MORE ELECTION RETURNS

The Fusionists Carried Idaho, Which Will Retire George L. Shoup from the Senate.

HEARTY CONGRATULATIONS

President McKinley Received Many of Them—California Gives McKinley Nearly 40,000 Majority—Several States Still Doubtful.

Canton, Ohio, November 8.—President McKinley received congratulatory telegrams from all quarters of the country and the world. Senator Hanna and many assistants of the Union Club, Cleveland, joined in a message expressing satisfaction. A congratulatory exchange of messages between the president and vice president-elect Roosevelt was also received.

Oyster Bay, N. Y., Nov. 8.—President McKinley, Canton, O. "I congratulate you and I congratulate far more the nation. I feel the most heartfelt gratitude over the result." (Sigs) THEODORE ROOSEVELT.

Hon. Theodore Roosevelt, Oyster Bay, N. Y. "I heartily appreciate your kind expressions and congratulate you upon concluding in health one of the most memorable campaigns of our political history." (Sigs) WM. MCKINLEY.

All dispatches breathed the spirit of devotion to the President and of patriotic sense of the result. The presidential party left yesterday afternoon for Washington.

CONGRATULATIONS FROM BRYAN. Lincoln, Neb., Nov. 8.—William J. Bryan sent the following telegram at noon today to President McKinley:

"Hon. William McKinley, President of the United States: At the close of another presidential campaign it is my lot to congratulate you upon the second victory." (Signed) W. J. BRYAN.

WEST VIRGINIA. New York, Nov. 8.—Senator N. B. Scott received a dispatch from West Virginia today saying that the legislature would be Republican by 12 to 25 majority.

NEBRASKA. Washington, Nov. 8.—Assistant Secretary of War McKeljohn, today received the following:

"Fullerton, Neb.—Nebraska is re-elected. McKinley carried the state by not less than 5,000. The legislature will be Republican in both houses."

Omaha, Neb., Nov. 8.—The Bee at noon prints the table on the national ticket giving complete returns of 55 counties and ten others with one precinct missing from each, out of the total 90 counties which gives McKinley 90,228, Bryan 85,196. Same counties in 96 gave McKinley 85,476, Bryan 96,547. With this ratio of increase, McKinley will have a plurality of about 5,000. The fusionists claim the counties unreported of which will give Bryan a small plurality in the state. The state ticket is running close to the vote on president. Both sides claim four, out of six congressmen. Neither side will have more than five or six majority on joint ballot.

IDAHO. Boise, Idaho, Nov. 8.—About four-fifths of the vote in Idaho has been reported. Bryan has a plurality of 1,330. Glenn, fusion for congress, 892; Hunt, fusion for governor, 1,441. The fusionists have 42 members in the legislature, Republicans 25 with 3 unreported. This will retire Geo. L. Shoup from the United States senate.

CALIFORNIA. San Francisco, Calif., Nov. 8.—Nearly complete returns show that California has given McKinley close to 40,000 plurality, and returned a solid Republican delegation to congress. The legislature is Republican by phenomenal majorities.

KENTUCKY. Frankfort, Ky., Nov. 8.—Governor Beckham returned to the state capital today. He says his plurality will not be under 5,000. The state election commission will meet week after next to canvass the returns. Returns from rural districts are unusually slow coming in. It is evident that both sides will continue to claim until after the official count is made and then there will likely be a contest for governor to be settled in the courts.

Louisville, Ky., Nov. 8.—Leslie Coombs, chairman of the Republican state campaign committee, at noon dictated the following statement: "Under any fair election law McKinley and Yerkes would have carried the state by 8,000 or 10,000 majority. The Republican vote has been whittled down in many places by petty larceny and in a number of places by highway robbery. Nothing but the official count will settle the election and if the count is made under the Goebel law, the Republicans have no reasonable grounds to expect a fair treatment."

The Evening Times claims the election of Beckham, Democrat, for governor by 3,486, basing the 11th district on the Republican claim of 19,205 majority there for Yerkes. The returns to date show Beckham's majority without the 11th district to be 22,691. At the Democratic headquarters it was said that all returns from the 11th district will probably be in tonight.

Leslie Coombs, chairman of the Republican state committee, telegraphed Payne that the official count will be necessary to determine the electoral vote in Kentucky. The telegram states: "Three thousand legal Republicans remain uncounted in the ballot boxes. Other frauds will cost us 5,000 votes."

ILLINOIS.

Chicago, Nov. 8.—With a few doubtful districts to hear from the Republicans apparently have a majority of eight in the state legislature, the margin in the lower house however, is but one, on the face of the returns so far received.

NEBRASKA. Chicago, Nov. 8.—A telegram was received at the Democratic headquarters today from Bryan stating that the Democratic national ticket carried Nebraska by 2,000, and the state ticket by 4,000, and the next legislature will be Democratic.

Chicago, Nov. 8.—Vice Chairman Henry Payne, of the Republican national committee, today received a telegram from the chairman of the state committee in Nebraska, stating that the Republicans carried the state by a safe majority, and also that they have the state senate and probably will be able to organize in the house.

