Territory of New Mexico, and that thereupon warrants were duly issued, copies of which are attached to the sheriff's return herein, and the relator was arrested and taken into custody pending an investigation by the magistrate and he still remains in custody, the hearing before the magistrate being set for January 28th, 1908.

"This stipulation is only for the purpose of this application and shall not be used on any trial or hearing on the merits.

"Signed by attorneys for relator and attorneys for the Territory and dated at Alamogordo, Otero County, New Mexico, this 25th day of January, 1908."

Upon this stipulation oral arguments were heard by the court, and counsel desiring that further argument might be heard, asked leave to file briefs, which was granted, and able and exhaustive briefs were afterwards submitted on behalf of the Territory by the Attorney General and District Attorney Wright, and on behalf of the petitioner by Wharton and Lawson and J. W. Thompson, his counsel.

### OPINION.

By Judge Edward A. Mann.  
The first question raised by counsel in their briefs, is one of jurisdiction, the Territory contending that this proceeding is merely an attempt to question the sufficiency of the complaint by habeas corpus proceedings, thus falling within the rule laid down by the Supreme Court of New Mexico, "In re, Peraltareavis," 8 N. M., 27, and that case, with authorities there cited and others from the Supreme Court of the United States, certainly lays down the rule that a writ of habeas corpus cannot be made to take the place of a demurrer to the indictment, or a writ of error from a court of competent jurisdiction for the mere correction of errors, but I do not understand the authorities to go so far as to include a complaint before an examining magistrate having power only to bind the accused over to await the action of the grand jury, in any case cited, except the Peraltareavis case. In the Siebold case (ex parte Siebold, 100 U. S. 371), upon which the holding in the Peraltareavis case was based, Justice Miller lays down the rule as follows: "If the statute has invested the court which tried the prisoner with jurisdiction to punish a well defined class of offenses, as forgery of its bonds, or perjury in its courts, its judgment as to what acts were necessary to constitute the crime is not reviewable on a writ of habeas corpus."

Our statutes on the subject of habeas corpus declare that "every person imprisoned or otherwise restrained of his liberty, except in the cases in the following section specified, may prosecute a writ of habeas corpus, according to the provisions of this chapter, to obtain relief from such imprisonment or restraint if it proves to be unlawful."

(Chapter V, C. L. L. 1897) and the following section lays down the exceptions as follows:

"Persons committed or detained by the final judgment, conviction or decree of any competent tribunal, or by virtue of an execution issued upon such judgment or decree; but no order of commitment for any alleged contempt, to enforce the rights or remedies of any party, shall be deemed a judgment, conviction or decree within the meaning of this section; nor shall any attachment or other process issued upon any such order, be deemed an execution within the

## WOMAN AFTER GARFIELD'S SCALP

Mrs. Helen Pierce Grey, Newspaper Writer, Files Serious Charges Against Indian Bureau.

Washington, April 3.—Mrs. Helen Pierce Grey, the newspaper writer arrested last summer because of her connection with the protests of Crow Indians against the manner in which the government agents managed the Crow reservation in Montana, resumed her statement yesterday before the Senate committee on Indian affairs. She charged that to keep from starving the Indians were compelled to eat the meat of diseased cattle and sheep; that they were frequently thrown in to jail without cause and kept at the mercy of the agents; that the children of the government reservation school were mistreated. She stated positively that all of these things must have been done with the knowledge of some of the officials at Washington.

Another interesting chapter was added also to her account of her own experiences as an investigator.

That some of the members of the committee were impressed by the character of the charges which Mrs. Grey said were susceptible of proof, was evident from the character of the cross examination. It is not unlikely that a general investigation will be ordered.

Secretary of the Interior James R. Garfield is involved in her sweeping charges.

## BEGINS SERVING LIFE SENTENCE

Frank Berlin, Sent Up From Otero County for Murder, Committed to Territorial Penitentiary.

When the prison gates clanged shut behind Frank Berlin last night, he bade farewell to the outside world forever, for unless he should be pardoned, he will spend the remainder of his life in the territorial penitentiary.

Berlin pleaded guilty at the recent term of the district court for Otero county of second degree murder for the killing of George S. Van Syckle a fellow miner during a quarrel at Otero grande several months ago. Judge Parker fixed his punishment at 99 years in the penitentiary at hard labor.

Berlin was brought to Santa Fe last night by Sheriff H. M. Denny, of Otero county, who also brought another prisoner, William Smith, who was sentenced to serve one year for larceny. Deputies John Hunter and John H. Peeble, accompanied Sheriff Denny and served as an extra escort to guard the prisoners.

## NEW YORK LAWYER TAKEN INTO CUSTODY.

New York, April 3.—Daniel R. Delaney, of Brooklyn, cashier of the law firm of Henry E. Coe and company, of this city, was arrested at Mountaingle today. He is charged with misappropriation of funds of the firm and forging and falsely endorsing checks to the amount of \$26,000.

## MARINE HORROR IN BRITISH WATERS

### Torpedo Boat Destroyer Sinks With All on Board

### RUN DOWN BY CRUISER

### Accident Occurred During Night Maneuvers With All Lights Out.

Portsmouth, Eng., April 3.—Thirty-six men, including Lieut. Middleton, commander of the torpedo boat destroyer Tifer, lost their lives in a collision off the Isle of Wight last night between that vessel and the British cruiser Berwick. The vessels belonged to the Portsmouth division of the British home fleet and were engaged in night maneuvers in the English channel while on their way to Portsmouth.

