## VARSITY LOSES TO COLORADO COLLEGE

First Game of Season Played Away From Home and Our Team Returns Losers by Score of 47 to 2.

The Varsity eleven was defeated by Colorado College last Saturday afternoon at Colorado Springs by the score of 47 to 2. This appears to be a very one sided game, but contrary to appearances all reports show that the game was very exciting and well played. The game was played at Washburn field, and about fifteen hundred people attended the contest.

Notwithstanding the fact that we were defeated, the experience gathered from this contest is well worth the effort and our men are just that much better equipped to take on all opponents for the rest of the season.

Each and every one of our men played exceptionally well, but Lee, Hoffman and Wigeley starred.

The hospitality with which our team was met is indeed worthy of mention. Too much praise can not be given the Colorado College, and it is earnestly hoped that we will be able to reciprocate some time in the near future. One important thing which always leaves an impression on a visiting team is the way they are treated.

The Colorado team was considerably heavier than our team and were thus able to make their gains by line plunges, which method they pursued during the entire contest. The U. N. M. completely outclassed their opponents in the use of the forward pass, Captain Brorein received a long pass and succeeded in taking the ball across the goal line, but the referee's whistle was blown and Brorein was declared out of bounds about fifteen or twenty yards from the goal, legally, however.

The safety, constituting the two points made by the University, occurred in the last quarter. Range, half back for Colorado, intercepted a forward pass Lapraik to Brorein, in the neutral zone, that is within the 10-yard line back of the goal which Colorado was defending, and instead of touching the ball to the ground, attempted to run with it and Brorein tackled him back of the line, thus making the safety for the University.

Davis, quarter back for Colorado, starred for the College.

The team arrived home Sunday morning at 9:45.

## SCHOLASTIC STANDING RECOGNIZED IN U.N.M.

Chapter of Honor Society Installed in University With Due Ceremony; Competition to Be Keen in Senior Class This Year for Election to This Fraternity.

The New Mexico chapter of Phi Kappa Phi was installed Saturday afternoon, October 7th, by Dr. E. W. Wentworth, professor in the Kansas A. & M. College, and regent of Phi Kappa Phi for the northern province.

At ten o'clock Saturday morning was held the public lecture delivered by Dr. Wentworth on the subject: "I, an Undergraduate." The speaker answered on the basis of biology, the question why go to college. In the animal world he showed how the difference in care and treatment determined future values. The same difference of treatment applied to human beings, enables them to increase their value to themselves and to society.

Explaining the ideals of Phi Kappa Phi the speaker stated "that this society stands for achievement." "Achievement is the basis of appreciation. The athlete is measured by the degree of his achievement. So it is in every walk of life. President Foster of Reed College has looked into the records of college men during the last one hundred years, and has found that 40 per cent of all college men have achieved what is called success, while 85 per cent of the honor men have reached the category of successful. Election to honor societies stamps the student as being an intellectual leader among men."

Dr. L. B. Mitchell, president of the local chapter, told something of the history of Phi Kappa Phi and stated that it was founded with the purpose of honoring men and women who had attained academic achievement in any and all departments of learning.

In the afternoon the original petitioners were received into membership and declared the New Mexico Chapter of Phi Kappa Phi. Officers were then elected for the ensuing year as follows: President, Dr. Mitchell; vice-president, Dr. Clark; secretary, Prof. Weese; treasurer, Prof. Wand; marshal, Prof. Worcester.

Elaborate plans have been outlined for a splendid production which will include numerous fancy choruses as well as several prominent characters. All persons in the University having talent and ambitions along this line will be given a chance to display it.

At a meeting of the Dramatic club on Tuesday, October 3, Miss Hickey gave a rough outline of the plot as it has been worked out so far. All those who were present at this meeting know that "it listens well."

The first act opens with a carnival scene with every one wondering who is to be queen of the carnival. This is to be a great position of honor and, as Sibyl, the prophetess, announces, there are important requirements that must be fulfilled by this important person. The one and only way to do this is to win the football every night and encourage them so they will be in position to defeat the Colorado School of Mines here Saturday.

