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LOUD IN PRAISE
OF THE CONGRESS

Governor Curry Says
Exhibits Were
Grand

PROUD OF SHOWING MADE

Executive Leaves for Las
Vegas to Join Andrews
Campaign Party.

Governor George Curry returned yesterday morning from Albuquerque, where he had been in attendance at the Sixteenth National Irrigation Congress and the International Industrial Exposition since the opening day of both gatherings. After spending the day enjoying a much needed rest, he left this morning for Las Vegas where he will attend two meetings today in the interest of the re-election of Delegate W. H. Andrews. Before leaving for Las Vegas this morning he spent about two hours in his office at the Capitol, attending to executive business. He will return to Albuquerque for the closing days of the fair. Governor Curry had nothing but praise for the Congress and the exposition.

In speaking of the visit of William Randolph Hearst, chairman of the Independence party campaign committee and owner of a string of newspapers across the continent, Governor Curry said:

"Mr. Hearst, at the farewell banquet tendered him before his departure for El Paso, said that he was in favor of statehood for New Mexico and that he would do anything in his power to help the people of the territory attain it. He told us all that we could call upon him at any time for his services, if we thought he could be of any assistance in attaining our ambition."

"Assistant Secretary of Commerce Wheeler, who represented President Roosevelt at the Congress, also expressed his advocacy of statehood for the territory and promised his assistance in the work of attaining it."

Exhibits Excellent.

Governor Curry had nothing but praise for the magnificent exhibits of the products of New Mexico and Arizona and states which were represented at the exposition. "The exhibits demonstrated to the people from all parts of the country," said Governor Curry, "that New Mexico is a rich empire and that her resources as yet have merely been scratched on the surface. I was exceedingly proud at the excellent showing the territory made."

New Military Instructor.

"The military maneuvers and drills were one of the most pleasing features of the big exposition which was filled with features. The honors and prizes secured by the New Mexico Military Institute in the competitive military maneuvers and evolutions reflects great credit on Colonel Wilson, Captain Barlow the military instructor there, and the officers and faculty. The showing made by the cadets of the College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts of Las Cruces was also very good, when the fact that the institution has had no regular army military instructor, is taken into consideration. I have arranged to have a regular army instructor assigned to this school and under his direction I hope to see the cadet corps develop into one of the

best drilled and disciplined school battalions in the territory.

Praises National Guard.

"When the new armories, which are now under way, are completed, I look for increased interest among the members of the National Guard of the territory in military tactics and maneuvers, and within a short time I believe that the citizen soldiery of New Mexico will be able to favorably compete with any of the state National Guards of the country. Under the circumstances, the National Guard did very well in the exhibition drills at Albuquerque."

Lauds Regular Troops.

New Mexico is greatly obliged to the War Department for the assignment of the regular troops to the exposition. They were one of the principal attractions of the Fair and Congress and covered themselves with honor by their mastery of their profession. To see them drill was like watching a machine. Had the regular troops taken part in the competitive drills, they would have proven invincible."

TAFT'S WESTERN TRIP
WILL END WEDNESDAY

Kansas City, Oct. 5.—With a parting word to Kansas with meetings here and at Leavenworth and Atchison today, William H. Taft will cross to Missouri for two days' campaigning and then go direct to Chicago, ending his Western trip Wednesday. In Missouri, Candidate Taft will speak at St. Joseph, Marysville, Chillicothe and Brookfield.

Thousands Cheer Taft.

St. Joseph, Mo., Oct. 5.—Taft's invasion of Missouri began here at noon today. The candidate addressed several meetings of workmen here, declaring he was the friend of labor. He also delivered an extended speech at the opera house here. The audience was overflowing with enthusiasm. At Leavenworth, Kansas, this morning, fully three thousand workmen stood five minutes in a drenching rain and listened to a speech by Taft. His reception there and at other points in the Sunflower state where he made addresses today, was very enthusiastic.