The night was very dark and the cruiser Berwick was steaming slowly. When the destroyer attempted to cross the big cruiser's bow she was caught midships and cut squarely in half, sinking almost immediately.

The deck crew dressed in heavy oilskins and boots went down with the vessel. Of the twenty-two saved most were engineers and stokers, who, having on only light clothing, were able to keep themselves afloat until picked up.

The ships were maneuvering without lights at the time of the disaster.

## BIG ILLINOIS DISTILLERY BURNS

### Fire at Peoria Causes Million Dollar Loss

### MUCH LIQUOR CONSUMED

### Estimated That 50,000 Gallons Went up in One Explosion

Peoria, Ill., April 3.—A fire which broke out in the grist mill at Corning and company's distillery here at 1:45 o'clock this morning was not brought under control until 11 o'clock. The entire plant was gutted and the loss is estimated at from \$750,000 to \$1,000,000. Several explosions during the progress of the fire endangered the lives of the firemen. Shortly after four o'clock this morning 3,000 cattle were stampeded by the explosion and ran at large in the railroad yards. Fifty thousand gallons of spirits were consumed as a result of one explosion.

## ARTESIAN WATER STRUCK AT SUWANEE

Well Brought in There is a Veritable Gusher—Rivals Those of the Pecos Valley.

Albuquerque, N. M., April 3.—A gusher, spouting three feet high from a ten-inch pipe with an estimated capacity of ten thousand gallons per minute was brought in at Suwanee, fifty-two miles west of Albuquerque shortly after noon yesterday by a well drilling outfit which for several weeks has been drilling for artesian water in the interest of the St. Louis and San Francisco railroad on lands owned by the company near Suwanee.

The strike, which is the second strong artesian flow to be encountered within two weeks, was made at a depth of 325 feet and according to the men having the drilling in charge the gusher is one of the strongest encountered in all their experience.

The gusher has caused much interest in the vicinity of Suwanee and the people for miles around are coming to see the well. The drilling outfit will be moved to a point west of the present gusher and another well will be drilled at once.

The land on which the gusher was encountered is owned by the "Frisco" system along with a very large acreage surrounding and if a sufficient water supply is developed large land development operations will undoubtedly follow in the immediate future.

## CAN RAISE COTTON IN NEW MEXICO

Promising Results Secured By Department of Agriculture in This Territory and Arizona.

Washington, April 3.—After years of unsuccessful efforts to introduce Egyptian cotton into the United States, the Bureau of Plant Industry of the Department of Agriculture, reports promising results have been secured in New Mexico and Arizona. Several million dollars worth of Egyptian cotton annually is imported. Experiments of Dr. Carson of the Department of Agriculture in the Colorado river basin within the past few years have proven successful and as much as 900 pounds of lint were secured from one acre last year. Seeds from successful growths in Arizona and New Mexico are now being distributed by the department.

## SISTERS MEET FOR FIRST TIME IN 22 YEARS.

When Mrs. Frederick Blackburn and daughters, Misses Retta and Mabel Van Dever, of Brooklyn, Illinois, walked into the Club boarding house on upper San Francisco street, last evening, there was a happy meeting and reunion of two sisters who had not seen each other for twenty-two years. Mrs. Goodwin, proprietress of the Club boarding house, and Mrs. Blackburn being sisters. For many years they had not heard from one another, in fact had lost all trace of each other's whereabouts, but a letter addressed to Postmaster Paul A. F. Walter was the means of effecting the reunion.

## READ ADMIRAL EVANS ON ROAD TO RECOVERY.

Paso Robles Hot Springs, Calif., April 3.—The physicians in attendance on Rear Admiral Evans today issued a bulletin that the admiral feels greatly improved. He slept well last night and the pain is fast disappearing.

## CRUSHING THE HEAD OF THE ALBUQUERQUE PUFF-ADDER

The Republican newspapers of the territory knowing and understanding the situation have taken no stock in the puff-adder claims of the New Mexican's Albuquerque morning yellow sheet contemporary that that sheet was the *sine qua non* and most influential Republican paper of the territory and that its libels on Republican officials and party leaders and its false and venomous charges against Delegate W. H. Andrews, Chairman H. O. Bursum and other prominent Republicans must influence the Republican party to hurl these leaders and officials from office-holding and important positions into the abyss of slime and muck created for them by the sheet. During the past three or four months the New Mexican has published many articles from the weekly Republican papers in the territory editorially denouncing these false claims and preposterous pretensions of the sheet and showing it up in its true colors. It is very plain to every man at all acquainted with the political situation and the trend of the newspaper editorials in the territory that the Albuquerque morning yellow sheet has been for the past four years a bitter and uncompromising enemy of the Republican federal administration, of Republican territorial officials and of such Republicans as have been prominent and influential in the councils of the party. This fact has been proclaimed very often during the past few months by Republican newspapers and the New Mexican for the information of the Republicans of the Sunshine territory publishes another strong and timely editorial from the columns of that straight, sound and strong Republican paper, the Farmington Enterprise, which says:

"The unanimity with which the Republican newspapers of New Mexico rebuke the cheek of the Albuquerque Morning Journal and cut into flinders its impudent assertions and foolish claims that it is the leading Republican paper of New Mexico, and that it has the right to dictate to the Republican party, certainly shows that the character of that paper is understood by the newspapers that are really and truly Republican and really and truly represent the Republican party."