Seattle, Wash., Nov. 8.—Rogers, D., carried the state for governor. Otherwise the Republicans made a clean sweep.

MONTANA. Helena, Mont., Nov. 8.—The legislature will be composed of 53 Clark Democrats, 33 Republicans, 8 Daly Democrats, and 1 Populist.

Bryan's majority is 8,000, and the Clark Democrat state ticket is elected by 7,400.

UTAH. Salt Lake, Utah, Nov. 8.—The Republican majority on a joint ballot in the legislature will be 9.

PENNSYLVANIA. Harrisburg, Pa., Nov. 8.—It appears that Quay men will have a majority of three on a joint ballot in the legislature. The leaders of the opposition say that they have enough votes to prevent Quay's election and declare that his friends cannot organize in either branch.

COLORADO. Denver, Colo., Nov. 8.—The fusionists will have a majority of 72 in the legislature on a joint ballot. The Republicans have only fourteen out of 100 members. The Democrats will probably have enough votes to organize in both the senate and the house.

MURPHY IS BEATEN. Phoenix, Ariz., November 8.—Marcus A. Smith, Democratic candidate for delegate to congress is elected by a majority of 995.

ANNEXED BY RUSSIA. A Goodly Slice of China Annexed by That Power.

Tien Tsin, Nov. 8.—General Linevitch, commander of the Russian troops, officially notified the foreign consuls that the land on the river side opposite the British and German settlements has been annexed to Russia by right of conquest. Much railroad property as well as the east arsenal is included in the territory. The consuls will protest against the annexation.

WILL REORGANIZE THE PARTY. Colonel Bryan and His Crowd to Be Pushed Aside.

Detroit, Mich., Nov. 8.—Don M. Dickinson is authority for the statement that within three weeks a meeting will be held in New York City to outline a plan of reorganization of the Democratic party. He says the call for a meeting will have the signatures of prominent Democrats. The meeting, Dickinson says, will be attended by Democrats of both gold and silver leanings.

STONE IS SARCASTIC. New York, Nov. 8.—Ex-Governor W. J. Stone said of the proposed reorganization of the Democratic party: "This kind of talk always follows the defeat of any party. Had the Republicans been defeated, they would be talking have not to say about reorganization are generally the ones who contributed the most to the defeat of their party."

WILL NOT RUN FOR SENATOR. Colonel Bryan Makes a Statement to That Effect.

New York, Nov. 8.—The Evening Journal prints the following telegram: "Lincoln, Neb., Nov. 8.—Editor of the Evening Journal: You may say officially that under no circumstances would I accept the office of United States senator, even were it tendered to me. I made my fight for the presidency and I lost. I am not going to take other men's positions from them." (Signed) W. J. BRYAN.

THE LIBERALS LEAD. Report of the Elections Held Yesterday in Canada.

Montreal, Nov. 8.—The returns of the parliamentary elections throughout the dominion, yesterday, show the following results: Liberals 123, Conservatives 78, Independents 8, unreported 5.

Elbridge T. Gerry Resigns. New York, November 8.—Elbridge T. Gerry, founder of the society for prevention of cruelty to children, has resigned as president of the organization. Vernon M. Davis has been named as Gerry's successor.

An Election in Porto Rico. San Juan de Porto Rico, Nov. 7.—It is estimated that 75,000 Republicans voted here today for commissioner to congress and members of the house of delegates. Not more than 200 Federals voted.

Bid the President Welcome. Washington, Nov. 8.—President McKinley arrived at 8:10 this morning. Several hundred people had assembled at the Pennsylvania depot to bid the president welcome.

GOVERNOR OTERO ENDORSED

The Next Legislature Is Certain to Be Republican by a Good Lead.

MR. RODEY'S BIG MAJORITY

The Republicans Have Elected Their Candidate to Congress by a Larger Vote Than the Most Sanguine Had Expected.

The following is an estimate of the membership of the 34th legislative assembly, based upon partly official and partly unofficial but reliable returns:

For the council from the district composed of Rio Arriba, Taos and San Juan counties, T. D. Burns, Republican, and Malaguas Martinez, Republican.

From the district composed of San Miguel and Guadalupe counties, Frank Springer and Charles Spiess.

From the district composed of Santa Fe county, Charles F. Easley, Democrat.

From the district composed of Bernalillo and McKinley counties, G. W. Harrison, Republican, and Thomas Hughes, Republican.

From the district composed of Valencia county, Colonel J. Frank Chavez, Republican.

From the district composed of Socorro and Sierra counties, C. G. Cruikshank, Republican.

From the districts composed of Grant, Dona Ana, Otero, Lincoln, Chavez and Eddy counties, J. F. Hinkle, Democrat, and J. S. Fielder, Democrat, making the council stand 9 Republicans and 3 Democrats.

FOR THE HOUSE. From the district composed of Union county, Encarnacion Sandoval, Republican.

From the district composed of Mora county, Cristoval Sanchez, Republican.

From the district composed of San Miguel county, I. Sena, Z. Valdez, E. P. Chapman, Republicans.