INCENDIARIES USE COAL
OIL TO BURN BUILDINGS

Las Vegas, N. M., Oct. 5.—Two unknown men soaked the buildings occupied by Sena and Delgado's bakery and woodyard in coal oil and then fired them early Sunday morning. The bakery was destroyed and is a total loss, but the woodyard was saved from the flames after a hard fight on the part of the volunteer firemen. A reward of \$100 for the capture of the incendiaries has been offered by the police, and as they have clues to the identity of the miscreants, their early apprehension is looked for.

MACK CLAIMS BRYAN'S
ELECTION IS A CERTAINTY

Chicago, Oct. 5.—Returning to Chicago today to take up the direction of the Democratic campaign in the West, Chairman Norman E. Mack declared the tide was strong for Bryan in the East and if the Democrats could hold their own there, their ticket surely would be elected. He expressed the opinion that New York, New Jersey, Rhode Island, Maryland, Delaware and Ohio will be found in the Democratic column. Indiana he declared was safely Democratic.

WOMAN AND CHILDREN
CREAMATED IN HOME.

Yonkers, N. Y., Oct. 5.—Mrs. Robert Cummings, and her two grandchildren, aged 3 and 10 years respectively, were burned to death today in a fire that destroyed Mrs. Cummings' cottage.

BULGARIA PROCLAIMS ITSELF
AN INDEPENDENT KINGDOM

Little Dependency of Turkey Causes
All Europe to Sit Up and Take
Notice

STEPS TAKEN TO PREVENT OPENING OF HOSTILITIES

Believed That Powers Will Participate in General Conference Looking to Peaceable Settlement of the Controversy.

Sofia, Oct. 5.—The proclamation of Bulgaria as an independent kingdom was officially made at Tirnova today. Prince Ferdinand and his ministers were at Tirnova when independence was proclaimed having reached there last evening. Tirnova, the ancient capital of Bulgaria, Bulgaria has been a tributary principality under control of the Sultan of Turkey. Bulgarian cavalry is already mobilizing on the frontier ready to resist the Turkish troops.

Turkey Blames Powers.

Constantinople, Oct. 5.—Turkey is convinced that Austria, backed by Germany, encouraged Bulgaria to declare its independence in order to strike a blow at the Kaimil ministry and compromise the new constitution. It is not known what steps Turkey will take, but the impression prevails that an European conference will be held to consider the whole situation.

France as Mediator.

Paris, France, Oct. 5.—France has decided to act as mediator to prevent war between Turkey and Bulgaria. Foreign Minister Pinchon has begun a conference with representatives of other powers with this object in view.

Turkey Does Not Want War.

London, Oct. 5.—Turkey is not inclined towards war with Bulgaria and

it is believed she will call a conference of the powers to consider Bulgaria's proclamation of independence. The indications are that the powers will intervene to prevent hostilities. All the chancelleries of Europe are busy today with efforts to discover a modus vivendi which will result in the maintenance of peace. The proclamation of Bulgaria's independence followed a conflict between Bulgaria and Turkey, concerning the control of the Oriental railroad in eastern Roumania, Bulgaria took control of the road in September because of a strike and operated it with military forces and when the strike had been settled refused to return possession to Turkey.

Troops Rushed to Frontier.

Paris, Oct. 5.—The Temps today publishes a dispatch from Vienna saying that the Bulgarian army is marching towards the frontier and that the Turks are also moving forward to encounter them. Austria-Hungary is mobilizing two army corps.

Would Revise Berlin Treaty.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 5.—It is stated with good authority that Russia will propose calling a conference of the powers for general revision of the Berlin treaty. This is the outcome of the proclamation of Bulgarian independence. Russia has reason to believe that the annexation of Bosnia and Herzegovina by Austria Hungary, is imminent.

FEDERAL EMPLOYEES
ARE REMOVED

President Roosevelt Resorts to Harsh Measures in Case of Men Guilty of Pernicious Activity in Politics.

Washington, Oct. 5.—As a result of a report made by the civil service commission, the President has removed Lincoln Avery, collector of the port at Port Huron, Michigan and also directed the removal of Charles H. Daily, special agent of the treasury at that place. The civil service commission found proof of charges that serious violation of the rules and regulations in regard to campaign assessments and which also involved on the part of the special agent, Daily, "pernicious activity in politics." A letter of the President to Secretary Cortelyou ordering the removal of the officials named, was made public today. The letter follows:

"To the Secretary of the Treasury: I hand you herewith the report of the civil service commission and accompanying documents in the case of political assessments collected from the classified employees of the custom house at Port Huron, Michigan. I desire that my action be given as wide publicity as possible. This so that all other collectors and heads of bureaus or officers may be warned in the matter."

