VARSIITY WINS CHAMPIONSHIP FROM AGGIES 13-0

AGGIE CHAMPIONSHIP HOPES CRUSHED BY LIGHT AND FAST VARSITY TEAM

Heavy Farmer Line Rolls Back Before Varsity Charge While Fast Backs Tear Through Aggie Line for Large Gains—Aggie Team Outclassed in Everything, While in Final Summary It Was Varsity's Deadly Execution of Forward Pass That Spelled Defeat of Heavier Eleven.

The Varsity machine met and defeated the Aggie eleven 13-0 Thanksgiving day on their own gridiron at State College, N. M., winning a clear title to the football championship of the Southwest.

held the on-rush of a superior weight and prevented the Aggies from scoring. From the aggressive standpoint it was Varsity's deadly execution of the forward pass that spelled the defeat of the farmer team; and the Ag-

ly claim the championship of the Southwest.

The game was one of much penalizing but it was a clean game and one fairly officiated and officiated in a manner that met the approval of both factions. In fact A. C. prides itself in finding four officials who will do the square thing at all times. The officials are four West Point grads, who are stationed at Camp Cotton and Fort Bliss, Texas.

Varsity executed one pass to Nohl that gained forty yards, another to Nohl netted thirty yards, and one to Brorien brought an equal gain. Many short passes were thrown to L. Feather and Balcomb. Aydelotte

ing the letters N, M, A, C in the order given.

The feeling at being beaten after a season of straight victories must have been anything but pleasant but the Aggies showed a spirit of courtesy and hospitality that Varsity might well imitate.

First Period.

Aggies kicked off to Varsity from south goal. L. Feather received and was tackled on Varsity 10-yard line. Lapraik punted and the Farmers field where Varsity regained it on a fumble.

Lapraik went through left side for 12 yards, and a pass to Nohl failed. Aydelotte fumbled ball on next play

The whole Cherry and Silver team stand out as the heroes of the game. Eleven men went on the field determined to win. They knew that every Varsity man there was back of them true as steel and they stood together better from the knowledge of the fact that they were only a few and it was up to those few to win—and win they did. Varsity outclassed the Aggies in everything but end runs and the wonderful spirit of a game loser, and she had no opportunity to display the latter.

It would be impossible to pick a star for the Varsity. It is true that the passes from Aydelotte to Nohl, Brorien, L. Feather, and Balcomb are responsible for most of Varsity's gains but on the other hand it was the Cherry and Silver line that with-

gies' end runs were the only plays with which they could gain ground. Coach Hutchinson whipped the team of many new and untried players that met a close defeat at the hands of Institute at the first of the season into a machine which gained a decisive 13-0 victory over the Aggie eleven who recently defeated the cadets 17-7. Lieut. Harris, who umpired the game and saw the Varsity-Institute and the Aggie-Institute contests, stated in his speech at the big turkey dinner that in his opinion Varsity outplayed Institute fair week and won a decisive victory over the Aggies. The god of luck and circumstance often play a big part in football games but there was nothing freakish in this contest and Varsity can and does fairly and square-

took the ball across the line in the second quarter for Varsity's first touchdown and L. Feather followed in the third period with the last score for the Cherry and Silver. The kick made by Wigley after the last touchdown hit the top of the west goal post but was not counted. Ladd attempted to save A. C. from a goose egg score by punting but he failed to bring the ball between the posts.

In the morning a cold wind was blowing from the north but by two o'clock this had subsided, and, though a little cold, they day was ideal for the game. The band and many fans came down from Las Cruces to witness the contest and A. C.'s rooters were there en masse. During the intermission between halves they marched down the field form-

The Aggies cannot claim that overconfidence was the cause of their defeat. They thought they were going to win. That was all well and good. But, nevertheless, we are positive they did not lose because they thought they were going to win. There are no excuses; there can be no excuses. Varsity outplayed the farmers, and the final score: Varsity 13, Aggies 0, tells the tale.

ver line tightened and they got ball on Aggies' short punt. Aydelotte went through right side for 6 yards and a long pass to Nohl netted Varsity 40 yards. Lapraik made 4 yards on line plunge, and a pass to Nohl failed. Lapraik went through right tackle for 4 yards, and first quarter ended with it Varsity's ball on 18-yard line. Score 0—0.

Second Period.

Varsity was penalized 15 yards at start for holding, after a gain of 4 yards had been made. Red went through line for 4 yards. Pass to Brorien failed. Aydelotte went around right end for fifteen yards, then smashed through left side for Varsity's first touchdown. Wigley made kick. Score: Varsity, 7; Aggies, 0.