From the district composed of Guadalupe county, doubtful.

From the district composed of Santa Fe county, B. M. Read and Jose E. Gomez, Republican.

From the district composed of Taos county, E. C. Abbott, Republican.

From the district composed of Rio Arriba county, B. Trujillo, Republican.

From Grant county, W. B. Walton, Democrat.

From the district composed of Grant, Dona Ana, and Otero counties, R. P. Barnes, Republican.

From the district composed of Dona Ana and Otero counties, Major W. H. H. Llewellyn, Republican.

From the district composed of the counties of Lincoln, Chavez, and Eddy, U. S. Bateman, Democrat, making a total of 21 Republicans, one doubtful, and two Democrats.

The New Mexican cannot help in looking over this list, but call the attention of the people of the territory to the fact that the legislative assembly which will contain 30 Republicans out of 36 members, is a pretty good endorsement of the territorial administration under Governor Otero. The Democratic party, candidates and leaders and a few disappointed, so-called Republicans may not think this is an endorsement, but the fact nevertheless remains that it is, and in the New Mexican's opinion, it is a right good and strong endorsement.

T. D. Burns, Republican candidate for the council, 280; Malaguas Martinez, Republican candidate for the council, 209; Crist, 459; Medina, 383; Manuel Sanchez, Republican candidate for member of the house, 316; Grandville Pendleton, Republican candidate for member of the house, 367; E. Mares, Democratic candidate for member of the house, 371.

The Republicans elected a county clerk, superintendent of schools and two county commissioners.

SOCORRO COUNTY. Twenty-three precincts give Rodey, Republican candidate for delegate to congress, 1189 votes; Larrazola, Democratic candidate for delegate to congress, 852; Cruikshank, for the council, had no opposition and received 1909 votes. Jose Sanchez and M. Winston, Republican joint representatives from Socorro and Sierra counties, received 1164 votes for Sanchez and 1137 for Winston. Jobson and Castillo, Democratic candidates for representatives from Socorro and Sierra counties, received Jobson 756 votes and Castillo 810.

The entire Republican county ticket is elected by a majority of 290, with the possible exception of two commissioners.

UNION COUNTY. Returns from Clayton precincts give Larrazola, Democratic candidate for delegate to congress, 43 majority. The Democrats carry the other two precincts by 150 majority. The Republican precincts are yet to be heard from.

TAOS COUNTY. Tres Piedras precinct gives Rodey 3. Larrazola 16, majority for Larrazola 13. Martinez for the council, Republican, receives 5 votes; Burns for the council, Republican, receives 2 votes; Medina, for the council, Democratic, receives 14 votes; Pendleton, for the house, Republican, receives 2 votes; Sanchez for the house, Republican, receives 2 votes; Abbott for the house, Republican, receives 4 votes; Mead, for the house, Democratic, receives 17 votes; Mares, for the house, Democratic, receives 17 votes; Pierce, for the house, Democratic, receives 13 votes.

COLFAX COUNTY. Raton, N. M., Nov. 8, 1900. Special to the New Mexican. Rodey, the Republican candidate for delegate to congress, received 118 votes; Larrazola, Democratic candidate for delegate to congress, received 1169 votes, giving him a majority of 43 votes.

Juan Navarro, Republican candidate for council, receives 1243 votes; Gallegos, Democratic candidate for the council, receives 1030 votes, giving Navarro a majority of 213 votes.

Gardner precinct out of 277 votes gave Rodey 250.

Barnes, Republican candidate for the house, receives 1260 votes; McGrath, Democratic candidate for the house, receives 1243 votes, giving Barnes a majority of 340 votes.

The Democrats only elected their candidate for treasurer, assessor, superintendent of schools and clerk.

In 1898 Ferguson's majority was 454 and this has been reduced to 42, a Democratic loss of 412.

NAVARRO ELECTED. Special to the New Mexican. Las Vegas, N. M., Nov. 8.—Juan Navarro, Republican candidate for the council, from official returns, has the following majorities: Mora county 190; Colfax county 212; Union county close, but may have carried by a small majority. Larrazola, Democratic candidate for delegate to congress, carried Mora county by a majority of two, and Colfax county by a majority of 42. The entire Republican county ticket in Mora county is elected.

CHAVES COUNTY. Special to the New Mexican. Roswell, N. M., Nov. 8.—The majority of Larrazola, Democratic candidate for delegate to congress, in Chaves county, is so far 290 with two precincts yet to hear from.

RIO ARRIBA COUNTY. Special to the New Mexican. Tierra Amarilla, N. M., Nov. 8.—Eleven precincts in the southern part of the county give Rodey, Republican candidate for delegate to congress, 385 majority; T. D. Burns, Republican candidate for the council, 560 majority. Five other precincts so far as received give Larrazola 60 majority, leaving yet 11 to hear from, all of them Republican. It is expected that Rodey's majority will be between 400 and 500.

Special to the New Mexican. Chama, N. M., Nov. 8.—Latest returns give Rodey, Republican candidate for delegate to congress, in 22 precincts, a majority of 588. The five remaining precincts will increase this majority by 200. The legislative and county tickets are all right.