Our own spirit of the triumph of the University that day has never been a man on any team who has been yellow when they played the Colorado College last Saturday. Sport and entertainment means a great deal to men who devote a good part of their time to these different activities and the sooner we let the team and the squad know that we are behind them whether they win or lose the better results will be easily attained.

The same last Saturday was one-sided and it happened to be against us, but our confidence in the team has not decreased one bit. In fact our opinion has been strengthened by the manner in which they took the defeat. Anybody can win and be happy but it takes a real man to lose and feel the same way. Our warriors are home with us again and we are mighty glad to have them all alive. The first string around your finger early in the game and remind yourselves that you ought to be out on the bleachers every night.

## VICTORY.

This year the University of New Mexico was on the schedule to play football with two teams of the Rocky Mountain Conference League teams. As Dr. Boyd pointed out in assembly, perhaps some eastern people who now believe we are a part of Old Mexico will change their minds and improve their knowledge of geography when they discover that we are old enough to pay football "It pays to advertise."

Further, we pointed out that the University had won a victory in being admitted to the Rocky Mountain Conference League, and that regardless of the score in the game which was played last Saturday we would come out victorious. This is exactly true to every one who knows what the Conference is and how much it means to our University to be admitted.

## FACULTY DISTRIBUTION BOX NOW AVAILABLE

A faculty distribution box has been placed on the east wall in the Administration Building, directly opposite the position for the purpose of making things more convenient for the students and the faculty. Any correspondence or letters of any weight whatever that may be desired to be taken up with the faculty need only to be placed in the pigeon hole directly beneath the desired professor's name, and it certainly will be attended to.

This system does away with the confusion which has been very noticeable around the library, and which has also been very inconvenient for the faculty members and some of the students' desires of having conferences with the different professors.

The box has been placed in a position of great convenience and from now on no one will have any trouble in finding the professors they are looking for.

This is also a very convenient place for students to place their notes and make up work when they are not able to leave or get into the professor's office. And let it not be said that any students are doing the same thing. "I carried these notes around with me for three days and finally lost them." Just as soon as you write your notes, fill them up gently and place them in the assigned pigeon-hole and the result is bound to be in your favor.

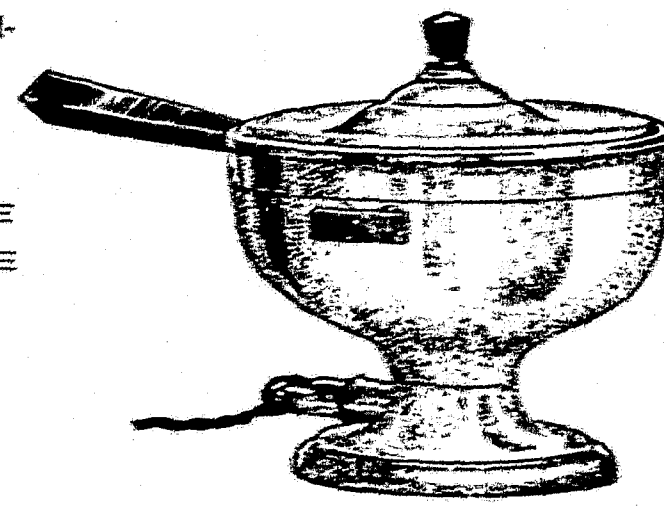

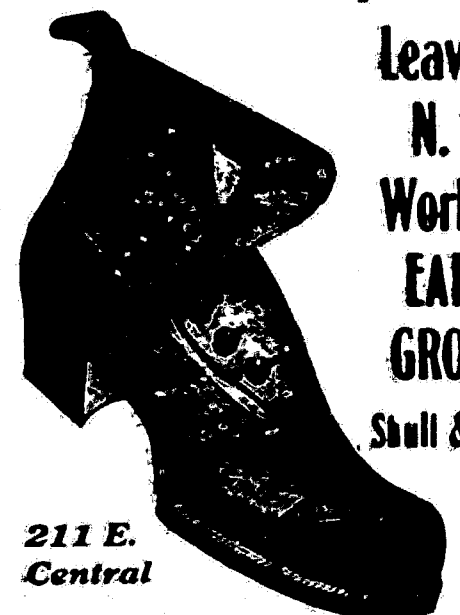