"I regard the offense as very gross. The hardship and suffering entailed on people of small salary is set forth in touching manner in the letter of complaint. A government employee in the classified service, who is deprived of lawful authority of power to exercise political activity is entitled to absolute immunity for failure to pay assessments or perform political service. It appears from the report of the commission that the present condition of affairs at Port Huron has lasted substantially ten years. I agree with the commission that under the circumstances set forth in their letter either the inspector was ignorant of what he should have known for the protection of his force and for the proper discharge of the duties of his office, that is of things of public and general notoriety easily ascertained and established, or that he knowingly and willfully permitted the evil practices to continue. In either case he is manifestly unfit to discharge the duties of his office and I shall forthwith remove him from that position. He has already been heard at length by the commission. I shall also remove Mr. Charles A. Bailey, the special treasury agent, for the reason set forth at length in the report of the commission."

Party From Chaves and Eddy Counties Spends Several Hours Very Delightfully in the Capital.

A party of very agreeable people from the southeastern part of the territory spent Saturday in La Villa Real de Santa Fe, the attractive and historic capital of the Sunshine Territory, and soon Sunshine State. They were visitors to the International Exposition and the men were delegates to the Sixteenth National Irrigation Congress in Albuquerque which they attended. They praised very highly the exhibition and especially the fruit and agricultural exhibit, the mineral and coal as well as the buildings put up by the Santa Fe Railway and the county of Colfax, which were the best on the grounds.

They are nearly all fruit raisers and are very well to do as their crops this year, especially apples, were very large and profitable. One of the gentlemen, a druggist, C. E. Brandsetter, was the only one who had any kick coming and he stated that the health of the country was distressingly good but nevertheless he did very well as there was lots of fruit there.

Among the party were, Lucius Dills, of Roswell, one of the old settlers of the Pecos Valley and of Chaves county, very prominent and honorable who served one term in the House of Representatives of the Thirty-fifth legislative assembly; an able newspaper man and also a lawyer and a surveyor. He was accompanied by Mrs. Dills and their children; E. L. Jones, fruit raiser, who has an apple orchard near Hagerman and who this year netted two hundred dollars per acre from his orchard and a great deal more from two acres that were planted in a special variety of the choicest apples. The profits of these two acres will total one thousand dollars. This is apple raising in the beautiful Pecos valley; P. Wagman, a lumber dealer at Hagerman who is doing well and who is accompanied by Mrs. Wayman, N. S. West, also a fruit raiser at Hagerman, who says he cannot kick at the profits he obtained from his orchard this year. Quite the reverse, Mr. and Mrs. F. G. Walter, also of the pretty little town of Hagerman, were members of the party and Mr. Walter's experience this year with his apple orchard is very satisfactory. Ed Miller is a prosperous business man in Hagerman and says that he likes that town and county very much; Miss Jeanette Shelley, is a young lady of the party and she is safe as she had lots of chaperones.

The Hagerman section of Chaves county is prosperous and all the fruit that has been raised has been shipped to Eastern cities and big towns in Texas and has sold at very good figures and in a hurry.

The party visited the many historical and territorial buildings in the city, school edifices, historical society, San Miguel church and many other places and were greatly interested in the many historical, ethnological and archaeological objects and admired the fine climatic conditions of this city. The whole trip was very enjoyable and they were all glad that they visited the exposition and paid a visit to the territorial capital. They are all friends of the New Mexican, being subscribers and readers of the paper and having learned by experience that the New Mexican is doing great and constant work for the betterment, increase in population and good of Chaves and Eddy counties. They all paid their respects to the editor of this paper and were very glad to meet him. "Union, Quay and Mora counties where I spent last week," said Chairman Bursum yesterday, "looked exceedingly good. I went to nearly every important point in them, and everywhere I found that Delegate Andrews was held in high esteem by the people, and the chances of rolling up a large vote for him in that section, are very sanguine. The people there know his record in Congress; know how hard

he has worked for the good of the territory and every part of the territory, and they also know how much he has accomplished. They realize that he is a man who does things, and they are eager for statehood. Knowing that the only way to secure favorable action on the statehood bill now before Congress is the re-election of Delegate Andrews, they will go to the polls on election day and express their opinions with the ballot."