TAOS COUNTY. Special to the New Mexican. Taos, N. M., via Tres Piedras, N. M., Nov. 8.—Taos county gives Rodey 100 and more majority. The entire Republican legislative and county ticket elected except Staplin, candidate for county commissioner from the 1st district.

GRANT COUNTY. Special to the New Mexican. Silver City, N. M., Nov. 8.—Grant county complete returns give Larrazola, Democratic candidate for delegate to congress, 157 majority. On the legislative ticket, Fielder, Democratic candidate for the council, received a majority of 654; Walton, Democratic candidate for the house from Grant county received a majority of 263; Hinkle, Democratic candidate for the council, received 210 majority; Ascarate, Democratic candidate for the house from the district comprising Grant, Dona Ana, and Otero counties, received a majority of 76.

A COMPLETE VICTORY. Las Vegas, November 8.—The majority in this county for Rodey is about 500, in Mora 100. Union county elects a Republican member to the legislature but will give Larrazola a majority of about 50. Spiess and Springer will have 800 to 1,000 majority.

CENSUS RETURNS. The Population of Massachusetts and Maine Announced. Washington, Nov. 8.—The population of Maine as announced by the census bureau is 694,466 against 691,058 in 1890; an increase of 3,380 or 5 per cent.

MASSACHUSETTS. Washington, Nov. 8.—The population of Massachusetts as officially announced by the census bureau is 2,805,246, against 2,238,943 in 1890; an increase of 566,403 or 25.2 per cent.

A RACE RIOT AVERTED. The Pennsylvania Militia, However, Had Been Called Out.

Washington, Pa., Nov. 8.—After all night of excitement over the threatened conflict between negroes and whites, quiet prevails this morning. Through the prompt action of the town authorities, aided by company II of the 10th Pennsylvania volunteers, the race riot was averted. The outbreak, it is said, was instigated by the negroes, recently brought from the south by contracting firms.

YELLOW FEVER APPEARS. A Woman Died of It Last Night at Natchez.

Jackson, Miss., Nov. 8.—One new case of yellow fever is reported at Natchez this morning. Mrs. Butler, the first patient reported, died last night. She was a niece of Governor Longino.

A COLD WAVE. The Temperature Went Down to Twelve and Snow Has Fallen.

Washington, Nov. 8.—The weather bureau issues a bulletin saying: "The first well marked cold wave of the season covers the middle western and northwestern states with a minimum reported temperature of 12 degrees above zero at Huron, S. D. Freezing weather is reported in southern Kansas, and southern Missouri, and snow has fallen as far south as the Ohio river."

Marcus Daly's Life in the Balance. New York, November 8.—The report was current here today that Marcus Daly of Montana had a recurrence of his recent illness and that his life is despaired of.

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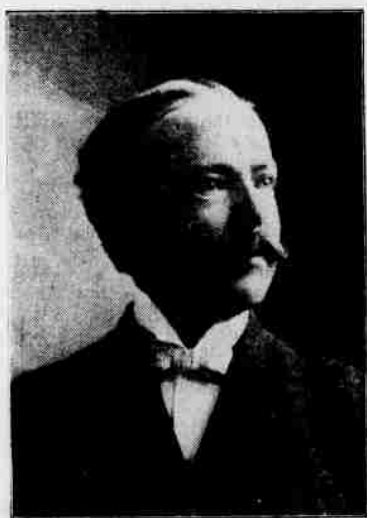

It's the votes that talked.

And now what will Aguinaldo and Bryan and the Chicago-American and the New York Journal do? Their vocation is gone for a time.

The Irish are in it this time. Oklahoma's delegate to congress is a Flynn, New Mexico's delegate is a Rodey and Arizona's delegate may be a Murphy.

Honest and fair primaries and honest and fair elections must be the order of the day in Santa Fe county from this time on. The men who oppose this must retire and will be compelled to retire.

It is to be hoped that from now on the race question will be relegated to the rear in New Mexico. Rodey's great majority demonstrates that it will benefit no party to bring it to the front.

And still the majorities grow. Even Utah, Wyoming and perhaps Idaho are in the Republican column and the only states in the north that Bryan carried are Colorado, Montana and Nevada.

There is every reason to believe that an enabling act can be had for New Mexico at the first session of the 57th congress. Get together, go to work and obtain it. The people of the territory want it.

The people of the United States evidently by a large majority still have confidence in President McKinley and desire to remain under his administration until March 4, 1905. This may be surprising but it is nevertheless absolutely true.

The solid south is no more, for Maryland and West Virginia and perhaps Kentucky are now permanently in the Republican column. Other southern states too will soon vote according to their own best interests rather than according to their antiquated prejudices.

With a Republican majority of 3,000 each, New Mexico and Oklahoma will not find it difficult to have themselves admitted to statehood by a Republican congress and a Republican president. It will mean four more Republican senators and two, or perhaps, three Republican representatives.