"It will be remembered that for the past four years that paper which we understand is being controlled secretly by the Democrats of the stamp of Nell B. Field, of Marron, of Burkhardt and others who have no more use for the Republicans and Republican principals than the Devil is said to have for Holy Water, and to secure fat county offices for their friends and the patronage and pay of the Bureau of Immigration from the boy ex-governor has steadily and vehemently attacked the Republican party, its candidates and many of the officials by direct and indirect falsehood, trumped up charges and libels and charged the management of official affairs as being false, corrupt and dishonest."

"There is hardly a prominent Republican who has not been assaulted in this manner and whom the paper has not endeavored to injure or to ruin. This sheet puts itself forward as a dictator and as the essence of Republicanism."

"The Journal has charged that the action of the Republican territorial central committee at its meeting February 18th, 1908, when the committee adopted fair and just regulations and rules for the government of Republican primaries and county conventions was taken by the committee with a corrupt and dishonest motive, and to help what the paper calls Hubbellism in Bernalillo county at the expense of the regular and true Republicans there."

"It claims that the Republican leaders and central committee had sinister and dishonest motives in their actions in order to put into power again corrupt and thieving officials who had plundered the county treasurer of Bernalillo for years. The charge was so astounding and is known to be so untrue that it fell flat at once and there was not a single real Republican newspaper but that denounced it as a lie and as a falsehood."

"The rules were too honest and fair for the fusion crowd in Bernalillo county, which is known to be kept together by the desire to control and benefit by the fat county offices in that county, by the county printing and by the control of the Bureau of Immigration."

"The Republican leaders supported unanimously by the true Republican

papers of the territory, of course, pay no attention to these outrageous charges of the paper and certainly none of its impertinence, in recognizing itself as the only genuine Republican paper in the territory."

"In this stand they are supported by the rank and file of the party in the territory. The office holding crowd and its mouthpiece, the Albuquerque Morning Journal, fought the Republican party two years ago and four years ago."

"The two Republican leaders who are especially assaulted by the Journal are Delegate Andrews and Chairman Bursum, although the former has done more for Albuquerque since he became delegate than for any other part of the territory, and he is certainly a very faithful, painstaking and successful delegate, as is fully demonstrated by his record."

"The paper assaulted Chairman Bursum principally because some of the men behind it hate him. He is in their way. He is not one of the silk-stocking, treacherous kind. He is a man—every inch of him. He is also too good natured, and that is another reason why the Journal takes advantage of him."

"The people and especially the Republicans, understand the situation and if the Journal and those behind it think that they will exercise much influence in this campaign they will find themselves woefully mistaken."

"The people are on to them and their assuming positions as reformers will not win this time."

## LIVE STOCK MARKET BULLISH.

Prices of lambs for mutton and steers for feeders and for the great livestock market are climbing. Too much of this can not happen for the good of the great livestock interests in this territory and throughout the great West. The reasons for this condition of the livestock market are set forth by the New York Evening Sun in a recent editorial as follows:

"A representative of one of the largest packing concerns is reported as saying that there is a great shortage of sheep and cattle, in fact, that it is impossible to obtain one-third of the number needed, and that it may be necessary to go abroad to meet the demand. The cause of what is described as an unforeseen situation is set forth as follows by this authority:

"Last fall, when the cattle raisers were preparing to put their cattle up for winter feeding and were ready to go into the market and buy lean cattle for fattening purposes, they made their accustomed demand on the banks for money. Just about that time the money stringency came on and currency practically went out of circulation, so that the banks could not get the cash to lend to the farmers. In consequence the farmers could not buy any more cattle to fatten. But worse still, they could not borrow any money on the cattle they had on their farms and ranches with which to buy food for them for the winter."

Those who said that the pay of certain persons in the community must not be cut ought to seize on the chance to demand, even with the assistance of the highest authority, that the dealers, wholesale and retail, keep down the price of beef and mutton."

"The packers will hardly dare to conduct their affairs on ordinary business principles if they can be brought to realize the danger they might run of being charged with participation in some dark conspiracy against somebody or other."

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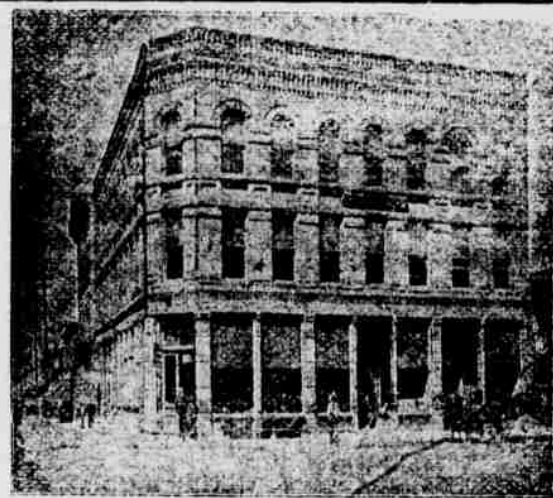

