## CHERRY AND SILVER OUTCLASS OPPONENTS

Crack Normal Team From Arizona, Unable to Score on Varsity Eleven; Play Called at End of Third Quarter on Account of Darkness.

The Varsity eleven trimmed the Flagstaff Normal team Saturday afternoon on the varsity field to the tune of 108 to 0. Play was called at the beginning of the fourth period on account of darkness. The Normalites were completely outclassed on account of their best players being out of the game. They were much lighter than our team, but were game to the core. The men from Arizona play clean football and are to be highly complimented in this respect.

The game was called at 3:30 and a fairly good crowd attended, even though the day was windy. Varsity kicked off, but Normals were unable to make their downs and the ball changed hands. In first two minutes of play "Doggie" carried the ball through tackle for a touchdown. The opposition was not very strong and the Varsity did not have much trouble in piling up three more touchdowns before the end of the first quarter. The score at this time was U. N. M. 27, Normals 0.

The wind was bad, and therefore forward passes were not pulled off to advantage, although Aydelotte handled the ball with a great deal of ease when the signal for a forward pass was given. "Doggie" and Aydelotte carried the ball over the line a majority of the times in the first half. The score at the end of this period was, U. N. M. 31, Normals 0. The Varsity second string men went in at the beginning of the second half, and continued to pile up the score. One feature of the game was Tom Williams reaching over the line and pulling a Normalite down, causing a loss of three or four yards. The entire team played exceptionally well. Due to the one-sided score, a complete write up of the contest would be impossible. Arizona took advantage of the wind, and every time Varsity kicked they allowed the ball to go out of bounds. By doing this they were given the ball on the twenty-yard line. During the entire first half the Normal boys did not make their downs once. The ball was in possession of our team most of the time. The only time the Normalites seemed to be able to get possession of it was when Wigley kicked out of bounds and the ball was placed on the twenty-yard line.

The financial part of the game, due to the bad day, did not come out any too well, a special effort will have to be made to make the football season pay for itself. In fact, the Athletic Council has taken action and decided that it will be absolutely necessary to have an advance sale of \$400 in order to finance the game with the Agricultural College. Dr. Kirk Will Conduct a Class in Geography of New Mexico Provided Sufficient Inquiries Are Made Before End of First Semester.

Dr. Kirk will offer a very advantageous course next semester on the geography of New Mexico, providing there are enough students desiring the course.

It would seem impossible to learn the conditions and interesting phases of our own state from a more competent person than Dr. Kirk. Holding the position of State Geologist as well as being secretary of the New Mexico Geological Society, in addition to his position in the University, Dr. Kirk has traveled over many square miles of New Mexico. Few understand the country better, either from studying the conditions or from actual experience with them.

It is the duty of the students of this University to know something of their own state, for even though New Mexico is a young state it has its importance. Certainly we should know of our own resources if any one should, and this is our opportunity to learn of them.

This will be a three-hour course, to begin the second semester. The hour has not been definitely decided upon yet, although it will probably be at 8 o'clock on Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

## DENNIS STATES FACTS AS SEEN IN EAST

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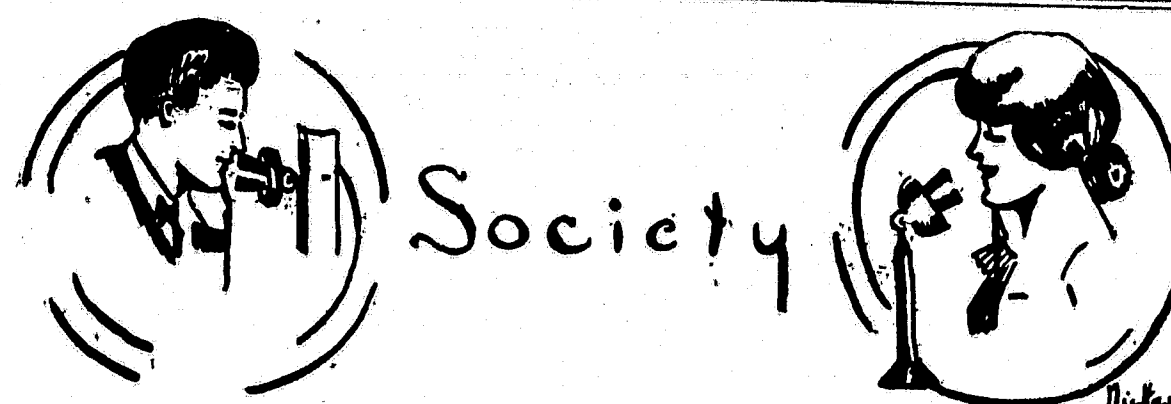
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## Sigma Chis Entertain

## SUCCESSFUL ASSEMBLY

The enrollment of the student body is the largest; there have been more men out for football; the team has been playing even better ball; it has received recognition by the Rocky Mountain Conference; and present indications are that the largest crowd ever present at any collegiate event in the Southwest will be up at the University field to see and help the Varsity win the championship.

As is befitting a game of such importance Mr. Mason, better known as "Macy," from Rutgers, has thought it opportune to issue a souvenir booklet and score card for our Thanksgiving game. This is but another step which classes the game with other big games of Colleges and Universities throughout the country. "Macy" has planned to get the booklet up in a very attractive style with a cherry red cover, lettered in silver. It will contain information of interest to everyone at the game. There will be a cut of the University accompanied by an article setting forth in a popular way the aims and prospects of the institution. Then will follow individual pictures of Coach Hutchinson Captain Brorien and Manager Bruce and a full page cut of the entire football squad. These pictures will be supplemented by a sort of "Who's Who" in U. N. M. football that is a short sketch of each man's football career. There will be a full page cut of the Aggie squad and similar information about each of their men. The official line-up and score together with University songs and cheers will complete the plan. These will be sold for the nominal sum of ten cents and we are glad to report that the project is receiving customary loyal support of the merchants in town.

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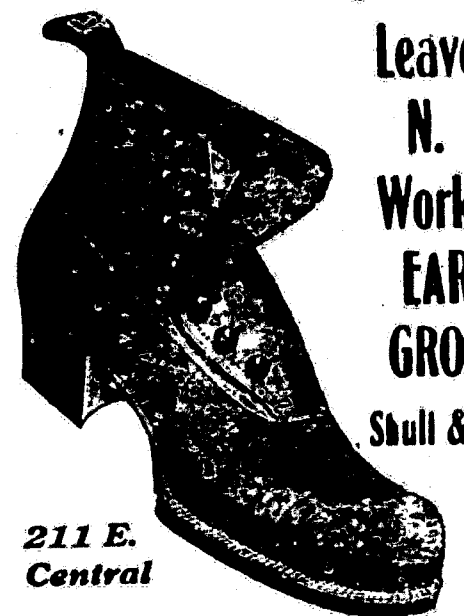
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