In two weeks from today the National Irrigation congress will be in session at Chicago. While the congress has no legislative or executive powers, yet it will do good in creating a sentiment in favor of the nation reclaiming the arid lands. The opposition in the east to the reclamation of the arid lands with government aid is dwindling, for it is now acknowledged that every million acres reclaimed means a new and increased purchasing power on the part of ten thousand families. The more people, the more farms, the more homes in the arid west, the greater will be the demand for goods manufactured in the east, and the more profitable railroad and commercial business will become.

Says the Optic, last Tuesday: "Santa Fe county will give a good account of itself today." And so it did and with it Bernalillo, Valencia, San Miguel and nearly every other county in the territory for the majority of the people of New Mexico not only discovered in time what is best for their interests, but also had sense enough to vote accordingly.

Now is the time for the Republican party in Santa Fe county to get together. It has been demonstrated that the majority and decency must rule if the Republicans are to win, and it should be out of the question for any one again to try running a ticket and a campaign all by himself and against the wishes of the leaders as well as the rank of the Republican party.

It is strange that a state like Florida should gain 35 per cent in population since 1890, and Indiana only 14.7 per cent. It must be remembered however, that Florida only needed to add 137,000 to the number of its inhabitants in order to gain 35 per cent, while Indiana had to add over twice as many people, or 324,000 to make a 14.7 per cent gain. The more populous a state becomes, the more difficult it is to keep up a certain percentage of gain.

It appears that the votes of several of the candidates of Tuesday's election will be very close. Messrs. Dudrow, McLaughlin and Maestas, who will canvass this vote are honest men. The people expect nothing else from them but that they will decide honestly and fairly and as the law directs. The victor is entitled to the certificate of election, be he Republican or Democrat. All good and honest citizens will approve such a course.

A 12-year old boy at Charleston, S. C., was killed by schoolboys who were imitating college students and hazed their companion. The young boys guilty of the crime can hardly be punished for imitating their seniors at the colleges, but something should be done to make hazing at colleges as disreputable an act as is stealing or unprovoked assault with intention to kill upon a stranger. Hazing should be made punishable with a sentence to the penitentiary, for reasoning and the mere regulations of the colleges and universities have failed to put a stop to it. There is a distinct line of demarcation between gentlemanly sport and murderous brutality.

The use of the metric system should become more general in the United States. Science uses it in this country and nearly all foreign nations use it in their commercial life. The United States money system is based on it and there is no reason why it should not be used in weights and measures in every day commerce. Russia has just adopted that system, and any delay in the United States following suit hinders and impedes commerce with other nations, besides depriving the people of this nation of the use of the most convenient measures and weights ever devised for commercial as well as for scientific purposes.

The health report of Denver shows that in October out of 184 deaths, 51 were from tuberculosis, and 29 per cent of these had been contracted in Denver. This is proof sufficient that Colorado climate is no longer a preventative for consumption and certainly, in the same degree, is not as good a place for consumptives to go to for their health. Physicians the world over must soon recognize that they should send their patients to New Mexico in order to secure the maximum of benefit that a change of climate means to a consumptive. Thus far no country has been discovered which is as free of consumption as New Mexico, and that has so good a climate for the cure of tuberculosis.

Idle Attacks Upon Governor Otero.

The El Paso papers that care nothing for the people of New Mexico except for what they can make out of them, are wretched because upon recommendation of the Cattle Sanitary Board of New Mexico, Governor Otero has issued a quarantine proclamation against Texas cattle. The governor simply did what he was required to do by law. The Cattle Sanitary Board knows its own business best and will certainly not ask odds or permission from the El Paso papers to do what it thinks right for the protection of New Mexico cattle, but the El Paso papers take this occasion to make an assault on Governor Otero. This is in line with the course of the other Democratic papers in the territory, who also take every occasion to assail Governor Otero in their columns without cause without rhyme and without reason. The best point in this situation is that neither side can hurt Governor Otero. As far as human probability goes he will be reappointed by the president to the office of governor which he has ably, well and satisfactorily filled since June 7, 1897, and the whole outfit in El Paso and in this territory that oppose him will have nothing but their wicked labor for their pains.

MURDERED ON THE BORDER.

A Ranchman's Violent Death on the New Mexico Line.

R. L. Hall, a prominent and wealthy ranchman of El Paso county, Texas, was shot while on his ranch, seventy miles north of Van Horn on the New Mexico line, by Fayette Seelye, a cowboy. The ranch foreman, O. L. Herling, was also wounded in the arm. Seelye escaped, going west, and is thought to be in the Guadalupe mountains on the border. A reward of \$1,000 is offered by Hall's relatives for his capture.

The shooting resulted from a difficulty between the two men twelve months ago, in which Seelye was worsted. At that time he had Hall arrested, but the defendant was acquitted. Persons familiar with the circumstances have been expecting trouble and were not surprised. Both Hall and Herling were unarmed when shot.

NEW MEXICO'S WHITE INDIANS

A Romantic Tradition That They Are Descendants of the Legendary Welsh Prince Madoc.

