## VARSITY AND AGGIES BATTLE FOR SUPREMACY TURKEY DAY

### Farmers Are Coming Prepared to Put Up Scrap of Their Lives; Determined to Administer Defeat to U. N. M. Eleven

The Varsity eleven will meet the Aggies Thursday afternoon, Thanksgiving day, at Varsity field to decide the championship of the state. The game will be called promptly at 3 o'clock and a record breaking attendance is expected.

Our men have been practicing harder than ever before and will undoubtedly come out with the big end of the score. The fact, however, that we have been practicing so strenuously, shows very clearly that we do not expect to win in a walk.

Coach Hutchinson's ability is too well known to attempt any explanation. Suffice it to say, in this respect, that we all realize he is one of the best football coaches in the country. A glance at some of the earlier Princeton catalogues is enough to give you the entire information needed on "HUTCH."

Captain Brorlen has been with us three years now, and certainly deserves the honor which was bestowed upon him last year, as captain of the Varsity eleven. Carl has played his best football this year and will undoubtedly be picked for all Southwestern end.

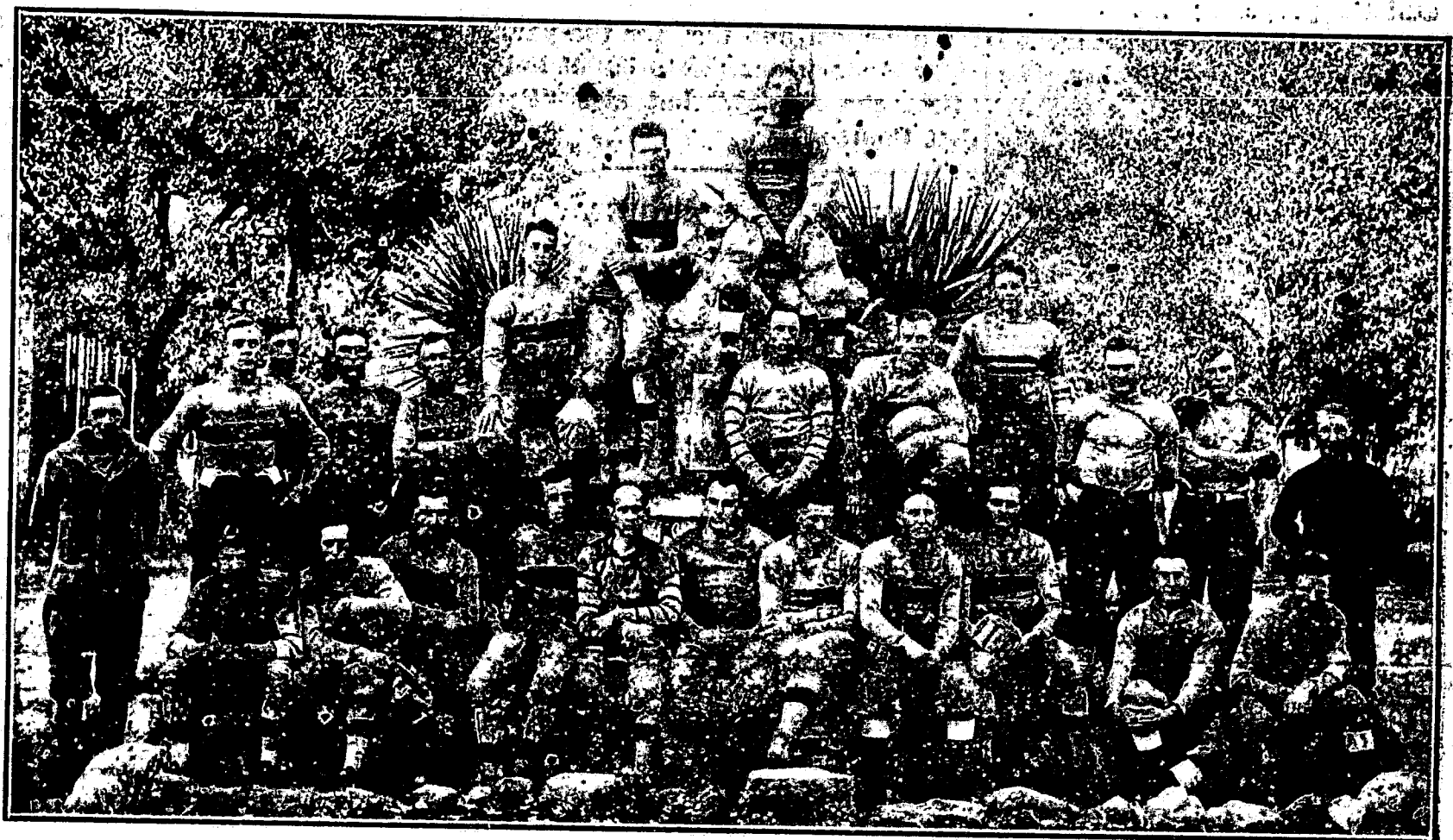
Floyd Lee has played two years on the team and aided Hutch in coaching last year, when he was unable to take part on account of internal injuries. He is back in the game this year, and the grit and fight of the little fellow has made him a reputation.

