FUR WILL FLY WHEN LOWER CLASSES BATTLE IN ARENA

Committee Announces Rules for Epoch Making Annihilation of Freshmen and Sophomores, Who Enlist Their Famous Fighters to Decide Awe-Inspiring Questions.

FEAR THAT SOPHS WILL ERECT "KING'S CROSS."

The management announces the GREATEST SPECTACLE OF ITS KIND since the Christian Martyrs at the University arena on Feb. 4, when the Sophomores and Freshmen meet in the class fight of the year. The slaughter will take the irregular semblance of a cane rush and an obstacle race. The result determines whether the Sophomores can make the Freshmen continue to wear their ink spots.

It is whispered about that the Freshmen have organized themselves and have subscribed to two correspondence courses by ex-wrestling champs.

Sophs Object

On the other hand it is a generally admitted thing in Sophomore circles that if this can be proved against the Frosh every second year man is to put up "King's Cross" on the day of the match and let the yearlings have the cane. It certainly doesn't seem fair to have Farmer Burns and Frank Gotch coaching the other side. The management assured a representative of the Weekly yesterday that the fight would not be protested.

Rules

The rules of the contest are set forth at length by the committee. In the cane rush the rules positively declare that there must be a cane. Everything else is left to the discretion of the participants. In the obstacle race the rules are inflexible in their demand that there be obstacles and a race. Rough play, providing it does not extend over the time devoted to the meet, is perfectly legitimate.

Limited Armament

Attention is called to the new form this year's concentrated hazing has taken. While last year's frolic resulted in serious injuries, it was decided to make the affair this year more gentlemanly. Exemplifying President Harding, a limitation of Armaments was declared and the very effective Knock'em-Down-and-Drag-Em-Out tactics of last year have been declared unconstitutional. All those who declare the rules scraps of paper will be pouted at and hissed by a committee appointed for that purpose.

Sizing Them Up

To offset this advantage, the Freshmen class has been permitted to enlist Civerolla as an extra member of its team.

Between the first and second

CONSTITUTIONS READ BY STUDENT COUNCIL

At a meeting of the Student Council held last Wednesday in the Seminar room, the constitutions of the Dramatic Club and the Lowell Literary society, which were offered for approval, were read and discussed in detail.

The constitution of the Dramatic club was returned to that organization for the inculcation of one or two minor details of importance, but the Council expressed its approval on the bulk of its clauses. VARSITY PASSERS TO MEET ARIZONA

Lobos and Wildcats Will Mix in Two Contests in Armory on February 1st and 2nd.

Despite pre-season announcements to the contrary, the University dribblers will take part in Inter-Collegiate basketball this year, two games having been arranged by Coach Johnson with the Arizona Wildcats, to be played here on February 1st, and 2nd. The interfraternity contests have been discontinued until the 5th of the month, and a series of practice games has been arranged for the U. N. M. squad, in preparation for Arizona.

The outlook for a winning Varsity team at the present time does not appear very bright. With only a little more than a week to play together, members of the Red and Gray squad have had to go through a period of very intensive training, but at the present time, they are shaping into a smoothly functioning quintet. Stowell, Bryan, and Dow are certain to be included in the first string line-up, while the other positions are as yet tentatively awarded.

Little is known of the strength of the Wildcats. The ability of their mentor, however, to put winning teams in the field insures a speedy pack of passers, and the rivalry which always dominated contests between the Arizonians and the Lobos should provide two hard-fought battles.

The games will be staged on the Armory court, and plans are being made for a University cheering section. Further announcements will be made concerning these arrangements.

GEOLOGY CLASS MAKES SURVEY OF VOLCANOES

Under the supervision of Prof. R. W. Ellis, the geology classes made a field trip Wednesday afternoon to the volcanoes, studying their structure and that of the surrounding lava field.

Prof. Ellis explained to the class that the volcanoes have probably been extinct for at least 100,000 years, and that the lava flow probably dates back to about the same period. Although there is no life in the volcanoes now, it cannot be stated definitely that they will never become active, he explained.

The class drove to the volcanoes in cars, leaving the university at 1:00 o'clock, and returning to town shortly after 5:00 o'clock.

THE LOWELL SOCIETY

Unfortunately, the Lowell Literary Society is hampered in its development by a controversy over the question of whether the organization shall be limited in membership to male undergraduates. At several meetings of the society, the question has been mulled over, and the constitution, which was submitted for adoption, with the restricted membership clause in it, is in the process of being amended.

We do not think there should be any division in the ranks of students and co-eds in such a society as the Lowell. A co-educational institution offers that advantage to intellectual women which can be found in no other type of organization namely, mental contact with constructively thinking men. This is considered to be one of the greatest broadening influences available to the modern woman, and the society will be defeating its purpose if the co-eds are excluded.

There are admitted objections to having a mixed society attend meetings in Rodey Hall at night. It is said that town girls would be unable to attend unless accompanied by escorts. Would not the same objection hold true in the case of these same girls attending a strictly co-ed meeting? The program is too crowded during the day to permit of afternoon meetings, and we are back at the point where we started.

The Lowell Society requires of all its members a good measure of hard work. It holds forth no social inducements to its members. Undergraduates who join the organization do so with serious purposes and the dilettante is noticeably lacking in the personnel of the society.

And then, as the major consideration, we must face the evil which confronts every University activity we have, that is, the danger of death from lack of interest. There are few enough, as it is, interested in forensics, and to divide the force would be to wilfully challenge defeat.

faults of the past term, but every
undergraduate, if he has failed in

The Department of Electrical Engineering is at last able to announce the arrival of the long-awaited wireless receiving apparatus. The equipment was received last Friday and it was installed and in operation within fifteen minutes after the time the goods were unpacked. Communications were established with various wireless stations and a few words were exchanged with an operator at Waurika, Oklahoma, that are known not to exist in the latest revised edition on wireless parlor small-talk as edited by Mr. Morse.

Weather reports dispatched here were recorded at Douglas, Arizona on last Saturday. The operator at that station commented on the clearness and accuracy of the sendings. The juice-bugs are now busily engaged in installing those parts of the wireless telephone transmitting outfit. The parts are purchased from an Eastern firm and are assembled in the laboratory.

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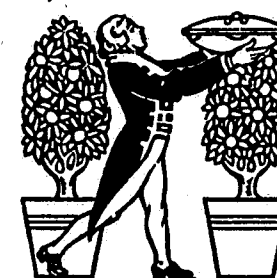
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