THE INDIANS ARE MERELY ALBINOS

For more than 100 years the question whether there existed in America a tribe of white Indians has been agitated, and more or less positive statements from learned men can be quoted on both sides. That the legend of a white race had a basis in fact is proved by six individuals still living in the pueblo of Zuni, N. M., says the Scientific American. Their existence, however, is known to very few, and even of those who have visited the village, not many have seen the white Indians, for as a rule they keep themselves out of sight. The history of the legend is interesting.

From the earliest times more or less definite rumors about white Indians have been current. In 1791 the Rev. Dr. John Williams published a treatise on the subject, which is now very rare, although the impetus which he gave the inquiry still survives. The purpose of the publication was to start a subscription fund, to be devoted to the exploration of the wild parts of America beyond the Ohio river, where the author was sure the long-sought white man would be found. In his own mind there was not the slightest doubt that these whites were descendants of Prince Madoc, of Wales, who, according to the Welsh legend, left his native country soon after 1170 A. D., on account of family dissension, and started out to the west, leaving Ireland on his right hand.

According to the ancient bards, Prince Madoc returned in the course of time with glowing accounts of a new country he had discovered, and gathering his adherents about him, he set sail again for the far west, to the land which he had found, and was never afterwards heard of. Dr. Williams contended that the white Indians were the descendants of these 12th century Welshmen, and, whatever may be thought of his conclusion, his argument was certainly worth consideration. He cited the many reports concerning these Indians then current, coming from various parts of the American continent, particularly the account of a man named Rimington, a native of England, who had met the white Indians at a grand trading meeting, or Indian fair, at the forks of the Ohio. He was told that they came from a remote district west of the Mississippi. Rimington's companion, a Welshman, claims to have spoken to these Indians in his own language. It was said also that these Indians had a book, which they venerated highly, but were unable to read.

More than sixty years later, when the Pacific railroad surveys across the continent were made, the story cropped out in another form, but the white Indians were definitely located at the pueblo of Zuni. In the reports of the survey, published in 1856, a description of one of the Indians is given, together with a list of words which were said to be practically synonymous in the Zuni and Welsh languages. No explanation of the presence of white members of the tribe was attempted. About 1877, J. H. Bodley, a newspaper correspondent, visited Zuni. He mentions a book which these Indians had, and which they regarded with great reverence, although they could not read it.

There can be no doubt that the white Indians at Zuni are albinos. There are four others at the Moqui villages and several scattered among the other pueblos. In dress, manners, customs and language, they are like their fellows, but their complexion is very fair, they are, indeed, much whiter than the average white man who has lived much in the open air. Their hair is a tawny, yellow, instead of the jet black which characterizes the Indian. Their eyes are so weak that they have to keep them closed in the sunlight. This is due, doubtless, to the absence of coloring matter in the iris. As the skin lacks that protection also these people suffer very much from sunburn, where the regular Indian is almost as immune as a negro. Their eyelids and lips are always sore, and it is probably on account of their dread of the sunlight that so few travelers have seen them.

To those who have seen these curious freaks they give the impression at first that they are Irishmen dressed as Indians, for their faces have a decidedly Celtic cast. The only way, however, in which they differ from other members of the tribe is in the absence of coloring matter in the skin and hair. The cause of this albinism has not been determined; it may be due to close intermarriage within the family, an inevitable result of the social system of the pueblos and their organization under the clan or gens system.

AN UNLUCKY MAN.

A Lordsburg Man with a Bullet Hole in His Lungs Taken to El Paso.

James E. Kelley, of Lordsburg, was brought to El Paso this week and placed in Hotel Dieu. There is a bullet hole through his lungs, and has been there since October 24. It is not known whether the wound was made by accident or whether some one deliberately shot him. He says he was sitting on a bench with some other men when his pistol which was in his belt or pocket was discharged. The men who were with him say it was accidentally discharged, but Kelley thinks the position of the wound makes that story unreasonable. The bullet entered his back, ranged upward and passing through his lungs entered his arm. He thinks some one turned his pistol upward and pulled the trigger. It is a queer case either way and hard to figure out how either incident could have happened. Kelley is in a serious condition, largely due to the wound having been neglected so long.

Kelley has been in the hospital here before. While assisting to construct the E. P. & N. E. road he was struck by a flying object which was blown up by an explosion and his skull was crushed, his scalp taken off in quite a large spot, and one of his eyes was knocked out.

CITY ORDINANCES.

ELECTRIC LIGHT ORDINANCE.

An ordinance granting an electric light franchise to M. W. McGrath, and his assigns, with the right to bore for artesian water, petroleum or natural gas.
Be it ordained by the city council of the city of Santa Fe:
Section 1. That there is hereby granted to M. W. McGrath, and his assigns, the right to construct, operate and maintain without compensation to the city of Santa Fe, an electric light plant for the lighting and illumination of the said city, and extend electric wires over and upon streets of said city for such illumination and lighting, and for that purpose to erect and maintain all proper and convenient poles and necessary appliances and to make all proper and suitable excavations, such wires, poles, appliances and excavations to conform as to grade and other particulars to the requirements of the municipal ordinances now in force or hereafter adopted, and the franchise hereby granted to cover the present and future limits of the said city.