**ANTI-GAMBLING STATUTE DOES NOT APPLY TO SLOT MACHINES.**

meaning of this section." Section 2782, C. L. L. 1897.  
Without discussing the question involved in the Peraltareavis case, viz: Whether the Supreme Court of the Territory will take original jurisdiction in a habeas corpus proceeding of one held under a warrant issued by a United States commissioner, I am constrained to hold that under the circumstances of the case at bar, a Justice of the Supreme Court is bound, under the statute above quoted, to issue the writ where a person is in custody under a warrant issued by a Justice of the peace sitting as an examining magistrate and to inquire whether the crime charged is in fact an offense against the laws of the Territory, and especially so where, as in this case, there is a stipulation of facts entered into and the case fully presented by the Territory and the defendant. This holding seems to be reasonable and just, for after all it is only asking the court to which defendant is bound over, to decide whether or not he shall be held in custody to answer at a future sitting of that court for the acts constituting his alleged crime. The writ of habeas corpus is one which the courts favor because of its peculiar nature. Since it first appeared in the history of our jurisprudence, it has been jealously guarded as a sacred right by the people, so much so indeed, that by section nine of article one of the Constitution of the United States it was provided that its privileges should never be suspended, except in cases of invasion or rebellion.

They were in fact legitimized and recognized as a means of obtaining revenue and these games and others of like character were run and operated in saloons and open gambling houses, where people were openly invited to stake their money against the house. This had been permitted since 1887, with slight modifications. In 1897 another act was passed by the legislature as follows: Section 4152 Compiled Laws 1897:

"That all persons, firm, company or corporation, owning, operating or conducting any nickel or penny-in-the-slot machines, or other slot machines, within the Territory of New Mexico, shall pay an annual license of fifty dollars per year for each and every one of such machines so owned, operated or conducted, which license shall be issued by the probate clerk and paid to the officer now authorized by law to collect licenses, and shall be applied to the general county school fund: Provided, That no nickel-in-the-slot machine used purely as a musical instrument, for weighing or other similar purposes and not as a gambling device or game of chance, shall be regarded as coming under the provisions of this act and the owner or operator of such last mentioned machines or machine shall not be required to pay license upon or for operating the same."

**Not Prohibited By Anti-Gambling Statute.**  
I do not wish to be understood as holding that only the games named specifically in the act are prohibited, for such is not the case. The general words are broad enough to cover any game of a like character as those enumerated. I have no doubt but keno, policy and many other banking games and games of chance already known and any other like game which human ingenuity may invent of a like character or species, is within the act and may be punished under its provisions, but in the case of slot machines of the character described in the stipulation, there is this difference which appears to me controlling. They were known to the legislature as is shown by previous legislation; they were not in the same general class for the legislature itself had put them in a separate class, and they were not confined to the public gambling house which the legislature was evidently seeking to abolish.  
It is suggested that the act in question repeals the act providing for licensing slot machines and that it would be an absurdity to say that the legislature intended to permit them to run without license. Without passing upon the question of the right to collect the license, it is a sufficient answer to say that the effect upon the license feature throws no light upon the question at issue. The mere repeal of the license law, without further legislation, could not make any sort of gambling a crime.  
To create a crime, the legislature must speak in plain and unmistakable terms, defining the act it seeks to prohibit and before one can be punished under such an act, he must be brought within its terms. No matter how corrupt a practice may be, nor how flagrant an act may be against the public morals or public decency, the courts are powerless to punish until the legislature has defined the crime and fixed the measure of the penalty.

One of the complaints charge defendant with running a lottery and counsel for the Territory cite some cases from Texas, Alabama, Louisiana, Georgia and Florida, in which the courts of those states have held that slot machines fall within the definition of lotteries under the various statutes of those states. The act of the legislature of New Mexico relating to lotteries, was passed in 1889 and appears in the 1897 compilation as Sections 1327 to 1332 inclusive. A careful reading of those sections seems to leave their meaning so clear and unclouded as to leave no room for construction. The last section (1332) provides that the act shall be construed to apply to every device or devices and only to such device or devices as are commonly called or known as lottery, although called or designated by any other name, and the preceding sections relate to tickets and drawings in such a manner as to clearly indicate that the legislature had in mind only lotteries of the common kind where tickets are sold and regular drawings are held.  
While the general definition of the word lottery might cover a slot machine of the kind described in the stipulation, yet our legislature so clearly restricted the legislation in question to lotteries where tickets are sold and drawings had, as lotteries are commonly conducted, that such definitions have no application here. I have not been able to examine the statutes of Texas and the other states which have been cited, but conclude that they must be much broader than ours. Again, it is hardly conceivable that the legislature should provide for the licensing of slot machines of the kind under consideration at fifty dollars each per annum, had it considered them lotteries which it had already prohibited under heavy penalties. It seems perfectly clear that such machines were not lotteries within the meaning of our laws.