Mr. Bursum conferred with the Republican leaders of the counties which he visited, met the voters, and made several speeches in which he emphasized the necessity of the re-election of Delegate Andrews if any hope for an early passage of the statehood bill with its many beneficial clauses, is to be hoped for.

Candidate Larrazo'o had already made a tour through the three counties visited by Chairman Bursum but it is the opinion of Mr. Bursum that his appearance and speeches had little weight with the voters there.

ELEVEN PERSONS CREMATED IN
NEW YORK TENEMENT FIRE

New York, Oct. 5.—Eleven persons lost their lives in a fire early this morning in a four-story, double tenement house on lower Mulberry street. The dead are:

There were approximately fifty persons comprising eight Italian families in the building when the fire was discovered.

The fire was of incendiary origin. Three barrels stuffed with rubbish soaked with oil were blazing fiercely in the lower hall, cutting off the escape of fifty or more persons who were sleeping on the upper floors. Some were overcome by smoke and died in their beds. Others fell unconscious when groping to reach the windows and were burned. Many were injured by jumping into the street.

NEW MEXICO IN 1873 AND 1902.

In the Santa Fe postoffice hangs a map of New Mexico printed in 1873. The fact that it was issued by a bookstore at Cimarron, Colfax county, is in itself significant, for those were the palmy days of that historic town, which only lately has experienced a revival after a peaceful slumber of thirty years. The map, although only a third of a century old, is remarkable in many respects, and brings vividly to mind the marvelous progress of the Territory in that short span of time. There were thirteen counties in those days, of which one, that of Santa Ana, is no longer on the map. Valencia county stretched from Arizona to Texas. Dona Ana county included what is now the county of that name, and the counties of Luna, Otero, Chaves and Eddy. Taos county extended from the Sangre de Cristo Range to Arizona and Utah. Santa Fe county was no larger than at present, but had an irregular shape. There was not a single postoffice in regions now occupied by Union, Quay, Roosevelt, Eddy, Chaves and other counties. One looks in vain for Roswell, Carlsbad, Tucumcari, Alamogordo and scores of other familiar and prosperous towns and settlements that have sprung into vigorous existence since then. The territory had only one third the inhabitants it has today and these lived mostly in the Rio Grande Valley.

It was seven years before the first railroad, but the map shows many projected and surveyed lines. Cimarron had four projected railroads coming to it as their junction point, yet did not get any railroad until more than thirty years afterwards and then only a minor coal-carrying road. The Denver and Rio Grande was surveyed from the Colorado line to Santa Cruz, Nambé and Tesuque into Santa Fe and made a wide sweep from Santa Fe to Santo Domingo and thence to Albuquerque and south to the miserable little village of Franklin, now the proud city of El Paso. The Central or Western Railroad survey came from Salt Lake, Utah, to Chamita, there forming a junction with the Denver and Rio Grande, thence coming to Santa Fe. It followed the Chama river. The Arkansas and Cimarron railroad as planned after leaving Cimarron, was surveyed to Taos and from there to a junction with the Denver and Rio Grande near Velarde. There was no survey of the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe then, but the line later occupied by it was followed very much by the survey of the Cimarron and Denver Railroad, except that after leaving Raton Pass, it was accommodating enough to serve to the west to take in the town of Cimarron and then calmly proceeded southward, joining the Atlantic and Pacific at Galisteo, cruelly leaving Santa Fe to one side, much like its successor, the Santa Fe, did eight years later, the map throwing some doubt upon the tradition that the Santa Fe had honestly intended to bring its main line to this historic city. The Atlantic and Pacific survey crossed the territory from east to west, a plan not fully realized until the completion of the Belen cut-off a quarter of a century later. The Southern Pacific was the only road built as shown on the map, but there was no Deming in those days, although Silver City already appeared on the map, as did some of the older mining camps like Santa Rita and Hanover.