The right is also granted to the said M. W. McGrath, and his assigns, to bore suitable wells for the discovery of natural gas, petroleum and artesian water within the present or future limits of the said City of Santa Fe, and in case either or all said products should be discovered, to utilize, sell and dispose of the same, and to erect, establish and maintain suitable and proper buildings, reservoirs, tanks and other appliances necessary to conserve the same, with the right and privilege to establish and maintain suitable pipes and pipe lines, and to furnish and supply the said city and the inhabitants thereof with the product thereof, at reasonable prices.

Section 2. That all the rights, privileges and powers granted by the city of Santa Fe to the said M. W. McGrath and his assigns as set forth and specified in the preceding section hereof, be and they are hereby granted for the term of twenty-five years from the date of the passage of this ordinance.

Section 3. This ordinance is passed and the above franchise is given upon the express condition that the said M. W. McGrath, or his assigns, shall in all respects finish and complete all things necessary to provide electric lights for the said city and the proper lighting thereof on or before the first day of November, 1901.

Section 4. Provided, that this franchise does not conflict with any prior franchise.

An Ordinance providing for a water supply for the City of Santa Fe. Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Santa Fe:

Section 1. That there is hereby granted to M. W. McGrath, and his assigns, the right to construct, operate and maintain water works for the purpose of supplying water for irrigation, domestic, public and fire purposes for the City of Santa Fe, New Mexico, and for such other purposes as may be necessary for the health, comfort, safety and requirements of the inhabitants thereof, for the full term of twenty-five years from and after the passage of this ordinance.

Section 2. That permission is hereby granted to the said M. W. McGrath, and his assigns, the right of way for the period of twenty-five years from and after the passage of this ordinance, to lay water pipes and mains in and under any and all streets, roads, lanes, alleys and other highways, and grounds dedicated to public use within the present boundaries of the present or future corporate limits of said City, and to extend said pipes, place and erect hydrants, fountains, conduits and such other useful devices or structures as may be necessary for the successful operation of said water works system and the proper distribution of water in said City, and for this purpose M. W. McGrath, and his assigns, shall have the right to excavate said streets, roads, lanes, alleys and other highways, pavements, sidewalks and other public grounds; provided, that there shall be no unreasonable obstruction of the same, and that they shall be immediately restored as nearly as practicable to the same condition as they were in before said excavation.

Section 3. That the said M. W. McGrath, his successors and assigns, shall lay and extend pipes for the carrying of said water to any part of the said City when requested to do so by resolution of the City Council: Provided that said extension is required for the use of hydrants for fire purposes, by said City, and that said City shall obligate itself to pay to said M. W. McGrath, and his assigns, for the use of said hydrant when in operation.

Section 4. The said M. W. McGrath, and his assigns, shall furnish an ample supply of pure, wholesome, filtered water, not at present utilized by gravity or other pressure, of not less than eighty pounds to the square inch, through main pipes of sufficient size and quality to meet all requirements of the city and its inhabitants.

Section 5. The city authorities shall adopt and enforce all local and territorial ordinances necessary to protect the said water works and the owners thereof from fraud and imposition, and to prevent the waste of water on the part of consumers, and the said M. W. McGrath, and his assigns, shall have power to make such rules and regulations for the conduct and management of his and their business as it may deem necessary, not inconsistent with the laws of the territory and the ordinances of the city.

Section 6. In consideration of the benefits that will accrue to the city and its people by the operation of the said water works system, and for the better protection of the city against ravages by fire, the city of Santa Fe, hereby agrees and binds itself to pay to the said M. W. McGrath, and his assigns, for the term of twenty-five years, an annual rental of thirty-five dollars each for not less than thirty hydrants, to be placed at such points on the water mains as the city council may locate them, to be used for fire purposes, and the same rental to be paid for each additional hydrant so located. Such payment to be made quarterly after said hydrants are erected and supplied with water.

Section 7. For the government of the said M. W. McGrath, and the protection of the citizens, the water rates to consumers, during the continuance of this franchise, shall not exceed the following monthly tariff rates, namely:

Section 9. This ordinance is passed and the above franchise is given upon the express condition and understanding that the said M. W. McGrath, and his assigns, shall have his or their reservoir completed, mains laid, and water ready for delivery thereon within two years from the filing of the acceptance thereof by said M. W. McGrath; and upon the failure of said M. W. McGrath or his assigns to so complete the work and provide water for delivery in the mains, all rights and privileges granted hereunder shall lapse and become forfeited without further action on the part of said city, and the said M. W. McGrath shall take nothing or receive no benefit under and by virtue of this ordinance.

Section 10.

Franchise to be null and void if transferred to any existing water company now in said city of Santa Fe.

SEWER SYSTEM ORDINANCE.

Chapter

An ordinance granting a franchise to M. W. McGrath to construct, maintain and operate a sewer system in the City of Santa Fe.