**III.**  
Coming now to the serious question in the case and that upon which counsel devote the greater part of their briefs: Is a slot machine of the kind described in the stipulation of facts, contemplated by the act of the legislature, approved March 21st, 1907 (Chapter 64, Laws 1907), entitled: "An act to prohibit gambling in the Territory of New Mexico?" This act I quote in full as it appears in the original act on file in the office of the territorial secretary:

**Text of Anti-Gambling Law.**  
"Council Bill No. 48. An act to prohibit gambling in the Territory of New Mexico. Be it enacted by the 37th Legislative Assembly of the Territory of New Mexico:  
Section 1. It shall hereafter be unlawful to run or operate any banking games of chance such as faro, monte, passaro, passmonte, twenty-one, roulette, chuck-a-luck, hazard, fan tan, poker, stud poker, red and black, high and low, craps, or any other banking games or games of chance played with dice or cards by whatsoever name known, in the Territory of New Mexico.  
Section 2. Any person who is the owner or possessor of the games mentioned in section one or any person engaged in operating any such games, or who is in actual possession and control as lessee or otherwise of the premises upon which said games are run or operated, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine of not less than one hundred (\$100) dollars nor more than five hundred (\$500) dollars, and shall be imprisoned in the county jail for not less than six months.  
Section 3. It shall be the duty of all district attorneys to report any and all violations of this law to the grand jury and it shall be the duty of the grand jury to investigate for themselves and cause indictments to be brought against any violator of any of the foregoing offenses men-

tioned in Section one of this act, whether in operation at the time of investigation or at any other time after the passage of this act and within three years from the date of the commission of the offense.  
Section 4. The fines assessed and collected under the provisions of this act shall go to the benefit of the school fund of the school district, town or city, in which such offense is committed, except in towns or cities of over one thousand inhabitants in which case one-half of all fines shall go to the town or city.

"That all persons, firm, company or corporation, owning, operating or conducting any nickel or penny-in-the-slot machines, or other slot machines, within the Territory of New Mexico, shall pay an annual license of fifty dollars per year for each and every one of such machines so owned, operated or conducted, which license shall be issued by the probate clerk and paid to the officer now authorized by law to collect licenses, and shall be applied to the general county school fund: Provided, That no nickel-in-the-slot machine used purely as a musical instrument, for weighing or other similar purposes and not as a gambling device or game of chance, shall be regarded as coming under the provisions of this act and the owner or operator of such last mentioned machines or machine shall not be required to pay license upon or for operating the same."

It is also a matter of common knowledge that slot machines of the kind set out in the stipulation, were set up in saloons, billiard halls, barber shops and other public places and licensed under the provisions of the latter act, but these machines were not confined to saloons and gambling houses as were the games enumerated under the act of 1887 and those amendatory thereto.

**Congress Gave Broad Hint.**  
It may also be mentioned, to our shame perhaps, but with truth nevertheless, that the abolishment of open gambling in both the territories of Arizona and New Mexico had its origin in Congress and that until a bill for its abolishment had been reported in Congress, the legislatures of the territories took no steps in that direction, so that such legislation as they did finally pass was called forth more by fear of national legislation upon the subject, than by any great moral wave of reform in our own legislature.

Public opinion in the territory and nation demanded the elimination of the open public gambling house, and it was that evil that the legislature intended to and did abolish by the act of 1907. This is established, I think, by the language of the act itself, for it is not the ordinary player of gambling games, but the person who runs or operates, the owner or possessor of the games mentioned in the first section of the act, or any person engaged in operating any such games, or who is in actual possession or control as lessee or otherwise of the premises upon which games are run or operated, at which the law strikes.

The legislature had long since differentiated between the roulette wheel, the crap game, and other like games such as are mentioned in Section 1 of this act, and the slot machine. The difference in the license required, two hundred dollars in one case and fifty dollars in the other, seems to represent the legislative idea of the greater and lesser evil. The title of the act is itself deceptive, for while it declares the act to be one to prohibit gambling, it does not in fact prohibit gambling or attempt to do so, but merely makes it unlawful to run or operate any banking games or games of chance such as are named in the first section. The persons playing at these games even, other than the operator, are guilty of no offense under the law.

**Slot Machines Gambling Devices.**  
I fully agree with counsel that slot machines, such as are described in the stipulation, are gambling devices and that too of a bad character and that they ought, by all means, to be legislated against and their use prohibited within the Territory, but it is the duty of the legislature and not of the courts to accomplish this end. Judicial legislation, especially of criminal laws, may be a greater evil

than that which it attempts to curb. The statute in question is a penal statute and must, under all the rules of construction, be construed strictly. If the meaning of the legislature be apparent from the act itself, viewed in the light of other legislation on the same subject, then there is no room for judicial construction and the duty of the court is to enforce the law as it finds it and refrain from attempting to bring within its terms that which cannot be found in the law itself without a strained construction.  
It appears from the act itself that the legislature intended to make it unlawful to run or operate two classes of games which it had theretofore licensed and permitted, viz: Banking games and games of chance played with dice or cards, these were designated in the act specifically by the words, "such as faro, monte, passaro, passmonte, twenty-one, roulette, chuck-a-luck, hazard, fan tan, poker, stud poker, red and black, high and low, craps (and generally by the words) or any other banking game or games of chance played with dice or cards by whatsoever name known."