A book might be written by the old-timer from the suggestions made and the memories brought to life by a study of this map which proves that the New Mexico of today is not a third of a century old, for the New Mexico of 1873 seems like a different commonwealth altogether.

Beneath the 1873 map, hangs a post-route map of 1901, which shows that the most recent and greatest growth of New Mexico is not even eight years old. Carlsbad and Roswell, it is true, had been placed on the map a number of years before, and Alamogordo had just had its coming-out party, but there is no indication yet of Tucumcari, of Texico, of Clovis, of the scores of new towns founded since then. In those days there was no El Paso and Southwestern Railroad system, no Santa Fe

Central, no Dawson nor St. Louis, Rocky Mountain and Pacific, no Farmington railroad, and no indication of the Rock Island extending its line into the territory. There was no Quay, no Roosevelt, no Sandoval county. There were three postoffices in the region that now has more than fifty included in Quay county. East of the Pecos river and south of the thirty-fifth parallel, there was only one postoffice, that of Portales. In this part of New Mexico there are now over one hundred postoffices. The entire population of this section, only eight years ago, did not reach a thousand, today it is 40,000.

Great indeed has been the growth and the progress of New Mexico in many other respects in those years, all Republican years, and but few residents realize that they are living in a transition period as great as that which was inaugurated by the coming of the first railroad into the Trans-Missouri West. It is true, there are still several large white spots on the most up-to-date map of New Mexico, such as the Jornada del Muerto, in southern Socorro and Sierra counties, in western Valencia, southeastern San Juan and in a few other counties, but at the present rate of settlement by almost 25,000 homeseekers on almost three million acres of public land annually, most of these spots will be dotted with settlements before another five years have marched into history.

GOOD WORK BY THE REPUBLICAN TERRITORIAL COMMITTEE.

Secretary James W. Reynolds of the Republican territorial committee, has issued thousands of copies of a very neat and instructive little manual giving the vote in the territory for delegate in 1904 and 1906 in a short but very intelligently prepared synopsis of the registration and election laws. This pamphlet was printed in Spanish and English and is now being distributed to the voters for their information and guidance. It should be in the hands of every voter be he Republican or Democrat.

Much very well thought out work is being done by the Republican territorial central committee headquarters in this city under the very efficient, careful and strict administration of Secretary Reynolds, who is certainly proving the best man for the position. The five clerks are being kept busy and thousands of envelopes containing campaign matter, speeches and editorials from Republican territorial newspapers are being mailed to voters to inform them of the fair, decent and real conditions of the campaign and of the great questions that are before the people of New Mexico. It treats the coming session of the legislative assembly, the legislation that is necessary for the benefits of the people, the action that will be taken in the short session of the 60th Congress in the matter of passing the Andrews bill for an enabling act for the state of New Mexico and the great necessity and absolute importance of the election of Delegate W. H. Andrews, Republican members of the council and house of the 38th legislative assembly and county officials in order that the counties may enjoy honest, efficient, economical and careful county administrations.

The success of Delegate Andrews is demanded in order that statehood may be obtained and the bill now pending in Congress passed at the short session and that many beneficial provisions therein be made law for the advancement and benefit of the new state. Republican majorities are needed in the council and house of representatives that Republican administrative policies may be carried out and that many recommendations for new laws that are needed for the betterment and improvement of the present laws made by Governor Curry will be carried into effect. The necessity of Republican success in county nominations is demonstrated clearly and the voters are informed of the various conditions that exist in county affairs and why it will be best to select Republican nominees for county offices. These officials should be of the people, with the people and elected by the people. They should be the best men that can be selected and the nominations should consist of right thinking and honorable men who have sufficient education and knowledge of public affairs to conduct them in a proper and fair way.

NEW MEXICO PENSIONERS AND DELEGATE ANDREWS' RECORD.