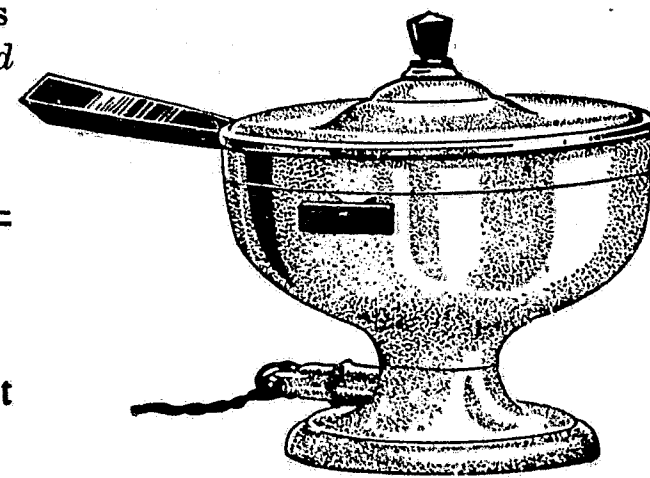
Varsity kicked to Aggies and they returned pigskin to Varsity 40-yard line. Nohl and Jack made good tackles ending desperate runs by Aggies. Farmers were penalized fifteen yards for holding. Aggies penalized again and a third time, fifteen yards each time. They punted and Lapraik was tackled on Cherry and Silver 10-yard line. Aydelotte made 15 yards on end run, and Varsity was penalized fifteen yards for showing. Varsity punted. Aggies made good gains but Cherry and Silver line held them at 30-yard line where Ladd attempted a place kick which went wild. Varsity, with ball on their own 20 yard line, punted. Ladd carried ball for long end run of forty yards and goal, but ran out of bounds twenty yards from end of field. Aggies punted over border. Varsity's ball on own 20-yard line; they punted and ball went outside at 30-yard line at end of first half.

Talk Varsity spirit! Can anyone who saw the demonstration in town Friday after the return of the conquering heroes doubt that Varsity has a college spirit?

Aydelotte has been Varsity's star all season and his forward passes to the ends and backs were responsible for Varsity's scores. Everybody was delighted but not surprised to see this crack player make all-Southwestern half-back.

Many Cherry and Silver men did not get in the Thanksgiving contest but Varsity appreciates how they would have given the best that was in them had they been called upon to play. We're all for the Varsity fellows and there's another season and another championship coming to us in 1916.

Some interesting dope lies in the fact that previous to the Thanksgiving contest Varsity had had 12 points scored against her and the Aggies 13. That Varsity not only held the Aggies scoreless but themselves made as many points against the farmers as had been made by all other combined teams this season. In 1913 the Aggies won over Varsity 13—0 and this is our first victory over them

since 1909 when we won by a score of 51—0. It is also interesting to note that both teams had 6 points scored against them in a practice game with a high school.

RECEPTION OF FOOTBALL TEAM.

When the University's victorious team stepped off the Las Cruces train with the Southwestern championship it was a dazzling sight that met their eyes and a roaring sound that greeted them. Second Half.

Varsity kicked off to the north goal and Aggies returned to their own 30-yard line. After failing to make gains Aggies punt and Lapraik with ball is tackled on Varsity 30-yard line. Varsity lost the ball on a fumble on one play and regained on Aggies' fumble on next play. Lapraik went through left tackle for 5 yards. Varsity failed to gain and punted to Aggies' 40-yard line. After gains by Aggies, Varsity line held and Ladd failed on a second place kick from their 45-yard line. Varsity, with ball on their 20-yard line, sent Balcomb through line for 10 yards. L. Feather got 8 yards on forward pass. Balcomb got 8 yards on forward pass and Jack went through line for 2 yards. Long pass to Brorien nets Varsity 30 yards, and another to Nohl 12 yards. The Aggie line held here but on the fourth down L. Feather carried the ball 12 yards around right end for the second touchdown. Kick not made. Score: Varsity 13; Aggies 0.

Aggies fumbled ball on kick-off and Varsity recovered it. Pass to L. Feather got gain of 5 yards. Jack

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went through line for 2 yards. Varsity lost ball on downs. Aggies used last three minutes of play Ray resome smashing end runs and Lapraik did good tackling on their line drives. Aggies punted and Balcomb, receiving, was tackled on Varsity 25-yard line. Balcomb went through line for 3 yards. Aggies got pass to Brorien. End of third period; Aggies ball on Varsity's 17-yard line.

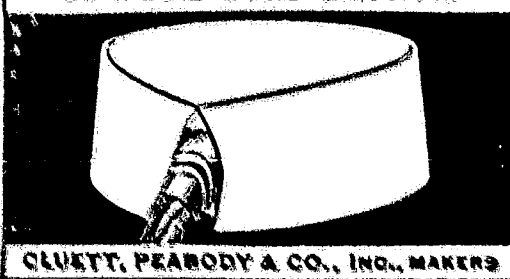
The city Pan-Mexican meets next Saturday afternoon at three o'clock at the home of the president, Mrs. P. G. Quench, 113 South Walter Street.