The games named were some of them such as roulette and fan tan, banking games, but played without either dice or cards, while others, such as faro, monte, and poker were games of chance played with dice. All along through the gambling legislation these same games and others like them are classed together and treated in the same manner, while slot machines of the kind mentioned had received legislative recognition in a distinct class. The general words in this act following the specific games enumerated, under the most liberal construction of the rule of ejusdem generis, would cover only games of the same kind of species.  
I think the legislative meaning is clear and the intention is to prohibit the running and operating of all those games such as is mentioned in the act and such as they had theretofore permitted in the public gambling houses and saloons of the Territory. Surely it would be a violent construction of the statute in question to hold that the barber, or cigar store man who owned or leased premises for his business and merely permitted the slot machine man to set a machine in his shop, should be fined from one hundred to five hundred dollars and sent to jail for six months, when the legislature had not named slot machines in the act, though they had been recognized by it in former acts, and that too as different and distinct

from the games specified in the act itself.

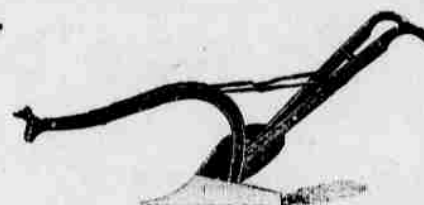

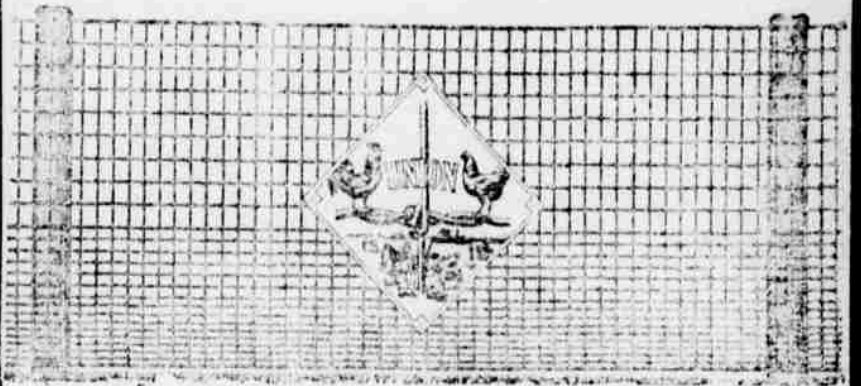

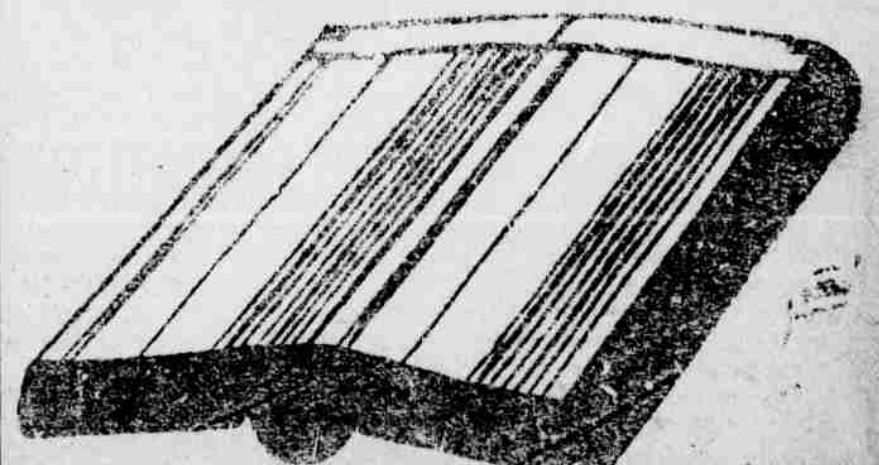

### EASTERN NEW MEXICO GROWING

That Section of Territory Forging to Front By Leaps and Bounds—Clovis Coming Metropolis.

A well known citizen of eastern New Mexico who is a resident of the thriving town of Clovis which gives great promise of becoming the metropolis of that section at no distant day, addresses a very interesting communication to the editor of the New Mexican in which he graphically describes the phenomenal growth of that section. As the letter is exceedingly interesting the New Mexican prints it herewith:

"Clovis, New Mexico, April 1, 1908. Editor New Mexican,

"Santa Fe, New Mexico.

"I know that it will do your heart good to know that this section of the territory is steadily forging to the front. Almost every train brings to this district freight cars loaded to the guards with the household and personal effects of those good citizens from other states who came here within the past few months and pre-empted land. Cultivation and improvement of the farms is the order of the day and the country for many miles each way from here presents very much the same appearance as western Kansas did a few years ago. The planting of young trees is very much in evidence and the community generally seems to be deeply imbued with a spirit of labor and progress and cheerfulness over the prospects for the future. The contract for the electric power house from which the machinery of the round house will be operated, has been let and work on the same will be begun within a few days. Likewise continued construction of the Harvey eating house. The new Santa Fe depot has been completed and is now occupied. It is the largest and costliest depot on the system in the territory.

"There has been and still is great jealousy of Clovis exhibited by Texico and Farwell which are desperately anxious that the new machine shops be located in one of these two places. This feeling has taken shape in the nature of printed circulars which have been freely distributed on the trains entering the territory, setting forth the fact that not only will the shops be located at either Texico or Farwell, but that the improvements already made here by the Santa Fe railway will eventually be moved to one of those towns. I am exceedingly sorry to see such a spirit of unkind and unfair rivalry and trust that it will not be long before both towns discontinue it and get into the band wagon of progressive eastern New Mexico. We are all in the same boat and cannot afford to rock the boat.