New Mexico, on June 30, 1902, had 2,250 pensioners of the United States government, who received \$352,248 annually, according to the report of the U. S. Commissioner of Pensions. Colorado had 9,098 pensioners, receiving \$1,360,830, and Wyoming had 956 receiving \$148,398 each year. Before Delegate W. H. Andrews made it his especial business to look after the claims of New Mexico veterans, this Territory had only as many pensioners as Wyoming. Since June 30, enough more pensions have been granted New Mexico veterans, mostly through the personal efforts of Senator Andrews, to swell the total annual income of people of the territory from that source to something like \$400,000. If re-elected, as he doubtless will be, the pension money distributed annually to worthy veterans in New Mexico, will reach before long \$500,000. It is not claimed that without Senator Andrews, these pensions could not be obtained, for every veteran is entitled to his pension as a matter of law; but in practice, New Mexico's delegate has informed many a pensioner of his rights of which the veteran had been unaware, has smoothed the way for him in the Pension Bureau, which unacquainted with local conditions and local customs held up many a pension claim for trivial irregularities. In other words, Representative Andrews has expedited the grant whenever his personal efforts could do so. These 2,250 pensioners, their families and intimate friends, no doubt represent 10,000 votes on election day, and the Republican party certainly has a right to expect every one of those votes for its candidates, for the pension policy was inaugurated, amplified and maintained by the party in general, and Delegate W. H. Andrews, in particular, has given time and effort to make the veterans of New Mexico recipients of their just dues in this respect.

ANDREWS WILL GAIN BY LARRAZOLO'S YELPS.

The difference in the campaign conducted by Delegate Andrews and by Candidate Larrazolo is well described by the Torrance County Leader in the following editorial:

"Andrews for delegate to Congress increases in popularity as the campaign advances. Wherever he has been visiting and speaking he has made many friends and votes. Larrazolo, according to reports in the various newspapers at places where he has been speaking, is furnishing lots of hot air and trying to draw the native vote on the race issue, but is not making many votes. In fact, many Democrats are declaring their intention of voting for Senator Andrews, the man who can do something. We know of at least a dozen Democrats in this vicinity up to the present time who will cast their votes for Andrews, and after Larrazolo makes his set speech here the number of Andrews supporters will probably be increased three fold.

The Torrance County Leader published at Estancia, the county seat, puts the following pertinent question which will not be answered, however, by Larrazolo and his crowd, for the very reason that Larrazolo has never done anything for Torrance county or Estancia nor for that matter, for New Mexico, while Delegate W. H. Andrews has secured many benefits in the shape of large donations of public lands, of handsome public buildings, of cash appropriations and has been instrumental in helping hundreds of deserving veterans, their widows and orphans, to pensions and to increases in pensions. Here are the questions propounded by the Leader:

"What has Larrazolo ever done for Torrance county? Andrews built the Santa Fe Central railroad and made Torrance county a possibility. Why should we want to send a man as delegate who can do nothing? Vote for Andrews and get results."

The Springer Stockman, Democratic in politics, declares that hundreds of Republicans are supporting Larrazolo. In this case the wish is evidently father to the thought, no more, no less. The fact is that the Republicans of New Mexico are rallying in great numbers under the Andrews standard and what is more hundreds of Democrats who prefer statehood to the Noble Spaniard's elevation to Congress, are doing likewise. The result on November the third will show.

The Roswell Register Tribune thinks that the citizens of New Mexico who are patriotic ought to vote for Andrews and announces this in the following bright little editorial squib:

"No matter what your previous political connections may have been it is now a plain matter of Andrews and statehood, or Larrazolo and no statehood. That ought to settle it with you, if you are a patriot."

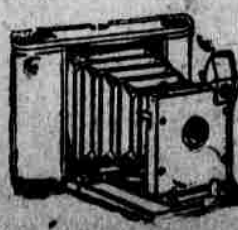

EARLY HISTORY OF COPPER IN GRANT COUNTY

(From the Silver City Independent.)

