FIELD SESSIONS FELLOWSHIPS

Three to six field sessions fellowships will be available to University of New Mexico students this summer in the Chaco Canyon. These fellowships are open only to students who register for 175F or 199F or 251F at Chaco during the month of August. For further details, see Dr. D. D. Brand, Director of the Field Sessions.

GRADUATE FELLOWSHIPS

The Department of Anthropology probably will have between one and four graduate fellowships open for the academic year 1936-37. Any student who has majored in anthropology and graduated (or will graduate before fall of 1937) with better than average grades may apply for a fellowship. Obtain blanks from the Office of the Graduate Dean, and submit the filled-in forms to Dr. D. D. Brand, Head of Department.

WHERE TO STUDY?

Students planning to do special or advanced work in other schools should consult the catalogs and other material available in Dr. Brand's office. The Committee on Graduate Instruction, of the American Council on Education, has prepared a report upon institutions offering graduate work in one or more of thirty-five fields of knowledge. The institutions were rated as highly prepared, adequately prepared, and not equipped to prepare candidates for the doctorate. This issue there will be given only the highly prepared and adequately prepared institutions in Anthropology and Geography; and the highly prepared in Sociology and Philosophy.