"One thing that serves to retard the county of Roosevelt to a large extent is the statue-quo condition of the large and fertile body of land north of here, the ownership of which is in dispute between the Santa Fe railroad and the government. The larger portion of this land, about 200,000 acres, has been filed upon by homesteaders but such filings have all been suspended pending action of the department of the interior in the premises. These filers are in the main responsible people and not nestors, but under the circumstances have not been warranted in improving their claims. But for this existing condition relative to this land the cultivated area of Roosevelt county would

this year be increased by many thousands of acres and an immense amount of permanent improvement added to our wealth."

### BELEN BOASTS BRICK PLANT

Important Industry For Cut-off Town—Civic Improvements Have Become Fad There.

Belen, N. M., April 3.—The New Mexico Manufacturing and Contracting company has fired a kiln of 350,000 of brick produced from the Belen kiln in the machinery for making a fine quality of pressed brick. The quality of brick predicted from the Belen kiln is equal to any that can be bought elsewhere.

J. L. Tucker has started a photograph gallery near Goebel's drug store. At present he is operating in a large tent but expects to immediately erect a studio.

Civic improvements have become a fad in Belen. The Town and Improvement company has been having the streets graded and trees set along the avenues. New sidewalks have been built and parks sowed in grass. The home builders have felt the stimulus and are cleaning up their yards and planting flowers and shrubs.

O. M. Ziegler, formerly agent for the Santa Fe railway at this place, with his wife, has been visiting the latter's father, M. Rigney, an old resident of this county.

Gabino Gilbert is constructing two brick residence houses on South Main street. The buildings are beautiful cottages and will cost approximately \$2,500 each.

The Red Sox baseball team is planning to make it interesting for the other teams of the territory during the coming season. Uniforms have been purchased and upwards of four hundred dollars subscribed already to put the team on its feet with proper equipment. The club elected Dr. W. H. Dempsey manager for the field and George Hoffman, business manager.

Though several light frosts have visited this region since the fruit trees have been in bloom, it is not believed that any real damage has been done. What little has been killed so far will only properly thin the usually over-loaded trees. The peach trees promise a fine crop of the luscious fruit this season.

The city of Albuquerque counts a great deal on the proximity of Belen for the cultivation of trade interests as is shown by the large amount of advertising done by the Duke City merchants in the Belen Tribune. The Belen Tribune carries the best patronage of advertising of any weekly paper in the territory and this by home merchants as well as outsiders.

### ALLEGED HORSE THIEF RETURNED TO TEXAS

Carlsbad, N. M., April 3.—William Davis, an "outlaw" horse rider and bronco buster, who is known throughout the Southwest as "Hackamore Bill," was arrested here by Deputy Sheriff William Lucas a few days ago on advice from the authorities of Scurry county, Texas, where he is wanted to answer to a charge of horse stealing. Davis agreed to return to the one Star state without a requisition and was turned over to Sheriff Bowles of Scurry county who returned with Davis to the scene of his alleged crime.

### LOS TANOS IS FORGING TO FRONT

Although But Three Months Old It is Keeping up With the Progress of Progress.

Special to the New Mexican.

Los Tanos, N. M., April 3.—The town of Los Tanos is about three months old but it is growing fast. It is a station on the El Paso and Southwestern railway about twelve miles north of Santa Rosa. About fifty business and residence houses have already been erected and more are under construction. The section surrounding Los Tanos is rapidly settling will well-to-do and hard working farmers. They hail from many states, over fifty families having arrived in this section from Virginia and Kentucky.

The railroad company has agreed to commence the construction of a commodious depot here at once.

It is believed that farming can be carried on successfully in this section without irrigation if the Campbell dry culture system is used. The rainfall is believed to be sufficient during the growing season.

Yesterday's maximum temperature was 47 degrees at 11:45 a. m., and the minimum temperature was 32 degrees at midnight, the mean temperature for the day being 40 degrees. The departure from the normal was four degrees. The relative humidity at 6 a. m., was 53 per cent and at 6 p. m. 55 per cent, while the average relative humidity for the day was 54 per cent. The lowest temperature during last night was 25 degrees and the temperature at six o'clock this morning was 25 degrees.

**PRESIDENT LUTHER FOSTER TO RETIRE**

His Resignation as Head of New Mexico Agricultural College Announced—Will Not Leave School.

Mesilla Park, N. M., April 3.—Dr. Luther Foster, who, for some years past has been the head of the New Mexico Agricultural College here, is to retire from the presidency of the institution at the close of the present school year, to devote his time to the directorship of the experiment station, having held both positions in the past. The increasing importance of the experiment station and the rapid extension of the work has made the change necessary. This was determined upon at the recent meeting of the board of control of the college.

The resignation of Professor J. J. Vernon, who has held the chair of agriculture in the college for the last seven years, was also accepted by the board, to take effect the first of July. It is understood that Professor Vernon is to remain in the valley where he has acquired extensive interests during his residence here.

**MURDER TRIAL ON AT ALBUQUERQUE.**

Albuquerque, N. M., April 3.—The trial of Cecilio Doreme for the murder of a man named Lobato, in the Eight Spot saloon on Christmas day last, was commenced in the district court here yesterday afternoon. Much difficulty was experienced in selecting a jury to try the case, several of the prospective jurors being disqualified on their statement that they were opposed to capital punishment.