Jack Lapraik, our "banty-legged" quarterback has played on the team consistently since his matriculation at the Varsity, and in the past has done some very good work.

Bob Wigley, the big center, has proved himself worthy of nonorable mention in his two years of service at the Varsity.

Lee Langston, last year's all Southwestern guard, has improved wonderfully under Hutch's supervision and is a candidate for the same position this year.

year of football last season, has developed materially this year.

Howard Fullerton, has devoted a good part of his time the last four years, to rounding the first team men in shape, and has finally gained a place on the regular lineup.

Louis Nohl, last year's all Southwestern end, has been out of the game the last week or so with a bad knee, but his usual ability in handling the forward pass will more than likely attract attention.

Pete Sinesio, one of last year's scrubs, showed what he had in him, and gained a first team position this year.

"Swift" Shields, chosen two years ago as all Southwestern end is back with us this year, and with his additional weight should be able to land high honors.

McMains and Upton, two of last year's second team men have shown up well this season. McMains speed in end runs and Upton's ability to hit the line are strong factors.

Lyman Thackrey, the speedy and brainy quarterback has shown up to good advantage this year and will more than likely have charge of the team on Thanksgiving day. "Thack" is a real football player.

Carl Aydelotte, the all Southwestern halfback last year, is even better this season, and chances are that he will land the same position on the

all Southwestern team. Speedy, brainy and heavy enough, he is a power of strength to the Varsity eleven.

Craig and Dunlap, two men who have had one year's training under Hutch, are back in the squad again this year.

John Powell, although playing his first year college football, shows signs of life and in a year or so will be the regular man in the quarterback's position. He is light but fast and steady.

John Steed from Deming has a position on the regular lineup.

C. Clark, also from Deming high school is learning the tricks of college football, and will prove a valuable man at center.

Tom Williams, the big 175-pound tackle is a power of strength to us this year and has a good chance to make all Southwestern.

Bernhardt is fast and under careful coaching of Hutch will develop into a real "find."

Wilfley and Magee have been attending practice regularly and will make somebody hustle next year.

Last, but by no means least, we have a halfback who will demonstrate what a real speedy man is. Having considerable experience and knowing football thoroughly, Hoffman, better known as "DOGGIE," will be a hard man to keep from

## DISTRIBUTION OF FUND.

The distribution of the \$5.00 athletic fund was made some time ago by the athletic council in conference with those representing other student interests.

The athletic council should see that each activity has its correct share. So far this has not been done, due to the fact that the council has not been able to get together for their meetings as regularly as might be desired.

Football season has been given \$450.00 and the following statement will show that to this time, we have gone considerably in debt:

It is most assuredly desired that this deficit will be made up on the Thanksgiving game, but unless the hearty co-operation of the student body is combined with the efforts of Manager Bruce, some definite action will have to be taken to insure the success of the remaining athletic activities of the year.

The athletic council is the principal authority on all matters pertaining to athletics, and no games shall be arranged without its consent. In fact not a cent of expense should be contracted without the sanction of said council.

Let it be understood that each manager realize the responsibility placed upon him and that he consult with the council before anything definite be arranged in the way of games, etc.

The object of the council is to act as a guiding hand.

## THE CLOSED SEASON.

With the close of the Thanksgiving recess, there remains before us but three weeks of the first semester. Monday, December 4, starts the last weeks. Thursday, Friday and Saturday, December 21, 22 and 23, respectively, bring us up at the end, not in the proverbial "cloud of dust" but in a flood of final examinations.

The committee on non-athletic student activities, which began its active work at the beginning of the

semester, has outlined a policy which, though new to us, is in force at other institutions. The last three weeks are to be "closed season."

"Yep," replied William, "but it makes his feet awful sore."

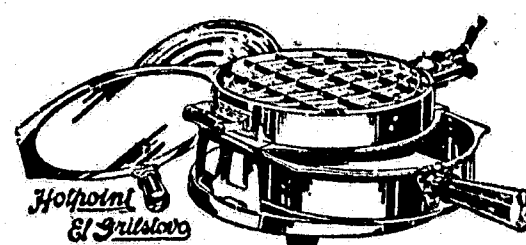
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## MUSICAL COMEDY IS BOUND TO BE SUCCESS

Al Hunt, assistant to the president, is also in the ancient city for a few days.

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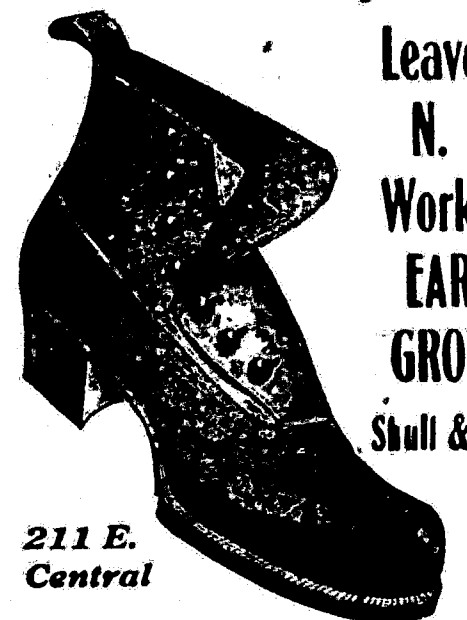
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