THE VICTORIA GROUP, and claims, eight in number, are designated, viz.: The Victoria, Montezuma Milwaukee, Daly, Tenderfoot, Big Bug, Markley and Burdette. The two latter are fractional claims. The Montezuma, Daly and a portion of the Big Bug cover the living springs, and control a part of the waters of the drainage area of Deadman Gulch. The northeastern end lines adjoin the patented lands of the Crowfoot Land and Cattle company, a property rated as highly valuable by reason of the copper deposits lying beneath. 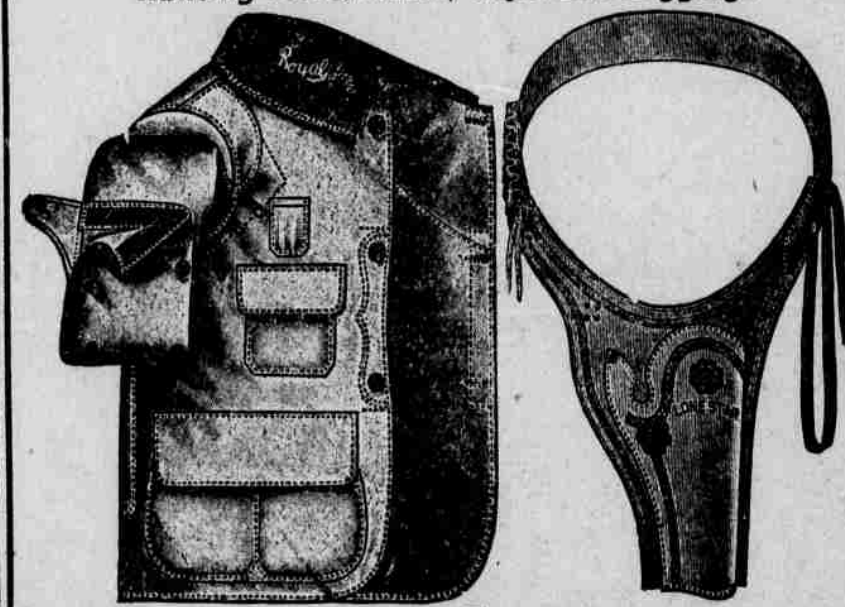

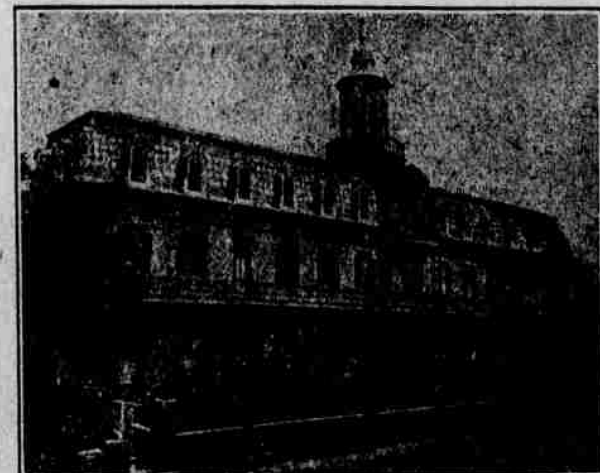

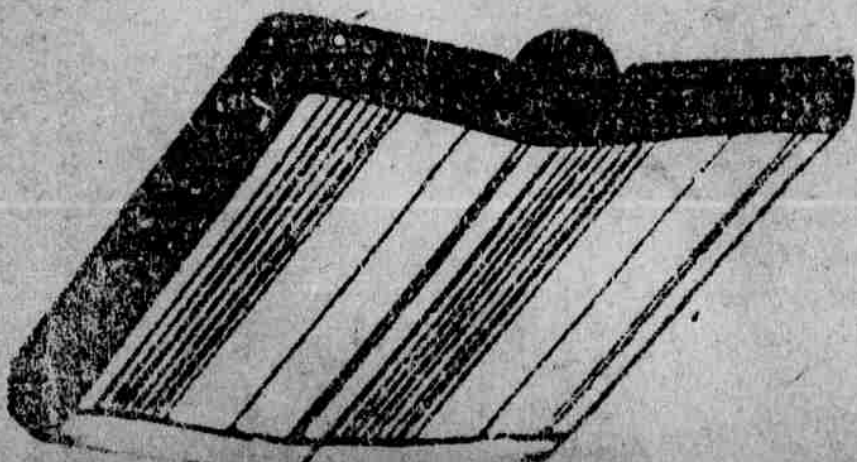

TERRITORIAL NEWS NOTES

The artesian well experiment which Estancia is about to begin is being delayed by the non-arrival of the smoke stack for the engine. Everything else is on the ground and in readiness to go to work.