Be it ordained by the city council of the City of Santa Fe:

Section 1. That the right of way and the right and privilege and franchise to construct, maintain and operate a sewer system in the City of Santa Fe, New Mexico, for the purpose of carrying away and disposing of the sewage of said city, is hereby granted to M. W. McGrath, a citizen of the United States, and a resident of the City of Chicago, in the State of Illinois, or his assigns, for the term of twenty-five years from the passage of this ordinance, subject, however, to the terms, provisions and conditions hereinafter mentioned and set forth.

Section 2. That said M. W. McGrath or his assigns, are hereby granted the right of way as held by the said City of Santa Fe, and within its limits as now or hereafter incorporated, for the said term of twenty-five years, to lay and maintain sewers, mains or pipes in any and all streets, roads, lanes, alleys and other public highways and grounds dedicated to, owned or controlled by said city or which may hereafter during the existence of this franchise be dedicated to, owned or controlled by within the present or future limits of said city, and to construct all needful devices and structures as may be needed and necessary for the operating and maintaining of said sewer system in said city; Provided, however, that no device, structure or means detrimental or injurious to the health of the citizens of said city or as a nuisance, shall be used, maintained or operated in connection with the establishment or operation of said sewer system within said city, under the penalty of law and subject to be abated; and the said M. W. McGrath or his assigns shall have the right to excavate any street, road, lane, alley or other highway or public grounds within the limit of said city necessary to be done in the proper construction, maintaining and operating of said sewer system; Provided, there shall be no unnecessary obstruction of any such street, road, lane, alley or other highway or public ground, and any such street, road, lane, alley or other public highway or grounds shall be restored to as good a condition, as near as practicable to the same condition as the same were in before such excavation of the same without unnecessary delay, and any unnecessary delay in so restoring any such street, road, lane, alley, or other public highway or grounds so excavated shall be declared a violation of the laws of the Territory of New Mexico, and the ordinances of said city in references to the obstruction of public roads, highways and public streets.

Section 3. The said sewer system when constructed and completed shall be of sufficient capacity to meet the requirements of said city, and there shall be constructed, ready for use and operation, not less than five thousand feet of sewer mains within the limits of said city on or before the first day of January, 1902, and not less than one thousand feet within nine months from the passage of this franchise, and in the event of a failure to construct ready for use and operation five thousand feet of said sewer system in the said city by said date then the city council of said city shall have the power to declare this franchise null and void and of no force and effect.

Provided, however, that if any injunction or other process of law shall be instituted against the contractor or constructors, contractor or contractors in the construction or working of said sewer system, by reason of which the work thereon shall be delayed, then the time so consumed by reason of any such litigation shall not be counted or considered and the time for the completion of the said five thousand feet shall be extended for a period equal to that consumed by said litigation; provided, however, that the said city council shall be fully satisfied that the litigation is bona fide, and not collusive before such extension of time shall operate.

Section 4. The said City of Santa Fe shall have the right to purchase said sewer system at any time after the expiration of five years from the completion thereof, with all the rights, privileges and franchises herein granted, which may at the time be owned, claimed, possessed or enjoyed by the owners thereof, at a fair valuation, which shall be determined by three disinterested persons, non-residents of said city, one to be selected by the city council of said city, one to be selected by the owners of said franchise and property, and one to be selected by the first two selected, and the three persons thus chosen shall act as commissioners to assess and appraise the value of said franchise, property and effects pertaining and belonging to said sewer system and fix the value thereof, and the amount so fixed as the value of such franchise and property shall be the price to be paid by said city for the same.

Section 5. The city council of the City of Santa Fe shall and will enact all proper, needful and requisite ordinances necessary for the proper protection of said sewer system from any trespass, fraud or imposition on the same, and properly enforce the same by fine and penalties against any person or persons violating any such ordinance or ordinances, and the owner or owners of such franchise and sewer system shall have and they are hereby authorized to make such tariff rates for the connection with and use of said sewer system as he or they shall deem necessary, as well as to establish all other reasonable rules and regulations that may be required and necessary for the management thereof, not in conflict with or contrary to the existing laws of the Territory of New Mexico.

Section 6. The construction, building, operating and maintaining of said sewer system for which this franchise is granted shall be free from any cost, expense or charge to said city, and any and all damages, claims or demands arising or occurring in such construction and building or the maintaining and repairing of the same after construction, shall be at the expense of the owner or owners of said franchise and sewer system.

Section 7. It shall be unlawful for any person except such as are authorized by the owner or owners of said sewer system, or by the mayor or city council of said city, with the approval of the owner or owners of said sewer system, to in any way disturb, meddle with or interfere with any main, pipe or connection, or anything pertaining to or connected with said sewer system. And any such person violating any provisions of this ordinance, shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not less than ten dollars nor more than one hundred dollars, or by imprisonment in the county jail or city prison for a term not less than ten days nor more than ninety days, or by both such fine and imprisonment, in the discretion of the court trying the cause.

Section 8. Within thirty days after the granting of this franchise and the approval of the mayor of the said City of Santa Fe, the said M. W. McGrath shall file with the city clerk of the City of Santa Fe his written acceptance of said franchise and franchise, subject to all the conditions and provisions therein set out and mentioned, and failure to file such acceptance within said time shall be deemed a revocation of said franchise.