**DEMOCRATIC CENTRAL COMMITTEE ORGANIZES.**

The Democratic city central committee met yesterday and organized by electing Frank Owen, chairman; Alfredo Delgado, secretary, and Evaristo Lucero, treasurer.

The committee also selected Frank Andrews to take place of Charles Haspelmath on the Democratic ticket for councilman from the third ward. Mr. Haspelmath, seeing the handwriting on the wall for Democratic defeat, refused to run.

**T. J. CRAWFORD.****LAST NIGHT'S RATIFICATION MEETING**

Fair Attendance at Gathering of "Un-terrified" at Court House—Long-Winded Resolutions.

The ratification meeting of the "un-terrified" believers in the doctrines of Jefferson, Bryan and other, dead and living leaders of Democracy took place at the county court house last night. Although the attendance was larger than usual at Democratic meetings in this city, there were not as many voters present as were at the Republican convention the night before. Among the number present at last night's meeting were many Republicans, who went there out of curiosity.

Fully one hour behind time Chairman N. B. Laughlin called the meeting to order and asked the convention to ratify the action of the Democratic city central committee, which selected Frank Andrews to take the place of Charles Haspelmath as nominee for the city council from the Third ward. On motion the nomination of Mr. Andrews was ratified and he is now a full-fledged candidate for councilman.

J. P. Victory, chairman of the committee on resolutions, reported and read the resolutions. It took Mr. Victory almost an hour to read them. The resolutions condemn the administration of Mayor T. B. Catron and all other Republican officials in the city and county of Santa Fe and promise many good things to the voters if they elect the Democratic ticket. They promise to build a school house in the Fourth ward, a bridge over the Santa Fe river on Canon Road, to keep the streets clean, build additional sidewalks, improve the police department and many other rosy promises, too numerous to mention. The resolutions for a wonder, do not make a single mention of such dead leaders of the party as Jefferson and Jackson and living patriots as "Peerless" Bryan.

The name of ex-President Grover Cleveland was also ignored. All in all the long document purporting to be the platform of the Democratic party of the city of Santa Fe is nothing but an expression of Democratic sentiments well known to every person in every nook and corner of the United States as a promise to destroy what the Republican party has constructed. After the resolutions were adopted Chairman Laughlin called upon the various city candidates from mayor down to address the meeting and limited the speech of each man to not less than five minutes nor more than twenty minutes. At intervals the band played "Dixie."

It was after 11 o'clock when the chairman announced the meeting adjourned and long before adjournment over one-third of the voters present became tired and left. Several ladies were present who watched the proceedings very closely.

**ORGANIZE ANTI-SALOON LEAGUE**

Citizens of Roswell Get Together and Plan to Stamp Out the Liquor Evil in That City.

Roswell, N. M., April 3.—A committee of twenty-five business men of Roswell, selected from all branches of trade, all professions, all parties and all churches, met at the Baptist church and organized the Anti-Saloon League of Roswell, with Rev. H. F. Vermillion as president and R. Spencer secretary. The organization was but a primary movement, and the intention is to base upon it a general movement for prohibition. A resolution expressing the sentiments of the gathering and making for the league a sort of constitution upon which to act, was passed. This resolution condemns the saloon as an institution and pledges the members to fight for its abolishment, through reasonable and legal means.

The first act of the new league was to appoint a committee the duty of which is to interview the men who stand for election to the city council in the coming city election and ascertain if they will be willing to put the matter of prohibition to a vote of the people if they are petitioned at any time during their term of office by a large number of citizens to do so.

**LEGAL QUALIFICATIONS SCHOOL BOARD MEMBERS**

Territorial Superintendent of Public Instruction J. E. Clark has mailed a circular which explains the legal qualifications of members of the boards of education in city and incorporated towns. The circular is of much importance and reads in part as follows:

"1. Shall be a qualified voter of the territory.

"2. Shall have resided in the district at least two years previous to election.

"3. Shall be a tax payer; i. e., own property subject to taxation in the district.

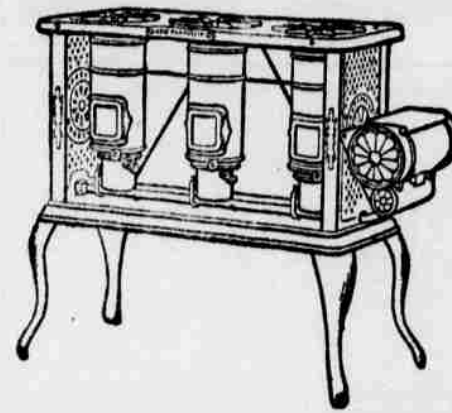
"4. Must have accounted for all public money of the territory coming into his hands by reason of having held any public office, and paid the same into the treasury.

"5. Shall not be a member of the council or board of trustees."

Mr. Clark also says that a legally qualified voter at school elections in city or incorporated towns must be a legal voter in the city or town.

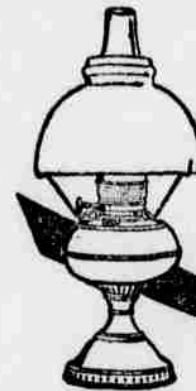