Fire last Monday night at Willard destroyed the residences of Attorney Frank J. Jennings and Levi Anderson. The origin of the fire is unknown, but it started in the Jennings house while the family was away from home spending the evening with the family of Alfred Means. Nothing was saved from the Jennings house and the owners saved the clothing they had on—that was all. Anderson saved his household goods, but they were in a badly damaged condition. The loss is very heavy to both as it leaves them almost homeless. Both buildings were partially covered by insurance.

Secretary James Wilson, of the Department of Agriculture, having ascertained by exhaustive investigation that a contagious and communicable disease, known as scabbies, existed among the cattle in a number of western states, issued a quarantine order last week to be effective in certain parts of Montana, North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, Wyoming, Colorado, Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico. That portion of the Sunshine Territory which is affected by the quarantine lies in the counties of Eddy, Chaves, Roosevelt, Quay, Union, Colfax, Mora, San Miguel, Guadalupe, the part of Torrance lying east and south of the El Paso and Rock Island railway, the part of Lincoln lying east and south of the El Paso and Southwestern, and the part of Otero lying east of the El Paso and Southwestern.

The Eagle Mining company at Parsons, Lincoln county, started in thirty days ago on a test run with cyanide tanks. The work is in charge of an expert named Patton, and the conditions are that 200 tons of ore a day will be tested for the next sixty days, at the end of which time, if it be demonstrated that the test has been successful, it will be continued. So far the indications are said to be flattering. The ore is treated without sorting, and is being mined and delivered at the mill for less than thirty cents a ton, and as it carries values running from two to five dollars a ton, the profit on each day's run will be considerable. The cyanide ran short last week, but a consignment of it was received from California and was hauled to Parsons. Considerable interest is manifested in the result of the sixty days' test. If successful it will mean a great deal for the company and a great deal for the people living at Parsons and along the Rio Bonito.

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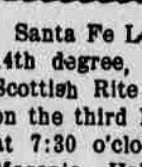

EARLY HISTORY OF COPPER IN GRANT COUNTY

(Continued From Page Three.)

prettily situated, and is the most picturesque in the system of mountains in which it is located. The claims parallel Iron Creek, and for a distance of nearly three miles, one can walk upon croppings of copper ore ranging from fifty to one hundred feet in width. The locations are full size, and constitute an unbroken line between the points mentioned, viz.: Beginning at the southerly end and running northeasterly, is Star No. 1, Star No. 2, Evening Star, Bay Horse, Bay Horse No. 7, 6 and 4, Star No. 4, Black Horse, Standard 4; Star No. 2, Star No. 3, Standard No. 1, Fulton, Big Horse, Roy, Fremont and Aberdeen, the latter ending on the National group. The remaining claims of the group are for the most part parallel locations, and with those enumerated show copper values which with greater development will become producing mines. The Fremont claim near the northern end of the property at a depth of 57 feet is in ore carrying sulphides of copper and presents strong indications that richer and larger bodies will be found with depth. The Evening Star which end lines on the Austin, presents many of the characteristics of that property, with only a shaft 35 feet in depth to its credit. 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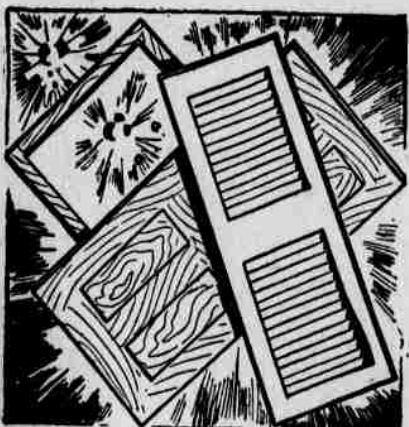

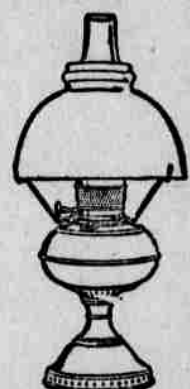
